And it is hereby further ordered, that Her Majesty's Printer do forthwith print a competent number of copies of the said Form of Prayer and Thanksgiving, that the same may be forthwith sent round, and read in the several churches and chapels of England and Wales, and of the town of Berwick-upon-Tweed.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis;" it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any part or parts of the metropolis, or in any burialground or places of burial in the metropolis, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued, subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that, from and after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such part or parts of the metropolis, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of the parishes in which any burial-grounds or places of burial affected by such representation shall be situate, or on some other conspicuous places within the part or parts of the Metropolis affected by such representation, one calendar month at the least before such representation is so considered;

provided always, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the Vestry Clerk of

such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George G ey, Bart, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and Vestry Glerk of the parish hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, burials should be forthwith discontinued therein;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Hen Order in Council of the seventeenth day of November last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the thirtieth day of December last, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the above recited Act;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued in the undermentioned parish, as follows,

STEPNEY. - Forthwith in the churchyard of Holy Trinity, Mile End, with the exception of now existing family graves, which shall be used in accordance with the official regulations for new burial grounds.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of " the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning " the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the projection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may, require; provided always, that notice of such, representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on !

some other conspicuous places within the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has made representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that

burials shall be discontinued therein:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the seventeenth day of November last, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the thirtieth day of December last, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new hurial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as is herein otherwise directed), as

follows; viz.:

HOGSTHORPE, LINCOLNSHIRE. — Forthwith in the parish church, and from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the churchyard, with the exception of now existing vaults and grave spaces reserved for the use of survivors,widowers and widows,—which are free from water and can be opened without the exposure of human remains.

LUTON, BEDFORDSHIRE. From and after the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the Friends' Burial-ground,

in Castle-street.

AMLWCH, NORTH WALES .- Forthwith in the parish church and in the Salem Chapel, and from and after the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the parish churchyard of Amlwch, and also in the chapelyard of Salem, with the exception of vaults and walled graves existing on the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately enclosed by concrete or by stone or brick-work properly cemented.

CHEADLE. - Forthwith in the church and in the old part of the parish churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately enclosed by concrete or by stone or brickwork properly cemented.

GREAT MALVERN. - Forthwith in the church-yard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and enclosed by concrete or masonry or brickwork properly cemented.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the "laws concerning the burial of the dead in "England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards hereinafter mentioned, from the time specified in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said church-

yards, be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards, be postponed, as follows; viz.:

In the churchyard of Dalsron, from the thirtyfirst of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, to the twenty-eighth of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four,

In the churchyard of GILDERSOME, from the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, to the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-

In the churchyard of Newent, from the thirtyfirst of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, to the thirty-first of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

In the churchyard of Petersham, from the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, to the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, provided that no new grave be dug in ground which has been already buried in.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the twentieth and twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Burial Acts," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from

such other persons as may have the cars of any vaults or places of burial, for preventing them from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health; and that every such Order in Council shall be published in the London Gazette, and that such churchwardens or other persons shall do or cause to be done all acts ordered as aforesaid, and the expenses incurred in and about the doing thereof shall be paid out of the poor rates of the parish: provided always, that no such representation shall be made until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the churchwardens or other persons, or one of the churchwardens, or other persons having the care of the vaults or places of burial to which the representation relates:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation having been duly given to the churchwardens or other persons having the care of the vaults and graves in the undermentioned churches and chapels, has made a representation, stating that he is of opinion that, for the purpose of preventing the said vaults and graves from becoming injurious to the public health, an Order should be made for the adoption of the measures which are hereinafter set forth;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of the said vaults and graves in the undermentioned churches and chapels do adopt, or cause to be adopted, the following measures, viz. :-

That the coffins now uncovered in the vaults beneath THE PARISH CHURCH, CHURCH, St. JOHN'S WOOD EPISCOPAL CHAPEL, Blandford - street BAPTIST CHAPEL, and GROVE-ROAD ROMAN CATHOLIC CHAPEL, all in the parish of St. Marylebone, be embedded in soil mixed with charcoal and enclosed by concrete or by masonry, or brickwork properly cemented, and that such disinfectants be used, or other precautions taken for the safety of the men employed in the work, as the Officer of Health for the district of St. Marylebone shall direct.

"beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to " amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead " in the metropolis," made a representation stating time to time to order such acts to be done by or I that, for the protection of the public health, no

new burial-ground should be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that interments in the same should be discontinued, with the following modifications; viz.:

CROYDON.—Forthwith in the churchyard of the Ecclesiastical District of All Saints, Upper Norwood, except so far as compatible with the following conditions, viz.:-That with the exception of now existing family vaults and graves, the interments be restricted to the bodies of the parishioners of the Ecclesiastical District of All Saints, Upper Norwood, and of persons dying in that district; that the burials be conducted in accordance with Nos. 3, 4, 5, 6, and 8, of the official regulations for new burial grounds; that in family earthern graves a layer of earth, not less than one foot thick, be left undisturbed above the previously buried coffin, and that, with the exception of family vaults and graves, no grave be re-opened.

ESCOMBE, BISHOP AUCKLAND. — In the old churchyard, except for widowers or widows of those already buried therein.

HENSINGHAM, Sr. BEES. — Forthwith in the church of St. John, and on and after the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by masonry or brickwork properly cemented.

CHADRIER, STOCKPORT. — Forthwith in the church and churchyard.

SWANSCOMBE, DARTFORD.—Forthwith in the parish church, and from and after the first of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the churchyard, with the exception of now existing family vaults and brick-graves, and also with the exception of now existing family earthen-graves, which can be opened without disturbing human remains, and in which no coffin shall be buried without a covering of four feet of earth.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-second day of February next:

Fixed Light at entrance to Grand Port.

The Government of the Mauritius has given notice, that on and after the 1st day of March, 1864, a light will be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Isle aux Fouquets, on the edge of the reef, at half a mile north of the southern entrance of Grand Port, on the east coast of the Island of Mauritius.

The light will be a *fixed* white light, placed at an elevation of 108 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 16 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the first order.

The tower from base to vane is 84 feet high, and as well as the adjacent buildings is white. It marks the southern entrance to Grand Port, and stands about 4½ cables E.N.E. of Isle Passe, and 3 miles from the coast of Mauritius, in lat. 20° 24′ 20″ N., long. 67° 45′ 9″ East of Greenwich.

Directions. — A government pilot in a few months will be stationed at the lighthouse, and will board vessels bound to Grand Port, on their making the usual signals. Vessels bound to Grand Port may approach the light when bearing from N. by E. round by north to W. by S.; and when about 2 miles from it should heave to for the pilot with the vessel's head off shore.

Should it be desired to get shelter, approach the light under easy sail till at about three-quarters of a mile from it, avoiding the shoal patch of 6 fathoms water off Laverdie Point, the extreme of the coral reef bounding the south side of entrance to Grand Port; then steer so as to round Isle Passe at the distance of half a mile, as a spit runs out from its south side for about a cable's length; when haul to the northward and anchor in 18 to 20 fathoms water. It is not recommended to attempt to enter without a pilot, except in cases of extreme necessity.

A vessel from the southward bound to Port Louis, round the north end of the island of Mauritius (the usual track), should, after sighting Grand Port Light, steer so as to pass it at a distance of about 4 miles; when at that distance, with the light bearing W. by S., a N.N.E. \(\frac{1}{2} \) E. course for 9 miles, if the weather be clear, will bring a vessel in sight of Flat Island revolving light, bearing about N. by W. \(\frac{1}{2} \) W.; the course can then be shaped as required.

A vessel from the northward having Flat Island light on a N.N.W. bearing should be careful, after sighting Grand Port light, not to bring it, when at a distance of less than 8 miles, on a more southerly bearing than S.W. by W. ½ W., or she will be too near the coast reef northward of the light.

The coast reef bounding Grand Port is bordered by a bank of irregular soundings extending some distance seaward; the lead, if carefully attended to, will prove a tolerable guide in thick weather.

Vessels bound into Grand Port should not approach it at night, but should heave to well southward of the light, as the drift is to the northward, and much time will be lost in working back. Isle Passe on the north side of the entrance is easily known by the battery and other buildings on it. At times the rollers block the channel, although the depth is from 14 to 22 fathoms; and

generally the reefs on either side are perfectly visible from aloft. The rise of tide is 3 feet.
