#### PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the better government of Her Majesty's subjects resorting to China," power was given to Her Majesty to authorise the Superintendent of the Trade of Her Majesty's subjects in China (so long as such Superintendent should be also the Governor of the island of Hong Kong) to enact, with the advice of the Legislative Council of the said island of Hong Kong, all such laws and ordinances as might from time to time be required for the peace, order, and good government of Her Majesty's subjects, being within the dominions of the Emperor of China, or being within any ship or vessel at a distance of not more than one hundred miles from the coast of China, and to enforce the execution of such laws and ordinances by such penalties and forfeitures as to him, by the advice aforesaid, should seem fit; and it was (amongst other things) enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty to disallow, in the whole or in part, any laws or ordinances so to be enacted as aforesaid, and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council to alter the same, or any of them, as to Her Majesty in Council should seem meet; and that it should also be lawful for Her Majesty. by any Order or Orders made, with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, to ordain for the government of Her Majesty's

vessel at a distance of not more than one hundred miles from the coast of China, any law or ordinance which to Her Majesty in Council might seem meet, as fully and effectually as any such law or ordinance could be made by Her Majesty in Council for the government of Her Majesty's subjects, being within the said island of Hong Kong;

And whereas under and by virtue of the said Act, and of a certain other Act passed in the same Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to remove doubts as to the exercise of power and jurisdiction by Her Majesty within divers countries and places out of Her Majesty's dominions, and to render the same more effectual," Her Majesty was pleased by an Order in Council bearing date the thirteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, to make provision for the good government of Her Majesty's subjects resorting to China, and for certain other purposes therein mentioned; and thereby (amongst other things) Her Majesty's Superintendent of British Trade in China, for the time being, was authorised and empowered to make and enforce, by fine and imprisonment, rules and regulations for the observance of the stipulations of treaties, and for the peace, order, and good government of Her Majesty's subjects, being within the dominions of the Emperor of China, or being within any British ship or vessel at a distance of not more than one hundred miles from the coast of China; And Her Majesty was thereby further pleased (among other things) to give authority to any of Her Majesty's Consuls within the dominions of the Emperor of China, to cause any British subject, who, after having been twice convicted of and punished for any crime or offence, should not be able to find good and sufficient security for his good behaviour, or who might be convicted before such Consul of any of certain particular crimes therein enumerated, to be sent out of the dominions of the Emperor of China, in the manner therein mentioned;

and it was (amongst other things) enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty to disallow, in the whole or in part, any laws or ordinances so to be enacted as aforesaid, and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council to alter the same, or any of them, as to Her Majesty in Council should seem meet; and that it should also be lawful for Her Majesty by any Order or Orders made, with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, to ordain for the government of Her Majesty's subjects, being within the dominions of the Emperor of China, or being within any ship or

and by virtue of the said Order now in recital, I tion against the said Emperor, in carrying on such afterwards to return to and again take up his abode within any part of the said dominions, without Her Majesty's permission, to be signified as therein mentioned; and any such person so returning to, and taking up his abode within any part of the said dominions, was thereby made punishable, by fine or imprisonment, and liable to be again sent out of the dominions of the Emperor of China, at any time afterwards, in default of finding good and sufficient security for his future good behaviour, in the manner therein particularly mentioned;

And whereas by a certain Ordinance made and passed on the seventeenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, by His Excellency Sir John Bowring, Kt., then Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the said Colony of Hong Kong and its dependencies, and Her Majesty's Plenipotentiary and Chief Superintendent of the Trade of British Subjects in China, with the advice of the Legislative Council of Hong Kong, it was enacted, that it should be a misdemeanour, punishable by not more than two years' imprisonment, or by a fine not exceeding five thousand dollars (such punishment to be accumulative or not, at the discretion of the adjudicating tribunal), for any British subject, within any part of China, to assist either the existing Chinese Government, or any or either of the different factions then engaged, or who might be thereafter engaged, in opposition to the Government, by personal enlistment in the service of either of the said several parties, or by procuring other persons to enlist in such service, or by furnishing, selling, or procuring warlike stores of any description, or by fitting out vessels, or by knowingly and purposely doing any other act to assist either party, by which neutrality might be violated; and that the tribunal for adjudicating on offences, of the description intended to be thereby dealt with, should consist of a Consular Officer in charge of a Consulate, and two Assessors of Her Majesty, resident within the Consulate;

