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*The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Friday, July 29, 1864.*

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

WE are commanded by Her Majesty to release you from further attendance in Parliament, and at the same time to convey to you Her Majesty's acknowledgments for the zeal and assiduity with which you have applied yourselves to the discharge of your duties during the session of Parliament now brought to a close.

Her Majesty commands us to inform you that she greatly regrets that the endeavours which she made, in concert with the Emperor of the French, the Emperor of Russia, and the King of Sweden, to bring about a reconciliation between the German Powers and the King of Denmark, were not successful, and that the hostilities which had been suspended (during the negotiations) were again resumed. Her Majesty trusts, however, that the negotiations which have been opened between the belligerents may restore peace to the North of Europe.

Her Majesty, having addressed herself to the Powers who were contracting parties to the Treaty by which the Ionian Republic was placed under the Protectorate of Great Britain, and having obtained their consent to the annexation of that Republic to the Kingdom of Greece, and the States of the Ionian Republic having agreed thereto, the Republic of the Seven Islands has been formally united to the Kingdom of Greece, and Her Majesty trusts that the union so made will conduce to the welfare and prosperity of all the subjects of His Majesty the King of the Hellenes.

Her Majesty's relations with the Emperor of China continue to be friendly, and the commerce of Her subjects with the Chinese Empire is increasing.

Her Majesty has been engaged, in concert with the Emperor of Austria, the Emperor of the French, the King of Prussia, and the Emperor of Russia, in an endeavour to bring to effect an amicable arrangement of differences which had arisen between the Hospodar of Moldo-Wallachia and his Suzerain the Sultan. Her Majesty has the satisfaction to inform you that this endeavour has been successful.

Her Majesty deeply laments that the civil war in North America has not been brought to a close.

Her Majesty will continue to observe a strict neutrality between the belligerents, and would rejoice at a friendly reconciliation between the contending parties.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

Her Majesty commands us to convey to you Her warm acknowledgments for the liberal supplies which you have granted for the service of the present year, and towards the permanent defence of Her Majesty's dockyards and arsenals.

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

Her Majesty has observed with satisfaction that the distress which the civil war in North America has created in some of the manufacturing districts has to a great extent abated, and Her Majesty trusts that increased supplies of the raw material of industry may be expected from countries by which it has hitherto been scantily furnished.

The revolt of certain tribes in New Zealand has not yet been quelled, but it is satisfactory to Her Majesty to know that a large portion of the native population of those islands have taken no part in this revolt.

It has been a source of much gratification to Her Majesty to observe the rapid development of the revenues of Her East Indian Possessions, and the general contentment of the people inhabiting those extensive regions.

Her Majesty has given Her cordial assent to many measures of public usefulness, the result of your labours during the session now brought to a close.

The Act for extending to women and children employed in various trades the regulations applicable to factories in general, will tend materially to preserve the health and improve the education of those on whose behalf it was framed.

The Act for authorising the grant of Government annuities will encourage habits of prudence among the working classes, and will afford them the means of securely investing the results of their industry.

The Act for authorising a further advance for public works in some of the manufacturing districts will contribute to alleviate the distress in these districts, and will afford the means of completing many works of much importance for the health of the population.

The Act for giving increased facilities for the construction of railways will diminish the expenses attendant upon the extension of those important channels of communication.

It has afforded to Her Majesty the most heart-felt satisfaction to observe the general well-being and contentment which prevail throughout Her dominions, and to remark the progressive increase and development of the national resources, and to find that, after sufficiently providing for the public service, you have been able to make a material diminution in the taxation of the country.

On returning to your respective counties you will still have important duties to perform, essentially connected with the linking together of the several classes of the community; and Her Majesty fervently prays that the blessing of Almighty God may attend your exertions, and guide them to the object of Her Majesty's constant solicitude, the welfare and happiness of Her people.

Then a Commission for proroguing the Parliament was read; after which the Lord Chancellor said:

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

By virtue of Her Majesty's Commission, under the Great Seal, to us and other Lords directed, and now read, we do, in Her Majesty's name, and in obedience to Her commands, prorogue this Parliament to Thursday, the thirteenth day of October next, to be then here holden; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Thursday, the thirteenth day of October next.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient, that such contiguous portions of the said parishes of All Saints, Hertford, Saint John, Hertford, and Great Amwell, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Little Amwell aforesaid.

sent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of All Saints, Hertford, of the said parish of Saint John, Hertford, and of the said parish of Great Amwell, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of the Holy Trinity, situate at Little Amwell aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Little Amwell.'

