Foreign Office, December 7, 1864.

RARL RUSSELL, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received information from Her Majesty's Minister at Stuttgardt to the effect that it has been notified in the Official Gazette of Wurtemburg, that the necessity for travellers being provided with Passports at the frontier or within the Kingdom of Wurtemburg is abolished. Foreigners, travelling within the Kingdom, must, however, be prepared to furnish proof of their identity and their nationality, if called upon by the police authorities to do so.
