Any Lady who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a

letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Princess.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing Rooms, except in attendance upon the Ladies of their families.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to; which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

#### PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and twenty four, sections two, three, four, and seven; duly prepared, and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, sections two, three, four, and seven; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for assigning certain lands and hereditaments as the endowment of the See of Lincoln.

"Whereas the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lincoln, succeeded to the See of Lincoln on an

avoidance, which happened before the passing of the hereinbefore-mentioned Act, and is in receipt of the amount named by Act of Parliament as the income of the Bishop of Lincoln, videlicet, five thousand pounds per annum; and the said John, Bishop of Lincoln, has signified to us his willingness to accept an endowment for his See, in lands and hereditaments in lieu of his said income, and that the arrangement hereinafter set forth should be made for that purpose.

"And whereas the lands and hereditaments specified and described in the first part of the schedule hereto annexed, now belong to, and are vested in, the said Bishop and his successors in the said See, and the lands and hereditaments specified and described in the second part of the same schedule are now vested in us, and the lands and hereditaments so specified in the said two parts of the schedule aforesaid are together, in the opinion of our Estates Committee, convenient to be held as the endowment of the said See of Lincoln, and are calculated to secure to the holder thereof as nearly as may be (after deducting costs of management) a net annual income of five thousand pounds, and no more.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said John, Bishop of Lincoln, testified by his having signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal, we humbly recommend and propose that upon the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published Order, the lands, tenements, and hereditaments particularly described in the first part of the schedule hereunto annexed, with their appurtenances, shall be assigned and remain as a part endowment for the said See of Lincoln, absolutely freed and discharged from all right, title, interest, claim, or demand of or from us other than such as is created or allowed by the said Act; and that the lands and hereditaments specified and described in the second part of the said schedule hereto annexed, with all our right, title, estate, and interest therein, and in any tithes, or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, arising thereout or charged thereupon, and the benefit of the perpetual land-tax (if any) charged upon the same premises shall be assigned as a further endowment of the said See of Lincoln, and shall as from the twenty-fifth day of March last become and be absolutely vested in the said Bishop as an endowment for his See, as contemplated by the said Act, subject always and nevertheless to the liabilities and charges to which the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments are now specifically liable, to the end that all the lands, hereditaments, and emoluments of or belonging to the said See of Lincoln, except such as are so specified and described in the said two parts of the schedule aforesaid, and except also all rights of patronage and presentation, and the residence of the Bishop may become vested absolutely in us, under and by virtue and subject to the provisions of the said hereinbefore-mentioned Act.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The **QUEEN's** Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS a certain Order in Council was made on the 7th day of April, in the present year, under the provisions of an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for the appointment of convenient places for holding of Assizes in England and Wales:" and whereas Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, has thought fit to revoke the said Order, and to give other directions in lieu thereof; and whereas by the said Act of Parliament it was (amongst other things) declared and enacted that His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Most Honourable Privy Council, should have power from time to time to order and direct at what place or places in any county in England or Wales the Assizes and Sessions under the Commissions of Gaol Delivery and other commissions for the dispatch of civil and criminal business should be holden, and to order and direct such assizes and sessions for the dispatch of civil and criminal business to be holden at more than one place in the same county on the circuit; and to order and direct the assizes and sessions under such commissions for the dispatch of criminal business to be holden for the whole county at one place, and for the dispatch of civil business at one or more places in such county on the same circuit; and further to order and direct any special Commissions of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery to be holden at any one or more places in such county; and it was also further declared and enacted, that in case His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Most Honourable Council, should think fit to order and direct that the assizes or any such special commissions should be holden at more than one place in any one county, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, to divide any such county for the purposes of the said Act, and to make rules and regulations touching the venue in all cases, civil and criminal, then pending or thereafter to be pending, and to be tried within any division of such county, so to be made as aforesaid, and touching the liability and attendance of jurors, whether grand jurors, special jurors, or common jurors, at the assizes and sessions as aforesaid, or at any sessions under any special commissions to be holden within any such division, and touching the use of any house of correction or prison as a common gaol, and the government and keeping thereof, and touching the alterations of any commissions, writs, precepts, or other proceedings whatsoever, for carrying into effect the purposes of that Act, and touching any other matters that might be requisite for carrying into effect the purposes of that Act, and all such rules and regulations should be of the like force and effect as if the same had been made by the authority of Parliament, and should be notified in the London Gazette, or in such other manner as His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Most Honourable Privy Council, should think fit to direct:

