**W**HEREAS by the Naval Agency and Distribution Act, 1864, it was enacted (among other things) that the several shares of any money in the several cases in the said Act enumerated distributable among the officers and crew of any of Her Majesty's ships-of-war should be paid to the persons entitled thereto, in such manner and subject and according to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as might from time to time be directed by Order in Council:

And whereas it was by the said Act also enacted that Her Majesty in Council might from

time to time make such orders as might seem meet for the better execution of the said Act:

And whereas it was by the said Act further enacted that the said Act should commence on such day, not later than the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, as Her Majesty in Council should think fit to direct:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf, by the said Act, or otherwise, in Her vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:

1. This Order and the Naval Agency and Distribution Act, 1864, shall commence from and immediately after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

2. All money distributable among the officers and crew of any of Her Majesty's ships-of-war, within the meaning of the said Act, shall be paid either into the Bank of England to the credit of Her Majesty's Paymaster-General, or into the hands of an official accountant (belonging to the Commissariat or some other Department), appointed for the purpose by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, or by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

3. The Commissioners of Greenwich Hospital shall from time to time pay into the Bank of England, to the credit of Her Majesty's Paymaster-General, all sums certified by the Accountant-General of the Navy to have been paid to claimants and others proving themselves entitled to shares of any such money distributable as aforesaid, as was before the 1st day of June, 1829, paid into Greenwich Hospital.

4. Before any money distributable as aforesaid is actually distributed, notification shall be given by advertisement inserted in the London Gazette, under the direction of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

5. If the share of any person of any money distributable as aforesaid is not duly claimed within six years after it is payable to him, it shall be deemed unclaimed, and shall be dealt with accordingly.

6. Notwithstanding that any such share has been forfeited, or is unclaimed, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty may, if they see good cause, pay the same out of the naval prize cash balance.

7. All accounts relative to any money distributable as aforesaid (whether the same became distributable before or after the commencement of the present Order) shall be deemed finally closed at the expiration of forty years from the date of distribution.

8. Where it is made to appear to the satisfaction of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty that any person entitled to a share of any money distributable as aforesaid, is, from his state of mind, incompetent to the management of his affairs (not being, however, found or declared lunatic in course of law), the whole or any part of such share may be paid over, under the direction of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, to the wife or relative or other person having the care and maintenance of such incompetent person, to be applied for his maintenance and benefit.

9. Any assignment made by a warrant officer of any money distributable as aforesaid shall be void, unless it truly expresses the consideration-money actually paid by the person in whose favour it is made to the person making it, and upon any

such assignment there shall be paid so much money only as appears to have been actually paid as consideration for the same.

10. In the subsequent provisions of this Order, the term "subordinate officer," "seaman," or "marine," includes every person belonging to Her Majesty's naval service, or being a supernumerary attached thereto, except commissioned and warrant officers.

11. The share of any subordinate officer, seaman, or marine of any money distributable as aforesaid shall not be paid to any person other than such subordinate officer, seaman, or marine himself, or the person named in an order drawn by him as hereinafter prescribed.

12. Every such order shall be drawn on a printed form issued for the purpose to the drawer by the Accountant-General of the Navy.

13. Every such order shall be drawn in favour of some one or other of the following persons, by name:—

The drawer's wife.  
 „ father or mother.  
 „ son or daughter.  
 „ brother or sister.

14. Every such order shall be signed by the drawer in the presence of the person who is to certify according to such directions as may be subjoined to the form of order.

15. Every such order shall be irrevocable during the life of the person in whose favour it is drawn.

16. Nothing in the present Order in Council shall affect any order drawn by a subordinate officer, seaman, or marine before the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.

17. If on, or at any time after, the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, a licensed agent or his representative has a lawful claim against the share of any subordinate officer, seaman, or marine, of any money distributable as aforesaid, in respect of advances made by such agent before the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, the claims shall be duly discharged under the direction of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty as nearly as may be, as if the said Act had not been passed.

18. Payments of shares of money, distributable as aforesaid, at places where there are not any Naval Accountants, shall be made upon remittance bills by any officer of the revenue, and the amounts so paid shall be repaid to the respective Departments of the Revenue in the same manner as at present, subject to such alterations as the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty may from time to time direct; and in all cases of remittance bills made out and not paid, owing to the death of the party or other cause, such bills shall be returned to the Accountant-General of the Navy to be cancelled.

19. An account shewing all the receipts and expenditure on account of money distributable as aforesaid, made up to the thirty-first day of March, in each year, and signed by the Accountant-General of the Navy, shall be annually laid before the House of Commons.

And the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the fifth and sixth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the law of Copyright," it is among other things enacted, that it shall not be lawful for any person not being the proprietor of the copyright, or some person authorized by him, to import into any port in the United Kingdom, or into any other part of the British possessions, for sale or hire, any printed book first composed, or written, or printed and published in any part of the United Kingdom wherein there shall be copyright, and reprinted in any country or place whatsoever out of the British dominions; And whereas by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British Possessions abroad," books, wherein the copyright is subsisting, first composed or written or printed in the United Kingdom, and printed or reprinted in any other country, are absolutely prohibited to be imported into the British possessions abroad; And whereas by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the tenth and eleventh years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the law relating to the protection in the Colonies of works entitled to copyright in the United Kingdom," it is enacted, that in case the Legislature or proper legislative authorities in any British possession shall be disposed to make due provision for securing or protecting the rights of British authors in such possessions, and shall pass an Act or make an Ordinance for that purpose, and shall transmit the same in the proper manner to the Secretary of State, in order that it may be submitted to Her Majesty, and in case Her Majesty shall be of opinion that such Act or Ordinance is sufficient for the purpose of securing to British authors reasonable protection within such possession, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, if she think fit so to do, to express Her Royal approval of such Act or Ordinance, and thereupon to issue an Order in Council declaring that so long as the provisions of such Act or Ordinance continue in force within such colony, the prohibitions contained in the aforesaid Acts, and hereinbefore recited, and any prohibitions contained in the said Acts, or any other Acts, against the importing, selling, letting out to hire, exposing for sale or hire, or possessing foreign reprints of books first composed, written, printed, or published in the United Kingdom, and entitled to copyright therein, shall be suspended so far as regards such colony: And whereas an Act was passed by the Governor, Council, and Assembly of Saint Vincent and its dependencies, No. 602, entitled, "An Act to authorise the importation into the Government of the Island of Saint Vincent and its dependencies, of books being foreign reprints of books first composed or written, or printed or reprinted or published in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and in which there may be any copyright," which

said Act is therein directed to be, and is, herein-after cited as "The Copyright Act, 1852," whereby due provision was made for securing and protecting the rights of British authors in the said island, and whereas Her Majesty expressed Her Royal approval of the same:

And whereas Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, and by the authority of the said recited Act of the Session of Parliament held in the tenth and eleventh years of Her Majesty's reign, did, on the eighteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, order that so long as the provisions of the said Act of the Legislature of the said island should remain and continue in force within the said island, all prohibitions in the said hereinbefore recited Acts of the Imperial Parliament, or in any other Acts thereof contained, against the importing into the said island, or against the selling, letting out to hire, or possessing therein foreign reprints of books first composed, written, printed, or published in the United Kingdom, and entitled to copyright therein, should be suspended so far as regarded the said island; And whereas since the making of the said Order in Council of the eighteenth of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, a certain other Act has been passed by the Governor, Council, and Assembly of St. Vincent, No. 805, entitled "An Act to amend the Copyright Act, 1852," whereby due provision is made for securing and protecting the rights of British authors in the said island; and whereby it is enacted that the said Act (No. 805), and the Copyright Act, 1852, shall be read and construed together as one Act, and that the said Act (No. 805) may be cited as "The Amended Copyright Act, 1864," and that the said Act, and the said "Copyright Act, 1852," may be cited together as "The Copyright Acts, 1852 and 1864;" And whereas Her Majesty has expressed Her Royal approval of the said "Amended Copyright Act, 1864:"

And whereas Her Majesty is of opinion that the said "Copyright Acts, 1852 and 1864," are sufficient for the purpose of securing to British authors reasonable protection within the Island of Saint Vincent:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, and by the authority of the said recited Act of the Session of Parliament held in the tenth and eleventh years of Her Majesty's reign, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that so long as the provisions of the said "Copyright Acts, 1852 and 1864," shall remain and continue in force within the said Island of Saint Vincent, all prohibitions in the said hereinbefore recited Acts of the Imperial Parliament, or in any other Acts thereof contained against the importing into the said island, or against the selling, letting out to hire, or possessing therein foreign reprints of books first composed, written, printed, or published in the United Kingdom, and entitled to copyright therein, shall be suspended so far as regards the said island:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury and the Right Honourable Edward Cardwell, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**W**HEREAS by the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted, that, "Her Majesty may, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time reduce all or any of the dues for the time being payable in respect of existing or future lighthouses, buoys, or beacons, for the time being under the management of the General Lighthouse Authorities," therein mentioned (that is to say, the Corporation of the Trinity House of Deptford Strond, the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, and the Port of Dublin Corporation):

