### REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to

The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentation shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the sixteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme, for substituting a money payment to the Archdeacon of Saint David's, in the Cathedral of Saint David's, for certain property belonging to his Archdeaconry.

"Whereas it was by the above-mentioned Acts enacted, that by the authority therein provided, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions thereof, any arrangement might from time to time be made, with the consent, in writing, under the hand of any dignitary or officer of any cathedral church, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or

other hereditaments belonging to such dignitary or officer, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting in any case any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments,

“And whereas the said Archdeaconry of Saint David's is endowed, *inter alia*, with the Prebend of Meidrim or Mydrim, in the said Cathedral of Saint David's, and with the lands, tithes, and hereditaments to the said prebend belonging, and the Venerable George Clark is the present holder of the said archdeaconry, and as such archdeacon is in possession of a house of residence situate at Saint David's.

“And whereas one of the purposes of the said firstly-mentioned Act is to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls in parishes where the same is required.

“And whereas it has been agreed between us and the Venerable George Clark, that with a view to better carrying into effect the aforesaid purpose of the said firstly-mentioned Act, the following arrangement should be recommended by us to your Majesty in Council.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the said George Clark, testified by his having signed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that immediately upon the gazetting of any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, all lands, tithes, and other hereditaments whatsoever, belonging to the Prebend of Meidrim or Mydrim, so annexed to the said Archdeaconry of Saint David's as aforesaid (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage, and excepting also the house of residence at Saint David's), and all the estate, right, title, and interest therein of the said George Clark and his successors, Archdeacons of Saint David's, shall become and be absolutely vested in us and our successors, for the purposes of the said Acts, subject nevertheless to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof, or of any part or parts thereof, and subject also to the discharge of any liability which attaches, or may attach, to the said archdeacon, in respect of first fruits or tenths chargeable on the estates and premises herein recommended to be transferred to us as aforesaid, and that we shall upon such gazetting as aforesaid, be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds of the said lands, tithes, and hereditaments as from the said first day of January in the year last past; and that in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance there shall be paid by us to the said George Clark and to his successors, Archdeacons of Saint David's, the annual sum of two hundred and sixty pounds, by equal half yearly payments on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year, and that immediately upon such gazetting as aforesaid there shall be paid by us to the said George Clark, the sum of two hundred and sixty pounds, in respect of the period which elapsed between the said first day of January in the year last past and the first day of January now last past; provided always, that no renewal of any lease, nor any new lease of the said lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, or of any part thereof, was or shall since the twenty-sixth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, have been or shall be granted or made by the said George Clark.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them,

in conformity with the provisions of the said Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Saint David's.

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Masbrough, in the parish of Rotherham, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York.

“Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Rotherham and of the chapelry district of Greasborough (some time part of the same parish), which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and chapelry district respectively.

“And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Rotherham, and of the said chapelry district of Greasborough, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Masbrough aforesaid.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honorable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York, and the patron in right of his see of the vicarage of the said parish of Rotherham, and with the consent of the Right Honorable William Thomas Spencer, Earl Fitzwilliam, the patron of the perpetual curacy of

the said chapelry district of Greasborough (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Rotherham, and of the said chapelry district of Greasborough, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Masbrough aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Masbrough;' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the said William, Archbishop of York, and his successors, Archbishops of York, for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Masbrough, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Rotherham, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the south-east by an imaginary line extending along the middle of the river Don, on the west by the chapelry district of Saint Thomas, Kimberworth, sometime part of the aforesaid parish, and on the north by the chapelry district of Greasborough, also sometime part of the same parish of Rotherham.

"And also all that portion of the said chapelry district of Greasborough which is situate to the south of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides such chapelry district from the said parish of Rotherham, at a point in the middle of the line of the Midland Railway; and extending thence, north-eastward, along the middle of the said line of railway, for a distance of five furlongs, or thereabouts, to the centre of the bridge which carries such line of railway over the private road leading from Wentworth Woodhouse to Kirk Gate Lodge; and extending thence, south-eastward, along the middle of such private road, to its junction with the road leading from Park Gate to Masbrough; and extending thence, southward, along the middle of the last-described road, as far as the boundary which divides the said chapelry district of Greasborough from the parish of Rotherham aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all those several portions of the said parish of Kelloe, and of the said parish of Bishop Middleham, which are respectively mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Cassop-cum-Quarrington.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, the sum of two hundred pounds, and that so soon as a church shall have been erected within such district, and shall have been approved by us, and consecrated as the church of such district, and for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the said last-men-

