**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the Session  
of Parliament, held in the twenty-sixth and  
twenty-seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, in-  
titled "An Act to enable Her Majesty in Council  
"to make alterations in the Circuits of the Judges,"  
it is enacted that Her Majesty, by and with the  
advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council,  
shall have power from time to time to order and  
direct that the Circuits of Her Majesty's Judges  
in England and Wales, or any of such Circuits,  
shall be altered, by taking away from any circuit  
any county, or counties, or any part or parts of  
any county or counties, and annexing the same to  
any other circuit or circuits; and every such  
alteration shall take effect upon and from the date  
of the Order in Council, in and by which the same  
shall be ordered and directed, or from such other

time as shall be provided in such Order. Now,  
therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the  
advice of Her Privy Council, to order and direct,  
and it is hereby ordered and directed that the  
Northern, the Midland, and the Norfolk Circuits of  
Her Majesty's Judges in England, shall be altered  
in manner following (that is to say); the county  
of York, and the county of the city of York, shall  
be taken away from the Northern Circuit, and  
annexed to the Midland Circuit; and the counties  
of Leicester, and of Rutland, and of Northampton,  
shall be taken away from the Midland Circuit, and  
annexed to the Norfolk Circuit: And it is hereby  
further ordered and directed that every such  
alteration shall take effect upon and from this  
eighth day of December, one thousand eight hun-  
dred and sixty-three.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session  
of Parliament, held in the twenty-sixth  
and twenty-seventh years of Her Majesty's reign,  
intituled "An Act to enable Her Majesty in  
"Council to make alterations in the Circuits of  
"the Judges," after reciting that by the twenty-  
eighth section of the Act of the session of  
Parliament, holden in the sixth and seventh years  
of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter eighteenth,  
it is enacted that, except as is thereafter provi-  
ded, no greater number of Barristers shall be  
appointed in any year to revise the Lists of Voters,  
in the election of Members to serve in Parliament  
for the several counties, cities, boroughs, and  
places, within the several circuits in England and  
Wales than as therein provided, it is by the said first-  
mentioned Act enacted, that, upon any alteration  
or alterations being made in any of the said circuits  
by Her Majesty in Council, by virtue of such first-  
mentioned Act, it shall also be lawful for Her  
Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy  
Council, to order and direct that the number of  
Revising Barristers to be appointed for the several  
counties, cities, boroughs, and places, within any  
circuit or circuits affected by such alteration or  
alterations as aforesaid, shall be increased or

diminished as to Her Majesty, by and with such advice as aforesaid, may seem meet, anything in the last recited Act to the contrary notwithstanding: Provided always, that the present total number of Revising Barristers shall not be augmented otherwise than in accordance with the provisions of the twenty-ninth section of the said last-mentioned Act.

And whereas Her Majesty has been pleased this day by Her Order, made by virtue of the said first-mentioned Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order and direct that the Northern, the Midland, and the Norfolk Circuits shall be altered in manner in the said Order set forth.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order and direct, and it is hereby ordered and directed that the number of Revising Barristers to be appointed for the several counties, cities, boroughs, and places within the Northern Circuit (being a circuit affected by such alterations as aforesaid), shall be diminished by the number of six; and that the number of Revising Barristers to be appointed for the several counties, cities, boroughs, and places within the Midland Circuit (being a circuit affected by such alterations as aforesaid), shall be increased by the number of three; and that the number of Revising Barristers to be appointed for the several counties, cities, boroughs, and places within the Norfolk Circuit (being a circuit affected by such alterations as aforesaid), shall be increased by the number of three.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the Poll at County Elections;" it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the Justices of any county, riding, parts, or division, in England or Wales, in Quarter Sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling-places for such county, riding, parts, or division, is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition, may be a polling-place or polling-places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition, shall be a polling-place or polling-places, for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the Justices of the Peace for the county, riding, parts, or division, in Quarter Sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and describe the divisions of counties, and the limits of cities and boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling-place.

And whereas the Justices of the Peace for the county of Kent, in General Quarter Sessions assembled on the twenty-second day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling-places at present existing in the Western Division of the said county is insufficient, and praying that the town of Woolwich, in the said division of the said county, may be an additional polling-place for the Western Division of the said county.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that the said town of Woolwich shall be an additional polling-place for the Western Division of the said county; and that the Justices of the Peace for the said county, in Quarter Sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act, passed in the second and third years of the reign of his said late Majesty shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such Western Division of the said county into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling-place.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the bishoprick of Winchester, and now vested in us.

"Whereas under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and duly published in the London Gazette on the day following, the lands, tenements, and hereditaments called 'The Southwark Park Estate,' otherwise 'The Winchester Park Estate,' situate in the parish of Saint Saviour, Southwark, in the county of Surrey, and particularly described in the schedule to the said Order, which therefore belonged to the bishoprick of Winchester, became and are now vested in us in fee-simple for the purposes, and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas certain of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments aforesaid, are subject to outstanding beneficial sub-leases, and partly on that account, and partly on account of their character