And whereas it is expedient that the said Ordinance of the seventeenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, should be explained and amended, and that further provisions should be made to prevent the participation of British subjects within the dominions of the Emperor of China, in acts of war or rebellion against the authority of the said Emperor;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of all powers enabling Her in this behalf, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. Nothing in the said Ordinance made and passed on the seventeenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, shall extend or apply, or be deemed to have extended, or to have been applicable, to any British subject, who, at any time heretofore may have assisted, or may hereafter assist, the Government of the Emperor of China, by the means in the same Ordinance mentioned, or otherwise howsoever, by or under the leave or licence of Her Majesty, or by or under the authority of any Order of Her Majesty in Council, at any time heretofore made, or to be hereafter made.

2. If any subject of Her Majesty, within any part of the dominions of the Emperor of China, shall, at any time after the publication of this present Order, in Her Majesty's Colony of Hong Kong, levy war, or take part in any operations of war, against the Emperor of China, or aid or abet any persons who are or who may be engaged in carrying on war or rebellion or insurrec- l

war or rebellion, or insurrection, such person shall be liable to the several penalties mentioned in the said Ordinance of the seventeenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and shall further be liable to be sent out of the dominions of the Emperor of China; and, in case of his afterwards returning within the same, shall be liable to be proceeded against and punished, and to be again sent out of the said dominions, and so from time to time, in the same manner, in all respects, as is provided by the said Orders in Council of the thirteenth day of June, one thousand eight him died and fifty-three, and the twelfth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, respectively, concerning the persons liable to be sent out of the said dominions the ler those respective Orders.

3. Every person offending against this present Order may be proceeded against in the same manner, in all respects, as is provided by the said Order of the thirteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, concerning persons offending against any rules or regulations duly made, under and by virtue thereof, by Her Majesty's Superintendent of British Trade in China for the time being.

And the Right Honourable Earl Russell, and the Right Honourable Edward Cardwell, two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

#### PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Order of Her Majesty in Council, made on the tenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, by virtue of a certain Act of Parliament passed in the session holden in the third and fourth years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for the appointment of convenient " places for the holding of assizes in England and "Wales," it was, amongst other things, ordered that the assizes and sessions holden under commissions of gaol delivery and other commissions for the dispatch of civil and criminal business for the county of York, theretofore holden at York, should thereafter be holden on the same circuit at York and Leeds, in the said county, and that the said county should be divided, for the purposes of carrying the said Act and that Order into execution, into two divisions, which should respectively be called "the North and East Riding Division, and "the West Riding Division," and that the said "North and East Riding Division" should include and consist of the whole of the North and East Ridings of the said county; and the said "West Riding Division" should include and consist of the whole of the West Riding of the said county:

And whereas, by the fifth section of the said Order in Council, it is provided as follows:

"In all cases of commitment for trial, or of " recognizances to appear and prosecute, or give "evidence or answer at the assizes for any offence suffered to have been committed in the said "North and East Riding Division, such commit-

"recognizances shall be taken to appear and pro-" secute or give evidence or to appear and answer "at the assizes at York, as heretofore, and for any "offence suffered to have been committed in the said 'West Riding Division,' the commitment shall be to the borough gaol of Leeds, and the re-" cognizances shall be taken to appear and prose-"cute or give evidence, or to appear and answer, at "the assizes at Leeds, unless the Justice or Jus-"tices of the Peace, making any such commit-"ment or taking such recognizances, shall, under " the special circumstances of the case, think fit to " make such commitment for trial or recognizance " to appear and prosecute or to give evidence, or "to appear and answer, at the assizes to be " holden in either of the said Divisions, other than "that in which the offence shall be suffered to "have been committed, in which case such com-" mitment shall be made and recognizances taken, "and such trial shall take place accordingly: And whereas, under and by virtue of certain Orders duly made, pursuant to another Act passed in the session of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to "amend the law relating to the expences of pro-" secutions, and to make further provision for the "apprehension and trial of offenders, in certain "cases," three several gaols or houses of correction, at Northallerton, in the North Riding, at Beverley, in the East Riding, and at Wakefield, in the West Riding, of the said county of York, respectively, have been declared to be, and have been duly constituted, fit prisons for persons committed for trial at the assizes for the said county; and it is expedient to make further provision with respect to the commitment and trial of prisoners who have been, or may hereafter be, committed to the said three several gaols or houses of correction, respectively, and for that purpose to alter and amend the said fifth section of the said Order in Council of the tenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four:

