WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty

King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the Poll at County Elections," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the Justices of any county, riding, parts, or division, in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition, shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the Justices of the Peace for the county, riding, parts, or division in quarter sessions, or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act passed in the session of the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled, "An Act to settle and describe the divisions of counties, and the limits of cities and boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the Justices of the Peace, in and for the county of Durham, in quarter sessions assembled, on the second day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the southern division of the said county is insufficient, and praying that Saint John's Chapel, in Weardale, within the said southern division of the said county should be made an additional polling place for the said division:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that Saint John's Chapel, in Weardale, shall be an additional polling place for the said southern division of the county of Durham, and that the Justices of the Peace of the said county, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act, passed in the session of the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such county of Durham into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter sixty; of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-

four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter sixty; of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation for altering the boundaries of the District Chapelry of Saint Jude, Manningham, in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the third day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and published in the London Gazette on the fourteenth day of the same month and year, a part of the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, in the said county and diocese, was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church called Saint Jude's Church, situate at Manningham, in the said parish, and such district chapelry was called 'Saint Jude's District.'

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that the boundaries of the said district chapelry should be altered and extended as hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of Ripon, as Bishop of the said diocese, of the Reverend William Carus, Canon Residentiary of the Cathedral Church of Winchester, of the Reverend John Venn, the Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Saint Peter, in the city of Hereford, of the Reverend Edward Anriol, the Rector or Incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Saint Dunstan in the West, in the city of London, of the Reverend Edmund Hollond, of Hyde Park Gardens, in the county of Middlesex, Clerk, and of the Reverend William Cadman, the District Rector or Incumbent of the District Rectory of the Trinity, or Trinity District Rectory, in Saint Marylebone, in the county of Middlesex, the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, of the Reverend John Burnet, the Vicar or Incumbent of the said vicarage, and as such vicar the patron of the perpetual curacy of the district chapelry of Saint Jude, Manningham aforesaid, and of the Reverend John Eddowes, the Incumbent of the said perpetual curacy (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that, in our opinion, it would be expedient that the boundaries of the said district chapelry of Saint Jude, Manningham, should be altered and extended so as to include within the limits of such district chapelry all those additional portions of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and are thereon colored pink, and that the said additional portions so to be included within the limits of the district chapelry aforesaid should become and form part of such district chapelry.

"And we humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The additional territory to be included within

the limits of the District Chapelry of Saint Jude, Manningham, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point upon the boundary dividing the said parish from the district chapelry of Saint Jude, Manningham (heretofore part of the same parish), in the middle of Manningham-lane, opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of the road passing by the rear of Belle Vue-place; and extending thence south-eastward along the said boundary (following the middle of the said lane), to the point near Eldon-place where such boundary diverges from the said lane; and continuing thence, still south-eastward, along the middle of the same lane, as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-western end of Trafalgar-street; and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of such street to its northern extremity; and continuing thence, precisely in the same direction, and in a straight line (crossing the main line of the Leeds and Bradford Railway, and crossing also Valley-road), to a boundary stone inscribed on its northern side 'M. St. J. D. C. 1864, No. 1,' and placed on the western bank of the Bradford Beck, at a distance of one hundred and twenty yards, or thereabouts, from the middle of the western end of Busy-bridge; and continuing thence, first in the last-mentioned direction to the middle of the said Beck, and then in a direction generally north-westward along the middle of the same Beck, as far as a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'M. St. J. D. C. 1864, No. 2,' and placed in the middle of the north-eastern end of the wall or fence forming the south-eastern boundary of the premises belonging to the Bradford Gas Works Company; and extending thence south-westward to such boundary stone; and continuing thence in the same direction along the middle of the said boundary wall or fence to its south-western extremity; and continuing thence, still south-westward and in a direct line, recrossing Valley-road, and recrossing also the main line of the Leeds and Bradford Railway aforesaid, to a boundary stone inscribed 'M. St. J. D. C. 1864, No. 3,' and placed on the western side of the said line of railway, at the easternmost corner of the garden ground commonly called Leach's Gardens; and extending thence, still south-westward, along the middle of the fence which forms the south-eastern boundary of the said gardens to the junction of such fence with the fence which forms the south-eastern boundary of a certain quarry now worked by Messieurs Crabtree and Mellor, and which said fence also forms the south-eastern boundary of certain land belonging to John Kay, of Farfield, in the county of York aforesaid, Esquire; and continuing thence, still south-westward, along the middle of the last-described fence, to a point on the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, from the new parish of Saint Paul, Manningham (heretofore part of the first-named parish), such point being in the middle of Manningham-lane aforesaid, opposite to the middle of the south-western end of the said fence, and opposite also to the north-western corner of the house and premises recently erected at or near to Holy Well Ash, and belonging to the executors of the late William Sugden, of Bradford, in the said county of York, and now in the occupation of William Ackroyd, Grocer; and extending thence south-eastward along the last-described boundary, following the middle of

