AT the Court at *Windsor*, the 7th day of *April*, 1864.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for the appointment of convenient places for the holding of Assizes in England and Wales," it was (amongst other things) declared and enacted that His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Most Honourable Privy Council, should have power from time to time to order and direct at what place or places in any county in England or Wales the Assizes and Sessions under the Commissions of Gaol Delivery and other commissions for the dispatch of civil and criminal business should be holden, and to order and direct such assizes and sessions for the dispatch of civil and criminal business to be holden at more than one place in the same county on the circuit, and to order and direct the assizes and sessions under such commissions for the dispatch of criminal business to be holden for the whole county at one place, and for the dispatch of civil business at one or more places in such county on the same circuit; and further to order and direct any special Commissions of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery to be holden at any one or more places in such county; and it was also further declared and enacted, that in case His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Most Honourable Council, should think fit to order and direct the assizes or any such special commissions should be holden at more than one place in any one county, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, to divide any such county for the purposes of the said Act, and to make rules and regulations touching the venue in all cases, civil and criminal, then pending or thereafter to be pending, and to be tried within any division of such county, so to be made as aforesaid, and touching the liability and attendance of jurors, whether grand jurors, special jurors, or common jurors, at the assizes and sessions as aforesaid, or at any sessions under any special commissions to be holden within any such division, and touching the use of any house of correction or prison as a common gaol, and the government and keeping thereof, and touching the alterations of any commissions, writs, precepts, or other proceedings whatsoever, for carrying into effect the purposes of that Act, and touching any other matters that might be requisite for carrying into effect the purposes of that Act, and all such rules and regulations should be of the like force and effect as if the same had been made by the authority of Parliament, and should be notified in the London Gazette, or in such other manner as His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Most Honourable Privy Council, should think fit to direct.

And whereas divers petitions have been presented to Her Most Excellent Majesty the Queen, praying for the holding of the Assizes for the county palatine of Lancaster at Manchester, as well as at Liverpool and Lancaster: And whereas it is certified that proper courts and lodgings for Her Majesty's Judges have been prepared at Manchester: And whereas it will be very beneficial and convenient to a great portion of the inhabitants of the said county palatine and highly conducive to the proper administration of civil and criminal justice, if the assizes and sessions holden in the said county palatine under commissions of gaol delivery and other commissions for the despatch of

civil and criminal business, should be holden at Manchester as well as at Lancaster and Liverpool;

It is therefore ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council, as follows (that is to say):

I. The Assizes and Sessions holden under Commissions of Gaol Delivery and other commissions for the dispatch of civil and criminal business for the county palatine of Lancaster, heretofore holden at Lancaster and at Liverpool, shall hereafter be holden on the same circuit, at Lancaster, Liverpool, and Manchester, in the said county palatine.

II. The said county palatine shall be divided, for the purposes of carrying the said Act of Parliament and this Order into execution, into three divisions, which shall respectively be called the "Northern Division," the "West Derby Division," and the "Salford Division."

III. The said Northern Division shall be and remain the same which was constituted by an Order in Council, bearing date the 24th day of June, 1835, made in pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, that is to say, the same shall include and consist of the whole of the hundreds of Lonsdale, Anamderness, Leyland, and Blackburn; the said West Derby Division shall include and consist of the whole of the hundred of West Derby; and the said Salford Division shall include and consist of the whole of the hundred of Salford.

IV. The House of Correction at Salford, in the hundred of Salford, shall and may be used, in manner hereinafter mentioned, as a common gaol, for the purposes of carrying the said Act of Parliament and this Order into effect; and any Justice or Justices of the Peace, or Coroner, for the said county palatine, or for any liberty therein, may commit to the said house of correction any person duly charged with any offence triable at the assizes; and from and after the opening of the Court at Manchester aforesaid all prisoners in the said house of correction, committed for trial at the assizes, shall be in and under the government, custody, and charge of the Sheriff of the said county palatine of Lancaster, and the prisoners who may be removed, pursuant to the direction hereinafter given, from the House of Correction at Kirkdale, for trial at the assizes to be holden at Manchester, shall also be kept by the said Sheriff in the said House of Correction at Salford, and all such prisoners so committed or removed as aforesaid shall continue in and under the government, custody, and charge of the said Sheriff, in the said house of correction, until the execution of their respective sentences, or until they shall be delivered from thence into the custody in which they ought by virtue of their respective sentences to be delivered, or shall be delivered by due course of law; and the Governor or keeper of the said House of Correction at Salford shall from time to time transmit to the said Sheriff or his deputy, seven days at least before the commission day of the assizes to be holden at Manchester, a list of the prisoners committed to such assizes for trial, or awaiting their trial at such assizes, together with a statement of their several offences, in order to enable him, the said Sheriff, to prepare a proper calendar of such prisoner, which he, the said Sheriff, is hereby required to do.

V. In all cases of commitment for trial, or of recognizances to appear and prosecute, or give evidence or answer at the assizes, for any offence supposed to have been committed in the said Northern Division, such commitment shall be to the Castle of Lancaster, and the recognizances shall be taken to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer at the Assizes at Lancaster as heretofore; and for any offence supposed

to have been committed in the said West Derby Division, the commitment shall be to the House of Correction at Kirkdale, and the recognizances shall be taken to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer at the Assizes at Liverpool; and for any offence supposed to have been committed in the said Salford Division, the commitment shall be to the House of Correction at Salford aforesaid, and the recognizances shall be taken to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer at the Assizes at Manchester, unless the Justice or Justices of the Peace, making any such commitment or taking such recognizances, shall, under the special circumstances of the case, think fit to make such commitment for trial, or recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer at the assizes to be holden in either of the said divisions, other than that in which the offence shall be supposed to have been committed, in which case such commitment shall be made and recognizances taken, and such trial shall take place accordingly.

