Venice, Aug. 31. Our last Letters from the *Mohr*, brought us an account of Towns being attacked and taken without any intervening time between, and now we hear again the same from thence: For by a *Felucca* arrived this Night in 8 days from *Lepanto*, we have advice, that the *Venetian Army* had landed at the upper end of the Gulph, fought, got a Victory, was Masters of *Corinthe*, and of the whole *Isthmus*, driving the *Turks* quite out of it; which is such a Series of Success, that it appears to us more like a Dream of a Victory, than a Reality, though we have no Reason to doubt of its Certainty, but are expecting the Particulars.

Vienna, August 31. Their Imperial Majesties returned hither yesterday in the Evening from *Nieu-Fladt*; but whether there will be any such Relation published as was expected to be brought by Count *Tafel*, is now made a Question; for he is returned with the Emperor, and we hear nothing more of it. Here is a large account brought of vast Quantities of Powder, Bullet, Bombs, Grenado's, Horses, Camels, Mules and Buffalo's; with all sorts of Provisions, which the Commissary General *Rabata* has taken Possession of in the Emperor's Name for the use of the Army; whereby they are like to be supplied at the Enemies Cost for the rest of the Campaign. It's said, that amongst other Curiosities brought hither, is the Grand Visiers Collection of Letters, amongst which, there is one from the Prince of *Transylvania*, Congratulating with him upon his success in forcing the Imperialists over the *Drave*; and desiring of him the Assistance of 10000 Men against Winter, to put him into a Condition to withstand any Propositions that may be made him, either as to Quarters, or whatever else may be prejudicial to the Engagements he is under with the *Porte*: And yet we hear, that there is an Envoy expected here from the said Prince within few days, some of his Servants being already arrived. The account we have of the Enemy, is, that none of them are to be seen on this side of the *Drave*: The Grand Visier, who is sensible what that Militia is capable of in their rage after a defeat, who have been used to revenge their own Fallings upon their Officers, and by a barbarous practice, to make no distinction between the Unfortunate and Criminal, had thought fit to prevent any such Contrivances against him, by first dividing them, and then removing from them; and accordingly, having ordered about 4000 Spahis and 2000 Janisaries to be left at *Esseck*, and most of the remainder at *Peter Waradin* for the security of that Bridge, he was gone himself, with few more than his Life-Guard, to *Belgrade*: That he had writ an account of what had hapned to the Grand Signior, most lamenting the loss of the Janisaries, as what was hardly to be repaired. We do not find that the Relations yet agree, what the Enemy may have lost in this occasion: Our Men compute that their Army is diminished at least 25000: But it is said, that *Ishmael Bassa*, who was taken at *Buda*, having the second Command there, and had paid his Ransom of 14000 Crowns at *Mohatz* but few days before the Fight to General *Dunawald* (whose Prisoner he was;) had writ to the said General from *Esseck*, a Letter of Civility for his good Usage; wherein he acquainted