Manningham-lane aforesaid to the point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of the road passing by the rear of Belle Vue-place as aforesaid, where the said imaginary line commenced.

"And also all that other portion of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, wherein the present incumbent thereof now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the west by an imaginary line extending along the middle of White Abbey-road, and on the north by the new parish of Saint Paul, Manningham, before mentioned, and on all other sides by the said district chapelry of Saint Jude, Manningham.

"And also all that other portion of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, wherein the present incumbent thereof now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the north-east and on the south-east by an imaginary line extending along the middle of the road which passes at the back of the houses on the north-eastern and south-eastern sides of Peel-square, and which is bounded on the south-west by another imaginary line extending along the middle of Lumb-lane, and on the north-west by the said district chapelry of Saint Jude, Manningham.

"And also all that other portion of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, wherein the present incumbent thereof now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the north-west by an imaginary line extending along the middle of the wall which forms the south-eastern boundary of the grounds and premises occupied by the Bradford Infirmary, and on the south-west by another imaginary line extending along the middle of Westgate, and on the east by another imaginary line extending along the middle of Lumb-lane aforesaid."

- And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty, King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the first day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-

ninth year of His Majesty, King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Turncroft, in the chapelry district of the Holy Trinity, Over Darwen, sometime part of the parish of Blackburn, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Turncroft aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that portion of the said chapelry district of the Holy Trinity, Over Darwen, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portion, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Turncroft, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Turncroft.'

"And with the like consent of the said James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified as aforesaid), we further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Turncroft, being:—

"All that portion of the chapelry district of the Holy Trinity, Over Darwen, sometime part of the parish of Blackburn, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, which is situate generally to the east of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said chapelry district from the parochial chapelry of Turton, in the same county and diocese, at a point a little to the north of Cadshaw New Bridge, in the middle of the Bolton and Blackburn Trust road; and extending thence, first north-eastward and then north-westward along the middle of the said trust road to its junction with Bolton-street, and continuing thence, still north-westward, along the middle of such street as far as a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of a certain road leading to the Darwen Paper Mills, and called 'Mill Gap-lane'; and extending thence, south-eastward, to and along the middle of the said lane as far as the centre of the bridge which



carries such lane over the River Darwen; and extending thence, in a direction mainly north-westward, along the middle of the said river, as far as a point under the centre of Over Darwen bridge, opposite to the middle of the south-western end of Sudell's-road; and extending thence, north-eastward, to and along the middle of the last-named road, as far as the boundary which divides the said chapelry district of the Holy Trinity, Over Darwen, from the chapelry district of Saint James, Over Darwen, in the county and diocese aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Finsbury, should be altered as hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation), of the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul, London, the patrons of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street (in testimony whereof they have hereunto affixed their corporate seal), and of the Reverend Lewis Marcus, the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Finsbury (in testimony whereof he also has signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that in our opinion it would be expedient that, from and after the date of the next avoidance of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Finsbury, should be altered and extended, so as to include within the limits of such new parish all that additional part of the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, which is situate to the south of an imaginary line extending along the middle of the street called Banner-street, all which said part is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink; and that from and after the date of such avoidance of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, as aforesaid, the said additional part of such parish so to be included within the limits of the new parish of Saint Paul, Finsbury, as aforesaid, should become and be and form part of the said new parish.

"And we humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter sixty; of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation for altering the boundaries of the district chapelry of Saint Mary, Laister Dyke, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-sixth day of the same month and year, a part of the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, in the said county and diocese, was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Laister Dyke, in the said parish, and such district chapelry was called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Laister Dyke.'

