THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at New Granada, the following translation of a Decree recently issued by the President

of that Republic, requiring the presentation of certified invoices of all merchandize imported into New Granada:—

ART. 1.—The obligation is hereby imposed upon importers of foreign merchandize, of presenting, together with the manifests, the original invoices, certified by the Colombian Consul at the port from which they are sent.

ART. 2.—At the foreign ports where there are no Colombian Consuls, the certificate shall be obtained from the Consul of a friendly nation. The Consuls of the Republic of Chile are bound to perform this service according to Article 34 of the Treaty of amity, commerce, and navigation with that Republic.

ART. 3.—The certificate spoken of in Article 1st shall express the number of packages mentioned in the invoice, the species of merchandize, the Colombian weight of each package, the name of the vessel in which they are shipped, the Colombian port to which they are directed, and the name of the merchant or commission agent to whom they belong.

ART. 4.—The Consuls shall transmit to the "Oficina General de Cuentas" a legalized copy of the invoices certified by them.

ART. 5.—The Consuls shall be entitled to levy one dollar upon each invoice they certify, in accordance with the 4th Clause, Article 19th, of the Law of the 7th of March, 1856, upon Consular Service.

ART. 6.—The following dates are fixed for the carrying out of this Decree:—

60 days, as regards merchandize imported from ports in the Antilles, Central America, and the Republics on the Pacific.

90 days, as regards merchandize proceeding from the United States and Mexico; and

120 days, as regards merchandise proceeding from other ports.

These dates shall be counted from the date of this Decree.

ART. 7.—The non-presentation of certified invoices subjects every package composing the cargo to examination, and to an additional duty of 10 per cent. over and above the ordinary duties.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister in China, reporting that the Chinese Government has provided that in cases where due notice is given to export, within twelve months, produce brought down the Great River to Shanghai, the half duty paid thereon shall be refunded if the marks, packages, amounts and weights are found by the Chinese Customs Authorities to correspond with those originally entered in the books, and if such produce is exported within the twelve months now allowed in lieu of the three months hitherto granted.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Buenos Ayres, enclosing the following translation of a Decree passed by the Argentine Government on the 23rd September last:

ART. I.—All vessels coming from ports where Argentine Consuls have been named, must have their manifesto viséd in proper manner by such Consul, under pain of paying double the Consular Fees, the same to be recoverable at the Custom-house, one half to be devoted to the National Revenue, and the other half given to the proper Consul.

ART. II.—This fine of double fees above mentioned will be put in force four months after date of this Decree, recovering in the meantime only the usual fees ordained by Art. 8, of the law 7th November, 1862.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Madagascar, reporting that the duties and restrictions applied to articles imported into and exported from that island, during the reign of Queen Ranavaloa, have been in force from the 18th of September last, and stating that the following is the scale of customs, &c., duties:

On all Imports except Spirits 10 per cent. in kind
Spirits 33½ „

On all Exports 20 per cent. *ad valorem*, of which 10 per cent. may be deducted from the vendor of produce, but the whole is recoverable from the shipper.

Tonnage dues are charged according to the measurement of vessels, 6*d.* per ton register, and 1*s.* per foot of draught.

WHEREAS, at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden at Stafford, in and for the county of Stafford, on Monday, the 19th day of October, 1863, before the Right Honourable Thomas George, Earl of Lichfield, Chairman, and Thomas Fletcher Twemlow, Esquire, and others, their Fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace in the county aforesaid, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanors committed in the same county, a Provisional Order was made in the words following—that is to say :

“Whereas the Right Honourable Thomas George, Earl of Lichfield, the Right Honourable Edward Richard Baron Hatherton, the Right Honourable John Lord Wrottesley, Edward Bul-ler, Thomas Fletcher Twemlow, John Ayshford Wise, and Henry Killick, Esquires, and the Reverend John Sneyd, Clerk, being eight of Her Majesty’s Justices of the Peace of the county of Stafford, and acting in and for the said county, and being residents in the said county of Stafford, did on the 19th day of September, in the year of our Lord 1863, by writing under their hands, require the Clerk of the Peace for the said county to add to or send with the notice required by law to be given of the holding of the then next General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, in and for the said county, a notice in the form marked A in the Schedule, to a certain Act made and passed in a session of Parliament, holden in the 25th and 26th years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled ‘An Act for the better management of Highways in England,’ that at such Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, to be holden in and for the said county of Stafford, a proposal would be made to the Justices of the Peace for the said county, then and there assembled, to divide the said county into Highway Districts. And whereas the said Clerk of the Peace for the said county duly complied with the said requisition in every particular, and also in conformity and compliance with the requisition of the said Justices, sent by post in a prepaid letter, notices in the aforesaid form, to the Church-wardens or Overseers of every parish and place maintaining its own highways, mentioned in the Provisional Order and Districts hereinafter mentioned and hereby made: And whereas at the Court of Quarter Sessions, held in and for the said county of Stafford, on Monday, the 29th day of June, 1863, a Final Order was duly made under the provisions of the said Act, constituting and dividing a part of the said county into a Highway District, called ‘Burton-upon-Trent Highway District.’ Now this Court upon a due consideration of the premises, and being satisfied that the said requisition has been duly complied with, and that all proper notices have been given in the manner and to the persons as required by the first-mentioned Act, has entertained the said proposal, and under and by virtue of the first-mentioned Act, doth hereby make this Provisional Order, that the county of Stafford, with the exception of the several parishes, townships, and places included and comprised in the aforesaid ‘Burton-upon-Trent Highway District,’ and with the exception of the parishes, places, and districts, and parts of parishes and places, in and by the said Act directed and required not to be included in any Highway District formed in pursuance thereof, shall be divided into Highway Districts for the more convenient management of highways; and the said districts shall be known