"And may also, by and with the like advice, from time to time increase or vary any of such dues, so that no dues payable in respect of any lighthouse, buoy, or beacon existing at the time when the said Act came into operation, should be made to exceed the amount which had at any period, previous to such time, been received in respect thereof, or to which the said dues might during any part of such period as last aforesaid lawfully have been raised:"

And whereas it is by the said Act further enacted, that "Tables of all Light Dues, and a copy of the Regulations for the time being in force in respect thereof, shall be posted up at all Custom-houses within the United Kingdom, and that each of the said General Lighthouse Authorities shall from time to time, as occasion requires, furnish copies of such Tables and Regulations to the Commissioners of Customs in London, and to the principal officers of Customs resident at all

places where Light Dues are collected on account of such Lighthouse Authority, and that such copies shall be posted up by the Commissioners at the Custom-house in London, and by such officers at the Custom-houses of the places at which they are respectively resident:"

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 26th day of June, 1855, Her Majesty did approve of certain Consolidated Tables therein referred to of Light Duties levied by the said General Lighthouse Authorities respectively:

And whereas, by various subsequent Orders in Council, Her Majesty has approved of certain variations and abatements from the Light Duties comprised in the said Tables, and also of certain new Light Duties:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that it is expedient to revise and amend the aforesaid Consolidated Tables of Light Duties:

And whereas new Consolidated Tables of Light Duties levied by the said General Lighthouse Authorities respectively, in the form hereunto annexed, together with certain abatements, regulations, and exemptions contained therein, have been submitted for Her Majesty's approval:

And whereas the said last-mentioned Consolidated Tables, and the said abatements, regulations, and exemptions contained therein, appear to be proper and reasonable:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve, and doth hereby approve, the said new Tables of Light Duties, and the said abatements, regulations and exemptions submitted as aforesaid.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-first day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate at Emery Down, in the chapelry of Lyndhurst, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church called Christ Church, situate at Emery Down aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said chapelry of Lyndhurst, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Christ Church, Emery Down.'

"And with the like consent of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified as aforesaid), we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Christ Church, Emery Down, being:—

"All that part of the chapelry of Lyndhurst, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of

Winchester, which is situate to the west and north of an imaginary line commencing at a boundary stone inscribed 'E. D., Ch. Ch. D.C., 1864, No. 1,' and placed upon the boundary dividing such chapelry from the parish of Minstead, in the same county and diocese, at the point where the said boundary crosses the southern side of Silver-lane; and extending thence, south-eastward, and in a straight line, across the grounds belonging to the mansion house called or known as 'Northerwood,' to the north-eastern corner of such house; and continuing thence, still south-eastward, along the north-eastern end of the same house to its south-eastern corner, and extending thence, south-westward, in a direct line, again crossing the grounds belonging to Northerwood to a boundary stone inscribed 'E. D., Ch. Ch. D.C., 1864, No. 2,' and placed on the eastern side of the road leading from Ringwood to Lyndhurst, at a point opposite to the middle of the south-western extremity of the fence which divides the Northerwood New Forest Inclosure from the said grounds belonging to Northerwood; and extending thence, first south-westward, to the middle of the said road, and then, south-eastward, along the middle of the same road for a distance of eighty-seven yards or thereabouts, to its junction near the Swan Inn, with the road leading from Lyndhurst to Christ Church; and extending thence, first westward and then southward, along the middle of the last-described road as far as a point opposite to the eastern corner of the dwelling-house called Cuffnal's West Lodge, in the occupation of Mrs. Hargreaves, and numbered 362 upon the tithe commutation map of the said chapelry of Lyndhurst, and upon the map hereunto annexed; and extending thence, south-eastward, and in a straight line to the said eastern corner of the last-described dwelling-house, and continuing thence in the same direction to a boundary stone inscribed 'E.D. Ch. Ch. D.C. 1864, No. 3,' and placed on the southern side of Pinkney-lane, at a point opposite to the middle of the northern extremity of the fence which divides Pinkney Farm from the Butts Lawn Inclosure; and extending thence, south-westward, along the southern side of Pinkney-lane aforesaid, to Pinkney-lane End, and continuing thence in the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of seven hundred and twenty yards, or thereabouts, to a boundary stone inscribed 'E.D. Ch. Ch. D.C. 1864, No. 4,' and placed on the western boundary of the said chapelry of Lyndhurst, at a point where such boundary crosses the southern fence of the inclosure in Gritnam Wood, numbered 419 on the maps aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fourth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints, situate at Lydgate, in the chapelry of Cross Stone, in the parish of Halifax, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said chapelry of Cross Stone, and of the chapelry of Todmorden, in the parish of Rochdale, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population, which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective chapelries.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said chapelry of Cross Stone and of the said chapelry of Todmorden should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, situate at Lydgate aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon, of the Right Honourable Henry John, Viscount Palmerston, First Lord of your Majesty's Treasury, acting on behalf of your Majesty as the patron in right of the Crown of the vicarage of the said parish of Halifax, of the Venerable Charles Musgrave, Archdeacon of Craven, the vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage of the parish of Halifax aforesaid, and as such vicar or incumbent the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said chapelry of Cross Stone, of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester, and the patron in right of his see of the vicarage of the said parish of Rochdale, and of the Reverend John Edward Nassau Molesworth, Doctor in Divinity, the vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage of the parish of Rochdale aforesaid, and as such vicar or incumbent the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said chapelry of Todmorden (in testimony of which consents they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said chapelry of Cross Stone and of the said chapelry of Todmorden which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of All Saints, situate

at Lydgate aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints, Harley Wood.'

"And we further represent that it has been proposed, with the like consents of the said Henry John, Viscount Palmerston, acting on behalf of your Majesty as aforesaid, of the said Charles Musgrave, the said James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester, and the said John Edward Nassau Molesworth (so testified as aforesaid), and it would in our opinion be expedient that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of the said consolidated chapelry of All Saints, Harley Wood, should belong to and should be exercised by the said Charles Musgrave, as the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Halifax aforesaid, and by his successors, vicars or incumbents of the same vicarage, for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints, Harley Wood, being:—

"All that portion of the chapelry of Cross Stone, in the parish of Halifax, in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon, which is situate to the south-west of an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary dividing such parish from the new parish of Saint John, Holme, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, at a point in the middle of the road, called the 'Stiperden Bank,' leading from Burney to Hebden Bridge, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of such road to its junction with Hawkstones Road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named road as far as a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of Eastwood-road, and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of the last-named road, as far as a point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of Windy Harbour-lane, and extending thence south-westward to and along the middle of the said lane to its junction at the most eastern corner of Whirlaw Common, with a certain bridle road, leading along the eastern side of the said common to Whirlaw-lane, and continuing thence still south-westward along the middle of the said bridle road to its junction with Whirlaw-lane aforesaid, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of two hundred yards, or thereabouts, to a point in the middle of Bent's Clough, and extending thence in a direction generally south-eastward, along the middle of the said clough to its junction with Oak Hill Clough, and extending thence in a direction generally south-westward along the middle of the last-named clough to its junction with the River Calder; and continuing thence still south-westward in a direct line (crossing the said river and crossing the Burnley-road), to a point on the boundary which divides the said chapelry of Cross Stone from the chapelry of Todmorden, in the parish of Rochdale, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester aforesaid, which said point is distant forty-seven yards, or thereabouts, to the north-west of the centre of the north-western side of the Todmorden National School building. And also all that portion of the said chapelry of Todmorden, which is situate to

the north of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing such chapelry from the chapelry of Cross Stone as aforesaid, at a point in the centre of Scatcliffe Bridge, which carries over the said River Calder a certain road leading past Scatcliffe to Royd House, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-described road as far as the centre of the bridge which carries such road over Scatcliffe Clough, and continuing thence still south-westward along the middle of the said clough to a boundary stone, inscribed "H. W. A. S. C. C. 1864," and placed at the south-western termination of such clough, and extending thence in a direct line due south-west to a point near Sour Hall, in the middle of the road leading from Todmorden past the said Hall to Bernshaw Tower, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of forty-eight yards, or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of the road, called Woodfield Bottom, and extending thence south-westward to and along the middle of the last-named road to its junction with Loggerhead-lane, and continuing thence still south-westward along the middle of such lane, and also along the middle of the lane, called 'Back o' th' Edge,' to the junction at 'Clough Foot,' of the last-named lane, with the turnpike-road, called 'Dules Gate,' leading from Todmorden to Bacup, and continuing thence first westward, then south-westward, and then north-westward along the middle of the last-described road as far as the boundary which divides the said chapelry of Todmorden from the consolidated chapelry district of Saint John, Bacup, in the county of Lancaster, and diocese of Manchester aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the said dioceses of Ripon and Manchester.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-four; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third

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and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-four; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls within the new parish of Shotton-with-Haswell, heretofore part of the parish of Easington, and situate in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham, and within the new parish of the Holy Trinity, South Hetton, heretofore part of the same parish of Easington, and situate within the same county and diocese of Durham.