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said district chapelry should be altered and extended so as to include within the limits of such district chapelry an additional portion of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, and a portion of the adjacent parish of Calverley, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and also a portion of the adjacent parochial chapelry of Pudsey, within the said parish of Calverley, as hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of Ripon, as Bishop of the said diocese, and also as the patron in right of his see of the vicarage of the said parish of Calverley; of the Reverend William Carus, Canon Residentiary of the Cathedral Church of Winchester; of the Reverend John Venn, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Saint Peter, in the city of Hereford; of the Reverend Edward Auriol, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Saint Dunstan-in-the-West, in the city of London; of the Reverend Edmund Hollond, of Hyde-park-gardens, in the county of Middlesex, Clerk; and of the Reverend William Cadman, the district rector or incumbent of the district rectory of the Trinity district rectory, in Saint Marylebone, in the county of Middlesex, as the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford; and also as the patrons of the perpetual curacy of the district chapelry of Saint Mary, Laister Dyke aforesaid; of the Reverend John Burnet, the vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage of the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford; of the Reverend Alfred Brown, the vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage of the parish of Calverley aforesaid, and as such vicar the patron of the perpetual curacy of the parochial chapelry of Pudsey aforesaid; and of the Reverend Henry John Graham, the incumbent of such perpetual curacy; and of the Reverend George Collins, the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said district chapelry of Saint Mary, Laister Dyke aforesaid (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that in our opinion it would be expedient that the boundaries of the said district chapelry of Saint Mary, Laister Dyke, should be

altered and extended, so as to include within the limits of such district chapelry all that additional portion of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford; and also all those portions of the adjacent parish of Calverley, and of the adjacent parochial chapelry of Pudsey, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and are thereon colored blue, pink, and green respectively, and that the said portions so to be added to, and so to be included within, the limits of the said district chapelry of Saint Mary, Laister Dyke aforesaid, should become and form part of such district chapelry.

"And we humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"Territory proposed to be added to the District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Laister Dyke:—

"All those several portions of the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, of the parish of Calverley, in the same county and diocese, and of the parochial chapelry of Pudsey, also in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, from the district chapelry of Saint Mary, Laister Dyke, some time part of such parish, in the middle of that branch of the Leeds and Halifax turnpike-road which passes through Bradford and Horton, at a point opposite to the middle of the south-western end of a certain foot-path which connects such road with the old turnpike-road to Leeds, such point being distant one hundred and sixty-eight yards, or thereabouts, to the east of the middle of the northern end of Pratt-street, and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of the said footpath (passing thereby to the east of the houses called Bower Green), and to the west of the house called Bower Green Farm, to the junction of such foot-path with the old turnpike-road to Leeds aforesaid, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named road, as far as its intersection by the Dudley Hill, Killinghall, and Harrogate Turnpike-road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named turnpike-road, as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-western end of the wall or fence forming the southern boundary of the Bradford Moor Cavalry and Infantry Barracks, and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of such wall or fence to its junction with the wall or fence forming the eastern boundary of the same barracks, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-described wall or fence to a point in the middle of the old turnpike-road to Leeds aforesaid, opposite to the middle of the north-western end of the last-described wall or fence, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the same road, as far as the boundary which divides the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, from the parish of Calverley aforesaid, and extending thence north-westward along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Calverley from the district chapelry of Saint Luke, Eccleshill, in the same county and diocese, and extending thence north-eastward along the last-described boun-

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts.

"We humbly recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us out of the Common Fund in the said Acts mentioned, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices described in the first schedule hereunto annexed, the annual sum set opposite to the name of each such benefice, in the last column of the same schedule, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year.

