The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Thursday, February 4, 1864.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

WE are commanded to assure you that Her Majesty has great satisfaction in recurring again to the advice and assistance of Her Parliament.

Her Majesty is confident that you will share Her feeling of gratitude to Almighty God on account of the Princess of Wales having given birth to a Son: an event which has called forth from Her faithful people renewed demonstrations of devoted loyalty and attachment to Her person and family.

The state of affairs on the Continent of Europe has been the cause of great anxiety to Her Majesty. The death of the late King of Denmark brought into immediate application the stipulations of the Treaty of May, 1852, concluded by Her Majesty, the Emperor of Austria, the Emperor of the French, the King of Prussia, the Emperor of Russia, the King of Sweden, the King of Denmark, and afterwards acceded to by the King of Hanover, the King of Saxony, the King of Wurtemberg, the King of the Belgians, the King of the Netherlands, the Queen of Spain, the King of Portugal, and the King of Sardinia.

That Treaty declared that it is conducive to the preservation of the balance of power, and of the peace of Europe, that the integrity of the Danish Monarchy should be maintained, and that the several territories which have hitherto been under the sway of the King of Denmark should continue so to remain; and for this purpose it was agreed that in the event of the death of the late King and of his uncle Prince Frederick without issue, his present Majesty King Christian IX should be acknowledged as succeeding to all the dominions then united under the sceptre of His Majesty the King of Denmark.

Her Majesty, actuated by the same desire to preserve the peace of Europe which was one of the declared objects of all the Powers who were parties to that Treaty, has been unremitting in Her endeavours to bring about a peaceful settlement of the differences which on this matter have arisen between Germany and Denmark, and to ward off the dangers which might follow from a beginning of warfare in the north of Europe; and Her Majesty will continue her efforts in the interest of peace.

The barbarous murders and cruel assaults committed in Japan upon subjects of Her Majesty rendered it necessary that demands should be made upon the Japanese Government, and upon the Daimio by whose retainers some of those outrages were committed.

The Government of the Tycoon complied with the demand made upon them by Her Majesty's Government, and full satisfaction having been made, the friendly relations between the two

Governments have continued unbroken. But the Daimio Prince of Satsuma refused to comply with the just and moderate demands which were made upon him.

His refusal rendered measures of coercion necessary, and Her Majesty regrets that while those measures have brought this Daimio to an agreement for compliance, they led incidentally to the destruction of a considerable portion of the town of Kagosima.

Papers on this subject will be laid before you.

The insurrection which broke out last year among some portion of the native inhabitants of New Zealand still unfortunately continues, but there is reason to hope that it will, before long, be put down.

Her Majesty commands us to inform you that She has concluded a Treaty with the Emperor of Austria, the Emperor of the French, the King of Prussia, and the Emperor of Russia, by which Her Majesty consents to give up the Protectorate of the Ionian Islands, and also agrees to the annexation of those islands to the Kingdom of Greece. This Treaty shall be laid before you. Her Majesty is also negotiating a treaty with the King of the Hellenes for regulating the arrangements connected with the union of the Ionian Islands with the Kingdom of Greece.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

Her Majesty has directed the estimates for the ensuing year to be laid before you. They have been prepared with every attention to economy, and with a due regard to the efficiency of the public service.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

Her Majesty commands us to inform you that the condition of the country is, on the whole, satisfactory. The revenue has fully realised its expected amount; the commerce of the United Kingdom is increasing; and while the distress in the manufacturing districts has been in some degree lessened, there is reason to look forward to an increased supply of cotton from various countries which have hitherto but scantily furnished our manufacturers with this material for their industry.

Her Majesty has directed that a commission shall be issued for the purpose of revising the various forms of subscription and declaration required to be made by the Clergy of the Established Church. A copy of that commission will be laid before you.

Various measures of public usefulness will be submitted for your consideration.

Her Majesty commits, with confidence, the great interests of the country to your wisdom and care; and She fervently prays that the blessings of Almighty God may attend your deliberations and prosper your councils for the advancement of the welfare and happiness of Her loyal and faithful people.