It is therefore ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of all powers vested in Her Majesty by the said first recited Act of Parliament, or otherwise enabling Her Majesty in that behalf.

I. The said fifth section of the said Order in Council shall be amended and altered, and the same is hereby amended and altered as follows:-

"In all cases of commitment for trial, or of re-"cognizances to appear and prosecute, or give evidence or answer, at the assizes for any " offence supposed to have been committed in the "said 'North and East Riding Division,' such "commitment shall be either to the Castle of "York, or to the gaol or house of correction in "Northallerton, or to the gaol or house of correct " tion in Beverley, and the recognizances shall be "taken to appear and prosecute, or give evidence " or to appear and answer, at the assizes at York, " as heretofore, and for any offence supposed to "have been committed in the 'said West Riding "Division," the commitment shall be either to the " borough gaol in Leeds, or to the gaol or house "of correction in Wakefield; and the recogni-"zances shall be taken to appear and prosecute " or give evidence, or to appear and answer, "at the assizes at Leeds; unless the Justice " or Justices of the Peace, making any such "commitment, or taking such recognizance, shall, under the special circumstances of the "case, think fit to make such commitment for

"ments shall be to the Castle of York, and the I "or give evidence, or to appear and answer, at "the assizes to be holden in either of the said "Divisions other than that in which the offence "shall be supposed to have been committed, in "which case such commitment shall be made and "recognizances taken, and such trial shall take " place accordingly."

> II. All prisoners now or hereafter in custody in the said gaol or house of correction in Wakefield, for trial at the next ensuing assizes to be holden at York, after the date of this Order, for offences appearing by their respective commitments to have been committed within the said "West Riding Division" (other than such prisoners, if any, as may have been committed by any Justice or Justices in such special case as in the said fifth section aforesaid), shall be tried at the said next assizes to be holden at Leeds, and the Sheriff of the said county shall, ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the Commission at the said next assizes at Leeds, cause to be inserted in one or more of the newspapers published in the said county a list of the names of such prisoners who are to be tried at Leeds (so far as the same list can then be made out), with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, together with a notice that all persons bound by recognizance to appear and prosecute or give evidence against such prisoners, so to be tried at Leeds, shall appear and give evidence at the said next assizes to be holden at Leeds; and the persons so bound shall so appear and prosecute and give evidence accordingly; and all such prisoners, so to be tried at Leeds, shall be removed from the said Gaol or House of Correction to the said Borough Gaol at Leeds, for the purposes of such trial, and shall there be kept in custody, in the same manner, in all respects, as they would have been liable to be removed to and kept in custody at York, if this Order and the said Order of the tenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, had not been made.

> III. This Order and the said Order of the tenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, shall henceforth be in force and take effect, in the same manner, as if the fifth section of the said Order of the tenth day of June had been originally contained therein in the terms of the said fifth section, as hereby amended: and in all other respects, save as they are hereby amended and altered, the provisions of the said Order of the tenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, shall remain and be in full force and effect.

HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more " easy the taking the Poll at County Elections," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the Justices of any county, riding, parts, or division, in England or Wales, in Quarter Sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county, "trial or recognizance to appear and prosecute | riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying

that the place or places mentioned in the said ! petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the Justices of the Peace for the county, riding, parts, or division, in Quarter Sessions or some Special Sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and describe the divi-" sions of Counties, and the limits of Cities and "Boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as "respects the Election of Members to serve in "Parliament," shall, conformably to the said lastmentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place;

And whereas the Justices of the Peace of the North Riding of Yorkshire, in Quarter Sessions assembled, on the twenty-eighth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty four, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places at present existing in the North Riding of Yorkshire is insufficient, and praying that the town of Helmsley, in the said North Riding, should be made an additional polling place for the said

Riding;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said Petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that the said town of Helmsley shall be an additional polling place for the North Riding of Yorkshire; and that the Justices of the Peace of the said Riding, in Quarter Sessions, or some Special Sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act, passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such North Riding of Yorkshire into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

England, in pursuance of the Act of the fiftyninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Michael, situate in the parish of Tenterden, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Canterbury.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that
a district chapelry should be assigned to the said
church of Saint Michael, situate in the parish of

Tenterden aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honorable and Most Reverend Charles Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Tenterden, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Michael, Tenterden.

"And, with the like consent of the said Charles Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury (testified as aforesaid), we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the

time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Michael, Tenterden, being:-

"All that part of the parish of Tenterden, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Canterbury, which is situate to the north-east of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish from the parish of Woodchurch, in the same county and diocese, at the point where the turnpike - road leading from Woodchurch to Tenterden passes over Huntbourne Bridge; and extending thence, westward, along the middle of the said turnpike-road as far as a point near the bottom of Clay-hill, opposite to the middle of the southern end of a certain lane leading to Brissenden Farm; and extending thence, first northward, to and along the middle of the said lane, then north-westward and then northeastward along the middle of the same lane as far as a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'T. St. M. D. C., 1864, No. 1,' and placed on the western side of the said lane in the middle of the south-eastern end of the fence dividing the close numbered 1527 upon the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Tenterden and upon the map hereunto annexed, from the closes numbered respectively 1502 and 1501, upon the same maps; and extending thence north-westward, to such boundary stone, and continuing thence in the same direction along the middle of the said fence and of the fence dividing the close numbered 1528 upon the said maps, from the closes numbered respectively 1497 and 1498 upon the same maps, to the junction of the last-described fence with the

fence dividing the close numbered 1531 upon the said maps, from the said close numbered 1498 as aforesaid; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-described fence to its junction with the fence dividing the close numbered 1532 upon the said maps, from the closes numbered respectively 1495 and 1494, and the wood called Knock Wood, and numbered 1405 upon the same maps; and extending thence northwestward along the middle of the last-described fence to a point in the middle of a certain occupation road leading from Knock Farm, through Knock Wood, to Tenterden, such point being opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of the said fence; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said occupation road as far as a point in the middle of the fence dividing the said Knock Wood from the closes numbered respectively 1443, 1442, and 1441, upon the said maps; and extending thence alternately northwestward and north-eastward along the middle of the said fence and along the middle of the fence dividing the close numbered 1414, upon the said maps, from the close numbered 1441 as aforesaid, to a point in the middle of the lane leading from Knock Wood Farm, to Tenterden, opposite to the middle of the north-western end of the last-described fence; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-described lane for a distance of sixty-two yards or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the middle of the south-eastern end of a certain causeway which leads into the turnpikeroad leading from Tenterden to Ashford, and which passes between the closes and premises on the north numbered 1416, 1415, and 1429, upon the said maps, and the close and premises on the south numbered 1418, upon the same maps; and extending thence north-westward to and along the middle of the said causeway to its junction with the said turnpike-road, leading from Tenterden to Ashford; and extending thence in a direct line due west across such turnpike-road to a boundary stone inscribed 'T. St. M. D. C. 1864, No. 2, and placed on the western side of the same turnpike-road; and extending thence south-westward and in a direct line across the close numbered 649 upon the said maps to the point where the fence dividing such close from the close numbered 659 upon the said maps, joins the fence dividing the close numbered 659 as aforesaid, from the close numbered 647 upon the same maps; and extending thence first north-westward and then south-westward along the middle of the said last-described fence and along the middle of the fence dividing the close numbered 648 upon the said maps, from the said close numbered 647 upon the same maps, to the junction of the last-described fence with the fence dividing the wood called Home Wood, and numbered 634 upon the said maps, from the closes numbered respectively 647 as aforesaid, 646, and 635, upon the same maps; and continuing thence south-westward along the middle of the lastdescribed fence to a point in the middle of a certain stream which flows from Home Wood to Ashbourne Mill; and continuing thence first south-westward and then westward along the middle of the said stream to its junction near Brattle Watermill on the northern side of the road leading from Tenterden to Cranbrook, with the waste watercourse of the Mill-stream, which, flowing from Gribble-wood and through the ponds called respectively Great Mill Pond and Town Pond, supplies the said Brattle Watermill; and extending thence northward along the middle of the said waste watercourse to the southern end of Town Pond aforesaid; and extending thence

