ARTICLE I.

Les Hautes Parties Contractantes prennent acte :—

1. Du Traité conclu le 12 Mai, 1863, entre la Belgique et les Pays Bas, qui restera annexé au présent Traité, et par lequel Sa Majesté le Roi des Pays Bas renonce à jamais au péage établi sur la navigation de l'Escaut et de ses embouchures par le § 3 de l'Article IX du Traité du 19 Avril, 1839, et Sa Majesté le Roi des Belges s'engage à payer le capital de rachat de ce péage, fixé à 17,141,640 florins.

2. De la déclaration faite au nom de Sa Majesté le Roi des Pays Bas, le 15 Juillet, 1863, aux Plénipotentiaires des Hautes Parties Contractantes, et portant que la suppression du péage de l'Escaut consentie par Sa dite Majesté, s'applique à tous les pavillons ; que ce péage ne pourra être rétabli sous une forme quelconque ; et que cette suppression ne portera aucune atteinte aux autres dispositions du Traité du 19 Avril, 1839 ; déclaration qui sera considérée comme insérée au présent Traité, auquel elle restera également annexée.

ARTICLE II.

Sa Majesté le Roi des Belges fait, pour ce qui la concerne, la même déclaration que celle qui est mentionnée au § 2 de l'Article précédent.

ARTICLE III.

Sa Majesté le Roi des Belges prend encore envers les autres Parties Contractantes les engagements suivants, qui deviendront exécutoires à

partir du jour où le péage de l'Escaut cessera d'être perçu :—

1. Le droit de tonnage prélevé dans les ports Belges sera supprimé ;

2. Les droits de pilotage dans les ports Belges et dans l'Escaut seront réduits :—

De 20 pour cent pour les navires à voiles ;
De 25 pour cent pour les navires remorqués ;
De 30 pour cent pour les navires à vapeur ;

3. Le régime des taxes locales imposées par la ville d'Anvers sera dans son ensemble dégrevé.

Il est bien entendu que le droit de tonnage ainsi supprimé ne pourra être rétabli, et que les droits de pilotage et les taxes locales ainsi réduits ne pourront être relevés.

Le Tarif des droits de pilotage et celui des taxes locales à Anvers, abaissés comme il est dit ci-dessus, seront inscrits dans les Protocoles de la Conférence qui a arrêté le présent Traité.

ARTICLE IV.

En considération des dispositions qui précèdent, Sa Majesté la Reine du Royaume Uni de la Grande Bretagne et d'Irlande, Sa Majesté l'Empereur d'Autriche, Roi de Hongrie et de Bohême, Sa Majesté l'Empereur du Brésil, Son Excellence le Président de la République du Chili, Sa Majesté le Roi de Danemark, Sa Majesté la Reine d'Espagne, Sa Majesté l'Empereur des Français, Sa Majesté le Roi de Hanovre, Sa Majesté le Roi d'Italie, Son Altesse Royale le Grand Duc d'Oldenbourg, Son Excellence le Président de la République du Pérou, Sa Majesté le Roi de Portugal et des Algarves, Sa Majesté le Roi de Prusse, Sa Majesté l'Empereur de toutes les Russies, Sa Majesté le Roi de Suède et de Norwège, Sa Majesté l'Empereur des Ottomans, et les Sénats des Villes Libres et Hanséatiques de Lubeck, Brême, et Hambourg, s'engagent à payer à Sa Majesté le Roi des Belges, pour leurs quote-parts dans le capital de rachat du péage de l'Escaut, que Sa dite Majesté s'est obligée à compter en entier à Sa Majesté le Roi des Pays Bas, les sommes indiquées ci-après, savoir :—

Il est convenu que les Hautes Parties Contractantes ne seront éventuellement responsables que pour la part contributive mise à la charge de chacune d'elles.

ARTICLE V.

En ce qui regarde le mode, le lieu, et l'époque du paiement des différentes quote-parts, les Hautes Parties Contractantes se réfèrent aux arrangements particuliers qui sont ou seront conclus entre chacune d'elles et le Gouvernement Belge.

ARTICLE VI.