by the several and respective names hereinafter mentioned, that is to say :

- Bilston and Wolverhampton District,
- Cheadle and Uttoxeter District,
- Eccleshall District,
- Kingswinford and Wordsley District,
- Leek District,
- Penkridge District,
- Pirehill District,
- Shenstone, Elford, and Rugeley District,
- Stafford and Stone District,
- Westbromwich, Wednesbury, and Walsall District.

And it is further ordered, that the several parishes, townships, tithings, hamlets, and places herein-after mentioned, shall be united and form the said several districts hereinbefore and hereinafter mentioned; and that the number of Waywardens which each parish is to elect shall be the number set opposite to each parish, that is to say :

A Provisional Order was also made to constitute the parishes of Bredwardine, Blakemere, Brobury, Clifford, Cusop, Dorstone, Letton, Moccas, Preston-upon-Wye, Witney, and Winferton, into a highway district, to be called “The Bredwardine Highway District”; and that the several townships, hamlets, and places, of Clifford, Middlewood, Hardwick, and Westbrook, all of which are in the parish of Clifford, and each of which now separately maintains its own highways, and such part of the township, hamlet, or place of Fomine, as is in the said parish of Clifford, shall be respectively combined with the said parish of Clifford; and that no separate Waywardens shall be elected for such separate townships, hamlets, and places, and that the several townships, hamlets, and places of Upper and Lower Dorstone, in the parish of Dorstone, and such part of the township, hamlet, or place of Fomine, as is in the said parish of Dorstone, shall be combined with the said parish of Dorstone, and that no separate Waywardens shall be elected for such several townships, hamlets, and places; and that the said parishes of Clifford and Dorstone respectively, shall be severally subject to the same liabilities in respect of all the highways within each of such two parishes which have been hitherto maintained by such several townships, hamlets, and places; and that two Waywardens shall be elected for the said parish of Clifford, and one for each of the said parishes of Bredwardine, Blakemere, Brobury, Cusop, Dorstone, Letton, Moccas, Preston-upon-Wye, Whitney, and Winferton.

(Repeal, Consolidation, and Amendment of Acts, Amalgamation of the Commercial Dock Company and the Grand Surrey Docks and Canal Company; Re-Incorporation of the two Companies into one Company by a different name; Arrangements as to Capital and Debt; Power to increase the Capital and to borrow; Provisions as to the Priorities and Rights of Holders of Stock and Shares in the two Companies; General Provisions for regulating the Company; Powers to purchase, &c., Lands, and to execute new Works; Provisions as to Tolls and Rates.)

1. 3. 6. To authorize the Company to augment the capital of the two Companies by the creation and issue of ordinary or preference stock, or ordinary or preference shares, or by all or any of those modes, to such an amount as may be provided by

the Act, and to grant to the subscribers of such new capital such priorities, privileges, and advantages, as the Act may provide.

7. To determine the order and manner in which the proprietors of stock and shares in the two Companies, and in the Company, shall be entitled to the profits of the Company, applicable to dividends, and to alter the priorities, rights, and privileges of the proprietors of existing ordinary and preference stock, and ordinary and preference shares in the two Companies respectively.

8. To prescribe the scale of voting at general meetings of the Company.

(Provisions as to use of Subways provided by Metropolitan Board of Works, Water, Gas, and other Companies, and persons to lay down Pipes in subways so provided; Restrictions against breaking up Streets; Amendment of Acts.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing Session for an Act to empower the Metropolitan Board of Works to require Gas, Water, Telegraph, and other Companies, Corporations, Societies, or persons to make use of the subways already formed, or in course of completion by the Board, or hereafter to be made by the Board in the Metropolis for the purpose of laying down Gas, Water, and other pipes, Tubes for telegraph wires, or any other pipes or apparatus.

Extension of limits of supply of Gas and of Rates; Power to pay Dividends and hold Meetings half-yearly; Amendment of Acts.
