In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be

made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentation shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

*Programme and Regulations for the International Exhibition.*

Art. 1. The Directors of the Oporto Crystal Palace Company and the Exhibition Committee have fixed Monday, the 21st of August, 1865, as the opening day of the Exhibition.

Art. 2. Every article produced or obtained by human industry in all countries will be admitted to the Exhibition, and classified under one of the four following great divisions :—

1. Raw materials and their immediate transformations ;
2. Machinery ;
3. Manufactures ;
4. Fine Arts.

These four Divisions comprehend the forty-five following classes :—

**1st Division.**

- Class 1. Mining, quarrying, and mineral products.
2. Forest industry, chase, fishery, and crops obtained without cultivation. Pisciculture and apparatus.
3. Agriculture, immediate products—vegetable and animal.
4. Alimentary substances and products in their different degrees of preparation.
5. Animal and vegetable substances used in manufactures.
6. Chemical and pharmaceutical substances and products.
7. Natural and artificial fertilizers.

## 2nd Division.

- Class 8. Railway plant, including locomotives, engines, and carriages.
9. Carriages not connected with rail or tram-roads.
  10. Manufacturing machines and tools.
  11. Machinery and mechanisms in general.
  12. Agricultural and horticultural machines and implements.
  13. Civil engineering, architectural and building contrivances.
  14. Military engineering, armour, and accoutrements, ordnance and small arms.
  15. Naval architecture, ships' tackle.
  16. Philosophical instruments, and processes depending upon their use.
  17. Photographic apparatus.
  18. Horological instruments.
  19. Musical Instruments,
  20. Surgical instruments and appliances.

## 3rd Division.

- Class 21. Cotton. }  
 22. Flax and hemp. } Including mixed fabrics.  
 23. Silk. }  
 24. Wool. }  
 25. Carpets. }  
 26. Woven, spun, felted, and laid fabrics, when shown as specimens of printing or dyeing.

 36. Works in precious metals and their imitations, and jewellery.  
 37. Glass.  
 38. Ceramic manufacture (china, porcelain, earthenware, &c.).  
 39. Manufactures not included in previous classes.

## 4th Division.

- Class 40. Architecture.
41. Paintings in oil and water colours, &c., and drawings.
  42. Sculpture and models; intaglios; die-sinking.
  43. Engraving; lithography.
  44. Enamels; mosaics; frescoes.
  45. Photography.

Art. 3. The exhibition will take place in the Company's buildings, "The Oporto Crystal Palace," in the city of Oporto.

Art. 4. The general exhibition will occupy the principal nave and aisles of the palace.

- 1st. For the Fine Art department, suitable picture galleries are provided in the body of the building.
- 2nd. The machinery will be placed in the Annex—a temporary iron building.
- 3rd. Cattle and other animals, which will be admitted during the period hereafter indicated (Art. 40), will have the necessary stalls.

Art. 5. No rent will be charged to exhibitors during the time appointed for the exhibition.

Art. 6. Rough counters and wall space will be provided gratuitously. The arrangements mentioned in Art. 26 will be at the charge of the exhibitor.

Art. 7. All goods and articles for the Exhibition must be delivered at the building free of any charge to the Company, and at the risk of the exhibitor. The reception of goods and articles for exhibition will commence on Monday, the 15th of May, 1865; and none will be received after the 31st of July.

Art. 8. Articles and packages will be unloaded at the building. Exhibitors may have their articles presented by their agents or employés; but if the said articles are not accompanied by any person, then the Exhibition Committee will order the opening of the same by their officers, and the distribution of the contents amongst the respective classes, all with utmost care, but at the risk of the owner.

Art. 9. Tickets will be issued to every exhibitor, his agent, or employé, to enable him to pass into the building, until the 20th August, between certain hours, to arrange the articles for exhibition. These tickets must be produced on entrance, and given up when required.

Art. 10. The most effectual means will be taken, in combination with the civil authorities, to guard against fire and protect the property of the exhibitors; but the Committee cannot be responsible for losses by fire, robbery, accident, or damage of any kind. (See Art. 25.)

