A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS by Our Order in Council of this day's date, We were graciously pleased to annul, from and after the thirtieth day of September next, Our Royal Proclamation of the twenty-ninth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, regulating, according to the scheme set forth therein or recognized thereby, the distribution of the net proceeds of prizes captured from the enemy, of captures and seizures under the several Acts of Parliament

passed relating to the revenues of customs, and to trade and navigation, for the abolition of the slave trade, for the capture and destruction of pirates and piratical vessels, and of the rewards conferred for the same; as also of the awards for all salvage granted to the crews of Our ships and vessels of war, when not otherwise specially apportioned by the terms of the respective awards and allowances; and, in consequence of several new ratings and denominations, and certain alterations having been introduced and made in Our Royal Naval Service since the date of Our said former Proclamation, and for other causes, it is expedient that provision should be made for the future distribution of such net proceeds and salvage not otherwise specially apportioned, and all other moneys whatsoever granted to be shared among the officers and crews of Our ships and vessels in the manner of prize money.

We do, therefore, now make known to all Our loving subjects, and to all others whom it may concern, by this Our Proclamation, by and with the advice and consent of Our Privy Council, that Our Royal will and pleasure is, and We do hereby direct, that ships or vessels being in sight of a prize, as also of the captor, under circumstances to cause intimidation to the prize and encouragement to the captor, shall be alone entitled to share as joint captors, and that the distribution of all such net proceeds of prizes, rewards, allowances, salvage awards, and of all bounties and grants whatsoever distributable to Our Royal Navy in the manner of prize money, shall be made as follows, viz:—

That the flag officer or officers shall have one-twentieth part of the whole net proceeds arising from prizes captured from the enemy, and from all other captures and seizures, &c., as aforesaid, made by any of the ships or vessels under his or their command, and of the rewards conferred for the same, according to the following conditions and modifications, save and except as hereinafter provided and directed; that is to say:—

When there is but one flag officer he shall have the entire one-twentieth part; when two flag officers shall be sharing together, the chief shall have two-thirds, and the other flag officer shall have the remaining one-third of the one-twentieth part; and when there shall be more than two flag officers, the chief shall have one-half of the said one-twentieth part, and the remaining half shall be equally divided among the junior flag officers; commodores of the first class and captains of the fleet to share as flag officers: Provided always, that no flag officer, unless actually on board any of Our ships or vessels of war, and at the actual taking, sinking, burning, or otherwise destroying any ship or ships of war, privateer or privateers belonging to the enemy, shall share in the distribution of any head money or bounty money granted as a reward for the taking, sinking, burning, or otherwise destroying any such ship or vessel of the enemy.

That no flag officer, unless actually present at the capture or destruction of any pirates or piratical ship, vessel, or boat, shall share in any distribution of the proceeds or bounty in respect of such pirates, or of the crews of such piratical ship, vessel or boat.

That no flag officer shall share in any remuneration or reward conferred or awarded to the crew of any of Our ships or vessels as salvage, unless he shall have been actually on board the ship or vessel to which the award shall be made, or have personally aided and assisted in the transaction at the time the service was rendered.

That no flag officer commanding in any port in the United Kingdom shall share in the proceeds

of any prize captured from the enemy, or in other captures, seizures, rewards, or any distributive proceeds as aforesaid, made by any ships or vessels which shall sail from or leave such port by order of the Lord High Admiral, or of Our Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral.

That when ships or vessels under the command of several flag officers belonging to several stations shall be joint captors, &c., each flag officer shall receive a proportion of the one-twentieth part, according to the number of officers and men present under the command of each such flag officer; and when ships or vessels under orders from the Lord High Admiral, or from Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral, are joint captors, &c., with other ships or vessels under a flag or flags, the like regulations as to the apportionment of the flag share to the flag officer or officers are to be observed.

With reference to flag officers it is to be noted,—

That when an inferior flag officer is sent to reinforce a superior officer on any station, the superior flag officer shall not share in any prize taken by the inferior flag officer before he has arrived within the limits of that station, unless the inferior officer shall have received some order directly from, and shall be acting in execution of some order issued by such superior flag officer.

No chief flag officer quitting any station, except upon some definite urgent service, and with the intention of returning to the station as soon as such service is performed, shall share in any prize taken by Our ships or vessels left behind after he has passed the limits of the station, or after he has surrendered the command to another flag officer appointed by the Admiralty to command in chief upon such station.

An inferior flag officer quitting any station (except when detached by orders from his commander-in-chief upon a special service, accompanied with orders to return to such station as soon as the service has been performed), shall have no share in prizes taken by the ships and vessels remaining on the station after he has passed the limits thereof.

In like manner flag officers remaining on such station shall not share in the prizes taken by such inferior officer, or by ships or vessels under his immediate command, after he has quitted the limits of the station, except he has been detached as aforesaid.

A commander-in-chief or other flag officer belonging to any station, shall not share in any prize or prizes taken out of the limits of that station by any ship or vessel under the command of a flag officer of any other station, or under orders from Our Commissioners of the Admiralty, unless such commander-in-chief or flag officer is expressly authorized by Our said Commissioners to take the command of that station in which the prize or prizes is or are taken, and shall actually have taken upon him such command.

Every commodore having a captain under him, shall be esteemed a flag officer with respect to the twentieth part of prizes taken, whether he be commanding-in-chief or serving under command.

The first captain to the admiral and commander-in-chief of Our fleet, and also the first captain to any flag officer appointed to command a fleet of ten ships of the line or upwards, shall be deemed to be a flag officer for the purpose of sharing in prize, and shall be entitled to share therein as the junior flag officer of such fleet.

Any officer on board any of Our ships of war at the time of capturing any prize or prizes who

shall have more commissions than one, shall be entitled only to share in such prize or prizes according to the share allotted to him by the above-mentioned distribution in respect to his superior commission or office.

And with reference to these regulations it is to be noted, that a captain, commander, or other commanding officer of a ship or vessel shall be deemed to be under the command of a flag when he shall actually have received some order from, or be acting in the execution of some order issued by, a flag officer, whether he be or be not within the limits of the station of such flag officer; and in the event of his being directed to join a flag officer on any station, he shall be deemed to be under the command of such flag officer from the time when he arrives within the limits of the station, which circumstance is always to be carefully noted in the log book; and it shall be considered that he continues under the flag officer of such station until he shall have received some order directly from, or be acting in the execution of some order issued by, some other flag officer; duly authorized, or by the Lord High Admiral, or Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral.

And We hereby direct, that the captain, commander, lieutenant commanding, staff commander commanding, master commanding, or any other officer duly commanding any ship, sloop, or vessel of war, singly making a capture or seizure, or otherwise entitled to the distributive benefit arising from any proceeds, reward, grant, bounty, salvage, or other award as aforesaid, that is to say, the officer actually in command at the time, shall have one-eighth of the remainder, or if there is no flag, one-eighth of the entire net proceeds, except that if the single capturing ship be a rated ship having a commander under the captain, the commander shall take a portion of the one-eighth part as if he were commander of a sloop according to the proportion hereinafter set forth; and if more than one commanding officer of the same rank of command, shall be entitled to share as joint captors, &c., the one-eighth shall be equally divided between them; but when captains, commanders, lieutenants commanding, staff commanders commanding, and masters commanding, respectively, Our ships and vessels of war, and commanders under captains in rated ships, shall share together in whatever variety of combination, the one-eighth shall be so divided into parts for a graduated apportionment as to provide for each captain receiving six parts; each commander of a sloop, or commander under the captain in a rated ship, three parts; and each lieutenant commanding, staff commander commanding, or master commanding, or other officer actually commanding a small vessel of war, two parts; which We hereby direct shall be the proportion in which they shall respectively share; commodores of the second class, and field officers of marines, or of land forces serving as marines, doing duty as field officers, above the rank of major, to share as captains, and field officers of marines, or of land forces serving as marines, and doing duty in the rank of major, to share as commanders of sloops. And We further direct, that after provision shall thus have been made for the flag share (if any), and for the portion of the commanding officer or officers and others as above specified, the remainder of the net proceeds shall be distributed in ten classes, so that each officer, man, and boy composing the rest of the complements of Our ships, sloops, and vessels of war, and actually on board at the time of any such capture, seizure, &c., as aforesaid, and every person present and assisting shall receive shares, or a share,

according to his class, as set forth in the following scale :—

First Class.—Staff-captain, inspector of steam machinery afloat, when embarked with a fleet, inspector-general, or deputy inspector-general of hospitals and fleets, when embarked with a fleet :—Forty-five shares each.