"Provided always that the grants so recommended to be made by us to the benefices of Warminster and Westbourne shall be paid only upon the production to us, on or before the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, of certificates under the hand of the Bishops of the respective dioceses, that a curate duly licensed by such bishop has in each instance been employed within the parish or district during the preceding half year: And provided also that the grant so recommended to be made by us to the benefice of Lavingham, shall be paid only upon the production as aforesaid of a like certificate; that two such curates have been duly employed within the parish during the preceding half year: And provided furthermore, that a portion amounting to a yearly sum of one hundred and seventy-five pounds, of the grant so recommended to be made by us to the benefice of Highworth, with the chapelries of Sevenhampton and South Marston, shall be paid only upon the production, as aforesaid, of a like certificate; that two such curates have been duly employed within the parish during the preceding half year, and that one of them has resided during that time at South Marston aforesaid: And provided also that the lastly mentioned grant to the said benefice of Highworth, with the chapelries of Sevenhampton and South Marston, shall, with the consent of the Reverend Edward Rowden, the vicar or incumbent of the said benefice of Highworth, with the chapelries of Sevenhampton and South Marston, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, be and be held to be in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of thirty-seven pounds, which, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the seventh day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, was made payable by us to the vicar of the said parish of Highworth, subject to a certain

condition with respect to the performance of Divine service in the chapel at Broad Blunsdon: And provided also that the grants, payment whereof is so herein recommended to be made by us conditionally upon the employment of assistant curates, shall continue in force so long only as may to us appear to be expedient under the circumstances from time to time affecting the respective cures, in favour of which the same conditional grants are so recommended and proposed.

"And we further recommend and propose that the messuage, lands, and premises, tithes, or rent-charges in lieu of tithes and other hereditaments particularly described in the second and two following schedules hereunto annexed, with their appurtenances, now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the several spiritual persons hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the second schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Llanfawr, in the county of Merioneth and diocese of Saint Asaph, formerly belonging to the sinecure rectory of Llanfawr, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Llawr-y-Bettws, in the same county and diocese; that the lands and hereditaments described in the third schedule hereunto annexed, situate at Salter-street, in the parish of Tanworth, in the county of Warwick and diocese of Worcester, which were conveyed to us by a deed, bearing date the twenty-first day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and made between William Burman, of Hampstead, near Birmingham, in the county of Stafford, Esquire, of the first part; Tertius Thomas Burman, of Lady-lane, in the said parish of Tanworth, Farmer, the said William Burman, William Ballard, of Lillington, in the said county of Warwick, Builder, and Joseph Ward, of the borough of Warwick, in the same county, Solicitor, of the second part; Mary Burman, of Brook House, Salter-street, aforesaid, widow, of the third part; and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the fourth part; which deed is intended to be deposited in the registry of the said diocese of Worcester, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Saint Patrick, Salter-street aforesaid; that the messuage, lands, hereditaments, and premises described in the fourth schedule hereunto annexed, situate within the parish of Tenbury, in the county of Worcester and diocese of Hereford, which were conveyed to us by a deed, bearing date the 5th day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and made between Samuel Hancon, late of Hartlebury, in the said county of Worcester, but now of the city of Hereford, Farmer, and Sarah, his wife, of the first part; the Reverend Sir Frederick Arthur Gore Ouseley, of Lovehill-house, in the parish of Langley, in the county of Buckingham, Clerk, of the second part; and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the third part; which deed is intended to be deposited in the registry of the said diocese of Hereford, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Saint Michael, Tenbury aforesaid.



"And we further recommend and propose that the six several rent-charges, chief rents, or annual sums, respectively amounting to five pounds eighteen shillings and sixpence, six pounds five shillings and eightpence, five pounds eighteen shillings and sixpence, five pounds eighteen shillings and fourpence, six pounds nine shillings and sevenpence, and three pounds seventeen shillings and fourpence, issuing out of and charged upon certain lands situate within the township of Northowram, in the parish of Halifax, in the county of York and diocese of Ripon, which rent-charges were conveyed to us by a deed, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and made between Isaac Green, of Horley Green, in the said parish of Halifax, Gentleman, of the first part; Thomas Parker, of Horley Green Place, in the same parish, Salesman, Henry Whitaker, of Horley Green Place aforesaid, Fishmonger, Robert Midgley, of Salterlee, in the said township of Northowram, Worsted Spinner, John Walshaw, of the same township, Dyer, and John Goodyear, of Shibden, in the said parish of Halifax, Stone Merchant, of the second part; and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the third part; which deed is intended to be deposited in the registry of the said diocese of Ripon, shall in like manner, and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Saint Thomas, Charlestown, in the same county of York and diocese of Ripon.

