

dary, as far as the point near Lower Fagley, where the bridle-road leading from Lower Fagley towards Woodhall Hill crosses Fagley Beck, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said bridle-road for a distance of thirty yards, or thereabouts, to the middle of the northern end of a certain new road, leading to the point where the branch of the Leeds and Halifax turnpike-road, which passes through Bradford and Horton as aforesaid, unites with the old turnpike-road to Leeds aforesaid, and extending thence southward to and along the middle of the said new road (crossing Gain Lane), to the junction of such new road with the said turnpike-roads, and continuing thence in a direct line southward across the said branch of the Leeds and Halifax turnpike-road, which passes through Bradford and Horton as aforesaid, to a point in the middle of the north-western end of a certain stream, which flows into the Tyersall Beck, and divides the close numbered 623, upon the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Calverley, and upon the map hereunto annexed from the closes numbered respectively 624 and 625 upon the same maps, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said stream, passing under the turnpike-road called Dick Lane, and also dividing the closes numbered respectively 622, 621, 620, 611, and 610, upon the said maps, from the closes numbered respectively 626, 627, 619, 618, 617, and 612, upon the same maps, to the northern boundary of the line of the Leeds, Halifax and Bradford junction branch of the Great Northern Railway, and extending thence in a direct line south-eastward across the said branch line of railway to the boundary which divides the said parish of Calverley from the parochial chapelry of Pudsey aforesaid, at a point in the middle of the northern end of the fence forming the eastern boundary of the Wood called North Wood, and numbered 112 upon the said maps, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of such fence to the footpath which leads from Pudsey to Quarry Gap, and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-described footpath through North Wood aforesaid, as far as a point in the middle of the fence forming the western boundary of the same Wood, and opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'L. D. St. M. D. C., 1864, No. 3,' and placed on the southern side of the said footpath, and extending thence south-westward to such boundary stone, and continuing thence still south-westward, and in a direct line across the several closes numbered respectively 78, 79, 81, 84, 68, and 67 upon the said maps, to a point in the centre of the bridge which carries a certain occupation road leading to the close numbered 67 as aforesaid, over the line of the Bradford and Ardsley branch of the Great Northern railway, and extending thence first southward, and then south-westward, along the middle of the last-named line of railway, as far as the boundary which divides the said parochial chapelry of Pudsey from the parochial chapelry of Tong, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and extending thence north-westward along the last-described boundary to its junction near Cutler Height, with the boundary dividing the parochial chapelry of Pudsey, from the district chapelry of Saint Mary, Laister Dyke aforesaid, and continuing thence first north-westward, and then north-eastward, along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing such district chapelry from the parish of Calverley aforesaid, and continuing thence first north-eastward, and then north-westward, along the last-described boundary to its junction with the

boundary dividing the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, from the district chapelry of Saint Mary, Laister Dyke, as first mentioned, and extending thence first south-westward, and then westward, along the boundary last referred to, as far as the first-described point in the middle of that branch of the Leeds and Halifax turnpike-road, which passes through Bradford and Horton as aforesaid, where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Cefn, in that part of the parish of Saint Asaph, in the diocese of Saint Asaph, which lies in the county of Denbigh.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mary, situate at Cefn aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Vowler, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient, that all that part of the said parish of Saint Asaph which is above referred to, and which is more particularly described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should
