THE following is an extract of a Despatch from the Honourable E. M. Erskine, Her Majesty's Minister at Athens, to Earl Russell, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, dated July 22, 1864:

"The Hellenic Government have paid into my hands a sum of £658 5s. 8d., being the amount due under Schedule B of the Convention for the month of June last, on account of allowances for loss of office.

"Most of the persons residing in the Ionian Islands have already received the amounts due to them respectively; and I have taken measures to ascertain the address of those residing elsewhere who have not yet placed themselves in communication upon the subject with Her Majesty's Legation."

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted, that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within

such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has made representations, stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials shall be discontinued therein:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the tenth day of June last, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-fifth day of July instant, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said parishes shall be dis-

continued (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz.:

**LIGHTCLIFFE, HALIFAX.**—Forthwith beneath the church, and from and after the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the churchyard, with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented, and also with the exception of now existing family earthen graves which can be opened without disturbance of human remains and in which no coffin shall be interred without a covering of four feet of earth.

**SOBERTON, BISHOP WALTHAM, HANTS.**—Forthwith beneath the church, and in the churchyard from and after the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, with the exception of now existing family vaults and graves which can be opened without disturbance of human remains.

**WALCOT, BATH.**—In the Parochial Burial-ground, except in vaults and walled graves existing on the first of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, each coffin buried in which shall be embedded in charcoal and separately entombed by brickwork or masonry properly cemented:—grass or other living vegetation to be maintained on that part of the surface not occupied by walks or monuments.

**DONINGTON, NEAR SPALDING, LINCOLNSHIRE.**—Forthwith in the Parish Church, and from and after the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the churchyard, with the exception of now existing family vaults and brick graves, and reserved grave spaces.

**LITTLE STANMORE.**—Forthwith in that portion of the churchyard which lies to the east of a line drawn along the east of the walls of the church and of the building called the Monument Room, with the exception of now existing vaults and family graves which can be opened without exposing human remains, and are free from water.

**ABERDARE.**—Forthwith in the Parish Churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves constructed before the fifth of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, which are free from water, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately enclosed in masonry or brickwork properly cemented.

**LLANVAIR ARY BRYN.**—In the churchyard, except for the burial of parishioners, and the widows, widowers, parents and children of those already buried therein: also, that no grave be buried in which cannot be opened without the exposure of coffins, or the disturbance of entire bones.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's

reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyard hereinafter mentioned, from the time specified in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyard be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyard be postponed as follows; viz.:

In the churchyard of Egremont, Cumberland, to the third of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

**W**HEREAS the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that interments in the same should be discontinued, with the following modifications; viz.:

**HAYFIELD, GLOSSOP.**—Forthwith beneath the church; and in the churchyard, except in the now existing walled graves, each coffin buried in which shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by stone or brickwork, properly cemented; and in other graves for the burial of widowers, widows, or parents of those already buried in the churchyard, no such grave to be less than five feet deep, or to be opened, unless it be free from coffins or remains.

**COVENTRY.**—Forthwith in St. Peter's Church-yard, except in vaults and walled graves, which can be opened without disturbance of soil that has been buried in,—every coffin buried in which shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by stone or brickwork, properly cemented; and, except in earthen graves for the burial of widowers, widows, parents, and children of those already buried in the churchyard, no such grave to be less than five feet deep, nor opened, unless free from coffins.

**HOUGHTON REGIS, DUNSTABLE.**—Forthwith in the church; and also in all that part of the churchyard which lies on the south of a line drawn along the southside of the church; and also within four yards of the National Schools, with the exception of now existing vaults and family graves; in the remainder of the churchyard no ground to be opened which is not free from the accumulation of water, nor in which burials have taken place during the last twenty years, with the exception of now existing vaults and family graves.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the tenth day of September next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said tenth day of September.

PROVISIONAL ORDER for the formation of a Highway District, under Statute 25 and 26 Victoria, chapter 61, to be called "THE ECCLESFIELD AND BRADFIELD HIGHWAY DISTRICT."

AT the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace held by adjournment, at Rotherham, in and for the said Riding, the 1st day of July, in the year of our Lord 1864;