"And we further recommend and propose that all our reversionary estate and interest in the lands and hereditaments described in the fifth schedule hereunto annexed, situate within the parish of Barton Saint David, in the county of Somerset, and diocese of Bath and Wells, formerly belonging to the Prebend of Barton Saint David, shall in like manner, and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Barton Saint David.

"And we further recommend and propose that the rectorial tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes arising within the parish of Highweek, in the county of Devon and diocese of Exeter, and commuted at a sum of one hundred and thirty-three pounds and ten shillings per annum, all which formerly belonged to the Prebend of Teignton Regis, and are now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein shall in like manner and by the authority aforesaid be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Highweek.

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole of the property situate or arising within the parish of Yarm, in the county and diocese of York, and comprising certain tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, commuted at a sum of two hundred and sixty-five pounds and ten shillings per annum, together with a cottage or tenement known as the Glebe House, which formerly belonged to the Archbishoprick of York, and is now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein shall in like manner and by the authority aforesaid be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Yarm.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Francis Jackson Blandy, Clerk, the vicar or incumbent of the

vicarage of the parish of Netheravon, in the county of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the sixth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Netheravon, with their appurtenances, now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein shall, in like manner and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Netheravon, in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of twenty pounds, now payable by us to the same vicar or incumbent, in respect of the estates formerly belonging to the Prebend of Netheravon, and also in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of thirty pounds, now payable by us to the same vicar or incumbent, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the eleventh day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight: And provided furthermore that the said tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, to be so annexed as last-mentioned, shall be and be held to be charged and chargeable at all times for ever hereafter in exoneration of all or any other hereditaments whatsoever, formerly belonging to the said prebend, with the liability to repair and maintain the chancel of the parish church of Netheravon aforesaid.

"And whereas it appears to us, after duly considering the cases undermentioned, to be expedient that the grants respectively recommended to be made by us to the benefices of Broad Blunsdon, Fifield with Idbury, Highweek, Highworth with Sevenhampton and South Marston, Kilburn, Llawr-y-Bettws, Netheravon, Warminster, and Yarm, should commence and take effect from the dates hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: in the case of the perpetual curacy of Broad Blunsdon from the thirtieth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Fifield with Idbury, from the ninth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Highweek from the ninth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the vicarage of Highworth, with the chapelries of Sevenhampton and South Marston, from the thirtieth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Kilburn, from the fourth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Llawr-y-Bettws, from the fourth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the vicarage of Netheravon, from the first day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the vicarage of Warminster, from the first day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; and in the case of the vicarage of Yarm, from the twelfth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the several grants hereinbefore recommended by us to be made to the said last-mentioned benefices respectively shall commence and take effect from the said dates hereinbefore in that behalf mentioned respectively.

"And we further recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered to pay



out of the Common Fund aforesaid, on behalf of the benefices specified in the seventh schedule hereunto annexed, such annual sums as may be necessary for discharging the yearly instalments which, in respect of interest and principal monies, may from and after the dates set opposite to the names of the said benefices respectively, in the fourth column of the same schedule, become from time to time due and owing on account of certain mortgages of the said several benefices, which by certain deeds, bearing the respective dates set forth in the fifth column of the same schedule, have been effected under the provisions of the Acts known as 'Gilbert's Acts,' enabling the Governors of the bounty of

Queen Anne, for the augmentation of the maintenance of the poor clergy, to lend money for the purpose of providing residences for the clergy.

"And we further recommend and propose that if at any time it shall appear desirable to us that any lands tithe or other hereditaments should be substituted for the annual sums hereinbefore mentioned, or any of them, or any part thereof, nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such substitution or any other measure relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

*Fixed and Flashing Light on Plateau des Triagoz.*

THE Minister of Public Works in France has given notice, that on and after the 15th day of November, 1864, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on the Guen-Bras Rock of the Plateau de Triagoz, west of the Sept Iles, department of the Côtes-du-Nord.

The light is a *fixed* white light, varied by white and *red flashes* alternately, at intervals of *thirty seconds*. It is placed at an elevation of 98 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 12 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the third order.

