WHEREAS the rules and practice observed for the purpose of preventing collisions at sea, which were formerly adopted by maritime nations, have proved insufficient to satisfy the requirements of modern navigation; and whereas various alterations in such rules and practice have from time to time been made by different nations, but the rules so altered have been found to be in some cases inconsistent with each other, and in other cases to have the force of municipal law only; and whereas certain regulations for the purpose aforesaid have been sanctioned by "The

Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and are contained in the Table C, in the schedule to that Act; And whereas for the purpose of correcting certain clerical errors the said regulations have, in pursuance of the provisions in the said Act contained, been modified by an Order in Council bearing date the 9th day of January, 1863, and the said regulations, so modified, are appended to the said Order, and to this Order; And whereas by virtue of the said Act and of the said Order the said regulations so appended as aforesaid, so far as relates to British and French ships and also so far as relates to certain other foreign ships when within British jurisdiction, came into operation on the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; And whereas it is provided by the same Act, that, whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that the Government of any foreign country is willing that the regulations for preventing collisions, contained in Table C in the schedule to the said Act, or such other regulations for preventing collisions as are for the time being in force under the said Act, should apply to the ships of such country when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction, Her Majesty may by Order in Council direct that such regulations shall apply to the ships of the said foreign country, whether within British Jurisdiction or not. And it is further provided by the said Act that whenever an Order in Council has been issued applying any regulation made by or in pursuance of the said Act to the ships of any foreign country, such ships shall, in all cases arising in any British Court, be deemed to be subject to such regulation, and shall for the purpose of such regulation be treated as if they were British ships: And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty, that

The Government of the United States of America

is willing that the said Regulations appended to the said Order, and to this Order, should apply to ships belonging to the United States of America, when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct,

That the said regulations appended to the said Order in Council, bearing date the ninth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-

three, and to this Order, shall from the first day of September next apply to ships belonging to

The United States of America, whether within British jurisdiction or not.

#### PRELIMINARY.

Art. 1. In the following Rules every Steam Ship which is under sail and not under steam is to be considered a Sailing Ship; and every Steam ship which is under steam, whether under sail or not, is to be considered a ship under steam.

##### RULES CONCERNING LIGHTS.

#### *Lights.*

Art. 2. The Lights mentioned in the following Articles, numbered 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9, and no others, shall be carried in all weathers, from sunset to sunrise.

#### *Lights for Steam Ships.*

Art. 3. Sea-going Steam-ships when under weigh shall carry,

(a.) *At the Foremast Head*, a bright White Light, so fixed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass; so fixed as to throw the light 10 points on each side of the ship, viz., from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on either side; and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least five miles:

(b.) *On the Starboard Side*, a Green Light so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of

the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the starboard side, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles:

(c.) *On the Port Side*, a Red Light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the port side, and of such a character, as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles:

(d.) The said Green and Red Side Lights shall be fitted with inboard screens, projecting at least three feet forward from the Light, so as to prevent these lights from being seen across the bow.

#### *Lights for Steam Tugs.*

Art. 4. Steam Ships, when towing other ships, shall carry two bright White Mast-head Lights vertically, in addition to their side lights, so as to distinguish them from other Steam Ships. Each of these Mast-head Lights shall be of the same construction and character as the Mast-head Lights which other Steam Ships are required to carry.

#### *Lights for Sailing Ships.*

Art. 5. Sailing Ships under weigh, or being towed, shall carry the same lights as Steam Ships under weigh, with the exception of the White Mast-head Lights, which they shall never carry.

#### *Exceptional Lights for small Sailing Vessels.*

Art. 6. Whenever, as in the case of small vessels during bad weather, the Green and Red lights cannot be fixed, these lights shall be kept on deck, on their respective sides of the vessel, ready for instant exhibition; and shall, on the approach of or to other vessels, be exhibited on their respective sides in sufficient time to prevent collision, in such manner as to make them most visible, and so that the Green light shall not be seen on the port side, nor the Red light on the starboard side.

To make the use of these portable lights more certain and easy, the lanterns containing them shall each be painted outside with the colour of the light they respectively contain, and shall be provided with suitable screens.

#### *Lights for Ships at Anchor.*

Art. 7. Ships, whether steam ships or sailing ships, when at anchor in roadsteads or fairways, shall exhibit, where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding twenty feet above the hull, a White Light, in a globular lantern of eight inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon, and at a distance of at least one mile.

#### *Lights for Pilot Vessels.*

Art. 8. Sailing Pilot Vessels shall not carry the lights required for other sailing vessels, but shall carry a White Light at the mast head, visible all round the horizon, and shall also exhibit a Flare-up Light every fifteen minutes.

#### *Lights for Fishing Vessels and Boats.*

Art. 9. Open Fishing Boats and other open boats shall not be required to carry the side lights required for other vessels; but shall if they do not carry such lights, carry a lantern having a Green Slide on the one side and a Red Slide on the other side; and on the approach of or to other vessels, such lantern shall be exhibited in

sufficient time to prevent collision, so that the Green light shall not be seen on the port side, nor the Red light on the starboard side.

Fishing Vessels and open boats when at anchor, or attached to their nets and stationary, shall exhibit a bright White Light.

Fishing Vessels and open boats shall, however, not be prevented from using a Flare-up in addition, if considered expedient.

#### RULES CONCERNING FOG SIGNALS.

##### *Fog Signals.*

Art. 10. Whenever there is fog, whether by day or night, the Fog Signals described below shall be carried and used, and shall be sounded at least every five minutes, viz.:

(a.) Steam Ships under weigh shall use a Steam Whistle placed before the funnel, not less than eight feet from the deck:

(b.) Sailing ships under weigh shall use a Fog Horn:

(c.) Steam Ships and Sailing Ships when not under weigh shall use a Bell.