And whereas divers petitions have been presented to Her Most Excellent Majesty the Queen, praying for the holding of the Assizes for the county palatine of Lancaster at Manchester, as well as at Liverpool and Lancaster: And whereas it is certified that proper courts and lodgings for Her Majesty's Judges have been prepared at Manchester: And whereas it will be very beneficial

and convenient to a great portion of the inhabitants of the said county palatine, and highly conducive to the proper administration of civil and criminal justice, if the assizes and sessions holden in the said county palatine, under commissions of gaol delivery and other commissions for the dispatch of civil and criminal business, should be holden at Manchester as well as at Lancaster and Liverpool:

It is therefore ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council, as follows (that is to say):

I. The said Order in Council of the 7th day of April last, shall be and the same is hereby revoked and made void.

II. The Assizes and Sessions holden under Commissions of Gaol Delivery and other commissions for the dispatch of civil and criminal business for the county palatine of Lancaster, heretofore holden at Lancaster and at Liverpool, shall hereafter be holden on the same circuit, at Lancaster, Liverpool, and Manchester, in the said county palatine.

III. The said county palatine shall be divided, for the purposes of carrying the said Act of Parliament and this order into execution, into three divisions, which shall respectively be called the "Northern Division," the "West Derby Division," and the "Salford Division."

IV. The said Northern Division shall be and remain the same which was constituted by an Order in Council, bearing date the 24th day of June, 1835, made in pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, that is to say, the same shall include and consist of the whole of the hundreds of Lonsdale, Amounderness, Leyland, and Blackburn; the said West Derby Division shall include and consist of the whole of the hundred of West Derby; and the said Salford Division shall include and consist of the whole of the hundred of Salford.

V. The House of Correction at Salford, in the hundred of Salford, shall and may be used, in manner hereinafter mentioned, as a common gaol, for the purposes of carrying the said Act of Parliament and this Order into effect; and any Justice or Justices of the Peace, or Coroner, for the said county palatine, or for any liberty therein, may commit to the said house of correction any person duly charged with any offence triable at the assizes; and from and after the opening of the Court at Manchester aforesaid all prisoners in the said house of correction, committed for trial at the assizes, shall be in and under the government, custody, and charge of the Sheriff of the said county palatine of Lancaster, and the prisoners who may be removed, pursuant to the direction hereinafter given, from the House of Correction at Kirkdale, for trial at the assizes to be holden at Manchester, shall also be kept by the said Sheriff in the said House of Correction at Salford, and all such prisoners so committed or removed as aforesaid shall continue in and under the government, custody, and charge of the said Sheriff, in the said house of correction, until the execution of their respective sentences, or until they shall be delivered from thence into the custody in which they ought by virtue of their respective sentences to be delivered, or shall be delivered by due course of law; and the Governor or keeper of the said House of Correction at Salford shall from time to time transmit to the said Sheriff or his deputy, seven days at least before the commission day of the assizes to be holden at Manchester, a list of the prisoners committed to such assizes for trial, or awaiting their trial at such assizes, together with a statement of their several offences, in order to enable him, the said Sheriff, to prepare a proper

calendar of such prisoners, which he, the said Sheriff, is hereby required to do.