tioned Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the further sum of one hundred pounds, making in the whole the sum of three hundred pounds, and that the said sums of two hundred pounds or three hundred pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of the consecration of such church as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May, or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that, instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Cassop-cum-Quarrington, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Kelloe, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham, which is comprised within that, the greater part of the township of Cassop, known as 'Old Cassop,' and containing by admeasurement one thousand one hundred and ninety-four statute acres or thereabouts; and also all that further portion of the same parish which is comprised within that part of the township of Quarrington which is situate to the north-east of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish of Kelloe from the parish of Bishop Middleham, in the county and diocese aforesaid, at a point distant about one hundred yards to the south-west of the southern end of Four Mile Bridge, and distant exactly one hundred yards from and to the west of the western side of the turnpike road leading from Durham to Stockton, and extending thence north-westward in a course distant one hundred yards from and parallel to the western side of the turnpike road aforesaid to a point situate about one hundred and twenty yards to the north-east of Bowburn House, on the boundary which divides the said parish of Kelloe from the extra-parochial part or place called 'Whitwell House.'

"And also all those several portions of the said parish of Bishop Middleham which are comprised within those parts of the township of

Cornforth, near Four Mile Bridge and Low Peat Edge, which are also situate to the north-east of the said imaginary line."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the herein-before secondly mentioned Act, been transmitted to the incumbents and to the patrons of the two parishes out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and such incumbents and patrons have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that all those several portions of the said parish of Kelloe, and of the said parish of Bishop Middleham, which are respectively mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette, of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Cornforth.'

"And we further recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, the sum of two hundred pounds, and that so soon as a church shall have been erected within such district, and shall have been approved by us, and consecrated as a church of such district, and for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the further sum of one hundred pounds, making in the whole the sum of three hundred pounds, and that the said sums of two hundred pounds or three hundred pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the license of such minister or of the consecration of such church as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithes, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Cornforth, being:—

"All those several portions of the parish of Kelloe, in the county of Durham, and in the

diocese of Durham, and also all that portion of the parish of Bishop Middleham, in the same county and diocese, which are situate mainly to the north of an imaginary line commencing at the place called 'Fallow Field,' on the western side of the turnpike-road leading from Durham to Stockton, where the boundary which divides the extra-parochial part or place called 'Garmondsway Moor' from the said parish of Bishop Middleham, meets the boundary dividing the township of Bishop Middleham, in the said parish, from the township of Cornforth, in the same parish; and extending thence westward along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary which divides the said township of Bishop Middleham from the township of Thrislington, in the same parish of Bishop Middleham; and extending thence southward along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary which divides the township of Mainsforth, in the said parish of Bishop Middleham, from the township of Thrislington aforesaid; and extending thence generally westward along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Bishop Middleham from the parish of Merrington, in the county and diocese aforesaid. And all which said portions of the parishes of Kelloe and Bishop Middleham aforesaid are also situate to the south-west of another imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish of Bishop Middleham from the extra-parochial part or place called 'Garmondsway Moor' as aforesaid, at the before-mentioned place called 'Fallow Field,' on the western side of the turnpike-road leading from Durham to Stockton; and extending thence north-westward along the said boundary as far as a point near to Coxhoe Bridge, in the middle of the line of the North-Eastern Railway; and extending thence westward along the middle of the said line of railway to a point distant one hundred yards from the western side of the turnpike-road aforesaid; and extending thence north-westward in a course distant exactly one hundred yards from and parallel to the western side of the same turnpike-road, as far as a point situate about one hundred and twenty yards to the north-east of Bowburn House, on the boundary which divides the said parish of Kelloe from the extra-parochial part or place called 'Whitwell House;' and continuing thence, still north-westward, along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary which divides the said parish of Kelloe from the parish of Saint Oswald, in the county and diocese aforesaid."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly-mentioned Act been transmitted to the incumbents and to the patrons of the two parishes out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and such incumbents and patrons have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-third day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district, for spiritual purposes, out of the parish of Kelloe, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham, and out of the parish of Bishop Middleham, in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Kelloe, and of the said parish of Bishop Middleham, which are hereinafter-mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship), should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Kelloe, have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein-mentioned Acts.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all those several portions of the said parish of Kelloe, and of the said parish of Bishop Middleham, which are respectively mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette, of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Coxhoe.'