L'exécution des engagements réciproques con-tenus dans le présent Traité est subordonnée, en tant que de besoin, à l'accomplissement des formalités et règles établies par les lois constitutionnelles de celles des Hautes Parties Contractantes qui sont tenues d'en provoquer l'application, ce qu'elles s'obligent à faire dans le plus bref délai possible.

ARTICLE VII.

Il est bien entendu que les dispositions de l'Article III ne seront obligatoires qu'à l'égard des Puissances qui ont pris part ou qui adhéreront au Traité de ce jour, Sa Majesté le Roi des Belges se réservant expressément le droit de régler le traitement fiscal et douanier des navires appartenant aux Puissances qui sont restées ou resteront en dehors de ce Traité.

ARTICLE VIII.

Le présent Traité sera ratifié, et les ratifications en seront échangées à Bruxelles, avant le 1er Août, 1863, ou aussitôt que possible après ce terme.

En foi de quoi les Plénipotentiaires respectifs l'ont signé, et y ont apposé le cachet de leurs armes.

Traité du 12 Mai, 1863, entre la Belgique, et les Pays Bas, annexé au Traité Général du 16 Juillet, 1863.

Sa Majesté le Roi des Belges et Sa Majesté le Roi des Pays Bas, Grand Duc de Luxembourg, s'étant mis d'accord sur les conditions du rachat, par voie de capitalisation, du péage établi sur la navigation de l'Escaut et de ses embouchures par le § 3 de l'Article IX du Traité du 19 Avril, 1839, ont résolu de conclure un Traité spécial à ce sujet, et ont nommé pour leurs Plénipotentiaires :

Sa Majesté le Roi des Belges, le Sieur Aldephonse Alexandre Felix Baron du Jardin, Commandeur de l'Ordre de Léopold, décoré de la Croix de Fer, Commandeur du Lion Néerlandais, Chevalier Grand-Croix de la Couronne de Chêne, Grand-Croix et Commandeur de plusieurs autres Ordres, Son Envoyé Extraordinaire et Ministre Plénipotentiaire près de Sa Majesté le Roi des Pays-Bas :

Lesquels, après avoir échangé leurs pleins pouvoirs, trouvés en bonne et due forme, ont arrêté les Articles suivants:—

ARTICLE I.

Sa Majesté le Roi des Pays Bas renonce à jamais, moyennant une somme de dix-sept millions cent quarante et un mille six cent quarante florins des Pays Bas, au droit perçu sur la navigation de l'Escaut et de ses embouchures en vertu du § 3 de l'Article IX du Traité du 19 Avril, 1839.

ARTICLE II.

Cette somme sera payée au Gouvernement Néerlandais par le Gouvernement Belge à Anvers ou à Amsterdam, au choix de ce dernier, le franc calculé à 47½ cents des Pays Bas, savoir:—

Un tiers sitôt après l'échange des ratifications, et les deux autres tiers en trois termes égaux échéant le 1 Mai, 1864, le 1 Mai, 1865, et le 1 Mai, 1866.

Il sera loisible au Gouvernement Belge d'anticiper les susdites échéances.

ARTICLE III.

A dater du paiement du premier tiers, le péage cessera d'être perçu par le Gouvernement des Pays Bas.

Les sommes non-immédiatement soldées porteront intérêt à 4 pour cent l'an, au profit du Trésor Néerlandais.

ARTICLE IV.

Il est entendu que la capitalisation du péage ne portera aucune atteinte aux engagements qui résultent, pour les deux Etats, des Traités en vigueur en ce qui concerne l'Escaut.

ARTICLE V.

Les droits de pilotage actuellement perçus sur l'Escaut sont réduits:—

De 20 pour cent pour les navires à voiles;
De 25 „ „ remorqués; et
De 30 „ „ à vapeur.

Il reste d'ailleurs convenu que les droits de pilotage sur l'Escaut ne pourront jamais être plus élevés que les droits de pilotage perçus aux embouchures de la Meuse.

ARTICLE VI.

Le présent Traité sera ratifié, et les ratifications en seront échangées à la Haye dans le délai de quatre mois, ou plus tôt si faire se peut.