"Whereas the Bishop of Durham for the time being is patron in right of his see of the rectory of the said parish of Easington, and is also in the same right patron of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Shotton with Haswell, and also of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, South Hetton.

"And whereas the Reverend James Manisty, Clerk, the present rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Easington, did by indenture bearing date the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and made under the provisions of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eight, and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-seven, and with such consents as are required by the same acts, demise, and lease to Matthew Forster, of Bellesize House, Hampstead, in the county of Middlesex, Esquire, Percival Forster, of the same place, Esquire, and John Walker, of Bradley Hall, in the county of Durham, Esquire, for a term of forty-one years from the tenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the mine and seam of coal called 'The Hutton Seam', lying under a certain portion of the glebe lands, belonging to the rectory of the said parish of Easington, such portion of glebe and premises being particularly set forth and described in the said indenture of lease, the counterpart whereof is registered and deposited with us as contemplated by the said lastly mentioned Acts, and being also set forth and described in the schedule hereto annexed, together with such rights, easements, and facilities for working the same mine and seam of coal, and for carrying away the produce thereof as in the same indenture are mentioned, but subject always to the reservation of certain royalties, or rents, and money payments to be paid to or on account of the said rector or incumbent and his successors, and to be received, and invested, and applied by us the said Commissioners, subject to the provisions of the two Acts lastly mentioned.

"And whereas there is by the said lease reserved a dead or minimum annual rent or payment by the lessees to, or on account of, the lessor of five hundred and fifty pounds.

"And whereas certain lands and hereditaments, situate within the limits of the ancient parish of Easington aforesaid, have become vested in us for the purposes and subject to the provisions of the said firstly and lastly hereinmentioned Acts.

"And whereas a desire has been expressed to us by the Right Reverend Charles, the present Bishop of the said diocese of Durham, and also by the said James Manisty, the present rector or incumbent as aforesaid of the rectory of the said parish of Easington, and it appears to us to be expedient that arrangements should be made in manner hereinafter mentioned for apportioning

the income of the rectory of the said parish of Easington between the rector or incumbent for the time being of such rectory and the several incumbents for the time being of the said new parishes of Shotton with Haswell and the Holy Trinity, South Hetton, respectively; and also that, in consideration of such apportionment, the rector or incumbent for the time being of the rectory of the said parish of Easington should be relieved from the burden of certain yearly sums now chargeable on him as such rector or incumbent, to wit, a yearly sum of five pounds payable to the Healmote Courts of Durham, and a yearly sum of five pounds payable to the rector and churchwardens for the time being of the parish of Gateshead, for the poor of that parish, and a certain fee farm rent of four pounds per annum, granted from the Crown, and due to certain pensioners out of the rectory of Easington, and a certain quit rent of two pounds three shillings and fourpence per annum due to the Kepier Grammar School at Houghton-le-Spring, in the said county of Durham, and that the said rector or incumbent should also be relieved from the burden of a certain yearly decreasing payment to the Commissioners of Loans on Public Works, in respect of monies advanced to a former rector of Easington, for the purpose of the drainage of lands belonging to him as such rector, which last-named payment amounted, during and in respect of the past year, to fifty-two pounds sixteen shillings and tenpence.

"And whereas we are also of opinion that the grants in augmentation of the income of the incumbents of the said new parishes of Shotton with Haswell and the Holy Trinity, South Hetton, which are hereinafter recommended and proposed, should be made.

"And whereas a house of residence for the incumbent of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, South Hetton, has been provided, by a gift thereof from the Reverend Henry George Liddell, but upon the understanding that a house of residence for the incumbent of the new parish of Shotton with Haswell aforesaid should be provided by us, in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York, and of the said Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham, and of the said James Manisty, the now rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Easington (testified by their having respectively signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any other conveyance or assurance in the law, all the mines and minerals, quarries, and beds, situate, lying, and being under the surface of the portion of glebe land hereinbefore and in the said indenture of lease mentioned and set forth, and described in the said schedule hereto annexed, with the benefit and profit of the rents, royalties, and other reservations, reserved or made payable as aforesaid by the same lease, shall be transferred from the said rector of Easington and his successors, and shall become and be vested in, and for ever thereafter belong to, the incumbents for the time being of the two several new parishes of Shotton with Haswell and the Holy Trinity, South Hetton, aforesaid, as tenants in common, and not as joint tenants; and that all monies received and to be received by us in respect of such minerals or beds which, according to the provisions of the said lastly-mentioned Acts,

are to be treated as capital, shall, instead of being held by us in trust for and invested on account of and for the benefit of the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Easington for the time being, be held by us, and be invested and applied, *mutatis mutandis*, in the manner contemplated by the said lastly-mentioned Acts, on behalf and for the benefit of the several incumbents for the time being of the said new parishes of Shotton with Haswell and the Holy Trinity, South Hetton, respectively, in equal moieties and proportions; and that with a view to providing immediately an adequate maintenance for the several incumbents of the said new parishes of Shotton with Haswell, and the Holy Trinity, South Hetton, a payment calculated after the rate of three hundred pounds per annum, shall, on the first day of November next, be made by us out of our Common Fund, to each of such incumbents, in respect of the period between such last-mentioned date and the twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and that on the first day of May and the first day of November in every year, during a period of twenty-nine years, calculated from the said first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, there shall be paid by us to the incumbent for the time being of each of such new parishes, the yearly sum of two hundred and ninety pounds, diminishing in each year by the amount of ten pounds, until such yearly payment shall, by such annual diminution, have become reduced to nothing.

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us out of our said Common Fund, such a sum or sums of money, not exceeding one thousand four hundred pounds, as we shall consider necessary for providing for the incumbent of the said new parish of Shotton with Haswell and his successors, a house which shall in our opinion be fit and suitable for his and their permanent residence.

"And we further recommend and propose, that so long as the Rector of Easington for the time being shall be liable for the payment of the said yearly sums, so payable by him as aforesaid to the authorities of the Healmote Courts at Durham, and to the rector and churchwardens of the parish of Gateshead, and also to the Commissioners of Loans on Public Works, and to the Kepier Grammar School at Houghton-le-Spring aforesaid respectively, the amount of such payments or payment, if only one remain, shall be payable, and paid to him by us out of our Common Fund aforesaid; and that such such sums or sum, as the case may be, shall be due to such rector, and receivable from us on the first day of May and the first day of November in every year, upon proof being furnished to us of the previous payment by such rector of the annual sums or sum so due from him as aforesaid.

"And we hereby further and lastly recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures, relating to the several matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

The SCHEDULE referred to in the foregoing Scheme.

"All that coal mine and seam of coal, as well opened as unopened, called 'The Hutton Seam,' lying and being within and under, or which can or may be wrought or gotten, in, forth, or out of that portion of the glebe lands of the rectory of Easington aforesaid, which is situate within a

ring fence, and lying westward of the turnpike road leading from Sunderland to Stockton, and containing three hundred and ninety-six acres or thereabouts, commonly called 'The Hall Field Estate.'

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the first and second years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and six; of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-eight; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two; duly prepared and certified to Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the first and second years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and six; of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-eight; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two; have prepared, and now humbly certify to your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for uniting the benefice (being a rectory) of All Hallows, Lombard-street, in the city of London, with the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, with Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, in the said city of London, and for the other purposes hereinafter mentioned.

