THE following Despatch has been received from Sir Frederick Bruce, Her Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Chief Superintendent of Trade in China :

My LORD, *Peking, April 30, 1863.*

Referring to my Despatch* of 8th September, 1862, I have the honor to state that Mr. Medhurst, before leaving Shanghai, published the letter to him which formed Inclosure in that Despatch. The publication has done good, by clearing up the misapprehension that prevailed, as to the real position of foreigners at the Chinese Ports open to trade, and as evidence that Her Majesty's Government will not agree to any system which does not respect the territorial rights of the Chinese Government, and its exclusive jurisdiction over its own subjects. This exclusive jurisdiction of China over Chinese, and of each foreign nation over its subjects, is the foundation on which the international relations of China with the outer world is based.

I am glad to say that Monsieur Bertheimy enclosed to the French Government the paper containing my correspondence with Mr. Medhurst as expressing the views entertained by him on this delicate question. They are fully concurred in by the Russian and the American Ministers.

The British and American communities have appointed a committee to prepare a scheme for the municipal government of the large part of the settlement inhabited by them, in conformity with these principles, and I hope that, with the aid of their experience, a system may be found which will meet the requirements of the place, and to which the Chinese Government will give its assent.

The growth of Shanghai is wonderful ; its population is estimated at 1,500,000, and it bids fair to become soon the most important city of the East. The Chinese flock to it on account of the security it enjoys, and the silk manufacture which was destroyed by the Taeping occupation of Soochow and Hung-chow, is taking root at Shanghai.

It is a subject of great satisfaction to me that our resolution to save Shanghai from the destruction that menaced it at the hands of the Taeping Lordes, has not only been productive of great

benefit to trade, but has afforded a safe asylum and an escape from ruin to so large a body of the industrious and respectable native population.

— Fulham Union.—Parish of Hammersmith.

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the parish of Hammersmith, in the county of Middlesex;—

To the Clerk or Clerks to the Justices of the Petty Sessions held for the division or divisions in which the said parish is situate;—

And to all others whom it may concern;—

WHEREAS the population of the parish of Hammersmith, in the county of Middlesex, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons.

And whereas, at a meeting of the Vestry, held at the National School Room, near the parish Church, after public notice in that behalf, on

Thursday, the eleventh day of June last, it was resolved,—

“That the Poor Law Board be requested to
“issue an Order, under their Seal of Office,
“directing that the Act passed on the 5th
“August, 1850 (13 and 14 Vict. c. 57),
“entitled ‘An Act to prevent the holding of
“‘Vestry or other Meetings in Churches,
“‘and for regulating the appointment of
“‘Vestry Clerks,’ shall be applied to and
“put in force within this parish, as regards
“that portion of it only which relates to the
“appointment of a Vestry Clerk.”

And whereas the Churchwardens of the said parish have made their application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the above resolution,

Now, therefore, we, the said Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, hereby order and direct as follows; that is to say:—

ARTICLE I.—That so much of the said Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk, shall forthwith be applied to, and be put in force within, the said parish of Hammersmith.

And at the request of the said Churchwardens, we hereby prescribe and direct, that the said Vestry Clerk shall perform the following duties, in addition to the duties set forth in the said Act; that is to say:—

1. To make out the rates raised in the said parish under the *Metropolis Local Management Act*, and to procure the same to be allowed, and to give all notices thereof required by Law, and to prepare and counter-sign the Rate Receipt Books.
2. To make out, keep, and enter the accounts of the rates raised in the said parish under the *Metropolis Local Management Act*, and to attend the auditing thereof.
3. To inquire into the settlements of paupers becoming chargeable to the said parish, and to report thereon to the Churchwardens and Overseers, and on receiving instructions from them to prepare all documents necessary to obtain the order of removal, and to adopt all such subsequent proceedings as the Law may require for the removal of the pauper, which he shall be legally qualified to perform.

ARTICLE II.—That a salary of two hundred and fifty pounds per annum shall be paid to the Vestry Clerk for the time being, appointed under the authority of the Statutes in that behalf and this Order, by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said parish.

ARTICLE III.—That the salary of such Vestry Clerk shall be payable up to the day on which he ceases to hold such office, and no longer, and shall be paid by quarterly payments at the several quarters ending at the usual Feast Days in the year, namely, Michaelmas Day, Christmas Day, Lady Day, and Midsummer Day, with a proportionate sum to be paid to his executors or administrators in case he shall die while holding such office.

ARTICLE IV.—That every person appointed to the office of Vestry Clerk in the said parish, shall give to the Guardians of the Poor of the Fulham Union, in the county of Middlesex, a bond, in the penal sum of five hundred pounds, in the names of himself and two sufficient sureties, con-

ditioned for the due and faithful performance of the duties of the office; and every such officer shall give immediate notice to the said Guardians of the death, insolvency, or bankruptcy of either of such sureties, and shall, when required by the said guardians, produce a certificate, signed by two householders, that his sureties are alive and believed by them to be solvent, and shall supply a fresh surety in the place of any such surety who may die, or become bankrupt or insolvent;

Provided that the Guardians may, if they think fit, take the security of any society or company, expressly authorised by statute to guarantee or secure the faithful discharge of the duties of any Poor Law Officer.

ARTICLE V.—That the Auditor of the District comprising the said Fulham Union, shall, in the statement required by the General Order of the Poor Law Commissioners, dated the seventeenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, to be transmitted to the Poor Law Commissioners of the securities of the officers of the said Union, include the name of the Vestry Clerk for the said parish of Hammersmith for the time being, appointed under the authority aforesaid, together with the particulars in the said General Order required, and shall report thereon to the Board of Guardians of the said Union, in like manner as therein set forth with reference to the securities of other officers.

ARTICLE VI.—That a copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.