Second Class.—Senior Lieutenant of a rated ship, not bearing a commander under the captain, secretary to the admiral of the fleet, or admiral commanding-in-chief, staff-commander :—Thirty-five shares each.

Third Class.—Sea-lieutenant, master, captain of marines, of marine artillery, or of land forces doing duty as marines, whether having higher brevet-rank or not, staff-surgeon, secretary to an admiral or to a commodore of the first class, not commanding-in-chief, chief engineer :—Twenty-eight shares each.

Fourth Class.—Lieutenant or quartermaster of marines, lieutenant of marine-artillery, lieutenant, quartermaster or ensign of land forces doing duty as marines, secretary to a commodore of the second class, chaplain, surgeon, paymaster, naval instructor, sub-lieutenant, chief gunner, chief boatswain, chief carpenter, assistant surgeon, second master, assistant-paymaster in charge, Assistant-paymaster, engineer, assistant-engineer, gunner, boatswain, carpenter :—Eighteen shares each.

Fifth Class.—Midshipman, master's assistant, pilot, clerk, master-at-arms, chief gunner's mate, chief boatswain's mate, chief captain of the fore-castle, admiral's coxswain, chief quartermaster, chief yeoman of the signals, chief carpenter's mate, naval schoolmaster, chief stoker, ship's steward, ship's cook, chief bandmaster :—Ten shares each.

Sixth Class.—Naval cadet, assistant clerk, ship's corporal, gunner's mate, boatswain's mate, captain's coxswain, captain of the fore-castle, quartermaster, yeoman of the signals, coxswain of the launch, captain of the maintop, captain of the foretop, captain of the afterguard, captain of the hold, sailmaker, ropemaker, carpenter's mate, caulker, blacksmith, armourer, plumber, painter first class, leading stoker, sick berth steward, bandmaster, sergeant of marines, of marine artillery, or of land forces doing duty as marines :—Nine shares each.

Seventh Class.—Coxswain of the barge, coxswain of the pinnace, captain of the mast, second captain of the fore-castle, second captain of the maintop, second captain of the foretop, signalman, second captain of the afterguard, captain of the mizentop, sailmaker's mate, coxswain of the cutter, cooper, caulker's mate, painter second class, sick berth attendant, musician, head krooman, corporal of marines or of land forces doing duty as marines, bombardier of Marine Artillery :—Six shares each.

Eighth Class.—Leading seaman, shipwright, stoker, and coal trimmer, yeoman of store rooms, second captain of the hold, sailmaker's crew, blacksmith's crew, tinsmith, armourer's crew, carpenter's crew, stoker second class, cooper's crew, able seaman, bandsman, tailor, shoemaker, butcher, second head krooman, lamp trimmer, flag officer's steward, cook and domestic, captain's steward and captain's cook in all rated ships, ward room steward and ward room cook in first, second, third, and fourth rates, ship's steward's assistant, ordinary seaman, private and fifer of marines or of land forces doing duty as marines, drummer and bugler, gunner of Marine Artillery :—Three shares each.

Ninth Class.—Captain's steward and captain's cook in vessels below sixth rates, ward-room

steward and ward-room cook in vessels below fourth rates, gun-room steward, gun-room cook, assistant sick-berth attendant, engineer's cook, engineer's servant, captain's servant, commander's servant, secretary's servant, warrant officer's cook, cook's mate, barber, second class ordinary seaman, captain's cook's assistant, ward-room servant, ward-room cook's assistant, ward-room officer's servant, gun-room servant, warrant officer's servant, krooman, ship's steward's boy, boy first class, supernumeraries, except as hereinafter provided, persons borne merely as passengers, and not declining to render assistance on any occasion of capture or seizure, &c. :—Two shares each.

Tenth Class.—Boy below the first class :—One share.

All supernumeraries holding ranks in the service above the ranks or ratings specified in the fifth class of this Our Proclamation, who have been ordered to do duty in any of Our ships and vessels by the Lord High Admiral, by Our Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, by the senior officer of the fleet or squadron, or if none senior, then by the captain or commanding officer of the capturing ship or vessel, if not by special authority employed in higher capacities, shall share according to the ranks which they respectively hold in the service ; but in all cases, to qualify them for so sharing, and not merely as supernumeraries in the ninth class, due notation of their being thus respectively ordered to do duty, must be made on the victualing lists and prize lists.

And with respect to supernumeraries of ratings in the service below the denominations of those specified in the fourth class of this Our Proclamation, and who at full victuals are engaged in the ordinary duties of the ship, it is Our will and pleasure that they shall always share according to the ratings which they bear in the service.

And in order that Our Royal intentions herein may be duly carried into effect, We further direct that when any capture or seizure is made, or service performed, for which a distributable grant or reward is to be, or is expected to be, conferred or awarded to any of Our ships or vessels of war, the Captain or Commanding Officer shall transmit or cause to be transmitted, as soon as may be, to the Secretary of the Admiralty, a true and perfect list of all the officers, seamen, marines, soldiers, and others who were actually on board on the occasion, with a notation thereon, stating whether any other of Her Majesty's ships or vessels was in sight at the time of the capture, accompanied by a separate list containing the names of those belonging to the crew who were absent on duty or otherwise at the time, specifying the cause of such absence ; each list to contain the quality of the service of each person, with their several ratings, to be subscribed by the Captain or Commanding Officer, and three or more of the chief officers on board.

And when a list of those actually on board, with the separate list of persons absent, though belonging to the ship or vessel, shall have been verified on examination with the ship's books lodged as official records, the Accountant-General of Our Navy shall grant a certificate that such lists are correct, or have been corrected, as occasion may require, in order that distribution of the respective prize or other proceeds, payable as prize or salvage money, may be duly made in the Department of the Accountant-General of Our Navy.

