E ARL RUSSELL, K.G., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received the following Despatch from the Honourable Charles Augustus Murray, C.B., Her Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Dresden:

Mr Lord, Dresden, June 2, 1864.

I HAVE the honour to inform your Lordship that great and continually recurring inconvenience is experienced at this mission from the number of travellers, claiming (I do not say falsely) to be British subjects, who apply here for passports, but who are entirely unprovided with any proof whatever of their nationality, beyond their own

This is, I believe, chiefly caused by an idea prevalent in England, that in Germany generally, but at any rate in Saxony, passports are not required. This is true, so far as relates to passing through the country; but the police regulations prohibit any residence, or even a short stay, in Dresden, unless a passport be deposited at the police office.

Again, many travellers go to Austria viâ Dresden, and, if unprovided with passports, are invariably turned back at Bodenbach, the frontier station of Bohemia. They are then forced to return to Dresden, and apply to me for passports; and frequently, having no proof whatever to offer that they are not Americans, or other than British subjects, are detained here until the necessary proofs can be sent from England.

As the time is now approaching when the usual influx of British travellers may be expected, I would venture to suggest to your Lordship that much inconvenience would be spared to travellers, as well as to Her Majesty's missions, if the advisability, if not absolute necessity, of all persons providing themselves with passports before going to Germany were made known to the public through the Foreign Office.

NOTICE, under the Passengers' Act, 1855, reducing the declared length of Voyage to North America, for certain Passenger Steam Ships.

WHEREAS by the thirtieth section of "The Passengers' Act, 1855," it is enacted that, for the purposes of the Act, the length of voyage for a passenger ship proceeding from the United Kingdom to the several places therein mentioned shall be determined by a scale therein set forth, and that, for the like purposes, the Emigration Commissioners, acting by and under the authority of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by notice in writing issued under the hands of any two of such Commissioners, and published in the London Gazette, may nevertheless declare what shall be deemed to be the length of voyage from the United Kingdom to any of such places, or to any other place whatsoever, and may fix such different lengths of voyage as they may think reasonable for different descriptions of vessels.

And whereas in the scale set forth in the said Act, the length of voyage from the United Kingdom to North America (except the West Coast thereof) is declared to be, for ships propelled, either wholly or in aid of sails, by steam engines of not less power than sufficient, without the aid of sails, to propel the ship after the rate of five statute miles an hour, forty days if the ship clears out between the sixteenth day of January and the

fourteenth day of October, both days inclusive, and forty-five days if the ship clears out between the fifteenth day of October and the seventeenth day of January, both days inclusive.

And whereas it is expedient to reduce the length of voyage to North America, as regards passenger ships propelled by steam engines at a rate of not

less than ten statute miles an hour.

Now therefore, in exercise of the power thus vested in us, we, the undersigned, being Her Majesty's Emigration Commissioners, having obtained the requisite authority in that behalf of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, do, by this notice, declare that the length of voyage from the United Kingdom to North America (except the West Coast thereof) shall, for the purposes of the said Passengers' Act, 1855, be as follows; that is to say:—For passenger ships propelled by steam engines of sufficient power to propel the ship without the aid of sails at the rate of not less than ten statute miles an hour, if the ship clears out between the sixteenth day of January and the fourteenth day of October, both days inclusive, thirty-two days; and if the ship clears out between the fifteenth day of October and the fifteenth day of January, both days inclusive, thirty-seven days

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 23.)—MEDITERRANEAN—EAST COAST OF SICILY.

Fixed Light on Massa Point, Syracuse.

THE Minister of Marine at Turin has given notice, that on and after the 15th day of June, 1864, a light will be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Massa point, at the south side of entrance to the harbour of Syracuse.

The light will be a fixed white light, at an elevation of 125 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a

distance of 3 miles.

The tower is white, 46 feet high, and stands on a quadrangular base, S.S.E. 2 E., distant 71 cables from the lighthouse in the fort at the opposite side of the entrance to the harbour. The lat. is 37° 2′ 20" N., long. 15° 16′ 21" East of Greenwich.

Red Light at Catania.

Also, that on and after the 15th day of June, 1864, a fixed red light will be substituted for the present harbour light at the extremity of the mole at Catania. The light will be at an elevation of 22 feet above the sea, and should be visible at a distance of 2 miles.

GULF OF NAPLES.

Bell Buoy on Cavallara Shoal.

Also, that on and after the 1st day of June, 1864, a Bell buoy will be placed on the Cavallara shoal, at about 24 cables from Cape Posilipo, at the western side of the Gulf of Naples. Vessels should give the buoy a good berth, to avoid also the shoals of Gajola.

Revolving Light on Soukhoum Point.

Information has been received at the Admiralty that a revolving light is exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Soukhoum point, near Soukhoum Kaleh, coast of Circassia. The point is low, and the tower 102 feet high, but no other particulars have been received.