"And we further represent, that it has been proposed, with the like consents of the said Richard, Baron Westbury (acting on behalf of your Majesty as aforesaid), John Villiers Stuart, Marquis Townshend, Harriet McNab, Daniel Robert McNab, Joseph Thomas Humphry, George Murray Humphry, and Harriet Parrott (so testified as aforesaid), and it would, in our opinion, be expedient that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of the said consolidated chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Little Amwell, should belong to and be exercised jointly by the Honorable and Reverend Lowther Barrington, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Watton, in the said county of Hertford, by the Reverend Charles Deedes, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Bengeo, in the said county of Hertford, by the Reverend Thomas Woodward, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Thundridge, in the said county of Hertford, and by Robert Cooper Lee Bevan, of Trent Park, in the said county of Middlesex, Esquire, their heirs and assigns.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Little Amwell, being:—

"All those several portions of the liberty of Little Amwell, within the parish of All Saints, Hertford, in the county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Rochester, of the parish of Great Amwell, in the same county and diocese, and of the parish of Saint John, Hertford, also in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within and bounded by an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary dividing the said liberty of Little Amwell from the parish of Great Amwell aforesaid, at a point in the middle of the road called Walnut Tree Walk; and extending thence first southward and then alternately south-eastward and south-westward along the said boundary, as far as a point in the middle of the road leading from Little Amwell to Amwell; and extending thence south-westward as far as a point upon the boundary dividing the said parish of Great Amwell, from the parish of Saint Margaret, Stanstead, in the same county and diocese, such point being situate at the north-west angle of such boundary, and being also situate at or near to the eastern side of a certain footpath leading from Little Amwell aforesaid to Hailey Bury; and extending thence south-eastward along the last-named boundary, following also mainly the course of the said footpath as far as the point at which the same boundary diverges to the east, at or near to the north-eastern corner of a certain occupation road leading

from Hailey-lane past the eastern and northern sides of Hailey Bury College into the turnpike road leading from Hertford to London; and extending thence south-westward, and in a direct line to a point in the middle of the said occupation road; and extending thence westward along the middle of the same road (passing to the north of Hailey Bury College aforesaid) to the junction of such road with the said turnpike road leading from Hertford to London; and extending thence, first south-eastward, then southward, and then again south-eastward, along the middle of the same turnpike road as far as a point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of a certain occupation road leading from such turnpike road to Box Wood; and extending thence south-westward to a point (in the middle of the north-eastern end of the said occupation road) upon the boundary dividing the said parish of Great Amwell from the consolidated chapelry district of Hoddesdon, in the same county and diocese; and extending thence, first north-westward, and then south-westward, along the last-described boundary to its junction (in the middle of Elbow-lane, near to the homestead called or known as the Keeper's House) with the boundary dividing the said parish of Great Amwell from the parish of Saint John Hertford aforesaid; and extending thence northward along the last-described boundary (which follows at first the middle, and afterwards the western side of the said lane) to the junction of the same boundary with the boundary dividing the liberty of Little Amwell aforesaid from the said parish of Saint John, Hertford, such point of junction being situate at or near to the junction of Elbow-lane aforesaid with the turnpike road leading from Hertford to London before mentioned; and continuing thence, still northward, along the last-described boundary (following the western side of the said turnpike road) to the point at which such boundary turns north-eastward across such turnpike road; and extending thence north-eastward along the same boundary as far as the middle of the same turnpike road; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the same turnpike road, as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-western end of a certain occupation road connecting such turnpike road with Gallows-lane; and extending thence, first eastward and then north-eastward, to and along the middle of the said occupation road, as far as a point upon the boundary dividing a certain detached portion of the said parish of Great Amwell from the parish of Saint John, Hertford, aforesaid; and extending thence, first northward (crossing Gallows-lane aforesaid), and then north-eastward along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the same detached portion of the said parish of Great Amwell from the liberty of Little Amwell aforesaid; and extending thence south-eastward along the last-described boundary as far as a point in the middle of Gallows-lane aforesaid; and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named lane to a point opposite to the middle of the south-western end of the road called Walnut Tree Walk aforesaid; and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of the last-named road, as far as the point upon the boundary dividing the said liberty of Little Amwell from the parish of Great Amwell aforesaid, where the said imaginary line commenced."

