Easington Union.—Township of Dawdon.

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the township of Dawdon, in the county of Durham;

To the Clerk or Clerks to the Justices of the Petty Sessions held for the division or divisions in which the said township is situate;

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS the population of the township of Dawdon, in the county of Durham, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons.

And whereas at a meeting in Vestry, of the inhabitants of the said township, held at the Vestry-room of the said township, after public notice in that behalf, on Thursday, the 19th day of November last, it was resolved,—

“That an application be made to the Poor Law Commissioners to make an Order, in pursuance of the Act of Parliament, 13th and 14th Victoria, chapter 57, sect. 1, that such part of the said Act as applies to the appointment of Vestry Clerks, be put in force

“within the township of Dawdon, in order
“that a Vestry Clerk may be elected for the
“said township.”

And whereas the Overseers of the Poor of the said township have made their application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the above resolution,

Now, therefore, we, the Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, hereby order and direct as follows; that is to say:—

ARTICLE I.—That so much of the said Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk, shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said township of Dawdon.

ARTICLE II.—That the Overseers of the Poor of the said township shall, unless the Poor Law Board otherwise direct, pay to the officer for the time being appointed to the said office of Vestry Clerk for the said township, under the authority of the Statutes in that behalf and this Order, for the performance of the duties of such office, a salary of one pound one shilling per annum.

ARTICLE III.—That the salary of such Vestry Clerk shall be payable up to the day on which he ceases to hold such office, and no longer, and shall be paid by half-yearly payments at Lady Day and Michaelmas Day, in every year, with a proportionate sum to be paid to his executors or administrators in case he shall die while holding such office.

ARTICLE IV.—That a copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.