"And we further recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us in each and every year to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed, according to the provisions of the herein secondly-mentioned Act, the sum of two hundred pounds, and that so soon as a church shall have been erected within such district, and shall have been approved by us, and consecrated as the church of such district, and for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, a

new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish the further sum of one hundred pounds, making in the whole the sum of three hundred pounds, and that the said sums of two hundred pounds or three hundred pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister, or of the consecration of such church as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May, or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Coxhoe being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Kelloe, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham, which is comprised within, and is co-extensive with the limits of the township of Coxhoe, save and except all that part of the said township, containing by admeasurement nineteen statute acres two roods and twenty-five perches or thereabouts, upon the eastern side of which the present village of East Hetton is situate, all which said part being nearly in the form of a square, the length whereof from east to west is one thousand four hundred and seventeen links or thereabouts, and the width thereof from north to south one thousand three hundred and eighty-three links or thereabouts, is defined by four boundary stones inscribed 'C.D., 1865,' one of which is placed at each of the four corners of the said square.

"And also all that portion of the parish of Bishop Middleham, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which is comprised within so much of the township of Cornforth as is situate to the north-east of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing such parish from the said parish of Kelloe, at a point distant about one hundred yards to the south-west of the southern end of Four Mile Bridge, and distant exactly one hundred yards from and to the west of the western side of the turnpike road leading from Durham to

Stockton, and extending thence south-eastward in a course distant one hundred yards from and parallel to the western side of the turnpike road aforesaid, as far as a point in the middle of the line of the North-Eastern Railway. And all which said portion of the parish of Bishop Middleham aforesaid is also situate to the north of another imaginary line commencing at the last-described point in the middle of the line of the North-Eastern Railway aforesaid, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of such line of railway as far as the boundary near Coxhoe-bridge, which divides the said parish from the extra-parochial part or place called or known as 'Garmondsway Moor.'

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly-mentioned Act, been transmitted to the incumbents and to the patrons of the two parishes out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and such incumbents and patrons have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter sixty; of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Minera, in the county of Denbigh, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph.

"Whereas, by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-third day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and published in the London Gazette on the sixth day of December in

the same year, a part of the parish of Wrexham, in the county and diocese aforesaid, was assigned as a chapelry district to the consecrated church situate at Minera, in the said parish, and such chapelry district was called 'The Chapelry District of Minera.'

"And whereas the said chapelry district of Minera is reputed to have become, under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, a new parish of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven.

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that the boundaries of the said new parish of Minera should be altered as hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Vowler, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph, as such bishop, and also as the patron in right of his see of the vicarage of the said parish of Wrexham, with the consent of the Reverend George Cunliffe, the vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage, and as such vicar the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Minera, and with the consent of the Reverend Thomas Jeffrey Jones, the incumbent of the said perpetual curacy of the new parish of Minera (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that, in our opinion, it would be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Minera should be altered and extended, so as to include within the limits of such new parish, all that additional portion of the parish of Wrexham which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and which is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink; and that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette, of an Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this representation, and without any other assurance in the law, the said additional portion of the said parish of Wrexham, so to be included within the limits of the new parish of Minera as aforesaid, should become and be, and form part of the said said new parish of Minera.

"And we humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The territory proposed to be added to the new parish of Minera, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Wrexham, in the county of Denbigh, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph, which is comprised within so much of the township of Bersham as is situate to the west of an imaginary line extending along the middle of the ancient earthwork or way known as 'Offa's Dyke.'"

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and

Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Asaph.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, of the Reverend William Carus, Clerk, Canon Residentiary of the cathedral church of Winchester, of the Reverend John Venn, Clerk, the Vicar of the parish of Saint Peter, in the city of Hereford, of the Reverend Edward Auriol, Clerk, the Rector of the parish of Saint Dunstan-in-the-West, in the city of London, of the Reverend Edmund Hollond, Clerk, of Hyde Park-gardens, in the county of Middlesex, and of the Reverend William Cadman, Clerk, the Rector or Incumbent of the district rectory of the Trinity or Trinity District Rectory, in Saint Marylebone, in the said county of Middlesex, the Patrons of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Mary, Cheltenham, of the Reverend Edward Walker, the Rector or Incumbent of the rectory of the same parish of Saint Mary, Cheltenham, and of the Reverend Joseph Finch Fenn, the Minister or Incumbent of the said church called 'Christ Church' (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), and with the consents of the several persons named and described as aforesaid in the first schedule hereunder written (in testimony of which consent the said several persons so hereinafter named and described as aforesaid have hereunto set their respective hands and seals), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Saint Mary, Cheltenham, which is described in the second schedule hereunder written (all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed), should be assigned to the said church called Christ Church, situate in the same parish of Saint Mary, Cheltenham, and should be named 'The District Chapelry of Christ Church, Cheltenham;' and with the like consents (testified as aforesaid) of the said Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, and of the said William Carus, John Venn, Edward Auriol, Edmund Hollond, William Cadman, Edward Walker, and Joseph Finch Fenn, and of the several persons named and described as aforesaid in the said first schedule hereunder written.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the second day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the prebend of Hunderton, in the cathedral church of Hereford, and now vested in us.