"Whereas by the lastly hereinbefore recited Act, it was enacted that two or more contiguous benefices within the metropolis (as defined by the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twelve), might from time to time be united without regard in any case to population or aggregate yearly value, and without limitation as to the same, and that every such union should be effected in manner therein-after provided. And by the same Act it was also enacted that whenever it should appear to the bishop of the diocese of London, that an union of benefices might with advantage to the interests of religion be effected within his diocese, he might cause a commission to be issued, authorising the persons to be therein named to report upon the expediency of the proposed union, and that if the return to the commission should recommend an union the bishop should cause proposals for a scheme based upon the terms recommended to be prepared for effecting the union, which proposals, with the consent thereto in writing of the patrons

of each of the benefices effected, should be transmitted by the bishop to the churchwardens of each parish proposed to be united, in order that the same might be considered by the inhabitants in vestry assembled, who were to notify their assent or objections to, or suggestions for the modification of the same, and that the said bishop should cause such proposals as finally approved by him to be transmitted to us, who should thereupon cause to be prepared a scheme for carrying out the proposed union, which scheme might, with the assent of the bishop and patrons and the vestries of the parishes to be effected thereby, embody any modifications of the proposals, and should send drafts of such proposed scheme to the churchwardens of the parishes to be respectively affected by the said scheme, with notice that they or any of them might within two calendar months show cause to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, against the proposed union, or any part or parts of the scheme relating thereto, and that if within such period of two calendar months no cause should be shown we should certify the scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the bishop and of the patrons and of the vestries of the parishes affected thereby to your Majesty in Council, and that thereupon it should be lawful for your Majesty in Council to make and issue any order or orders for effecting the union, and for uniting the parishes of the united benefices into one parish for ecclesiastical purposes, and for such other purposes as are in the Act now in recital provided. And it was thereby also enacted that it should be lawful for us to insert in any scheme to be prepared by us, all proper directions for the appointment of the first incumbent of the united benefice, and for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons should present or nominate to such united benefice from time to time as the same should become vacant, and all such provisions in addition to those by the said Act expressly authorised as might, in our opinion, be necessary for effectually carrying out the particular measures proposed by the said scheme, including any provisions which might be found necessary for the compensation of any of the incumbents of the benefices to be united who might be willing to retire therefrom, and that we might for the purposes of the now reciting Act exercise all powers and privileges for the time being exercisable by us under the Acts of Parliament relating to our Commission or under the Church Building Acts. And by the same Act it was also enacted that if for the purpose of more conveniently carrying the provisions of that Act into effect it should appear to us desirable in any case of a proposed union of benefices, that an exchange should be made of the patronage of any of the benefices proposed to be united for the patronage of any other benefice, an exchange might (with the consent of the patrons of the benefices, in respect whereof such exchange should be intended, and with our approval) be made by any corporation with any other corporation of the patronage, or any rights of presentation to any benefice, whether the whole patronage of such benefice should be vested in one corporation or in different corporations, by way of alternate presentation or otherwise, and that every such exchange should be effected by the scheme for the proposed union of benefices. And further, that any scheme might (subject to certain restrictions in the said Act contained) provide (*inter alia*) for the erection of any new church or parsonage house, for the pulling down or removal of any existing church (except certain churches therein mentioned, which did not include the church of the said parish of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, with Saint Leonard's, Eastcheap), or par



sonage house of any benefices proposed to be united, and for the appropriation or sale of the materials and site of the same respectively, and of the ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use and enjoyment thereof, for the appropriation of any plate or other furniture held in trust for any church to be pulled down, for the disposal of any organ in such church, for compensation to parish clerks or other officers, or for arrangement with respect to fees or vestry rooms: Provided always that the scheme for the removal of any church or parsonage should provide for the erection of another church or parsonage within the limits of the metropolis. And it was thereby further provided that no such scheme should be submitted to your Majesty in Council until it had been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months. And it was by the said last-mentioned Act also enacted, that in the same scheme might be inserted all such provisions for the maintenance and regulation of the joint vestry of the united parish, and for defining the proportions in which each parish should contribute towards the sustentation of the fabric of the church of the united parish, and for the maintenance of the services therein, and for other ecclesiastical purposes as we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, having regard to the circumstances of each particular case might deem necessary. And further, that in order to give validity to any such scheme, the consent of the vestry of any parish should be signified in writing under the hand of the chairman of such vestry, stating that in a vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent, a resolution for giving such consent had been duly carried.

“And whereas under the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Lord Bishop of the said diocese of London, duly issued a commission for the purpose of inquiring into the expediency of the proposed union of the said rectory of All Hallows, Lombard-street, and the said rectory of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, with Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, and by the return made to the said commission, the Commissioners therein named certified all such matters and things as appeared to them material, together with their opinion that the proposed union was expedient, and in such return they recommended the terms on which, in their opinion, the same ought to be effected.

“And whereas the said Archibald Campbell, Lord Bishop of London, has caused proposals for a scheme, based upon the terms recommended by the Commissioners named in the hereinbefore mentioned commission, to be laid before us, which proposals have been assented to by the Dean of the cathedral and metropolitical church of Christ, Canterbury, and the Chapter of the same church, patrons of the said rectory of All Hallows, Lombard-street, and patrons alternately with the Dean of the cathedral church of Saint Paul, in London, and the Chapter of the same church of the said rectory of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, with Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, and also by the Dean and Chapter of the said last-named cathedral church, the other alternate patrons of the said last-named rectory, and also by the vestry of the parish of All Hallows, Lombard-street, and by the joint vestry of the united parishes of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, and Saint Leonard, Eastcheap.

“And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such union should be effected, and that such arrangements relating thereto, and to the patronage of the said rectories, should be made as are herein-after mentioned.

“Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consents of the said Archibald Campbell, Lord Bishop of London (testified by his signing and sealing this scheme), of the said Dean and Chapter of the cathedral and metropolitical church of Christ, Canterbury, and of the said Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul, in London (testified by their respectively sealing this scheme with their several corporate seals), and of the vestry of the said parish of All Hallows, Lombard-street, and the joint vestry of the said united parishes of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, and Saint Leonard, Eastcheap (testified by the respective chairmen of the said vestry and joint vestry respectively signing this scheme, pursuant to resolutions passed at a vestry and joint vestry respectively, duly convened for the purpose of giving such consents), that the said rectory of All Hallows, Lombard-street, and the said rectory of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, with Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, shall be united and consolidated into, and shall become and be one benefice, under the style of ‘The united rectory of All Hallows, Lombard-street, with Saint Benet, Gracechurch, and Saint Leonard, Eastcheap.’

“And we further recommend and propose that if, when this scheme shall be confirmed by an Order of your Majesty in Council, both of the said rectories shall be vacant, the union of the said rectories shall take effect forthwith; and if one of the said rectories only shall be then vacant, the said union shall also take effect forthwith, if the incumbent of the other of the said rectories shall consent to become the incumbent of the united rectory, but if he shall not so consent, then that the union shall take effect upon the then next vacancy of his benefice, and the then incumbent of the other of the said rectories shall be the first incumbent of the united rectory; and if, when this scheme shall be confirmed by an Order of your Majesty in Council, both of the said rectories shall be full, then that the said union shall take effect upon the next vacancy of either of them, if the incumbent for the time being of the other of the said rectories shall consent to become the incumbent of the united rectory, and he shall be the first incumbent of the united rectory; but if he shall not so consent, then the said union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacancy of his benefice, and the then incumbent of the other of the said rectories shall be the first incumbent of the united rectory. And that it shall be lawful for the Bishop to admit to the united rectory the first incumbent thereof (if an incumbent for the time being of either of the existing rectories) without any form or fee of or for presentation, and he shall thereupon become the incumbent of the united rectory, and that until the time of the union taking effect, the existing incumbencies shall remain separate, and the rights and liabilities in respect thereof shall remain unaffected by anything herein contained.

