

four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter sixty; of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation for altering the boundaries of the District Chapelry of Saint Jude, Manningham, in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the third day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and published in the London Gazette on the fourteenth day of the same month and year, a part of the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, in the said county and diocese, was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church called Saint Jude's Church, situate at Manningham, in the said parish, and such district chapelry was called 'Saint Jude's District.'

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that the boundaries of the said district chapelry should be altered and extended as hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of Ripon, as Bishop of the said diocese, of the Reverend William Carus, Canon Residentiary of the Cathedral Church of Winchester, of the Reverend John Venn, the Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Saint Peter, in the city of Hereford, of the Reverend Edward Anriol, the Rector or Incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Saint Dunstan in the West, in the city of London, of the Reverend Edmund Hollond, of Hyde Park Gardens, in the county of Middlesex, Clerk, and of the Reverend William Cadman, the District Rector or Incumbent of the District Rectory of the Trinity, or Trinity District Rectory, in Saint Marylebone, in the county of Middlesex, the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, of the Reverend John Burnet, the Vicar or Incumbent of the said vicarage, and as such vicar the patron of the perpetual curacy of the district chapelry of Saint Jude, Manningham aforesaid, and of the Reverend John Eddowes, the Incumbent of the said perpetual curacy (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that, in our opinion, it would be expedient that the boundaries of the said district chapelry of Saint Jude, Manningham, should be altered and extended so as to include within the limits of such district chapelry all those additional portions of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and are thereon colored pink, and that the said additional portions so to be included within the limits of the district chapelry aforesaid should become and form part of such district chapelry.

"And we humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The additional territory to be included within

the limits of the District Chapelry of Saint Jude, Manningham, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point upon the boundary dividing the said parish from the district chapelry of Saint Jude, Manningham (heretofore part of the same parish), in the middle of Manningham-lane, opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of the road passing by the rear of Belle Vue-place; and extending thence south-eastward along the said boundary (following the middle of the said lane), to the point near Eldon-place where such boundary diverges from the said lane; and continuing thence, still south-eastward, along the middle of the same lane, as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-western end of Trafalgar-street; and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of such street to its northern extremity; and continuing thence, precisely in the same direction, and in a straight line (crossing the main line of the Leeds and Bradford Railway, and crossing also Valley-road), to a boundary stone inscribed on its northern side 'M. St. J. D. C. 1864, No. 1,' and placed on the western bank of the Bradford Beck, at a distance of one hundred and twenty yards, or thereabouts, from the middle of the western end of Busy-bridge; and continuing thence, first in the last-mentioned direction to the middle of the said Beck, and then in a direction generally north-westward along the middle of the same Beck, as far as a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'M. St. J. D. C. 1864, No. 2,' and placed in the middle of the north-eastern end of the wall or fence forming the south-eastern boundary of the premises belonging to the Bradford Gas Works Company; and extending thence south-westward to such boundary stone; and continuing thence in the same direction along the middle of the said boundary wall or fence to its south-western extremity; and continuing thence, still south-westward and in a direct line, recrossing Valley-road, and recrossing also the main line of the Leeds and Bradford Railway aforesaid, to a boundary stone inscribed 'M. St. J. D. C. 1864, No. 3,' and placed on the western side of the said line of railway, at the easternmost corner of the garden ground commonly called Leach's Gardens; and extending thence, still south-westward, along the middle of the fence which forms the south-eastern boundary of the said gardens to the junction of such fence with the fence which forms the south-eastern boundary of a certain quarry now worked by Messieurs Crabtree and Mellor, and which said fence also forms the south-eastern boundary of certain land belonging to John Kay, of Farfield, in the county of York aforesaid, Esquire; and continuing thence, still south-westward, along the middle of the last-described fence, to a point on the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, from the new parish of Saint Paul, Manningham (heretofore part of the first-named parish), such point being in the middle of Manningham-lane aforesaid, opposite to the middle of the south-western end of the said fence, and opposite also to the north-western corner of the house and premises recently erected at or near to Holy Well Ash, and belonging to the executors of the late William Sugden, of Bradford, in the said county of York, and now in the occupation of William Ackroyd, Grocer; and extending thence south-eastward along the last-described boundary, following the middle of
