### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her

Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Princess.

## TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, and in respect of letters, newspapers, parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers, transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post.

And whereas by an Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office," the provision concerning the maximum weight of letters to be sent by the post as fixed in and by the said first-mentioned Act is repealed, and in order to prevent packets of an unwieldy bulk, or an inconvenient size, being transmitted by the post, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, at any time or times thereafter, by Warrant under their hands, to fix a maximum weight of letters to be sent by the post, and from time to time to repeal or revoke such maximum weight wholly or in part, and declare any other maximum weight in lieu thereof, and all letters are to be forwarded, conveyed, and delivered by the post in conformity with any such Warrant; and also in conformity with, under, and subject to, all such orders, conditions, limitations, regulations, and restrictions, as to the form, size, or dimensions thereof, whether in proportion to the weight or otherwise as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, shall from time to time direct; and by the said Act power is also given to the Postmaster-General to collect and receive the foreign and colonial postage charged or chargeable on any letters sent by the post, and also with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to require the postage, British, colonial, or foreign, of any letters sent by the post, to be prepaid either in money or in stamps as he may think fit, on the same being put into the Post Office; and also with such consent to abolish or restrict the prepayment in money of postage on letters sent by the post, either altogether or on certain letters, and to require the prepayment thereof to be in stamps, and to refuse to receive or send by the post any letters tendered contrary to any regulations thereby made; and it is also declared and enacted that it shall be lawful for the Postmaster-General, and any officer of the Post Office, to detain any letters which shall be posted or sent by the post contrary to the regulations of that Act, or of the first-mentioned Act, or contrary to any regulations made under the authority of that Act, or the said first-mentioned Act, or contrary to the regulations of any Treasury Warrant to be issued under or by virtue of that Act, or which had been or should be issued under or by virtue of the said first-mentioned Act, and to open such letters, and either to return them to the senders thereof, or to forward them to the places of their destination, charged in either case with such rates of postage as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, shall from time to time direct.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by divers Warrants under their hands, have fixed and limited the dimensions of letters and packets transmissible by the post within the United Kingdom, and it is expedient to

alter the same in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the undersigned, being two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do, in exercise of the powers reserved to us, in and by the said before-mentioned Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, by this Warrant under our hands, order and direct as follows:--

1. That (except in the cases hereinafter mentioned) no letter or packet of any description whatever, which in length shall exceed two feet, or in breadth or depth one foot, shall be forwarded by the post between any places within the United Kingdom, nor by the post of any post town in the United Kingdom.

2. That the preceding clause shall not extend or apply to petitions or addresses forwarded to Her Majesty, or to petitions or addresses to Her Majesty, or petitions to either House of Parliament forwarded to any Member of either House of Parliament, or to printed votes or proceedings of Parliament, or to letters or packets of any description whatever to or from any of the Government offices or departments, or to or from any public officer to whom the Postmaster General shall, from time to time, direct that the exemption hereby granted shall be extended, but so that the petitions and addresses forwarded to any Member of either House of Parliament, and printed votes and proceedings of Parliament be sent without covers, or in covers open at the sides, and so that if any such petitions or addresses to Her Majesty, or petitions to either House of Parliament forwarded to any Member of either House of Parliament, shall exceed thirty-two ounces in weight, according to the provisions of the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, the whole of such respective petitions and addresses shall be chargeable as heretofore with the full letter rates of postage.

3. That every letter sent or tendered, or delivered, in order to be sent by the post between any places in the United Kingdom, or by the post of any post town in the United Kingdom, which shall in length exceed two feet, or in breadth or depth one foot (except as hereinbefore is provided) shall and may be detained and opened, (and at the option of the Postmaster General) shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination under and subject to the following regulations (that is to say), if the postage of such letter shall have been prepaid in money, or if such letter shall bear a stamp or stamps equal in value or amount to the rates of postage to which it shall be liable, such letter may be returned or given up or forwarded (at the option of the Postmaster General) as aforesaid, free of any further or additional charge for postage; but if any such letter shall be posted without any stamp thereon, and without the postage thereof being prepaid, the same on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall be chargeable with a postage of double the amount to which it would have been liable if the postage thereof had been prepaid when posted; and if any such letter shall have thereon or affixed thereto any stamp or stamps the value or amount of which shall be less than the rate of postage to which such letter would be liable if prepaid, or if the sum prepaid shall be less than the postage to which the letter was liable as prepaid, there shall be charged thereon a postage of double the amount of the difference between the value of such stamp

or stamps, or the sum so prepaid, and the full postage to which such letter would have been liable if prepaid.