“And we further recommend and propose that if, after the confirmation by your Majesty of this scheme, and before the union shall have taken effect, the incumbent for the time being of either of the existing rectories shall retire from his incumbency in order that the union may take immediate effect, the incumbent so retiring from his incumbency shall be entitled, during the period hereinafter specified, to receive out of the annual income of the united rectory, and by way of compensation, a yearly sum equal in amount to five-sixths of the net annual value of the tithe and tithe rents-charge and endowments annexed to his rectory, computed on the average receipts of the three years immediately preceding the year in

which he shall retire, which annual sum shall commence as from the day on which the union shall take effect, and shall be considered to accrue *de die in diem*, but shall be payable by equal half-yearly payments in every year, the first half-yearly payment thereof to become due and be paid at the end of six calendar months next after the day on which the union shall take effect; and that the said annual sum shall be payable to the retiring incumbent during the remainder of his life, or until he shall accept any other Church preferment of an annual value equal to or greater in amount than the said annual sum to be so made payable to such retiring incumbent as aforesaid; and upon his accepting such preferment, the said annual sum shall thenceforth absolutely cease to be payable, but if the same annual sum shall cease by his death, or by his acceptance of such Church preferment (as the case may be), on any other than one of the half-yearly days of payment, he or his executors or administrators shall be entitled to a proportionate part of the said annual sum for the period which at the time of such cesser shall have elapsed of the then current half-year, which proportionate part shall be payable at the end of the then current half-year, and that the said annual sum shall be charged upon the annual income of the united rectory, and shall be payable out of the same by the incumbent for the time being thereof, and as between such incumbent and the retiring incumbent and his assigns, the said annual sum shall be a first charge at law and in equity upon the income of the united rectory, and the incumbent of the said united rectory shall be deemed to have accepted the same subject to a trust to pay to the retiring incumbent or his assigns the said annual sum out of the income of such united rectory, and for that purpose to use all due diligence to receive and collect the income of the said united rectory, and if such annual sum shall be in arrear and unpaid for a period of more than twenty-one days after any of the said half-yearly days of payment, and the fact of the same being so in arrear shall be verified by the declaration of the incumbent who shall have so retired, or his assigns, or in such other manner as shall be required by the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of London, it shall be lawful for the said Bishop to make an order upon the incumbent for the time being of the united rectory, requiring him to pay the amount in arrear within a time to be specified in such order, and if the same shall not be paid within such period as last aforesaid, then it shall be lawful for the said Bishop to sequester the profits of the said united rectory until all such arrears and the costs of the sequestration shall have been paid and satisfied, but the power to be so conferred upon the said Bishop shall not in anywise abridge or interfere with the rights of the incumbent who shall have so retired, or his assigns, to recover the said annual sum, and all arrears thereof, by proceedings at law or in equity, or with the legal and equitable rights of the incumbent for the time being of the united rectory to recover from the preceding incumbent of the united rectory, his executors or administrators, any arrears of the said annual sum which ought to have been paid by such preceding incumbent.

"And we further recommend and propose that upon the said union taking effect, the church of All Hallows, Lombard-street, shall become and thereafter continue to be the parish church of the said united rectory; and that after the said union the expense of maintaining the fabric of the parish church of the united rectory, and providing for the maintenance of the services therein, shall

be defrayed by the three parishes of the united rectory, and shall, as between the respective parishes, be provided in the following proportions, (that is to say) the amount to be provided by each parish shall bear the same proportion to the whole amount to be provided as the total amount of the annual rateable value of the property in each such parish, as assessed for the time being for the purposes of the Consolidated Rate, shall bear to the aggregate amount of the like rateable annual value of the property in all the said three several parishes.

"And we further recommend and propose that upon the said union taking effect, the font, communion table, and plate, used for the purposes of the Holy Communion in the church of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, shall be transferred to the parish church of the said united rectory, but if the same shall, in the opinion of the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of London, not be required for such church, then that the same, or such of them as shall not be so required, shall be transferred to such other church or chapel, within the diocese of London, as the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese shall select.

"And we further recommend and propose that upon the said union taking effect, if the tables of fees used in the two churches be alike in all particulars, the table of fees used in the church, which will become the church of the united rectory, shall (until revised or altered by proper authority), be the table of fees for the three united parishes, but if such tables of fees be not alike in all particulars, then that the same shall be of no authority, and a new table of fees shall be made for the use of such united parishes under the authority of, and with the consents, and in the manner specified in the eleventh section of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four.

"And we further recommend and propose that upon the said union taking effect, the persons who at that time shall hold the offices of parish clerk of the parish of All Hallows, Lombard-street, and parish clerk of the united parishes of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, and Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, shall, without any further appointment, become the joint parish clerks of the said three united parishes, and the persons who, at the time of the said union taking effect, shall hold the offices of sexton of the parish of All Hallows, Lombard-street, and sexton of the united parishes of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, with Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, shall, without any further appointment, become the joint sextons of the said three united parishes; and upon the death, retirement, or removal of either of the joint parish clerks, the other of them shall become the sole parish clerk of the said three united parishes, and upon the death, retirement, or removal of either of the joint sextons, the other of them shall become the sole sexton of the said three united parishes; and the parish clerk of the said three united parishes shall afterwards, upon any vacancy in that office, be appointed by the incumbent of the united rectory, and any future vacancy in the office of sexton shall be filled up by the joint vestry of the said three united parishes; and each such joint parish clerk and joint sexton shall perform such and such only of the duties appertaining to the offices of parish clerk and sexton respectively of the said three united parishes, as the rector and churchwardens for the time being of such parishes may from time to time require, but no parish clerk or sexton of the said three united parishes shall have any larger estate or interest in his office, than he shall have

possessed in his original office before the said union.

"And we further recommend and propose that upon the said union taking effect, the persons who at that time shall respectively hold the offices of parish clerk and sexton of the united parishes of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, and Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, and who shall become joint parish clerk and joint sexton respectively of the said three united parishes, shall respectively cease to hold the office of parish clerk and sexton respectively of the said united parishes of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, and Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, and the parish clerk so ceasing to hold such his office of clerk shall, by way of compensation, so long as he shall be one of the joint parish clerks aforesaid, receive from the vestry of the said united parishes of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, with Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, during the pleasure of such vestry, a salary equal in amount to his then present salary; and in like manner the sexton so ceasing to hold such his office of sexton shall, by way of compensation, so long as he shall be one of the joint sextons aforesaid, receive from the vestry of the said parishes of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, and Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, during the pleasure of such vestry, a salary equal in amount to his then present salary.

"And we further recommend and propose that so long as a salary under the provisions above proposed, shall be payable by the united parishes of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, with Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, to one of the joint parish clerks aforesaid, those parishes shall not be required to contribute towards the salary of the other of the joint parish clerks aforesaid, and so long as a salary shall under the provisions above proposed be payable by the said united parishes of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, with Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, to one of the joint sextons aforesaid, those parishes shall not be required to contribute towards the salary of the other of the joint sextons aforesaid, but whilst such salaries, by way of compensation, shall continue payable to such joint parish clerk and joint sexton respectively, the salaries of the other joint parish clerk and joint sexton aforesaid, shall be paid exclusively by the parish of All Hallows, Lombard-street.

"And we further recommend and propose that for the purposes of the Act of the fourteenth year of the reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third, chapter seventy-eight, the three parishes of the said united rectory shall be deemed to be one parish only.

"And we further recommend and propose that upon the said union taking effect, all the properties constituting the emoluments and endowments of the respective rectories of All Hallows, Lombard-street, and Saint Benet, Gracechurch, with Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, shall become and be transferred and annexed to the said united rectory as the endowment thereof, but subject to the payment of any annual rentcharge in perpetuity, not exceeding the annual sum of one hundred pounds, which shall be charged upon any part or parts of the permanent endowments belonging to the said united rectory, by any scheme which may be prepared by us, and which may be ratified by an Order of your Majesty in Council, under the eleventh section of the thirdly hereinbefore recited Act, and to the powers and remedies to be by such scheme and Order given for the recovery of the same annual rentcharge, such rentcharge not to commence until the annual sum hereinbefore proposed to be provided for the retiring incumbent, shall have ceased to be payable.

"And we further recommend and propose that upon the said union taking effect, the church of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, shall be taken down, and its materials and site sold by public auction, the pulpit, bells, clock, organ, and other furniture and fittings (other than the font, communion table, and plate), being reserved to be appropriated (if in the opinion of the Bishop for the time being of the diocese of London required), for the use of the church proposed to be provided for an intended new district at Stepney, to be called the district of Saint Benet, Stepney; but if not so required and appropriated, that the same be sold, and the produce dealt with in the same manner as the produce of the sale of the materials and site of the church.

"And we further recommend and propose, that in the first place there shall be set apart and appropriated, out of the net proceeds which shall be realized by the sales effected in pursuance of the recommendations and proposals hereinbefore contained, a sum of one thousand pounds as part of the fund to be provided for the payment of the expenses incurred, or to be incurred, in relation to all the proposals and schemes for the union of benefices under the hereinbefore recited Acts. That in the next place, there shall be set apart and appropriated out of such net proceeds of the said sales, a sum of one thousand five hundred pounds, for providing a house of residence for the rector of the said united rectory. That, in the next place, there shall be set apart and appropriated out of such net proceeds such a sum as we shall determine (not exceeding three equal fourth parts of the entire net proceeds of the said sales) for the erection of the church proposed to be provided as aforesaid, for the intended new district of Saint Benet, Stepney, and for the endowment of the same, with a clear yearly income of three hundred pounds per annum. That, in the next place, there shall be set apart and appropriated out of such net proceeds, such a sum not exceeding four thousand pounds, as shall be determined by the joint vestry of the said three united parishes, for the purposes of repairing and repewing the said church of All Hallows, Lombard-street, and of putting the same into a fit and proper condition for becoming the church of the said three united parishes, such sum to be laid out and expended by such joint vestry, under the direction and superintendence of a competent architect, to be nominated by the said joint vestry, and to be approved of by the Bishop of the said diocese of London for the time being. And that the residue (if any), of the said net proceeds of the said sales, shall be held and applied upon and according to the trusts and provisions contained in the twenty-second section of the said hereinbefore thirdly recited Act.