VI. All prisoners now or hereafter in custody in the House of Correction at Kirkdale, for trial at the next ensuing assizes to be holden at Liverpool after the date of this Order, for offences appearing by their respective commitments to have been committed within the said Salford Division (other than such prisoners (if any) as may have been committed by any justice or justices in such special case as aforesaid, or as may have been removed to the said House of Correction at Kirkdale, from the said House of Correction at Salford, by the order of a court or judge as hereinafter provided) shall be removed by the Sheriff of the said county palatine, to the said House of Correction at Salford, for trial at the said next Assizes to be holden at Manchester, and shall be tried there; and the said Sheriff shall, ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the Commission at the said next Assizes at Manchester, cause to be inserted in one or more of the newspapers published in the said county, a list of the names of the prisoners so removed (so far as the same list can then be made out), with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, together with a notice that all persons bound by recognizance to appear and prosecute or give evidence, or give evidence against the said next Assizes to be holden at Manchester, and the persons so bound shall so appear and prosecute, and give evidence accordingly; and all prisoners who shall be in custody for trial at the assizes in the said House of Correction at Salford, shall be tried at the assizes holden at Manchester.

VII. All indictments for offences triable at the assizes, supposed to have been committed in the said Northern Division of the said county palatine, shall be preferred to the grand jury for the said county at Lancaster, and for such offences supposed to have been committed in the said West Derby Division of the said county, shall be preferred to the grand jury for the said county at Liverpool; and for such offences supposed to have been committed in the Salford Division of the said county, shall be preferred to the grand jury for the said county at Manchester, except in the cases of persons committed or held to bail under the special circumstances hereinbefore-mentioned, or remand for trial by order of a court or judge as hereinafter provided, in which cases indictments shall be preferred to the grand jury at Lancaster, Liverpool, or Manchester, to or at whichever of the said places such persons shall be committed, or held to bail to appear; and all issues arising upon or out of any such indictment shall be tried at whichever of the said places the same shall have been preferred: Provided that issues now joined, or hereafter to be joined, or any

indictments already found at the assizes, shall be tried at the Assizes holden at Lancaster or Liverpool, as the case may be.

VIII. Any person, not in custody, against whom any bill of indictment shall hereafter be found at the Assizes at Lancaster, shall, if committed, be committed to the Castle of Lancaster, for trial at the Assizes to be holden at Lancaster, or in case such bill of indictment be found at the Assizes at Liverpool, such person shall be committed to the said House of Correction at Kirkdale, for trial at the Assizes to be holden at Liverpool, or in case such bill of indictment be found at the Assizes at Manchester, such person shall be committed to the said House of Correction at Salford, for trial at the Assizes to be holden at Manchester.

IX. The Sheriff of the said county palatine, or his deputy, and the Clerk of the Crown for the said county palatine, or his deputy, shall attend at the Assizes at Manchester, as well as at Lancaster and Liverpool; and all Justices of the Peace and Coroners, bound by law to attend at the assizes shall attend at the said Assizes at Lancaster, Liverpool, or Manchester, according as their usual place of residence may be in the said Northern Division, or in the said West Derby Division, or in the said Salford Division, respectively; and such Justices and Coroner as have no residence in any of the said divisions, may attend at any of the said places which shall be nearest to their usual place of residence; and all Mayors, Stewards, and Bailiffs of liberties, hundreds and wapentakes in the said Northern Division shall attend at the Assizes at Lancaster, in the West Derby Division at the Assizes at Liverpool, and in the Salford Division at the Assizes at Manchester: And every such Justice of the Peace and Coroner shall certify his examinations, informations, inquisitions, bailments, and recognizances in respect of offences which, according to this Order, are to be tried at the Assizes at Lancaster, to the Clerk of the Crown, before or at the opening of the Court at Lancaster; and in respect of offences which are to be tried at Liverpool, before or at the opening of the Court at Liverpool; and in respect of offences which are to be tried at Manchester, before or at the opening of the Court at Manchester.

X. No alteration shall be necessary, by reason of this Order, in the Commissions of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery for the said county palatine of Lancaster, but three Assize writs shall be issued by the Clerk of the Crown for the said county palatine, in the same manner as two have heretofore issued, directed to the Sheriff of the said county palatine, one of which shall be, as near as may be, in the form hereunto annexed marked (A); and another, in the like form, substituting the words "Castle at Lancaster," for the words "Court House at Manchester," and "Northern Division" for "Salford Division;" and another, in the like form, substituting the words "Court-House at Liverpool," for "Court-House at Manchester," and "West Derby Division" for "Salford Division;" but no deviation in such writs from the said form shall in any way invalidate the same; and the Sheriff shall return one writ at the Assizes at Lancaster, and another at the Assizes at Liverpool, and another at the Assizes at Manchester, with the proper schedules or panels thereto annexed respectively, and with a schedule of the nomina ministrorum for the whole county, and writs of subpoena shall issue as heretofore, with the proper alteration, naming the Assizes at Lancaster, Liverpool, or Manchester, as the case may be, at which the attendance of the witnesses is to be given; any all writs of jury process shall be altered in like manner; but no alteration shall be necessary in and

mittimus to the said county palatine for the trial of any issue joined in any of Her Majesty's Courts at Westminster: And all assize writs and subpoenas to be hereafter issued for the next assizes may be tested on any day after the date of this Order, and for any subsequent assizes may be tested in manner heretofore used and accustomed.

XI. The Sheriffs of the said county palatine shall summon a grand jury for the body of the said county, which shall attend at the Assizes at Lancaster, and shall be sworn for the body of the whole county, as heretofore; and another grand jury, which shall attend at the Assizes at Liverpool, and be sworn in like manner; and another grand jury, which shall attend at the Assizes at Manchester, and be sworn in like manner; which said several grand juries may consist in whole, or in part, of the same persons, and may consist altogether of several persons.

XII. The Sheriff or other minister to whom belongs the return of the jurors for the trial of issues to be tried at the said Assizes at Lancaster, Liverpool, or Manchester, either from any of the superior Courts at Westminster, or in the Court of Common Pleas at Lancaster, or of any criminal issue, shall summon a competent number of men named in the Jurors' Book, to serve on juries, indiscriminately, on the civil and criminal side, at the Assizes at Lancaster, so as such number be not less than 48 nor more than 72; and also a competent number of the like persons to serve on juries, indiscriminately as aforesaid, at the Assizes at Liverpool, so as such number be not less than 48 nor more than 72; and also a competent number of like persons to serve on juries, indiscriminately as aforesaid, so as such number be not less than 48 nor more than 72: Provided that a Judge of any of Her Majesty's superior Courts at Westminster, or the Judges in the Commissions of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery for the said county, may, at any time, direct a greater or less number to be summoned in any of the said cases, on which such greater or less number shall be summoned accordingly, and the Sheriff or other minister, in summoning such juries, to attend at the Assizes, at Lancaster, Liverpool, or Manchester, respectively, shall have regard to the convenience of such jurors, as to their respective places of residence.