"Whereas, on the vacancy of the said prebend, which occurred on or about the sixteenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, by the decease of the Reverend James Wetherell, Clerk, the then prebendary, all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments theretofore belonging to the said prebend (except rights of patronage) became, by virtue of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, absolutely vested in us for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas our estate in the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments aforesaid, consists of a reversion expectant upon a beneficial lease, and produces during the subsistence of such lease only a small annual revenue, and partly on that account and partly on account of the character or situation of the property is unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas, by an Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, power is given to lessees holding under us, in the event of our declining to enter into a treaty for the sale of our reversions or the purchase of the leasehold interests, to require us to purchase such leasehold interests at a valuation.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law from time to time, to sell or dispose of and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, with the consent of the holder or holders thereof, to be testified by his, her, or their being made parties to such instruments, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments heretofore belonging to the said prebend of Hunderton, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his, her, or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise, as he, she, or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Hereford.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-third day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts.

"We humbly recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us out of the common fund in the said Acts mentioned, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices described in the first schedule hereunto annexed, the annual sum set opposite to the name of each such benefice, in the last column of the same schedule, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year.

"Provided always that the grants so recommended to be made by us to the several benefices of Leighton Buzzard, Mere, and Ryhope, shall be paid only upon the production to us, on or before the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, of certificates under the hand of the bishops of the respective dioceses, that a curate duly licensed by such bishop has, in each instance, been employed within the parish or district during the preceding half year. And provided also, that a portion amounting to a yearly sum of one hundred and fifty pounds of the grant so recommended to be made by us to the benefice of Skelton with the chapelry of Brotton annexed, shall be paid only upon the production as aforesaid of a like certificate. And provided also, that the grants, payment whereof is so herein recommended to be made by us conditionally upon the employment of assistant curates, shall continue in force so long only as may to us appear to be expedient under the circumstances from time to time affecting the respective cures, in favour of which the same conditional grants are so recommended and proposed. And provided also that a portion amounting to a yearly sum of twenty-five pounds of the grant so recommended to be made by us to the benefice of Owston, shall cease and determine immediately upon and from the lapse of a subsisting lease of certain title commutation rent charges, amounting to a yearly sum of twenty-nine pounds one shilling and eleven-pence, which arise out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Owston, and the reversion expectant upon the determination of which lease is already

vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Owston. And provided further, that a portion amounting to a yearly sum of one hundred and twenty pounds of the grant so recommended to be made by us to the benefice of Saint John, Spittlegate, shall cease and determine immediately upon and from the lapse of a subsisting lease of certain title commutation rent charges amounting to the yearly sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, arising out of or upon lands situate within the township of Harrowby, in the parish of Grantham, in the county and diocese of Lincoln, the reversion expectant upon the determination of which lease is already vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Saint John, Spittlegate aforesaid. And provided lastly, that in consideration of the grant so recommended to be made by us to the benefice of Little Faringdon, the annual sum or stipend of fifty pounds, which, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the first day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, was made payable by us to the vicar of the then consolidated benefice of Langford with the chapelry of Little Faringdon, in the county of Berks and diocese of Oxford, subject to the employment of a duly licensed curate by such vicar, shall, with the consent of the Reverend Francis Gregory Lémann, Clerk, the vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage of Langford, from which the said chapelry of Little Faringdon has become separated since the passing of such last-mentioned Order of your Majesty in Council, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, absolutely cease and determine as from the date of the commencement of the grant so recommended to be made by us to the benefice of Little Faringdon as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that the rectorial title commutation rent charges, amounting to a yearly sum of two hundred and ninety-two pounds, arising out of or upon lands situate within the townships of Meriadog and Wigfair, in the parish of Saint Asaph, in the county of Denbigh and diocese of Saint Asaph, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the deanery of the cathedral church of Saint Asaph, and now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Saint Mary, Cefn, in the said county of Denbigh and diocese of Saint Asaph.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Thomas Wallis Richards, Clerk, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Leighton Buzzard, in the county of Bedford and diocese of Ely, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes or rent charges in lieu of tithes described in the second schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Leighton Buzzard, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the prebend of Leighton Beaudesert, and now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, in like manner and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Leighton Buzzard, in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or

stipend of twelve pounds, now payable by us to the same vicar or incumbent in respect of the estates formerly belonging to the said prebend.

