MY LORD,

AFTER the retreat of the rebel natives from Mangatautari, reported in my last despatch, they dispersed in every direction; and considering it inadvisable to follow them any further into the interior of the country, I proposed to his Excellency the Governor of New Zealand that further operations should be discontinued in the Province of Auckland, that the troops required for the defence and occupation of the territory from which

we had expelled the natives should hut themselves for the winter, and that the remainder should embark for New Plymouth, to reinforce Colonel Warre, and assist him in driving the Taranaki and Ngatirnamu rebels beyond the boundaries of the settlement.

I had recently received from Colonel Warre a report (herewith enclosed) relative to the surprise of a small detachment of regular and colonial troops, who fell into an ambuscade of rebels, on which occasion Captain Lloyd, 57th Regiment, commanding the detachment, and five men, were killed, and twelve wounded.

On the 17th April, however, information having been received from Colonel Greer, 68th Regiment, commanding at Tauranga, that the natives in that district had collected in considerable force, and entrenched themselves in a strong position about three miles from his post, it was decided by his Excellency and myself that the reinforcements intended for New Plymouth should be sent to Tauranga. They were accordingly embarked without delay in Her Majesty's ships "Esk" and "Falcon," placed at my disposal for that service by Commodore Sir William Wiseman, and by the 26th April were all landed at the mission station of Tauranga, to which place I had transferred my Head Quarters on the 21st.

On the 27th, I moved the 68th Regiment, under Colonel Greer, and a mixed detachment of 170 men, under Major Ryan, 70th Regiment, towards the rebel entrenchment, of which I made a close reconnaissance.

It was constructed on a neck of land about 500 yards wide, the slopes of which fell off into a swamp on either side. On the highest point of this neck they had constructed an oblong redoubt, well palisaded, and surrounded by a strong post-and-rail fence, a formidable obstacle to an assaulting column, and difficult to destroy with artillery. The intervals between the side faces of the redoubt and the swamps were defended by an entrenched line of rifle pits.

I encamped the 68th Regiment and Major Ryan's detachment about 1200 yards from the enemy's position on the 27th, and on that and the following day the guns and mortars intended to breach the position were brought up to the camp, which was joined by a large force of seamen and marines, landed, at my request, from the ships of the squadron by Commodore Sir William Wiseman. The composition and strength of the force assembled in front of the enemy's position, on the morning of the 28th, are shewn in the margin.*

Having received information that, by moving along the beach of one of the branches of Tauranga Harbour, at low water, it was possible for a body of troops to pass outside the swamp on the enemy's right and gain the rear of his position, I ordered Colonel Greer to make the attempt with the 68th Regiment, after dark, on the evening of the 28th; and in order to divert the attention of the enemy

from that side, I ordered a feigned attack to be made in his front.

Colonel Greer's movement succeeded perfectly, and on the morning of the 29th he had taken up a position in rear of the enemy, which cut off his supply of water, and made his retreat in daylight impossible, but was necessarily too extended to prevent his escape by night. I enclose Colonel Greer's report of his proceedings.

During the same night the guns and mortars were placed in position and opened fire soon after daybreak, on the morning of the 29th. I gave directions that their fire should be directed principally against the left angle of the centre work, which, from the nature of the ground, I considered the most favourable part to assault.

Their practice was excellent, particularly that of the howitzers, and reflects great credit on the officers in command of batteries.

About twelve o'clock, the swamp on the enemy's left having been reported by Captain Greaves, Deputy-Assistant Quartermaster-General, practicable for the passage of a gun, a 6-pounder Armstrong gun was taken across to the high ground on the opposite side, from which its fire completely enfiladed the left of the enemy's position, which he was thus compelled to abandon.

The fire of the guns, howitzers, and mortars, was continued with short intermissions until 4 P.M., when a large portion of the fence and palisading having been destroyed, and a practicable breach made in the parapet, I ordered the assault.

150 Seamen and Marines, under Commander Hay, of H.M.'s ship "Harrier," and an equal number of the 43rd Regiment, under Lieutenant-Colonel Booth, formed the assaulting column.

Major Ryan's detachment was extended as close to the work as possible, to keep down the fire from the rifle pits, with orders to follow the assaulting column into the work.

The remainder of the Seamen and Marines, and of the 43rd Regiment, amounting together to 300 men, followed as a reserve.

The assaulting column, protected by the nature of the ground, gained the breach with little loss, and effected an entrance into the body of the work, when a fierce conflict ensued, in which the natives fought with the greatest desperation. Lieutenant-Colonel Booth and Commander Hay, who led into the work, fell mortally wounded. Captain Hamilton, of the "Esk," was shot dead on the top of the parapet, while in the act of encouraging his men to advance, and in a few minutes almost every officer of the column was either killed or wounded. Up to this moment the men, so nobly led by their officers, fought gallantly, and appeared to have carried the position, when they suddenly gave way and fell back from the work to the nearest cover.

This repulse I am at a loss to explain, otherwise than by attributing it to the confusion created among the men by the intricate nature of the interior defences, and the sudden fall of so many of their officers.

On my arrival at the spot, I considered it unadvisable to renew the assault, and directed a line of entrenchment to be thrown up within 100 yards of the work, so as to be able to maintain our advanced position, intending to resume operations the following morning.

The natives availing themselves of the extreme darkness of the night, abandoned the work, leaving some of their killed and wounded behind.

