Fahrzeuge, welche diesen Anordnungen nicht Folge leisten, werden zuerst durch einen blinden Schuss und wenn auch der unberücksichtigt bleibt, durch einen scharfen Schuss erinnert werden. Dasselbe geschieht, wenn Fahrzeuge beim Passiren der Batterien unterlassen, nach Sonnenuntergang die gesetzlich vorgeschriebenen Laternen zu führen.

NOTIFICATION to Ships passing the Batteries of the Jade Bay.

WHEREAS the Batteries belonging to the Royal Prussian Establishment on the Jade have been armed and have hoisted the Flag of War, all sailing vessels must henceforth pass the same under shortened sails and hoist their national flag. All steamers must pass at half speed, and must likewise show their national flag. When vessels are hailed by an Ordnance Boat bearing the Prussian flag, they must instantly heave to or stop and obey the orders of such Ordnance Boat. Vessels which do not obey such orders will be reminded first by a blank shot, and if that also remains unnoticed then by a shot with ball. The same proceeding will be adopted when vessels passing the Batteries after sunset omit to carry the lights which are prescribed by law.

These rules shall come into force on the day of their publication.

THE Secretary of State for War has received Despatches from Lieutenant-General Sir D. A. Cameron, K.C.B., Commanding the Troops in New Zealand, of which the following are copies:

Head Quarters, Camp Tuhi Karamea, Waipa, January 4, 1864.

MY LORD,

I HAVE the honour to report that on the 2nd of December I moved from Rangiriri up the right bank of the Waikato, with 850 men, and arrived on the 7th at Rahinpokeka. On the 8th and 9th the force was conveyed up the river in the "Pioneer," and landed at Ngaruawahia, a distance of about ten miles. No opposition was offered to our advance between Rangiriri and Ngaruawahia, though the latter place was found to be very strongly entrenched. On the 28th December, the force moved up the Waipa to Whata Whata, and on January 1st, 1864, to this Camp, about sixteen miles from Ngaruawahia.

My progress has necessarily been slow owing to the difficulty of supplying even so small a body of troops as that under my command at so great a distance from Auckland.

There are so many shoals in the Lower Waikato at this season of the year, that neither the Pioneer nor Avon can be used for the transport of supplies below Rahinpokeka. Between that post and Rangiriri these are conveyed in flat bottomed row boats.

The strength of the current renders this a most laborious service, but it is performed with zeal and cheerfulness by the officers and men of the Royal Navy, under the personal superintendence of Commodore Sir William Wiseman, to whom I am greatly indebted for his indefatigable exertions in bringing up troops and supplies, as well as for the cordial assistance he at all times affords me in carrying out my plans.

The Waipa, though a deep river, is too narrow and winding for so long a vessel as the "Pioneer," and the "Avon" is at present my only means of transport above Ngaruawahia.

The natives have assembled in great force in our front, and have constructed very strong earth-

works on all the tracks leading into the interior. I am bringing up reinforcements and collecting supplies and means of transport as quickly as possible, and hope to be able to resume operations in a few days.

I have thought it desirable to open a communication between this post and Raglan, a small European settlement on the West Coast, having a good harbour not more than 20 miles distant from the Waipa River, and to which there is at present only a bush track; I have, therefore, directed the 50th Regiment and a detachment of 300 Waikato Militia, the whole, under Colonel Waddy, C.B., to embark at the Manukau for Raglan, where the greater part have already arrived. These troops will be employed in improving the track and rendering it practicable for Infantry and pack horses, so that in case of need reinforcements may reach me in a few hours, but until a good road is made this line can only be occasionally used for supplies.

In a former despatch, 29th ultimo, I reported to your Lordship that a force of 800 men, under Colonel Carey, 2nd Battalion 18th Regiment Royal Irish, had landed on the Coast of the Firth of the Thames, and taken possession of Pukorokoro. I enclose a copy of a letter from Colonel Carey, from which you will perceive that the objects of the expedition were successfully accomplished. A chain of posts has been established from the Thames to the Waikato, and has already had the effect of clearing the bush to the south and east of Auckland, of the marauding parties, which previously infested it.