And in the event of difficulty arising with respect to any of the regulations hereby ordered, or if any case should occur not herein provided for, or not sufficiently provided for, We are pleased

hereby to authorize the Lord High Admiral, or Our Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral for the time being, to issue such directions thereupon as may appear just and expedient; which directions shall have the same force and effect as if specially provided for in this Our Royal Proclamation: Provided always, and the distribution hereinbefore ordered shall take effect only with respect to the proceeds of captures, seizures, and services as aforesaid, which shall be made and performed on and after the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five; and that the proceeds arising from all captures, seizures, and services as aforesaid, made or performed prior to that date, shall be distributed in accordance with any Proclamation or Proclamations now in force or in force at the time of such captures, seizures, or services respectively and applicable thereto, which We are pleased hereby to direct accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the Poll at County Elections," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the Justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division, and that the Justices of the Peace for the county, riding, parts, or division in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act passed in the session of the second and third years of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and describe the divisions of counties, and the limits of cities and boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the Justices of the Peace of the county of Flint, in quarter sessions assembled, on the fifth day of January one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places at present existing in the county of Flint is insufficient, and praying that the town of Rhyl should be made an additional polling place for the said county;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that the said town of Rhyl shall be an additional polling place for the county of Flint; and that the Justices of the Peace of the said county, in quarter sessions, or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act, passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such county into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

WHEREAS the rules and practice observed for the purpose of preventing collisions at sea, which were formerly adopted by maritime nations, have proved insufficient to satisfy the requirements of modern navigation; And whereas various alterations in such rules and practice have from time to time been made by different nations, but the rules so altered have been found to be in some cases inconsistent with each other, and in other cases to have the force of municipal law only; And whereas certain regulations for the purpose aforesaid have been sanctioned by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and are contained in the Table C, in the schedule to that Act; And whereas for the purpose of correcting certain clerical errors the said regulations have, in pursuance of the provisions in the said Act contained, been modified by an Order in Council bearing date the 9th day of January, 1863, and the said regulations, so modified, are appended to the said Order, and to this Order; And whereas by virtue of the said Act and of the said Order the said regulations so appended as aforesaid, so far as relates to British and French ships and also so far as relates to certain other foreign ships when within British jurisdiction, came into operation on the 1st day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; And whereas it is provided by the same Act, that, whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that the Government of any foreign country is willing that the regulations for preventing collisions, contained in Table C in the schedule to the said Act, or such other regulations for preventing collisions as are for the time being in force under the said Act, should apply to the ships of such country when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction, Her Majesty may by Order in Council direct that such regulations shall apply to the ships of the said foreign country, whether within British jurisdiction or not. And it is further provided by the said Act that whenever an Order in Council has been issued applying any regulation made by or in pursuance of the said Act to the ships of any foreign country such ships shall, in all cases arising in any British Court, be deemed to be subject to such regulation, and shall for the purpose of such regulation be treated as if they were British ships: And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty, that

The Government of His Majesty the King of the Hawaiian Islands is willing that the said Regulations appended to

the said Order, and to this Order should apply to ships belonging to those islands when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct,

That the said regulations appended to the said Order in Council, bearing date the ninth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and to this Order, shall from the date of this Order apply to ships belonging to

the Hawaiian Islands,

whether within British jurisdiction or not.

REGULATIONS FOR PREVENTING COLLISIONS AT SEA.

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PRELIMINARY.

Art. 1. In the following Rules every Steam Ship which is under sail and not under steam is to be considered a Sailing Ship; and every Steam ship which is under steam, whether under sail or not, is to be considered a ship under steam.

RULES CONCERNING LIGHTS.

Lights.

Art. 2. The Lights mentioned in the following Articles, numbered 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9, and no others, shall be carried in all weathers, from sunset to sunrise.

Lights for Steam Ships.

Art. 3. Sea-going Steam-ships when under weigh shall carry,

(a.) *At the Foremast Head*, a bright White Light, so fixed as to show an uniform and unbroken

Light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass; so fixed as to throw the light 10 points on each side of the ship, viz., from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on either side; and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least five miles:

(b.) *On the Starboard Side*, a Green Light so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken Light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the starboard side, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles:

(c.) *On the Port Side*, a Red Light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the port side, and of such a character, as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles:

(d.) The said Green and Red Side Lights shall be fitted with inboard screens, projecting at least three feet forward from the Light, so as to prevent these lights from being seen across the bow.

Lights for Steam Tugs.

Art. 4. Steam Ships, when towing other ships, shall carry two bright White Mast-head Lights vertically, in addition to their side lights, so as to distinguish them from other Steam Ships. Each of these Mast-head Lights shall be of the same construction and character as the Mast-head Lights which other Steam Ships are required to carry.

Lights for Sailing Ships.

Art. 5. Sailing Ships under weigh, or being towed, shall carry the same Lights as Steam Ships under weigh, with the exception of the White Mast-head Lights, which they shall never carry.

Exceptional Lights for small Sailing Vessels.

Art. 6. Whenever, as in the case of small vessels during bad weather, the Green and Red Lights cannot be fixed, these lights shall be kept on deck, on their respective sides of the vessel, ready for instant exhibition; and shall, on the approach of or to other vessels, be exhibited on their respective sides in sufficient time to prevent collision, in such manner as to make them most visible, and so that the Green light shall not be seen on the port side, nor the Red light on the starboard side.

To make the use of these portable lights more certain and easy, the lanterns containing them shall each be painted outside with the colour of the light they respectively contain, and shall be provided with suitable screens.

Lights for Ships at Anchor.

Art. 7. Ships, whether steam ships or sailing ships, when at anchor in roadsteads or fairways, shall exhibit, where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding twenty feet above the hull, a White Light, in a globular lantern of eight inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon, and at a distance of at least one mile.

Lights for Pilot Vessels.

Art. 8. Sailing Pilot Vessels shall not carry the lights required for other sailing vessels, but shall

carry a White Light at the mast head, visible all round the horizon,—and shall also exhibit a Flare-up Light every fifteen minutes.

Lights for Fishing Vessels and Boats.

Art. 9. Open Fishing Boats and other open boats shall not be required to carry the side lights required for other vessels; but shall if they do not carry such lights, carry a lantern having a Green Slide on the one side and a Red Slide on the other side; and on the approach of or to other vessels, such lantern shall be exhibited in sufficient time to prevent collision, so that the Green light shall not be seen on the port side, nor the Red light on the starboard side.

Fishing Vessels and open boats when at anchor, or attached to their nets and stationary, shall exhibit a bright White Light.

Fishing Vessels and open boats shall, however, not be prevented from using a Flare-up in addition, if considered expedient.

RULES CONCERNING FOG SIGNALS.

Fog Signals.

Art. 10. Whenever there is fog, whether by day or night, the Fog Signals described below shall be carried and used, and shall be sounded at least every five minutes, viz. :—

(a.) Steam Ships under weigh shall use a Steam Whistle placed before the funnel, not less than eight feet from the deck :

(b.) Sailing ships under weigh shall use a Fog Horn:

(c.) Steam Ships and Sailing Ships when not under weigh shall use a Bell.

STEERING AND SAILING RULES.

Two Sailing Ships meeting.

Art. 11. If Two Sailing Ships are meeting end on or nearly end on so as to involve risk of collision, the helms of both shall be put to port, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

Two Sailing Ships crossing.

Art. 12. When two sailing ships are crossing so as to involve risk of collision, then, if they have the wind on different sides, the ship with the wind on the port side shall keep out of the way of the ship with the wind on the starboard side; except in the case in which the ship with the wind on the port side is close hauled and the other ship free, in which case the latter ship shall keep out of the way; but if they have the wind on the same side, or if one of them has the wind aft, the ship which is to windward shall keep out of the way of the ship which is to leeward.

Two Ships under Steam meeting.

Art. 13. If two ships under steam are meeting end on, or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, the helms of both shall be put to port, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

Two Ships under Steam crossing.

Art. 14. If two ships under steam are crossing so as to involve risk of collision, the ship which has the other on her own starboard side shall keep out of the way of the other.

Sailing Ship and Ship under Steam.

Art. 15. If two ships, one of which is a sailing ship, and the other a steam ship, are proceeding

in such directions as to involve risk of collision, the steam ship shall keep out of the way of the sailing ship.

Ships under Steam to slacken speed.

Art. 16. Every steam ship, when approaching another ship so as to involve risk of collision, shall slacken her speed, or, if necessary, stop and reverse; and every steam ship shall, when in a fog, go at a moderate speed.