On taking possession of the work in the morning, Lieutenant-Colonel Booth and some men were found still living, and to the credit of the natives,

had not been maltreated, nor had any of the bodies of the killed been mutilated.

I enclose a list of our casualties. I deeply deplore the loss of the many brave and valuable officers who fell in the noble discharge of their duty on this occasion.

The 43rd Regiment, and the service, have sustained a serious loss in the death of Lieutenant-Colonel Booth, which took place on the night after the attack. I have already mentioned the brilliant example shewn by this officer in the assault; and when I met him on the following morning as he was being carried out of the work, his first words were an expression of regret that he had found it impossible to carry out my orders.

The heroism and devotion of Captain Hamilton and Commander Hay reflect the highest honour on the naval service.

The loss of the enemy must have been very heavy, although not more than 20 bodies and six wounded were found in and about their position. It is admitted by the prisoners that they carried off a large number of killed and wounded during the night; and they also suffered in attempting to make their escape, as described in Colonel Greer's report.

I beg to bring to your Lordship's favourable notice the important service rendered by Colonel Greer, who conducted the night march, and occupied the ground in rear of the enemy with so much skill.

The Officers and Men of the 68th Regiment deserve the greatest credit for the cheerfulness and zeal with which they performed a very harassing duty.

I must also specially mention the name of Major Ryan, 70th Regiment, who, after covering the advance of the assaulting column with his detachment, followed into the work, and with Captain Jenkins, H.M.S. "Miranda," was one of the last to leave it.

Lieutenant and Adjutant Garland, 43rd Regiment, has been particularly reported to me for his conspicuous conduct in the assault.

I am much indebted to all the Officers commanding and Heads of Department, for the zeal and activity with which they discharged their respective duties; and I must particularly mention the valuable services of Deputy Inspector-General Mouat, Surgeon McKinnon, 57th Regiment, and Assistant-Surgeon Manley, Royal Artillery, who fearlessly exposed themselves to fire in attending to the wounded, the greater part of whom fell close to the enemy's work.

Commodore Sir William Wiseman on this, as on every other occasion, co-operated with me in the most cordial manner; and I am much indebted to him, as well as to the whole of the Officers and Men of the Royal Navy and Marines, who took part in these operations, for their valuable assistance.

SIR,

April 8, 1864.

IT is with the deepest regret I have the honour to report, for the information of the Lieutenant-General Commanding, that a reconnoitring party, strength as per margin,* under the command of Captain Lloyd, 57th Regiment, fell into a strong native ambuscade on the morning of the 6th instant, and, being completely surprised, were attacked at great disadvantage by the rebels. Captain Lloyd and six of the 57th Regiment and Taranaki Militia (military settlers), were killed, and 12 of the same corps were wounded.

As soon as the report reached me from Lieutenant Clarke, Deputy-Assistant Quartermaster General, whom I had sent to Oakura to watch the proceedings of Captain Lloyd's party, I collected such men as were available (strength, as nearly as I can ascertain, shown in the margin),† and proceeding myself to Oakura, I left the troops under Major Butler, 57th Regiment, and the Volunteers under Captain Atkinson (Taranaki Rifle Volunteers), to follow as quickly as possible. On passing Omata, I requested Captain McKellar, the officer in charge, to give me as many of his men as he could spare (Militia),‡ and they followed me very rapidly with a force of nearly similar strength from the redoubts at Poutoko and Fort Robert. As soon as this party, of about 100 rank and file, had reached Oakura, I took forward the 24-pound howitzer, under Captain Martin, Royal Artillery, and leaving word for the Taranaki Rifle Volunteers to take a direct route through the fern to Ahu-Ahu, where the disaster occurred, I went on by the beach to Hauranga (Big Jack's pah), from whence there is a cart track leading directly on Ahu-Ahu, up which I proceeded with the Militia above noted, until within a few hundred yards of the ranges. I here directed Captain Martin to fire a few rounds to the right of the position, to ascertain whether any natives were in ambuscade; and Captain Mace, Taranaki Militia, and his mounted men volunteered to ride forward, scattering through the fern, to ascertain whether any Maoris were in possession of the rifle pits, by which the spur of the hill is surrounded. We then pushed forward, and being shortly joined by Captain Atkinson's Volunteers and the party of the 57th Regiment, under Major Butler, we recovered the mutilated remains of Captain Lloyd, and five other men, whose heads had been cut off by the infuriated Maoris.

Several men of the Militia, who had concealed themselves in the fern, were saved and brought in by the timely arrival of the reinforcements, and as no Maoris were visible in any direction, I returned to Oakura by eight o'clock P.M., where the troops remained for the night. The Volunteers and Militia preferring to return to town, I allowed them to do so, and they arrived at New Plymouth at twelve o'clock at night, having marched at least 24 miles since noon, with a cheerfulness and zeal for which they are now notorious, and for which I cannot accord them too high praise.

As regards the origin of this unfortunate affair, which I am unwilling to prejudice, I have ordered

evidence to be taken and every enquiry to be made, and as this is still incomplete, I must claim the Lieutenant-General's indulgence until the next mail, when I hope to be able to report more fully all particulars.

As some rebel Maoris are stated to have arrived from the north, I have strengthened the outposts, and depend entirely on the Militia and Volunteers for the defence of the town. The regular troops are severely overworked by constant long marches on occasion of alarms, for which reason, and to

spare them as much as possible, I have placed them at the out-stations.

