DECLARATION of the British and Spanish Governments for the Abolition of the Practice of Firing on Merchant-Vessels from British and Spanish Forts in the Straits of Gibraltar.

Signed at Madrid, March 2, 1865.

THE Government of Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the Government of Her Majesty the Queen of Spain, taking into consideration that the causes which gave rise to the establishment of certain precautions in the fortified places which command the Straits of Gibraltar, in the case of vessels approaching them within the distance of cannon-shot while sailing in those waters, no longer exist; and having regard to the inconveniences to which the navigation of merchant vessels has been liable by a compliance with the formalities to which they are subjected by reason of the aforesaid precautions, when the currents or the winds oblige them to enter into the waters belonging to the maritime jurisdiction of the aforesaid fortified places; and taking into consideration, finally, that those fortified places, under normal circumstances, are exempted by the good faith of nations from surprises or attacks which the law of nations condemns, have agreed upon what follows:—

1°.

In the places of war and fortresses belonging to Great Britain and Spain which command the Straits of Gibraltar, those regulations are abolished, in virtue of which it is required that merchant vessels which cruize in the said straits shall show their flag in passing within cannon-shot of those places or fortresses; and it is agreed equally to abolish the intimation by means of shots, at first with powder only, and afterwards with ball, to those vessels which neglect or refuse to comply with the aforesaid obligation of showing their flag.

2°.

The agreement which precedes does not deprive the Governments of Great Britain and Spain of the right of taking, in the aforesaid places and

EL Gobierno de Su Majestad la Reina del Reino Unido de la Gran Bretaña e Irlanda, y el de Su Majestad la Reina de España, tomando en consideracion que han desaparecido ya las causas que motivaron ciertas precauciones establecidas en las plazas de guerra que dominan el Estrecho de Gibraltar, para los casos en que se aproximan á ellas bajo el tiro de cañon, los buques que navegan en aquellas aguas; y en vista de los inconvenientes que ofrece para la navegacion mercante el cumplimiento de las formalidades á que por razon de las referidas precauciones se hallan sujetos, cuando las corrientes ó los vientos les obligan á entrar en las aguas pertenecientes á la jurisdiccion marítima de dichas plazas de guerra; y atendiendo por ultimo á que estas en circunstancias normales se hallan escudadas por la buena fé de las naciones contra sorpresas y atentados que condena el derecho de gentes, han convenido en lo siguiente:—

1°.

Quedan suprimidas en las plazas de guerra y fortalezas pertenecientes á Inglaterra y España que dominan el Estrecho de Gibraltar, las disposiciones en cuya virtud se exige que los buques mercantes que cruzan dicho Estrecho muestren su bandera al pasar bajo el tiro de cañon de aquellas plazas ó fortalezas; quedando igualmente suprimida la intimacion por medio de disparos con pólvora sola primeramente, y con bala despues, á los buques que descuidan ó rehusan el cumplimiento de la espresada obligacion de mostrar su bandera.

2°.

El acuerdo que precede no priva á los Gobiernos de Inglaterra y España de la facultad de establecer, en las espresadas plazas y fortalezas,

fortresses, in time of war, those precautions which they may think necessary, and which are in conformity with what the law of nations prescribes in regard to this matter.

3°.

The present Declaration does not exempt the vessels of either of the two nations from the observance of the rules of maritime etiquette in seas common to both, on meeting ships of war of either of the two nations; nor does it exempt them from the formalities respectively established for the entrance into the ports of the aforesaid British and Spanish fortresses which command the Straits of Gibraltar.

4°.

It is understood that this Declaration of the British and Spanish Governments in no way alters, modifies, or derogates from the dispositions, regulations, and practices which at present are in force in the aforesaid places and fortresses with regard to the ships of war which navigate in those waters or which enter their ports.

5°.

Both Governments will give the necessary orders for the execution of the present agreement, which will begin to come into force from and after the 15th of the present month.

In witness whereof the present Declaration has been signed in duplicate by Sir John Fiennes Crampton, Baronet, Knight-Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Her Britannic Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of Madrid, and by Don Antonio Benavides, Knight Grand Cross of the Royal and distinguished Order of Charles III, and Her Catholic Majesty's Minister of State, who have affixed thereto their respective seals.