The tower is about 92 feet high from base to vane, and stands in lat. 48° 52' 20" N., long. 3° 38' 55" West of Greenwich.

THE United States Lighthouse Board has given notice, that the light on Portland Head has been raised to 101 feet above the level of the sea, and a second-order light substituted for the former one of the fourth order, visible in clear weather from a distance of 17 miles. The following directions have in consequence been given:—

## DIRECTIONS.

*Channel between West Cod Ledge and Corwin Rock.*

On Cape Elizabeth are two lights, placed N.E. and S.W., 280 yards apart, which can be seen 18 miles; the N.E. light is *revolving*, and the S.W. *fixed*. If from the eastward, bring Cape Elizabeth lights to bear W. by N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N., and steer for them until Portland Head light bears N.N.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W., when the vessel will be about three-quarters of a mile S.W. by S. from West Cod Ledge (4  $\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms), and the same distance E. by N. from Corwin Rock (3  $\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms); then steer (n for Portland Head light bearing N.N.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W., for about 2  $\frac{1}{4}$  miles, until Cape Elizabeth lights are in line; then stand N. by E. nearly half a mile, until Portland Head light bears N.W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N., when run for it until within half a mile.

These courses leave Willards Rock (5  $\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms) a quarter of a mile to the southward and westward; Pinetree Ledge (3  $\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms) a quarter of a mile, and Jordan Ledge (3  $\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms) one-third of a mile to the northward and eastward. The



course with Portland Head light bearing N.N.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. leads close to Willards Rock, and is safe with a smooth sea; but with a swell on, the courses given above should be followed. When within half a mile of Portland Head light, steer N. by W. for the harbour.

If from the southward, keep 5 miles from Cape Elizabeth lights. This distance clears all dangers, with the lights between the bearings of N.E. by E. and  $\frac{1}{2}$  W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N. Bring Portland Head light to bear N.N.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W., and steer in as above.

*Channel between West Cod Ledge and Bache Rock.*

With Cape Elizabeth lights bearing W. by N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N., bring Portland Head light to bear N.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. Run in on this last bearing, leaving West Cod Ledge a mile to the southward and westward, and Bache Rock ( $4\frac{1}{4}$  fathoms) a mile to the northward and eastward, until Cape Elizabeth lights are in line; then steer N.W. by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. about  $1\frac{1}{4}$  miles, until Portland Head light bears N.W.  $\frac{3}{4}$  N.; when steer on this bearing (leaving Willards Rock one third of a mile to the southward and westward; Pine-tree Ledge a quarter of a mile, and Jordan Reef ( $3\frac{3}{4}$  fathoms) one-third of a mile to the northward and eastward) until within a half a mile of the light, when follow the directions given above.

*To Pass Northward of Bulwark and Round Shoals.*

Run in with Portland Head light bearing W. by N.  $\frac{3}{4}$  N., leaving Round Shoal ( $4\frac{3}{4}$  fathoms) half a mile, and Bulwark Shoal (14 feet) two-thirds of a mile to the southward, and passing between, and a quarter of a mile from Jordan Reef to the southward and westward, and Witch Rock (4 fathoms) to the northward and eastward.

*Along the Coast from the Eastward.*

When two miles south of Small Point, if the weather is clear, Portland Head light should be seen bearing W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N., distant  $16\frac{1}{2}$  miles. This bearing leads southward of Temple Ledge (5 fathoms), nearly  $1\frac{1}{4}$  miles; Lumbo Ledge ( $4\frac{1}{4}$  fathoms), nearly  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles; Half-way Rock, three-quarters of a mile; Junk of Pork and Outer Green Island, three-quarters of a mile; to the northward of Witch Rock (4 fathoms), a quarter of a mile; and to the southward of Ram Island Ledge, one-third of a mile.

Cape Elizabeth lights bearing S.W. by W. leads clear of all dangers between Mitchell and Willards rocks, to the eastward of Junk of Pork, between Jewell Island and Half-way Rock, up to the entrance of Harpswell sound.

In thick weather strangers should not approach from the southward and eastward in a less depth than 45 fathoms with soft or sticky bottom. The depths given at mean low water. The mean rise of tide is 9 feet; and the fall of the lowest tide below mean low water,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  feet.