I HAVE the honour to state, for the information of the Lieutenant-General Commanding, that in compliance with his instructions, I marched out of Camp with the 68th Light Infantry (strength as per margin*), carrying one day's cooked rations and a great coat each, on the 28th ultimo, at a quarter to seven o'clock, P.M., my object being to get in rear of the enemy's position by means of a flank march round their right. To accomplish this it was necessary to cross part of a mud flat (at the head of a bay) about three-quarters of a

mile long, only passable at low water, and then nearly knee deep, and within musketry range of the shore, in possession of the enemy, rough high ground, covered with ti-tri and fern.

2. At the point at which I got off the mud flat, there is a swamp about 100 yards broad, covered with ti-tri about 5 feet high, on the opposite side of which the end of a spur (which runs down from the high ground in rear of the pah) rose abruptly: this was also covered with high fern and ti-tri.

3. It being of the first importance that this movement should be accomplished without attracting the attention of the enemy, my instructions were to gain the top of the spur alluded to, during the darkness, and remain there until there should be sufficient light to move on.

4. The regiment was all across and lying down in line along the crest of the ridge, with picquets posted round them, at ten o'clock, which was two hours before the moon rose. I beg here to state that to the well-timed feigned attack made by the Lieutenant-General Commanding on the front of the enemy's pah, I consider myself indebted for having been enabled to accomplish this, the most difficult part of the march, without being attacked at a great disadvantage, and exposing the movement to the enemy, for when we reached the top of the ridge, the remains of their picquet fires were discovered. The picquets having no doubt retired to assist in the defence of the pah.

5. About half-past one o'clock, A.M., I advanced, and at three o'clock I reached a position about 1,000 yards directly in rear of the pah. I was guided in selecting this position by hearing the Maoris talking in their pah, and the sentries challenging in our head-quarter camp. It was dark and raining at the time.

6. I immediately sent Major Shuttleworth forward with three companies to take a position on the left rear of the pah, and I placed picquets round the remainder of the rear about 700 yards distance from it.

7. At daybreak I detached three companies to the right, under command of Major Kirby, and posted a chain of sentries so that no one could come out of the pah without being seen; up to this time the enemy did not appear to be aware that they were surrounded, they were singing and making speeches in their pah. Later in the morning, Lieutenant Colonel Gamble, C.B., Deputy Quartermaster-General, visited my post, having an escort with him of 30 of the Naval Brigade, under Lieutenant Hotham, R.M., and seeing that I wanted a reinforcement on my right, he left his escort with me, and I received valuable assistance from that excellent officer and his party. About the same time Major Shuttleworth moved more to his left and closer to the pah.

8. These positions were not altered during the bombardment except temporarily when the Maoris shewed a disposition to come out at one or other flank, or when it was necessary to move a little from a position getting more than its share of the splinters of shell which kept falling about all day during the bombardment.

9. When the bombardment ceased and the signal of a rocket let me know that the assault was about being made, I moved up close round the rear of the pah in such a position that the Maoris could not come out without being met by a strong force.

10. About five o'clock P.M., the Maoris made a determined rush from the right rear of their pah, I met them with three companies, and after a skirmish drove the main body back into the pah. About 20 got past my right, but they received a flank fire from Lieutenant Cox's party (68th), 60 men, and Lieutenant Hotham's, 30 men Naval Brigade, and 16 of the Maoris were seen to fall, a number of men pursued the remainder. By the time I had collected the men again and posted them it was quite dark; my force available on the right was quite inadequate to cover the ground in such a manner as to prevent the Maoris from escaping during the night; in fact, I consider on such a wet dark night as that was, nothing but a close chain of sentries strongly supported round the whole rear and flanks could have kept the

Maoris in, and to do that a much stronger force than I had would have been necessary.

11. During the night the Maoris made their escape; I think that (taking advantage of the darkness), they crept away in small parties, for during the night every post either saw or heard some of them escaping, and fired volleys at them. The Maoris careful not to expose themselves never returned a shot during the night, but there were occasional shots fired from the pah, no doubt to deceive us as to their having left it.

12. I cannot speak too highly of the conduct of the 68th during the march on Thursday night; it was performed with the most complete stillness and regularity. I have also the pleasure of being able to state, that during the whole of their fatiguing duty, they were always ready to obey cheerfully any order they received, and after dark it was most difficult to move about from the way in which the ground in rear was swept by the musketry in front.

13. I am much indebted to the Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers for the active intelligence and zeal with which they performed their duty; I beg to mention particularly Major Shuttleworth, 68th Light Infantry, who with the guide and six men, went feeling the way to the front during the night march, and afterwards commanded on the left, repelling several attempts of the Maoris to get away in that direction.

Captain Trent, 68th Light Infantry, who with his Company, formed the advanced guard during the night march, and performed that duty with much intelligence, and was afterwards engaged on the left, where he entailed a rifle pit, and in the front covering a working party.

Lieutenant Cox, 68th, who occupied with judgment and good effect an important position on my right, where he entailed a rifle pit, and quite shut up what appeared the principal point of egress from the pah.

Lieutenant Hotham, R.M., who was, with a party of the Naval Brigade, at the same post with Lieutenant Cox.

To Lieutenant and Adjutant Covey, 68th Light Infantry, Field Adjutant, I am, on this occasion, as on every other where duty is concerned, much indebted for the zeal and intelligence with which he has assisted me in seeing my orders carried out; during the whole time he was constantly alert and active wherever he was required. To all I owe my best thanks.