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester, of William Wagstaff, of Rhûg, near Corwen, in the county of Merioneth, Esquire, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Middleton, and of the Right Honorable Thomas, Earl of Wilton, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Prestwich (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Middleton, and of the said parish of Prestwich, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated

chapelry for the said church of All Saints, situate at Rhodes aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Rhodes.'

"And we further represent that it has been proposed, with the like consents of the said William Wagstaff and Thomas, Earl of Wilton (so testified as aforesaid), and it would in our opinion be expedient that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of the said consolidated chapelry of Rhodes, should belong to and be exercised by the rector or incumbent for the time being of the said parish of Middleton.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Rhodes being:—

"Whereas by the authority of an Order in Council of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, bearing date the twenty-second day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, and published in the London Gazette upon the sixteenth day of February in the following year, certain contiguous portions of the parish of Heston, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and of the parish of Isleworth, in the same county and diocese, were formed into a consolidated chapelry, and were assigned to a consecrated church, situate at Hounslow, in the said parish of Heston, and such consolidated chapelry was called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Hounslow.'

"Now, therefore, with the consents of The Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, the Bishop of the said diocese of London, and the Patron in right of his See, both of the vicarage of the said parish of Heston, and of the perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry or new parish of Hounslow, of the Reverend Edward Spooner, the Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Heston, of the Reverend Edward East, the Incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry or new parish of Hounslow, and of the Reverend Henry William Perry Richards, the Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Isleworth (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), and with the consent of the Dean and Canons of the Queen's Free Chapel of Saint George within her Castle of Windsor, the Patrons of the vicarage of the

said parish of Isleworth (testified by their having affixed their common or capitular seal to this representation), we humbly represent that in our opinion it would be expedient that, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this representation, the boundaries of the said consolidated chapelry or new parish of Hounslow, should be altered so as to dis sever therefrom all that portion thereof which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured green; and which heretofore formed part of the said parish of Heston; and that all the said portion of the consolidated chapelry or new parish of Hounslow aforesaid, so to be dis severed therefrom as last proposed, should be re-annexed to and should again form part of the said parish of Heston.

"And we humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"Territory proposed to be re-annexed to the parish of Heston, being:—

"So much of that portion of the consolidated chapelry or new parish of Hounslow, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, which was heretofore part of the parish of Heston, in the same county and diocese as lies to the west of an imaginary line, commencing at a point in the middle of the high road leading from Staines to London, opposite to the middle of the southern end of Wellington-lane, and extending thence northward to and along the middle of such lane, as far as the boundary which at present divides the said consolidated chapelry or new parish from the said parish of Heston, at a point opposite to the middle of the eastern end of the road known as the 'sixth private road' or Green-lane."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the ninth

day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts.

"We humbly recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, out of the common fund in the said Acts mentioned, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices described in the first schedule hereunto annexed, the annual sum set opposite to the name of each such benefice in the last column of the same schedule, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year.

"Provided always, that the grants so recommended to be made by us to the benefices of Saint Stephen Spitalfields, Holy Trinity Stockton-on-Tees, and East Stoke with Syerston and Elston, shall be paid only upon the production to us, on or before the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, of certificates under the hand of the Bishops of the respective dioceses, that a curate duly licensed by such Bishop has in each instance been employed within the parish or district during the preceding half year; and provided also, that with regard to the payment of a portion, amounting to one hundred pounds, of the grant so recommended to be made by us to the benefice of Yetminster with Chetnole, a like certificate be required that a curate has been duly employed at Chetnole.

"And we further recommend and propose that the tithes, or rent charges in lieu of tithes, described in the second schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Llanarmon yn Yâl, in the counties of Denbigh and Flint and diocese of Saint Asaph, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the sinecure rectory of Llanarmon yn Yâl, and now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Llanarmon yn Yâl.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend John Owen, Clerk, the perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of Erryrys, in the said counties of Denbigh and Flint and diocese of Saint Asaph, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes, or rent charges in lieu of tithes, described in the third schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Llanarmon yn Yâl, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the said sinecure rectory of Llanarmon yn Yâl, and now vested in us, shall, in like manner and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of Erryrys, in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of one hundred and fifty pounds now payable by us to the same perpetual curate or incumbent, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council bearing date