or situation, are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable, under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas by an Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, power is given to lessees holding under us, in the event of our declining to enter into a treaty for the sale of our reversions, or the purchase of the sub-leasehold interests, to require us to purchase such sub-leasehold interests at a valuation.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments, or such part or parts thereof, as we shall at any time or from time to time think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorised and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act, with the consent of the parties interested in such beneficial sub-leases (if any), testified by his, her, or their being made parties to such instruments, all or any of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his, her, or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise, as he, she, or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration, as shall, upon due calculation and enquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council, now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Winchester.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorised and empowered to appropriate out of the common fund created by the herein firstly-mentioned Act, to each of the several benefices specified in the first column of the said schedule hereunto annexed respectively, the capital sum set against the name of each such benefice, in the fifth column of the same schedule, and that such capital sums respectively, or any part or parts thereof may be paid and applied by us towards the purchase or acquisition for such livings respectively, or any one or more of them, of any land, tithe, or other hereditaments which may appear to us to be suitable for annexation to such benefices respectively, or towards defraying the cost of providing suitable parsonage houses for the same; and that in the meantime there shall be allowed and paid by us by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year, to the incumbents for the time being of the said several benefices respectively, in respect of such capital sums, or of such part or parts thereof as shall remain from time to time unapplied towards such purposes as aforesaid, the several yearly sums specified in the sixth column of the said schedule, and therein set against the names of the said several benefices respectively, or such parts of the said several yearly sums respectively, as shall bear a proportion to the parts of the said several capital sums last-mentioned so remaining unapplied as aforesaid, corresponding with the proportion or proportions which the amounts of the said several yearly payments respectively bear to the amounts of the said respective capital sums so specified in the fifth column as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"Whereas the said prebend was vacant at the time of the passing of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments theretofore belonging to the said prebend (except rights of patronage) became, upon the passing of the said Act, and by virtue thereof, absolutely vested in us for the purposes, and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments aforesaid, are not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant, but are now in possession, but some portions thereof, on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable, under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas, with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said lands, tenements, hereditaments and endowments, or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time, and from time to time think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein,

or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorised and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments, theretofore belonging to the said prebend of Freeford, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his, her, or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise, as he, she, or they, shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration, as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyard and burial-grounds, be postponed, as follows; viz.:

In the churchyard of CUMBERWORTH, Yorkshire, from the first of January to the first of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

In the burial-grounds of the Wesleyan and Baptist Chapels, Haddenham, to the thirty-first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

**BIRMINGHAM.**—Forthwith in All Saints' Churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, and in already purchased private graves, to be used in accordance with the regulations for new burial-grounds.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the nineteenth day of January next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of or on some conspicuous places within the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said nineteenth day of January.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage, certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, or in respect of, letters, newspapers, parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers, transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post; and by the same Act powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of postage therein mentioned.

And whereas further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament, passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-office.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by a certain Warrant in writing, under their hands, bearing date at Whitehall, Treasury-chambers, the 21st day of July, 1857, in exercise of the powers vested in them in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, did (amongst other things) order and direct that all packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, colonial, or foreign, and all packets consisting of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament or the Colonial Legislatures, might be transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and any part of the several places mentioned and set forth in the schedule A to the now reciting Warrant annexed, and, amongst other places, Canada, subject to the several rates of postage and

regulations therein contained. And the said Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury did order, direct, and declare that the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury might, by warrant under their hands, or the hands of any two of them, at any time thereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage thereby fixed or altered, or any of the orders, directions, regulations and conditions thereby made, and might make and establish any new or other rates, orders, directions, regulations and conditions, in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates of postage which might be payable were to be paid.

And whereas it is expedient to extend the privileges granted by the said recited Warrant of the said Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the said 21st day of July, 1857, and to authorise the transmission by the post, between the United Kingdom and Canada, of certain other packets, and for that purpose to make certain further and other regulations in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us, in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, and every of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows, that is to say:—

1. All packets consisting of patterns or samples of merchandise of no intrinsic value, posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Canada, or posted in Canada addressed to the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and Canada, the sea conveyance being by Canadian packet-boat, subject to the several rates of postage, and to the several orders, directions, regulations, and restrictions hereinafter mentioned and contained (that is to say):—

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform single rate of postage of threepence.

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces, and not exceeding one half of a pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one half of a pound, and not exceeding one pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid four rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound, and not exceeding one pound and one half of another pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid six rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and one half of another pound, and not exceeding two pounds in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid eight rates of postage.

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage; and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight, shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

2. No such packet which in length or breadth or width shall exceed the dimensions of two feet, shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant.

3. No pattern or sample being of any intrinsic value, or being an article or thing of a saleable nature, or having a value of its own apart from its mere use as a pattern or sample, shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant.

4. There shall be no enclosure, sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other enclosure not authorised by this Warrant, sent in or with any such packet.

5. There shall be no writing or printing in or upon any such packet, or on the cover thereof, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender thereof, a trade mark, and number and price.

6. All such packets shall be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Nevertheless, samples of seeds, drugs, and such other articles and things as cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or of other material, but bags so closed that they cannot be readily opened, even although they be transparent, shall not be used for that purpose.

7. If any packet sent, or tendered, or delivered, in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant shall, in length, or breadth, or width, exceed the dimensions of two feet, or shall consist wholly of patterns or samples of any intrinsic value, as in the third clause of this Warrant mentioned, or if there shall be any writing or printing in or upon any such packet, or on the cover thereof, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender thereof, a trade mark, and number and price, or if any such packets shall not be sent in covers, open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination (except samples of seeds, drugs, and such other articles and things as cannot be sent in open covers, and which may be enclosed in bags of linen or of other material, or in case of bags being used, if such bags shall be so closed that they cannot be readily opened every such packet shall be chargeable and shall be treated in all respects as a letter.

8. If any packet, sent, or tendered, or delivered, in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be posted in Canada, and the postage paid thereon at the time of the same being posted shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable under and by virtue of this Warrant, but equal in amount to the sum of three-pence, every such last-mentioned packet shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the difference between the postage so paid thereon and the postage to which such packet would be liable as aforesaid, together with a further and additional rate of postage of three-pence; but if any such packet shall be posted in Canada without any postage having been paid thereon, or with a postage paid thereon less in amount than the sum of three-pence, every such respective packet shall be forwarded, charged with a postage of double the amount of postage to which it would have been liable under and by virtue of this Warrant if the postage had been paid when posted.