I wish to bring to particular notice the admirable manner in which the regiment was guided by Mr. Parvis, who volunteered to act as guide on the occasion; he went to the front with Major Shuttleworth and six men, and without hesitating or making a mistake, brought me straight to the position I wished to occupy.

The whole regiment was back in camp by 4 P.M. yesterday.

The casualties were as follows:—killed, 1 serjeant; wounded, 16 privates.

MY LORD,

SHORTLY after my arrival at Tauranga, I received a report, dated 21st April, copy of which I herewith enclose, from Major Colvile, 43rd Regiment, Commanding a detachment of 150 men, at Maketu, a native settlement on the east coast, about 18 miles from Tauranga.

This detachment had been stationed there by desire of his Excellency the Governor of New Zealand, in the beginning of April, as a support to a tribe of loyal natives, who had taken up arms to prevent other tribes of the east coast from passing through their territory to join the rebels in the Waikato.

Immediately on receipt of Major Colvile's report I sent him a supply of ammunition and a 12-pounder Armstrong gun, with a few men of the Royal Artillery.

Having received a further communication* from him, reporting that the enemy had collected in great force in his front, and were digging rifle pits within 800 yards of his redoubt, I sent him a reinforcement of 60 men of the 43rd Regiment, and as the rifle pits were within range of heavy guns from the sea, I requested Commodore Sir William Wiseman to send one of the ships of the squadron to shell the position.

Captain Jenkins, Royal Navy, proceeded there, accordingly, on the 27th April, with Her Majesty's ship "Falcon" and the Colonial steamer "Sand-fly," and compelled the enemy to evacuate his entrenchments, and retreat down the coast, pursued by the loyal natives, as reported in a letter from Major Colvile, dated 30th April, a copy of which is herewith enclosed.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to report to you an engagement with the East Coast natives, at Why-hee two miles from the fort at Maketu, in which about 110 men of the force under my command were engaged.

An ambuscade was laid near the ford at Why-hee, this morning, and at least 50 rebels opened fire on Ensign Way, 3rd Waikato Regiment, Private Key, 43rd Light Infantry, and myself, when we were crossing the river at ten A.M., in a canoe.

The rebels were certainly not above 50 yards distant at the time, and I consider our escape as most providential and wonderful.

They pursued us across the ford on our jumping out of the canoe into the water, and followed us yelling and firing till we got into the bush and escaped.

On arrival at the fort, I immediately ordered out a party of 50 men of the 43rd Light Infantry, and 3rd Waikato Regiment, under the command of Captain Smith, 43rd Light Infantry, to drive the enemy across the ford.

They found on arrival, that the enemy had recrossed the river, and had established themselves about 400 yards distant on that side, and kept up

a constant fire from the sand hills and bush around, which we returned with interest.

Finding the enemy mustering strong, I sent for a further reinforcement of 30 men, under the command of Captain Harris, 43rd Light Infantry, and Ensign Way, 3rd Waikato. Major Drummond Hay, and Captain MacDonald also arrived, with the Forest Rangers (14 men), and a number of the friendly Otrawa tribe also joined. I requested Major Hay to cross the river with his Rangers and all the native allies.

This he did, but as very few of the natives would follow him, he was reluctantly compelled to retire, after remaining engaged for some time.

My orders are so very stringent not to go far from the settlement of Maketu, that I was compelled to content myself with lining the side of the river, and firing at 400 yards and more at the rebels.

The East Coast natives, apparently 300 strong, are now entrenching themselves at the position they occupied to-day, and I hear they are receiving further reinforcements.

I have, therefore, requested Major Hay to attack them across the river in the morning, if he can induce the native allies to follow him.

At dusk, I withdrew my men and returned to the fort, leaving a strong party of natives to protect the village of Why-hee, and give the alarm in the event of the rebels coming on.

My best thanks are due to Captains Smith and Honorable A. E. Harris, 43rd Light Infantry, for the able manner they led their companies into action.

Also to Ensign Way, commanding the detachment 3rd Waikato.

I have the honour to enclose the list of wounded, which, I am glad to say, is but small, considering we were under fire for between six and seven hours. Besides the enclosed, Captain McDonald, of the Forest Rangers, was slightly wounded in the hand.

I consider I am strong enough to hold the settlement, provided more ammunition is sent me as soon as possible, as I expect to be engaged again to-morrow.

From the nature of the country, and from our being unable to cross the river, it is impossible to estimate the loss of the enemy. They were, however, seen carrying off killed or wounded on several occasions during the day.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to state in reply to your letter of yesterday's date, for the information of the Lieutenant-General, that the ford at Waihi cannot be seen from the headland to the left of the Waihi pah, the ford lying to the right too much. The ford is, however, commanded (if my memory serves me right) from the right of the Waihi pah, as per accompanying rough sketch.

The enemy has now advanced his rifle pits to within 800 yards of my fort, having worked all night, and working still, though occasionally fired on by the Armstrong.

They sent in word yesterday that we were all to be attacked last night; and I doubt not, from their bold bearing, that they are in great numbers, and intend keeping their word.

Very few, I fancy, are in the Waihi pah now, but most in the entrenched position more than half a mile nearer.

They may have been strengthening the pah, in case of their trenches being taken, to retreat to; but this I cannot be certain of, as their movements in rear are concealed from our view.