VI. In all cases of commitment for trial, or of recognizances to appear and prosecute, or give evidence or answer at the assizes, for any offence supposed to have been committed in the said Northern Division, such commitment shall be to the Castle of Lancaster, and the recognizances shall be taken to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer at the Assizes at Lancaster as heretofore; and for any offence supposed to have been committed in the said West Derby Division, the commitment shall be to the House of Correction at Kirkdale, and the recognizances shall be taken to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer at the Assizes at Liverpool; and for any offence supposed to have been committed in the said Salford Division, the commitment shall be to the House of Correction at Salford aforesaid, and the recognizances shall be taken to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer at the Assizes at Manchester, unless the Justice or Justices of the Peace, making any such commitment or taking such recognizances, shall, under the special circumstances of the case, think fit to make such commitment for trial, or recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer at the Assizes to be holden in either of the said divisions, other than that in which the offence shall be supposed to have been committed, in which case such commitment shall be made and recognizances taken, and such trial shall take place accordingly.

VII. All prisoners now or hereafter in custody in the House of Correction at Kirkdale, for trial at the next ensuing Assizes to be holden at Liverpool after the date of this Order, for offences appearing by their respective commitments to have been committed within the said Salford Division (other than such prisoners (if any) as may have been committed by any justice or justices in such special case as aforesaid, or as may have been removed to the said House of Correction at Kirkdale, from the said House of Correction at Salford, by the order of a court or judge as hereinafter provided for), shall be removed by the Sheriff of the said county palatine, to the said House of Correction at Salford, for trial at the said next Assizes to be holden at Manchester and shall be tried there; and the said Sheriff shall ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the commission at the said next Assizes at Manchester, cause to be inserted in one or more of the newspapers published in the said county, a list of the names of the prisoners so removed (so far as the same list can then be made out), with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, together with a notice that all persons bound by recognizance to appear and prosecute or give evidence against such prisoners so removed, shall appear and give evidence at the said next Assizes to be holden at Manchester, and the persons so bound shall so appear and prosecute, and give evidence accordingly; and all prisoners who shall be in custody for trial at the Assizes in the said House of Correction at Salford, shall be tried at the Assizes holden at Manchester.

VIII. All indictments for offences triable at the Assizes, supposed to have been committed in the said Northern Division of the said county palatine, shall be preferred to the grand jury for the said county at Lancaster, and for such offences supposed to have been committed in the said West Derby Division of the said county, shall be preferred to the grand jury for the said county at Liverpool; and for such offences supposed to have been committed in the Salford Division of the said county, shall be preferred to the grand jury for the said county at Manchester, except in the cases of

persons committed or held to bail under the special circumstances hereinbefore mentioned, or removed for trial by order of a court or judge as hereinafter provided, in which cases indictments shall be preferred to the grand jury at Lancaster, Liverpool, or Manchester, to or at whichever of the said places such persons shall be committed, or held to bail to appear; and all issues arising upon or out of any such indictment shall be tried at whichever of the said places the same shall have been preferred: Provided that issues now joined, or hereafter to be joined, or any indictments already found at the Assizes, shall be tried at the Assizes holden at Lancaster or Liverpool, as the case may be.

IX. Any person, not in custody, against whom any Bill of Indictment shall hereafter be found at the Assizes at Lancaster, shall, if committed, be committed to the Castle of Lancaster, for trial at the Assizes to be holden at Lancaster, or in case such bill of indictment be found at the Assizes at Liverpool, such person shall be committed to the said House of Correction at Kirkdale, for trial at the Assizes to be holden at Liverpool, or in case such bill of indictment be found at the Assizes at Manchester, such person shall be committed to the said House of Correction at Salford, for trial at the Assizes to be holden at Manchester.