"And we further recommend and propose that upon the said union taking effect, the alternate right to present and nominate the incumbent of the rectory of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, with Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, which is now vested in the said Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul, in London, shall become, and be transferred to, and absolutely vested in the said Dean and Chapter of the cathedral and metropolitical church of Christ, Canterbury, and their successors for ever. And that thereupon the alternate right to present and nominate the incumbent of the rectory of Saint Michael, Queenhithe, with Holy Trinity the Less, in the said city and diocese of London, which is now vested in the said Dean and Chapter of the cathedral and metropolitical church of Christ, Canterbury, shall become, and be transferred to, and absolutely vested in the said Dean and Chapter of the said cathedral

church of Saint Paul, in London, and their successors for ever.

“ And we further recommend and propose that upon the said union taking effect, the patronage of, and right of presentation or nomination to the said united rectory, and also the patronage of, and right of presentation or nomination to the said intended new district of Saint Benet, Stepney, shall become and be absolutely vested in the said Dean and Chapter of the said cathedral and metropolitical church of Christ, Canterbury.

“ And we further recommend and propose that if such intended new district shall be constituted before the said union of the said united rectory shall have taken effect, the right of nominating or presenting an incumbent of such new district, shall in the meantime, and until the said union shall have taken effect, be exercised by the Dean and Chapter of the said cathedral and metropolitical church of Christ, Canterbury.

“ And we further recommend and propose that if the said union shall have taken immediate effect, by reason of the incumbent for the time being of either of the existing incumbencies having retired from his incumbency, and such incumbent shall be living when the united rectory shall for the first time after such union become vacant, the incumbent who shall have so retired shall (if in the opinion of the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of London he be not disqualified by age or otherwise), be entitled to fill such vacancy, and may be admitted by the said Bishop to the said united rectory without any form or fee of or for presentation; and he shall thereupon become the incumbent of the said united rectory, and the annual sum hereinbefore made payable to him shall thereupon absolutely cease to be payable.

“ And we further recommend and propose that upon the said union taking effect, the land forming the site of the two houses which are situate in Pudding-lane, and which now constitute part of the endowment of the said rectory of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, with Saint Leonard, Eastcheap, shall be appropriated for the site of a new rectory house for the said united rectory, and that as soon after the union as possession can be obtained of such land, the buildings now standing thereon shall be converted into a new rectory house, or else that the present buildings shall be pulled down, and a new rectory house built upon such site (whichever course may, in the opinion of the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of London, be most advisable), and that thereupon the sum of one thousand five hundred pounds hereinbefore recommended and proposed to be appropriated out of the proceeds of the sale of the materials and site of the said church of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, for the erection of a rectory house for the use of the said united rectory, and all accumulations (if any) which shall have arisen out of the annual income of the securities upon which such sum of one thousand five hundred pounds may have been invested, shall be applied by us in such conversion, or in or towards erecting such new rectory house, and that any additional sum which may be required for the above purposes beyond the sum of one thousand five hundred pounds shall be provided by the incumbent from his own resources.

“ And we further recommend and propose that this scheme shall not take effect until the consents which under the seventeenth section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth Victoria, chapter one hundred and forty-two, are requisite to the sale and appropriation of the

church of Saint Benet, Gracechurch, and the site thereof shall have been duly obtained.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the hereinbefore recited Acts, or any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said said scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fourth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul, situate at Southport, in the parish of North Meols, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Chester.

“ Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Paul, situate at Southport aforesaid.

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of North Meols, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned to the said

church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Southport.'

"And, with the like consent of the said John, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester (testified as aforesaid), we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

**The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.**

"The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Southport, being:—

"All that part of the parish of North Meols, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Chester, which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the north-western boundary of such parish, at the point on the shore of the Irish Sea, where the said boundary is met by the boundary dividing the township of North Meols, in the said parish, from the township of Birkdale, in the same parish; and extending thence south-eastward along such township boundary (crossing the line of the Liverpool, Crosby, and Southport Railway, and also crossing Mill-lane) as far as a point in the middle of the public footpath called 'Churchgate;' and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of such footpath, for a distance of two hundred and two yards or thereabouts, to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'S. St. P. D. C., 1864, No. 1,' and placed on the southern side of the said footpath, at the middle of the north-western end of the fence dividing the close numbered 102, upon the tithe commutation map of the said township of North Meols, and upon the map hereunto annexed from the close numbered 112, upon the same maps; and extending thence south-eastward to such boundary stone; and continuing thence in the same direction along the middle of the said fence, and along the middle of the fences dividing the closes numbered respectively 102 as aforesaid, 101, 100, 98, 97, and 96, upon the said maps, from the closes numbered respectively 113, 114, 115A, and 115, upon the same maps, to a boundary stone inscribed 'S. St. P. D. C., 1864, No. 2,' and placed on the northern bank of Fine Jane's Brook, at a point in the middle of the southern extremity of the fence dividing the close numbered 96, from the close numbered 115 as aforesaid; and extending thence first south-eastward to the middle of the said brook, and then in a direction mainly north-eastward along the middle of the same brook, as far as a point in the centre of the bridge which carries Town-lane over the said brook; and extending thence first north-westward along the middle of such lane to its junction with Trap-lane; and continuing thence still north-westward along the middle of the last-named lane, to its junction with East Bank-lane; and continuing thence in the same direction along the middle of the last-named lane to the centre of the bridge which carries such lane over the line of the Liverpool, Crosby, and Southport Railway aforesaid; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular parts of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Paddington, and of the said new parish of Saint Saviour, Paddington, hereinafter mentioned and described (such parts not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship), should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas, for the purpose of providing an endowment for the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, certain persons have subscribed a sum of three thousand pounds, and have caused the same to be expended in the pur-

chase of the several messuages or tenements next hereinafter mentioned.

“ And whereas, by an indenture, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and made, or expressed to be made, between Edward Vigers, late of Number 2, Upper Lisson-street, Edgeware-road, in the said county of Middlesex, but now of Berner's-street, in the same county, Timber Merchant, of the one part; and us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the other part; the said Edward Vigers, in consideration of the before-mentioned sum of three thousand pounds, did appoint, grant, release, and convey unto us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, and our successors, all those seven several messuages or tenements situate in a newly laid out street, called ‘Tavistock-terrace,’ in the parish of Paddington, in the said county of Middlesex, and numbered respectively 9 to 15, both inclusive, in the said street. “ Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all those parts of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Paddington, and of the said new parish of Saint Saviour, Paddington, which are described in the second schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that

the same shall be named ‘The District of Saint Mary Magdalene, Paddington.’

“ And we further recommend and propose that the said several messuages or tenements situate in Tavistock-terrace and Great Western-crescent aforesaid, and subject to the leases thereof hereinbefore mentioned, together with the rents or reservations payable under or in respect of such leases so appointed, granted, released, and conveyed unto us and our successors as aforesaid, and all our estate and interest therein respectively, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette, become and be transferred to, and become absolutely vested in, the minister of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the herein secondly named Act, and in his successors, ministers of the same district, for ever.

“ And we further recommend and propose that we may be authorised and empowered to pay out of our said common fund, in each and every year to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, the sum of thirty-three pounds six shillings and eight pence, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the license of such minister as aforesaid; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry of such district shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between, and paid to, the minister making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister succeeding to such district.

“ And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to, and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised jointly by Charles Lewes Parker, of No. 4, Delamere-terrace, in the county of Middlesex, Esquire, Alfred Daniel Sprauge, of No. 12, Princes-square, Bayswater, in the same county, Esquire, the Honorable Henry Walpole, of No. 17, Half-Moon-street, Piccadilly, in the same county, Henry Wood, of No. 10, Cleveland-square, in the same county, Esquire, and William Frost Wood, of No. 2B, Albany, Piccadilly, in the same county, Esquire, their heirs and assigns for ever.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

thence still south-eastward to and along the middle of the said branch line of railway, as far as the point where it is intersected by Tanner's-lane;— and all which said part of the district parish of Saint Paul, Warrington aforesaid, is also situate to the north-west of another imaginary line commencing at the last-described point where the said Dallam-lane branch line of the London and North-Western Railway is intersected by Tanner's lane as aforesaid, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said lane to its eastern extremity, and continuing thence still north-eastward across Winwick-street to and along the middle of the street called 'Pinner's-brow' to the boundary dividing the said district parish from the parish of Warrington aforesaid, at a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of Lygoc's-lane, and continuing thence first north-eastward and then north-westward along the last-described boundary to its junction near Orford Hall with the boundary which divides the said district parish from the district of Christ Church, Padgate, in the same county and diocese."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the district parish of Saint Paul, Warrington (out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken), and certain observations and objections which have been offered and taken by the said patron and the said incumbent respectively, have been laid before Her Majesty in Council, together with the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has, notwithstanding such observations and objections, been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chester.