XIII. Every person who shall have served as jurors at any of the said Assizes, shall have the like privilege and exemption, by virtue of the Act passed in the sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, for consolidating and amending the Laws relating to Jurors and Juries, as if he had served at Assizes holden for the whole county; and all the powers and provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, and of "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1852," touching the summoning of juries, common and special, and the summoning of jurors to serve, indiscriminately, on the criminal and civil side, and, otherwise, shall be in force with respect to each of the said Assizes, to be holden at Lancaster, Liverpool, and Manchester respectively, as they were before this Order with respect to the Assizes holden at Lancaster and Liverpool.

XIV. Every declaration hereafter to be delivered or filed in any action in which the issue is intended to be tried at the Assizes for the county palatine of Lancaster, holden at Lancaster, Liverpool, or Manchester, respectively, shall have in the margin, besides the ordinary venue, the words ["Northern Division"] or ["West Derby Division"] or ["Salford Division"], but no other alterations in the ordinary form of such declaration shall be necessary; and issues arising in such actions, if tried at the Assizes, shall according be tried at the Assizes, holden at Lancaster, Liverpool, and Man-

chester respectively: Provided, that in all cases of civil actions in which the venue is by law local, the issues therein shall be tried at Lancaster, in cases where the cause of action shall have arisen in the Northern Division, and at Liverpool, where the cause of action shall have arisen in the West Derby Division, and at Manchester, where the cause of action shall have arisen in the Salford Division, in like manner as if the said three divisions were three separate counties: Provided, nevertheless, that it shall be lawful for the Court in which any such issue is joined, or for any Judge of any of the superior Courts at Westminster, if they or he shall think fit, to order such issues to be tried at the Assizes holden in either of the said divisions in which the cause of action did not arise, and also to order the words in the margin of the declaration to be amended in any other cases so as to cause the trial to take place at the Assizes holden in another division: But in all cases of issues already joined, in which the venue is laid in the county of Lancaster (Northern Division), or in the said county (Southern Division), such issues shall be tried at the Assizes at Lancaster or Liverpool, as the case may be, unless the Court in which the action shall have been commenced, or a Judge of any of the superior Courts at Westminster, shall otherwise order, by directing the proper words to be inserted in the margin of the declaration or otherwise, as they or he shall think fit.

XV. In all cases of indictments removed into Her Majesty's Court of Queen's Bench at Westminster, by certiorari, and in all cases of informations triable at the Assizes, for offences alleged to have been committed, or matters alleged to have arisen in the said county palatine, the trial of any issue or issues arising therein, shall take place at the Assizes at Lancaster (unless in the case of indictments), the said Court of Queen's Bench, or any Judge thereof, or any Judge of the Court of Common Pleas at Lancaster, or (in the case of informations) the Court in which the information shall be filed, shall otherwise order.

XVI. Her Majesty's Court of Queen's Bench or any Judge thereof, or any Judge of any of the superior Courts at Westminster, being a Commissioner of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery for the said county palatine, shall and may, if such Court or Judge shall think fit, order and direct that the issue or issues upon any indictment found by any of the said grand juries at Lancaster, Liverpool, and Manchester respectively, to be tried at any Assizes to be holden for any of the said three divisions, and order and direct any prisoner in custody, for trial at the Assizes, in the said Castle of Lancaster, or in the said House of Correction at Kirkdale, or in the said House of Correction at Salford, to be removed to take his trial accordingly, and shall issue a writ of habeas corpus for such removal.

XVII. Every recognizance which shall be entered into to appear and prosecute or give evidence, or to appear and answer, as the case may be, at the Assizes to be holden at Lancaster, Liverpool, or Manchester, shall, in case such order shall have been made as last aforesaid, be obligatory on the parties, bound by such recognizance to appear and prosecute or give evidence, or to appear and answer, as the case may be, and to do all the things therein mentioned, at the Assizes at which, by such Order, the trial is to take place, in like manner as if such recognizance had been originally entered into for appearing and prosecuting, or giving evidence, or for appearing and answering, or doing such other things at the last-mentioned Assizes: Provided that one week's notice shall have been given, either by serving the same personally upon the parties bound by such recognizance, or by leav-

ing the same at the place of residence as of which such parties are described in the recognizance, to appear at such last-mentioned Assizes: Provided also, that the Court or Judge making such Order for trial and removal as aforesaid, shall cause the party applying for such Order, whether he be the prosecutor or the party charged, to enter into a recognizance in such sum, and with or without sureties, as such Court or Judge may direct, conditioned to give such notice as aforesaid to the parties bound by such recognizances, to appear at the Assizes at which the trial shall be ordered to take place as aforesaid.

XVIII. Nothing in this Order contained shall extend to issues upon indictments or other proceedings removed into the Court of Pleas of the Crown of Lancaster, which shall be tried at the Assizes holden at Lancaster as heretofore.

XIX. Nothing in this Order contained shall extend to prevent the Commissioners of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery, or Justices of the Common Pleas within the said county, or the grand or petty juries sitting at Lancaster, Liverpool, or Manchester, from having and exercising, at any of the said places, such jurisdiction as now belongs to them respectively by law over the whole county.

XX. So much of the said Order in Council of the 24th day of June, 1835, as is repugnant to or inconsistent with this Order shall be and is hereby repealed, annulled, and made void.

that you make it known to all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Coroners, Stewards, Constables, Bailiffs of liberties, hundreds, and wapentakes in the Salford Division of the county aforesaid, that they and every of them be then and there, with the rolls, records, and other muniments, to do that which to their office upon this occasion belongs; and have you there the number of the said Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Coroners, Stewards, Jurors, Constables, and Bailiffs, and every of them, and the names of them by whom you so make them to come, and before whom, and by whom you so make them to know, and this Writ.