first westward and then northward along the southern and western margin of the said pond, to its northern extremity; and continuing thence still northward along the middle of the said Millstream, following thereby the western side of the closes numbered respectively 838 and 839 upon the said maps, and crossing under the road leading from Brown's-corner towards Cranbrook as far as a point in the middle of the same road; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said road as far as a point opposite to the middle of the southern end of the fence dividing the close numbered 843 upon the said maps, from the close numbered 1008 upon the same maps; and extending thence northward to and along the middle of the last-described fence, to its junction with the western side of Great Mill Pond aforesaid; and extending thence north-westward along the said western side of the last-named pond to its northern extremity; and continuing thence still north-westward along the middle of the said Mill-stream (passing the western side of Gribble Wood aforesaid), to the boundary which divides the said parish of Tenterden from the parish of Biddenden, in the county and diocese aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Canterbury.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twelfth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nine-teenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints, situate at Horton, in the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, situate at Horton aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, situate at Horton aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of All Saints, Horton.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon (testified as aforesaid), we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, buptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that so long as the Reverend John Burnet, the present vicar or in-cumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, shall remain such vicar or incumbent, all the said fees shall be paid by the minister of the same church to the said John Burnet.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of All Saints, Horton, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, which is comprised within, and is bounded by, an imaginary line, commencing at the point in the middle of Great Horton-road where the boundary which divides the same parish from the new parish of Saint John, Bradford, in the county and diocese aforesaid, is met by the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, from the consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew, Bradford, in the same county and diocese; and extending thence south-westwarg along the last - described boundary, followind thereby the middle of Great Horton-road aforesaid to the junction (at or near to Primrose hill) of such boundary with the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, from the district chapelry of Great Horton, some time part of the same parish; and continuing thence first southwestward along the last-described boundary, and then alternately south-eastward and south-westward along the same boundary to a boundary stone inscribed 'H. A. S. D. C., 1864,' and placed on the northern side of the footway leading from Great Horton to Little Horton-lane; and extending thence, first southward, to the middle of the said footway, and then, south-eastward, along the middle of the same footway to its junction

with Little Horton-lane aforesaid; and continuing thence, still south-eastward, across the said lane to a point in the middle of the western extremity of a certain road or street called Park-lane; and continuing thence, still south-eastward, along the middle of the said last-named road or street, as far as a point opposite to the middle of the northeastern extremity of Greaves-street; and extending thence, still south-eastward and in a direct line for a distance of two hundred and twenty yards or thereabouts (crossing Hutson-street), to the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, from the district chapelry of Saint Stephen, Bowling, some time part of the same parish, at a point on the western side of Manchester-road, near Albion Mill; and extending thence, first eastward, along the said boundary to the middle of the said road, and then, northeastward, along the middle of the same road as far as a point opposite to the middle of the southeastern end of Gate-street; and extending thence, north-westward, to and along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Crowtherstreet; and extending thence, northward, along the middle of the last-named street as far as the point where it is intersected by College-street; and continuing thence, still northward, across the last-named street, and to and along the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, from the particular district of Saint James, Bradford, sometime part of the same parish, to the point where such boundary diverges to the east, at the intersection of Grafton-street by Growtherstreet; and continuing thence, still northward, along the middle of Crowther-street aforesaid, as far as the first-described boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, from the new parish of Saint John, Bradford aforesaid; and extending thence, first westward, then southeastward, then westward, and lastly north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary to its junction in the middle of Great Horton-road with the boundary dividing the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, from the consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew, Bradford aforesaid, at which point of junction the said imaginary line commenced:"

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty, in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, sections two, three, four, and seven,

duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twelfth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, sections two, three, four, and seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for assigning certain lands and hereditaments as the endowment of the See of Norwich.