the eleventh day of October in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Frederick Harvey Freeth, Clerk, the perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the parish of Lyss, in the county of Southampton and diocese of Winchester, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes, or rent charges in lieu of tithes, described in the fourth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Lyss, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the Chancellorship of the cathedral church of Salisbury, and now vested in us, shall, in like manner and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Lyss, in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the stipend or customary payment heretofore payable and made by us to the said perpetual curate or incumbent in respect of the estates formerly belonging to the said Chancellorship of Salisbury Cathedral, and also in lieu of and full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of four pounds heretofore payable by us to the same perpetual curate or incumbent, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-seventh day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven; provided always, that the tithes, or rent charges in lieu of tithes, to be so vested as last-mentioned, shall be charged and chargeable at all times for ever hereafter in exoneration of all or any other hereditaments formerly belonging to the said Chancellorship, with the liability to repair and maintain the chancel of the parish church of Lyss.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Thomas Bennett Round, Clerk, the perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the parish of Rotherwick, in the said county of Southampton and diocese of Winchester, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes, or rent charges in lieu of tithes, described in the fifth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Rotherwick, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the said Chancellorship of the cathedral church of Salisbury, and now vested in us, shall, in like manner, and by the authority aforesaid be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Rotherwick, in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the stipend or customary payment heretofore payable and made by us to the said perpetual curate or incumbent in respect of the estates formerly belonging to the said Chancellorship of Salisbury Cathedral: Provided always, that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes to be so vested as last-mentioned shall be charged and chargeable at all times for ever hereafter in exoneration of all or any other hereditaments formerly belonging to the said Chancellorship with the liability to repair and maintain the chancel of the parish church of Rotherwick.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend George Edward Smith, clerk, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Owston, in the county and diocese of Lincoln (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme), that the lands and hereditaments described in the first part of the sixth schedule hereunto annexed, situate within the said parish of Owston, with their appurtenances, all which here-

ditaments and premises were conveyed to us by a deed, bearing date the tenth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and made between Richard Dawson, late of Epworth, in the county of Lincoln, but now of Elm-field-house, in the borough of Kingston-upon-Hull, Gentleman, of the first part, Godfrey Hudson, of Sandtoft, in the parish of Belton, in the said county of Lincoln, Farmer, of the second part, the said Richard Dawson, of the third part, George Fish, of Owston aforesaid, Farmer, of the fourth part, and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the fifth part, which deed is intended to be deposited in the registry of the said diocese of Lincoln, and also the lands and hereditaments described in the second part of the same schedule, likewise situate within the said parish of Owston, with their appurtenances, all which said last-mentioned hereditaments and premises were conveyed to us by a deed, bearing date the eleventh day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and made between Charles Barningham, of Ferry, in the said parish of Owston, Stonemason, of the first part, the said Reverend George Edward Smith, of Owston aforesaid, Clerk, of the second part, and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the third part, which said last-mentioned deed is also intended to be deposited in the said registry of the diocese of Lincoln, and all our estate and interest therein shall, in like manner, and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Owston, in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of thirty-nine pounds, payable by us to the same vicar or incumbent, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-second day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

"And whereas it appears to us, after duly considering the circumstances of the cases under-mentioned, to be expedient that the grants respectively recommended to be made by us to the benefices of Balderton, Camden Town, Farndon, Lyss, Milnrow, and Rotherwick, should commence and take effect from the dates hereinafter mentioned respectively; that is to say: in the case of the vicarage of Balderton, from the fourth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Camden Town, from the twentieth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; in the case of the vicarage of Farndon, from the eighteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Lyss, from the twenty-fifth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Milnrow, from the first day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two; and in the case of the perpetual curacy of Rotherwick, from the twenty-second day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the several grants hereinbefore recommended by us to be made to the said last-mentioned benefices respectively, shall commence and take effect from the said dates hereinbefore in that behalf mentioned respectively.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in the parish of Husthwaite, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York.

"Whereas, by virtue of and under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and made under the provisions of the Act of the first and second years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and six, and of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-eight, the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Husthwaite, and the perpetual curacy of the parish of Birdforth, in the said county of York, and diocese of York, will, upon the next avoidance of either of the said perpetual curacies, become united into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only.

"And whereas, it was by the same Order directed that the patrons for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of Husthwaite, and the patron for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of Birdforth, should present or nominate to such benefice alternately for ever, the patron of the said perpetual curacy of Birdforth being entitled to present or nominate for the first turn after the said union should be fully perfected.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Husthwaite have become vested in us under the

provisions of and for the purposes of the hereinbefore firstly and secondly mentioned Acts.