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, His Majesty the Emperor of Austria, King of Hungary and Bohemia, His Majesty the King of the Belgians, His Majesty the Emperor of Brazil, His Excellency the President of the Republic of Chile, His Majesty the King of Denmark, Her Majesty the Queen of Spain, His Majesty the Emperor of the French, His Majesty the King of Hanover, His Majesty the King of Italy, His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Oldenburg, His Excellency the President of the Republic of Peru, His Majesty the King of Portugal and the Algarves, His Majesty the King of Prussia, His Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias, His Majesty the King of Sweden and Norway, His Majesty the Emperor of the Ottomans, and the Senates of the Free Hanseatic Cities of Lubeck, Bremen, and Hamburg, being equally animated with the desire to liberate for ever the navigation of the Scheldt from the toll now imposed upon it, to secure the reform of the maritime taxes collected in Belgium, and thereby to facilitate the development of the commerce and navigation of their respective dominions, have resolved to conclude a Treaty for that purpose, and have named as their Plenipotentiaries, that is to say:—

And the Senates of the Free Hanseatic Cities of Lubeck, Bremen, and Hamburgh, the Sieur Geffcken, Knight of the Second Class with badge of the Order of the Crown of Prussia, Officer of the Imperial Order of the Rose of Brazil, Knight of the Legion of Honour, Doctor of Laws, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the said Cities to His Majesty the King of the Belgians ;

Who, after having exchanged their full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon the following articles :—

ARTICLE I.

The High Contracting Parties place upon record :—

1. The Treaty concluded on the 12th of May, 1863, between Belgium and the Netherlands, which shall remain annexed to the present Treaty, and whereby His Majesty the King of the Netherlands renounces for ever the toll established on the navigation of the Scheldt and its mouths by Section 3 of Article IX of the Treaty of the 19th of April, 1839, and His Majesty the King of the Belgians engages to pay the capital of the redemption of that toll, fixed at 17,141,640 florins.

2. The Declaration made in the name of His Majesty the King of the Netherlands on the 15th of July, 1863, to the Plenipotentiaries of the High Contracting Parties, to the effect that the suppression of the Scheldt toll agreed to by His said Majesty applies to every flag ; that that toll cannot be re-established under any form whatsoever ; and that such suppression shall in no way affect the other arrangements of the Treaty of the 19th of April, 1839 ; which declaration shall be considered as if it were inserted in the present Treaty, and shall remain equally annexed thereto.

ARTICLE II.

His Majesty the King of the Belgians, in so far as he is concerned, makes the same declaration as that which is mentioned in Section 2 of the preceding Article.

ARTICLE III.

His Majesty the King of the Belgians further makes to the other Contracting Parties the following engagements, which shall come into operation from the day when the Scheldt toll shall cease to be collected :—

1. The tonnage duty imposed in Belgian ports shall cease to be levied ;

2. The pilotage dues in Belgian ports and in the Scheldt shall be reduced :—

20 per cent. for sailing vessels ;

25 per cent. for towed vessels ;

30 per cent. for steam-vessels.

3. The system of local taxes imposed by the city of Antwerp shall be throughout diminished.

It is well understood that the tonnage duty thus abolished shall not be re-established, and that the pilotage dues and the local taxes thus reduced shall not be again raised.

The tariff of pilotage dues and that of the local taxes at Antwerp, reduced as above stated, shall be inserted in the Protocols of the Conference which has concluded the present Treaty.

ARTICLE IV.

In consideration of the preceding arrangements, Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, His Majesty the Emperor of Austria, King of Hungary and Bohemia, His Majesty the Emperor of Brazil, His Excellency the President of the Republic of Chile, His Majesty the King of Denmark, Her Majesty the Queen of Spain, His Majesty the Emperor of the French, His Majesty the King of Hanover, His Majesty the King of Italy, His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Oldenburg, His Excellency the President of the Republic of Peru, His Majesty the King of Portugal and the Algarves, His Majesty the King of Prussia, His Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias, His Majesty the King of Sweden and Norway, His Majesty the Emperor of the Ottomans, and the Senates of the Free Hanseatic Cities of Lubeck, Bremen, and Hamburgh, engage to pay to His Majesty the King of the Belgians, as their share in the capital of the redemption of the Scheldt toll, the whole of which His said Majesty has taken upon himself to pay to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, the sums hereinafter specified ; that is to say :—

It is agreed that each of the High Contracting Parties shall be eventually responsible only for the contributive share placed to its own charge.

