THE following Despatch has been addressed by Earl Russell to Sir Alexander Malet, Her Britannic Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the Diet of Frankfort:

*Foreign Office,
September 29, 1863.*

SIR,

YOUR Despatch of the 21st inst. shows in a convincing manner, that the state of affairs between Germany and Denmark is becoming very serious.

You state that a Report of a Committee has been presented to the Diet, from your analysis of which it appears that the framers of this Report recommend Federal execution in the Duchy of Holstein; that the Report is to be considered on the 1st of October, and if adopted, execution will take place three weeks afterwards, the shortest interval of time, you observe, which the Constitution of the Diet allows.

It appears further, that the grounds upon which the resolution of Federal execution is to be based, are of the widest description.

The Report says, "The aim of the execution consists unmistakably in carrying out the Diet's Decrees of the 11th of February and the 12th of August, 1858, of the 8th of March, 1860, of the 7th of February, 1861, and the 9th of July, 1863, in so far as this has not already been done, and at the same time in fulfilment of the declared engagement entered into by the Royal Rescript of the years 1851-2, with reference to the Duchies of Holstein and Lauenburg, that is to say, to establish between the said Duchies, together with Sleswig, and the kingdom of Denmark Proper, a general constitution connecting them by a common union (*gleichhartiger Verband*) which should secure the independence and equal rights of each, in such wise that no one part should be subordinated to another; and likewise for the establishment of provincial constitutions for the Duchies of Holstein and Lauenburg, possessing a representation with competence of final decision."

It is impossible for Her Majesty's Government to shut their eyes to the gravity of the proposition which the Diet have to consider.

Had the report of the Committee gone no further than to affirm that the Royal Letters Patent do not fulfil the resolutions of the Diet as to the Duchy of Holstein; that the Duke of Holstein

has no right to dispose of the money of Holstein without the consent of its representatives; that he has no right to enact laws for Holstein but in concurrence with the Diet of Holstein; that the long delays of the Danish Government to come to a satisfactory arrangement have made Federal execution necessary, Her Majesty's Government, although they would still have lamented the interference of the German Diet at this particular time, could not have denied that the principles asserted were the sound, and indeed the fundamental principles of constitutional government.

But it cannot be pretended that the constitution of the whole Danish Monarchy can be subject to the jurisdiction of the German Confederation.

If the representatives of the Duchies of Holstein and Lauenburg are to have a *veto* on the proceedings of the Danish Parliament and of the Danish Government, it is obvious that measures the most necessary for the defence of Denmark against a foreign enemy may be hindered, the whole action of the Danish monarchy may be paralysed, and the integrity and independence of Denmark may be seriously impaired.

Her Majesty, by the Treaty of London of May 8, 1852, is bound to respect the integrity and independence of Denmark. The Emperor of Austria and the King of Prussia have taken the same engagement.

Her Majesty could not see with indifference a military occupation of Holstein, which is only to cease upon terms injuriously affecting the constitution of the whole Danish monarchy.

Her Majesty's Government could not recognize this military occupation as a legitimate exercise of the powers of the Confederation, or admit that it could properly be called a Federal execution.

Her Majesty's Government could not be indifferent to the bearing of such an act upon Denmark, and upon European interests.

Her Majesty's Government therefore earnestly entreat the German Diet to pause, and to submit the questions in dispute between Germany and Denmark to the mediation of other Powers, unconcerned in the controversy, but deeply concerned in the maintenance of the peace of Europe and the independence of Denmark.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Washington, enclosing, as follows, a copy of a circular issued by the Treasury of the United States to the Agents of that Department, "concerning trade with and in States declared in "insurrection, and concerning abandoned and "captured property," together with a summary of the most important provisions in the revised regulations presented by the United States Secretary of the Treasury.

To the Special Agents of the Treasury Department.