"And whereas the said Master, Fellows, and Scholars of Trinity College, Cambridge, are willing that the patronage of the said perpetual curacy of the said parish of Husthwaite, and the right of nominating the minister or incumbent of the church of the same parish now so vested in them as aforesaid, and also the alternate patronage of the said perpetual curacies of the said parishes of Husthwaite and Birdforth, when so united together into one benefice as aforesaid, and the alternate right so vested by the hereinbefore mentioned Order as aforesaid in the patrons for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of Husthwaite to present or nominate to such benefice should be transferred and vested in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed, upon the understanding that the income of the said perpetual curacy of the said parish of Husthwaite be augmented by us in manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Honorable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York, and of the said Master, Fellows, and Scholars of Trinity College, Cambridge, in testimony whereof the said William, Archbishop of York has hereunto affixed his signature and seal, and the said Master, Fellows, and Scholars have hereunto also affixed their common or corporate seal, we humbly recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such Order, the patronage of the said perpetual curacy of the said parish of Husthwaite, and the right of nominating the minister or incumbent of the same parish now as aforesaid vested in the said Master, Fellows, and Scholars of Trinity College, Cambridge, subject to the provisions of the said hereinbefore mentioned Order of your Majesty in Council, shall, subject to the same provisions, be transferred to and absolutely vested in the said William, Archbishop of York and his successors, Archbishops of the same See, so that the right (now by the same Order vested in them, the said Master, Fellows, and Scholars, as patrons for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of Husthwaite) to present or nominate to the benefice, formed or to be formed by the union as aforesaid, of the said perpetual curacies of the said parishes of Husthwaite and Birdforth, alternately, with the patron, for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of Birdforth, shall henceforth and hereafter be and remain vested in the said William, Archbishop of York and his successors, Archbishops of the same See for ever, in such manner that he and they shall from the day aforesaid become and be sole patron and patrons of such benefice.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act passed in the session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and thirteen, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme, for augmenting the income of the Archdeaconry of Leicester, in the diocese of Peterborough.

"Whereas it was by the said Act enacted, that so soon as conveniently might be, and by the authority therein provided (that is to say), by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying the same, any archdeaconry might, subject to the consent of the Bishop, be endowed by the annexation, either of an entire canonry, or of a canonry charged with the payment of such portion of its income as should be determined on, towards providing for another archdeacon in the same diocese, or with such last-mentioned portion of the income of a canonry, or by augmentation out of the common fund in the same Act mentioned, but not so as to raise the average annual income thereof to an amount exceeding two hundred pounds; and that no canonry should be so charged with a payment of a portion of the income thereof to any archdeacon, unless the average annual income of such canonry, after payment of such portion as aforesaid, should amount to or exceed five hundred pounds, with a proviso, that no archdeacon should be entitled to hold any endowment or augmentation or other emolument as such archdeacon, under the provisions of the same Act, unless resident for the space of eight months in every year within the diocese in which his archdeaconry should be situate, but subject to the same provisions as to licences for non-residence which are enacted with respect to incumbents of benefices by the Act relating to pluralities and residence in the same Act mentioned.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us, that the net average annual income of the said archdeaconry does not exceed one hundred and sixty-two pounds.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Francis, Bishop of Peterborough, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose, that until the Archdeaconry of Leicester shall have been endowed by the annexation thereto of a canonry in the Cathedral Church of Peterborough, there shall be paid by us out of our said common fund, to the Venerable Henry Fearon, the present archdeacon of the said archdeaconry, and to his successors in the same archdeaconry, so long as he and they shall respectively hold the same, and shall duly reside, in accordance with the provisions of the said first-recited Act, the annual sum of thirty-eight pounds on the first day of January in every year; and every such whole yearly payment shall be made only on production to us of a certificate, under the hand of the Bishop of the diocese for

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the time being, that the said Henry Fearon, or his successor, for the time being in the said archdeaconry, has duly resided as aforesaid during the the preceding year, or on the production to us of a licence of non-residence, and that the first such yearly payment shall be made on the first day of January next.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend, under the provisions of the above-mentioned Acts, the sum of nine hundred pounds; and as a security for the same, that the said Bishop do mortgage all or any part of the endowments now belonging, or which hereafter may belong, to his said see, to the said Governors, by deed, for the term of thirty-five years, or until the said sum of nine hundred pounds, with the interest for the same, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied; and that such principal sum shall be repaid, with interest, in manner following; that is to say:—From and after the expiration of the first year of the said term, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, in which year no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, the said Bishop, or his successors, shall yearly and every year pay to the said Governors, their successors or assigns, one thirtieth part of the said principal sum, until the whole thereof shall be repaid; and shall, at the end of the first and each succeeding year, pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum, or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid; and if and when it shall happen that the principal and interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall have become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors, their successors and assigns, to recover the same, and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof, by distress and sale, in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants, by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale; and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, and shall bind as well the said Charles John, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, as every succeeding Bishop of the said see, until the principal, money, and interest, costs, and charges, shall have been paid off and discharged.