"Whereas the Right Reverend John Thomas, Bishop of Norwich, succeeded to the See of Norwich on an avoidance which happened before the passing of the hereinbefore mentioned Act, and is in receipt of the amount named by Act of Parliament as the income of the Bishop of Norwich, videlicet, four thousand and five hundred pounds per annum; and the said Bishop of Norwich has signified to us his willingness to accept an endowment for his See in lands and hereditaments in lieu of his said income, and that the arrangement hereinafter set forth should be made for that purpose.

"And whereas the lands and hereditaments specified and described in the schedule hereto annexed, now belong to and are vested in the said Bishop and his successors in the said See, and are, in the opinion of our Estates Committee, convenient to be held as the endowment of the said See of Norwich, and are calculated to secure to the holder thereof, as nearly as may be (after deducting costs of management), a net annual income of other Act of Parliament.

duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in four thousand and five hundred pounds and no Council a scheme hearing date the twelfth day more.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said John Thomas, Bishop of Norwich, testified by his having signed this scheme, and sealed the same with his Episcopal seal, we humbly recommend and propose, that upon the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law, other than such duly published Order, the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, with their appurtenances, shall be assigned and remain as the endowment for the said See of Norwich, absolutely freed and discharged from all right, title, interest, claim or demand of or from us, other than such as is created or allowed by the said Act. and shall as from the twenty-fifth day of March last be and remain the endowment for the said See of Norwich, as contemplated by the said Act, subject always and nevertheless to the liabilities and charges to which the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments are now specifically liable, to the end that all the lands, hereditaments, and emoluments of or belonging to the said See of Norwich, except such as are so specified and described in the schedule aforesaid, and except also all rights of patronage and presentation and the residence of the Bishop may become vested absolutely in us, under and by virtue of, and subject to, the provisions of the said hereinbefore mentioned Act.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the district chapelry of Saint George, Old Brentford, sometime part of the parish of Saint Mary, Ealing, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, and out of the said parish of Saint Mary, Ealing.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the portions of the said district chapelry of Saint George, Old Brentford, and of the said parish of Saint Mary, Ealing, which are hereinafter mentioned and described, such portions not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship, should be constituted a separate district

in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Saint Mary, Ealing, have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the hereinmentioned Acts.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said district chapelry of Saint George, Old Brentford, and of the said parish of Saint Mary, Ealing, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Paul, Old Brentford.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us in each and every year to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, the sum of two hundred pounds, and that so soon as a church shall have been built within such district, and shall have been duly approved by us and consecrated as the

district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us in each and every year to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish the further sum of one hundred pounds, making together the annual sum of three hundred pounds, and that the said sums of two hundred pounds and one hundred pounds respectively shall be paid by equal halfyearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first of each of such respective payments, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or the first day of November next after the day of the date of the license of such minister, or of the approval and consecration of such church as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or incumbency of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish. Provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or, instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts. or of either of them, or of any other Act of Par-

"The District of Saint Paul, Old Brentford, being: -

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Saint Mary, Gateshead, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Gateshead.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (testified as aforesaid), we further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Gateshead, being:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of certain benefices between the Bishop of London and the Principal and Scholars of the King's Hall and College of Brasenose, in the University of Oxford.

"Whereas the said Bishop of London is seized in fee, in right of his See of the patronage of, or perpetual right of nomination to, the several benefices specified in the first part of the schedule hereto annexed.

"And whereas the said Principal and Scholars of the King's Hall and College of Brasenose, in the University of Oxford, are seized in fee of the patronage of, or perpetual right of nomination to, the several benefices specified in the second part of the said schedule; and have also the right to nominate and present fit clerks to officiate in all churches or chapels which now are, or which shall be, built within the limits of the said several benefices specified in the said second part of the said schedule.