I have further to report that Colonel Warre, C.B., commanding the troops in the Taranaki district, made an attempt to surprise the enemy's position in the Kaitake ranges, near New Plymouth.

The plan, though well concerted, failed. The bush road through which the party advanced to take the position in rear, was imperfectly known, and the Officer in command after advancing some distance, finding that he could proceed no further without risk of discovery, very properly withdrew his men, in accordance with his instructions. The expedition therefore returned to New Plymouth, without having come into collision with the enemy.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to report, for the information of the Lieutenant-General Commanding, that the remainder of the force under my command (after establishing posts at Pukorokoro, "Miranda" Redoubt, and at Maiapi "Esk" Redoubt) reached this yesterday evening, and encamped within a few hundred yards of the Paparata stockade.

A portion of the force marched to the latter place this afternoon (having been prevented from doing so by heavy rain in the morning), cut down the stockade, and set fire to the whares, which were capable of holding some 700 natives.

The enemy must have evacuated the place some time since.

The position is not one suited for a redoubt, being commanded by a hill in rear, with a deep, wooded gully intervening, it is likewise out of the

direct line of communication from the other Thames posts to the Waikato posts, and not visible from the Esk Redoubt.

I have, therefore, decided on building a redoubt on this hill, which commands a fine view of the country as far as Waikari Lake, including the Queen's Redoubt and adjacent posts on the west and "Esk" Redoubt, and a portion of the Thames Firth on the east. Thus, a system of telegraph by signal may be at once established between the Thames and the Waikato.

Subject to the approval of the Commander of the Forces, I have named this redoubt "Surrey," having the head-quarters of the 70th Regiment encamped here.

As Captain Greaves, Deputy Assistant Quartermaster-General, is sending you a report of the nature of the defences of the late Paparata stockade, it is needless for me to do so.

The rifle pits I purpose having filled in on Monday next.

I forward to the Deputy Adjutant-General a state shewing the present distribution of the force under my command.

A party of the defence force under Mr. Macdonald proceed with this mail to the Queen's Redoubt, from whence I have to request some oxen may be sent to this camp, so that the troops may obtain some fresh meat, having been on salt provisions since they left Auckland, on the 16th of last month, with the exception of one day's fresh meat procured at Pukorokoro.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage" power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial

letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable, are to be paid, and it is provided that the power thereby given should extend to any increase or reduction or remission of postage.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament, passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office."

And whereas certain powers are also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Stamp Duties on Newspapers, and to provide for the transmission by post of printed periodical publications."

And whereas it is expedient that the rates of postage now payable under a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 4th day of October, 1861, on certain letters, newspapers, and packets should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:—

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us, in and by the said recited Acts and every of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in the United Kingdom addressed to the Republic of Venezuela or posted in the Republic of Venezuela addressed to the United Kingdom, and transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and any part of the Republic of Venezuela either direct or via the Island of St. Thomas (the sea conveyance between the United Kingdom, and the Republic of Venezuela or Island of St. Thomas, being by British packet boat), there shall be charged and taken an uniform rate of postage of one shilling.

2. On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to any part of the Republic of Venezuela transmitted by the post between any port in the Republic of Venezuela, and any of Her Majesty's Colonies, or any foreign country through the United Kingdom (the sea conveyance between the Republic of Venezuela and the United Kingdom being direct or via the Island of Saint Thomas by British packet boat), there shall be charged and taken a British rate of postage of one shilling for such conveyance to or from any part of the United Kingdom, and for the conveyance of every such letter between the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet boat or vessel (not being a packet boat) conveying the same, and the colony or foreign country to or from which the same shall be forwarded such a further or additional rate of postage as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted or delivered at the port of the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet boat or vessel (not being a packet boat) conveying the same and transmitted direct between

such port, and any such colony or foreign country, provided that in all cases where such additional rate includes both inland and sea services there shall be deducted from the said rate of one shilling, the sum of one penny, in respect of the inland conveyance under this clause of every such letter sent through the United Kingdom.

