

We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of The Unity, Bristol, being :—

"All those several portions of the out-parish of Saint Philip and Saint Jacob, Bristol, in the county of Gloucester, and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, of the new parish of Saint Luke, Barton Hill, in the same county and diocese, and of the district parish of the Holy Trinity, Bristol, in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within, and are bounded by an imaginary line, commencing on the boundary which divides the said district parish of the Holy Trinity, Bristol, from the out-parish of Saint Philip and Saint Jacob, Bristol aforesaid, at a point in the middle of Whipping Cat Hill opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of Unity-street, and extending thence south-westward to and along the middle of such street, as far as a point opposite to the middle of the northern end of New Thomas-street, and extending thence southward to and along the middle of New Thomas-street, aforesaid, to its junction with Ross-street, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Upper Cheese-lane, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said lane to its junction with Cheese-lane, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of sixty-three yards or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of the wall forming the north-western boundary of the inclosure and premises known as Messrs. Powell and Rickett's Glass Works, and extending thence south-westward to and along the middle of the said wall to its south-western extremity on the northern shore of the Floating Harbour, and continuing thence still south-westward and in a direct line to a point on the boundary in the middle of the said Floating Harbour which divides the out-parish of Saint Philip and Saint Jacob, Bristol, aforesaid, from the parish of Temple, otherwise called Holy Cross, in the county of the city of Bristol and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol aforesaid, and extending thence south-eastward along the last-described boundary following thereby the middle of the said Floating Harbour as far as the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the Great Western Railway over the said harbour, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said line of railway as far as a point on the boundary dividing the out-parish of Saint Philip and Saint Jacob, Bristol, from the new parish of Saint Luke, Barton Hill aforesaid, and extending thence north-westward along the last-described boundary, following thereby the middle of Cooks-lane as far as the point where such boundary diverges eastward from the middle of the said lane, and extending thence northward along the middle of the same lane as far as a point opposite to the middle of the western end of Tyler-street, and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with the street or alley called Barton Vale, and extending thence north-westward for a distance of nine yards or thereabouts along the middle of the last-

named street or alley to a point opposite to the middle of the south-western end of the passage leading through the Crown Inn and premises, and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of the said passage to its junction with Union-row, and continuing thence still north-eastward across the said row to a point in the middle of the south-western end of the passage called Sydney-alley, and continuing thence still north-eastward along the middle of the last-named passage to its junction with Kingsland-road, and continuing thence still north-eastward across the said road to and along the middle of Sussex-street to its junction with Folly-lane, and continuing thence still north-eastward across Folly-lane, crossing the boundary which divides the out-parish of Saint Philip and Saint Jacob, Bristol, from the new parish of Saint Luke, Barton Hill as aforesaid, to a point in the middle of the south-western end of the partition wall which separates the houses and premises situate on the eastern side of the last-named lane and numbered respectively 20 and 21, and also similarly numbered on the map hereunto annexed, and continuing thence still north-eastward along the middle of the said wall to its junction with the wall forming the eastern boundary of the gardens and premises belonging to and in the rear of the houses on the eastern side of Folly-lane aforesaid, and extending thence north-westward for a distance of one hundred and seven yards or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-described wall to the boundary at the north-western extremity of such wall, which divides the said new parish of Saint Luke, Barton Hill, from the district parish of the Holy Trinity, Bristol aforesaid, and extending thence westward along the last-described boundary as far as a point in the middle of the south-eastern end of Lear's-lane, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named lane (crossing the branch lines of the Midland Railway and passing to the east of the goods station of the said railway) to the junction of such lane with Dead Horse-lane, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named lane to its south-western extremity, on the eastern side of Whipping Cat Hill aforesaid, and continuing thence in the same direction across the said hill to the boundary which divides the district parish of the Holy Trinity, Bristol, from the out-parish of Saint Philip and Saint Jacob, Bristol, as first-mentioned, and extending thence north-westward along the boundary last referred to, to the point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of Unity-street, where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the two several registries of the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, at Bristol and at Gloucester.
