THE Queen has been pleased to approve of M. Abel Frédéric Gautier as Consul-General in the British Provinces of North America, to reside at Quebec, for His Majesty the Emperor of the French.

The Queen has also been pleased to approve of Don Manuel José Palacios as Consul-General in the Polynesian Islands for the Republic of Peru.

By virtue of an Act, passed in the twenty-fourth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to repeal so much of two Acts made in the tenth and fifteenth years of the reign of His present Majesty as authorizes the Speaker of the House of Commons to issue his warrant to the Clerk of the Crown for making out writs for the election of Members to serve in Parliament, in the manner therein mentioned, and for substituting other provisions for the like purposes;" and of an Act passed in the twenty-sixth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to further limit and define the time for proceeding to Election during the Recess:"

I do hereby give notice, that the death of the Right Honourable Edward Ellice, late a Member serving in this present Parliament for the city of Coventry, hath been certified to me in writing, under the hands of two Members serving in this present Parliament, and that I shall issue my warrant to the Clerk of the Crown to make out a new writ for the electing of a Member to serve in this present Parliament for the said city, at the end of six days after the insertion of this notice in the London Gazette.

fore styled "Agents General for the Crown Colonies," shall henceforth be designated "Crown Agents for the Colonies."

The Queen has been pleased to grant unto William Henry Jones, of Lennard-place, Saint John's Wood, in the parish of Saint Marylebone, in the county of Middlesex, Esquire, a Commander in the Royal Navy, and to Sarah Henrietta Byrom, of Leek, in the county of Stafford, Spinster, only child of Henry Byrom, of Bath, in the county of Somerset, Esquire, by Sarah, his late wife, Her Royal licence and authority that they may (in pursuance of a covenant contained in a deed of indenture executed in contemplation of their intended marriage) from and immediately after the solemnization of their said intended marriage, take and henceforth use the surname of Byrom, in addition to and after that of Jones, and that he, the said William Henry Jones, may bear the arms of Byrom; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise the said Royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And to command that the said Royal concession and declaration be recorded in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

The Queen has been pleased to grant unto Theophilus Paske, of New Wandsworth, in the county of Surrey, Gentleman, eldest son and heir of Thomas Theophilus Paske, late of the city of Bath, Esquire, a retired Colonel in the service of the East India Company on the Madras Establishment, deceased, Her Royal licence and authority, that he may use the surname of Haselfoot, in addition to and after that of Paske, and bear the arms of Haselfoot quarterly with those of Paske; and that such surname and arms may, in like manner, be taken, borne, and used by his issue; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise the said Royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And to command that the said Royal concession and declaration be recorded in Her Majesty's College of Arms.