3. On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight transmitted by British packet boat from any port in the Republic of Venezuela to any port on the Western Coast of South America, and conveyed via any port in New Granada, without passing through the United Kingdom, there shall be charged and taken an uniform rate of postage of one shilling and fourpence.

4. On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by British packet boat from any port in the Republic of Venezuela to any other foreign port (except any port in the United Kingdom or on the Western Coast of South America) without passing through the United Kingdom there shall be charged and taken a British rate of postage of fourpence.

5. All such respective letters so transmitted as hereinbefore in the first, second, third, and fourth Clauses of this Warrant mentioned, if exceeding half an ounce in weight shall be subject to the several further and additional and progressive rates of postage hereinafter mentioned (that is to say):—

On every such letter, if exceeding half an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight there shall be charged taken and paid two rates of postage;

And on every such letter, if exceeding one ounce and not exceeding one ounce and one-half of another ounce in weight three rates of postage;

And on every such letter if exceeding one ounce and one-half of another ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight four rates of postage;

And for every additional half of an ounce in weight of any such letter above the weight of two ounces there shall be charged, taken, and paid one additional rate of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of an ounce in weight shall be charged as an additional half of an ounce in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant if not exceeding one-half of an ounce in weight.

6. Nothing herein contained shall be construed in anywise to annul prejudice or affect any of the exemptions and privileges granted by the said hereinbefore recited Acts or either of them, or by or under or any other Acts of Parliament relating to the Post Office, or any of the privileges which officers, seamen, and soldiers employed in Her Majesty's Service are, by law, entitled to, of sending and receiving by the post, letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.

7. On every printed British newspaper posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the Republic of Venezuela, and on every printed newspaper posted in the Republic of Venezuela, addressed to the United Kingdom, transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and the Republic of Venezuela direct or via the Island of St. Thomas, by British packet boat, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, in the United Kingdom, the rate of British postage hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, if not exceeding the weight of four ounces, a rate of one penny, and if exceeding that weight but not exceeding the weight of eight ounces, a rate of twopence, and for every additional four

ounces in weight of any such newspaper above the weight of eight ounces, an additional rate of one penny shall be charged, and any fractional part of such additional four ounces shall be charged as an additional four ounces in weight.

8. On every packet consisting of a printed newspaper, not exceeding four ounces in weight, transmitted by British packet boat from any port in the Republic of Venezuela to any port on the Western Coast of South America, and conveyed via any port in New Grenada without passing through the United Kingdom, there shall be charged and taken an uniform rate of postage of fourpence.

9. On every packet consisting of newspapers, books, publications, or works of literature or art whether British, colonial, or foreign, not exceeding four ounces in weight, transmitted by British packet boat from any port in the Republic of Venezuela to any other foreign port (except any port in the United Kingdom or on the Western Coast of South America) without passing through the United Kingdom, there shall be charged and taken an uniform rate of postage of one penny.

10. All such respective packets as hereinbefore in the 8th and 9th Clauses of this Warrant mentioned, if exceeding four ounces in weight, shall be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned (that is to say):

On every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight and not exceeding eight ounces in weight, two rates of postage;

And on every such packet, if exceeding eight ounces and not exceeding one pound in weight, four rates of postage;

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and the half of another pound in weight, six rates of postage;

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of one pound and the half of another pound, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

11. All packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, colonial, or foreign, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the Republic of Venezuela, or posted in the Republic of Venezuela, addressed to the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and the Republic of Venezuela, direct or via the Island of St. Thomas (the sea conveyance between the United Kingdom and the Republic of Venezuela, or Island of St. Thomas, being by British packet boat), and all such respective packets shall be transmitted in conformity with and under and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained relating thereto. And all such respective packets so transmitted and chargeable with postage under this clause shall be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned (that is to say):

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the uniform single rate of postage of threepence;