They say the enemy are rather hard pressed for provisions, and cannot remain much longer without doing something.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to report, for the information of the Lieutenant-General, that the whole of the enemy evacuated their entrenchments on the morning of the 28th, and on my entering the trenches immediately after the shelling from the man-of-war was finished (with 100 men), I found all had escaped.

Major Hay and the native allies followed them up as far as Te-Awa-Ote-Atua, 18 miles from here, and had an engagement there, killing between 50 and 60, with the loss only of one man killed and four wounded (all natives).

This engagement occurred on the 29th.

Major Hay and all the native allies have returned to Maketu this morning, the enemy having retreated further down the coast.

IN continuation of my letter of proceedings of the 3rd ultimo, I have the honour to inform you,

for the information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that on the 6th April, I accompanied the General on a reconnaissance up the right bank of the Horitui River; on arrival opposite the rebel pah at Maungatautari we found that it was evacuated, and saw some few natives retiring, about two miles off.

A company of the 70th Regiment crossed over the river and took possession of the position, until relieved, later in the day, by the 50th Regiment and Naval Brigade.

2. The General having informed me that operations were over in the Waikato District, arrangements were made for the removal of the seamen and marines, and on the 11th April they left the front to join their ships, with the exception of Acting Lieutenant F. J. Easter and about ten men belonging to the "Harrier," doing duty in the "Avon," who were left behind, the Colonial Government not being able to relieve them.

3. On the departure of the men, the Lieutenant-General Commanding promulgated in General Orders, his thanks to the Navy for their assistance and co-operation, a copy of which I beg to enclose for the information of their Lordships.

4. On the 19th, the "Esk," returned to Auckland, bringing several of the principal chiefs of the Thames District, and information that the natives had given up their arms and agreed to the terms of peace offered by the Government.

5. On the 17th a letter was received from Captain Robert Jenkins (a copy of which is enclosed), acquainting me that the rebels were in great force outside Te Papa, and had threatened to attack the camp. His Excellency Sir George Grey, the Governor, requested that I would send down what force I could, as there were no troops available at Auckland. The Marines of the squadron, who had just arrived from the Waikato, were sent down the next day, under the command of Lieutenant Hill, R.N., and Lieutenant Gardner, R.M.A., in the steamer "Sandfly." On the 20th the "Esk" embarked the General and Staff, and 400 troops, with 30 seamen of the "Curaçoa," and proceeded to Tauranga; the rest of the reinforcements have been brought down here by Her Majesty's ships, "Harrier" and "Falcon."

6. On the 24th I left the "Curaçoa," with 91 blue jackets, and embarked in the "Falcon" for Tauranga, arriving on the 25th, and on the following day, with the General, proceeded in the "Sandfly" down the coast to Maketu, near which the rebels were in great force, and threatening to attack Major Colville commanding there; finding it practicable to shell the enemy's position, I determined on sending the "Falcon" and "Sandfly" for that purpose.

7. On the following day the two vessels proceeded to Maketu, under the command of Captain Robert Jenkins, of the "Miranda," and dislodged the natives; a copy of Captain Jenkins' letter to me, reporting his proceedings, is forwarded herewith for their Lordships' information.

8. The Maoris having thrown up a strong pah about three miles from the village of Te Papa, at a place called Pukehinahina, the General, who had previously advanced the 68th Regiment to a position about 1,000 yards from it, requested that I would land some heavy guns from the ships for the purpose of destroying their works.

On the 27th and 28th, the seamen of the squadron were engaged in landing the 110-pounder and two 40-pounder Armstrong guns of the "Esk," and placing them in position.

9. On the 29th, the position was shelled and taken, the particulars of which are given in my letter, No. 41.

10. The seamen and marines landed at Te Papa have, since the engagement, been busily employed in returning the guns to the "Esk," and bringing down the stores, &c., from the front; the seamen have been embarked again.

11. Yesterday (the 2nd instant) the bodies of those who had lost their lives in the action at Pukehinahina, were buried at Te Papa with military honours.

12. The wounded of the Naval Brigade have been placed on board the "Miranda," and are, I am glad to say, doing well.

2. It is reported that they are acting under the orders of William Thompson, and that he is endeavouring to collect all the forces he can for operations in this neighbourhood.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to inform you, that in compliance with your orders, I embarked at daylight this morning in the Colonial steamer

"Sandfly," and with Her Majesty's ship "Falcon" proceeded to Maketu.

2. On the arrival of the vessels off that place, Major Colville sent on board Ensign Langlands, of the 43rd Light Infantry, with a letter (copy of which is enclosed), and to show me the position of the hostile natives; a whale-boat also came out with natives going to Flat Island. I, however, sent them back with a letter to Major Colville, informing him that I was going to shell the enemy's position.

3. The "Falcon" was placed in a position which enfladed the enemy's works from the whares on their right on the cliff; but before she had opened fire, a large number of natives were seen retreating along the beach to the eastward. I immediately followed them with the "Sandfly;" and on nearing them, opened on them with the 12-pounder Armstrong of the "Falcon," manned by "Miranda's," and the "Esk's," manned by its own crew.

4. On our firing, the natives took cover under the sand-hills, and continued their hurried retreat to Otamarako; they were, however, seen to stop in several clumps of trees, &c., into which shells were at once thrown, after which the extensive whares, both inside and out of the old pah at Otamarako, were shelled.