GENTLEMEN.—The President of the United States, having, by proclamation of July 1, 1862, declared and proclaimed that the States of South Carolina, Florida, Georgia, Alabama, Louisiana, Texas, Mississippi, Arkansas, Tennessee, North Carolina, and the State of Virginia, except the following counties, Hancock, Brooke, Ohio, Marshall, Wetzell, Marion, Monongalia, Preston, Taylor, Pleasants, Tyler, Ritchie, Doddridge,

Harrison, Wood, Jackson, Wirt, Roane, Calhoun, Gilmer, Barbour, Tucker, Lewis, Braxton, Upshur, Randolph, Mason, Putnam, Kanawha, Clay, Nicholas, Cabell, Wayne, Boone, Logan, Wyoming, Webster, Fayette and Raleigh, are in insurrection and rebellion:—

And having also by proclamation on the 31st of March, 1863, revoked certain exceptions made by his former proclamation, dated August 16, 1861, and declared that the inhabitants of the States of Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Tennessee, Alabama, Louisiana, Texas, Arkansas, Mississippi, Florida and Virginia (except the forty-eight counties of Virginia designated as West Virginia, and except, also, the ports of New Orleans, Key West, Port Royal, and Beaufort, in North Carolina), are in a state of insurrection against the United States, and that all commercial intercourse, not licensed and conducted as provided in said act, between the said States and the inhabitants thereof, with the exceptions aforesaid, and the citizens of other States, and other parts of the United States, is unlawful, and will remain unlawful until such insurrection shall cease or has been suppressed, and notice thereof has been duly given by proclamation; and all cotton, tobacco and other products, and all other goods and chattels, wares and merchandise coming from any of said States, with the exceptions aforesaid, into other parts of the United States, or proceeding to any of said States, with the exceptions aforesaid, without the license and permission of the President, through the Secretary of the Treasury, will, together with the vessel or vehicle conveying the same, be forfeited to the United States.

And the act of Congress "further to provide for the collection of duties on imports and for other purposes, approved July 13, 1861," having authorized said proclamation, and the license and regulations referred to.

And the act of Congress supplementary to said act of July 13, 1861, approved May 20, 1862, having conferred additional powers on said Secretary, and prescribed further conditions of trade.

And the Act of Congress approved March 12, 1863, entitled "an Act to provide for the collection of abandoned property and for the prevention of frauds in insurrectionary districts within the United States," having declared

"That it shall be lawful for the Secretary of the Treasury, from and after the passage of said Act, as he shall from time to time see fit, to appoint a special agent or agents to receive and collect all abandoned or captured property in any state or territory, or any portion of any state or territory of the United States, designated as in insurrection against the lawful government of the United States by the proclamation of the President of July 1, 1862: Provided, that such property shall not include any kind or description which has been used, or which was intended to be used, for waging or carrying on war against the United States, such as arms, ordnance, ships, steamboats, or other water craft, and the furniture, forage, military supplies, or munitions of war."

And further, "That any part of the goods or property received or collected by such agent or agents may be appropriated to public use on due appraisement and certificate thereof, or forwarded to any place of sale within the loyal States, as the public interests may require; and that all sales of

such property shall be at public auction to the highest bidder, and the proceeds thereof shall be paid into the Treasury of the United States."

And further, "That he shall cause a book or books of account to be kept, showing from whom such property was received, the cost of transportation and the proceeds of the sale thereof."

And further, "That any person claiming to have been the owner of any such abandoned or captured property may, at any time within two years after the suppression of the rebellion, prefer his claim to the proceeds thereof in the Court of Claims; and on proof, to the satisfaction of said Court, of his ownership of said property, of his right to the proceeds thereof, and that he has never given any aid or comfort to the present rebellion, to receive the residue of such proceeds after deducting the expenses of transportation and sale of said property, and any other lawful expenses attending the disposition thereof."

And further, "That it shall be the duty of any officer or private of the regular or volunteer forces of the United States, or any officer, sailor or marine in the naval service of the United States, upon the inland waters of the United States, who may take or receive any such abandoned property, or cotton, sugar, rice, or tobacco, from persons in such insurrectionary districts, or have it under his control, to turn the same over to an agent appointed as aforesaid, who shall give a receipt therefor; and in case he shall refuse to do so, he shall be tried by a court martial, and punished as said court shall order, with the approval of the President of the United States."

And the Secretary of War and the Secretary of the Navy having respectively made and published orders, for the enforcing of said acts.

The following regulations are prescribed for the government of the several supervising, assistant, and local special agents and agency aids, appointed to carry said Acts and the regulations made under them into effect; and for the purpose of conducting the commercial intercourse licensed and permitted by the President, and preventing the conveyance of munitions of war and supplies to insurgents, or to localities declared to be in insurrection against the United States, or in such quantities that there will be imminent danger of their falling into the possession or under the control of insurgents; and are published, together with the proclamations and license of the President, the several Acts of Congress and the orders of the Secretaries of War and of the Navy, for the information of parties interested.