And on every such packet exceeding four ounces in weight there shall be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows (that is to say):

On every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight, and not exceeding eight ounces in weight, two rates of postage;

And on every such packet, if exceeding eight ounces and not exceeding one pound in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and the half of another pound in weight, six rates of postage;

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of one pound and the half of another pound, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight, shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

12. Every packet which shall be transmitted by the post under the 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th, and 11th clauses of this Warrant shall be so transmitted in conformity with and under and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter contained (that is to say):

Every British newspaper which shall be posted in the United Kingdom, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be printed and published at intervals not exceeding thirty-one days between any two consecutive numbers or parts of such publication, and the same shall be registered by the proprietor or printer thereof at the General Post Office in London, and shall be posted within fifteen days from the date of its publication, and the title and date of the newspaper shall be printed at the top of every page thereof.

There shall be no word or communication printed on any newspaper transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant after the publication thereof, or upon any cover thereof, nor any writing or marks upon any such newspaper or upon any cover thereof other than and except the name and address of the person to whom the same is sent, but the name or title of such newspaper, and the name and address of the publisher, newsvendor, or agent by whom the same is sent, may be printed on the cover thereof.

There shall be no paper or thing enclosed in or with any such newspaper.

No packet, which in length or breadth or width shall exceed the dimensions of two feet, shall be forwarded by the post under the 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th, and 11th Clauses of this Warrant.

The terms "Books, Publications, or Works of Literature or Art" in this Warrant used, shall, for the purposes of this Warrant, mean and comprise all such articles as in their general character are either literary, or consist of printed, written, engraved, or lithographed matter (although not strictly literary) including books (whether printed, written, or plain), publications or compilations (whether in print or in manuscript), almanacks printed or lithographed, letters and such artistic productions as prints, maps, (whether on paper or canvas, or cloth, and whether printed or written), and photographs, when not on glass or in frames containing glass, and any des-

cription of paper, parchment, or vellum (whether printed, lithographed, written upon or plain, or any mixture of the four), together with any binding, mounting, or covering of or upon or belonging to any such article or production or any portion thereof, or of or belonging to any paper, parchment, or vellum, and including also any cases or rollers of prints or maps, book-markers (whether of paper or otherwise), pencils, pens, or other things usually appertaining to any such article or production, paper, parchment, or vellum, or necessary for its safe transmission, which shall be sent in the same packet with any such article or production to which they or it shall belong: Provided, nevertheless, that nothing herein contained shall extend to authorize the sending by the post, under the 9th, 10th, and 11th Clauses of this Warrant, of any patterns, or books of patterns, or papers of patterns of any article or thing whatsoever, unless such patterns consist merely of paper, nor of any packet consisting of or containing any photographs, drawings, prints, or other contents which may be obviously of an obscene character.

Every packet transmitted by the post under the 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th, and 11th Clauses of this Warrant shall be sent open at the ends or sides and either without a cover or in a cover or envelope open at the ends or sides.

No packet transmitted by the post under the 9th, 10th, and 11th Clauses of this Warrant shall contain any written letter either closed or open, nor any written communication in the nature of a letter either closed or open (whether such letter or communication be addressed to or intended for the person to whom the packet shall be directed, or any other person), nor any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection nor any other enclosure not authorized by this Warrant sent in or with any such packet, nor shall there be any written letter or written communication in the nature of a letter in or upon any such packet or on the cover or envelope thereof.

Every packet transmitted by the post under the 7th and 11th Clauses of this Warrant, and posted in the United Kingdom, shall be put into the Post Office at such hours in the day, and under all such regulations as the Postmaster-General may appoint.

Upon every packet transmitted by the post under the 7th and 11th Clauses of this Warrant, which shall be posted in the United Kingdom, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted.

13. All letters, notices, and other communications (whether upon paper, parchment, or vellum), partly printed or partly lithographed and partly written, which if wholly written would not be considered letters or communications in the nature of letters, shall and may be transmitted by the post under and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, conditions, and rates respectively in the 9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th Clauses of this Warrant mentioned and contained.