“And we further recommend and propose, that the said sum of nine hundred pounds shall be paid to us, and that the receipt of our joint Treasurers for the time being, endorsed on the said mortgage deed, shall be a good and sufficient discharge to the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof; and that upon the receipt of the said sum of nine hundred pounds, the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient, towards effecting the said additions and improvements in the Episcopal house of residence aforesaid.

“And we further recommend and propose, that so soon as such additions and improvements shall have been completed, the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol for the time being shall, at his personal charge and expense, insure and keep insured the said Episcopal house of residence from loss or damage by fire, in one of the public offices of assurance in London or Westminster, to be approved by us, in a sum of not less than seven thousand pounds, and that such Bishop shall, within fourteen days after any premium for such insurance shall have become due and payable, deliver to us the receipt for the same; and that in case of any loss or damage by fire to the said house, any and every sum of money receivable under such insurance shall become and be payable and be paid to and deposited with us, in trust to be applied, and the same,

together with any interest and accumulations thereof, shall be applied by us towards the rebuilding or repairing and reinstating of the said house, or of any part thereof which may have so suffered loss or damage, in such manner as shall be determined on by us, with the concurrence of the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol for the time being.

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the herein-named Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the two several registries of the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, at Bristol and Gloucester.

## TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the Duties of Postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage payable by law, on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office."

And whereas it is expedient to alter the rates of British postage now payable upon the letters hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us, in and by the said recited Acts, and each of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order, direct, and declare as follows:

1. All letters exceeding half an ounce in weight transmitted direct or via Panama by

British packet boat between any part of the United Kingdom and any port or place on the Western Coast of South America, or transmitted direct by British packet boat between any ports or places on the said Western Coast of South America, or between any foreign ports in the West Indies, or between any ports in the British West Indies, or between any ports in the British West Indies and any foreign port in the West Indies (not in any such cases passing through the United Kingdom), under or by virtue of five several Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date, respectively the 31st day of December, 1841, the 11th day of September, 1845, the 28th day of April, 1852, the 13th day of October, 1852, and the 19th day of September, 1855, shall in lieu of being charged with postage according to the scale of weight contained in or referred to by such respective Warrants be charged with postage according to the following scale of weight, that is to say:

2. On every letter transmitted as is mentioned in clause No. 1 of this Warrant if exceeding one half of an ounce in weight and not exceeding one ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two rates of postage.

And on every letter so transmitted, if exceeding one ounce and not exceeding one ounce and one half of another ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, three rates of postage;

And on every letter so transmitted, if exceeding one ounce and one half of another ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, four rates of postage;

And for every additional half of an ounce in weight of any letter so transmitted as aforesaid, above the weight of two ounces, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, one additional rate of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of an ounce in weight shall be charged as an additional half of an ounce in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this Warrant shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under the said hereinbefore recited Warrants respectively, if not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight.

3. The term "British West Indies" used in this Warrant shall be construed to mean and include the following colonies and places, and their respective dependencies, that is to say, Antigua, Bahamas, Barbadoes, Bermuda, Berbice, Carriacou, Demerara, Dominica, Grenada, Honduras, Jamaica, Montserrat, Nevis, St. Kitts, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Tobago, Tortola, Trinidad, and Turk's Islands; and the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty for the regulation of the duties of postage.

4. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby altered, or any of the orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, regulations, conditions, or restrictions in lieu thereof, and from time to time may

appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

5. This Warrant shall come into operation on the 1st day of October, 1864.

*Fixed Light on Cape Kara.*

Also, that on and after the 10th day of July, 1864, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Cape Kara, at the east side of entrance to Saloniki bay, at the head of the gulf of the same name.

The light is a fixed light, showing red from seaward when bearing from N.  $\frac{3}{4}$  W. round by north to N.E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N.; and white from N.E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N. round by east and south to W. by S.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S. By keeping the white light in sight a vessel will clear Touzla point, but in rounding the shoal ground off Cape Kara a berth of a long mile should be given to the lighthouse.