5. Soon after noon "Falcon" ceased firing, the enemy's works on the left bank of the Waihi River being occupied by the troops from Maketu, under Major Colville, of the 43rd; "Sandfly" then anchored to await the arrival of "Falcon," when both vessels shelled the whares at Otamarako, the "Falcon" also throwing shell amongst bodies of natives which were seen from her mast heads retreating.

6. At 3 P.M. ceased firing, the enemy having, apparently, entirely abandoned the settlement, and a body of friendly natives being seen advancing along the beach from Maketu. I then returned in the "Sandfly" to Tauranga, the "Falcon" proceeding to Auckland with the mails which were awaiting her at the mouth of the harbour.

7. I beg to bring to your notice the zeal and exertions of Senior Lieutenant G. R. Hope, in command of the "Falcon," and of Captain Hannibal Marks, commanding the Colonial Steamer "Sandfly," whereby, in a few hours the enemy has been driven from the strong position which completely hemmed in the garrison of Maketu, and also from the extensive settlement of Otamarako, the former being occupied by a detachment of 43rd Light Infantry, under Major Colville, and the latter by friendly natives of Maketu.

I would also beg to recommend Henry Glas-sington, Boatswain's Mate and Seaman Gunner, Edward Metters, Leading Seaman and Gunnery Instructor, of the "Miranda;" and John Towel, Gunner's Mate and Gunnery Instructor, of the "Esk;" for the extraordinary precision of their fire from the 12-pounder Armstrongs, notwithstanding that there was a very considerable swell during the whole time.

I BEG to state, for the information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that the

seamen of the squadron were employed during the night of the 28th of April, in mounting the 110-pounder, and two 40-pounder Armstrong guns of "Esk" in position, 750 yards distant from the enemy's works at Pukehinahina, and in bringing up 100 rounds of ammunition for each gun.

2. Shortly after dark the artillery opened fire on the enemy's work with some small guns and cohorn, and the infantry at the advanced posts with rifles, to divert the attention of the Maoris, whilst the 68th Regiment passed their right flank, and established themselves on the ridges in rear of the pah.

3. Soon after daybreak, on the morning of the 29th, the enemy commenced firing from rifle pits on their left, on our advanced battery, and when it was light enough to see the 68th position, all the batteries opened fire, with directions to endeavour to breach the left corner of the main work.

4. The fire from the Armstrong guns and 24-pounder howitzers of the Royal Artillery was extremely good; during the day 100 rounds was fired from each of the Armstrong guns with great effect, and without a single thing going wrong; I may here state, that throughout this war the Armstrong guns have been most successful; many rounds have been fired from them, and no single accident has occurred either to those of the Royal Navy or Royal Artillery.

5. At about ten o'clock the General requested me to bring up more heavy guns; I sent Captain Robert Jenkins with 100 men, to bring out the two 25-cwt. 32-pounders of the "Miranda," with 100 rounds of ammunition for each; this service was performed in a very short period, the guns being in camp and ready for mounting by three P.M.; they were not, however, required.

6. The fire continued till near 4 P.M., when, the breach being practicable, both General Cameron and myself considered the time had arrived for assaulting the work; more especially as the day was drawing to a close, and we felt convinced, from the difficult nature of the ground in rear of the pah, that it would be impossible to prevent the enemy escaping in the night, and there seemed little doubt they would attempt this, as they tried to get away in the afternoon, but were driven back by the force in their rear.

7. The assaulting party was composed of a mixed force from the Naval Brigade and 43rd Regiment, the Naval portion of the force consisted of eighty Seamen of "Curaçoa," "Miranda," "Esk," and "Harrier," and seventy Marines of the squadron; the Officers of the Navy, with the assaulting column, were Lieutenant George G. Duff, Senior of the "Esk," Lieutenant Charles Hill, Senior of "Curaçoa," Lieutenant Klintberg, of the Swedish Navy, borne on the books of "Curaçoa," Acting Lieutenant A. J. W. Musgrave, of "Esk," Sub-Lieutenant P. R. H. Parker, of "Falcon," Mr. James Watts, Gunner of the "Miranda," and Lieutenant R. B. Gardner, R.M.A., of "Esk;" the whole under the command, and led by Commander Edward Hay, of "Harrier."

8. The remainder of the Naval Brigade (with the exception of thirty-four men detached under Lieutenant C. F. Hotham), about 200 strong, under Captain Jenkins, of "Miranda," Captain J. F. C. Hamilton, of "Esk," Lieutenant R. F. Hammick, of "Miranda," Lieutenant R. S. Hunt, of "Harrier," Mr. W. H. Tatton, Gunner of "Esk," and Mr. P. Smith, Gunner of "Harrier," with part of the troops in camp formed the supports.

9. The assaulting column was formed at the Naval Battery and advanced four deep, sailors and soldiers, led by Commander Hay and Colonel Booth, of the 43rd, to within 100 yards of the breach, where they halted under cover of a hill for a few moments to get breath; when the order was given to advance, they rushed into the work with great dash, led in the most brilliant manner by Colonel Booth, Commander Hay, and the rest of the officers; they effected a lodgment in the work and held it for some time.

10. The work was such a complication of traverses, rifle-pits and underground holes, that it was very difficult to get along at all, and impossible to move in numbers; in consequence of this difficulty, and suffering heavily from the Maoris double-barrelled guns, fired from holes and cover where it was impossible to see the enemy, and with all their leading officers killed or wounded, the men were compelled to retire.

11. The supporting column moved up close behind the assault, and many of them (all the officers), got into the work, but were driven out by the retreat of the storming party.