Whereas, the Right Honourable Lord Wharncliffe, Wilson Overend, James Wilson Rimington Wilson, William Frederic Dixon, and William Pashley Milner, Esquires, being five of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, acting in and for the said Riding (two of whom at least are resident in the district hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, the said James Wilson Rimington Wilson, and William Frederic Dixon), did, by writing, under their hands, dated the 30th day of May, 1864, require the Clerk of the Peace for the said Riding, to add to or send with the Notice required by law to be given of the holding of Courts of General or Quarter Sessions, a notice in the form thereunder written or thereunto annexed, being the form marked "A" in the schedule to a certain Act of Parliament, made and passed in the session of Parliament, held in the 25th and 26th years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the better management of Highways in England," that at the Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace therein mentioned, that was to say, at the Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, to be holden by adjournment at Rotherham, in and for the said Riding, on Friday, the 1st day of July then next, a proposal would be made to the Justices then and there assembled, to constitute all the townships, hamlets, and places within the parish of Ecclesfield, in the said Riding, that was to say, the township of Ecclesfield, comprising the several hamlets or places of Barnes Green, Butterthwaite, Birley Carr, Chapeltown, Ecclesfield Lower, Ecclesfield Upper, Grenoside, High Green and Mortomley, Hadfield House and Brush House, Low Shire Green and Hartley Brook, Oughtybridge, Southey, Upper Shire Green and Wincobank, Whitley, Wadsley, and Wadsley Bridge; and the township of Bradfield, comprising the several hamlets or places of Bolsterstone, Brightholmlee, Bradfield, Bradfield Dale, Dungworth, Fairest, Green, Gate, Holdworth, Low Bradfield, Midhope, Moorwood, Onesacre, Stannington, Storrs, Smallfield, Ughill, Wigtwizzle, and Worrall, a Highway District, for the more convenient management of highways. And the said Justices did thereby also require the said Clerk of the Peace to send by post in a prepaid letter, notices in the aforesaid form, to the Churchwardens or Overseers of every parish, township, hamlet, or place thereinbefore mentioned. And whereas, a proposal is now made to this Court, to constitute the said parish, townships, hamlets, and places aforesaid, a Highway District accordingly; and proof having been given to the satisfaction of this Court that the requisition contained in the said writing of the 30th day of May, 1864, has been duly complied with by the said Clerk of the Peace, and that all the notices required by the said Act of Parliament have been duly given and published.

Now, therefore, the Justices assembled at this present Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace (being the Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace mentioned in the said notice), in pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in them under and by virtue of the said Act of Parliament, do entertain the said proposal, and do make this Provisional Order constituting,

and do hereby provisionally constitute, all the townships, hamlets, and places within the parish of Ecclesfield, in the said Riding, that is to say, the township of Ecclesfield, comprising the several hamlets or places of Barnes Green, Butterthwaite, Birley Carr, Chapeltown, Ecclesfield Lower, Ecclesfield Upper, Grenoside, High Green and Mortomley, Hadfield House and Brush House, Low Shire Green and Hartley Brook, Oughtybridge, Southey, Upper Shire Green and Wincobank, Whitley, Wadsley, and Wadsley Bridge; and the township of Bradfield, comprising the several hamlets or places of Bolsterstone, Brightholmlee, Bradfield, Bradfield Dale, Dungworth, Fairest, Green, Gate, Holdworth, Low Bradfield, Midhope, Moorwood, Onesacre, Stannington, Storrs, Smallfield, Ughill, Wigtwizzle, and Worrall, a Highway District, under and for the purposes of the said Act of the 25th and 26th Victoria, cap. 61, and for the more convenient management of highways in the said parish, townships, hamlets, and places respectively. And further that the said Highway District shall be known by the name of "the Ecclesfield and Bradfield Highway District."

And the said Justices, in further pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in them, under and by virtue of the said Act of Parliament, do hereby further order, declare, and appoint, that the aforesaid hamlets or places, into which the said township of Ecclesfield (being a township which separately maintains its own poor), is divided, that is to say, the hamlets or places of Barnes Green, Butterthwaite, Birley Carr, Chapeltown, Ecclesfield Lower, Ecclesfield Upper, Grenoside, High Green, and Mortomley, Hadfield House and Brush House, Low Shire Green and Hartley Brook, Oughtybridge, Southey, Upper Shire Green and Wincobank, Whitley, Wadsley, and Wadsley Bridge (each of which said hamlets or places separately maintains its own highways), shall be combined for the purposes of the said Act of Parliament. And the said Justices do also declare that no separate Waywardens shall be elected for such last-mentioned hamlets and places, and that such township of Ecclesfield shall be subject to the same liabilities in respect of all the highways within it, which were before maintained by such hamlets and places separately and respectively, as if all their several liabilities had attached to the whole township. And further, that four Waywardens shall be elected by such township of Ecclesfield as a whole.

And the said Justices in further pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in them, under and by virtue of the said Act of Parliament, do hereby further order, declare, and appoint, that the aforesaid hamlets or places, into which the said township of Bradfield (being a township which separately maintains its own poor), is divided, that is to say, the hamlets or places of Bolsterstone, Brightholmlee, Bradfield, Bradfield Dale, Dungworth, Fairest, Green, Gate, Holdworth, Low Bradfield, Midhope, Moorwood, Onesacre, Stannington, Storrs, Smallfield, Ughill, Wigtwizzle, and Worrall (each of which said hamlets or places separately maintains its own highways), shall be combined for the purposes of the said Act of Parliament. And the said Justices do also declare that no separate Waywardens shall be elected for such last-mentioned hamlets and places, and that such township of Bradfield shall be subject to the same liabilities in respect of all the highways within it, which were before maintained by such hamlets and places separately, and respectively, as if all their several liabilities had attached to the whole township. And further,

that six Waywardens shall be elected by such township of Bradfield as a whole.

And lastly, the said Justices do hereby direct and appoint that the confirmation of this Provisional Order, by a Final Order, shall be taken into consideration at the Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, to be held by adjournment at Doncaster, in and for the said riding, on the 21st day of October, in the year of our Lord 1864.