WHEREAS the rules and practice observed for the purpose of preventing collisions at sea, which were formerly adopted by maritime

nations, have proved insufficient to satisfy the requirements of modern navigation; and whereas various alterations in such rules and practice have from time to time been made by different nations, but the rules so altered have been found to be in some cases inconsistent with each other, and in other cases to have the force of municipal law only; and whereas certain regulations for the purpose aforesaid have been sanctioned by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and are contained in the Table C, in the schedule to that Act; And whereas for the purpose of correcting certain clerical errors the said regulations have, in pursuance of the provisions in the said Act contained, been modified by an Order in Council bearing date the 9th day of January, 1863, and the said regulations, so modified, are appended to the said Order, and to this Order; And whereas by virtue of the said Act and of the said Order the said regulations so appended as aforesaid, so far as relates to British and French ships and also so far as relates to certain other foreign ships when within British Jurisdiction, came into operation on the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; And whereas it is provided by the same Act, that, whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that the Government of any foreign country is willing that the regulations for preventing collisions, contained in Table C in the schedule to the said Act, or such other regulations for preventing collisions as are for the time being in force under the said Act, should apply to the ships of such country when beyond the limits of British Jurisdiction, Her Majesty may by Order in Council direct that such regulations shall apply to the ships of the said foreign country, whether within British Jurisdiction or not. And it is further provided by the said Act that whenever an Order in Council has been issued applying any regulation made by or in pursuance of the said Act to the ships of any foreign country such ships shall, in all cases arising in any British Court, be deemed to be subject to such regulation, and shall for the purpose of such regulation be treated as if they were British ships: And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty, that

The Government of His Majesty the King of Denmark

is willing that the said Regulations appended to the said Order, and to this Order should apply to ships belonging to Denmark Proper, and to ships belonging to the Duchy of Schleswig, when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct,

That the said regulations appended to the said Order in Council, bearing date the ninth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and to this Order, shall from the date of this Order apply to ships belonging to

Denmark Proper, and the Duchy of Schleswig,

whether within British jurisdiction or not.

REGULATIONS REFERRED TO IN THE FOREGOING ORDER.

REGULATIONS FOR PREVENTING COLLISIONS AT SEA.

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PRELIMINARY.

Art. 1. In the following Rules every Steam Ship which is under sail and not under steam is to be considered a Sailing Ship; and every Steam ship which is under steam, whether under sail or not, is to be considered a ship under steam.

RULES CONCERNING LIGHTS.

Lights.

Art. 2. The Lights mentioned in the following Articles, numbered 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9, and no others, shall be carried in all weathers, from sunset to sunrise.

Lights for Steam Ships.

Art. 3. Sea-going Steam-ships when under weigh shall carry:

(a.) *At the Foremast Head*, a bright White Light, so fixed as to show an uniform and unbroken Light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass; so fixed as to throw the light 10 points on each side of the ship, viz., from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on either side; and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least five miles:

(b.) *On the Starboard Side*, a Green Light so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken Light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass; so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the starboard side; and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles:

(c.) *On the Port Side*, a Red Light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass; so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the port side; and of such a character, as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles:

(d.) The said Green and Red Side Lights shall be fitted with inboard screens, projecting at least three feet forward from the Light, so as to prevent these lights from being seen across the bow.

Lights for Steam Tugs.

Art. 4. Steam Ships, when towing other ships, shall carry two bright White Mast-head Lights vertically, in addition to their side lights, so as to distinguish them from other Steam Ships. Each of these Mast-head Lights shall be of the same construction and character as the Mast-head Lights which other Steam-Ships are required to carry.

Lights for Sailing Ships.

Art. 5. Sailing Ships under weigh, or being towed, shall carry the same lights as Steam Ships under weigh, with the exception of the White Mast-head Lights, which they shall never carry.

Exceptional Lights for small Sailing Vessels.