And whereas it hath been represented that it would be of advantage to the public, if the County Court of Cheshire, holden at Congleton, were ordered to be holden at Sandbach, as well as at Congleton;

Her Majesty, having taken the premises into consideration, is thereupon pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, the County Court of Cheshire, holden at Congleton, shall be holden at Sandbach, as well as at Congleton.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said "Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and direct that the provisions of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," with respect to salvage for services rendered in saving life from British ships, shall, in all British Courts, be held to apply to services rendered in saving life from Prussian ships, whether such services are rendered within British jurisdiction or not.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parishes of Great Bedwyn, Little Bedwyn, and Burbage, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Katharine, situate in Savernake Forest aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Walter Kerr, Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury, and also in right of his see patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Burbage, and of the Most Honorable George William Frederick, Marquis of Ailesbury, the patron both of the vicarage of the said parish of Great Bedwyn, and of the vicarage of the said parish of Little Bedwyn, (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parishes of Great Bedwyn, Little Bedwyn, and Burbage which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Katharine, situate in Savernake Forest aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Katharine, Savernake Forest.'

"And we further represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said Walter Kerr, Bishop of Salisbury, and the said George William Frederick, Marquis of Ailesbury (testified as aforesaid) that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Katharine, Savernake Forest, shall belong to and be exercised by the said George William Frederick, Marquis of Ailesbury, during his life, and that from and after his decease the said right of presentation and appointment shall belong to and be exercised by the Most Honorable Mary Caroline, now the wife of the said Marquis (provided that she should survive him), and that from and after the decease of both of them, the said Marquis and Marchioness, the said right of presentation and appointment shall belong to and be exercised by the heirs and assigns of him the said George William Frederick, Marquis of Ailesbury.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet."

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Katharine, Savernake Forest, being:—

"All those portions of the several parishes of Great Bedwyn, Little Bedwyn, and Burbage, in the county of Wilts, and in the diocese of Salisbury, which are comprised within and bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Great Bedwyn from the said parish of Burbage at a point in the middle of the fence (forming part of the southern boundary of Savernake Forest), which divides that

portion of such forest, known as 'Long String,' and numbered 645 and 646 upon a certain map or plan deposited in the Estate Office of the Marquisate of Ailesbury, and entitled 'Great Bedwyn Parish, except the tithing of Marten,' and upon the map hereunto annexed, from the close called Durlley Field, and numbered 759 upon the same maps, such point being at or near the north-eastern end of the fence which divides the said close called Durlley Field, from the close called Hill Field, and numbered 631 upon the Tithe Commutation map of the said parish of Burbage, and upon the Map hereunto annexed, and being also opposite to a boundary stone, inscribed '1. C. 1863,' and placed on the northern side of the said fence, at a distance of one hundred and twelve yards and a-half, or thereabouts, from the south-western corner of the base of a certain summer-house called the Octagon Tower, situate within the said forest, and extending thence, first, south-eastward along the middle of the said fence, and then either south-eastward, or eastward, or northward along the middle of the fences (forming other part of the southern boundary of Savernake Forest aforesaid), which divide the said portion numbered 645 and the portion numbered 646 as aforesaid of the said part of such forest known as Long String from the closes called respectively Harbour Field, and Limpton Field, and numbered respectively 758, 753 upon the said two first-mentioned maps, as far as the junction of the said fence dividing the last-mentioned portion of Long String aforesaid from the close called Limpton Field aforesaid, with the fence which divides that other portion of Long String aforesaid which is planted and numbered 646 and 646A upon the said two first-mentioned maps from the same last-named close, and extending thence first eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of such last-named fence, and of the fences which divide the said portion of Long String which is planted and numbered 646 and 646A as aforesaid and the close called Lower Barn Field, and numbered 651 upon the said two first-mentioned maps, from a certain sheep-down, numbered 740 and 739 upon the same maps, to the point where the fence dividing the said close called Lower Barn Field from that portion of the sheep-down before referred to, which is numbered 739 upon the said two first-mentioned maps, meets the south-western extremity of the fence which divides the field called Haw Field, and numbered 652 upon the said two first-mentioned maps, from certain public roads called respectively Crofton Lane and Bloxham Lodge Lane, or Bloxham Lodge Road, and continuing thence north-eastward (crossing a certain green drive leading from the Brail Woods towards the mansion called Tottenham Park, or Savernake House) along the middle of the said last-described fence to the junction of such fence with the fence dividing the said field called Haw Field from the wood called Haw Wood Copse, or Haw Wood, and numbered 653 upon the said two first-mentioned maps, and extending thence south-eastward across the last-named road as far as the north-western extremity of the fence dividing the close called Meadow at Bloxham, and the plantation called Coppice at Bloxham Lodge (which said close and plantation are respectively numbered 675 and 673 upon the said two first-mentioned maps) from the close called Park Field, and numbered 676 upon the same maps, and from the close called Little Park Field, and numbered 677 upon the said maps, and from those portions which are numbered 678 and 679 of a certain down numbered 678, 679, and 681 upon the said two first-mentioned maps, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-described fence, as far as its junction with the fence

