Oxford, Saint Clement Rectory.

KNOW all men, that we, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, having, in pursuance of an Order of the Right Honourable Richard, Baron Westbury, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, made under and by virtue of the power for that purpose given to him by the "Lord Chancellor's Augmentation Act," 1863, received a sum of four hundred pounds (being a portion not exceeding one-half of the purchase money paid into the Bank of England as the consideration for the sale and conveyance by the said Lord Chancellor, under the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Act, of the advowson of the rectory of Saint Clement, Oxford, in the county of Oxford, and in the diocese of Oxford), and having been required by the said Order to grant such annuity as is hereinafter mentioned in immediate augmentation of the said living, and to charge the same in manner hereinafter set forth, do hereby, for and in consideration and in respect of the said sum of four hundred pounds so received by us as aforesaid, grant unto the Reverend John Thomson Darby, the Incumbent of the said rectory of Saint Clement, Oxford, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and his successors incumbents of the same rectory, for ever, one annuity or yearly sum of fourteen pounds,