"And whereas by the third section of the aboverecited Act, it is enacted that the word 'person' shall include any corporation, and the master, provost, warden, or head of any college or collegiate establishment, and the master, guardian, or head of any hospital, and the governing body respectively entitled in his or their corporate capacity to any such patronage; and shall also extend to and include the Queen's Majesty, as well in respect of patronage vested, or to be vested in, or exercised by, Her Majesty in right of the Crown, as in right of the Duchy of Lancaster or of the Duchy of Cornwall; and in every case of exchange in right of the Crown, where the benefice is above the yearly value of twenty pounds in the Queen's books, the assent of Her Majesty shall be testified by the signature of the Lord High Treasurer or First Commissioner of the Treasury for the time being; and when such yearly value shall be twenty pounds or under, such assent shall be testified by the signature of the Lord High Chancellor, and the assent of Her Majesty; when the patronage is in respect of the Duchy of Lancaster, shall be testified by the signature of the Chancellor of the Duchy; and when the patronage is in respect of the Duchy of Cornwall, such assent shall be testified by two or more of the principal officers of the said Duchy, to be appointed in manner provided for appointment of officers to grant leases under the provisions of an Act passed in the session held in the first and second years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter five, which assent they are hereby authorized and empowered to give; and in every case of exchange in right of the Duchy of Cornwall, when there is a Duke of Cornwall, the assent of the said Duke shall be testified in writing, under the Privy Seal of the said Duke, first had and obtained for that purpose.

"And whereas the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of London, and the Principal and Scholars of the King's Hall and College of Brasenose aforesaid, have signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said several benefices, and the right of nomination to all the churches or chapels hereinbefore mentioned, may be exchanged, as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due inquiry and calculation as to the circumstances of the proposed exchange, and the relative values of the said benefices and patronage; and we do hereby certify to your Majesty, that after making all proper deductions and allowances, the values of the said benefices, respectively, are as set forth in the two parts of the schedule hereunto annexed.

"Now, therefore, with the assent of the said Archibald Campbell, Bishop of London, as patron in right of his See of the several benefices set forth in the first part of the said schedule, and of the said Principal and Scholars of the King's Hall and College of Brasenose, as patrons of the several benefices set forth in the second part of the said schedule, in testimony whereof the said Archibald Campbell, Bishop of London, has signed and

sealed, and the said Principal and Scholars of the said King's Hall and College of Brasenose have sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose, that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the patronage of, or perpetual right of nomination to, the said several benefices specified in the said first part of the schedule hereto annexed, shall be assigned and transferred from the said Archibald Campbell, Bishop of London and his successors in the said See, and shall become and be vested in, and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Principal and Scholars of the King's Hall and College of Brasenose and their successors for ever; and that in exchange for the same the patronage of, or perpetual right of nomination to, the benefices specified in the second part of the said schedule hereto annexed, and the right of nomination and presentation to all churches and chapels which now are, or shall hereafter be, built within the limits of the said benefices specified in the said second part of the said schedule, shall be assigned and transferred from the said Principal and Scholars of the King's Hall and College of Brasenose and their successors, and shall in like manner become and be vested in, and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Archibald Campbell, Bishop of London, and his successors in the said See for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act,

or of any other Act of Parliament.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said new parishes hereinafter mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine Worship), should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter set

forth.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Saint Pancras have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the hereinmentioned Acts.

"And whereas a sum of four thousand two hundred pounds New Three Pounds per Centum Annuities has been contributed and transferred to our account and into our name in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, by John Derby Allcroft, of Porchesterterrace. Bayswater, in the said county of Middlesex, Esquire, in aid of the maintenance of the minister for the time being of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted; and we have, in respect thereof, agreed with the said John Derby Allcroft, and have undertaken to provide and pay, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, to such minister as aforesaid, when duly licensed, the yearly sum of one hundred and twenty-six pounds.

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that, in consideration of the transfer of the said sum of four thousand two hundred pounds New Three Pounds per Centum Annuities as aforesaid, the whole right of patronage of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, should be assigned to the said John Derby Allcroft, his heirs and assigns, in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that all that portion of the said new parish of Kentish Town, and also all that portion of the said new

parish of the Holy Trinity, Haverstock Hill, which are respectively mentioned and described in the Schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Martin, Kentish Town.'