which divides the said plantation called Coppice at Bloxham Lodge, and the close called Dog Kennel Meadow, and numbered 672 upon the said two first-mentioned maps, and the plantation called Bloxham Coppice, and numbered 667 upon the same maps, from that portion of the same down, which is numbered 681 as aforesaid, and from the plantation called Bloxham Lands, and numbered 682 upon the said two first-mentioned maps, and from the plantation forming part of that portion of the close called Bloxham Mead, which is numbered 665 upon the same maps, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-described fence as far as the point at the extremity of the same fence, where such fence meets the fence dividing that portion of the close called Bloxham Mead as aforesaid, which is numbered 664 on the said two first-mentioned maps, from the plantation called Bloxham Coppice, and numbered 667 as aforesaid, and extending thence first generally north-westward along the middle of the last-named fence, and then north-eastward along the middle of the fence dividing the said last-named portion of the said close called Bloxham Mead, from the close called 'Adjoining Well Meadow,' and numbered 663 upon the said two first-mentioned maps as far as a point in the middle of the fence dividing the closes called 'Adjoining Well Meadow' and 'Adjoining Well Meadow' and numbered 662 and 661 upon the same maps from the aforesaid first-named close called also 'Adjoining Well Meadow,' and numbered 663 as aforesaid, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last described fence as far as a point in the middle of the before-mentioned road leading from Crofton Lane aforesaid to Bloxham Lodge and to Stock Common, such point being opposite to the middle of the north-western extremity of the said last described fence, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the same road to its north-eastern extremity, and continuing thence in a direct line north-eastward across Stock Common aforesaid to a boundary stone inscribed '2 S. C. 1863,' and placed in the middle (or nearly so) of the northern end of the said last-described fence and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said road leading from Horse Hall Hill to the junction of the same road with the aforesaid turnpike-road leading from Hungerford to Marlborough, and continuing thence in a direct line still north-eastward across such turnpike-road to a point on the boundary dividing the said parish of Little Bedwyn from the parish of Froxfield, in the same county and diocese, and extending thence in a direction generally north-westward along the last-described parish boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Little Bedwyn from the parish of Ransbury, in the same county and diocese, and extending thence in a direction mainly south-westward or westward along the last-described parish boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Little Bedwyn from the parish of Mildenhall, in the same county and diocese; and extending thence first southward and then generally south-westward along the last-described parish boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Little Bedwyn from the new parish of Savernake, in the same county and diocese, and extending thence in a direction generally south-eastward along the last-described parish boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Burbage from the said

new parish of Savernake, and extending thence south-westward along the last-described parish boundary as far as a point in the middle of the northern end of the fence forming the western boundary of the several closes numbered respectively 687, 688, and 686, upon the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Burbage, and upon the map hereunto annexed, such point being near to a boundary stone inscribed '9. S. F. St. K. C. C. 1863,' and placed in the most western angle of the close numbered 687 as aforesaid, and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-described fence to a point in the middle of the road, known as the Green Drive, otherwise 'Love Walk,' opposite to the middle of the southern extremity of the said last-described fence, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said last-mentioned road (crossing the road leading from Burbage to Durley) to a point in the middle of the fence forming part of the southern boundary of Savernake Forest aforesaid, and extending thence first southward and then south-eastward along the middle of the said fence to the point opposite to the boundary stone numbered 1, where the said imaginary line commenced."

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Joseph Cotton, the Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, of the Right Honorable Richard, Baron Westbury, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, acting on behalf of your Majesty, as the patron in right of the Crown, both of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Greenstead, and of the vicarage of the said parish of Ardleigh, of the Right Honorable Anne Florence, Dowager Countess Cowper, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Michael, Mile End, otherwise Myland, of the Right Honorable Edward Cardwell, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, acting on behalf of your Majesty, as the patron, in right of your Majesty's Duchy of Lancaster, of the rectory of the said parish of Langham (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), and with the consent of the Master and Fellows of Balliol College, within the University of Oxford, the patrons both of the rectory of the said parish of All Saints, Colchester, and of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Saint Botolph, Colchester (in testimony whereof the said Master and Fellows have affixed their common or corporate seal to this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parishes of Saint Andrew, Greenstead, of Saint Michael, Mile End, otherwise Myland, of Langham, of Ardleigh, of All Saints, Colchester, and of Saint Botolph, Colchester, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate in the said parish of Saint Andrew, Greenstead aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John, Colchester.'

"And with the same consents, so testified respectively as aforesaid, we further humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient, that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint John, Colchester, should belong to and be exercised by the Venerable Charles Parr Burney, Clerk, Archdeacon of Colchester, and his successors, archdeacons of the same archdeaconry.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John, Colchester, being:—

"All those portions of the several parishes of Saint Andrew, Greenstead, of Saint Michael, Mile End (otherwise Myland), of Langham, and of

Ardleigh, in the county of Essex, and in the diocese of Rochester, and also all that detached portion of the parish of All Saints, Colchester, and also all that detached portion of the parish of Saint Botolph, Colchester, in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Andrew, Greenstead, from the detached portion of the parish of Saint Botolph, Colchester aforesaid, at a point on the western side of the turnpike-road leading from Colchester to Manningtree (at which point a boundary stone, inscribed 'C. Kingston-upon-Hull, and in the diocese of York, which is comprised within and bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish from the district chapelry of Saint Stephen, Hull, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of the Anlaby-road opposite to the middle of the northern end of Walker-street; and extending thence southward to and along the middle of the last-named street to its intersection by Adelaide-street; and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named street to its intersection by Great Thornton-street; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named street as far as a point opposite to the middle of the western end of William-street; and extending thence eastward to and along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Cogan-street; and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Great Passage-street; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named street as far as a point opposite to the middle of the southern end of Lower Union-street; and extending thence northward to and along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Osborne-street; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named street to its intersection by Anne-street; and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named street to a point in the middle of the wall which crosses and forms the northern extremity of the same last-named street, and which is part of a continuous series of walls inclosing and bounding on the south and east certain land belonging to 'The Guild or Brotherhood of Masters and Pilots, Seamen of the Trinity House in Kingston-upon-Hull,' upon which land the almshouses belonging to the said guild or brotherhood, which are called 'The Master-Mariners and Mariners Almshouses,' are situate; and extending thence first eastward and then northward along the middle of such wall and of the other walls forming the rest of the said continuous series, passing (throughout the whole length of the same walls) immediately along the rear of the said almshouses, or some of them, as far as a point on the boundary dividing the said parish of Holy Trinity, Kingston-upon-Hull, from the said district chapelry of Saint Stephen, Hull, such point being situate in the middle of Carr Lane, opposite or nearly opposite to the middle of the northern end of that one of the said continuous series of walls which abuts upon the same Carr Lane; and extending thence south-westward along the said boundary dividing the said parish of Holy Trinity, Kingston-upon-Hull, from the said district chapelry of Saint Stephen, Hull (following thereby first the middle of Carr Lane aforesaid, and then the middle of the Anlaby Road aforesaid), to the point in the middle of the last-named road where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eleventh day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts.