Art. 6. Whenever, as in the case of small vessels during bad weather, the Green and Red lights cannot be fixed, these lights shall be kept on deck, on their respective sides of the vessel, ready for instant exhibition; and shall, on the approach of or to other vessels, be exhibited on their respective sides in sufficient time to prevent collision, in such manner as to make them most visible, and so that the Green light shall not be seen on the port side, nor the Red light on the starboard side.

To make the use of these portable lights more certain and easy, the lanterns containing them shall each be painted outside with the colour of the light they respectively contain, and shall be provided with suitable screens.

Lights for Ships at Anchor.

Art. 7. Ships, whether steam ships or sailing ships, when at anchor in roadsteads or fairways, shall exhibit, where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding twenty feet above the hull, a White Light, in a globular lantern of eight inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon, and at a distance of at least one mile.

Lights for Pilot Vessels.

Art. 8. Sailing Pilot Vessels shall not carry the lights required for other sailing vessels, but shall carry a White Light at the mast head, visible all round the horizon,—and shall also exhibit a Flare-up Light every fifteen minutes.

Lights for Fishing Vessels and Boats.

Art. 9. Open Fishing Boats and other open boats shall not be required to carry the side lights required for other vessels; but shall if they do not carry such lights, carry a lantern having a Green Slide on the one side and a Red Slide on the other side; and on the approach of or to other vessels, such lantern shall be exhibited in sufficient time to prevent collision, so that the Green light shall not be seen on the port side, nor the Red light on the starboard side.

Fishing Vessels and open boats when at anchor, or attached to their nets and stationary, shall exhibit a bright White Light.

Fishing Vessels and open boats shall, however, not be prevented from using a Flare up in addition, if considered expedient.

RULES CONCERNING FOG SIGNALS.

Fog Signals.

Art. 10. Whenever there is fog, whether by day or night, the Fog Signals described below shall be carried and used, and shall be sounded at least every five minutes, viz. :—

(a.) Steam Ships under weigh shall use a

Steam Whistle placed before the funnel, not less than eight feet from the deck:

(b.) Sailing ships under weigh shall use a Fog Horn:

(c.) Steam Ships and Sailing Ships when not under weigh shall use a Bell.

STEERING AND SAILING RULES.

Two Sailing Ships meeting.

Art. 11. If Two Sailing Ships are meeting end on or nearly end on so as to involve risk of collision, the helms of both shall be put to port, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

Two Sailing Ships crossing.

Art. 12. When two sailing ships are crossing so as to involve risk of collision, then, if they have the wind on different sides, the ship with the wind on the port side shall keep out of the way of the ship with the wind on the starboard side; except in the case in which the ship with the wind on the port side is close hauled and the other ship free, in which case the latter ship shall keep out of the way; but if they have the wind on the same side, or if one of them has the wind aft, the ship which is to windward shall keep out of the way of the ship which is to leeward.

Two Ships under Steam meeting.

Art. 13. If two ships under steam are meeting end on or nearly end on so as to involve risk of collision, the helms of both shall be put to port, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

Two Ships under Steam crossing.

Art. 14. If two ships under steam are crossing so as to involve risk of collision, the ship which has the other on her own starboard side shall keep out of the way of the other.

Sailing Ship and Ship under Steam.

Art. 15. If two ships, one of which is a sailing ship, and the other a steam ship, are proceeding in such directions as to involve risk of collision, the steam ship shall keep out of the way of the sailing ship.

Ships under Steam to slacken speed.

Art. 16. Every steam ship, when approaching another ship so as to involve risk of collision, shall slacken her speed, or, if necessary, stop and reverse; and every steam ship shall, when in a fog, go at a moderate speed.

Vessels overtaking other Vessels.

Art. 17. Every vessel overtaking any other vessel shall keep out of the way of the said last-mentioned vessel.

Construction of Articles 12, 14, 15, and 17.

Art. 18. Where by the above rules one of two ships is to keep out of the way, the other shall keep her course, subject to the qualifications contained in the following Article.

Proviso to save special cases.