#### STEERING AND SAILING RULES.

##### *Two Sailing Ships meeting.*

Art. 11. If Two Sailing Ships are meeting end on or nearly end on so as to involve risk of collision, the helms of both shall be put to port, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

##### *Two Sailing Ships crossing.*

Art. 12. When two sailing ships are crossing so as to involve risk of collision, then, if they have the wind on different sides, the ship with the wind on the port side shall keep out of the way of the ship with the wind on the starboard side; except in the case in which the ship with the wind on the port side is close hauled and the other ship free, in which case the latter ship shall keep out of the way; but if they have the wind on the same side, or if one of them has the wind aft, the ship which is to windward shall keep out of the way of the ship which is to leeward.

##### *Two Ships under Steam meeting.*

Art. 13. If two ships under steam are meeting end on, or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, the helms of both shall be put to port, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

##### *Two Ships under Steam crossing.*

Art. 14. If two ships under steam are crossing so as to involve risk of collision, the ship which has the other on her own starboard side shall keep out of the way of the other.

##### *Sailing Ship and Ship under Steam.*

Art. 15. If two ships, one of which is a sailing ship, and the other a steam ship, are proceeding in such directions as to involve risk of collision, the steam ship shall keep out of the way of the sailing ship.

##### *Ships under Steam to slacken speed.*

Art. 16. Every steam ship, when approaching another ship so as to involve risk of collision, shall slacken her speed, or, if necessary, stop and reverse; and every steam ship shall, when in a fog, go at a moderate speed.

##### *Vessels overtaking other Vessels.*

Art. 17. Every vessel overtaking any other vessel shall keep out of the way of the said last-mentioned vessel.

#### *Construction of Articles 12, 14, 15, and 17.*

Art. 18. Where by the above rules one of two ships is to keep out of the way, the other shall keep her course, subject to the qualifications contained in the following Article.

##### *Proviso to save special cases.*

Art. 19. In obeying and construing these rules, due regard must be had to all dangers of navigation; and due regard must also be had to any special circumstances which may exist in any particular case rendering a departure from the above rules necessary in order to avoid immediate danger.

##### *No Ship, under any circumstances, to neglect proper precautions.*

Art. 20. Nothing in these Rules shall exonerate any ship, or the owner, or master, or crew thereof, from the consequences of any neglect to carry lights or signals, or of any neglect to keep a proper look-out, or of the neglect of any precaution which may be required by the ordinary practice of seamen, or by the special circumstances of the case.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter sixty; of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventh day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter sixty; of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint John, Smallbridge, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, and also for altering the boundaries of the chapelry district of Saint James, Wardleworth, in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"Whereas, by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-third day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and duly published in the London Gazette, on the thirtieth day of November, in the same year, a part of the ancient parish of Rochdale, in the county and diocese aforesaid, was assigned as a district to the consecrated church, called Saint John, situate at Smallbridge, in the said parish of Rochdale, and such district was called 'The Chapelry District of Saint John, Smallbridge.'

"And whereas the said chapelry district of Saint John, Smallbridge, is reputed to have since become, under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty,

chapter one hundred and four, a new parish of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven.

"And whereas by the hereinbefore mentioned Order of your Majesty in Council, a further part of the said ancient parish of Rochdale was assigned as a district to the consecrated church, called Saint James, situate at Wardleworth, in the said parish of Rochdale, and such district was called 'The Chapelry District of Saint James, Wardleworth.'

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it seems to us to be expedient, that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John, Smallbridge, and also the boundaries of the said chapelry district of Saint James, Wardleworth, should be altered in the manner hereinafter described.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester, and, in right of his see, the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Rochdale, of the Reverend John Edward Nassau Molesworth, Doctor in Divinity, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Rochdale, and as such vicar or incumbent, the patron both of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Saint John, Smallbridge, and of the perpetual curacy of the said chapelry district of Saint James, Wardleworth, of the Reverend Robert Keningale Cook, the incumbent of the said perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Saint John, Smallbridge, and of the Reverend Robert Strettell Rowan, the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said chapelry district of Saint James, Wardleworth (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that in our opinion it would be expedient, that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John, Smallbridge, and also the boundaries of the said chapelry district of Saint James, Wardleworth, should be respectively altered, so as to dis sever and disannex from such last-mentioned chapelry district, and so as to include within the said new parish of Saint John, Smallbridge, all that part of the said chapelry district of Saint James, Wardleworth, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and which is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon colored green; and that the said part of the said chapelry district of Saint James, Wardleworth, so to be dis severed and disannexed therefrom as aforesaid, should, from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this representation, and without any other assurance in the law, be included within the limits of the said new parish of Saint John, Smallbridge, and should become and be and form part of such new parish.

"And we humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The territory proposed to be dis severed and disannexed from the chapelry district of Saint James, Wardleworth, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, and to be included within the limits of the new parish of Saint John, Smallbridge, in the same county and diocese, being :—

"All that piece or parcel of land called or known as Grindrod Bank, containing, by admeasurement, three acres two roods and thirty-two perches, be the same more or less, lying and being within the limits of the chapelry district of Saint James, Wardleworth, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, and belonging to John Smith Entwistle, of Foxholes, in the said county of Lancaster, Esquire, which said piece or parcel of land is bounded on the south-west by the park or pleasure ground of Foxholes aforesaid, belonging to the said John Smith Entwistle; and on the north-west, north, and north-east, by a certain other piece or parcel of land, called or known as 'Will Rhodes,' belonging to the same John Smith Entwistle; and on the south-east and east by the stream, called or known as Hey Brook, which divides the said piece or parcel of land, called or known as Grindrod Bank, from the land (also belonging to the said John Smith Entwistle) within the said new parish of Saint John, Smallbridge, upon which stands a certain cotton mill, called or known as Hamer Hall Mill.'

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the seventh day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Stockton-upon-Tees, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of

Stockton-upon-Tees, hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship) should be constituted a separate district, in manner hereinafter set forth.