“And whereas it appears to us, after duly considering the circumstances of the cases under mentioned, to be expedient that the grants respectively recommended to be made by us to the benefices of Saint Mary, Cefn; Saint Thomas, Eccleston; Holy Trinity, Gateshead; Little Faringdon; Saint Saviour, Saint Pancras, London; Rotherham; and Ryhope; should commence and take effect from the dates hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Mary, Cefn, from the seventh day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Thomas, Eccleston, from the sixteenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Holy Trinity, Gateshead, from the eighth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Little Faringdon, from the first day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Saviour, Saint Pancras, London, from the seventh day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five; in the case of the vicarage of Rotherham, from the fourth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four; and in the case of the perpetual curacy of Ryhope, from the first day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

“Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the several grants hereinbefore re-

commended by us to be made to the said last-mentioned benefices respectively, shall commence and take effect from the said dates hereinbefore in that behalf mentioned respectively.

“And we further recommend and propose that we may be authorised and empowered to pay out of the common fund aforesaid, on behalf of the benefices specified in the third schedule hereunto annexed, such annual sums as may be necessary for discharging the yearly instalments which in respect of interest and principal monies may from and after the dates set opposite to the names of the said benefices respectively, in the fourth column of the same schedule, become from time to time due and owing on account of certain mortgages of the said several benefices, which by certain deeds bearing the respective dates set forth in the fifth column of the same schedule, have been effected under the provisions of the Acts known as ‘Gilbert’s Acts,’ enabling the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, for the augmentation of the maintenance of the poor clergy, to lend money for the purpose of providing residences for the clergy.

“And we further recommend and propose that if at any time it shall appear desirable to us that any lands, tithe, or other hereditaments should be substituted for the annual sums hereinbefore-mentioned, or any of them, or any part thereof, nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such substitution or any other measure relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Cilcain, of the parish of Mold, in the county and diocese aforesaid, of the chapelry district of Gwernafeld, sometime part of the said parish of Mold, of the parish of Northop, in the same county and diocese, and of the consolidated chapelry of Rhes-y-Cae, also in the same county and diocese, which lie contiguous one to

another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes and chapelry district and consolidated chapelry.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Vowler, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph, as such bishop, and also as the patron in right of his see of the vicarage of the said parish of Mold, of the vicarage of the said parish of Northop, and of the perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry of Rhes-y-Cae; with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles John, Bishop of the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, as the patron in right of his see of the vicarage of the said parish of Cilcain; and with the consent of the Reverend Jenkin Davies, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Mold aforesaid, and as such vicar or incumbent, the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said chapelry district of Gwernafeld (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Cilcain, of the said parish of Mold, of the said chapelry district of Gwernafeld, of the said parish of Northop, and of the said consolidated chapelry of Rhes-y-Cae, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John the Evangelist, situate at Rhydymwyn aforesaid; and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John, Rhydymwyn'; and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the said Thomas Vowler, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Asaph, and his successors, bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

“ The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“ The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John, Rhydymwyn, being :—

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said district of Saint Augustine, Haggerston, of the said new parish of Saint Jude, Bethnal Green, of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Bethnal Green, and of the said parish of South Hackney, hereinafter mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship) should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein mentioned Acts.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all those several portions of the said district of Saint Augustine, Haggerston, of the said new parish of Saint Jude, Bethnal Green, of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Bethnal Green, and of the said parish of South Hackney, which are respectively mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed,

shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Stephen, Haggerston.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, the sum of two hundred pounds, and that so soon as a church shall have been erected within such district, and shall have been approved by us and consecrated as the church of such district, and for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the further sum of one hundred pounds, making in the whole the sum of three hundred pounds, and that the said sums of two hundred pounds or three hundred pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister, or of the consecration of such church as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May, or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Stephen, Haggerston, being:—

"All those several portions of the district of Saint Augustine, Haggerston, sometime part of the parish of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, of the new parish of Saint Jude, Bethnal Green, in the same county and diocese, of the new parish of Saint Peter, Bethnal Green, in the same county