All officers charged with the execution of these regulations, while using necessary vigilance to prevent supplies to rebels, either directly or by undue accumulation at points where there will be imminent danger of their falling into their hands, and in collecting abandoned or captured property, will be careful to occasion as little inconvenience as possible to any legitimate trade or intercourse, or to loyal people.

tary of the Treasury for the government of the limited commercial intercourse between the citizens of the loyal States and the inhabitants of States and parts of States heretofore declared to be in insurrection. The Secretary has given the most careful consideration to the subject, and, while many of the former restrictions have been removed, due provision has been made to prevent the rebels from benefiting by the regulations.

The general supervising special agents, now five in number, are required, after conference with the Generals commanding departments, when possible, and with their sanction, unless unavoidable circumstances prevent the obtaining of it, to designate by known geographical boundaries, or by the enumeration of counties, that portion of the territory included in their agencies respectively, with which trade may be safely permitted, and report such designation to the Secretary. The part of territory so designated shall be called the trade district; and no transportation of goods, except as specially provided for, shall be permitted beyond the lines of such district. If it shall appear that, beyond the lines of national military occupation, there is some territory within which the supply of necessities is required by humanity and sound policy, while trade cannot yet be safely re-established, then the supervising special agent, with the sanction of the General commanding the department, but in no case without his sanction, and subject to revocation and modification by the Secretary, may in like manner designate the portion of territory in their respective agencies to which goods may be properly permitted for individual and family supply, but for no other purpose. The territory so designated shall be called the supply district, and no goods shall be transported thereto for resale, except as provided by regulation. Authorized traders, except in the cities of Memphis and Nashville, and such other cities or towns as may hereafter be designated by the Secretary, with the concurrence and approval of the General commanding the department, shall not sell goods to others to be resold by them, but shall sell only to persons for their own individual family or plantation use. In Memphis, Nashville, and other cities after designation, authorized traders may sell goods to other traders for the purpose of resale upon the certificate of the proper local special agent. Persons and families residing in these cities may purchase supplies for their own consumption at any trade store therein without any permit or certificate, but goods so sold shall not be transported out of the said cities without the permit of the proper officer. Upon the request of the general commanding the department the establishment of one or more trade stores in any city or town of a supply district may be authorized under the same regulations as trade stores are established in trade districts, and subject to military orders. But the authority to establish such stores may be revoked and such stores discontinued whenever the public interest may require it. All proper and loyal persons may apply in the prescribed form for authority to purchase, for money other than gold or silver, any of the products of the country within the lines of national military occupation in the agency, except when prohibited by the general commanding the department, or other special military order, and to transport the same to market, on executing a proper bond. Every permit to purchase or sell cotton, tobacco, or other merchandise within any place or section in a State heretofore declared in insurrection, after commercial intercourse therewith, shall have been permitted by the Secretary of the

The President has considered and approved the revised trade regulations prescribed by the Secre-

Treasury, and every permit to transport the same thereto, therein, or therefrom, shall clearly define the character and quantity of the merchandise. Boats and vessels may be cleared, and merchandise not prohibited may be permitted, from any port which has been blockaded, but opened by proclamation, upon payment of such fees only as were chargeable therefor before the blockade was declared, but subject to prescribed regulations, and upon giving bond not to land or discharge any of such merchandise at any intermediate point, except under permit authorised by the regulations. But no goods, wares, or merchandise shall be shipped or transported from and out of such opened port, except under permits granted upon compliance with the regulations and local rules and payment of prescribed fees.

The above are a few of the most important provisions. The modified regulations are to supersede those of March 31 last, and all others conflicting with them. All permits granted and acts done in pursuance of former regulations are to be valid and effectual until the 15th of October next, unless the regulations shall have been sooner received and made known at the place of such permits or acts.

HARBOURS, AND WORKS AFFECTING TIDAL WATERS, OR NAVIGATION.

THE following Memorandum is published for the information and guidance of Harbour Authorities and other persons interested in Works situate in Tidal Waters :

THE attention of promoters of harbour works, as well as of parties objecting to such works, is especially directed to the enactments and regulations relating to Provisional Orders. (See Part III.)

I.—NOTICES OF WORKS TO BE CONSTRUCTED IN TIDAL WATERS.