“And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Stockton-upon-Tees have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein-mentioned Acts.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Stockton-upon-Tees which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that such district shall be named ‘The District of Saint James, Stockton-upon-Tees.’

“And we further recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us in each and every year to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, and that upon any building within such district being duly licensed by the bishop of the diocese for the performance of Divine service according to the provisions of the same Act, there shall be paid by us in like manner to such minister the further sum of fifty pounds, making together the sum of two hundred pounds, and that so soon as a church or chapel shall have been erected within such district, and shall have been approved by us and consecrated as the church or chapel of such district and for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish the further sum of one hundred pounds, making in the whole the sum of three hundred pounds, and that the said sums of one hundred and fifty pounds, two hundred pounds, or three hundred pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first such payment or a proportionate part thereof shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the license of such minister or of such building or of the consecration of such church or chapel as aforesaid, as the case may be, and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish: Provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such

annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

“The District of Saint James, Stockton-upon-Tees, being:—

“All that part of the parish of Stockton-upon-Tees within the limits of the municipal borough of Stockton-upon-Tees, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham, which is situate generally to the east of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary of the said municipal borough at a point in the middle of the southern end of Norton Bridge which carries the road leading from Norton to Stockton-upon-Tees over Lustring Beck; and extending thence first southward and thence south-westward along the middle of the said road as far as a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of Station-street; and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of the said street as far as a point opposite to the middle of the northern end of Croft-street; and extending thence southward to and along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Major-street; and continuing thence still southward across Major-street to the middle of the northern end of Haffron-street; and extending thence in the same direction along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Garbutt-street; and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Brown-street; and extending thence first south-westward and thence southward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Portrack-lane; and continuing thence still southward across the last-named lane to the middle of the northern end of Maritime-street; and extending thence still southward along the middle of the last-named street to a point opposite to the middle of the western end of Commercial-street; and extending thence eastward to and along the middle of the last-named street to its eastern extremity; and continuing thence still eastward and in a direct line across a certain timber-yard in the occupation of Messrs. Pearce and Lockwood, of Stockton-upon-Tees, to a boundary stone inscribed ‘S.-upon-T., St. J., D. 1864,’ and placed against the wall or fence which divides such timber-yard from the line of the West Hartlepool Railway; and continuing thence still eastward and in a direct line to a point in the middle of the said line of railway; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the same line of railway to the boundary on the northern bank of the River Tees of the municipal borough of Stockton-upon-Tees aforesaid.”

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has been, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act, transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron of the vicarage of the parish out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and such incumbent and

patron have respectively assented to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-four; have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls within the consolidated chapelry of Saint Mark, Woolston, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas the Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, for the time being, is, in right of his see, the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Mark, Woolston.

"And whereas the Bishop of the same diocese for the time being is also, in right of his see, the patron of the rectory of the parish of Saint Mary, in the town and county of the town of Southampton, and in the said diocese of Winchester.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Charles Richard, the present Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester has, as Bishop of the diocese and as patron as aforesaid of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Mary, Southampton, and of the perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Mark, Woolston, proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the income of the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Mary, Southampton, should be apportioned between the rector or incumbent thereof, and the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry of

Saint Mark, Woolston, in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honorable and Most Reverend Charles Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consent of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified as aforesaid), and with the consent of the Reverend Mark Cooper, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Mary, Southampton (testified as aforesaid), we humbly recommend and propose that the whole of the glebe lands belonging to the rectory of the said parish of Saint Mary, Southampton, and now under lease, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly Gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette, become and for ever thereafter be charged and chargeable with one annuity or yearly rent charge of one hundred and fifty pounds in favour and for the sole and proper use and benefit of the incumbent for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Mark, Woolston. And with such consents as aforesaid, testified as aforesaid, we further recommend and propose that the said annuity or yearly rent charge of one hundred and fifty pounds shall be payable and paid by the rector or incumbent for the time being of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Mary, Southampton, or his assigns, unto the incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Mark, Woolston, or to such person or persons as he, the said incumbent, may from time to time appoint to receive the same, by equal half-yearly payments, on the fourteenth day of June and the fourteenth day of December in each and every year, and that the first of such half-yearly payments shall be made on the fourteenth day of December now next ensuing, and that the said incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Mark, Woolston, shall have all such and the like powers of entry and distress and other (if any other) remedies for recovering payment of the said annuity or yearly rent charge, or so much thereof as shall in any one half-year remain unpaid by the space of twenty-one days after the day hereinbefore named for payment thereof as landlords may have with respect to rent reserved upon a lease and in arrear.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any part thereof, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for amending an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and duly published in the London Gazette on the sixteenth day of December in the same year, for substituting a money payment for certain property belonging to the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Worcester.

"Whereas by the said Order of your Majesty in Council, a certain scheme which had been prepared by us, and which was therein fully set forth, having been approved by your Majesty in Council, was, by and with the advice of your Majesty's said Council, ratified, and the same and every part thereof became effectual in law from and after the time of the publication of the said Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid.

"And whereas it was in the said scheme stated (*inter alia*) that it had been made to appear to us, by reason of the great antiquity of the said cathedral church, and of the want of due reparation thereof in times past, that it had become necessary for the due sustentation thereof to expend thereon forthwith such a sum as could not be wholly charged on the parties then entitled to the receipt and enjoyment of the divisible corporate revenues of the said Dean and Chapter, and it was in the said scheme also stated that we had ascertained that the sum so required to be forthwith expended in such repairs, and in effecting improvements conducive to the security of the fabric of the said cathedral church, amounted to fifteen thousand three hundred pounds, or thereabouts.

"And whereas it was and is one of the purposes of certain Acts of Parliament specified in the said scheme, by and under the authority whereof the said scheme was prepared by us, and was ratified by your Majesty in Council as aforesaid, to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls, and we were of opinion that it would ultimately conduce to the improvement of the said fund that certain manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments then belonging to the said Dean and Chapter should become and be transferred to and vested in us and our successors, and the same became, upon the passing and publication of the said Order of your Majesty in Council, transferred to and vested in us accordingly.