12. A breastwork was then thrown up on the ridge of the hill, where the assaulting column halted for breath, and a 24-pounder howitzer, two 6-pounder Armstrong guns, and some small cohorn were brought up to it. In the construction of the breastwork, and moving the guns, the Naval Brigade assisted.

13. The enemy, as was anticipated, escaped during the night. At 5 A.M. of the 30th, John Colenutt, A.B., of the "Harrier," entered the pah by himself and reported that the enemy had left it; the work was immediately occupied by the troops.

14. Lieutenant Hotham of the "Curaçoa" was detached early in the day; I enclose a copy of his proceedings, and beg again to recommend him to the favourable consideration of their Lordships.

15. It is with deep sorrow I have to refer to the casualties, which have been very great, especially amongst the officers (as at Rangiriri). Captain Hamilton, of the "Esk," was shot through the head while standing on a traverse inside the work, waving his sword and cheering his men on; he was so well known to their Lordships and the service at large, that it would be presumptuous in me to allude to the loss the country has sustained in him.

Commander Edward Hay had seen much service before in India, while serving under the late Sir William Peel and was badly wounded there; the way he led the storming party into the enemy's work was the admiration of all; he was mortally wounded there while cheering his men on, and died on the following day.

Lieutenant Charles Hill, of "Curaçoa," was a most gallant officer, he had been on shore with the men since they first landed; he was killed whilst advancing and cheering on his men.

Mr. James Watts, Gunner of "Miranda," was killed and frightfully tomahawked about the head: previous to his death he killed with his sword the native who shot Captain Hamilton.

The seamen and marines killed and wounded were all leading men of the different ships, and behaved most nobly.

The remainder of the Naval Brigade behaved with great gallantry. Captain Jenkins led the supports up to the work; but they were driven back by the retreating stormers; he succeeded in getting in himself and was one of the last to quit it.

Lieutenant Duff of "Esk" and Sub-Lieutenant Parker of "Falcon" were wounded, the former severely, while cheering the men on in the work.

Acting Lieutenant Musgrave of "Esk" was struck down in the ditch of the work, and for a short time stunned by a severe blow on the head; he behaved extremely well.

Lieutenant Klintberg, of the Swedish Navy, who has been with the "Curaçoa's" men since they first landed, behaved with much gallantry.

Lieutenant Gardner, of the Royal Marine Artillery, led his men gallantly.

Lieutenant Hammick, of "Miranda," was wounded severely, close to me, while assisting to rally the men retreating from the work.

Lieutenant Hunt, of "Harrier" and indeed every officer and man behaved to my entire satisfaction.

16. Amongst the seamen I would bring to their Lordships' special notice Samuel Mitchell, Captain of the fore-top of "Harrier" doing duty as Captain's Coxswain: he entered the pah with Commander Hay, and when that officer was wounded, brought him out, although ordered by Commander Hay to leave him and seek his own safety. I would venture to suggest that this is a fair case for a Victoria Cross.

Richard Smith, Boatswain's Mate of "Harrier," was one of the first men in the work, and he is spoken most highly of by Lieutenant Hunt of that ship.

John Noakes, Boatswain's Mate, of the "Miranda," assisted Mitchell in getting Commander Hay out of the work, and was badly wounded while endeavouring to rally the men and prevent their retreating.

John Wean, A.B., of Her Majesty's Ship "Esk," is highly spoken of for his good conduct in the assault.

James Harris, Ordinary Seaman of "Curaçoa," chased a Maori through the work, down the opposite side of the hill toward the 68th's position, and bayoneted him there amidst the cheers of the Regiment; unfortunately, in attempting to rejoin his comrades in the pah, he was shot dead close to it.

William Fox, Ordinary Seaman of "Curaçoa," who distinguished himself so much at Rangiriri, was severely wounded in the assault.

Gunner William Baker, Royal Marine Artillery, belonging to the "Curaçoa," carried a wounded man out of the pah under heavy fire.

17. Twenty-six dead bodies of Maoris have been found and buried; many more are supposed to be in the swamp they escaped through. From Lieutenant Hotham's report it will be seen that they were carrying numbers away with them when they retreated; it is likely there are more buried in the work. Six wounded were found in the pah and brought in here; three of them have since died.

18. I enclose for their Lordships' information a return of the casualties of the Naval Brigade.

*Camp Te Papa, Tauranga, New Zealand,

SIR, I HAVE the honour to report that I left Camp in front of the enemy's position at Pukehinahina yesterday morning, in command of the party detailed in the margin,* to escort Colonel Gamble, D.Q.G., across the mud flats to the rear of the enemy's position, for the purpose of communicating with Colonel Greer, of Her Majesty's 68th

* 4 petty officers, 30 seamen of No. 2 Company Naval Brigade.

Light Infantry, and having done so I was placed under Colonel Greer's orders.

Shortly afterwards, it being considered necessary to occupy a position for the purpose of preventing the escape of the enemy by the swamps and fords on the right of their position, I was ordered by Colonel Greer to reinforce a company of Her Majesty's 68th Light Infantry, under Lieutenant Cox, who was going out for that purpose, and proceeded under the direction of Mr. Baker, Interpreter, and a native guide, to a place on the beach overlooking the fords.