4. That every packet of whatever description (except letters) sent or tendered, or delivered, in order to be sent by the post between any places in the United Kingdom, or by the post of any post town in the United Kingdom, which shall in length exceed two feet, or in breadth or depth one foot (except as hereinbefore is provided), shall and may be detained and opened, and at the option of the Postmaster General be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination, and every such packet on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall, at the discretion of the Postmaster General, be chargeable with any rate or amount of postage he shall think proper not exceeding a postage of double the amount of postage to which it would have been liable as a letter if the postage had been paid when posted, nor less than the rate of postage which such packet would have been chargeable with if authorised to be transmitted by the post.

5. That so much of two several Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date respectively the 22nd day of October, 1847, and the 16th day of October, 1857; and so much of the several orders and directions therein respectively contained as relate to the dimensions of letters and packets authorized to be transmitted by the post within the United Kingdom shall be and the same are hereby repealed, revoked, and annulled.

6. That this Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.

7. That it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, for the time being, of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two of them, by Warrant under their hands at any time hereafter to alter or repeal any of the rates hereby fixed or altered, or the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time to appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

#### TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage, it was enacted that all letters and newspapers, and other printed papers which should be posted in any town or place within the United Kingdom, or should be brought from parts beyond the seas to any port or place within the United Kingdom, or should be sent by the post between the United Kingdom and places beyond the seas, or between any of the other places therein mentioned, or should pass through the United Kingdom, should be subject to the several regulations and rates thereafter contained, and further that letters transmitted by the post should be charged by weight according to the scale therein mentioned, and that the several numbers of rates of postage thereafter set forth should be charged

by and be paid to Her Majesty's Postmaster General for the use of Her Majesty on letters transmitted by the post, that is to say: on every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight one rate of postage; on every letter exceeding half an ounce, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage; on every letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage; on every letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage; on every letter exceeding three ounces, and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of postage; and for every ounce in weight, above the weight of four ounces, there should be charged and taken two additional rates of postage; and every fraction of an ounce, above the weight of four ounces, should be charged as one additional ounce. And it was by the said now reciting Act further enacted, that the following rates of postage (amongst others) should be charged by and paid to Her Majesty's Postmaster General for the use of Her Majesty on letters transmitted by the post, that is to say: Inland letters,—on all letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by the post between places within the United Kingdom (not being letters sent to or from parts beyond the seas), or posted in any post town in the United Kingdom, addressed to persons or places within such town or the suburbs thereof, there should be charged and paid one uniform rate of one penny, without reference to the number of sheets or pieces of paper or enclosures of which the same might be comprised, or to the distance or number of miles the same should be conveyed; and that on all such letters, if exceeding half an ounce in weight, there should be charged and paid progressive and additional rates of postage (each additional rate being estimated at one penny) according to the scale of weight and number of rates thereinbefore fixed and declared, and hereinbefore recited and mentioned; provided that such postage of one penny and such progressive and additional postage were prepaid at the time of posting such letters, or that such letters were duly and properly stamped when posted, as thereafter provided; but in case such postage on any such letters should not be prepaid, and such letters should not be duly and properly stamped, there should be charged on such letters the rate of postage thereafter mentioned. And by the said now reciting Act it was also enacted that the Postmaster-General might, at any time thereafter, charge for the use of Her Majesty on all letters, newspapers, and other printed papers sent by the post on which the postage should not be prepaid, and which should not be duly and properly stamped, and also on all letters sent by the post without being duly and properly stamped, although the postage thereon should be wholly or in part prepaid, such higher rates of postage than would otherwise by law be payable on such letters, newspapers, or other printed papers as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by Warrant under their hands, should from time to time deem expedient, and might also remit any of the rates of British postage or inland postage for the time being payable by law on the transmission of post letters, newspapers, or other printed papers to such extent as the Lords of the Treasury should from time to time direct.