By an Act for the Preservation of the Public Harbours of the United Kingdom, 1806, it is provided as follows, viz. :—

"From and after the passing of this Act, it shall not be lawful for any person or persons to make, construct, or erect any pier, quay, wharf, jetty, breast, or embankment in or adjoining to any public harbour in the United Kingdom, or any river immediately communicating therewith, so far as the tide flows up the same, without giving at least one month's previous notice of his, her, or their intention so to do to the Secretary of the Admiralty, who is to lay the same before the Lord High Admiral or Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty for the time being."

25 & 26 Vict., c. 69, s. 15.

By the Harbours Transfer Act, 1862, it is provided as follows, viz. :—

"From and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, the Act of the forty-sixth year of King George the Third (chapter one hundred and fifty-three) 'For the preservation of the public harbours of the United Kingdom,' shall be read as if the Board of Trade were therein named instead of the Admiralty."

All notices therefore which have hitherto been deposited at the Admiralty under 46 Geo. III., c. 153, must after the 31st December, 1862, be deposited at the Board of Trade.

II.—BILLS IN PARLIAMENT AFFECTING HARBOURS, TIDAL WATERS, OR NAVIGATION.

The Standing Orders of the House of Commons, No. 32, and the Standing Orders of the House of Lords, No. 182, Clause Three, contain the following requirements, viz. :—

"In cases where the work shall be situate on tidal lands within the ordinary spring tides, a copy of the plans and sections shall, on or before the thirtieth day of November, be deposited at the offices of the Board of Admiralty and of the Board of Trade."

The Standing Orders of the House of Commons, No. 39, contain the following requirements, viz. :—

"On or before the twenty-third day of December, a printed copy of every bill relating to any dock, harbour, navigation pier or port, shall be deposited in the office of the Board of Admiralty and in the office of the Board of Trade."

14 and 15 Vict., c. 49, s. 2.

By the Preliminary Inquiries Act, 1851, it is provided as follows, viz. :—

"Whenever application shall be made to Parliament for a bill whereby power is sought to construct any works on the shore of the sea, or of any creek, bay, arm of the sea, or navigable river communicating therewith, or to construct any bridge, viaduct, or other work, across any creek, bay, arm of the sea, or navigable river, or to construct any work affecting the navigation of any harbour, Port, tidal water, or navigable river, it shall be lawful for the Lord High Admiral, or for the Lords Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral, to require the promoters of such Bill to deposit at the office of the Admiralty, in addition to the plans, sections, or other documents which may have been deposited at such office, in compliance with the standing orders of either House of Parliament, all such statements and other documents as the said Lord High Admiral or Lords Commissioners shall deem necessary to explain the objects of the intended application to Parliament, and the proposed interference with such tidal lands or navigation, as the case may be."

25 and 26 Vict., c. 69, s. 3.

By the Harbours Transfer Act, 1862, it is provided as follows, viz. :—

“Whenever after the end of the present Session of Parliament application is made to Parliament for any such bill as is described in ‘The Preliminary Inquiries Act, 1851,’ the Board of Trade may exercise the powers by that Act given to the Admiralty; and in relation to every such bill that Act shall be read as if the Board of Trade were therein named instead of the Admiralty.”

The documents heretofore required by the Admiralty under the Preliminary Inquiries Act, in addition to those required by the standing orders, must, therefore, in the case of bills of the coming and future sessions, be deposited with the Board of Trade instead of with the Admiralty.

These documents consist of an ordnance map, or a chart of the locality, with the exact site and extent of the proposed works laid down thereon.

26 & 27 Vict., c. 92.

By the Railways Clauses Act, 1863, which will, like the original Railways Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, be incorporated with future private Acts, it is provided as follows, viz. :—

Protection of Navigation.

Sect. 13.—“Where the Company is authorized by the Special Act to construct, alter, or extend any work on, in, over, through, or across tidal lands or a tidal water, the Company shall, on or near the work, during the whole time of the constructing, altering, or extending thereof, exhibit and keep burning at their own expense, every night from sunset to sunrise, such lights (if any) as the Board of Trade from time to time requires or approves; and (notwithstanding the enactments for the time being in force respecting lighthouses) shall also on or near the work, when completed, always maintain, exhibit, and keep burning, at their own expense, every night from sunset to sunrise, such lights (if any) for the guidance of ships as the Board of Trade from time to time requires or approves.

“If the Company fails to comply in any respect with the provisions of the present section, they shall for each night in which they so fail be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.”