X. The Sheriff of the said county palatine, or his deputy, and the Clerk of the Crown for the said county palatine, or his deputy, shall attend at the Assizes at Manchester, as well as at Lancaster and Liverpool; and all Justices of the Peace and Coroners, bound by law to attend at the assizes, shall attend at the said Assizes at Lancaster, Liverpool, or Manchester, according as their usual place of residence may be in the said Northern Division, or in the said West Derby Division, or in the said Salford Division, respectively; and such Justices and Coroners as have no residence in any of the said divisions, may attend at any of the said places which shall be nearest to their usual place of residence; and all the Mayors, Stewards, and Bailiffs of liberties, hundreds and wapentakes in the said Northern Division shall attend at the Assizes at Lancaster, in the West Derby Division at the Assizes at Liverpool, and in the Salford Division at the Assizes at Manchester: And every such Justice of the Peace and Coroner shall certify his examinations, informations, inquisitions, bailments, and recognizances in respect of offences which, according to this Order, are to be tried at the Assizes at Lancaster, to the Clerk of the Crown, before or at the opening of the Court at Lancaster; and in respect of offences which are to be tried at Liverpool, before or at the opening of the Court at Liverpool; and in respect of offences which are to be tried at Manchester, before or at the opening of the Court at Manchester.

XI. The Sheriffs of the said county palatine shall summon a grand jury for the body of the said county, which shall attend at the Assizes at Lancaster, and shall be sworn for the body of the whole county, as heretofore; and another grand jury, which shall attend at the Assizes at Liverpool, and be sworn in like manner; and another grand jury, which shall attend at the Assizes at Manchester, and be sworn in like manner; which said several grand juries may consist in whole, or in part, of the same persons, and may consist altogether of several persons.

XII. The Precept issued by the Judges of Assize to the Sheriff of the said county palatine of Lancaster, or other Minister to whom belongs the return of the jurors for the trial of issues at the Assizes in and for the said county to summon jurors for the said Assizes for the trial of civil and criminal issues, and to summon special jurymen

to try the Special Jury Causes at such Assizes, pursuant to the provisions of the Common Law Procedure Act, 1852, shall direct the said Sheriff to summon such jurors and special jurymen respectively, to be and appear for the purposes aforesaid at the said Assizes at Lancaster, Liverpool, and Manchester respectively; and the said Sheriff or other Minister, shall accordingly summon a competent number of men named in the Jurors' Book, to serve on juries, indiscriminately, on the civil and criminal side, at the Assizes at Lancaster, so as such number be not less than 48 nor more than 72; and also a competent number of the like persons to serve on juries, indiscriminately as aforesaid at the Assizes at Liverpool, so as such number be not less than 48 nor more than 72; and also a competent number of like persons to serve on juries, indiscriminately as aforesaid, at the Assizes at Manchester, so as such number be not less than 48 nor more than 72: Provided that a Judge of any of Her Majesty's superior Courts at Westminster, or the Judges in the Commissions of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery for the said county, may, at any time, direct a greater or less number to be summoned in any of the said cases, on which such greater or less number shall be summoned accordingly. And the said Sheriff or other Minister shall also summon a sufficient number of Special Jurymen not exceeding 48 in all, to try the Special Jury Causes at each of the said Assizes at Lancaster, Liverpool, and Manchester respectively. And the Sheriff or other minister, in summoning such juries, to attend at the Assizes at Lancaster, Liverpool, or Manchester respectively, shall have regard to the convenience of such jurors, as to their respective places of residence.

XIII. Every person who shall have served as Jurors at any of the said Assizes, shall have the like privilege and exemption, by virtue of the Act passed in the sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, for consolidating and amending the Laws relating to jurors and Juries, as if he had served at Assizes holden for the whole county; and all the powers and provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, and of "The Common Law Procedure Act, 1852," touching the summoning of juries, common and special, and the summoning of jurors to serve, indiscriminately, on the criminal and civil side, and, otherwise, shall be in force with respect to each of the said Assizes, to be holden at Lancaster, Liverpool, and Manchester respectively, as they were, before this Order, with respect to the Assizes holden at Lancaster and Liverpool.