14. Any letter, notice, or other communication (whether upon paper, parchment, or vellum), partly printed, or partly lithographed, and partly written, which if wholly written, would be considered a letter or a communication in the nature of a letter, shall not be entitled to the privilege of being transmitted by the post under or by virtue of the 9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th Clauses of this Warrant, or the regulations, orders, directions, conditions, and rates therein respectively contained.

And every such last-mentioned letter, notice, or other communication sent by the post shall be deemed and considered to be a letter or a communication in the nature of a letter within the intent and meaning of the 12th Clause of this Warrant.

15. If any question shall arise whether any such letter, notice, or other communication is entitled to the privilege of a printed paper, so far as respects the transmission thereof by the post, or of being sent by the post under or by virtue of the 9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th Clauses of this Warrant, the same shall be referred to the determination of the Postmaster-General, whose decision thereupon shall be final.

16. If any packet sent or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post under the 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th, and 11th Clauses of this Warrant shall in length, or breadth, or width, exceed the dimensions of two feet, or if any such packet or the cover or envelope thereof shall not be open at the ends or sides, or if any such packet shall be sent otherwise than in conformity with the terms, conditions, and regulations hereinbefore in the 12th Clause of this Warrant contained, every such respective packet shall and may be detained and opened, and at the option of the Postmaster-General shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, and every such respective packet on being so returned or given up, shall, at the option of the Postmaster-General, be either free of postage, or be charged with any rate of postage he may think fit, not exceeding the postage to which it would have been liable as a letter.

17. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post under the 11th Clause of this Warrant from the United Kingdom to the Republic of Venezuela (any such packet posted in London and sent from any department or office in or connected with the public service of Her Majesty which shall keep a postage account with the General Post Office in London, and the postage thereof being charged in such account only excepted), shall be posted in the United Kingdom without any postage paid thereon, or with a postage paid thereon less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet is liable under and by virtue of the regulations hereinbefore contained, every such packet shall be detained and opened, and at the option of the Postmaster-General shall be dealt with and chargeable in like manner as is hereinbefore directed with respect to any packet not open at the ends or sides or exceeding in length or breadth or width the dimensions of two feet.

18. The postage of every letter transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant and posted in the United Kingdom, shall be paid at the time of the same being posted, either in money or by the proper postage stamp or stamps being affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such letter, near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon under or by virtue of this Warrant, and if any such letter shall be not so prepaid, the same shall and may be detained and opened, and shall be returned or given up to the sender thereof.

19. The respective letters and packets transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant shall be subject to the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage respectively contained in a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury under the hands of two of the said Commissioners, bearing date the 19th day of February, 1855, relating to re-directed rates of postage upon letters and

packets which shall be re-directed and again forwarded by the post.

20. The rates of postage chargeable on letters, newspapers, books, publications, or works of literature or art, and other printed papers transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant shall be in lieu of the rates of British postage now chargeable thereon under or by virtue of a certain Warrant under the hands of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 4th day of October, 1861, and the same together with the whole of such Warrant are hereby repealed, revoked, and annulled.

21. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to extend to any letters, newspapers, books, publications, or works of literature or art or other printed papers sent between the Republic of Venezuela and France, or sent otherwise than in closed mails between the Republic of Venezuela and any foreign country or British colony through France.

A Court of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of London, holden in the Inner Chamber of the Guildhall of the city of London, on Tuesday, the 23rd day of February, in the year of our Lord 1864, and in the 27th year of the reign of Her present Majesty Victoria, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith.