And whereas the Legislature of Antigua, by an Address, has prayed Her Majesty to make an Order in Council, directing "The West Indian Incumbered Estates Acts, 1854, 1858, 1862," and all other Acts continuing or amending, or in any way relating to the same, to come into operation, and to have the force of law in the said colony of Antigua, and by an

Act passed on the twenty-seventh day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, intituled "An Act for carrying into execution in Antigua the West Indian Incumbered Estates Acts, 1854, 1858, 1862," has made provision for the payment in that colony of such salaries and other expenses as required by the said Act of 1854, to the satisfaction of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies:

EARL RUSSELL, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received, through Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Peking, the following Report on the Trade of the Port of Tientsin, for the year 1863:—

**REPORT on the Trade of the Consular District of Tientsin, for the year 1863.**

Section I.

SHIPPING AND NAVIGATION.

*British and Foreign Vessels.*

The Shipping Returns for the year 1863, as compared with the returns of 1862, exhibit an increase in the number of British vessels trading at the port of Tientsin equal to one half. Indeed, the British vessels exceed *all* the other foreign flags, exclusive of the Americans which visit this port, by a little more than one-third. The subjoined Table will fully illustrate the truth of this:

The decrease which the returns exhibit in the number of "sundry" vessels is accounted for, first, [by the British merchants extensively employing small steamers in the Tientsin trade; and, secondly, by the British merchants having a quantity of light handy sailing-vessels suitable for this trade.

First. I mentioned in my report in 1862, the decrease in "sundry" vessels as compared with 1861, and I employed the following remarks as being in my opinion explanatory of the fact:—"The increase of small steamers in 1862," (as now in 1863) "connected with the Tientsin trade is, however, the principal cause of the decrease of continental shipping. These small steamers, nearly all of which hoist English colours, are undoubtedly by far the most convenient class of vessels for the traffic at this port. The city of Tientsin stands about 65 miles from the village of Taku, upon a river which, owing to its insufficient depth of water and tortuous course, is extremely difficult of navigation. At the mouth of this river (Pei-ho) there is a bar, which renders it unsafe for vessels drawing more than 11 feet 6 inches of water to enter Taku anchorage; while outside in the gulf the weather is often so boisterous, and the swell so high, that vessels cannot discharge their cargoes for several days together. The convenience, therefore, of a class of steam vessels able not only to clear the bar, but to carry their cargoes right up this 65 miles of river navigation to the very gates of the merchants godowns, is very great."

The trouble of hiring native boats, the slowness and stupidity of the native sailors, their dishonesty, the inconvenience of transhipment, and the delay which it occasions, have induced merchants to employ light swift steamers. *Three* such vessels have run regularly in 1863 between Tientsin and Shanghai, and several others have made occasional trips at moderate intervals.

Secondly. The British merchants at Tientsin have a sufficient quantity of sailing-vessels of a light draught of water, which renders the chartering of continental vessels superfluous. This was not so in 1861. British vessels could not be obtained of a size *small enough* for the Tientsin trade. The British merchants had, therefore, to charter continental vessels.

But the freight of German and Danish vessels has fallen in the market. The five or six British steamers, which trade between this and Shanghai, have engrossed the trade which belonged to continental vessels in 1861, and British merchants like British vessels better than those flying the flags of other Powers.

*Coasting Vessels.—Foreign and Native.*

The foreign vessels that visit Tientsin are, in the vast majority of instances, engaged in a merely coast trade. The merchants, foreign and native, in Hong Kong, Canton, and the other southern ports, charter foreign ships to transport their merchandise to Tientsin; and the merchants, foreign and native, in Tientsin employ foreign vessels to export their merchandise to Shanghai, Hong Kong, Canton, and other southern ports; the foreign ships and steamers generally touch at Shanghai, or make Shanghai their destination. The coasting trade at Tientsin, the only trade of the port, in the great majority of cases, is done by native or foreign Shanghai houses.

Not only are foreign vessels employed in a coasting trade between this port and Southern China, but they import and export *native produce*. Foreign vessels bring up to Tientsin, not only foreign manufactures, but sugar, rice, tea, oil, medicine, paper, and other native produce for which there is an extensive market at this port; and foreign vessels carry away not merely re-exports, but beans, peas, cotton, wool, hides, fruit, medicine, and other produce of Northern China, as well as the native junks. For particulars of the coasting trade, I beg to refer to my report on the trade of Tientsin, in 1861-1862.

The native junk is rapidly disappearing from the highways of commerce; the native merchants do not engage them; the principle of marine insurance annihilates the native craft: "Can you insure?" is a question which the Chinese merchants almost invariably put. Eighty southern junks came in 1863, one third of their holds were empty; one hundred and twenty-seven came in 1862. The eighty junks which entered in 1863, contained rice, sugar, tea, oil, paper, medicine, fruit, preserves, silk pieces, native hardware, wood, prepared opium, birds' nests, fish, sharks' fins, &c., &c., &c.; and they took away, peas, beans, salt, fruit, vegetables, fish, wheat, barley, millet, medicine, ginseng, &c., &c.

The coasting trade done in this consular district by the native junk is very great.

*Ports and Harbours, Buoys, Lighthouses, and Junk Buildings.*

For a description of the ports, harbours, buoys, lights, lighthouses, and junk buildings, I must refer to my report drawn up in 1862.

TRADE AND COMMERCE.

*Foreign Trade Imports.*

The Import Return for 1863, given below, will sufficiently indicate the nature and extent of the trade transacted at Tientsin during 1863. Except cotton manufactures, the returns for 1863 compare very favourably with those for 1862.

*Manufactured Cotton.*

The import of cotton manufactures has in 1863 steadily fallen off. The civil war in America, and the defective supply of cotton in England, fully accounts for this. Merchants' manufactures, when brought into competition with native cotton manufactures, owing to a rise in their price, ought as a matter of course to go to the wall. Foreign cotton manufactures in 1861 sold at Tientsin for about half the prices of native cottons. As a consequence, the people of the towns and villages scattered through Chi-li and the neighbouring provinces, purchased foreign cottons as being cheaper than their own cottons; but the country population adhered to their native manufactures. The country people, who work a great deal at rough employments, when manufactured cottons sold at one-half the price of native cottons, bought the native rather than the foreign, because the native lasted much longer than our Manchester goods. Native cottons, though not so comely, are much better adapted for the rough work of the rural population.

The scarcity of cotton has raised the price of Manchester goods so near the price of native cotton manufactures, that not only the country people but the town and village population purchase their home manufactures instead of merchants' goods. Till the normal state of the cotton market returns, and as a consequence till the prices drop very much lower than the prices current in 1863, the native cottons must rule the market.

*Woollens.*

The import of woollens has been unfavourable. In the trade report for 1862, I explained the cause. At Tientsin, and throughout North China in general, the winter months are dry, but the cold is very severe; as a consequence the Chinese prefer cottons or silks lined with fur for winter dresses rather than foreign woollens. In upholstery a good deal of woollen cloth is used, but for the most part the woollens are Russian, not English. The English woollens imported into Tientsin are too dear, of the wrong colour, and too heavy for the natives. Upon the whole then, the market for British woollens remains insignificant.

*Opium.*

This import maintains its high character; one hundred and eighty-two chests of Malwa have been imported in 1863 more than in 1862; and though the Shên-si crop of native opium was fair,

the Chinese favour the Indian, not the native drug. The native opium is, though very much cheaper, insipid, and very few of the Chinese smoke native opium, unless it is *mixed* with the Indian. If they can get the Indian of course so much the better, but a Chinaman reduced to a state of poverty, to which the habit of excessive opium smoking invariably leads, unable to purchase the Indian, mixes the native with the Indian, or even gathers up the cinders of Indian opium *twice* smoked, and smokes them a *third* time.