Art. 11. The Committee reserve to themselves the right to exclude any article they may think unsuitable to the Exhibition.

Art. 12. The following articles will not be admitted:—

- 1st. Organic substances liable to decomposition and corruption.
- 2nd. Living animals—except during the days appointed for their exhibition, at the places destined for the same, in the grounds of the Company. (See Art. 40–42.)
- 3rd. Phosphorus, gunpowder, and all detonating or dangerous substances. Copper caps, or other articles of a similar nature, may be exhibited, provided the detonating powder be not inserted; also lucifer matches, with imitation tops.

Art. 13. Spirits or alcohol, oils, acids, corrosive salts, and substances of a highly inflammable nature, will only be admitted by special written permission, and must be held in well-secured glass vessels, containing not more of any of those liquid substances than half an imperial pint each; and are to be placed in trays of lead or gutta percha, large enough to hold the contents of the glass vessels should a breakage occur.

Substances liable to give off an offensive smell must be properly enclosed in air-tight cases; also all substances liable to melt.

Art. 14. All articles exhibited will be classified without regard to nationality; but in each class the objects exhibited by one nation may be placed together.

Any exhibitor whose goods can properly be placed together will be at liberty to arrange such goods in his own way, provided his arrangement is compatible with the general scheme of the Exhibition, and the convenience of exhibitors.

Art. 15. Prices of articles exhibited may be affixed in all the Divisions. These prices are obligatory, under the penalty of immediate exclusion from competition, and loss of all prizes.

Art. 16. Exhibitors cannot remove their goods, or substitute others for them, during the period of the Exhibition, without the permission of the Committee.

Art. 17. Exhibitors may employ (under the regulations of the Committee) assistants to preserve and keep in order the articles they exhibit, or to explain them to visitors.

Art. 18. Free admission--within certain limits--will be given to exhibitors.

Art. 19. Steam and water power required for the purposes of the Exhibition will be supplied gratuitously.

Art. 20. Besides making arrangements for showing machinery in motion, and illustrating it by processes, the Committee will reserve space (if early application is made) for the exhibition of such processes of manufactures as can be carried on without danger to the rest of the Exhibition.

Art. 21. The Committee, considering that it will be interesting and instructive to the general public to have the opportunity of seeing the following and similar processes, will reserve sufficient space for showing examples of each of them:—Steel pen making, pin making, needle making, button making, medal striking, gold chain making, engine-turning for watches, brick and drain-tile making, glove making, stocking weaving, the manufacture of linens, the manufacture of woollen fabrics, ribbon weaving, glass blowing on a small scale, type casting, type printing by hand, lithographic printing, copper-plate printing, earthenware printing, porcelain printing, a potter's wheel, turning in metal, wood, and ivory, lace-making of all kinds, book-binding, tabinet and poplin weaving, straw-plait making, pipe and cigar making.

Art. 22. All intending exhibitors must state whether they are the designers, inventors, manufacturers, importers, or producers of the articles they propose to exhibit.

Art. 23. Packing-cases must be removed and stored at the expense of exhibitors or their agents, as soon as the goods are unpacked and examined.

If not removed within three days after due notice has been given, the packing-cases will be removed by the Company's servants, and the exhibitors will be charged for cartage and storage.

Art. 24. The foregoing rule will not apply to the Fine Art Department. (See Art. 36.)

Art. 25. Exhibitors must insure their own goods, should they desire this security.

Art. 26. Exhibitors will be permitted, subject only to the necessary general regulations, to erect, according to their own taste, all the counters, stands, glass frames, brackets, awnings, hangings, or similar contrivances, which they may consider necessary for the display of their goods.

Art. 27. The following is the form of address which should be adopted:—

Art. 28. Intending exhibitors are requested to apply without delay to the Secretary, stating the space required under the following form:—

- 1st. Name and Christian name of applicant (or name of firm).
  - 2nd. Nature of business carried on.
  - 3rd. Address { Street, &c., &c., and No.  
Name of town and country.
  - 4th. Nature and quantity of articles to be exhibited.
  - 5th. Number of class in which they are to be exhibited.