Art. 19. In obeying and construing these rules, due regard must be had to all dangers of navigation; and due regard must also be had to any special circumstances which may exist in any particular case rendering a departure from the above rules necessary in order to avoid immediate danger.

No Ship, under any circumstances, to neglect proper precautions.

Art. 20. Nothing in these Rules shall exonerate any ship, or the owner, or master, or crew thereof, from the consequences of any neglect to carry lights or signals, or of any neglect to keep a proper look-out, or of the neglect of any precaution which may be required by the ordinary practice of seamen, or by the special circumstances of the case.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter sixty; of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eleventh day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter sixty; of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Peter, Upper Gornal, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the thirty-first day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and duly published in the London Gazette upon the sixteenth day of April, in the same year, a portion of the parish of Sedgley, in the said county and diocese, was assigned as a separate district to the consecrated church of Saint Peter, situate at Upper Gornal, in the said parish, and such district was named 'The Chapelry District of Saint Peter, Upper Gornal.'

"And whereas the said chapelry district of Saint Peter, Upper Gornal, has, under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, since become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven.

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Upper Gornal, should be altered as hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lichfield (the Bishop of the said diocese), of the Right Honorable William Earl of Dudley, the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Sedgley, of the Reverend William Lewis, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Sedgley aforesaid, and in right of such vicarage or incumbency the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Upper Gornal, and of the Reverend George Girdlestone Woodhouse, the incumbent of the said perpetual curacy of the new parish of Saint Peter,

Upper Gornal aforesaid (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that, in our opinion, it would be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Upper Gornal, should be altered so as to annex to such new parish all that portion of the said parish of Sedgley which is described in the first schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended, and is thereon colored pink; and that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Upper Gornal should be further altered so as to dis sever therefrom all that portion thereof which is described in the second schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto appended, and is thereon colored green.

"And we further represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that portion of the new parish of Saint Peter, Upper Gornal aforesaid, so to be dis severed therefrom as last proposed, should be re-annexed to, and should again form part of the parish of Sedgley aforesaid.

"And we humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The First SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The territory proposed to be dis severed from the parish of Sedgley and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Peter, Upper Gornal, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Sedgley, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield, which is comprised within that part of the hamlet of Woodsetton which is situate to the south of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish from the chapelry district of Saint Paul, Tipton, in the same county and diocese, at a point at the eastern end of the fence dividing the inclosure numbered 2233 upon the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Sedgley, and upon the map hereunto annexed from the inclosure numbered 2246, upon the same maps, at which point a boundary stone inscribed 'U. G. St. P. N. "We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts.

"We humbly recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, out of the common fund, in the said Acts mentioned, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices described in the first schedule hereunto annexed, the annual sum set opposite to the name of each such benefice in the last column of the same schedule, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year: Provided always, that the grants so recommended to be made by us to the benefices of Breaston with Risley; Saint Paul, Haggerstone; Pocklington; Saint Paul, Shadwell; and Weeford with Hints; shall be paid only upon the production to us, on or before the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, of certificates under the hand of the bishops of the respective dioceses, that a curate duly licensed by such bishop has in each instance been employed within the parish or district during the preceding half-year; and provided also that a like certificate be required with regard to the payment of a portion amounting to one hundred pounds of the grant so recommended to be made by us to the benefice of Ebberston with Allerston; and provided furthermore that, with regard to the grant so recommended to be made by us to the benefice of Friday Bridge, a like certificate be required that a curate has been duly employed at Coldham and Pear Tree Hill, within the said district of Friday Bridge; and provided also that such lastly-mentioned grant shall be payable only so long as the said hamlets or places called respectively Coldham and Pear Tree Hill shall continue to form part of the district which is now for spiritual purposes under the charge of the perpetual curate or incumbent of Friday Bridge.

