The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis;" it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal

Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation, stating that, for the protection of the public health, burials shall be discontinued, with certain modifications, in such parishes.

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the eighth day of December last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the nineteenth day of January last, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials in the undermentioned parishes shall be discontinued as follows; viz.:

BROADWATER.—Forthwith,—entirely within four feet of the boundary wall on the north side of the churchyard; and in the new part of the churchyard, with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves which can be opened without disturbing soil that has already been buried in;—each coffin to be embedded in a layer of powdered charcoal four inches thick, and separately entombed in brick or stonework, cemented in an airtight manner;—and also with the exception of existing reserved earthen grave spaces, which can be opened without disturbing human remains, in which no body shall be buried without a covering of four and a half feet of earth.

BIRMINGHAM.—Forthwith in All Saints' Churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, and in already purchased private graves, to be used in accordance with the regulations for new burial-grounds.

of Her Privy Council, that the said Order be varied;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that interment in the burial ground of Bierley Episcopal Chapel, in the parish of Bradford, be discontinued, within twenty feet of the said chapel, except in walled graves in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and entombed by masonry or brickwork properly cemented.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," made representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that interments in the same should be discontinued, with the following modifications; viz.:

WEMBLEY.—Forthwith wholly in the church of St. John, and in the churchyard, except so far as may be compatible with the following regulations: That, with the exception of now existing family vaults and graves, the burials be restricted to the bodies of persons dying within the ecclesiastical parish of St. John, Wembley: that burials be conducted in accordance with Nos. 1, 3, 5, 6, 7, and 8, of the official regulations for new burial-grounds, and that no grave or vault be excavated to a greater depth than seven and a half feet.

EAST BARNET.—Forthwith in the church, and, with the exception of now existing family vaults and graves, in all that part of the churchyard which lies to the south of a line drawn along the south side of the church.

BENGEWORTH.—Forthwith in the church.

GREETLAND, HALIFAX.—Forthwith in the burial-ground of the Wesleyan chapel, except in as far as burials are conducted in accordance with the seventh and eighth official regulations for new burial-grounds.

RUGBY.—Forthwith in the new churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by concrete, or by masonry or brickwork properly cemented; and except in earthen graves not less than four feet deep, which can be opened without disturbance of human remains, and which are to be used for the burial of the widowers, widows, parents, or unmarried children, of those already buried in the churchyard.

HAWARDEN.—In the churchyard of Broughton on the first July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, except in graves not less than five feet deep, which are free from water and remains.

CHIPPING SODBURY.—In the church forthwith, and in the churchyard on the first October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed by brickwork and masonry, properly cemented; and except in graves not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without disturbance of entire bones, or exposure of coffins.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-second day of March next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of or on some conspicuous places within the parishes affected by such representations one month before the said twenty-second day of March.

HIGHWAY ACT.—FINAL ORDER.

Cornwall to Wit.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at Bodmin, in and for the said county, on Tuesday, the 5th day of January, in the 27th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord, 1864, before Charles Brune Graves Sawle, Esq., Chairman, the Right Honourable Charles Crespigny, Baron Vivian, Sir Colman Rashleigh, Baronet, John Jope Rogers, Esq., and others, their companions, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the peace in and for the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanours, committed within the said county.

Whereas at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at Bodmin, in and for the said county, on Tuesday, the 20th day of October last, a Provisional Order was made in the words and figures following (that is to say):

“Whereas the Right Honourable Charles Crespigny, Baron Vivian, the Honourable George Matthew Fortescue and Richard Foster, Nevil Norway and Robert Gould Lakes, Esquires, five Justices of the Peace for the county of Cornwall, did, by writing under their hands, dated the 29th day of May, 1863, require the Clerk of the Peace for the said county to add to or send with the notice required by law to be given for holding the then next Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, a notice in the form marked A in the schedule to the Act 25 and 26 Victoria, c. 61, intituled ‘An Act for the better management of ‘Highways in England,’ or as near thereto as circumstances would admit: that at the same Sessions a proposal would be made to the Justices then and there assembled, to divide the said county of Cornwall into Highway Districts for the purposes of the Highway Acts:

“And whereas the said Clerk of the Peace having complied with the said requisition, the said five Justices made the said proposal to the Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the said county, held at Bodmin, in and for the said county, on Tuesday, the 30th day of June last, and the said proposal having been entertained by the Justices then and there assembled, a Provisional Order was made, subject to the same being confirmed at these Sessions, dividing the county of Cornwall into seventeen highway districts as therein mentioned.

“And whereas the Justices now here assembled having considered the premises, this Court doth hereby confirm the said Provisional Order, with variations, extending to alterations in the parishes constituting the Highway Districts so formed in the said Provisional Order as aforesaid. And doth order (subject to the same being confirmed at the next General Quarter Sessions of the Peace to be held for this county on the 5th day of January next) that the county of Cornwall shall be divided into eighteen Highway Districts hereinafter mentioned (that is to say):

- The Stratton District.
- The Camelford District.
- The St. Columb District.
- The St. Germans District.
- The Launceston District.
- The Callington District.
- The Trigg District.
- The St. Austell District.
- The Tywardreath District.

"And this Court doth further order, that the next General Quarter Sessions of the Peace shall be appointed for taking into consideration the confirmation of the said Provisional Order by a Final Order."

And whereas notice of the said last-mentioned Provisional Order was, as soon as possible after the making thereof, given by the Clerk of the Peace of the said county of Cornwall, by publishing a copy thereof in the London Gazette, and also in the West Briton and Cornwall Gazette newspapers circulating in the said county, and also by sending a copy by post, in a prepaid letter, to the Overseers of every parish or place within the said proposed Highway Districts.

And whereas at the time of giving the notice required by law of the holding of these present Sessions, notice was also duly given by the Clerk of the Peace of the said county, that the confirmation of the said last-mentioned Provisional Order, by a Final Order, would be taken into consideration by the Justices at these present General Quarter Sessions of the Peace. Now, after due consideration of the said last-mentioned Provisional Order, and the notices thereof so given as aforesaid, this Court doth order that the said last-mentioned Provisional Order shall be, and the same is hereby finally confirmed; and this Court doth further order that the first Meeting of each of the Highway Boards for the said several Highway Districts, mentioned in the said last-mentioned Provisional Order, shall be held at the several places and times hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

For the Stratton District, at the Lecture Hall, Stratton, on Monday, the 11th day of April next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon.

For the Camelford District, at the Board Room of the Camelford Poor Law Union House, on Monday, the 11th day of April next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon.

For the Saint Columb District, at the Board Room of the Saint Columb Poor Law Union House, on Monday, the 11th day of April next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon.

For the Saint German's District, at the Poor Law Union House at Torpoint, on Monday, the 11th day of April next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon.

For the Launceston District, at the King's Head Inn, at Five Lanes, on Monday, the 11th day of April next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon.

For the Callington District, at Golding's Assembly Rooms, at Callington, on Monday, the 11th day of April next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon.

For the Trigg District, at the Washaway Inn, in the parish of Egloshayle, on Monday, the 11th day of April next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon.