XIV. Every declaration hereafter to be delivered or filed in any action in which the issue is intended to be tried at the Assizes for the county palatine of Lancaster, holden at Lancaster, Liverpool, or Manchester respectively, shall have in the margin, besides the ordinary venue, the words ["Northern Division"] or ["West Derby Division"] or ["Salford Division"] but no other alterations in the ordinary form of such declaration shall be necessary; and issues arising in such actions, if tried at the Assizes, shall accordingly be tried at the Assizes, holden at Lancaster, Liverpool, and Manchester respectively. Provided, that in all cases of civil actions in which the venue is by law local, the issues therein shall be tried at Lancaster, in cases where the cause of action shall have arisen in the Northern Division, and at Liverpool, where the cause of action shall have arisen in the West Derby Division, and at Manchester, where the cause of action shall have arisen in the Salford Division, in like manner as if the said three divisions were three separate counties: Provided, nevertheless, that it shall be lawful for the Court in which any such issue is joined, or for any Judge

of any of the superior Courts at Westminster, if they or he shall think fit, to order such issues to be tried at the Assizes holden in either of the said divisions in which the cause of action did not arise, and also to order the words in the margin of the declaration to be amended in any other cases so as to cause the trial to take place at the Assizes holden in another division: But in all cases of issues already joined, in which the venue is laid in the county of Lancaster (Northern Division), or in the said county (Southern Division), such issues shall be tried at the Assizes at Lancaster or Liverpool, as the case may be, unless the Court in which the action shall have been commenced, or a Judge of any of the superior Courts at Westminster, shall otherwise order, by directing the proper words to be inserted in the margin of the declaration or otherwise, as they or he shall think fit.

XV. In all cases of indictments removed into Her Majesty's Court of Queen's Bench at Westminster, by certiorari, and in all cases of informations triable at the Assizes, for offences alleged to have been committed, or matters alleged to have arisen in the said county palatine, the trial of any issue or issues arising therein, shall take place at the Assizes at Lancaster, unless (in the case of indictments) the said Court of Queen's Bench, or any Judge thereof, or any Judge of the Court of Common Pleas at Lancaster, or (in the case of informations) the Court, in which the information shall be filed, shall otherwise order.

XVI. Her Majesty's Court of Queen's Bench or any Judge thereof, or any Judge of any of the superior Courts at Westminster, being a Commissioner of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery for the said county palatine, shall and may, if such Court or Judge shall think fit, order and direct that the issue or issues upon any indictment found by any of the said grand juries at Lancaster, Liverpool, and Manchester respectively, shall be tried at any Assizes to be holden for any of the said three divisions, and order and direct any prisoner in custody for trial at the Assizes, in the said Castle of Lancaster, or in the said House of Correction at Kirkdale, or in the said House of Correction at Salford, to be removed to take his trial accordingly, and shall issue a writ of habeas corpus for such removal.

XVII. Every recognizance which shall be entered into to appear and prosecute or give evidence, or to appear and answer, as the case may be, at the Assizes to be holden at Lancaster, Liverpool, or Manchester, shall, in case such Order shall have been made as last aforesaid, be obligatory on the parties bound by such recognizance to appear and prosecute or give evidence, or to appear and answer, as the case may be, and to do all the things therein mentioned at the Assizes at which, by such Order, the trial is to take place, in like manner as if such recognizance had been originally entered into for appearing and prosecuting, or giving evidence, or for appearing and answering, or doing such other things at the last-mentioned Assizes: Provided that one week's notice shall have been given, either by serving the same personally upon the parties bound by such recognizance, or by leaving the same at the place of residence as of which such parties are described in the recognizance, to appear at such last-mentioned Assizes: Provided also that the Court or Judge making such Order for trial and removal as aforesaid, shall cause the party applying for such Order, whether he be the prosecutor or the party charged, to enter into a recognizance in such sum, and with or without sureties, as such Court or Judge may direct, conditioned to give such notice as aforesaid to the parties bound by such recognizances, to appear at

the Assizes at which the trial shall be ordered to take place as aforesaid.

XVIII. Nothing in this Order contained shall extend to issues upon indictments or other proceedings removed into the Court of Pleas of the Crown of Lancaster, which shall be tried at the Assizes holden at Lancaster as heretofore.

XIX. Nothing in this Order contained shall extend to prevent the Commissioners of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery, or Justices of the Common Pleas within the said county, or the grand or petty juries sitting at Lancaster, Liverpool, or Manchester, from having and exercising, at any of the said places, such jurisdiction as now belongs to them respectively by law over the whole county.