Done at Madrid, the second day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.

3°.

La presente Declaracion no releva á los buques de uno y otro pais de la observancia de las reglas de etiqueta maritima á su encuentro en mares comunes con buques de la marina de guerra de cualquiera de las dos naciones; ni tampoco les exime de las formalidades respectivamente establecidas para la entrada en los puertos de dichas fortalezas Inglesas ó Españolas que dominan el Estrecho de Gibraltar.

4°.

Queda entendido que en nada se alteran, modifican, ni derogan por esta Declaracion de los Gobiernos de Inglaterra y de España las disposiciones, reglamentos, ó practicas que hoy rijan en las espresadas plazas y fortalezas, respecto de los buques de guerra que naveguen en sus aguas, ó se dirijan á sus puertos.

5°.

Ambos Gobiernos espedirán las órdenes necesarias para la ejecucion del presente acuerdo, que empezará á regir desde el 15 del mes corriente.

En fé de lo cual la presente Declaracion ha sido firmada por duplicado por Sir John Fiennes Crampton, Baronet, Caballero Comendador de la muy Honorable Orden del Baño, Enviado Extraordinario y Ministro Plenipotenciario de su Majestad Británica en la Corte de Madrid, y por Don Antonio Benavides, Caballero Gran Cruz de la Real y distinguida Orden de Carlos III, y Ministro de Estado de Su Majestad Católica, los cuales la han sellado con el sello de sus armas.

WHEREAS by the three hundred and thirty-third section of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, it is enacted that, subject to the provisions contained in the fifth part of that Act, it shall be lawful for every pilotage authority, by bye law, made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, from time to time to do within its districts all or any of the things specified in that behalf in the said section:

And whereas the Pilotage Board of the port of Newport, being the pilotage authority for the port of Newport within the meaning of the said recited Act, made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty certain bye laws, which were approved by Order in Council dated the twenty-sixth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two:

And whereas one of such bye laws was the following, viz.:—“No. 7. No person shall be eligible or shall be appointed to act as a pilot, unless he shall have served a regular apprenticeship to a pilot of the district for five years, and been at least two years in the coasting or over-sea trade, or shall have been engaged in the coasting trade in the waters of the district for not less than five years, and no person shall be eligible if less than twenty-five years or more than forty-five years of age:”

And whereas the said Pilotage Board have made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty, a new bye law (which is set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed), in lieu of the said bye law above recited:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said new bye law is reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of, and signify her consent to, the substitution of the said new bye law of the said Pilotage Board, in lieu of the said recited bye law.

SCHEDULE.

Bye Law above referred to.

7. No person shall be eligible or shall be appointed to act as a pilot unless he shall have served a regular apprenticeship to a pilot of the district of five years, and been at least two years in the coasting or over-sea trade, or shall have been engaged in the coasting trade in the waters of the district for not less than five years, and no person shall be eligible if less than twenty-three years and more than forty-five years of age.

WHEREAS, by the four hundred and tenth section of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, it is enacted that upon the completion of

any new lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of any ship which passes the same or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may from time to time alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions, in, by, and subject to which the light dues authorised to be levied by the said Act are paid and collected:

And whereas the Port of Dublin Corporation have erected a new lighthouse on Aran Island, commonly called Aranmore, county Donegal, north-west coast of Ireland, and a light is already exhibited therein:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that there shall be paid in respect of the said light, for every vessel, whether British or foreign, which may pass or derive benefit from such light, the toll of three-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burthen of every such vessel for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on an oversea voyage; and one-sixteenth of a penny per ton for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom if on a coasting voyage; and that the said tolls in respect of the said lighthouse shall be levied by the Port of Dublin Corporation, subject to the gross abatement or discount of sixty per cent., and other regulations and abatements mentioned in the new consolidated tables of light duties, sanctioned by an Order in Council dated the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twelfth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints, situate at Ascot Heath, in the consolidated chapelry of Cranbourne, in the county of Berks, and in the diocese of Oxford.