Vessels overtaking other Vessels.

Art. 17. Every vessel overtaking any other vessel shall keep out of the way of the said last-mentioned vessel.

Construction of Articles 12, 14, 15, and 17.

Art. 18. Where by the above rules one of two ships is to keep out of the way, the other shall keep her course, subject to the qualifications contained in the following Article.

Proviso to save special cases.

Art. 19. In obeying and construing these rules, due regard must be had to all dangers of navigation; and due regard must also be had to any special circumstances which may exist in any particular case rendering a departure from the above rules necessary in order to avoid immediate danger.

No Ship, under any circumstances, to neglect proper precautions.

Art. 20. Nothing in these Rules shall exonerate any ship, or the owner, or master, or crew thereof, from the consequences of any neglect to carry lights or signals, or of any neglect to keep a proper look-out, or of the neglect of any precaution which may be required by the ordinary practice of seamen, or by the special circumstances of the case.

And whereas an address has been presented to Her Majesty, by the Legislative Council of St. Lucia, praying Her Majesty to authorize and permit the conveyance of goods and passengers from one part of that island to any other part of the same in other than British ships:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the

advice of Her Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said recited Act, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the day of the date of this Order, goods and passengers may be conveyed from one part of the island of Saint Lucia to another part thereof in other than British ships :

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable Edward Cardwell, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

" We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy ; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five ; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Ann, situate at Palmer's Elm, in the parish of Congresbury, in the county of Somerset and in the diocese of Bath and Wells.

" Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Congresbury and of the chapelry of Wick Saint Lawrence, thereto annexed, of the parish of Yatton, in the county and diocese aforesaid, of the parish of Kewstoke, in the same county and diocese, of the parish of Banwell, in the same county and diocese, and of the parish of Puxton, in the same county and diocese, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population, which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes and chapelry aforesaid.

" And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Congresbury, and of the chapelry of Wick Saint Lawrence, thereto annexed as aforesaid, and of the said parish of Yatton, of the said parish of Kewstoke, of the said parish of Banwell, and of the said parish of Puxton, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Ann, situate at Congresbury aforesaid.

" Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Robert John, Baron Auckland, Bishop of the said diocese of Bath and Wells, as Bishop of the diocese and also as the patron in right of his see of the vicarage of the said parish of Yatton, of the Right Honorable Richard, Baron Westbury, Lord High Chancellor

of Great Britain, acting on behalf of your Majesty as the patron in right of the Crown of the vicarage of the said parish of Kewstoke, of Richard Hunt, of the city of Bristol, Esquire, the patron for the next turn of the vicarage of the said parish of Congresbury with the chapelry of Wick Saint Lawrence, thereto annexed as aforesaid, of George Thomas, of the said city of Bristol, Esquire, of Harman Visger, of the same city, Esquire, of William Tothill, of Stoke Bishop, near the same city, Esquire, of William Fripp, of Dawlish, in the county of Devon, Esquire, of Robert Phippen, of Bedminster, near the said city of Bristol, Esquire, of Michael Castle, of Clifton, near the same city, Esquire, of John Fisher, of the same city, Esquire, of Frederick Terrell, of the same city, Esquire, of John Vining, of Weston-super-Mare, in the said county of Somerset, Esquire, of Thomas Powell, of Montpellier, near the said city of Bristol, Esquire, of John Savage, of the city of Bath, Esquire, of Edward Bowles Fripp the younger, of Southport, in the county of Lancaster, Esquire, of William Day Wills, of the said city of Bristol, Esquire, of William Herapath, of the same city, Esquire, of William Sanders, of Clifton, near the same city, Esquire, and of Thomas Carlisle, of Warwick-road, Paddington, in the county of Middlesex, Esquire, the Trustees of the Bristol Charities, and as such trustees the patrons after the next turn of the vicarage of the said parish of Congresbury, with the chapelry of Wick Saint Lawrence, thereto annexed as aforesaid (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), and also with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Bristol, the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Banwell, and also the patrons of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Puxton (in testimony whereof they have hereunto affixed their corporate seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Congresbury, and of the chapelry of Wick Saint Lawrence, thereto annexed as aforesaid, and of the said parish of Yatton, of the said parish of Kewstoke, of the said parish of Banwell, and of the said parish of Puxton, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Ann, situate at Palmer's Elm, in the parish of Congresbury aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Ann, Congresbury'; and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the said Robert John, Baron Auckland, Bishop of the said diocese of Bath and Wells, and his successors, Bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

" We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

" The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Ann, Congresbury, being :—

" All those several portions of the parish of Congresbury, and of the chapelry of Wick Saint Lawrence thereto annexed, in the county of

Somerset, and in the diocese of Bath and Wells, of the parish of Yatton, in the same county and diocese, of the parish of Kewstoke, in the same county and diocese, of the parish of Banwell, in the same county and diocese, and of the parish of Puxton, in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within, and are bounded by an imaginary line, commencing at the point near Palmer's Elm, where the boundary dividing the parish of Kewstoke from the parish of Puxton aforesaid, meets the boundary dividing the parish of Congresbury from the parish of Puxton aforesaid, such point being situate at the junction of the road leading from Weston-super-Mare to Congresbury, with the road leading from Palmer's Elm to Puxton; and extending thence, first south-eastward and then southward, along the middle of the last-described road (following thereby in part the boundary dividing the parish of Puxton from the several parishes of Congresbury and Kewstoke aforesaid), to the junction of such road with the road leading to Banwell; and continuing thence still southward along the middle of the last-described road, following thereby the boundary which divides the parish of Puxton from the parish of Congresbury, as aforesaid, to the point where such boundary diverges from the same road; and extending thence in a direction mainly eastward along the said boundary, as far as a point near Holebridges, in the middle of Holebridge Rhine; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said Rhine for a distance of fifty-three yards or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the middle of the south-eastern end of the fence dividing the close numbered 194 upon the map of the parish of Congresbury aforesaid, and upon the map hereunto annexed, from the closes numbered respectively 195 and 197, upon the same maps; and extending thence first north-westward to and along the middle of the said fence, and then northward along the middle of the same fence, to its junction with the fence dividing the close numbered 289 upon the said maps, from the close numbered 198 upon the same maps; and continuing thence still northward along the middle of the last-described fence, to a point in the middle of the southern end of Hell's-lane; and continuing thence in a direction at first northward and then north-westward along the middle of the said lane, to its junction with the Congresbury-road; and extending thence in a direct line still north-westward across the last-named road, to a point in the middle of the southern end of Pilhay-lane; and continuing thence first north-westward and then north-eastward along the middle of the last-named lane to the boundary near Pilhay Farm, which divides the parish of Congresbury from the parish of Yatton aforesaid; and continuing thence still north-eastward along the last-described boundary, to a point in the middle of the River Yeo; and extending thence in a direction generally north-westward along the middle of the said river (passing under the line of the Bristol and Exeter Railway) to the boundary dividing the said parish of Yatton from the parish of Kingston Seymour, in the same county and diocese; and extending thence south-westward along the last-described boundary (still following thereby the course of the River Yeo) to the junction of such boundary, with the boundary dividing the parish of Yatton from the chapelry of Wick Saint Lawrence aforesaid; and extending thence in a direction generally south-westward along the last-described boundary, extending thereby in part along New Ear-lane, and crossing the road leading from Wick Saint Lawrence to Congresbury, and crossing also Bourton-

lane to the junction of such boundary, with the boundary dividing the parish of Yatton from the parish of Banwell aforesaid, in the middle of the last-named lane; and continuing thence southward along the last-described boundary, as far as its divergence from such lane; and continuing thence south-westward along the middle of the said lane as far as its intersection by East Moor Rhine; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said Rhine (passing under the line of the Bristol and Exeter Railway aforesaid), as far as the point near Hay Bow, where the said Rhine is intersected by the road leading from Weston-super-Mare to Congresbury aforesaid; and extending thence first south-eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of the last-described road (following thereby in part the boundary dividing the parish of Kewstoke from the parish of Puxton), to the point near Palmer's Elm, where the said imaginary line commenced."