Sect. 14.—“Where the Company is authorized or required by the Special Act to construct a bridge over a navigable tidal water, and the special Act does not make express provision respecting the span or spans thereof, then the Company shall construct the same with a span or spans of such headway and waterway, and with such opening span or spans (if any), and according to such plan, as the Board of Trade directs or approves.”

Sect. 15.—“Where the Company constructs a bridge with an opening span, it shall not be lawful for the Company to detain any vessel, barge, or boat at the bridge for a longer time

“than may be necessary for admitting a carriage or engine traversing the railway and approaching the bridge to cross the bridge, and for opening the bridge to admit the vessel, barge, or boat to pass; and the Company shall be subject to and shall abide by such regulations with regard to the user of the bridge as may from time to time be made by the Board of Trade.

“If the Company detains a vessel, barge, or boat longer than the time aforesaid, or fails in any respect to abide by any such regulation as aforesaid, they shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, without prejudice to any remedy against them for any loss or damage sustained by any person.”

Sect. 16.—“Where the railway cuts off access between the land and a tidal water or tidal lands, then and in every such case the Company shall, during the construction of the railway, and from time to time thereafter, make, and shall permanently maintain, and allow to be used by all persons, at all times, free of toll or other charge, all such footways and carriage-ways over, under, or across the railway, or on a level therewith, as the Board of Trade from time to time directs or approves: Provided always, as follows:

- (1.) “The Company shall not be obliged to make a footway or carriage-way over lands for the use of an owner or occupier who has agreed to receive and has been paid compensation for the severance thereof from the tidal water or tidal lands:
- (2.) “The Company shall not be obliged to make, or to allow to be made, a footway or carriage-way in such manner as would interfere with the working or using of the railway:
- (3.) “The expense of the making and maintenance of a footway or carriage-way required to be made after the construction of the railway shall be defrayed by the persons or body interested in the tidal water or tidal lands for whose benefit or convenience the same is required:

“Where the footway or carriage-way is made across the railway on the level, then the manner of the making and watching of the level crossing shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Trade; and where the level crossing is made after the construction of the railway, then all expenses attending the watching thereof shall be defrayed by the persons or body interested in the tidal water or tidal lands for whose benefit or convenience the same is required.”

Sect. 17.—“Where the Company is authorised by the Special Act to construct a railway skirting a public navigable tidal river or channel, the Company shall not make any deviation of the railway from the continuous centre line thereof marked on the plan deposited by them at the Board of Trade, even within the limits of deviation shown on that plan, in such manner as to diminish the navigable space, without the previous consent of the Board of Trade, or otherwise than in such manner as is expressly authorised by the Board of Trade.

"If any deviation is made in contravention of the present section, the Board of Trade may abate and remove the work in the construction whereof the deviation is made, or any part thereof, and restore the site thereof to its former condition, at the expense of the Company; and the amount of such expense shall be a debt due from the Company to the Crown, and be recoverable accordingly, with costs, or the same may be recovered, with costs, as a penalty is recoverable from the Company."

Sect. 18.—"If a work constructed by the Company on, in, over, through, or across tidal lands or a tidal water is abandoned, or suffered to fall into decay, the Board of Trade may abate and remove the work, or any part of it, and restore the site thereof to its former condition, at the expense of the Company; and the amount of such expense shall be a debt due from the Company to the Crown, and be recoverable accordingly, with costs, or the same may be recovered, with costs, as a penalty is recoverable from the Company."

Sect. 19.—"If at any time the Board of Trade deems it expedient, for the purposes of the Special Act, or of this part of this Act, to order a survey and examination of a work constructed by the Company on, in, over, through, or across tidal lands or tidal water, or of the intended site of any such work, the Company shall defray the expense of the survey and examination; and the amount thereof shall be a debt due from the Company to the Crown, and be recoverable accordingly, with costs, or the same may be recovered, with costs, as a penalty is recoverable from the Company."

III.—PROVISIONAL ORDERS UNDER "THE GENERAL PIER AND HARBOUR ACT, 1861," AND "THE GENERAL PIER AND HARBOUR ACT, 1861, AMENDMENT ACT."

By the General Pier and Harbour Act, 1861, Amendment Act, it is provided as follows, viz.:—

Sect. 3.—"Any person intending to make application to the Board of Trade for a Provisional Order relative to a pier or harbour, which persons are hereinafter called the promoters, shall, in the months of October and November, or either of them, immediately preceding the application for the Provisional Order, publish notice of their intention by advertisement, according to the regulations contained in Schedule (B), Part I, to this Act."