"We humbly recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us out of the Common Fund in the said Acts mentioned in each and every year to the Incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices described in the first schedule hereunto annexed, the annual sum set opposite to the name of each such benefice, in the last column of the same schedule, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year.

"Provided always, that the grants so recommended to be made by us to the benefices of Alrewas, Caistor-with-Holton-le-Moor and Clixby, Holy Trinity, Hoxton, and Liddington-with-Caldecot, shall be paid only upon the production to us on or before the first day of May and the first day of November, in each and every year, of certificates, under the hand of the Bishops of the respective dioceses, that a curate duly licensed by such bishop, has, in each instance, been employed within the parish or district during the preceding half-year; and provided also, that the said grant so recommended to be made by us to the benefice of Holy Trinity, Hoxton, shall continue in force only until a new district or districts for spiritual purposes shall have been constituted either wholly or in part out of the new parish of Holy Trinity, Hoxton.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the messuages, lands, and premises, tithes or rent-charges, in lieu of tithes and other hereditaments particularly described in the second and nine following schedules hereunto annexed, with their appurtenances, now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the several spiritual persons hereinafter mentioned, that is to say; that the lands and hereditaments described in the second schedule hereunto annexed, situate within the parish of St. Albans, in the county of Hertford and diocese of Rochester, which were conveyed to us by a deed, bearing date the sixteenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and made between the Right Honorable James Walter, Earl of Verulam, and Gerard Wolfe Lydekker, of Harpenden Lodge, in the said county of Hertford, Esquire, of the one part, and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the other part, which deed is intended to be deposited in the registry of

the diocese of Rochester, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the rector or incumbent for the time being of the rectory of the said parish of St. Albans; that the lands and hereditaments described in the third schedule hereunto annexed, situate at Aston Brook, in the parish of Aston-juxta-Birmingham, in the county of Warwick and diocese of Worcester, which were conveyed to us by a deed bearing date the fifth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and made between Josiah Yeomans Robins, formerly of Allesley Park, in the county of Warwick, but now of Myton, in the same county, Esquire, Ebenezer Robins, of Birmingham, in the said county of Warwick, Surveyor, Samuel Holland, formerly of Plas yn Penrhyn, in the county of Merioneth, but now of Tau y Bwlch, in the same county, Esquire, John Hillier Blount, of Bagshot, in the county of Surrey, Doctor in Medicine, and Henry Parker, the younger, formerly of Avenue-road, Regent's-park, in the county of Middlesex, but now of Potters Bar, in the same county, Gentleman, of the first part, the Right Reverend Henry, Lord Bishop of Worcester, of the second part, and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the third part, which deed has been deposited in the registry of the diocese of Worcester, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Aston Brook aforesaid; that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the fourth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Henllan, in the county of Denbigh and diocese of Saint Asaph, formerly belonging to the deanery of the cathedral church of Saint Asaph, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Bylchau, in the same county and diocese; that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, described in the fifth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Henllan, in the said county of Denbigh and diocese of Saint Asaph, formerly belonging to the said deanery of the cathedral church of Saint Asaph, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Trefnant, in the same county and diocese; that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the sixth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Chigwell, in the county of Essex and diocese of Rochester, formerly belonging to the Prebend of Saint Pancras, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Saint John, Chigwell, in the same county and diocese; that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the seventh schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Chigwell, in the said county of Essex and diocese of Rochester, formerly belonging to the said Prebend of Saint Pancras, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the minister for the time being of the district of Chigwell Row, in the same county and diocese; that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the eighth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Elm, in the county of Cambridge and diocese of Ely, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the minister for the time being of the district of Fridaybridge, in the same county and diocese; that the lands and hereditaments described in the ninth schedule hereunto

annexed, together with the messuage and buildings thereon, situate within the parish of Hurst, in the county of Berks and diocese of Oxford, formerly belonging to the deanery of the cathedral church of Salisbury, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Hurst, with the chapelry of Twyford annexed; that the messuage, lands, hereditaments, and premises described in the tenth schedule hereunto annexed, situate within the parish of Llanstephan, in the county of Carmarthen and diocese of Saint David's, which were conveyed to us by a deed bearing date the thirtieth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and made between Elizabeth Lloyd, of Laques, in the said parish of Llanstephan, of the one part, and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the other part, which deed is intended to be deposited in the Registry of the diocese of Saint David's, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Llanstephan; that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, described in the eleventh schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Heckfield, in the county of Southampton and diocese of Winchester, which were conveyed to us by a deed bearing date the twentieth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and made between the Warden and Scholars of Saint Mary College of Winchester, in Oxford, commonly called New College, in Oxford, of the one part, and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the other part, which deed is intended to be deposited in the Registry of the diocese of Winchester, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Mattingley, in the same county and diocese.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend William Gibson Patchell, Clerk, the minister of the district of Drove End, in the county and diocese of Lincoln, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, described in the twelfth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Gedney, in the same county and diocese, with their appurtenances now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein shall, in like manner and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred and become absolutely vested in the minister for the time being of the said district of Drove End, in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of one hundred and thirty pounds, now payable by us to the same minister, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Charles Robert King Dallas, Clerk, the perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of Saint John, Farncombe, in the county of Surrey and diocese of Winchester, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the thirteenth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Godalming, in the same county and diocese, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the deanery of the cathedral church of Salisbury, and now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein shall, in like manner, and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual

curate or incumbent for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of Saint John, Farncombe, in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of forty pounds, now payable by us to the same perpetual curate or incumbent, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the ninth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty; and also in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of fifty pounds, now payable by us to the same perpetual curate or incumbent, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-third day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend John Edwards, Clerk, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Minety, in the counties of Gloucester and Wilts, and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the fourteenth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Minety, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the archdeaconry of Wilts, and now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein shall, in like manner and by the authority aforesaid be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Minety, in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of ten pounds, now payable by us to the same vicar or incumbent in respect of the estates formerly belonging to the said archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Sydney Henry Armitstead, Clerk, the perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of Saint John the Evangelist, Sandbach Heath, in the county and diocese of Chester, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the lands and hereditaments described in the first part of the fifteenth schedule hereunto annexed, situate at Sandbach aforesaid, with their appurtenances, all which hereditaments and premises were conveyed to us by a deed, bearing date the first day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and made between Philip Tatton Mainwaring, of Peover Hall, in the said county of Chester, Esquire, and Henry Eardley Aylmer Dalbiac, late of Chester Place, Hyde Park, in the county of Middlesex, but now of Udney House, Teddington, in the county of Surrey, Esquire, of the first part, Frederick William Steward, of Lincoln's Inn Fields, in the said county of Middlesex, Gentleman, of the second part, and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the third part, which deed is intended to be deposited in the Registry of the diocese of Chester, and also the lands and hereditaments described in the second part of the same schedule, likewise situate at Sandbach aforesaid, with their appurtenances, all which said last-mentioned hereditaments and premises were conveyed to us by a deed, bearing date the ninth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and made between William Wiustanley Hull, of 'The Knowle,' near Belper, in the county of Derby, Esquire, and Peter Mere Latham, of Lower Grosvenor-street, in the said county of Middlesex, Doctor in Physic, of the one part, and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the other part, which said last-mentioned deed is also intended to be deposited in the said Registry of the diocese of Chester, and all our estate and interest therein shall, in like manner, and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual

curate or incumbent for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of Saint John the Evangelist, Sandbach Heath, and shall be in lieu of and substitution for a portion amounting to one hundred and nine pounds per annum of the yearly sum or stipend of one hundred and fifty pounds, now payable by us to the same perpetual curate or incumbent, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twentieth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

“ And whereas it appears to us after duly considering the circumstances of the cases undermentioned to be expedient that the grants respectively recommended to be made by us to the benefices of Saint Albans, Aston Brook, Fridaybridge, Hurstwith-Twyford, Llanstephan, Llanthewy Vach, Mattingley, Saint Margaret, Uxbridge, and Saint Mark, Whitechapel, should commence and take effect from the several dates hereinafter mentioned respectively, that is to say; in the case of the rectory of Saint Albans, from the sixteenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, in the case of the perpetual curacy of Aston Brook, from the fifth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, in the case of the perpetual curacy of Fridaybridge, from the twenty-ninth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the case of the perpetual curacy of Hurst, with the Chapelry of Twyford annexed,

from the twenty-sixth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, in the case of the perpetual curacy of Llanstephan, from the thirtieth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, in the case of the perpetual curacy of Llanthewy Vach, from the twenty-fifth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, in the case of the perpetual curacy of Mattingley, from the twentieth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Margaret, Uxbridge, from the twenty-eighth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Mark, Whitechapel, from the tenth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three.

Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the several grants hereinbefore recommended by us to be made to the said last-mentioned benefices respectively, shall commence and take effect from the said dates hereinbefore in that behalf mentioned respectively.

And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church, called Chapel-le-Dale, situate in the ancient parochial chapelry of Ingleton Fells, otherwise Chapel-le-Dale, in the ancient parochial chapelry of Ingleton, within the parish of Bentham, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church, called Chapel-le-Dale as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those parts of the said parish of Bentham, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Chapel-le-Dale.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified as aforesaid), we further represent, that it appears to

us to be expedient, that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that so long as the Reverend Richard Denny, the present incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said ancient parochial chapelry of Ingleton, shall continue to be such incumbent, all the fees which shall be received in respect of the performance of the said offices at the said church, called Chapel-le-Dale, shall be paid by the minister thereof to the said Richard Denny.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Chapel-le-Dale, being:—

"So much of the ancient parochial chapelry of Ingleton Fells, otherwise Chapel-le-Dale, in the ancient parochial chapelry of Ingleton, within the parish of Bentham, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, as lies wholly outside the common or commonable land within the same parish, which is called or known as Scales Moor: And also all such other part (if any) of the said ancient parochial chapelry of Ingleton Fells, otherwise Chapel-le-Dale: And also all such part (if any) of that portion of the said ancient parochial chapelry of Ingleton, within the said parish of Bentham, which is not included within the said ancient parochial chapelry of Ingleton Fells, otherwise Chapel-le-Dale, as may consist of that part of the said common or commonable land, called or known as Scales Moor, which is situate to the east of an imaginary line, commencing at a point in the middle of the wall, which divides Scales Moor from Twisleton Pasture (opposite to which point a boundary stone inscribed 'C.-le-D. "And whereas by an indenture bearing date the twenty-seventh day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and made or expressed to be made between James Randell, of Number 25, Mark-lane, in the city of London, Esquire, Charles Randell, of Duke-street, Southwark, in the county of Surrey, Esquire, Edward Randell, of the same place, Esquire, and Henry Randell the younger, of Mark-lane aforesaid, Esquire, Trustees of the will of John Randell, late of Blackheath, in the county of Kent, Esquire, deceased, of the first part; Susan Shaw, now the Wife of Alexander Shaw, of Cavendish-square, in the county of Middlesex, Surgeon, but formerly the Widow of the said John Randell, of the second part; the said Charles Randell (surviving Executor of the Will of George Randell, late of Blackheath, in the county of Kent, Esquire, deceased), of the third part; Martha Randell, of Number 10, Marine-square, Brighton, in the county of Sussex, Spinster, Mary Smith, of Number 28, New Steine, Brighton aforesaid, Widow, Ann Hammond, of Oxford-terrace, Hyde-park, in the said county of Middlesex, Widow, Elizabeth Randell, of Lee, Blackheath, in the county of Kent, Spinster, and Sarah Randell, of Number 28, New Steine, Brighton aforesaid, Spinster, of the fourth part; and us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the fifth part; the said several persons, parties to the said indenture, of the first, second, third, and fourth parts, did, under and in conformity with the powers and

trusts of the said will of John Randell aforesaid, probate whereof was granted on the twenty-first day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, to James Randell, William Randell, Charles Randell, and George Evans, grant, release, and confirm unto us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, our successors and assigns, for the permanent endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, certain pieces or parcels of land or ground situate in Maiden-lane, in the parish of Saint Mary, Islington, in the county of Middlesex, with the several messuages and buildings thereon, the particulars whereof are set forth in a schedule annexed to or forming part of the said indenture, and are likewise set forth in the first schedule hereunder written.