"And whereas by the said scheme it was recommended and proposed, that as a part consideration for such transfer and conveyance, there should be forthwith paid and expended by us, in effecting such repairs of the said cathedral church and improvements as aforesaid, the sum of fifteen thousand three hundred pounds aforesaid.

"And whereas, in entering into the arrangements with the said Dean and Chapter which were set forth in the said scheme, it was estimated by us, and we remain satisfied that the improvement derivable and accruing therefrom to the said

fund, so applicable to making better provision for the cure of souls as aforesaid, will be of very considerable amount.

"And whereas the said sum of fifteen thousand three hundred pounds has been now wholly expended in the execution of works conducive to the security of the fabric of the said cathedral church, according to plans and specifications prepared by the architect of the said Dean and Chapter, and approved by us.

"And whereas it has been now ascertained, by the actual execution of such works, and by the more complete investigation of the state of the fabric which has thereupon become practicable, that the said estimate of fifteen thousand three hundred pounds was inadequate and insufficient to provide for the whole of the said necessary repairs of the said cathedral church, notwithstanding that a considerable sum of money in addition thereto, and in excess of the yearly revenues of their fabric fund, has been appropriated by the Dean and Canons towards the sustentation and improvement of the same church.

"And whereas the said Dean and Canons have applied to us for a contribution of two thousand pounds, in aid of the further reparation of the said cathedral church, towards which repair and towards the restoration and embellishment of the same church the said Dean and Canons have individually subscribed to an extent in the aggregate equal to the said last-mentioned sum, and other contributions of very considerable amount have been either paid or promised towards the same object by other parties residents in the county of Worcester, and others.

"And whereas if, at the time when we entered into the arrangements with the Dean and Chapter of Worcester which were set forth in the scheme so passed by us and ratified by your Majesty in Council as aforesaid, it had been made to appear to us that the reparation required by the fabric of the said cathedral church was as extensive as it has now proved to have been, we should have been willing and prepared to recommend and propose to your Majesty in Council that the sum to be appropriated by us for or towards the execution of the works so required as such part consideration as aforesaid, should have been larger by the said sum of two thousand pounds than was then actually recommended and proposed as aforesaid.

"And whereas it was, in the scheme so passed by us and ratified by your Majesty in Council, also recommended and proposed that nothing therein contained should prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters therein contained, in accordance with the Acts of Parliament therein mentioned, or any of them.

"And whereas, under all the circumstances of the case, we deem it just and expedient that the provisions of the scheme so passed by us and ratified by your Majesty in Council as aforesaid, should be altered and amended in manner herein-after set forth.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that for and towards the further repair and sustentation required by the said cathedral church as aforesaid, there shall be paid by us a further sum of two thousand pounds, together with interest on the same, or upon the balances thereof which may from time to time remain in our hands, after the rate of three pounds per cent. per annum, to be calculated from the day upon which any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette: Provided always, that the works, the cost of which

shall be defrayed out of such sum of two thousand pounds, or the interest thereon; shall be such as we may consider necessary or desirable for the sustentation of the fabric of the said cathedral church, and be executed according to plans and specifications to be approved by us, and to our satisfaction.

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Worcester.

"We humbly recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, out of the Common Fund in the said Acts mentioned, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices described in the first schedule hereunto annexed, the annual sum set opposite to the name of each such benefice in the last column of the same schedule, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year.

"Provided always, that the grants so recommended to be made by us to the benefices of Beaminster with Holy Trinity; Saint Oswald, Durham; Saint Paul, Bunhill-row, London; Saint Barnabas, King-square, London; and Shadforth; shall be paid only upon the production to us, on or before the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, of certificates under the hand of the Bishops of the respective dioceses, that a curate duly licensed by such Bishop has in each instance been employed within the parish or district during the preceding half year; and provided also that the said several grants so recommended to be made by us as last-mentioned to the benefices of Beaminster with Holy Trinity; Saint Oswald, Durham; Saint Paul, Bunhill-row, London; Saint Barnabas, King-square, London; and Shadforth; shall continue in force so long only as may to us appear to be expedient under the circumstances affecting the respective cures, in favour of which the same conditional grants are so recommended and proposed.

"And we further recommend and propose that the two several rent charges, chief rents, or annual sums of eight pounds two shillings and six pence, and thirteen pounds four shillings and two pence, issuing out of and charged upon certain lands situate within the township of Northowram, in the parish of Halifax, in the county of York, and diocese of Ripon, which rent charges were conveyed to us by a deed, bearing date the twelfth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and made between Isaac Green, of Horley-green, in the said parish of Halifax, Gentleman, of the first part; Thomas Parker, of Horley-green-place, in the same parish, Salesman; Henry Whitaker, of Horley-green-place aforesaid, Fishmonger; Robert Midgeley, of Salterbe, in the said township of Northowram, Worsted Spinner;

John Walshaw, of the same township, Dyer; and John Goodyear, of Shilden, in the said parish of Halifax, Stone Merchant, of the second part; and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England; of the third part; which deed is intended to be deposited in the Registry of the diocese of Ripon; and all our estate and interest therein, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Saint Thomas, Charlestown, in the same county of York, and diocese of Ripon.