WHEREAS the Court of Mayor and Aldermen of the said City of London, did, on the 2nd day of March, 1852, in pursuance and by virtue of the powers and authorities granted by a certain Act of Parliament made and passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King

George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend and enlarge the powers of an Act passed in the 4th year of the reign of His present Majesty, for the rebuilding of London Bridge, and for improving and making suitable approaches thereto." And also in pursuance and by virtue of the powers and authorities granted by a certain other Act of Parliament, holden in the 6th and 7th years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act for regulating hackney and stage carriages in and near London," make divers rules and regulations for (amongst other things) the better ordering and regulating the metropolitan stage carriages standing or plying for passengers in Gracechurch-street, and elsewhere, in the said city and liberties. And whereas it duly appears to this Court that

for the purpose of public convenience and accommodation it is expedient and proper that such rules and regulations should be repealed to the extent hereinafter mentioned, and that the rules, orders, and regulations hereinafter contained in that behalf, for the better ordering and regulating metropolitan stage carriages within the said city and liberties, and for enforcing order at the places in the said city and liberties, at which metropolitan stage carriages shall ply for passengers shall be made and established.

Now, therefore, this Court doth, in pursuance and by virtue of the powers and authorities granted by the said Act of Parliament, passed in the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth (so far as such powers and authorities extend), and also in pursuance and by virtue of the powers and authorities granted by the said Act of Parliament, passed in the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, and of all other powers and authorities enabling them in that behalf hereby order and direct as follows :

1. That the several standings or places for calling or plying for passengers by metropolitan stage carriages in New Bridge-street, King William-street, Bishopsgate-street, and on the east and west sides of Gracechurch-street, north of Fenchurch-street, be henceforth discontinued and abolished, and that no metropolitan stage carriage do or shall ply for passengers at such several last-mentioned places, or either of them, or call or stand for passengers, or remain thereat (except only for such time as shall be reasonably sufficient and necessary for taking up or setting down any passenger or passengers or goods, who or which may actually then and there lawfully require or be required to be taken up and carried thereby, or set down therefrom) nor shall begin or end its journey from or at such last-mentioned standings or places, or any or either of them.

2. That the standing or place for plying for passengers at present established in Threadneedle-street, on the north side of the Royal Exchange, shall be a standing or place for, and shall be used by, such metropolitan stage carriages as from time to time may commence their journeys there, and run or go on the journey from such last-mentioned standing or place to Kingsland-gate, Hackney, Clapton, Old Ford, Walthamstow, Edmonton, Tottenham, Southgate, Stoke Newington, Winchmore-hill, Balls-pond, Highbury, Hornsey, Hendon, Kentish-town, Newington-green, the London and North Western Railway Station, and the London and South Western Railway Station.

3. That the standing or place for plying for passengers at present established at the lower end of Gracechurch-street, on the east side of such street lying between the north side of Eastcheap and the south side of Benets-place, shall be a standing or place for, and shall be used only by, such metropolitan stage carriages as may from time to time commence their journey there, and run or go on the journey between such last-mentioned standing or place, and Camberwell, Peckham, Dulwich, Brixton, Norwood, Streatham, Clapham, Merton, Mitcham, Tooting, Wandsworth, Greenwich, Deptford, New Peckham, and Lewisham.

4. That a standing or place for plying for passengers be established in King William-street, at the junction of King William-street and Lombard-street, in the centre of the roadway lying between the church of St. Mary, Woolnoth and the Obelisk there, and such standing or place be used only by such metropolitan stage carriages as from time

to time may commence their journeys there, and run or go on the journey from such last-mentioned standing or place, westward to Westminster, Hammersmith, Brentford, and Kew Bridge.

5. That the standing or place for plying for passengers, at present established in St. Paul's-churchyard, by and near the iron railings, on the north side of the Cathedral, opposite London House Yard, be used only by such metropolitan stage carriages as from time to time may commence their journey there, and run or go on the journey between such last-mentioned place and Richmond, Hounslow, Colnbrook, and Romford.

6. That no metropolitan stage carriage whatsoever do or shall ply for passengers at any or either of the said several standings or places hereinbefore appointed, or call or stand for passengers, or remain thereat (except only for such time as shall be reasonably sufficient and necessary for taking up or setting down any passenger or passengers or goods, who or which may actually then and there lawfully require or be required to be taken up and carried thereby, or set down therefrom), save and except only such metropolitan stage carriages as are respectively hereinbefore appointed and allowed to ply for hire at such standings or places respectively, and that (except as last hereinbefore excepted) no metropolitan stage carriage whatsoever do or shall stand or ply for passengers at any place within the said city and liberties, other than or not being one of the places hereinbefore ordered and appointed for that purpose.