XX. So much of the said Order in Council of the 24th day of June, 1835, as is repugnant to or inconsistent with this Order shall be and is hereby repealed, annulled, and made void.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned, from the time specified in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said burial-grounds be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such burial-grounds be postponed as follows; viz.:

In the churchyard of Egremont, Cumberland, from the first of May to the twentieth of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

In the burial-grounds of the Grosvenor-street Chapel, Stalybridge, and the Methodist New Connexion Chapel, Dukinfield, from the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, to the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, provided that burials, in both these grounds, be conducted in accordance with the regulations contained in the Order in Council of the twenty-fourth

of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and that in the latter case no new graves be opened in the north-west compartment of the ground, nor within eighteen feet of the north-east portion of the boundary.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the seventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, it was directed that burials should be discontinued "with the exception of now existing family vaults and graves, in all that part of the churchyard of East Barnet which lies to the south of a line drawn along the south side of the church;" and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty that the said Order be varied: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to vary the said Order as follows; viz.:-to order that, with the exception of now existing family vaults and graves, no burials take place in the churchyard of East Barnet within twenty feet of Church Farm Industrial School.

#### TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage" certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, or in respect of letters, newspapers, Parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post.

And whereas by the said Act powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time and at any time thereafter by Warrant under their hands to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or Inland postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time by Warrant as aforesaid to alter or repeal any of such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time by Warrant as aforesaid to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid, and the power thereby given to alter and fix rates of postage is extended to any increase or reduction or remission of postage.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by an Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An

Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office."

And whereas it is expedient that packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, colonial, or foreign, should be transmitted by the post between Egypt and the East Indies, Ceylon, Mauritius, Labuan, China, Hong Kong, Australia, and New Zealand, by British packet boat, and that certain rates should be fixed and regulations made for that purpose, in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury in exercise of the powers or authority in us for that purpose vested in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners (by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided) order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. On every packet consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, colonial, or foreign, not exceeding four ounces in weight, transmitted by the post between Egypt and any port in the East Indies, Ceylon, Mauritius, Labuan, China, Hong Kong, New South Wales, Queensland, South Australia, Tasmania, Victoria, Western Australia, or New Zealand, direct by British packet boat, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, a British rate of postage of fourpence.

2. All such respective packets as hereinbefore in this Warrant mentioned, if exceeding four ounces in weight, shall be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned and set forth (that is to say):—

On every such packet if exceeding four ounces and not exceeding one half of a pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two rates of postage;

And on every such packet if exceeding one half of a pound and not exceeding one pound in weight, four rates of postage;

And on every such packet if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and one half of another pound in weight, six rates of postage;

And on every such packet if exceeding one pound and one half of another pound and not exceeding two pounds in weight, eight rates of postage;

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

3. Every packet transmitted by the post under this Warrant shall be subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter contained (that is to say):—

No such packet, which in length or breadth or width shall exceed the dimensions of two feet, shall be forwarded by the post under the provisions aforesaid;

No such packet posted in Egypt addressed to the East Indies or New South Wales exceeding the weight of three pounds shall be forwarded by the post under the provisions aforesaid.