ARTICLE V.

With regard to the manner, the place, and the time of the payment of the different shares, the High Contracting Parties refer to the separate arrangements which are or shall be concluded between each of them and the Belgian Government.

ARTICLE VI.

The execution of the reciprocal engagements contained in the present Treaty is expressly declared to be subject, in case of need, to the fulfilment of the formalities and rules prescribed by the constitutional laws of those of the High Contracting Parties for whom such a sanction is required, and who engage to take measures for obtaining the same with the least possible delay.

ARTICLE VII.

It is well understood that the arrangements of Article III shall be obligatory only with regard to those Powers which have taken part in or shall accede to the Treaty of this day; His Majesty the King of the Belgians expressly reserving to himself the right of regulating the treatment, in regard to duties and customs, of vessels belonging to Powers which have not or shall not become parties to that Treaty.

ARTICLE VIII.

The present Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Brussels before the 1st of August, 1863, or as soon as possible after that date.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

Treaty of the 12th of May, 1863, between Belgium and the Netherlands, annexed to the General Treaty of the 16th of July, 1863.

HIS Majesty the King of the Belgians, and His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, Grand Duke of Luxemburg, having come to an agreement upon the conditions of the redemption, by way of capitalization, of the toll established upon the navigation of the Scheldt and its mouths by section 3 of Article IX of the Treaty of the 19th of April, 1839, have resolved to conclude a special Treaty on that subject, and have named as their Plenipotentiaries:

His Majesty the King of the Belgians, the Sieur Aldephonse Alexander Felix Baron du Jardin, Commander of the Order of Leopold, decorated with the Iron Cross, Commander of the Netherlands Lion, Knight Grand Cross of the Oaken Crown, Grand Cross and Commander of several other Orders, His Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands.

His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, the Sieur Paul Van der Maesen de Sombreff, Knight Grand Cross of the Order of the Nichan Iftihar of Tunis, His Minister for Foreign Affairs; the Sieur John Rudolph Thorbecke, Knight Grand Cross of the Order of the Netherlands Lion, Grand Cross of the Order of Leopold of Belgium, and of several other Orders, His Minister of the Interior; and the Sieur Gérard Henry Betz, His Minister of Finance;

Who, after having exchanged their full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon the following Articles:—

ARTICLE I.

His Majesty the King of the Netherlands renounces for ever, in consideration of a sum of seventeen millions one hundred and forty-one thousand six hundred and forty Netherlands florins, the duty collected upon the navigation of the Scheldt and its mouths, in virtue of section 3 of Article IX of the Treaty of the 19th of April, 1839.

ARTICLE II.

This sum shall be paid to the Netherlands Government by the Belgian Government at Antwerp or Amsterdam, at the option of the latter, the franc being calculated at $47\frac{1}{4}$ Netherlands centimes, that is to say:—

One-third as soon as may be after the exchange of the ratifications, and the other two-thirds in three equal instalments falling due on the 1st of May, 1864, the 1st of May, 1865, and the 1st of May, 1866.

The Belgian Government shall be at liberty to anticipate the said days of payment.

ARTICLE III.

From and after the payment of the first third, the toll shall cease to be collected by the Government of the Netherlands.

The amount not immediately paid shall bear interest at 4 per cent. per annum for the benefit of the Netherlands Treasury.

ARTICLE IV.

It is understood that the capitalization of the toll shall in no way affect the engagements which result, with regard to the two States, from the Treaties in force concerning the Scheldt.

ARTICLE V.

The pilotage dues now collected in the Scheldt are reduced:—

20 per cent. for sailing-vessels;

25 per cent. for towed vessels;

30 per cent. for steam-vessels.

It is, moreover, agreed that the pilotage dues in the Scheldt shall never be higher than the pilotage dues collected in the mouths of the Meuse.

ARTICLE VI.

The present Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at the Hague in four months, or sooner if possible.

In witness whereof the aforesaid Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto their seals.