"And we further recommend, and propose that the lands and premises, tithes, or rentcharges in lieu of tithes, annual rents or money payments, and other hereditaments particularly described in the second and six following schedules hereunto annexed, with their appurtenances, now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the several spiritual persons hereinafter

schedule hereunto annexed, situate within the parish of Minety, in the counties of Gloucester and Wilts, and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, formerly belonging to the Archdeaconry of Wilts, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Minety; that the land and hereditaments described in the eighth schedule hereunto annexed, situate at Staleybridge, in the parish of Ashton-under-Lyne, in the county of Lancaster, and diocese of Manchester, which were conveyed to us by a deed, bearing date the fourth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and made between the Right Honourable George Harry, Earl of Stamford and Warrington, of the first part; John Petty Muspratt, of Lombard-street, in the city of London, Banker, William Cotton, of Leytonstone, in the county of Essex, Esquire, Matthew Whiting, of Barge-yard, Bucklersbury, in the said city of London, Merchant, and Kirkman Daniel Hodgson, of Saint Helen's-place, in the said city, Merchant, of the second part; and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the third part; which deed is intended to be deposited in the registry of the diocese of Manchester, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being, of the perpetual curacy of New Saint George, Staleybridge.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Thomas Richardson, Clerk, the perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of Saint Matthew, Pell-street, London, in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the messuages, lands, hereditaments, and premises described in the eleventh schedule hereunto annexed, situate in the parish of Bethnal Green, in the same county and diocese, with their appurtenances, all which hereditaments and premises were conveyed to us in and by a deed, bearing date the sixteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and made between Samuel Wray, of Number 15, Albion-grove, Thornhill-road, Barnsbury, in the said county of Middlesex, Gentleman, of the first part; George Clarkson, of Number 9A, Great Saint Helen's, Bishopsgate, in the city of London, Surveyor, of the second part; the said George Clarkson, of the third part; George Holme, of Number 15, Percy-street, Liverpool, in the said county of Lancaster, Architect, and Montague Gosset, of Number 4, Coleman-street, in the said city of London, Gentleman, of the fourth part; the said Thomas Richardson, of Number 17, Prince's-square, Saint George's in the East, in the said county of Middlesex, Clerk, of the fifth part; and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the sixth part; which deed is intended to be deposited in the registry of the diocese of London, shall, in like manner, and by the authority aforesaid, subject, nevertheless, to the several indentures of lease, the dates of which, with the names of the lessees to whom the same are respectively granted, and the reserved rents to which the same are respectively subject, are, in the said eleventh schedule hereunto annexed, set opposite to the description of the said hereditaments which are demised by such leases respectively, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of Saint Matthew, Pell-street, in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of an annual sum of sixty-three pounds eight shillings and eightpence, part of the annual sum or stipend of sixty-four pounds, heretofore payable by us to the said perpetual curate or incumbent, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

"And whereas it appears to us, after duly considering the circumstances of the cases under-mentioned, to be expedient that the grants respectively recommended to be made by us, to the benefices or churches of North and South Anston, Saint Martin, Castleton Moor, Corwen, Saint Peter, Croydon, Esh, Saint Jude, Gray's-inn-road, Saint Thomas, Greetland, Haxby, Millington with Great Givendale, Minety, Saint Matthew, Pell-street, London, and Strensall, should commence and take effect from the several dates hereinafter mentioned respectively, that is to say: in the case of the perpetual curacy of North and South Anston, from the twelfth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three;

in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Martin, Castleton Moor; from the twenty-ninth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; in the case of the vicarage of Corwen, from the twelfth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Peter, Croydon, from the thirtieth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Esh, from the tenth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Jude, Gray's-inn-road, from the twenty-eighth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Thomas, Greetland, from the fifth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Haxby, from the twenty-fourth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; in the case of the vicarage of Millington, with the vicarage of Great Givendale annexed, from the nineteenth day of June, in the

year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two; in the case of the vicarage of Minety, from the twenty-fifth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Matthew, Pell-street, London, from the twenty-sixth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; and in the case of the vicarage of Strensall, from the twenty-fourth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the several grants hereinbefore recommended by us to be made to the said last-mentioned benefices respectively, shall commence and take effect from the said dates hereinbefore in that behalf mentioned respectively.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.