The Committee will send printed forms to exhibitors on application.

Art. 29. In forwarding the goods, the exhibitors will have to send with the same a memorandum in duplicate, stating the name and christian name of exhibitor (or firm), the address, the number and weight of the packages, and the description of the articles and the price of each.

The Committee will furnish the forms of these memorandums on application to the Secretary.

Art. 30. On application by exhibitors, empty packing-cases will be warehoused up to the end of 1865 at the following scale of charges, including cartage to and from the Exhibition:—

- 800 reis (3s. 6d.) for package not exceeding 3 feet in its greatest dimension.
- 1,200 reis (5s. 4d.) for package not exceeding 4 feet in its greatest dimension.
- 1,600 reis (7s.) for package not exceeding 5 feet in its greatest dimension.
- 3,200 reis (14s.) for package not exceeding 8 feet in its greatest dimension.

Art. 31. Distinctive labels will be attached to such goods as are intended for sale, the price of which shall be entered in a book, kept by an officer of the Company, through whom all sales are to be made.

The labels must have the following words: *Vende-se,*

and the price.

Art. 32. Purchasers must, in all cases, pay a deposit of 15 per cent. on the purchase of any goods to the officer in charge of such accounts, and shall pay the remainder of the purchase-money, and, at their own expense, remove the article or articles purchased by him, within ten days from the final closing of the Exhibition.

No article will be considered sold, nor allowed to be marked sold, until the deposit has been paid.

Art. 33. In case any purchaser shall not pay the remainder of the purchase-money within the period specified, the deposit shall be forfeited, and may, at the option of the Committee, be given to the exhibitor of the article in question.

*Articles specially applicable to Fine Arts.*

Art. 34. No copies, drawings, or photographs of any of the works of art, will be allowed to be taken without the previous written consent of their respective owners.

Art. 35. All packing-cases must be legibly marked, on the inside, with the owner's name and address.

Art. 36. The empty packing-cases of this class will be warehoused at the Committee's charge.

Art. 37. No exhibitor in this class can obtain a prize, not being the author of the exhibited work.

Art. 38. At the close of the Exhibition a permanent gallery for pictures, &c., will be formed, and artists and others may leave their works on view, subject to the foregoing rules, and in accordance with the Directors of the Oporto Crystal Palace Company.

#### Foreign Articles—Customs.

Art. 39. In regard to foreign goods admitted to the Exhibition, the Exhibition building will be considered as a Custom-house store (entrepôt-réel), under convenient regulations proposed by the Government.

#### Supplementary Agricultural and Horticultural Show.

Art. 40. To make the International Exhibition more complete and attractive, there will be held, from the 5th to the 15th October, an Agricultural Show of living animals and plants.

Art. 41. This show will constitute, in relation to the International Exhibition, a supplementary and temporary class of the 1st Division.

Art. 42. This class is subdivided in the following manner :—

1st. Animals	Cattle.
	Horses.
	Sheep.
	Pigs.
	Poultry, &c.
	Bees.
2nd. Horticulture	Silkworms.
	Open air plants.
	Greenhouse plants.
	Stove plants.
	Fruits.
	Vegetables.

#### Rewards.

Art. 43. Medals and certificates of merit will be awarded in all the divisions and classes according to the decision of a mixed International Jury, partly appointed by the Council of the Exhibition, and partly elected by foreign exhibitors, in proportionable numbers.

Art. 44. Each class shall have an especial Jury, except where several classes have a natural connection, and are slightly represented, then one Jury may adjudicate on a group of several.

Art. 45. The President of each Jury shall be appointed by the Grand Council; but Vice-Presidents and reporters in each class shall be elected by the members of the respective Jury.

**TREASURY WARRANT.**

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage, certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, or in respect of letters, newspapers, parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers, transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post, and by the same Act powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of postage therein mentioned.

And whereas further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office.