"And we further recommend and propose that the messuage, lands, hereditaments, and premises described in the second schedule hereunto annexed, situate at Darnall, in the parish of Sheffield, in the county and diocese of York, which were conveyed to us by a deed, bearing date the eighth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and made between James Crossland, of Sheffield aforesaid, Grocer, Chandler, and Soap Boiler, and the Reverend Thomas Crossland, of Milford, near Belper, in the county of Derby, Clerk, of the one part; and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the other part; together with the right of way or road, which is also conveyed to us by the same lastly mentioned deed, and is therein more particularly described, shall, in like manner, and by the authority aforesaid, be conveyed to, and become absolutely vested in, the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Darnall aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that all our reversionary estate and interest in the messuage, lands, hereditaments, and premises described in the third schedule hereunto annexed, situate within the parish of Llanelwedd, in the county of Radnor, and diocese of Saint David's, now belonging to the prebend of Llanelwedd, in the collegiate church of Brecon, shall, in like manner, and by the authority aforesaid, be conveyed to, and become absolutely vested in, the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the said parish of Llanelwedd.

"And whereas it appears to us, after duly considering the cases undermentioned, to be expedient that the grants respectively recommended to be made by us to the benefices of Saint Paul, Bunhill-row, London; Christ Church, Saint George's-in-the-East; Saint Philip, Stepney; Saint Thomas, Stepney; and Turton, should commence and take effect from the dates hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Paul, Bunhill-row, London, from the twenty-fifth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Christ Church, Saint George's-in-the-East, from the twelfth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Philip, Stepney, from the first day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Thomas, Stepney, from the twelfth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; and in the case of the perpetual curacy of Turton, from the first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the several grants hereinbefore recommended by us to be made to the said last-mentioned benefices respectively, shall commence

and take effect from the said dates hereinbefore in that behalf mentioned respectively.

"And we further recommend and propose, that we may be authorised and empowered to pay out of the Common Fund aforesaid, on behalf of the benefices specified in the fourth schedule hereunto annexed, such annual sums as may be necessary for discharging the yearly instalments, which in respect of interest and principal monies may, from and after the dates set opposite to the names of the said benefices respectively in the fourth column of the same schedule, become from time to time due and owing, on account of certain mortgages of the said several benefices, which by certain deeds, bearing the respective dates set forth in the fifth column of the same schedule, have been effected

under the provisions of the Acts known as Gilbert's Acts, enabling the Governors of the bounty of Queen Anne for the augmentation of the maintenance of the poor clergy, to lend money for the purpose of providing residences for the clergy.

"And we further recommend and propose, that if at any time it shall appear desirable to us that any lands, tithe, or other hereditaments, should be substituted for the annual sums hereinbefore mentioned, or any of them, or any part thereof, nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such substitution, or any other measure relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts.

"Whereas the several benefactions, consisting of sums of cash or of land, tithe, rent-charges, or other hereditaments, which are mentioned in the fourth column of the schedule hereunto annexed, have been paid over to us in favour of, or have been otherwise secured to, the several benefices set forth in the first column of the same schedule respectively, upon condition that certain capital sums hereinafter mentioned should be appropriated

by us to the said several benefices respectively, and upon further condition that, in respect of such of the said benefactions as consist of cash, or such part or parts thereof as shall from time to time remain in our hands, there shall be paid by us to the incumbents for the time being of the said benefices respectively, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year, the yearly sums respectively specified and set forth in the sixth column of the same schedule, or a proportionate part of each of such annual sums.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered to appropriate out of the Common Fund, created by the herein firstly mentioned Act, to each of the several benefices specified in the first column of the said schedule hereunto annexed, respectively, the capital sum set against the name of each such benefice in the fifth column of the same schedule, and that such capital sums respectively, or any part or parts thereof, may be paid and applied by us towards the purchase or acquisition for such livings respectively, or any one or more of them, of any land, tithe, or other hereditaments, which may appear to us to be suitable for annexation to such benefices respectively, or towards defraying the cost of providing suitable parsonage houses for the same; and that, in the meantime, there shall be allowed and paid by us, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May, and the first day of November in each year, to the incumbents for the time being, of the said several benefices respectively, in respect of such capital sums, or of such part or parts thereof as shall remain from time to time unapplied towards such purposes as aforesaid, the several yearly sums specified in the seventh column of the said schedule, and therein set against the names of the said several benefices respectively, or such parts of the said several yearly sums respectively as shall bear a proportion to the parts of the said several capital sums last mentioned, so remaining unapplied as aforesaid, corresponding with the proportion or proportions which the amounts of the said several yearly payments respectively bear to the amounts of the said respective capital sums so specified in the fifth column as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Saint Alphage, Greenwich, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Saint Alphage, Greenwich, hereinafter-mentioned and described (which part does not at present contain within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship), should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas a sum of five thousand pounds, three pounds per centum consolidated bank annuities, has been contributed and transferred to our account and into our name in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England by the Reverend George Blisset, of East Wells, in the county of Somerset, Clerk, upon the understanding hereinafter set forth, that is to say, that in consideration of such contribution and transfer we should provide and pay to or for the maintenance of the minister of such district when constituted, and so soon as the same district shall have become a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes under the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, then of the perpetual curate of such new parish, a yearly sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, and should also make a grant out of our Common Fund of a like sum of one hundred and fifty pounds per annum for the maintenance of the same minister, or perpetual curate, and that the whole right of patronage of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and when such district

shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, then of the said new parish, should be assigned (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) to the said George Blisset, his heirs and assigns, in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Saint Alphage, Greenwich, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, be constituted, and become and be a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Paul, Greenwich.'

"And we further recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us, out of our Common Fund, in each and every year to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly-mentioned Act, and so soon as such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, then to the perpetual curate thereof the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds by equal half yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or perpetual curate as aforesaid, and that in case a vacancy in the ministry of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May, or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of any annual sum or sums then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish or, instead of any part of such annual sum or sums, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate and his successors, nothing herein, or in any other scheme contained, shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, and so soon as the same district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, then of the said new parish, and of the perpetual curate thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said George Blisset, his heirs and assigns, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures

relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

“SCHEDULE.