And whereas by another Act of Parliament made and passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the tenth and eleventh years of the reign of Her Majesty, cap. 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage

thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office, it was enacted that, in order to prevent packets of an unwieldy bulk or an inconvenient size being transmitted by the post, it should be lawful for the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, at any time or times thereafter, by Warrant under their hands, to fix the maximum weight of letters to be sent by the post, and from time to time to repeal or revoke such maximum weight wholly or in part, and declare any other maximum of weight in lieu thereof, and that all letters should be forwarded, conveyed, and delivered by the post, in conformity with any such Warrant, and also in conformity with, and under and subject to, all such orders, conditions, limitations, regulations, and restrictions as to the form, size, or dimensions thereof, whether in proportion to the weight or otherwise, as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, should from time to time direct; and by the said now reciting Act it was also enacted, that in all cases in which the British postage chargeable on any letters sent by the post should exceed the sum of one penny it should be lawful for the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by Warrant under their hands, to reduce such postage to any other rate of postage they might from time to time think fit.

And whereas by a certain Warrant under the hands of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date at Whitehall Treasury Chambers, the 22nd day of October, 1847, it was (amongst other things) ordered and directed that (except as hereinafter was provided or mentioned) if any letter exceeding four ounces in weight should be sent or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post between any places within the United Kingdom, or by the post of any post town in the United Kingdom, the postage of every such letter, according to the scale of weight and number and amount of rates of postage fixed and chargeable upon letters transmitted by the post between places within the United Kingdom, by the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty (being the first hereinbefore recited Act), should be prepaid in money, or such letter should be duly and properly stamped when posted.

And whereas inland letters have been heretofore, and since the passing of the said first hereinbefore recited Act, transmitted by the post, charged with rates of postage according to the scale of weight and number of rates fixed and declared in and by the said last-mentioned Act, and it is considered expedient to remit certain of the said rates of British postage or inland postage now payable on the transmission of such post letters, and to reduce the British postage chargeable thereupon in certain cases where such postage exceeds the sum of one penny, by altering the scale of weight and numbers of rates payable on such letters exceeding one ounce in weight, pursuant to the powers given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by and contained in the said hereinbefore recited Acts, and also to alter and amend the said hereinbefore recited Treasury Warrant, bearing date the 22nd day of October, 1847, in conformity thereto, in the manner hereinafter mentioned and contained.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers and authority vested in us in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in

that case made and provided, order and direct as follows:—

1. On all inland letters transmitted by the post between places within the United Kingdom (not being letters sent to or from parts beyond the seas), or posted in any post town in the United Kingdom, addressed to persons or places within such town or the suburbs thereof, if exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, there shall be charged and paid, in lieu and instead of the progressive and additional rates of postage charged according to the scale, and the several numbers of rates of postage mentioned and set forth, and authorised to be charged and paid, in and by the said hereinbefore recited Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-six, on such last-mentioned letters, the progressive and additional rates of postage, and according to the scale of weight hereinafter mentioned and set forth, each additional rate being estimated at one penny; that is to say:—

On every such inland letter exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, one additional rate of one penny, that is to say, a postage of two pence; On every such letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding one ounce and one half of another ounce in weight, a postage of three pence;

On every such letter exceeding one ounce and one half of another ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, a postage of four pence;

On every such letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding two ounces and one half of another ounce in weight, a postage of five pence;

On every such letter exceeding two ounces and one half of another ounce, and not exceeding three ounces in weight, a postage of six pence;

And for every additional half of an ounce in weight, above the weight of three ounces, there shall be charged and taken one additional rate of postage of one penny;

And every fraction of half of an ounce in weight, above the weight of three ounces, shall be charged as an additional half ounce in weight, and shall be liable to an additional rate of postage of one penny;

Provided that such postage be prepaid at the time of posting such letters, or that such letters be duly and properly stamped when posted, as provided by the said first hereinbefore recited Act; but in case such postage on any such letters shall not be prepaid, or such letters shall not be duly and properly stamped, there shall be charged on such letters a postage of double the amount to which such letters would otherwise be liable under this present Warrant.

2. The postage of every letter exceeding four ounces in weight, directed by the said hereinbefore recited Treasury Warrant, bearing date the 22nd day of October, 1847, to be prepaid in money, or to be duly and properly stamped when posted as is hereinbefore in that behalf mentioned and recited, shall be prepaid in money, or such letter shall be duly and properly stamped according to the scale of weight and amount of rates of postage hereinbefore by this Warrant fixed and made chargeable and payable upon such letters, and not according to the scale of weight and number and amount of rates of postage fixed and chargeable upon such letters by the said recited Act of the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Ma-



jesty, chapter 96, as in the said recited Warrant is mentioned, anything in the said recited Treasury Warrant contained to the contrary thereof notwithstanding.