"And we further recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us in each and every year to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed as aforesaid, the sum of twenty-four pounds, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the license of such minister as aforesaid; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry of such district shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister succeeding to such district; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that, instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister of the said district, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Martin, Kentish Town, being:-

"All that portion of the new parish of Kentish Town, sometime part of the parish of Saint Pancras, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, and also all that portion of the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Haverstock Hill, also sometime part of the said parish of Saint Pancras, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parishes at a point in the middle of Weedington-road; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of such

road to its north-western extremity; and continuing thence still north-westward and in a direct line to a point in the middle of the fence which forms the southern boundary of the close known as 'the Church lands,' belonging to the trustees of the said parish of Saint Pancras, and which is also the northern boundary of a certain brickfield belonging to, and in the occupation of, George Bassett, of Southampton-street, Fitzroy-square, in the said county of Middlesex, at which said point a boundary stone inscribed 'K. T. St. M. D., 1864, No. 1,' has been placed; and extending thence southwestward along the middle of the said fence, to a boundary stone inscribed 'K. T. St. M. D., 1864, No. 2,' and placed at or near to the junction of the said fence, with the wall or fence which forms the western boundary of the said close, and which is also the eastern boundary of the gardens at the back of Oakfield Terrace; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-described wall or fence, to a boundary stone inscribed 'K. T. St. M. D., 1864, No. 3.; and placed at or near to the junction of the said lastmentioned wall or fence, with the fence which forms the northern boundary of the same close; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned fence, as far as a point in the middle of the gateway at the south-eastern end of a certain road leading from the said close to Lismore Circus; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said road to a point in the middle of its north-western extremity, such point being opposite to the north-eastern angle of the house and garden called 'Ventnor House, known also as 'No. 1. "We humbly recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, out of the common fund in the said Acts mentioned, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices described in the first schedule hereunto annexed, the annual sum set opposite to the

name of each such benefice in the last column of the same schedule, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year.

- "And we further recommend and propose, that if at any time it shall appear desirable to us that any lands, tithe, or other hereditaments should be substituted for the annual sums hereinbefore mentioned, or any of them, or any part thereof, nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such substitution, or any other measure relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

#### UNIVERSAL CODE OF MARINE SIGNALS.

Board of Trade, Whitehall, July 11, 1864.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of the "Moniteur" of the 7th July, containing a French Imperial Decree, of which the following is a Translation :-

#### ART. I.

"The Commercial Code of Signals for the use of vessels of all Nations," as adopted by the Anglo-French Commission, shall alone be employed by French vessels for all communications exchanged at sea, whether between such vessels, or with semaphore stations, or with foreign vessels.

#### ART. 2.

Every vessel of the Imperial Navy, and every semaphore station on the French coasts, shall be furnished with the Signal Book, the flags, and other necessaries for exchanging signals with French and foreign merchant vessels according to the method Charles William Lancaster, of No. 151, New of signalling prescribed by the said code.

#### ART. 3.

French ships of war shall continue to communicate with each other and with French semaphore stations by the method of signalling at present in use in the Imperial Navy.

#### ART. 4.

Our Minister of Marine and Colonies shall cause to be furnished to the Chambers of Commerce at the various ports—

- Copies of the "Commercial Code of Signals," and of the list of French and foreign vessels, with their official numbers in the "Commercial Code of Signals."
- 2. Tables of the French semaphore stations.

There shall likewise be furnished to the Chambers of Commerce patterns,—

- Of the series of universal signal flags of the Commercial Code.
- Of the black balls for making the distant signals.

#### ART. 5.

Our Ministers of State of the Interior, and of the Marine, shall regulate the details (to be hereafter arranged between them) providing for the transmission by telegraph of commercial messages received from vessels or for communication to vessels.

#### ART. 6.

Our Minister of Marine and Colonies shall, by notice, decide the date after which the Commercial Code shall be exclusively used.

#### ART. 7.

All former orders and regulations contrary to the present Decree are hereby abrogated.

#### ART. 8.

Our Minister of Marine and Colonies is charged with the execution of this Decree.