Sect. 4.—"On or before the thirtieth day of November immediately preceding the application for the Provisional Order, the promoters shall deposit the documents described in Schedule (B), Part II, to this Act, according to the regulations therein contained."

Sect. 5.—"On or before the twenty-third day of December in the same year, the promoters shall deposit the documents mentioned in Schedule (B), Part III, to this Act, according to the regulations therein contained."

SCHEDULE (B) to 25 Vict., cap. 19, referred to in the above Sections.

PART I.—Advertisement in October or November of intended Application.

(1.) "Every advertisement is to state—

"1. The objects of the intended application, specifying any of the following objects, when comprised among the objects of the application:

"(a.) Extension of time for the completion of any works already authorised:

"(b.) Power for a Company to amalgamate with another:

"(c.) Power to sell, purchase, lease, or take on lease, an undertaking:

"(d.) Amendment or repeal of any local or special Act of Parliament, or of any former Provisional Order:

"(e.) Power to levy any tolls, rates, or duties, or to alter any existing tolls, rates, or duties:

"(f.) The conferring, varying, or extinguishing of any exemption from tolls, rates, or duties, or of any other right or privilege:

"(g.) Constitution or alteration of constitution of any harbour authority.

"2. A general description of the nature of the proposed new works, if any.

"3. The names of the parishes, townlands, townships, and extra-parochial places, in which the proposed new works, if any, will be made.

"4. The times and places at which the deposit under Part II of this schedule will be made.

"5. An office, either in London, or at the place to which the intended application relates, at which printed copies of the draft Provisional Order, when deposited, will be purchaseable as herein-after approved.

"(2.) The whole notice is to be included in one advertisement, which is to be headed, with a short title descriptive of the undertaking or application.

"(3.) The advertisement is to be inserted once at least in each of two successive weeks in some one and the same newspaper published in the city, town, or place where the proposed works will be made, or where the pier or harbour to which the intended application relates is situate; or if there be no such newspaper, then in some one and the same newspaper published in the county in which such city, town, or place, or some part thereof, is situate; and if there be none, then in some one and the same newspaper published in some adjoining or neighbouring county.

"(4.) The advertisement is also in every case to be inserted once at least in the London Gazette if the place to which the intended application relates is situate in England or Wales, in the Edinburgh Gazette if such place is situate in Scotland, or in the Dublin Gazette if such place is situate in Ireland."

PART II.—Deposit on or before 30th November.

"(1.) The promoters are to deposit—

"1. A copy of the advertisement published by
"them.

"2. A proper plan and section of the proposed
"new works, if any; such plan and
"section to be prepared according to
"such regulations as may from time to
"time be made by the Board of Trade
"in that behalf.

"(2.) The documents aforesaid are to be depo-
"sited for public inspection—

"1: In England or Ireland, in the office of the
"Clerk of the Peace for every county,
"riding, or division; in Scotland, in the
"office of the Principal Sheriff-Clerk for
"every county, district, or division in
"which any proposed new work will be
"made, or in which the pier or harbour
"to which the intended application re-
"lates, or any part thereof, is situate.

"2. At the custom-house, if any, of the port,
"sub-port, or creek to which the in-
"tended application relates.

"(3.) The documents aforesaid are also to be
"deposited in the offices of the *Admiralty** and of
"the Board of Trade."

PART III.—Deposit on or before 23rd December.

"(1.) The promoters are to deposit at the
Office of the Board of Trade—

"1. A memorial of the promoters, signed by
"them or one of them, headed with a
"short title descriptive of the under-
"taking or application (corresponding
"with that at the head of the advertise-
"ment), addressed to the Board of
"Trade, and praying for a Provisional
"Order.

"2. A printed draft of the Provisional Order
"as proposed by the promoters.

"3. An estimate of the expense of the proposed
"new works, if any, signed by the
"person making the same.

"(2.) They are also to deposit printed copies
"of the Draft Provisional Order for public in-
"spection at the Custom-house (if any) of the
"port, sub-port, or creek to which the application
"relates.

"(3.) They are also to deposit a sufficient
"number of such printed copies at the office
"named in that behalf in the advertisement; such
"copies to be there furnished to all persons
"applying for them at the price of not more than
"one shilling each."