And whereas it is expedient to fix certain rates of postage on packets consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize, of no intrinsic value, transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and the several places hereinafter set forth, and also to make certain regulations in relation thereto, as are hereinafter contained.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore-recited Acts of Parliament and each of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this



Warrant under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows; that is to say:—

1. All packets consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize, of no intrinsic value, posted in any part of the United Kingdom, addressed to Malta, or posted in Malta, addressed to any part of the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and Malta, either in the closed mail *viâ* Marseilles, and by British packet boat, or *viâ* France, and by French packet boat, subject to the several rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform single rate of postage of four pence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, for such transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned.

2. All packets consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize, of no intrinsic value, posted in any part of the United Kingdom, addressed to Alexandria, Cairo, or Suez, or posted in Alexandria, Cairo, or Suez, addressed to any part of the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and Alexandria, Cairo, and Suez, in the closed mail *viâ* Marseilles, and by British packet boat, subject to the several rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform single rate of postage of four pence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, for such transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned.

3. All packets consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize, of no intrinsic value, posted in any part of the United Kingdom, addressed to Shanghai, or any other port in China at which the British mail packet boat calls, or posted in Shanghai, or any other port in China at which the British mail packet boat calls, addressed to any part of the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and Shanghai, or other ports in China at which the British mail packet boat calls, subject to the several rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

On every such packet not exceeding four ounces in weight so transmitted direct *viâ* Egypt (the sea conveyance being by British packet boat), there shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform single rate of postage of four pence;

On every such packet not exceeding four ounces in weight so transmitted in the closed mail *viâ* Marseilles (the sea conveyance being by British packet boat), there shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform single rate of postage of sixpence;

And on every such packet if exceeding four ounces in weight there shall be charged, taken, and paid for such transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned.

4. All packets consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize of no intrinsic value posted in any part of the United Kingdom, addressed to any foreign port on the Western Coast of Africa at which the British mail packet boat calls, or posted in any foreign port on the Western Coast of Africa at which the British mail packet boat calls, addressed to any part of the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and such foreign ports on the Western Coast of Africa as aforesaid (the sea conveyance being by British packet boat), subject to the several rates of postage hereinafter mentioned (that is to say):—

On every such packet not exceeding four ounces in weight there shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform single rate of postage of threepence;

And on every such packet if exceeding four ounces in weight there shall be charged, taken, and paid for such transmission thereof as aforesaid, the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned.

5. Every packet which shall be transmitted by the post, under the authority of this Warrant, if exceeding four ounces in weight shall be subject to the several further and additional and progressive rates of postage hereinafter mentioned (that is to say):

On every such packet if exceeding four ounces and not exceeding one half of a pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two rates of postage;

And on every such packet if exceeding one half of a pound and not exceeding one pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid four rates of postage;

And on every such packet if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and one half of another pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid six rates of postage;

And on every such packet if exceeding one pound and one half of another pound and not exceeding two pounds in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid eight rates of postage;

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

6. Every packet which shall be transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant, shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several orders, directions, regulations, and conditions hereinafter contained (that is to say):—

7. No such packet, which in length or breadth or depth shall exceed the dimensions of two feet, shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant.

8. No pattern or sample being of any intrinsic value, or being an article or thing of a saleable nature, or having a value of its own apart from its mere use as a pattern or sample, shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant.

9. There shall be no enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other enclosure not authorised by this Warrant, sent in or with any such packet.

10. There shall be no writing or printing in or upon any such packet or on the cover thereof, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender thereof, a trade mark, and numbers and prices.

11. All such packets shall be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination; nevertheless samples of seeds, drugs, and such other articles and things as cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or of other material; but bags so closed that they cannot be readily opened, even although they be transparent shall not be used for that purpose.

12. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered, in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall in length or breadth or depth exceed the dimensions of two feet, or shall consist wholly of patterns or samples of any intrinsic value, as in the eighth clause of this Warrant mentioned, or if there shall be any writing or printing in or upon any such packet, or on the cover thereof, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender thereof, a trade mark, and numbers and prices, or if any such packets shall not be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination (except samples of seeds, drugs, and such other articles and things as cannot be sent in open covers, and which may be enclosed in bags of linen or of other material), or in case of bags being used, if such bags shall be so closed that they cannot be readily opened, every such packet shall be chargeable and shall be treated in all respects as a letter.

13. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered, in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant shall contain any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any other enclosure not authorised by this Warrant, every such enclosure may be taken out by any officer of the Post Office, and, at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be forwarded to the address on the packet, charged not only with the full rates of postage as an unpaid letter, but also, in the case of packets transmitted by the post under the provisions of the first, second, and fourth clauses of this Warrant, with a further and additional rate of postage of three pence, and, in the case of packets transmitted by the post under the provisions of the third clause of this Warrant, with a further and additional rate of postage of four pence, and the remainder of the packet, if duly prepaid by stamps, may be forwarded to the place of its address without any extra charge.

14. The postage of all such packets as aforesaid, posted in the United Kingdom, shall, in every case, be paid at the time of the same being posted, not in money, but by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, and the postage of all such packets as aforesaid, posted in Malta, or in Alexandria, Cairo, or Suez, shall also, in every case, be paid at the time of the same being posted, either in money or by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall, in every case, be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon under or by virtue of this Warrant.

15. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered, in order to be sent by the post under the provi-

sions of this Warrant, shall be posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Malta, without having thereon or affixed thereto any postage stamp, or shall be posted in Malta addressed to the United Kingdom, without any postage having been paid thereon, either in money or in postage stamps, every such respective packet shall be forwarded charged with a postage of double the amount of postage to which it would have been liable under and by virtue of this Warrant if the postage had been paid when posted.

16. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered, in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Alexandria, Cairo, or Suez, without having thereon or affixed thereto any postage stamp, or having thereon or affixed thereto a postage stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the single rate of postage payable, under this Warrant, on a packet not exceeding four ounces in weight, every such respective packet shall be detained and opened, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof.

17. If any packet sent or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Shanghai, or any other port in China at which the British mail packet boat calls, or to any foreign port on the Western Coast of Africa at which the British mail packet boat calls, without the postage payable thereon being paid at the time of the same being posted, by means of the proper postage stamp or stamps being affixed thereto, every such respective packet shall be detained and opened, and returned or given up to the sender thereof.

18. If any packet sent or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be posted in Alexandria, Cairo, or Suez, addressed to the United Kingdom, without any postage having been paid thereon, either in money or in postage stamps, or with a postage paid thereon in money or in postage stamps, less in amount than the single rate of postage payable under this Warrant, on a packet not exceeding four ounces in weight, every such respective packet shall be forwarded, charged with the full rates of postage, as an unpaid letter.

19. If any packet sent or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Malta, having thereon or affixed thereto a stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable under and by virtue of this Warrant, or shall be posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Alexandria, Cairo, or Suez, having thereon or affixed thereto a stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable, under and by virtue of this Warrant; but equal in amount to the single rate of postage payable under this Warrant, on a packet not exceeding four ounces in weight, or shall be posted in Malta, addressed to the United Kingdom, with a postage paid thereon in money or in postage stamps less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable under this Warrant, or shall be posted in Alexandria, Cairo, or Suez, addressed to the United Kingdom, with a postage paid thereon in money or in postage stamps less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable under this Warrant, but equal in amount to the single rate of postage payable thereon, every such respective packet

shall be forwarded, charged with the amount of the difference between the postage paid thereon or the value of such stamp or stamps so being thereon, or affixed thereto, and the postage to which such packet would be liable as aforesaid, together with a further and additional rate of postage of three pence.

20. In order to prevent any obstacles to the due and regular transmission of letters by the post, any officer of the Post Office may delay the transmission of any packet posted or forwarded by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, either for the space of twenty-four hours after the time at which the same ought to be despatched in due course of the post, or (at his option) until the despatch of the mail next after that by which the same ought, in due course of the post, to be forwarded by him.