Malwa opium is sold for about six hundred taels, while native Shên-si opium is sold for about four hundred taels. In 1862 native opium was offered in the market at six hundred and fifty taels; this rise in the price of native opium was caused by political disturbances in Shên-si, ultimately calmed down by means of bribes and donations, which threatened with extinction the whole trade of that province. The quantity of Indian imported into this district depends entirely on the state of the Shên-si crop. When the Shên-si crop is deficient, the demand for Indian opium increases, and *vice versa*.

Of the opium imported into Tientsin, from 150 to 200 chests a month are purchased for consumption in the capital. What Peking consumes in the native drug I do not exactly know; it must however be large.

*Produce of China and the Straits.*

The returns for 1863 show very favourably as compared with those of 1862.

This trade is partly in foreign and partly in native hands. The raw material is imported by foreign merchants, while the prepared material falls to the lot of native merchants. I should judge that one-half, or, perhaps, a little more, of this trade is carried on by Chinese. The native houses in Tientsin have agents in Hankow, Canton, Singapore, acute in business transaction. It is only in dealing with places in which Chinamen do not exist, that the native merchant meets with a difficulty; but wherever Chinese reside, the native merchant can do business very much cheaper than the foreign houses in China; and, moreover, his knowledge of the tastes and habits of his countrymen guarantees him against any gross mistakes, especially with reference to prepared commodities.

*Foreign Trade Exports.*

The Export Returns of 1863 compare favourably with those of 1862.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a translation of an Ordinance, published by the Senate of Lübeck, and dated the 15th October last, altering the Regulations for Ships entering and leaving the Port of Travemünde, as follows:—

PAR. 1. Whenever a ship shall enter the port after dark, the Master, for the information of the Pilot, shall, in proper time, hoist *two white lights, placed horizontally*, instead of the national flag.

PAR. 2. As signal in reply, *two red lights* shall be exhibited; viz., one on each of the two beacons which mark the *middle channel* of the fair water above the bar.

PAR. 3. So soon as the Master observes these lights, the ship may approach the port, keeping the Travemünde lighthouse to the W.S.W., within five fathoms of water, and then must await the arrival of a Pilot. Whenever a heavy storm shall prevent the Pilots from boarding, the ship must either anchor or keep under weigh until daylight. Those steamers only sailing on fixed days, which have a special permission to enter without a Pilot, shall enter the Port without one in the direction shown by the two red lights.

PAR. 4. Whenever the red lights are not exhibited, no ship may be brought in or enter without a Pilot, such ship must either anchor in five to six fathoms water, or remain under weigh till daylight.

All ships which, coming from Lübeck, are to go to sea directly, must already in the *Pfahlbrach* hoist their national flags on the foretop. After dark, such ships shall exhibit *two white lights, placed horizontally*, instead of the national flag.

The amended regulations shall come into operation, in the absence of further orders, on the *1st of November next*, and the appendix dated May 20, 1863, of the rules for the Port of Travemünde, dated June 27, 1860, shall be annulled.

Liverpool Licensing Bill.

**N**OTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament, in the ensuing session, for leave to bring in a Bill to regulate the granting of licenses for the sale of ale, beer, spirits, and other exciseable liquors by persons keeping or being about to keep inns, ale-houses, beer-houses, and victualling-houses, within the borough of Liverpool, and to alter the present mode of granting and transferring such licenses; and the said Bill will, amongst other things, provide that no such license shall be granted within the said borough, excepting in the case of houses of such rateable value, and upon such notice being given, and bond entered into, as will be specified in the Bill.

The Bill will also prescribe the rules which are to be followed, the payments which are to be made, and the conditions which are to be performed by all persons applying for any such license, such payments to be in addition to those which are now or hereafter may be by the general law payable in respect of licenses; and the Bill will impose penalties for the sale of ale, beer, spirits, and other exciseable liquors without such a license as will be prescribed by the Bill; and the Bill will also subject to a penalty all persons frequenting any inn, ale-house, beer-house, or victualling-house at such times as may be prohibited by law or by the said Bill; and the Bill will also, so far as may be necessary for the purposes thereof, alter the provisions of the public general Acts of the 9th George 4th, cap. 61, and the 1st William the 4th, cap. 64, and also of any other Act (public or local) now in force within the said borough of Liverpool; and it will vary and extinguish all existing rights and privileges which would interfere with any of its objects.

Bristol Docks.

(Improvement of River Avon; Construction of New Locks at Cumberland Basin; Purchase of Rownham Ferry; Amendment of Acts.)

**T**HE Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the city of Bristol (who are hereinafter called the Corporation) intend to apply to Parliament in the next session thereof, for leave to bring in a Bill to enable them to carry into effect the following, or some of the following, among other purposes, viz:—

(1) To alter, widen, straighten, and otherwise improve the bed or channel and banks and course of the River Avon, for a length of from about 400 yards above Rownham-ferry to about one mile and a half below the said ferry.

(2) To close the present north entrance lock from the River Avon into Cumberland Basin; to alter and improve the approaches to the south entrance lock of the said basin; and to construct a new entrance lock between the said River Avon and the lower end or north-west part of Cumberland-basin, instead of the said present north entrance lock, with all proper gates, sluices, culverts, piers, jetties, quays, wharves, mooring posts, bridges, engines and machinery, roads, approaches and other works and conveniences connected therewith; which new entrance lock will commence at the north-west end of Cumberland-basin, and will terminate in the River Avon, at or near the slip to Rownham-ferry.

(3) To construct a new junction lock, with proper works as aforesaid, to commence at the north-east corner of Cumberland-basin, and to terminate at the west side of the present entrance to "The Merchants' Dock." And the Bill will contain powers to divert into the said new entrance and junction locks the waters from the River Avon and the floating harbour.

(4) To enlarge the entrance into the floating harbour from the said new junction lock, by cutting off a portion of land situate between the eastern side of the said entrance to "The Merchants' Dock" and a graving dock, in the occupation of Messrs. Stothert and Co.; and for such purpose to

interfere with, and temporarily to close, the entrance into the said "Merchants' Dock."

(5) To deepen, alter, and improve the northern part of the bed of Cumberland-basin, and the walls, quays, roads, and works thereto adjoining.

All the said proposed improvements and works will be situate in one or more of the following parishes, that is to say, the parishes of St. Stephen and Clifton, in the city and county of Bristol; the parishes of Long Ashton and Abbots' Leigh, in the county of Somerset; and the parish of Westbury-upon-Trym, partly in the county of Gloucester and partly in the city and county of Bristol.

The Bill will also confer on the Corporation the following powers:—

During the construction, and for the maintenance of the said works, to interfere with any railways, constructed, or being constructed, and to alter, stop up, divert, or otherwise interfere with any roads, towing-paths, bridges, streams, springs, water-courses, rivers, drains, sewers, docks and navigations within, or adjoining to, the before-mentioned parishes; and especially to interfere temporarily with the navigation, and to regulate the use of the River Avon, and the towing-paths thereof; and also the use of Cumberland-basin and the floating harbour, and the locks, wharves, quays, cranes and works connected with the said basin and harbour; and also the use of the said ferry across the River Avon, called "Rownam-ferry," between the parishes of Clifton and Long Ashton.

To purchase lands, houses, and other property, compulsorily and by agreement, within the parishes hereinbefore mentioned, for the purposes of the said several works and for the deposit of the spoil and materials to be removed in the construction thereof. And also to purchase Rownham-ferry aforesaid, and all the rights, powers, and privileges connected therewith, and among them the right to levy toll, and to authorise the Corporation to remove the site of the said ferry to a distance not exceeding 300 yards below its present site.

To construct and use on the banks and towing paths of the River Avon, and on the roads connected therewith or incident thereto, temporary railways or tramways for the removal of the said spoil and material.

To vary, suspend, or extinguish all rights and privileges which may interfere with the purposes of the Bill.

To borrow money for the purposes of the Bill upon the credit of the dock estate of the Corporation, and the revenue arising therefrom, and also on the credit of the borough fund of the said city, or of the borough rates, or generally of the rates and other property of the Corporation.

The Bill will extend, alter, amend, and where needful repeal certain provisions of the following Acts, and of all other Acts relating to the port and harbour of Bristol:—11 and 12 William III., cap. 23; 22nd George II., cap. 20; 47 George III., sess. 2, cap. 33; 6 George IV., cap. 20; 1st Victoria, cap. 85; 5th Victoria, sess. 2, cap. 31; "The Bristol Dock Act, 1848" (11 and 12 Vict., cap. 43); and also of the following Acts relating to the port and harbour of Bristol, and the construction and maintenance of the docks and floating harbour there, so far as the provisions of the said Acts are still in force, namely, 43 Geo.