*The Board of Trade, acting in exercise of the
powers given to them by the General Pier
and Harbour Act, 1861, Amendment Act,
have made the following regulations:—*

1. The plans and sections to be deposited in
pursuance of section 4, of the General Pier and
Harbour Act, 1861, must be such plans and sec-
tions as would be required by the Standing Orders
of the House of Commons, if the Promoters,
instead of applying for a Provisional Order, were
proceeding by Private Bill.

2. The Draft Provisional Order which is to be
deposited at the Board of Trade on or before the
23rd December must be deposited in triplicate,
accompanied by a copy of every private or local

* See Section 12 of Harbours Transfer Act, referred to
below.

Act, charter, deed, or other document of a like
nature which is referred to therein.

3. The Promoters must be prepared to prove
compliance with the provisions of the Act con-
cerning deposit and publication by the 10th
January. Six days notice will be given of the
day and hour at which the Promoters are to attend
for the purpose at the Board of Trade. Printed
forms of proof will be supplied, which should be
filled up by the Promoters, and brought with the
requisite documents to the Board of Trade at the
time fixed for proof.

4. Any objections to the Provisional Order
which it is intended to urge on the Board of
Trade, must be sent in to that office before the
1st February. A copy of such objections must
also be sent, at the same time, to the promoters;
and in forwarding the objections to the Board of
Trade the objectors, or their agents, should state
that this has been done.

5. The Board of Trade will entertain and
consider objections founded on alleged injury to
public interests, or alleged violation of admitted
principles, *e.g.*, "That the proposed work will
"injure a public harbour," or "That tolls are to
"be imposed on ships which will derive no benefit
"from them;" and they will not proceed with any
Provisional Order to which valid objections of
this description are shown to exist. Objections
arising out of competition, or out of opposition
between local interests, they will only attempt to
settle, provided the parties are willing to abide by
their decision. When the parties cannot come to
terms, the Board of Trade will not order a local
inquiry, or attempt to anticipate the decision of
Parliamentary Committees.

6. The Bill for confirming Provisional Orders
will be brought in on the 1st March, or as soon
after that date as possible. And all preliminary
questions must be determined and the Provisional
Orders must be finally settled and signed before
that date.

*By the Harbours Transfer Act, 1862, it is
provided as follows, viz.:—*

Sect. 12.—"From and after the end of the
"present session of Parliament, any provision of
"the General Pier and Harbour Act, 1861,
"Amendment Act, requiring any deposit of docu-
"ments to be made at the Admiralty Office, shall
"be repealed."

Sect. 14.—"From and after the end of the
"present session of Parliament, the following
"sections of the General Pier and Harbour Act,
"1861, Amendment Act, and all provisions rela-
"tive thereto in any other Act or in any Pro-
"visional Order of the Board of Trade contained,
"shall be read and construed as if the Board of
"Trade were named in the said sections instead
"of the Admiralty; namely, sections seven, eight,
"nine, ten, and eleven."

**IV.—AS TO WORKS WHEN THEY HAVE BEEN
SANCTIONED BY PARLIAMENT.**

25 and 26 Vict., c. 69.

*By the Harbours Transfer Act, 1862, it is pro-
vided as follows, viz.:—*

Harbours, Docks, and Piers Clauses Act, 1847.

Sect. 5. "With respect to any special Act that
"may be passed after the end of the present
"session of Parliament, the following sections of
"the Harbours, Docks, and Piers Clauses Act,
"1847, and all provisions relative thereto in that

"Act or in any such future special Act contained, shall be read and construed as if the Board of Trade were named in the said sections instead of the Admiralty; namely, sections twelve, thirteen, sixteen, eighteen, and nineteen."

Railway Clauses Consolidation Acts, 1845.

Sect. 6. "With respect to any special Act that may be passed after the end of the present session of Parliament, sections seventeen of the Railways Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, and the Railways Clauses Consolidation (Scotland) Act, 1845, respectively, and all provisions relative thereto in the said Acts or any such future special Act contained, shall be read and construed as if the Board of Trade were named in the said sections instead of the Admiralty."

Tramways (Ireland) Act, 1860.

Sect. 7.—"With respect to applications made after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, under the Tramways (Ireland) Act, 1860, section forty-one of that Act, shall be read as if the Board of Trade were therein named instead of the Admiralty."

Special Acts for Railways, Harbours, &c.

