THE Queen has been graciously pleased to signify Her intention to confer the decoration of the Victoria Cross on the under-mentioned Officer, whose claim to the same has been submitted for Her Majesty's approval, for his gallant conduct in New Zealand, as recorded against his name; viz:

Regiment.	Rank and Name.	Act of Bravery for which recommended.
107th Regiment	Lieutenant-Colonel John Carstairs McNeill  Date of Act of Bravery, March 30th, 1864.	For the valour and presence of mind which he displayed in New Zealand, on the 30th of March, 1864, which is thus described by Private Vosper, of the Colonial Defence Force.  Private Vosper states that he was sent on that day with Private Gibson, of the same Force, as an escort to Major (now Lieutenant-Colonel) McNeill, Aide-de-Camp to Lieutenant-General Sir Duncan Cameron. Lieutenant-Colonel McNeill was proceeding to Te Awamutu on duty at the time. On returning from that place, and about a mile on this side of Ohanpu, this Officer, having seen a body of the enemy in front, sent Private Gibson back to bring up Infantry from Ohanpu, and he and Private Vosper proceeded leisurely to the top of a rise to watch the enemy. Suddenly they were attacked by about 50 natives, who were concealed in the fern close at hand. Their only chance of escape was by riding for their lives, and as they turned to gallop, Private Vosper's horse fell and threw him. The natives thereupon rushed forward to seize him, but Lieutenant-Colonel McNeill, on perceiving that Private Vosper was not following him, returned, caught his horse, and helped him to mount. The natives were firing sharply at them, and were so near that, according to Private Vosper's statement, it was only by galloping as hard as they could that they escaped. He says that he owes his life entirely to Lieutenant-Colonel McNeill's assistance, for he could not have caught his horse alone, and in a few minutes must have been killed.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of two Portuguese Royal Decrees, forwarded by Her Majesty's Minister at Lisbon, one of which fixes the duties on sugar imported into the Island of Madeira at the same rates as those in force in the Kingdom of Portugal.

The other Decree provides that the existing Customs' duties charged on foreign honey, molasses, and treacle, imported through the Custom House at Funchal, are to be maintained for a

period of three years.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Saint Petersburgh, enclosing translations of several Russian Imperial Ukases relating to the import duty on salt, of which the following are the more important provisions:—

The duty on foreign salt imported into Russia is fixed at 35 copecs per pood, except when imported into Archangel, at which port the existing duty is maintained.

The right to clear foreign salt, at the reduced rates of duty, at the ports of Revel, Arensburg, Kund, Hapsal, Herders, Hainash, Dagen, and Pernau, is extended to the 1st January, 1865.

### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 36.)-England - South and South-East COASTS.

### Prince Consort Shoal off Cowes.

A SHOAL, composed of gravel and shells, has lately been found by H.M.S. Prince Consort tailing on it, when anchored about  $3\frac{1}{2}$  cables E. by N. 3 N. from the Club House on West Cowes point.

The shoal is narrow, about a cable long, E.N.E. and W.S.W., and carries from 22 to 34 feet at low water springs, the least depth being towards its eastern part. It is marked by a white buoy, with the words Prince Consort Shoal on it, which has been placed in 4 fathoms, at about 33 yards northward of the 22 feet patch, with Old Castle point bearing S.E., distant nearly three quarters of a mile, and the club-house flagstaff W. by S. 3 S., a little more than one-third of a mile.

To pass northward of the shoal, keep Ryde

Knolls in the Downs.

### Pier open of Old Castle point.

Mariners are cautioned that considerable alterations have taken place in the shoals at the southern entrance of the Gull Stream, and that a knoll with only 44 fathoms on it at low water springs has been found, with South Brake buoy bearing N. by E., distant  $5\frac{1}{2}$  cables, Bunt Head buoy E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S., half a mile, and Gull Light vessel N.E.,  $2\frac{4}{10}$  miles.

Also that as little as  $4\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms at low water springs will be found about 31 cables S.S.W. from

Bunt Head buoy.