“The District of Saint Paul, Greenwich, being:—

“All that part of the parish of Saint Alphege, Greenwich, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of London, which is situate to the north of an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary dividing such parish from the parish of Saint Paul, Deptford, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the centre of the bridge (called Deptford-bridge), which carries the road leading from Deptford to Blackheath over the stream known as the River Ravensbourne, otherwise Deptford Creek; and extending thence first eastward and then south-eastward along the middle of the said road as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-western end of South-street:—And all which said part of the parish of Saint Alphege, Greenwich aforesaid, is also situate generally to the west of another imaginary line commencing at the last-described point in the middle of the road leading from Deptford to Blackheath, opposite to the middle of the south-western end of South-street; and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of the said street as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-western end of Blisset-street; and extending thence still north-eastward to and along the middle of the last-named street as far as a point opposite to the middle of the eastern end of Green-lane; and extending thence westward to and along the middle of the said lane to its junction with South-street aforesaid; and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with the Greenwich-road; and extending thence north-westward across the last-named road to and along the middle of Prince of Orange-lane to the junction of the last-named lane with a public highway (consisting in part of a footway, and in other part of a carriageway and footway), called ‘Straight’s Mouth;’ and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Straight’s Mouth aforesaid to its junction with the eastern end of Roan-street; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of sixty-six yards or thereabouts to a point opposite to the south-eastern end of the wall which forms the western boundary of the building and ground known as ‘The Grey Coat School,’ such wall being also the outer wall of the dwelling-house appropriated to the master of the said school; and extending thence north-westward to and along the middle of such wall or fence as far as the junction of the same wall or fence with the wall or fence which bounds the southern and western sides of the burial-ground belonging to the parish church of Saint Alphege, Greenwich; and extending thence first south-westward and then generally north-westward along the middle of the last-described wall or fence to a point in the middle of Lamb-lane, opposite to the middle of the northern end of such last-described wall or fence; and extending thence first eastward and then northward along the middle of the last-named lane to its junction with Bridge-street; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Church-street; and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named street to its northern extremity; and continuing thence in a straight line and

in the last-mentioned direction as far as the northern boundary of the said parish of Saint Alphege, Greenwich, in the middle of the River Thames.”

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the said secondly-mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the said parish of Saint Alphege, Greenwich (out of which parish it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken); and certain observations and objections which have been offered and taken by the said Incumbent, have been laid before Her Majesty in Council, together with the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has, notwithstanding such observations and objections, been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

“Whereas the several benefactions, consisting of cash, or of land, tithe, rent charge, or other hereditaments, which are mentioned in the fourth column of the schedule hereunto annexed, have been paid over to us in favour of, or have been otherwise secured to, the several benefices set forth in the first column of the same schedule, respectively, upon condition that certain capital sums, hereinafter mentioned, should be appropriated by us to the said several benefices respectively.

“Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered to appropriate out of the Common Fund, created by the herein firstly mentioned

Act, to each of the several benefices specified in the first column of the said schedule hereunto annexed, respectively, the capital sum set against the name of each such benefice in the fifth column of the same schedule; and that such capital sums, respectively, or any part or parts thereof, may be paid and applied by us towards the purchase or acquisition for such livings, respectively, or any one or more of them, of any land, tithe, or other hereditaments which may appear to us to be suit-

able for annexation to such benefices, respectively, or towards defraying the cost of providing suitable parsonage houses for the same.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient, that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Lawrence, Reading, and of the said parish of Saint Mary, Reading, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of the Grey Friars, situate in the parish of Saint Lawrence, Reading aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, and the patron in right of his see, both of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Lawrence, Reading, and of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Mary, Reading (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Lawrence, Reading, and of the said parish of Saint Mary, Reading, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of the Grey Friars, situate in the parish of Saint Lawrence, Reading aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of the Grey Friars, Reading'; and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of the said consolidated chapelry of the Grey Friars, Reading, should belong to, and should be exercised jointly by, the Reverend John Ball, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Lawrence, Reading, by the Reverend Peter French, the present incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the district parish of the Holy Trinity, Burton-upon-Trent, by John Neale, of Reading aforesaid, Solicitor, by the Venerable William Whitmarsh Phelps, Archdeacon of Carlisle, and by John Simonds, of Reading aforesaid, Banker, their heirs and assigns, for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of the Grey Friars, Reading, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Saint Lawrence, Reading, in the county of Berks, and in the diocese of Oxford, and also all that portion of the adjoining parish of Saint Mary, Reading, in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within, and are bounded by, an imaginary line,

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme, for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Ashton-in-Makerfield, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Chester, and out of the parish of Saint Thomas in Ashton-in-Makerfield, in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Ashton-in-Makerfield, and of the said parish of Saint Thomas in Ashton-in-Makerfield, hereinafter mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine Worship), should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas a piece or parcel of land containing two statute acres or thereabouts, situate at Haydock, in the said parish of Saint Thomas in Ashton-in-Makerfield (except the mines and minerals lying and being under such land), has been granted and released unto us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, as and for an endowment for the minister of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted.

"And whereas it is estimated that the annual value of the piece or parcel of land aforesaid is not less than forty pounds.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that upon the constitution of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, the minister thereof will, under and by virtue of an Act passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend an Act passed in the fourth year of Her present Majesty, intituled 'An Act for the Division of the Rectory of Winwick, in the County Palatine of Lancaster.'" be entitled to receive a sum of forty pounds per annum arising out of and charged upon the tithes or commutation in lieu thereof arising out of the township of Haydock, and forming part of the endowments of the

vicarage of the said parish of Saint Thomas in Ashton-in-Makerfield.

"And whereas the patron and the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Ashton-in-Makerfield have entered into an engagement with us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, to grant and annex to the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, when and so soon as the same shall be duly constituted, as an additional endowment, a sum of twenty pounds per annum, to be charged upon and to be secured out of the tithes or tithe commutation rentscharge belonging to the last-named rectory.

"And whereas, in order to further augmenting the permanent endowment of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, certain persons have contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England a sum of eight hundred pounds sterling, and we have in respect thereof and of certain accumulations of interest which have accrued thereon since the date of such payment, agreed and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, to the minister of the said district, when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, the yearly sum of twenty-eight pounds five shillings and eight pence.