“Whereas at certain extremities of the said consolidated chapelry of Cranbourne, of the parish of Sunninghill, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and of the consolidated chapelry of Bracknell, in the same county and diocese, which

lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective consolidated chapelries and parish.

“And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said consolidated chapelry of Cranbourne, of the said parish of Sunninghill, and of the said consolidated chapelry of Bracknell, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, situate at Ascot Heath aforesaid.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, as such bishop, and also as the patron in right of his see of the perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry of Cranbourne, and of the perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry of Bracknell (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation), and with the consent of the Master, Fellows, and Scholars of the College of Saint John the Evangelist, in the University of Cambridge, the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Sunninghill (in testimony whereof they have hereunto affixed their corporate seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said consolidated chapelry of Cranbourne, of the said parish of Sunninghill, and of the said consolidated chapelry of Bracknell, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of All Saints, situate at Ascot Heath aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints, Ascot Heath,’ and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, and his successors, bishops of the same diocese for ever.

“We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints, Ascot Heath, being :—

“All those several portions of the consolidated chapelry of Cranbourne, in the county of Berks, and in the diocese of Oxford, of the parish of Sunninghill, in the same county and diocese, and of the consolidated chapelry of Bracknell, in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the consolidated chapelry of Cranbourne aforesaid, from the parish of Winkfield, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of Winkfield Row-road ; and extending thence, north-eastward, along the middle of the said road to its junction with the road leading from Hatchet-lane to Ascot Heath Racecourse ; and extending thence, south-eastward, along the middle of the last-described road as far as a point in the cross roads at the northern corner of the said Heath, opposite

to the middle of the western end of a certain private road which leads to Sunninghill Park demesne ; and extending thence, eastward, to and along the middle of the said private road for a distance of five hundred and twenty yards, or thereabouts, to the palings which form the western boundary of the said demesne ; and extending thence, in a direction generally southward, along the said western boundary of the demesne crossing the boundary which divides the parish of Sunninghill from the consolidated chapelry of Cranbourne aforesaid, to the southern extremity of the said demesne boundary, at a point upon the northern side of the road which leads from Cheapside to Ascot Heath, and runs parallel with that part of the Ascot Heath Racecourse which is known as the New Mile ; and extending thence, first southward, to the middle of the last-described road, and then, westward, along the middle of the same road for a distance of three hundred and forty-five yards, or thereabouts, to its junction with the road which skirts the eastern side of Ascot Heath aforesaid ; and extending thence, southward, along the middle of the last-described road (crossing the New Mile-course aforesaid), to the junction of such road with the turnpike-road leading from Sunninghill to Bracknell ; and continuing thence still southward across the last-described road to a point in the middle of the northern end of a certain other road leading therefrom to Sunninghill Bog ; and continuing thence, in a direction mainly southward, along the middle of the last-described road as far as the centre of the bridge which carries the Reading branch line of the London and South-Western Railway over the said road ; and extending thence, south-westward, in a direct line to a boundary stone inscribed ‘A. S. A. H. C. C., 1865,’ and placed at the point where the boundary dividing the parish of Sunninghill from the consolidated chapelry of Bracknell meets the boundary dividing the said consolidated chapelry of Bracknell from the parish of Old Windsor, in the county and diocese aforesaid ; and extending thence, south-eastward, along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said consolidated chapelry of Bracknell from the parish of Windlesham, in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Winchester ; and extending thence, south-westward, along the last-described boundary as far as a point near Duke’s Hill, in the middle of the road leading from Bagshot to Bracknell ; and extending thence, north-westward, along the middle of the said road to its junction with the road leading from Bagshot to Windsor ; and extending thence, northward, along the middle of the last-described road (crossing the Reading branch line of the London and South Western Railway aforesaid), as far as a point near Chavey Down Lodge on the boundary dividing the said consolidated chapelry of Bracknell from the parish of Winkfield aforesaid ; and extending thence, south-eastward, along the said boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the consolidated chapelry of Cranbourne from the parish of Winkfield aforesaid ; and continuing thence, first south-eastward, along the last-described boundary, and then north-eastward, along the same boundary as far as the point in the middle of Winkfield Row-road where the said imaginary line commenced.”