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme, for making better provision for the cure of souls within the new parish of Saint George, Battersea, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas the church of the said new parish of Saint George, Battersea, is in the patronage of the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the parish of Saint Mary, Battersea, in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the church of the said new parish is ill endowed, and that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the said new parish.

"And whereas Elizabeth Maria Graham, of

Clapham Common, in the county of Surrey, Spinster, has paid over to us a sum of one hundred pounds sterling upon the understanding that the arrangement hereinafter mentioned respecting the patronage of the said new parish should be recommended by us to your Majesty in Council, and upon the further understanding that in respect of the said capital sum of one hundred pounds sterling above mentioned, or of such part thereof as may from time to time remain in our hands for the benefit of the incumbent of the said new parish, there should be paid by us to such incumbent for the time being, by equal half yearly payments, on the first day of May and on the first day of November in each year, the annual sum of three pounds six shillings and eight pence, or a part of such annual sum proportionate to the part of the said capital sum of one hundred pounds so remaining in our hands as aforesaid, and we have agreed to make such payment or payments accordingly.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and of the Reverend John Simon Jenkinson, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Mary, Battersea, and as such vicar or incumbent the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Saint George, Battersea, as aforesaid, in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole right of patronage of the said new parish of Saint George, Battersea, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto and to the church thereof, shall be transferred from the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the said parish of Saint Mary, Battersea, and shall become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised jointly by the said John Simon Jenkinson, the Reverend Samuel Garratt, incumbent of the church of the Holy Trinity, in the parish of Saint Giles in the Fields, in the county of Middlesex, Clerk, Samuel Scrivens, of Clapham-road, in the said county of Surrey, and of Bexhill, in the county of Sussex, Esquire, John Mills Thorne, junior, of the Nine Elms Brewery, in the said parish of Battersea, Esquire, and William Wainwright, of Battersea Rise, Clapham Common, in the said county of Surrey, Esquire, and their heirs and assigns, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or to any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act or Acts of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Worcester.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for assigning certain lands and hereditaments as an endowment for the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Carlisle.

"Whereas, under the provisions of the above-mentioned Act; and of an Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; and of an Act of the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty, chapter twenty-six; and by virtue of an Order of your Majesty in Council made under the authority of such provisions, bearing date the tenth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, and duly published in the London Gazette on the seventeenth day of December following; in consideration of an annual money payment of five thousand six hundred and eighty pounds, and of the appropriation by us of a sum of fifteen thousand pounds to the purpose of effecting certain repairs and improvements of and in connection with the said cathedral church, all the manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments theretofore belonging, either in possession or reversion, to the said Dean and Chapter (except certain portions thereof in the above-mentioned Order particularly excepted), and all the estate and interest therein of the said Dean and Chapter became vested in us.

"And whereas it was by the above-mentioned Order of your Majesty in Council provided that none of the monies or estates to be received or acquired under the provisions thereof should be applicable to the purposes of our common fund, except only so far as it might be necessary to reimburse such fund any advances made thereout under the provisions of such Order, until or unless

by and under the like authority the said Dean and Chapter should have been put into possession, in fee-simple, of real estates within the counties of Cumberland, Westmoreland, or Northumberland, any or either of them, sufficient to secure to them a clear annual income (after deducting rates, taxes, and other outgoings, including costs of management) of five thousand and nine hundred pounds, or such other sum as at the date of such transfer should, by the decision of arbitrators to be appointed in the usual way, be equivalent to the sum of five thousand nine hundred pounds at the date of such Order; subject, however, as well to the charges and outgoings mentioned in the schedule marked C, annexed to such Order, as to all other capitular liabilities.

"And whereas the said Dean and Chapter have signified to us their willingness to accept as their permanent endowment the manors, lands, rent-charges, tenements, and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, the whole of which are situate and arise within the counties of Cumberland, Westmoreland, and Northumberland, or one or other of them, and are now vested in us in fee-simple in possession, and the same are, in our opinion, convenient to be held as the permanent endowment of the said Dean and Chapter, and are calculated to produce, as nearly as may be, the above-mentioned net annual income of five thousand and nine hundred pounds.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church at Carlisle, testified by their having hereunto affixed their corporate seal, we humbly recommend and propose that, upon the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published Order, the manors, lands, rent-charges, tenements, and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, with their appurtenances, and all our right, title, estate, and interest therein, and in any tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes arising thereout or charged thereupon, and in the benefit of the perpetual land-tax, if any, charged upon the same premises, which has been redeemed, shall be assigned as the endowment of the Dean and Chapter of Carlisle, and shall, subject always and nevertheless to the liabilities and charges to which the said manors, lands, rent-charges, tenements, and hereditaments are now specifically liable, become and be absolutely vested in the said Dean and Chapter, in as full and ample a manner as if the same had formed part of the ancient possessions of the said Dean and Chapter.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the money payments heretofore payable by us under the provisions of the hereinbefore-recited Order of your Majesty in Council, of the tenth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, shall, as from the first day of May, cease and determine, and that the said Dean and Chapter shall be entitled to the then current annual proceeds of the hereditaments hereby proposed to be assigned to them; videlicet, those of the tithe rent-charges as from the first day of January now last past, and those of the remainder of such hereditaments as from the second day of February now last past.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district, for spiritual purposes, out of the parish of Lanchester, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham, out of the parish of Chester-le-Street, in the same county and diocese, out of the parochial chapelry of Witton Gilbert, in the same county and diocese, and out of the parochial chapelry of Tanfield, in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Lanchester, of the said parish of Chester-le-Street, of the said parochial chapelry of Witton Gilbert, and of the said parochial chapelry of Tanfield, which are hereinafter mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship) should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises, situate within the said parish of Lanchester, have become vested in us, under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein-mentioned Acts.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all those several portions of the said parish of Lanchester, of the said parish of Chester-le-Street, of the said parochial chapelry of Witton Gilbert, and of the said parochial chapelry of Tanfield, which are respectively mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Holmside.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly-mentioned Act, the sum of two hundred pounds, and that so soon as a church shall have

been erected within such district, and shall have been approved by us and consecrated as the church of such district, and for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the further sum of one hundred pounds, making in the whole the sum of three hundred pounds, and that the said sums of two hundred pounds or three hundred pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister or of the consecration of such church as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that, instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament, should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Holmside, being:—