Placing lines of sentries to command the outlets, and finding we had not force enough thoroughly to guard the line of escape, Lieutenant Cox thought it necessary to push forward along the fern ridge, and across the swamp, taking possession of a hill commanding the line of rifle pits leading down from the right flank of the enemy's work to the swamp, distant about 250 yards, arriving there about 11 A.M.

Observing that there were none of the enemy in the trench we took possession of it, at about 12 o'clock, but found it untenable from the heavy fire of our artillery. We accordingly retired and occupied our former position, commanding the outlets and the rifle pits. On the advance of the assaulting column, a number of the enemy attempted an escape by the rifle pits and swamp.

Leaving a party to guard the hill under Ensign Ilderton, of Her Majesty's 68th Light Infantry, we crossed the swamp, took possession of the trench, and succeeded in cutting off the retreat of about 60 natives, killing about 12, and driving the remainder back into their work.

Finding that from the advance of the attacking column we were beginning to be exposed to a heavy cross fire, and not being of sufficient strength to attack the work without a breach in the flank, we withdrew the party again under cover of the hill, where we found Ensign Ilderton had been fortunate enough to intercept the retreat of a small party of natives who had succeeded in gaining the swamp at the back of the hill.

Soon after dark we were reinforced by Lieutenant Covey, with 30 men of Her Majesty's 68th Light Infantry.

About 7 P.M., a large party of the enemy attempted to come over the hill immediately in our front, but being met by a heavy volley retired apparently with loss, and dividing into two parties attempted the swamp, where they were again met by heavy volleys from the right and left; but owing to the nature of the ground, and excessive darkness of the night, it was impossible to prevent the escape of the greater number of them.

We continued in the position until daylight, constantly firing, as far as we could judge, in the direction of small parties retreating through the swamp, and apparently carrying off their dead and wounded.

As soon as day broke we advanced to the pah, and found it in the hands of the Naval Brigade, and 43rd Light Infantry, when we were directed by Colonel Greer, commanding the column, to return to our own lines.

I cannot conclude without bringing to your notice the steady and cheerful manner in which the men under my command performed their duty.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, the following copy of a further Act passed by the Legislature of the United States, extending the period for the withdrawal of goods from Public Stores and Bonded Warehouses in the United States:

An Act to amend an Act entitled "An Act to extend the time for the withdrawal of goods from Public Stores and Bonded Warehouses, and for other purposes," approved 29th February, 1864.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that all goods, wares, and merchandise in Public Stores and Bonded Warehouses, on which the duties are unpaid, and which shall have been in bond for more than one

year and less than three years, may be entered for consumption and the bonds cancelled at any time before the first day of September next, on payment of duties and charges according to the laws in force at the time the goods shall be withdrawn.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, the following copy of an Act passed by the Legislature of the United States with respect to the prohibition of sales of gold, and foreign exchange :

An Act to prohibit certain sales of gold and foreign exchange.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that it shall be unlawful to make any contract for the purchase or sale and delivery of any gold coin or bullion to be delivered on any day subsequent to the day of making such contract, or for the payment of any sum, either fixed or contingent, in default of the delivery of any gold coin or bullion, or to make such contract upon any other terms than the actual delivery of such gold coin or bullion, and the payment in full of the agreed price thereof, on the day on which such contract is made, in United States notes or national currency, and not otherwise ; or to make any contract for the purchase or sale and delivery of any foreign exchange to be delivered at any time beyond ten days subsequent to the making of such contract ; or for the payment of any sum, either fixed or contingent, in default of the delivery of any foreign exchange, or upon any other terms than the actual delivery of such foreign exchange within ten days from the making of such contract, and the immediate payment in full of the agreed price thereof on the day of delivery in United States notes or national currency ; or to make any contract whatever for the sale and delivery of any gold coin or bullion of which the person making such contract shall not, at the time of making the same, be in actual possession. And it shall be unlawful to make any loan of money or currency not being in coin to be repaid in coin or bullion, or to make any loan of coin or bullion to be repaid in money or currency other than coin.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, that it shall be further unlawful for any banker, broker, or other person, to make any purchase or sale of any gold coin or bullion, or of any foreign exchange, or any contract for any such purchase or sale, at any other place than the ordinary place of business of either the seller or purchaser, owned or hired and occupied by him individually, or by a partnership of which he is a member.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, that all contracts made in violation of this Act shall be absolutely void.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, that any person who shall violate any provisions of this Act shall be held guilty of a misdemeanour, and, on conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than one thousand dollars, nor more than ten thousand dollars, or be imprisoned for a period not less than three months nor longer than one year, or both, at the discretion of the court, and shall likewise be subject to a penalty of one thousand dollars for each offence.

Sec. 5. And be it further enacted, that the penalties imposed by the fourth section of this Act may be recovered in an action at law in any court of record of the United States, or any court of competent jurisdiction, which action may be brought in the name of the United States by any person who will sue for said penalty, one-half for the use of the United States, and the other half for the use of the person bringing such action. And the recovery and satisfaction of a judgment in any such action shall be a bar to the imposition of any fine for the same offence in any prosecution instituted subsequent to the recovery of such judgment, but shall not be a bar to the infliction of punishment by imprisonment, as provided by said fourth section.

Sec. 6. And be it further enacted, that all Acts and parts of Acts inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.

Now, therefore, after fully considering the premises, and there being no objection offered thereto, it is ordered by this Court (being the Court appointed for the confirmation of the said Provisional Order as aforesaid), that the said Provisional Order be, and the same is hereby confirmed and made Final without variation.