The terms "Books, Publications, or Works of Literature or Art" in this Warrant used, shall for the purposes of this Warrant mean and comprise all such articles as in their general character are either literary, or consist of printed, written, engraved, or lithographed matter (although not strictly literary) including books (whether printed, written, or plain), publications or compilations (whether in print or in manuscript), almanacks, printed or lithographed, letters and such artistic productions as prints, maps (whether on paper or canvas, or cloth, and whether printed or written), and photographs, when not on glass or in frames containing glass, and any description of paper, parchment, or vellum (whether printed, lithographed, written upon or plain, or any mixture of the four), together with any binding, mounting, or covering of or upon or belonging to any such article or production or any portion thereof, or of or belonging to any paper, parchment, or vellum, and including also any cases or rollers of prints or maps, book-markers (whether of paper or otherwise), pencils, pens, or other thing usually appertaining to any such article or production, paper, parchment, or vellum, or necessary for its safe transmission, which shall be sent in the same packet with any such article or production to which they or it shall belong: And all letters, notices, and other communications (whether upon paper, parchment, or vellum); partly printed or partly lithographed and partly written, which, if wholly written, would not be considered letters or communications in the nature of letters: Provided, nevertheless, that nothing herein contained shall extend to authorize the sending by the post under the provisions of this Warrant of any letter, notice, or other communication (whether upon paper, parchment, or vellum), partly printed or partly lithographed, and partly written which, if wholly written would be considered a letter or communication in the nature of a letter, nor of any packet consisting of or containing any photographs, drawings, prints, or other contents which may be obviously of an obscene character, nor of any packet comprising prints or printed matter, unless such prints or printed matter shall consist only of prints or printed matter on paper, parchment, or vellum.

Every packet transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant shall be sent open at the ends or sides, and either without a cover or in a cover or envelope open at the ends or sides, and there shall be no written letter either closed or open, nor any written communication in the nature of a letter either closed or open (whether such letter or communication be addressed to or intended for the person to whom the packet shall be directed, or any other person), nor any inclosure, sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other inclosure not authorized by this Warrant, sent in or with any such packet, nor shall there be any written letter, or any written communication in the nature of a letter, in or upon any such packet, or on the cover or envelope thereof.

4. Upon every packet transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted, either in money, or by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed, or appear on the outside of every such packet near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon, under or by virtue of this Warrant.

5. In order to prevent any obstacles to the due and regular transmission of letters by the post, any officer of the Post-Office may delay the transmission of any packet posted or forwarded by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, either for the space of twenty-four hours after the time at which the same ought to be despatched in due course of the post or (at his option) until the despatch of the mail next after that by which the same ought, in due course of the post, to be forwarded by him.

6. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant shall be sent otherwise than in conformity with the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinbefore in the 3rd clause of this Warrant contained every such packet shall, and may be detained and opened, and at the option of the Postmaster-General shall (except in the cases provided for by the clause next hereinafter contained) be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed or be forwarded to the place of its destination, and every such packet on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall, at the option of the Postmaster-General, be either free of postage, or be charged with any rate of postage he may think fit, not exceeding the postage to which it would have been liable as a letter, and such postage shall be either paid by the sender, or by the person to whom the packet shall be forwarded.

7. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall contain any written letter, or any written communication, in the nature of a letter, whether closed or open, or any inclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any other inclosure not authorized by this Warrant, every such letter or communication or inclosure may be taken out by any officer of the Post-Office, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be forwarded to the address on the packet charged in either case, not only with the full rates of postage as an unpaid letter, but also with a further and additional rate of postage equal in amount to the single rate of postage chargeable under the provisions of this Warrant, on a packet not exceeding four ounces in weight, and the remainder of the packet, if the postage be duly paid when posted, may be forwarded to the place of its address without any extra charge.

8. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant shall be posted without any postage having been paid thereon, or without having thereon, or affixed thereto, any postage stamp, or with a postage paid thereon, or postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which shall represent a less amount than the postage chargeable under this Warrant, every such packet shall, and may be detained and opened, and shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof.

9. The term "East Indies" used in this Warrant shall be construed to mean every port or

place in Her Majesty's dominions in Asia (Hong Kong, Ceylon, Mauritius, Labuan, and Australia excepted), and the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.

10. In all cases in which any questions shall hereafter arise whether any article, matter, or thing transmitted by the post under this Warrant is entitled to the book post privilege, and to be so transmitted within the intent and meaning of this Warrant, such question shall be referred to the determination of the Postmaster-General, whose decision thereupon shall be final.

11. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may by Warrant under their hands or the hands of any two of them at any time hereafter alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed or altered, or any of the orders, directions, regulations, and conditions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, directions, regulations, and conditions in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

12. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.