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council : now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct

that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Oxford.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the nineteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Brackenfield, in the county of Derby and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas the church of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Brackenfield, is in the patronage of the rector or incumbent for the time being of the rectory of the parish of Morton, in the above-mentioned county and diocese.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the church of the said new parish is ill endowed, and that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the said new parish.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Featherstone and of the said parish of Methley, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, situate at Whitwood Mere aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Honorable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York, and of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of the diocese of Ripon (testified by their having respectively signed and sealed this representation), and with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Christ, in Oxford, the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Featherstone (testified by their having affixed their corporate seal hereto), and with the consent of the Right Honorable George William Frederick, Earl of Clarendon, Chancellor of your Majesty's Duchy of Lancaster, acting on behalf of your Majesty, as the patron in right of the Crown of the rectory of the said parish of Methley (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Featherstone, and of the said parish of Methley, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of All Saints, situate at Whitwood Mere aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Whitwood Mere'; and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry of Whitwood Mere, should belong to and be exercised by the said William, Archbishop of York, and by his successors, Archbishops of York, for ever.

chapter thirty-seven; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the second day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the new parish of Saint Mary, Bilston (sometime part of the parish of Wolverhampton), in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield, and out of the district parish of Christ Church, Coseley (sometime part of the parish of Sedgley), in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said new parish of Saint Mary, Bilston, and of the said district parish of Christ Church, Coseley, hereinafter-mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship), should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas William Baldwin, late of The Ellowes, in the parish of Sedgley, in the said county of Stafford, Esquire, deceased, in and by his last will and testament in writing, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, did, *inter alia*, give and bequeath unto certain persons therein named and described, and whom he appointed to be executors and trustees of his said will, a sum of eight thousand pounds sterling (which sum is therein and hereinafter referred to as the said church fund), upon trust that the same should be applied by his said executors and trustees in and towards the providing a proper site for erecting and the erection and completion of a church in that part of the township of Bilston, in the parish of Wolverhampton, in the said county of Stafford, which is called or known as 'Bradley,' with proper schools attached thereto, and for or towards the endowment of such church or the benefice thereof; and with the further direction, that if at any time within twenty-one years next after the decease of the said William Baldwin, and under or pursuant to the provisions of the herein secondly-mentioned Act or other legal authority, that part of the said township of Bilston, called 'Bradley,' or any portion thereof, should be duly constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it should be lawful for the said trustees for the time being of the said church fund to transfer unto or vest in us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, or any other commissioners, corporation, or public body legally authorized in that behalf, the same church fund, or such portion thereof as to the trustees thereof should, under the circumstances of the case, appear sufficient or proper for or towards the providing a church or chapel for such district, and for or towards the endowment or augmentation of the income of the minister or perpetual curate thereof, or for either of such purposes, and if for both, then in such proportions as the same trustees should think most beneficial.

"And whereas, in pursuance of a decree of the High Court of Chancery, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and made in a suit wherein John Baldwin and another were Plaintiffs

and Martin Baldwin and others were Defendants, the sum of three thousand nine hundred pounds, (being part of a sum of eight thousand nine hundred and ninety-two pounds four shillings and fourpence three pence per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities mentioned in the aforesaid decree, and being also part of the produce of the investment in such stock of the monies bequeathed by the said William Baldwin as aforesaid.) was ordered to be and has since been transferred by the Accountant General of the said Court of Chancery to our account and into our name in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, to be applied in and towards the maintenance of the minister to be appointed to the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the secondly herein mentioned Act, and we have in respect of such transfer agreed, and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year to such minister as aforesaid, when duly licensed, the yearly sum of one hundred and seventeen pounds.