7. That no metropolitan stage carriage whatsoever shall, under any circumstances whatsoever, stand or ply for passengers at or near any or either of the said standings or places hereinbefore appointed as aforesaid, for a longer space of time than five minutes, and that when and so soon as any second metropolitan stage carriage shall arrive at any such standing which shall then be going on the journey to the same place as any other metropolitan stage carriage which shall already then be upon or at any such standing, such last-mentioned stage carriage shall forthwith depart from such standing and proceed on its journey without loitering or delay, and that such of the metropolitan stage carriages who shall make the largest number of journeys in each day, on any of the before-mentioned lines of route, shall be allotted the foremost place on each of the said standings or places, and that those stage carriages making the smallest number of journeys in each day on any of the said lines of route, shall be assigned the last place or places on the said standings or places.

8. Nothing in these rules or orders contained shall affect the orders and regulations of the 2nd day of March, 1852, so far as they relate to Hackney Carriages, but in all other respects the said orders and regulations shall be, and they are, hereby repealed.

9. The drivers and conductors of the metropolitan stage carriages at the several standing places hereby appointed shall obey the direction of the time-keepers on duty at the several standings as to their respective vehicles, and the positions and places in which the same shall stand.

And this court doth hereby further order and direct that these several rules, orders, and regulations hereby made shall be forthwith advertised in the London Gazette and in the two newspapers circulated in the said city of London, called the Times and the Morning Advertiser; and that a copy of the said several rules, orders, and regulations be forthwith hung up for public inspection,

in the Town Clerk's office, at the Guildhall of the said city.

And this court doth hereby further order and direct that these several rules, orders, and regulations hereby made shall become and be in full force and effect upon and from the 25th day of March, in the year of our Lord 1864.

Advertisement of Alterations in proving all
Small Arms in respect to which the existing
Scales of Proof are not applicable.*

New Rule and Regulation and New Scale for the Proof of all Small Arms to which the existing scales of proof, under the Gun Barrel Proof Act, 1855, are not applicable, made under the authority of the said Act by the two Companies in the said Act called the Gunmakers' Company and the Birmingham Company, with the approval of the Right Honourable the Earl de Grey and Ripon, Her Majesty's Secretary of State for War, in the month of February, 1864.

WHEREAS, by the interpretation clause in the said Act, the words "Small Arms," are declared to include small arms of every description, and whether of then present use or of future invention, respectively adapted for the discharge of bullets, shots, or other projectiles, in the manner therein mentioned. And whereas, since the passing of the said Act, certain small arms have been invented, to which the scale of proof in schedule B, to the said Act annexed, is not applicable, and it is desirable for the public safety, that such small arms should not be used without being duly proved. And whereas, by the 95th section of the said Act, power is given to the said two Companies, from time to time, should they deem the proof, as stated in schedule B, to the said Act annexed, insufficient, with the approval of Her Majesty's Secretary of State for War, to make any new rules and regulations and new scale of proof in that behalf. Now, therefore, the said two Companies, with the approval of the Right Honourable the Earl de Grey and Ripon, Her Majesty's Secretary of State for War, do make the following new rule and regulation, and new scale of proof, with regard to the proving of such small arms as aforesaid, that is to say, that such small arms shall be proved with such a bullet as shall be applicable to the dimensions of the bore of the said small arms respectively, and with such a charge of gunpowder as shall not be less than twice the service charge: Provided that if any small arms shall be tendered for proof, whereof the barrel or chamber, or barrels or chambers respectively, if more than one shall not be capable of holding twice the service charge of powder, the same shall be proved with as much powder as the barrel or chamber, or as each barrel or chamber, as the case may be, shall be capable of holding, and that such proof shall be deemed sufficient.