Sect. 8.—"Where any special or local or local and personal Act, or Act of a local or local and personal nature, already passed or to be passed before the end of the present Session of Parliament,—

- "(1.) Authorizing or regulating the construction of a Railway, or the execution of any work whatever, situate on or affecting tidal lands, or the shore of the sea, or of any navigable river, where and so far up the same as the tide flows and reflows; or,
- "(2.) Authorizing or regulating the construction or improving of a harbour, dock, or pier, or works connected therewith, by any company, body corporate, commissioners, trustees, undertakers, persons or person; or
- "(3.) Constituting or altering or regulating the constitution of any harbour or conservancy authority; or
- "(4.) Altering or regulating the powers or duties of any harbour or conservancy authority,—

"contains either expressly or by incorporation or reference or otherwise, any provision for any of the purposes following:—

- "For preventing the construction or execution of any work or the doing of any thing without the consent or approval of the Admiralty, or for authorizing or requiring any work to be constructed, executed, or maintained, or any thing to be done with the consent, or on the requisition, or to the satisfaction of the Admiralty;
- "For empowering the Admiralty to exercise any authority concerning lifeboats, mortars, rockets, tide gauges, or barometers to be provided by any undertakers;
- "For empowering the Admiralty to make a local survey or examination at the expense of any company, body, or person;
- "For empowering the Admiralty, in case of any work being abandoned or suffered to fall into disuse or decay, or in any other case, to abate, remove, or alter,

"any work or any part of it, or restore the site thereof to its former condition, at the like expense:

"For empowering the Admiralty to exercise any authority concerning light to be maintained at night during the construction or execution of any work:

"For empowering the Admiralty or the first Lord of the Admiralty to nominate or appoint a member or members of any board or body of trustees, commissioners, or conservators, or of any harbour or conservancy authority:

"For empowering the Admiralty to determine any dispute or difference between or among any bodies or persons:

"For empowering the Admiralty, or the First Lord of the Admiralty, to nominate or appoint any arbitrator, referee, or umpire, or any engineer, inspector, or officer, or any person to fill any place or discharge any duty under such Act:

"or any other provision for the protection, management, or regulation of harbours or navigation, or for the exercise of any control or power over or in relation to any harbour authority, or any other provision in anywise relating to conservancy, or authorising or requiring any act or thing concerning harbours or navigation or conservancy, to be done by or in relation to the Admiralty,—

"Then from and after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, such Acts and all enactments relative thereto shall be read and construed as if in the respective provisions aforesaid the Board of Trade were named instead of the Admiralty, and the President of the Board of Trade instead of the First Lord of the Admiralty."

V.—RESERVATION OF ADMIRALTY JURISDICTION IN CERTAIN CASES.

By the 9th Clause of the Harbours Transfer Act, 1862, it is provided as follows, viz.:—

"Where it appears to the Admiralty that the interests of Her Majesty's Naval Service require that the whole or any part of any harbour, port, bay, estuary, or navigable river, in, on, or adjoining to which there is or shall be any of Her Majesty's Dockyards, Victualling Yards, Steam Factory Yards, Arsenals, or Naval Stations, should be excepted, either entirely or in some respects, out of the operation of the last foregoing section, the Admiralty may give notice in writing to the Board of Trade, that any such harbour, port, bay, estuary, or navigable river as aforesaid, or such part thereof as is in the notice specified, is to be deemed so excepted, either entirely or in the respects therein mentioned; and every such notice shall be published by the Admiralty in the *London, Edinburgh, or Dublin Gazette* (according as the place affected may be in England, Scotland, and Ireland), and thereupon the harbour, port, bay, estuary, or navigable river to which such notice relates, or the part thereof therein specified, shall, either entirely or in the respects therein mentioned, as the case may require, be and remain as if this Act had not been passed."

**APPOINTMENT OF STANDINGS FOR HACKNEY CARRIAGES WITHIN THE
METROPOLITAN POLICE DISTRICT; AND REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED.**

EIGHTEEN STANDINGS APPOINTED.

CROMWELL ROAD, Brompton.	Fifteen Carriages. In Cromwell Road, Brompton, along the kerbstone on the North side, commencing 25 yards East of the South Entrance to the International Exhibition, horses' heads towards the West, and extend Eastward a sufficient length for fifteen carriages.
GREAT WESTERN (or KENSINGTON) ROAD, Horticultural Gardens.	Eleven Carriages.