"And whereas the said sum of three thousand nine hundred pounds, three pence per centum consolidated bank annuities was so transferred to us as aforesaid, upon the understanding that we should pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein-named Act to the minister for the time being of the said district, when duly licensed as before-mentioned, the annual sum of thirty-three pounds six shillings and eightpence; and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district and of the nomination of the minister thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter-mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Mary, Bilston (comprising the said place called or known as 'Bradley,' or some part thereof), and also all those portions of the said district parish of Christ Church, Coseley, which are mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette, of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Martin, Bradley.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered to pay out of the common fund before referred to, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, the sum of thirty-three pounds six shillings and eightpence in each and every year, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the license of such minister as aforesaid, and that in case a vacancy in the ministry of such district shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister making the vacancy, or his personal representative

or representatives, and the minister succeeding to such district.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereof shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and become absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised jointly by Martin Baldwin, of Wolverhampton aforesaid, Esquire, John Baldwin, of Wolverhampton aforesaid, Esquire, and Edward Pugh, of Bilston aforesaid, Esquire, their heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Martin, Bradley, being :—

"All that portion of the new parish of Saint Mary, Bilston (sometime part of the parish of Wolverhampton), in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield, which is situate to the south-west of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing such new parish from the new parish of Saint Luke, Bilston, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of the line of the Great Western Railway; and extending thence, south-eastward, along the middle of such line of railway as far as a point on the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary, Bilston, from the new parish of Moxley, in the same county and diocese; and extending thence, southward, along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary, Bilston, from the parish of Sedgley, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield aforesaid.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, and of another Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, sections two and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the seventh day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorising the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the Bishoprick of Norwich, and now vested in us.

"Whereas the Honorable and Right Reverend John Thomas, Bishop of Norwich, who succeeded to the see of Norwich, on an avoidance which happened before the passing of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, and was in the receipt of the annual amount named by Act of Parliament as the income of the Bishops of Norwich, videlicet, four thousand and five hundred pounds per annum, having signified his willingness to accept an endowment for his bishoprick in lands and hereditaments, in lieu of such income, an arrangement was, in pursuance of the said last-mentioned Act, and by an Order of your Majesty in Council, dated the ninth day of July last, and published in the London Gazette on the twelfth day of the same month, with the approbation of the said John Thomas, Bishop of Norwich, made for assigning the lands and hereditaments, particularly described in the schedule to the said Order, with their appurtenances, as an endowment for the said Bishoprick of Norwich, and the same, by virtue of such Order, became, as from the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, the endowment for the said bishoprick, subject always and nevertheless to the liabilities and charges to which the said lands and hereditaments were then specifically liable.

"And whereas, immediately from and after the said Order was published in the London Gazette, all the lands, hereditaments, and emoluments theretofore of or belonging to the said Bishoprick of Norwich (except such portions thereof as are so specified and described in the schedule aforesaid, and except all rights of patronage or pre-

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Norwich.

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district, for spiritual purposes, out of the parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, out of the new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, in the same county and diocese, out of the district parish of Saint John, Hoxton, in the same county and diocese, and out of the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Hoxton, in the same county and diocese.

“ Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, of the said new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, of the said district parish of Saint John, Hoxton, and of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Hoxton, hereinafter mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship), should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter set forth.

“ And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein-mentioned Acts.

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all those several portions of the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, of the said new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, of the said district parish of Saint John, Hoxton, and of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Hoxton, which are respectively mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette, of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named ‘The District of Saint Mary, Hoxton.’

“ And we further recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us in each and every year

to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed, according to the provisions of the herein secondly-mentioned Act, the sum of two hundred pounds, and that so soon as a church shall have been erected within such district, and shall have been approved by us, and consecrated as the church of such district, and for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish the further sum of one hundred pounds, making in the whole the sum of three hundred pounds, and that the said sums of two hundred pounds or three hundred pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister, or of the consecration of such church as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May, or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

“The District of Saint Mary, Hoxton, being:—

“All those several portions of the parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, of the new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, in the same county and diocese, of the district parish of Saint John, Hoxton in the same county and diocese, and of the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Hoxton, also in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within and are bounded, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, from the new parish of Saint Matthew, City-road, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of the City-road opposite to the middle of the south-western end of Wharf-road; and extending thence south-eastward, along the middle of the City-road aforesaid, crossing

And whereas the said scheme has, notwithstanding the said objections or observations, been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.
