

to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed, according to the provisions of the herein secondly-mentioned Act, the sum of two hundred pounds, and that so soon as a church shall have been erected within such district, and shall have been approved by us, and consecrated as the church of such district, and for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish the further sum of one hundred pounds, making in the whole the sum of three hundred pounds, and that the said sums of two hundred pounds or three hundred pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister, or of the consecration of such church as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May, or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament,

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

“The District of Saint Mary, Hoxton, being:—

“All those several portions of the parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, of the new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, in the same county and diocese, of the district parish of Saint John, Hoxton in the same county and diocese, and of the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Hoxton, also in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within and are bounded, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, from the new parish of Saint Matthew, City-road, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of the City-road opposite to the middle of the south-western end of Wharf-road; and extending thence south-eastward, along the middle of the City-road aforesaid, crossing

thereby the boundary dividing the said new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, from the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, and also crossing the boundary which divides the last-named parish from the district parish of Saint John, Hoxton, aforesaid, as far as a point in such last-named road opposite to the middle of the southern end of Plumber-street; and extending thence northward to and along the middle of such street to the boundary which divides the said district parish of Saint John, Hoxton, from the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Hoxton aforesaid; and extending thence north-westward along the last-described boundary, continuing thereby along the middle of the said Plumber-street and along the middle of Provost-street as far as the junction of the last-named-street with Murray-street; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with the road or street which passes between Vaughan-terrace and Horace-terrace; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-described road or street as far as a point opposite to the middle of the eastern end of Edward-street; and extending thence south-westward to and along the middle of the last-named street to the boundary which divides the new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, from the new parish of Saint Matthew, City-road, as aforesaid; and continuing thence, first south-westward along the last-described boundary, following thereby the middle of Edward-street aforesaid, and then in a direction more southward along the same boundary, following thereby the middle of Wharf-road aforesaid, to the first-described point in the middle of the City-road, opposite to the middle of the south-western end of Wharf-road aforesaid, where the said imaginary line commenced.”

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly-mentioned Act, been transmitted to the incumbents and to the patrons of the parish, new parishes, and district parish respectively out of which it is proposed that the district recommended in the said scheme to be constituted shall be taken.

And whereas the incumbent of the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, who is also the patron of the said new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, and the incumbent of the said new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, and the incumbent of the said district parish of Saint John, Hoxton, have taken and made certain objections or observations to or upon the said scheme, which said objections or observations have, together with such scheme, been laid before Her Majesty in Council.

And whereas the said scheme has, notwithstanding the said objections or observations, been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.