21. And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by a certain other Warrant, in writing, under their hands, bearing date at Whitehall, Treasury Chambers, the 22nd day of December, 1863, did order and direct, that all packets consisting of patterns or samples of merchandise of no intrinsic value, posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Italy, or posted in Malta addressed to Italy, might be transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to Italy in closed mails *viâ* France, and from Malta to Italy by French or by Italian mail packet boats, subject to the several rates of postage, and to the several regulations therein respectively mentioned and contained. And the said Commissioners did order and direct (amongst other things), that there should be no writing or marks of any description, in or upon any packet transmitted by the post, under the authority of the now reciting Warrant, or on the cover thereof, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, a trade mark and number and price.

22. Now we do hereby further order and direct that, notwithstanding anything in the said recited

Warrant of the 26th day of December, 1861, and the 22nd day of December, 1863, respectively contained to the contrary, packets consisting of patterns of merchandise transmitted by the post under the authority of the said last-mentioned Warrants between the Island of Malta and any part of France or Algeria from the United Kingdom to Italy, and from Malta to Italy may, in addition to bearing or having thereon in writing the address of the person for whom they are intended, and a manufacturer's or trade mark, or number or price, bear or have thereon the address of the sender thereof.

§123. The term "foreign port" used in this Warrant shall include any foreign places on the Western Coast of Africa, and also any foreign islands situate within the distance of fifty miles from the same coast; and the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96.

24. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, revoke, or modify any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time may appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

25. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.

*Fixed Light on Oyster Rocks, Sedashigur Bay.*

INFORMATION has been received at the Admiralty, that a temporary light has been established on the Oyster Rocks, off the port of Carwar, Sedashigur Bay.

The light is a *fixed* white light, at an elevation of 160 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 10 miles.

The tower is round, of white granite, 40 feet high, and stands on the summit of the outer Oyster Rock, in lat. 14° 49' 15" N., long. 74° 2' 45" East of Greenwich.

The apparatus is to be replaced by a dioptric one of the first order, when the light will be visible 20 miles.

A sunken rock, with 14 feet on it at low water, lies between the Oyster Rocks and Elephant Islet, with the lighthouse bearing N.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N., distant  $1\frac{1}{6}$  miles; Elephant Islet E.S.E.,  $6\frac{1}{2}$  cables; and the western ends of Deogur and Coormaghur Islets nearly in line about N.N.E. A red buoy marks its north-west side.

Also, a shoal about 50 yards in length north and south, and 20 yards east and west, with  $2\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms on it at low water, over rocky bottom and shells, lies with the lighthouse bearing S.E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E., distant  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles; Coormaghur Islet E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N.; and Black Rock N.N.E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E. There are 10 fathoms all round the shoal. A red buoy marks the west side of it; vessels should not approach nearer than a cable.

**Directions.**—Steam-vessels from the northward should make Cape Ramas, and then steer for the Oyster Rocks lighthouse, avoiding the rocky shoal north-west of the lighthouse. When within 3 to 4 miles of the lighthouse, the Collector's bungalow on Konay Hill will be seen, and when it bears E.S.E., steer for it, and anchor in 4 or 5 fathoms water, mud bottom, near a white buoy which is placed to mark the anchorage, at about half-a-mile from the shore. As the Oyster light is approached at night, a red light should be seen on the shore of the Bay; and when it bears E.S.E., steer for it, and anchor in about 5 fathoms water, as before.

Vessels from the southward should make the Oyster Rocks lighthouse, and during day can with safety pass between them and Carwar Head. The highest part of Deogur Islet on with the highest part of Goormaghur Islet, leads eastward of the Oyster Rocks reef, which will shortly be marked by a beacon. When the Collector's bungalow on Konay Hill is in sight, bring it to bear E.S.E., steer for it, and anchor as before. Vessels from the southward at night should not pass between the Oyster Rocks and Carwar Head, unless well acquainted with the harbour; but should keep westward of the Oyster light until the red light on the shore of the Bay bears E.S.E., then steer for it.

Sailing-vessels making the port at night should anchor in about 8 fathoms water, near the Oyster Rocks light, and wait till daylight. It is high water at full and change at 9h. 30m. A.M., and the rise is 7 to 8 feet.