"All those several portions of the parish of Lanchester, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham, of the parish of Chester-le-Street, in the same county and diocese, of the parochial chapelry of Witton Gilbert, in the same county and diocese, and of the parochial chapelry of Tanfield, in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish of Lanchester from the parochial chapelry of Witton Gilbert aforesaid, at a point near Kay's Burn House, in the middle of the turnpike road leading from Durham to Lanchester, and extending thence in a direction mainly north-westward along such boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Lanchester from the district of Saint Peter, Sacriston, in the same county and diocese, and extending thence first north-eastward, then eastward, and again north-eastward along the last-described boundary, as far as the western side of the Cong Burn Bridge which carries Edmondsley Lane over the Cong Burn, and extending thence first north-westward and

then north-eastward along the western side of the said lane, following thereby in part the boundary dividing the said parish of Lanchester from the parish of Chester-le-Street aforesaid, to the junction of such boundary with the boundary dividing the said parish of Lanchester from the chapelry district of Pelton, in the same county and diocese, and extending thence in a direction generally westward along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Lanchester from the parochial chapelry of Tanfield aforesaid, and continuing thence first westward and then in a direction generally northward along the last-described boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Lanchester from the district parish of Collierley, in the same county and diocese, at the point where Southmoor Lane joins the road leading from Shield-row, and extending thence south-westward along the last-described boundary, following thereby the middle of Shield-row-lane and of the turnpike road leading from Newcastle to Durham, as far as the point near Green-gate, where such boundary diverges from the said turnpike road, and continuing thence in a direction generally southward along the middle of the same turnpike road as far as the point where it joins Edge-lane at Maiden-law, and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of such lane to its junction with Langley-lane, and continuing thence still south-eastward along the middle of the last-named lane to its junction with the turnpike road leading from Durham to Lanchester aforesaid, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named turnpike road as far the point near Kay's Burn House at which the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act, been transmitted to the incumbents and to the patrons of the several parishes and parochial chapelries out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and such incumbents and patrons have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

Her Majesty, chapter eighty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme, for making better provision for the cure of souls within the new parish of Saint Mary Magdalen, Billericay, in the county of Essex, and in the diocese of Rochester, and within the united parishes of Saint Nicholas and Saint Clement, in the city of Rochester, and diocese of Rochester aforesaid.

"Whereas the Bishop of Rochester for the time being is, in right of his see, the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Billericay, and is also in the same right patron of the vicarage of each of the said united parishes of Saint Nicholas and Saint Clement (that is to say, of the vicarage of Saint Nicholas with the vicarage of Saint Clement thereto annexed), in the city of Rochester, and the said bishop is also in the same right patron of the rectory of the parish of Orsett, in the said county of Essex, and within the diocese aforesaid; and is also in the same right patron of the rectory of the parish of Stone-next-Dartford, in the county of Kent, and within the same diocese.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the church of the said new parish of Billericay, and the church of the said united parishes of Saint Nicholas and Saint Clement, in the said city of Rochester, are respectively ill-endowed, and that it is desirable that some additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the said new parish, and within the said united parishes respectively.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester, the bishop of the diocese and the patron in right of his see as aforesaid, both of the rectory of the said parish of Orsett and of the rectory of the said parish of Stone-next-Dartford, has proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the income of the said rectory of Orsett should be apportioned between the rector or incumbent thereof and the incumbent of the said perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Billericay, in the manner hereinafter in that behalf recommended and proposed; and that the income of the said rectory of Stone-next-Dartford should be apportioned between the rector or incumbent thereof and the vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage of Saint Nicholas, with the vicarage of Saint Clement thereto annexed, in the said city of Rochester, in the manner hereinafter in that behalf recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Honorable and Most Reverend Charles Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, and of the said Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that upon and from the next avoidance of the said rectory of Orsett there shall be paid by the now next succeeding rector thereof and his successors out of the revenues of the same rectory to the incumbent for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of the new parish of Billericay and his successors, the annual sum of one

"Whereas the said church called Christ Church was erected under the provisions of two Local Acts of Parliament, to wit, the Act of the forty-third year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and seventeen, and the Act of the fiftieth year of His said Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty.

"And whereas it appears that the said church called Christ Church is still subject to the provisions of the said two Local Acts.

"And whereas, in pursuance of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, a representation has been made to us by the patron, by the incumbent, and by the vestry of the said parish of Saint Philip, Birmingham, and another representation has been made to us by the patrons, by the incumbent, and by the vestry of the parish of Saint Martin, Birmingham, in the county and diocese aforesaid, respectively, setting forth that it would be for the spiritual benefit of both those parishes that the said church called Christ Church should be brought within the provisions of the Church Building Acts, in order that a separate district may be assigned to such church, to comprise certain portions of the said parishes which lie contiguous one to another, and which are described in the schedule hereunder written, and in which a population is collected situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Philip, Birmingham, and of the said parish of Saint Martin, Birmingham, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry, for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church called Christ Church, as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester, as such Bishop, and also as the patron, in right of his see, of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Philip, Birmingham, and with the consents of the Very Reverend Francis Close, Dean of Carlisle, of the Reverend Edward Auriol, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Saint Dunstan in the West, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, of the Reverend Anthony Wilson Thorold, the rector or

incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Saint Giles in the Fields, in the last-named county and diocese, of the Reverend Daniel Wilson, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Islington, in the same county and diocese, and of the Reverend Charles Kemble, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, Bath, in the county of Somerset and in the diocese of Bath and Wells, the patrons of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Martin, Birmingham (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Philip, Birmingham, and of the said parish of Saint Martin, Birmingham, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church called Christ Church, as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Christ Church, Birmingham,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Christ Church, Birmingham, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Saint Philip, Birmingham, in the county of Warwick and in the diocese of Worcester, which comprises the site of the church called Christ Church, Birmingham, all which portion of the said parish is bounded, on the west and north by the boundary dividing such parish from the parish of Saint Martin, Birmingham, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and upon the other sides, that is to say, upon the east and south, by an imaginary line commencing upon the said parish boundary, at a point in the middle of Ann-street opposite to the middle of the north-western end of Waterloo-street; and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of the said last-mentioned street to its junction with the passage known as Christ Church-passage; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of such passage to its junction with New-street; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street to its north-western extremity; and extending thence in a direct line westward to a point on the parish boundary aforesaid in the middle of the north-western end of Pinfold-street. "Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, of the said new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, of the said parish of Saint James, Clerkenwell, and of the said parish of Saint John, Clerkenwell, hereinafter mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship), should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, have become vested in us under the

provisions of and for the purposes of the herein-mentioned Acts.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all those portions of the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, of the said new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, of the said parish of Saint James, Clerkenwell, and of the said parish of Saint John, Clerkenwell, which are respectively mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written, and which are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Paul, Clerkenwell.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us in each and every year to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, the sum of two hundred pounds, and that so soon as a church shall have been erected within such district, and shall have been approved by us, and consecrated as the church of such district, and for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being, of such new parish the further sum of one hundred pounds, making in the whole the sum of three hundred pounds, and that the said sums of two hundred pounds or three hundred pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next, after the day of the date of the licence of such minister, or of the consecration of such church as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that, instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament, should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"The District of Saint Paul, Clerkenwell, being:—

"All those several portions of the parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, of the new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, in the same county and diocese, of the parish of Saint James, Clerkenwell, in the same county and diocese, and of the parish of Saint John, Clerkenwell, in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of Goswell-street, opposite to the middle of the western end of Old-street, where the boundary dividing the parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, from the extra-parochial place commonly called 'The Charterhouse,' meets the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, from the particular district of Saint Thomas, Charterhouse, in the same county and diocese; and extending thence north-eastward along the last-described boundary, following thereby the middle of Old-street aforesaid, to a point opposite to the middle of the south-eastern end of Central-street; and extending thence north-westward to and along the middle of the last-named street to the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, from the new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, aforesaid; and continuing thence, still north-westward, along the last-described boundary, following thereby the middle of Central-street as aforesaid, as far as a point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of Seward-street; and extending thence south-westward to and along the middle of the last-named street to a point on the boundary in the middle of Goswell-street aforesaid, which divides the said new parish of Saint Barnabas, King-square, from the said parish of Saint James, Clerkenwell; and extending thence south-eastward along the last-described boundary as far as a point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of Compton-street; and extending thence south-westward to and along the middle of Compton-street to its junction with Saint John-street; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named street, following thereby in part the boundary which divides the parish of Saint James, Clerkenwell, from the parish of Saint John, Clerkenwell, aforesaid, as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-western end of Wilderness-row; and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of the said row to the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint John, Clerkenwell, from the extra-parochial place commonly called the Charterhouse aforesaid; and continuing thence still north-eastward along the last-described boundary, following thereby the middle of the said Wilderness-row, to a point on the boundary in the middle of Goswell-street aforesaid, which divides the said parish of Saint Luke, Old-street, from the extra-parochial place commonly called the Charterhouse as first-mentioned; and extending thence south-eastward along the boundary last referred to, following thereby the middle of Goswell-street aforesaid, to the point opposite to the middle of the western end of Old-street as aforesaid, where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said scheme has, notwithstanding the said observations or objections, been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chichester.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation, for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Alban, Heworth, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-third day of May following, a part of the parochial chapelry of Heworth, within the parish of Jarrow, in the said county and diocese, was assigned as a chapelry district to the consecrated church of Saint Alban, situate at Windy Nook, in the said parochial chapelry, and was called 'The Chapelry District of Saint Alban, Heworth.'