“And whereas the said pieces or parcels of land or ground, with the several messuages and buildings thereon, are subject to certain leases, the particulars of which are also set forth in the before-mentioned indenture, and in the first schedule hereunder written, as aforesaid, and the several rents or reservations payable under or in respect of the said leases amount to the annual sum of one hundred and ninety-eight pounds.

“And whereas a sum of fifty pounds per annum, part of the aforesaid sum of two hundred pounds per annum so provided as aforesaid by the said several persons, parties to the said indenture, of the first, second, third, and fourth parts, or some of them, for the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, was so provided upon the understanding that we should, in order to increasing the endowment of the said district, appropriate out of the Common Fund created by the firstly herein-named Act the capital sum of one thousand pounds, as hereinafter mentioned, for the benefit of the minister of the said district, when duly licensed, as before-mentioned, and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district and of the nomination of the minister thereto should be assigned in the manner hereinafter stated.

“Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of London, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Islington, which is described in the second schedule hereunder written, and which is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual pur-

poses, and that the same shall be named ‘The District of Saint Michael, Islington.’

“And we further recommend and propose, that the said pieces or parcels of land or ground, with the several messuages and buildings thereon, situate in Maiden-lane aforesaid, and subject to the leases thereof hereinbefore mentioned, together with the rents or reservations payable under or in respect of such leases, so granted, released, and confirmed unto us and our successors and assigns as aforesaid, and all our estate and interest therein respectively, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, become and be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the minister of the district so recommended to be constituted, so soon as one shall be appointed and licensed in accordance with the provisions of the herein secondly named Act, and in his successors, ministers of the same district.

“And we further recommend and propose, that we may be authorised and empowered to appropriate out of the Common Fund created by the firstly herein-mentioned Act as aforesaid, a capital sum of one thousand pounds, for the benefit of the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed, according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, and that such capital sum, or any part thereof, may be paid or applied by us towards the purchase or acquisition, for the endowment of such district, of any land, tithe, or other hereditament which may appear to us to be suitable for annexation thereto; and that in the meantime there shall be allowed and paid by us, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of the said district, when duly licensed as aforesaid, in respect of such capital sum, or such part thereof as shall remain from time to time unapplied towards such purposes as aforesaid, the annual sum of thirty-three pounds six shillings and eightpence, or such a part thereof as shall bear the same proportion to the whole of such annual sum as the part of the said capital sum so remaining unapplied as aforesaid bears to the amount of the whole of such capital sum.

“And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to, and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Susan Shaw during her life, and that from and after her decease the said right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, shall be assigned to, and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised jointly by, the said trustees of the said will of the said John Randell, deceased, their heirs and assigns, upon the trusts and for the purposes of his said will.

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a scheme, bearing date the tenth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Middlesbrough, in the county of York and in the diocese of York.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Middlesbrough hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any

consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship) should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas a sum of three thousand pounds sterling has been contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England by certain persons, to be applied in and towards the provision of a church for the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted.

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that in consideration of the contribution and payment to us of the said sum of three thousand pounds as aforesaid, the whole right of patronage of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, should be assigned as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Middlesbrough which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, be constituted and become and be a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint John the Evangelist, Middlesbrough.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us in each and every year to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, the sum of two hundred pounds, and that so soon as a church shall have been erected within such district, and shall have been approved by us and consecrated as the church of such district, and for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the further sum of one hundred pounds, making in the whole the sum of three hundred pounds, and that the said sums of two hundred pounds, or three hundred pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof,

shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of the consecration of such church as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or, instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and so soon as the same shall become a new parish as aforesaid, then of the said new parish, and of the nomination or appointment of the minister or perpetual curate thereto, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said William, Archbishop of York, and his successors, Archbishops of York for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of St. John the Evangelist, Middlesbrough, being:—

"All that the greater part of the parish of Middlesbrough, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York, which consists of those several portions of such parish which are situate wholly without that other part of the same parish which contains the parish church of St. Hilda, and which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing on the municipal boundary of the borough of Middlesbrough, at a point in the middle of the western end of Bridge-street West, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said street to the point where it is intersected by the road leading through Queen's-square, otherwise called Queen's-terrace, and extending thence northward along the middle of such road and across Gosford-street to a point in the middle of the south-western end of Cleveland-street, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named street, and across East-street, to a point in the middle of the south-western end of Durham-street, and continuing thence still north-eastward along the middle of the last-named street, and across Commercial-street, to a point in the middle of the south-western end of the road leading to the Ferry Landing, and continuing thence in the same direction along the middle of the last-

described road to its north-eastern extremity, and continuing thence in the same direction, and in a straight line across Middlesbrough Harbour to a point on the said municipal boundary of the borough of Middlesbrough in the mid-channel of the River Tees, and extending thence north-westward along the said municipal boundary following the mid-channel of the River Tees aforesaid as far as the point where such boundary diverges therefrom, and continuing thence first south-westward, and then south-eastward, and then again south-westward along the same boundary, passing to the west of Port Darlington, and crossing the Old Middlesbrough branch line of the Stockton and Darlington Railway, to the junction of the said municipal boundary with the boundary dividing the said parish of Middlesbrough from a certain detached portion of the parish of West Acklam, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and continuing thence still south-westward along the last-described parish boundary to the point where it rejoins the municipal boundary aforesaid, and continuing thence in the same direction along the said municipal boundary as far as the first-described point in the middle of the western end of Bridge-street West, where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas, a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act, been transmitted to the incumbent, and to the patron of the said parish of Middlesbrough, out of which it is intended that the district in such scheme recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and certain observations and objections which have been offered and taken by the incumbent of the said parish have been laid before Her Majesty in Council, together with the said scheme.

And whereas, the said scheme has, notwithstanding such observations and objections, been approved by Her Majesty in Council, now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has made representations, stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials shall be discontinued therein:
