## Darlington and Barton-lane End Road.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the power and authority of the said Act of the 14th and 15th of Victoria, cap. 38, given to me, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and in conformity with the said applications, I do by this Provisional Order under my hand declare,—subject to the confirmation hereof by Parliament,—that from the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, the rate of interest shall be reduced from five pounds to three pounds per centum per annum upon the bonded or mortgage debt of six thousand two hundred and thirty-three pounds four shillings, and from five pounds to one penny per centum per annum upon the subscribed debt of six thousand two hundred and seventy-six pounds ten shillings, charged or secured upon the tolls or revenues of the said road, and that the whole of the arrears of interest due and remaining unpaid upon the said subscribed debt at that date shall be extinguished.

Westbury-on-Severn Union.—Parish of Westbury-on-Severn.

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the parish of Westbury-on-Severn, in the county of Gloucester;—

To the Clerk or Clerks to the Justices of the Petty Sessions held for the division or divisions in which the said parish is situate;—

And to all others whom it may concern;—

**W**HEREAS the population of the parish of Westbury-on-Severn, in the county of Gloucester, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons,

And whereas, at a meeting of the Vestry of the said parish, held, after public notice in that behalf, at the workhouse of the said parish, on Thursday, the twenty-sixth day of February last, it was resolved that—

"The Churchwardens of this parish be requested to apply to the Poor Law Board for an Order under their Seal of Office applying and putting in force therein the statute 13 and 14 Vic., chap. 57."

And whereas the Churchwardens of the said parish have made application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the above resolution,

Now, therefore, we, the said Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, hereby order and direct:—

**ARTICLE 1.**—That the whole of the said Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled "An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other meetings in churches, and for regulating the appointment of Vestry Clerks," shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said parish of Westbury-on-Severn.

And at the request of the said Churchwardens, we hereby prescribe and direct that the said Vestry Clerk shall, if he be an Attorney-at-Law or Solicitor, in addition to the duties set forth in the Act:—

Perform and execute all the legal business of the Churchwardens and Overseers, or in which they shall be engaged, except prosecutions at the assizes, actions at law, suits in equity, or parliamentary business, without charge beyond disbursements.