"And whereas the said chapelry district of Saint Alban, Heworth, is reputed to have become, under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, a new parish of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven.

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Alban, Heworth, should be altered and extended so as to include within the limits of such new parish a certain detached portion of the parish of Saint Mary, Gateshead, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which is adjacent to the said new parish.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham, as such bishop, and also as the patron, in right of his see, of the rectory of

the said parish of Saint Mary, Gateshead, of the Venerable Archdeacon Prest, the rector or incumbent of the same rectory, of the Reverend Matthew Plummer, the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said parochial chapelry of Heworth, and as such incumbent, the patron of the perpetual curacy of the new parish of Saint Alban, Heworth, and of the Reverend Edward Hussey Adamson, the incumbent of the last-named perpetual curacy (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that in our opinion it would be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Alban, Heworth, should be altered and extended so as to include within the limits of such new parish all that portion of the parish of Saint Mary, Gateshead aforesaid which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and which is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink, and that the said portion of the parish of Saint Mary, Gateshead aforesaid so to be included within the limits of the said new parish of Saint Alban, Heworth, should become and be and form part of such new parish.

"And we humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The territory proposed to be added to the new parish of Saint Alban, Heworth, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham, being:—

"All that detached portion of the parish of Saint Mary, Gateshead, in the same county and diocese, which is bounded on the north by the consolidated chapelry of Saint Edmund, Gateshead, in the same county and diocese, and upon all other sides, that is to say upon the east, south, and west, by the said new parish of Saint Alban, Heworth."

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district, for spiritual purposes, should be set out and constituted for, and be annexed to, the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Heaton Reddish aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester; testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Heaton Norris, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and which is also delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, be severed and disannexed from the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Heaton Norris, and shall be set out and constituted for, and be annexed to, the said church of Saint Mary, situate at Heaton Reddish aforesaid, and shall become and be a district, for spiritual purposes, and shall be named 'The District of Saint Mary, Heaton Reddish.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the herein-named Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Mary, Heaton Reddish, being:—

"All that part of the new parish of Saint Thomas, Heaton Norris, some time part of the parish of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester, which is situate to the south-east of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish from the new parish of Christ Church, Denton, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of the Stalybridge and Stockport branch of the London and North-Western line of railway; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said line of railway, for a distance of six furlongs or thereabouts, to the centre of the bridge which carries the lane commonly called Barlow's-lane over such line of railway; and extending thence, first north-westward and then westward, along the middle of the said lane to its junction with Reddish-lane; and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named lane as far as a point opposite to the middle of the eastern end of Moor's-lane; and extending thence westward to and along the middle of the last-named lane as far as the centre of the swing-bridge which carries such lane over

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a scheme, bearing date the fifteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish of Godalming, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Godalming, which is hereinafter-mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its

limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship) should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

“ And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Godalming have become vested in us, under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein-mentioned Acts.

“ And whereas a sum of two thousand and five hundred pounds has been contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England, by Emma Susan Ramsden, the wife of John Charles Francis Ramsden, of Busbridge-hall, in the said parish of Godalming, Esquire, to be applied in the erection of a church for the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted.

“ And whereas at the instance of the said Emma Susan Ramsden a capital messuage or dwelling-house, and five acres, two roods, and fifteen perches of land, or thereabouts, situate within the limits of the said proposed district, have been severally granted and conveyed to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and our successors, partly for the purpose of a house of residence and glebe for the minister who shall be appointed and licensed to such district, and partly also for the purpose of a site for the erection of a church in and for the same district.

“ And whereas the said sum of two thousand and five hundred pounds and the said capital messuage or dwelling-house and land have been so contributed and paid, granted, and conveyed respectively as aforesaid, upon the understanding that we should provide and pay, by equal half-yearly payments, the annual sum or sums hereinafter-mentioned to the minister of the said district, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, and, upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district and of the nomination of the minister thereof, should be assigned in the manner hereinafter-mentioned.

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Godalming which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette, of any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named ‘The District of Busbridge.’

“ And we further recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed, according to the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act, the sum of two hundred pounds, and that so soon as a church shall have been erected within such district, and shall have been approved by us, and consecrated as the church of such district, and for the use and service of the minister and inhabitants thereof, and such district shall have thereupon become, according to the provisions of the said last-mentioned Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, there shall be paid by us, in each and every year, to the perpetual curate for the time being of such new parish, the further sum of one hundred pounds, making in the whole the sum of three

hundred pounds; and that the said sums of two hundred pounds or three hundred pounds, as the case may be, shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister, or of the consecration of such church as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or of the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that, instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister or perpetual curate and his successors, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

“ And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Emma Susan Ramsden, her heirs and assigns, for ever.

“ And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

“ The District of Busbridge, being :—

“ All that part of the parish of Godalming, in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Winchester, which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of Iron-lane where the boundary dividing the said parish of Godalming from the parish of Bramley, in the same county and diocese, meets the boundary dividing the said parish of Godalming from the particular district of Saint John the Evangelist, Farncombe, in the same county and diocese; and extending thence in a direction generally westward along the last-described boundary as far as a boundary stone inscribed ‘B.D., 1865, No. 1,’ and placed at the point where the fence which divides the close numbered 1,737 upon the title commutation map of the said parish of Godalming from the close numbered 1,736 upon the same maps meets the fence which divides the said close numbered 1,737 from the close numbered 1,759 upon the same maps; and extending thence in a direct line south-westward for a distance of four hundred and fifty-

