HIGHWAY DISTRICTS.—FINAL ORDER.

WILTS.

AT a General Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at Devizes, in and for the said county of Wilts, on Tuesday, the 16th day of February, in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord 1864, before Sir John Wither Awdry, Knight, Chairman, the Right Honourable Thomas Henry Sutton Sotheron Estcourt, George Heneage Walker [Heneage, George Matcham, Esquires, and others, their Fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the peace of the said Queen in the county aforesaid; and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanours done and committed in the said county it is ordered as follows (that is to say):

Whereas at the Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace held at Marlborough, in and for the said county of Wilts, on Tuesday, the 20th day of October, 1863, it was ordered provisionally, that the said county of Wilts be divided under the provisions of the Act 25 and 26 Vict., c. 61, into Highway Districts, as set forth in the list in such order specified, each such district to comprise the several parishes and places thereafter in such list attributed to such district respectively (subject to the exceptions and restrictions mentioned in the 7th section of the said Act), and each parish or place to elect the number of Waywardens also specified in such list. And it was also ordered provisionally that where any of the therein above-named parishes or places separately maintaining its own poor, was divided into townships, tithings, or hamlets, each of which separately maintained its own highways, such townships, tithings, and hamlets should, for the purposes of the said Highway Act, be combined, and should be deemed to

be included in the parish or place to which they respectively belonged; and no separate Waywardens should be elected for such townships, tithings, and hamlets; and each such parish or place should be subject to the same liabilities in respect of all the highways within it, which had been theretofore maintained by such townships, tithings, and hamlets separately, as if all their several liabilities attached to the whole of such parish or place; and that the Waywarden or Waywardens to be so as aforesaid elected for each such parish or place should be elected for the whole of such parish or place. And it was also ordered by the same Court that the confirmation of the Provisional Order then made, by a Final Order, should be taken into consideration at the Epiphany Quarter Sessions to be held at Devizes, on the 5th day of January then next.

And whereas notice, as directed by the said Act, was duly given by the Clerk of the Peace, that the confirmation of the said Provisional Order, by a Final Order, would be taken into consideration by the Justices assembled at the said Epiphany Quarter Sessions.

And whereas at the said Court of General Quarter Sessions, held at Devizes, in and for the said county of Wilts, on Tuesday, the 5th day of January, 1864, it was ordered that the Provisional Order made at the then last Michaelmas Quarter Sessions, for dividing the said county into highway districts, under the aforesaid Act, be varied, by substituting for the list therein contained of districts and parishes and places comprised in each district, and the number of Waywardens to be elected for each parish or place, the list therein and hereinafter contained. And it was by the same Court ordered, that the said Provisional Order, with such variations as aforesaid, be confirmed. And that inasmuch as in consequence of such variations as aforesaid in the said Provisional Order, the Order then made was by the said Act declared to be deemed provisional only, the confirmation of the same, by a Final

Order, be taken into consideration at this present Court of General Sessions of the Peace, which was thereby appointed for that purpose.

And whereas notice, as directed by the said Act, was also duly given by the Clerk of the Peace, that the confirmation of the said Provisional Order, with such variations as aforesaid, by a Final Order, would be taken into consideration by the Justices at this present Court of General Sessions.

Now, therefore, after duly considering the said Provisional Order, as so varied as aforesaid, and hearing all objections thereto, this Court doth

hereby confirm the same Order, and doth now make its Final Order in the premises, as follows, viz.,—That the county of Wilts be divided, under the provisions of the Act 25 and 26 Vict., c. 61, into the thirteen Highway Districts specified and set forth in the list hereinafter contained, each such district to comprise the several parishes and places in such list attributed to such district respectively (subject to the exceptions and restrictions mentioned in the 7th section of the said Act), and each parish or place to elect the number of Waywardens in such list attributed to each such parish or place.