"And whereas the said two acres of land (except the mines and minerals lying and being thereunder as aforesaid) and the said sum of twenty pounds per annum and the said sum of eight hundred pounds sterling have been or are to be so granted, secured, contributed, and paid respectively as aforesaid upon the understanding that we should appropriate out of the Common Fund created by the firstly herein-named Act the capital sum of one thousand pounds, as hereinafter mentioned, in further augmentation of the permanent endowment of the said district, and for the benefit of the minister of the said district, when duly licensed as before mentioned, and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said parish of Ashton-in-Makerfield, and of the said parish of Saint Thomas in Ashton-in-Makerfield, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint James Haydock.'

"And we further recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered to appropriate out of the Common Fund before referred to a capital sum of one thousand pounds in aid of the endowment of the district so recommended to be constituted, and for the benefit of the minister thereof for the time being, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, and that such

capital sum or any part thereof may be paid or applied by us towards the purchase or acquisition, for the endowment of such district, of any land, tithe, or other hereditament which may appear to us to be suitable for annexation thereto; and that in the meantime there shall be allowed and paid by us, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of the said district, when duly licensed as aforesaid, in respect of such capital sum, or such part thereof as shall remain from time to time unapplied towards such purposes as aforesaid, the annual sum of thirty-three pounds six shillings and eight pence, or such a part thereof as shall bear the same proportion to the whole of such annual sum as the part of the said capital sum so remaining unapplied as aforesaid bears to the amount of the whole of such capital sum.

“And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the rector or incumbent for the time being of the rectory of the said parish of Ashton-in-Makerfield.

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

“The District of Saint James Haydock being:—

“All that portion of the parish of Ashton-in-Makerfield, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Chester, and also all that portion of the parish of Saint Thomas in Ashton-in-Makerfield, in the same county and diocese, which are situate to the south and west of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish of Ashton-in-Makerfield from a detached portion of the parochial chapelry or new parish of Billinge, in the same county and diocese, at the point where the brook called ‘The Goyt’ enters the lake called ‘Carr Mill Dam,’ and extending thence south-eastward along such boundary, following thereby the middle of the said brook, as far as a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed ‘H. for a distance of seventy-four yards or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of a certain footpath connecting Robinson’s-lane aforesaid with the Ashton and Saint Helen’s turnpike-road, and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of such footpath (passing to the south of Pew Fall Colliery) to its junction with the said turnpike-road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the same turnpike-road for a distance of one hundred and fifteen yards or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of a certain other footpath leading to North Florida and Haydock, such last-mentioned point being situate at a distance of two hundred and ninety-three yards or thereabouts to the north-east of the third milestone from Saint Helen’s on the said turnpike-road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-described footpath as far as the boundary (near to North Florida aforesaid) dividing the said parish of Ashton-in-Makerfield from the parish of Saint Thomas in Ashton-in-Makerfield aforesaid, and extending thence first northward and then north-eastward along the said boundary as far as a point in the middle of Mill Field-lane, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named lane to its junction with Haydock-lane (east), and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named lane as far as a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of Withins-lane, and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of the last-named lane to its junction with the high-road leading from Haydock to Newton, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said high-road for a distance of three hundred and twenty yards or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of Vista-lane, and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of the last-named lane as far as a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of a certain footpath leading from such last-named lane to Crow-lane, and extending thence first south-eastward to and along the middle of the last-described footpath and then south-westward along the middle of the same footpath as far as the boundary (near to Hathern Covert) which divides the said parish of Saint Thomas in Ashton-in-Makerfield from the new parish of Saint Peter Newton-in-Makerfield, in the same county and diocese.”

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act, been transmitted to the respective incumbents and to the respective patrons of the churches of the said parishes of Ashton-in-Makerfield and of Saint Thomas in Ashton-in-Makerfield (out of which parishes it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken), and such respective incumbents and patrons have severally consented to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty by and with the like advice is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chester.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

"All that portion of the new parish of Saint Mark, Whitechapel, in the county of Middlesex,

and in the diocese of London, which is situate to the south of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing such new parish from the parish of Saint Botolph, Aldgate, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of Royal Mint-street; and extending thence eastward; along the middle of the same street to its junction with Cable-street; and continuing thence still eastward along the middle of the last-named street to the boundary dividing the said new parish of Saint Mark, Whitechapel, from the parish of Saint George-in-the-East, in the same county and diocese; and continuing thence still eastward along the last-described boundary, as far as the point where it diverges from the middle of Cable-street aforesaid.

"And whereas it appears to us that the lands specified in the schedule annexed to this scheme are necessary for the enjoyment of the episcopal residence at Addington, and are such as it is contemplated by the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, should be attached to the residence and should be held by the Archbishop exclusively of, and in addition to, the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, which, by the provisions of the same Act, are to be assigned as the endowment of his said See, for the purpose of securing the statutory income named for such Archbishop.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that immediately upon the publishing in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any legal conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published Order, the lands specified in the schedule annexed to this scheme shall become and be attached to, and form part of, the residence of the Archbishop of Canterbury, at Addington, in the county of Surrey, and shall be held and enjoyed by the said Archbishop, and his successors in the See of Canterbury irrespectively of and in addition to the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, which may hereafter be from time to time assigned to the said Archbishop or his successors, as the permanent endowment of the See, for the purpose of securing the statutory income of the Archbishoprick, viz., fifteen thousand pounds per annum.