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Stephen, situate in the parish of Lewisham, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Stephen, situate at Lewisham aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Lewisham which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned to the said church of Saint Stephen, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Stephen, Lewisham.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London (testified as aforesaid), we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The **SCHEDULE** to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Stephen, Lewisham, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Lewisham, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of London, which is comprised within, and is bounded by, an

imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish from the parish of Greenwich, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of the Lewisham-road, at its junction with the Morden-hill-road; and extending thence southward along the middle of the said Lewisham-road to its junction with the road leading over Lewisham-hill; and extending thence north-eastward, along the middle of the last-described road, for a distance of one hundred and thirty-three yards or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of a certain new road called Camden Villa-road, which leads past the northern side of the ancient Grammar School on Lewisham-hill to the road called Granville-park; and extending thence, first south-eastward and then southward, to and along the middle of the said new road to its junction with the road called Granville-park aforesaid; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road, for a distance of one hundred yards or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of a certain footpath which passes under the line of the North Kent Railway, and leads towards Saint Stephen's Church; and extending thence south-westward to and along the middle of the said footpath as far as the centre of the said line of railway; and extending thence south-eastward, along the middle of the same line of railway, as far as the boundary which divides the said parish of Lewisham from the parish of Lee, in the county and diocese aforesaid; and extending thence westward, along the last-described boundary, passing the southern side of the site of Saint Stephen's Church aforesaid, to a point on the eastern side of the Lewisham-road aforesaid; and continuing thence still westward across the said road and to and along the middle of Rennell-street to its junction with Molesworth-street; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with a certain occupation road, leading to the close numbered 1110 upon the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Lewisham and upon the map hereunto annexed; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said occupation road (passing under the line of the Mid Kent Railway) as far as a point opposite to the middle of the fence which divides the closes numbered respectively 1110 as aforesaid and 1109 upon the said maps from the close numbered 1111 upon the same maps; and extending thence south-westward to and along the middle of such fence to its extremity on the eastern bank of the River Ravensbourne and extending thence north-eastward along the said river bank for a distance of sixty-six yards or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the eastern end of the fence which divides the close numbered 926 upon the said maps from the close numbered 1843 upon the same maps; and extending thence westward across the said river and to and along the middle of the last described fence and along the middle of the fences which divide the closes numbered respectively 922 and 920 upon the said maps from the closes numbered respectively 919 and 918 upon the same maps, crossing the proposed branch line of the South Eastern Railway to the junction of the fence dividing the close numbered 920 from the close numbered 918 as aforesaid, with the fence dividing the close numbered 917 upon the said maps from the closes numbered respectively 918 as aforesaid and 1845 upon the same maps; and extending thence first southward and then south-westward along the middle of the last described fence to its extremity on the eastern side of a cer-

tain footway called Vicar's Hill Road, leading from the Lady Well Station of the Mid-Kent Railway aforesaid, towards Loam Pit Hill; and extending thence first westward to the middle of the last-named road, and then northward along the middle of the same road, passing the south-western end of Tile Kiln Lane, to the boundary which divides the said parish of Lewisham from the particular district of Saint John, Upper Lewisham-road, in the county and diocese aforesaid; and extending thence first northward and then north-eastward along the last described boundary to its junction with the boundary which divides the said parish of Lewisham from the parish of Greenwich, as first mentioned; and extending thence first southward and then eastward along the boundary last referred to as far as the point in the middle of the Lewisham-road where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty, chapter twenty-six, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty, King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty, chapter twenty-six, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for altering and improving the episcopal house of residence of the Bishop of Ripon, at Ripon.

"Whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of Ripon, that the episcopal house of residence at Ripon aforesaid requires certain alterations and improvements to be made therein, in order to render it suitable and convenient, and it has been proposed to us by the said bishop, and it appears to us to be expedient that towards defraying the cost of effecting such alterations and improvements, a sum of one thousand pounds, being a sum not exceeding two years income of the See, should be provided by borrowing the same, by way of mortgage, upon the security of all or any part of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments of, or belonging to, the bishoprick.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Robert, Bishop of Ripon (testified by his having

signed and sealed this scheme) we humbly recommend and propose that the said bishop be authorised to borrow from the governors of the bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above-mentioned Acts, the sum of one thousand pounds, and as a security for the same that the said bishop do mortgage all or any part of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments of, and belonging to, his said See, to the said governors by deed, for the term of thirty years, until the said sum of one thousand pounds, and interest for the same, at the rate hereinafter-mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof as hereinafter-mentioned, shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in manner following, that is to say, that from and after the expiration of the first year of the said term computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, in which year no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, the said bishop or his successors shall yearly and every year pay to the said governors, their successors or assigns, one-thirtieth part of the said principal sum, until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall at the end of the first and each succeeding year pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum, or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid, and that if and when it shall happen that the principal and interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said governors, their successors and assigns, to recover the same, and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale, in such manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors, from their tenants, by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale, and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, and shall bind as well the said Robert, Bishop of Ripon, as every succeeding bishop of the said See, until the principal money and interest, costs, and charges, shall be paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the said sum of one thousand pounds shall be paid to us, and that the receipt of our joint treasurers for the time being endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be good and sufficient discharge to the said governors and their successors, for the same who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof, and that upon the receipt of the said sum of one thousand pounds, the whole, or any part or parts thereof, shall be applied by us at such times, and in such manner, as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said alterations and improvements in the episcopal house of residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose, that so soon as such alterations and improvements shall have been completed, the Bishop of Ripon for the time being shall, at his personal charge and expense, insure and keep insured the said episcopal house of residence, as so altered and improved as aforesaid, from loss or damage by fire, in one of the public Offices of Assurance in London or Westminster, to be approved by us, in a sum of not less than twelve thousand pounds; and that such Bishop shall, within fourteen days after any premium for such insurance shall have become due and payable, deliver to us the receipt for the same; and that, in case of any loss or damage by fire to the said house, any and every sum of money receivable under such insurance shall become and be payable and be paid to and deposited with us,

in trust, to be applied, and the same, together with any interest and accumulations thereof, shall be applied by us, towards the rebuilding or repairing and reinstating the said house, or of any part thereof which may have so suffered loss or damage, in such manner as shall be determined on by us, with the concurrence of the Bishop of Ripon for the time being.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the herein-named Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas, on the vacancy of the said prebend, which occurred on or about the twenty-seventh day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, by the decease of the Reverend Sir Herbert Oakeley, Baronet, Clerk, the then prebendary, all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments, theretofore belonging to the said prebend (except rights of patronage) became, by virtue of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, absolutely vested in us for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Berlin, enclosing a copy of the new Customs' Tariff of the Zollverein States, which will be in force from the 1st July, and will be applicable to the produce and manufactures of Great Britain, and of which the following is a translation :—

ARTICLES FREE OF IMPORT DUTY.

1. The productions of agriculture and husbandry, of an estate crossed by the custom-frontier, and the dwelling-house and household-buildings of which are situate within the frontier.
2. Household furniture and utensils, used and worn cloths and body-linen, used manufacturing and mechanical implements, imported by immigrants for their own use; also new cloths, linen and effects (by special permission) which form part of a dowry, imported by foreigners who settle in the country in consequence of their intermarrying in the country.
3. House-furniture and effects, used worn cloths and body-linen, which (by special permission) are imported as forming a portion of an inheritance.
4. Cloths, linen, and other travelling things which travellers, carriers, and sailors take with them for their own use; also implements and instruments which travelling artists carry with them for practical use of their profession; also used cloths, linen, and other things which precede or follow the aforesaid persons; also provisions for consumption of travellers.
5. Carriages and boats and vessel imported for the purpose of conveyance of persons or goods, the vessels including all the used inventory-pieces found in them, provided they (the vessels) belong to foreigners, or the inland vessels bring back the same or similar inventory-pieces which they had on board when passing abroad; carriages of travellers; also (by special permission) even when, at the time of their importation, they did not serve as means of conveyance for the owners themselves, but were evidently previously employed as such, and are now imported for the same purpose; horses and other animals which are proved to have been employed as beasts of burden or transport for carts or travelling-vans; also riding-horses of travellers for their further conveyance.
6. Empty casks, sacks, etc., imported for the purpose of filling them with oil, grain, etc., to be sent abroad or are returned empty from abroad after having been discharged of their cargo; in both cases the identity must be secured and the import-duty guaranteed.
7. Pattern-books and patterns in cuttings and pieces, only imported as such and for that purpose.
8. Works of art imported for exhibitions, public institutions, and collections; also other objects imported for public libraries and other scientific institutions; also natural curiosities for scientific collections.
9. Antiquities, whose worth lies chiefly in their antiquity, and are of no other use but for collection.