Protocol Annexed to the Treaty of the 16th July, 1863.

THE undersigned Plenipotentiaries having met in Conference in order to conclude the General Treaty relative to the redemption of the Scheldt toll, and having judged it expedient, previously to putting that arrangement into form, to obtain explanations as to the scope of the Treaty concluded on the 12th of May, 1863, between Belgium and the Netherlands, resolved, for this purpose, to invite the Minister of the Netherlands to assist at the Conference.

The Plenipotentiary of the Netherlands responded to the invitation, and made the following declaration:—

The undersigned Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, declares, in virtue of special powers which he has received, that the suppression of the Scheldt toll, agreed to by his august Sovereign in the Treaty of the 12th of May, applies to every flag; that that toll cannot be re-established under any form whatsoever; and that such suppression shall in no way affect the other arrangements of the Treaty of the 19th April, 1839.

I do, by virtue of the provisions of "The Locomotive Act, 1861," by this Order, under my hand, prohibit the use of any kind of Locomotive whatever, propelled by steam, or any other than animal power, on the Old North Turnpike-road, and parish highways within the parish of Bassingbourn, or within any other parish, hamlet, or place adjacent thereto, in the counties of Cambridge and Hertford, except between the hours of nine at night and seven in the morning.

I do, in pursuance of the provisions of "The Locomotive Act, 1861," by this order, under my hand, prohibit the use of any kind of Locomotive whatever propelled by steam or any other than animal power on the above road, except between the hours of ten at night and seven in the morning.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at San José, Costa Rica, reporting that on the 15th June last, an uniform duty of four rials (two shillings) per quintal (one hundred pounds) was substituted for the storage, road dues, &c., hitherto collected by the Custom House on goods imported, in addition to the duties prescribed by the Tariff.

Upon the same date, a Custom House in the interior of the Republic, through which importations had to pass, subject to examination, was abolished, goods that have passed the Custom House at Punta Arenas being free for all the Republic.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Decree, forwarded by Her Majesty's Minister at Lisbon, containing the official text of a law prescribing certain alterations in the Portuguese Tariff, and of which the following is a translation:—

ARTICLE 1ST.—That the duty of 75 reis (4d.) per kilogramme, to which dry beef with or without any salt was subject, is reduced to 20 reis (1½d.) per an equal weight, including the beef which is despatched for consumption in Lisbon.

ARTICLE 2ND.—The duties laid down in the general tariff of the Custom Houses for fresh fish from river water or from the sea are reduced to the uniform rate of 6 per cent. *ad valorem*.

ARTICLE 3RD.—The duty of 30 reis (1½d.) per kilogramme, which is imposed in the aforesaid tariff for printing paper of any colour is reduced to 15 reis (¾ of a penny) for the same weight.

ARTICLE 4TH.—The export duty of ½ per cent. on the waste bits, shreds, and shavings of hides and skins, is raised to 1 per cent. *ad valorem*.

ARTICLE 5TH.—An import duty of 20 reis (1½d.) per kilogramme is established for the oil of petroleum.

ARTICLE 6TH.—The reductions and the exemptions from duty, stated in the table which is subjoined to this law are approved.

ARTICLE 7TH.—All legislation to the contrary is revoked.

We command, therefore, all the authorities to whom the knowledge and the execution of the said law appertain, to observe it and to comply

with the same, and to cause it to be complied with and observed exactly as is contained therein.

The Minister and Secretary of State for the Finance Department shall have it printed, published, and circulated.

ARTICLE I.—That so much of the said Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk shall forthwith be applied to, and be put in force within the said parish of Erith.

ARTICLE II.—That an annual salary of forty pounds shall be paid to the Vestry Clerk for the time being, appointed under the authority of the statutes in such behalf and this Order, by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the poor of the said parish.

ARTICLE III.—That the salary of such Vestry Clerk shall be payable up to the day on which he ceases to hold such office, and no longer, and shall be paid by quarterly payments at the several quarters ending at the usual Feast Days in the year, namely, Michaelmas Day, Christmas Day, Lady Day, and Midsummer Day, with a proportionate sum to be paid to his executors or administrators, in case he shall die while holding such office.