3. The terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act of the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96.

4. The Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury for the time being, by Warrant duly made, may at any time hereafter alter or repeal any of the rates of postage hereby fixed or altered, or any of the regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates of postage or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates of postage that may be payable are to be paid.

5. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.

#### TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-six, for the regulation of the duties of postage, certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, or in respect of letters, newspapers, parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post; and, by the same Act, powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of postage therein mentioned.

And whereas further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-five, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by a certain Warrant in writing under their hands, bearing date at Whitehall, Treasury Chambers, the 17th day of August, 1864, in exercise of the powers reserved to them in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, did order and direct that all packets consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize, of no intrinsic value, posted in the United Kingdom, might be transmitted by the post within the United Kingdom, subject to the several rates of postage and regulations therein contained; and the said Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury did further order and direct that the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury might, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time thereafter, alter, repeal, revoke, or modify any of the rates of postage thereby fixed, or any of the regulations thereby made, and might make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at

what time the rates that might be payable were to be paid.

And whereas, since the making of the said recited Warrant, difficulties have arisen in deciding whether certain patterns or samples transmitted by the post, under the authority of the said Warrant, are of intrinsic value, and it is therefore expedient to remove the restriction upon patterns or samples of merchandize of intrinsic value, and to authorize the transmission of such patterns or samples by the post, and, for that purpose, to repeal the said recited Warrant, and the rates of postage and regulations therein mentioned, and to fix certain other rates of postage, and make certain other regulations in the manner herein-after mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, and each of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows; that is to say:—

1. All packets consisting of patterns or samples posted in the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post within the United Kingdom, subject to the several rates of postage, and to the several orders, directions, regulations, and restrictions hereinafter mentioned and contained; that is to say:—

2. On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of two pence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces, and not exceeding eight ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of fourpence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding eight ounces, and not exceeding sixteen ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of eight pence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding sixteen ounces, and not exceeding twenty-four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of one shilling.

3. No such packet which shall exceed twenty-four ounces in weight, or which in length shall exceed two feet, or in breadth or depth one foot, shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant.

4. There shall be no enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other enclosure not authorized by this Warrant, sent in or with any such packet.

5. There shall be no writing or printing upon any such packet, or on the cover thereof, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender thereof, a trade mark, and number and price of the pattern or sample contained therein, nor shall there be any writing or printing in any such packet, except the address of the sender thereof, a trade mark, and number and price of the pattern or sample contained therein, which shall in all such last-mentioned cases be written or printed on labels attached to the pattern or sample.

6. All such packets shall be sent in covers open at the ends so as to be easy of examination; nevertheless samples of seeds, drugs, and such other articles and things as cannot be sent in open covers may be enclosed in boxes or in bags of linen or of other material, which shall be fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened,



but bags so closed that they cannot be readily opened, even although they be transparent, shall not be used for that purpose.

7. If any packet sent or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant shall exceed twenty-four ounces in weight, or shall in length exceed two feet, or in breadth or depth one foot, or if there shall be any writing or printing upon any such packet, pattern, or sample, or label attached thereto, or on the cover thereof, except as in the fifth clause of this Warrant mentioned, or if any such packets shall not be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination, except samples of seeds, drugs, and such other articles and things as cannot be sent in open covers, and which may be enclosed in boxes or in bags of linen or of other material which shall be fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened, or in case of boxes or bags being used, if such boxes or bags shall be so closed that they cannot be readily opened, every such packet shall and may be detained and opened, and (at the option of the Postmaster-General) be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed or be forwarded to the place of its destination, and every such packet on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall, at the discretion of the Postmaster-General, be chargeable with any rate or amount of postage he shall think fit, not exceeding a postage of double the amount of postage to which it would have been liable as a letter if the postage had been paid when posted, nor less than the rate of postage which such packet would have been chargeable with if authorized to be transmitted by the post.

8. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered, in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall contain any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any other enclosure not authorized by this Warrant, every such enclosure may be taken out by any officer of the Post Office, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be forwarded to the address on the packet charged not only with the full rates of postage as an unpaid letter, but also with a further and additional rate of postage of one penny, and the remainder of the packet, if duly prepaid by stamps, may be forwarded to the place of its address, without any extra charge.

9. The postage of all such packets as aforesaid shall in every case be paid at the time of the same being posted, not in money, but by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet, near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon, under or by virtue of this Warrant.

10. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered, in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be posted without having thereon or affixed thereto any postage stamp, every such last-mentioned packet shall be forwarded charged with a postage of double the amount of postage to which it would have been liable under and by virtue of this Warrant, if the postage had been paid by stamps when posted. And if any such packet shall be posted, having thereon or affixed thereto a stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable, under and by virtue of this Warrant, but equal in amount to one penny at the least, every

such last-mentioned packet shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the difference between the value of such stamp or stamps so being thereon or affixed thereto, and the postage to which such packet would be liable as aforesaid, together with a further and additional rate of twopence.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by a certain Warrant in writing under their hands, bearing date at Whitehall Treasury Chambers, the 28th day of November, 1844, in exercise of the powers reserved to them in and by the said firstly hereinbefore recited Act, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, did declare, consent, and direct (amongst other things) that no packet should be forwarded, conveyed, or delivered by the post within the United Kingdom, containing any razor, scissors, knife, fork, or other sharp or pointed instrument, or any article, matter, or thing whatsoever which might by pressure or otherwise be rendered injurious either to the officers of the Post Office or to the contents of the mail bags.

11. Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do hereby declare and direct that, notwithstanding the said recited Warrant of the 28th day of November, 1844, any packet posted in the United Kingdom, containing any razor, scissors, knife, fork, or other sharp or pointed instrument, keys, watch machinery, metal, metal tubing, or ore, or such like, shall and may be transmitted by the post within the United Kingdom, subject to the several rates of postage, and to the several orders, directions, regulations, and restrictions herein mentioned and contained; provided that every such razor, scissors, knife, fork, or other sharp or pointed instrument, keys, watch machinery, metal, metal tubing, or ore, or such like, so contained in any packet, be securely packed and guarded. And every such packet shall not only conform in every respect to the several orders, directions, regulations and restrictions herein contained, but the same shall also furnish sufficient protection against injury to the officers of the Post Office and to the contents of the mail bags; provided always, that nothing herein contained shall extend to authorize the transmission by the post within the United Kingdom of any packet containing any explosive or other dangerous material or substance.

12. And we do further order and direct, that if any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the authority of the eleventh clause of this Warrant, shall be posted or transmitted by the post without being securely packed and guarded, and without furnishing sufficient protection against injury to the officers of the Post Office and to the contents of the mail bags, as in such eleventh clause of this Warrant provided (of which the Postmaster-General shall be the sole judge), every such respective packet shall and may be detained and opened, and (at the option of the Postmaster-General) shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed; and every such packet on being so returned or given up, shall be chargeable with any rate or amount of postage the Postmaster-General shall think fit, not exceeding the letter rates of postage.

13. And we do further order and direct that, in order to prevent any obstacle to the due and regular transmission of letters by the post, any officer of the Post Office may delay the transmission of any packet posted or forwarded by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, for the space of twenty-four hours after the time at

which the same ought to be despatched, in due course of the post, whenever it may be necessary so to do, or (at his option) until the despatch of the mail next after that by which the same ought, in due course of the post, to be forwarded by him.

14. And we further order and direct that in all cases in which any question shall hereafter arise whether any packet, or any pattern, or sample contained therein, transmitted under or by virtue of this Warrant, is entitled to the privileges of this Warrant, and to be so transmitted within the intent and meaning thereof, such question shall be referred to the determination of the Postmaster-General, whose decision thereupon shall be final and conclusive upon all parties.

15. And we further order and direct that all packets transmitted by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall, in all respects (save and except as is hereinbefore mentioned and directed), be transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to the same or the like orders, directions, regulations, and conditions for the time being in force, and applicable to packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art transmitted by the post within the United Kingdom.

16. And we further order and direct that the terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96.

17. And we further order and direct that the said recited Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 17th day of August, 1864, shall be, and the same is hereby repealed, revoked, and annulled, and the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage therein mentioned and set forth shall wholly cease and determine.

18. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, revoke, or modify any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time may appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

19. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.
