

western extremity of St. Pietro island, on the south-west coast of Sardinia.

The light is a *fixed* white light, varied by a *flash* every *minute*. It is elevated 436 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 28 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the first order.

The tower is said to stand in lat. $39^{\circ} 8' 43''$ N., long. $8^{\circ} 14' 19''$ East of Greenwich, or about 2' east of that of the Admiralty Charts.

Fixed Light at Port Longone.

Also, that a *fixed* white harbour light would be shown from San Giovanni point at Port Longone, island of Elba, at 46 feet above the sea, and visible 8 miles.

Fixed Light at Port Ferraio.

Also, that a *fixed* white harbour light would be exhibited from Fort Gallo, near the Sanità Marittima, at Port Ferraio. The light is placed at an elevation of 21 feet above the sea.

Fixed Light on Pianosa Island.

Also, that a *fixed* white light would be exhibited from the battery west of the port at the island of Pianosa. The light is 78 feet above the sea, and visible 10 miles.

Nab Light Vessel.