"And we further recommend that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in compliance with the said recited Act, or any other Acts of Parliament.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Saint Mary, Gateshead, hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship), should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Saint Mary, Gateshead, have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein mentioned Acts.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Saint Mary, Gateshead, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon

and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, be constituted and become and be a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint James, Gateshead.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that in respect of the local claim upon the hereditaments and premises hereinbefore mentioned to have become vested in us under and for the purposes of the herein mentioned Acts, there shall be paid by us in each and every year to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, the sum of one hundred pounds, and that so soon as a church shall have been erected within such district, and shall have been approved by us and consecrated as the church of such district, and for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the further sum of one hundred pounds, making in the whole the sum of two hundred pounds, and that the said two sums of one hundred pounds each shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November, in each and every year, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next, after the day of the date of the licence of such minister, or of the consecration and approval of such church as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable by us shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish: Provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate, and his successors, nothing herein, or in any other scheme contained, shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and so soon as the same shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, then of the said new parish and of the nomination or appointment of the minister or perpetual curate thereto shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham, and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from

recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint James, Gateshead, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Saint Mary, Gateshead, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham, which is situate to the north of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish from the chapelry of Heworth, in the parish of Jarrow, in the county and diocese aforesaid, at a point in the middle of the Sunderland-road at or near to the Felling turnpike-gate, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said road to a point on the southern boundary of the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Gateshead, in the county and diocese aforesaid, at the junction between the Sunderland-road aforesaid and High-street:—And all which said part of the parish of Saint Mary, Gateshead aforesaid, is also situate generally to the east of another imaginary line commencing at the said last-described point on the southern boundary of the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Gateshead aforesaid, and extending thence first north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary, and then north-westward along the eastern boundary of the said new parish to the point in the middle of East-street, where such last-mentioned boundary diverges to the south-west, and continuing thence still north-westward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Sun-street, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named street, and (passing under the line of the North-Eastern Railway) along the middle of Hawks-lane as far as a point in the last-named lane opposite to the middle of the south-eastern end of Maiden-lane, and extending thence north-westward to and along the middle of the last-named lane (crossing the road which gives access to the Gateshead Park Iron Works) to the junction of the same lane with the head of Maiden-stairs, and continuing thence north-westward along the middle of Maiden-stairs aforesaid, to a point in the middle of the South Shore-road, opposite to the middle of the foot or north-western end of the same stairs, and extending thence north-eastward for a distance of twenty yards or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named road to a point opposite to the middle of the head or south-eastern end of the stairs known as 'Haggies Ferry,' and extending thence north-westward to and along the middle of the last-named stairs to their foot or north-western extremity, and continuing thence still north-westward, and in a direct line to the northern boundary of the said parish of Saint Mary, Gateshead, in the middle of the river Tyne."

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Paignton, in the county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular part of the said parish of Paignton [which is hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship)] should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Paignton have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the hereinmentioned Acts.

"And whereas a sum of three thousand pounds has been contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England, by the Reverend John Roughton Hogg, of Torquay, in the said county of Devon, clerk, to be applied in the erection of a church for the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and in the erection of a house of residence for the minister who shall be appointed and licensed to such district.

"And whereas the said John Roughton Hogg has also granted and conveyed to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and our successors two acres of land situate within the proposed limits of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted as the sites of the said proposed church and of the house of residence for the minister thereof.

"And whereas the said sum of three thousand pounds and the said two acres of land have been

so contributed and paid, granted, and conveyed respectively as aforesaid upon the understanding that we should provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments the annual sum hereinafter mentioned to the minister of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district and of the nomination of the minister thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Paignton which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Mary the Virgin, Collaton.'

"And we further recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us, out of the common fund referred to in the hereinmentioned Acts, in each and every year to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first of such payments, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or the first day of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister as aforesaid, and that in case a vacancy in the ministry of such district shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister succeeding to such district: Provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister of the said district, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

borough, in accordance with the Acts of Parliament in that case made and provided:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes,

without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials shall be discontinued therein :

The Governor has directed the publication of the following letter he has received from Vice-Admiral Kingcome, Commander-in-Chief, respecting the navigation of Fraser River. The suggestion contained in the early part of Admiral Kingcome's letter will be carried out, and a Light Ship will, in addition, be placed on the Sand Heads.

SIR,

I DEEM it right to bring under your notice that in coming to this place yesterday, I did not find any marks, except the two outermost Buoys, for the Channel from the Sand Heads to New Westminster, and that it was only through the ability and intimate local knowledge of Mr. Titcomb, Pilot, that the Tribune was enabled to reach this port.

As it must be of vast importance to the future commercial prosperity of British Columbia, that the approach to New Westminster should be made as easy of access and free from danger as possible, and the presence of the Tribune (drawing 19 feet 6 inches) in these waters proving, most conclusively, that direct communication with New West-

minster can be carried on by ocean ships of large tonnage, I would submit for your Excellency's consideration the expediency of having the Channel carefully examined, and marked out by large spar buoys, distinguished by different colours, placed on the banks or edge of the Shoal water on each side, and securely moored with running chains, on the plan suggested by Captain Richards, late in charge of the Admiralty survey of these coasts. The narrowest part of the Channel and the shoalest water is about midway between Garry Point and the Sand Heads, and here I think two well marked beacons should be placed on the land, in such a position that when in line they would lead over that part of the bar where the deepest water is to be found.

With the aid of a powerful steam-tug, ships can reach New Westminster with facility, for the approach to the entrance of the Fraser River possesses many advantages over that of the Thames. In the first place, the water is much smoother, and it is not exposed to any sea such as that raised in the North Sea by easterly gales, and which, in many instances, has caused the loss of ships.

Secondly, there are no outlying sands, and the Channel is not near so tortuous, and marks can be placed on the land, which on the Thames is nearly impossible.

Thirdly, the weather is much clearer, and the position of a ship more easily fixed.

Fourthly, the anchorage in English Bay is far preferable to that in the Downs.

In both rivers, ships must wait for the tides, and with the same, or even half the precautions in the Fraser that are used in the Thames, a perfect stranger would have no difficulty in taking ships, drawing from 19 to 20 feet, to New Westminster.
