By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, enclosing a copy of a French Imperial Decree, extending to the United Kingdom, the provisions of the Commercial Treaty concluded on the 17th January last between France and Italy.

WHEREAS it appears to me, the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that the use of locomotives, unless restricted as herein-after mentioned on or along the roads in the several parishes of Bottisham, Chenyhinton, Fulbourn, Feversham, Stow-cum-Quy Fen Ditton, Horningsea, Great Wilbraham, Little Wilbraham, Swaffham Prior, and Swaffham Bulbeck, in the county of Cambridge, is dangerous and inconvenient to the public:

I do hereby, by virtue of the provisions of the "Locomotive Act, 1861," by this order under my hand, prohibit the use of any kind of locomotive whatever propelled by steam or any other than animal power on the above roads, except between the hours of twelve o'clock at night and six o'clock in the morning.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ACT BY MOSSLEY, IN THE COUNTIES OF LANCASTER, YORK, AND CHESTER.
