T is this day ordered by Her Majesty in Council, that the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain do issue writs for further proroguing the Parliament, which was appointed to meet on Wednesday, the first day of November next, to Thursday, the twenty-third day of November next; and also for proroguing the convocations of the provinces of Canterbury and York, from Thursday, the second day of November next, to Friday, the twenty-fourth day of November next.

### PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS a Convention was concluded on VV the thirtieth of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, between Her Majesty and the King of Sardinia (now the King of Italy), whereby due protection was secured within the States of His Sardinian Majesty for the benefit of authors of books, dramatic pieces, musical compositions, drawings, paintings, articles of sculpture, engravings, lithographs, and any other works of literature and of the fine arts, in which the laws of Great Britain and of the States of His Sardinian Majesty did then or might thereafter give their respective subjects the right of property or copyright, and for the benefit of the lawful representatives or assigns of such authors, with regard to any such works first published within the dominions of Her Majesty:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty, that the stipulations of the said Convention are in force throughout all the States which form the Kingdom of Italy:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue

intituled "An Act to amend the law relating to International Copyright;" and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of her reign, intituled "An Act to enable Her Majesty to carry into effect a Convention with France on the subject of copyright, to extend and explain the International Copyright Acts, and to explain the Acts relating to copyright in engravings," doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the day next after the day of the publication hereof n the London Gazette, the authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers of any of the following works; that is to say: - books, dramatic works, musical compositions, drawings, paintings, sculpture, engravings, lithographs, and any other works of literature and the fine arts, in which the laws of Great Britain give to British subjects the privilege of copyright, and the executors, administrators, and assigns of such authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers respectively, shall, as respects works first published within the Kingdom of Italy after the said day next after the day of publication hereof, have the privilege of copyright therein for a period equal to the term of copyright which authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers of the like works respectively, first published in the United Kingdom, are by law entitled to, provided such books, dramatic works, musical compositions, drawings, paintings, sculpture, engravings, lithographs, or other works of literature or the fine arts shall have been registered, and copies thereof shall have been delivered according to the requirements of the said recited Acts within three months after the first publication thereof in any part of the Kingdom of Italy, or if such work be published in parts, then within three months after the publication of the last part thereof:

And it is hereby further ordered, that the authors of dramatic pieces and musical compositions, which shall after the day aforesaid be first publicly represented or performed within the Kingdom of Italy, or their executors, administrators, or assigns, shall have the sole liberty of representing or performing in any part of the British dominions such dramatic pieces or musical com-positions, during a period equal to the period during which authors of dramatic pieces and musical compositions first publicly represented or performed in the United Kingdom, are entitled by of the authority committed to her by an Act law to the sole liberty of representing or perform-passed in the session of Parliament, holden ing the same, provided such dramatic pieces or musical compositions have been registered, and copies thereof have been delivered according to the requirements of the said first-recited Act, within three months after the time of their being first represented or performed in any part of the Kingdom of Italy :

And Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, and by virtue of the authority of the said secondly hereinbefore-recited Act, doth hereby order that the authors of any works published, or of any dramatic pieces first publicly represented in the Kingdom of Italy at any time after the day next after the day of the publication hereof in the London Gazette, who may choose to reserve the -right of translating such works or dramatic pieces, their executors, administrators, and assigns shall, until the expiration of five years from the date of the first publication of the translations authorised by them respectively of such works, or from the time at which the translations authorised by them of such dramatic pieces are first published or publicly represented, be entitled, subject to the provisions mentioned in the said last-mentioned Act, to prevent the publication in the British dominions of any translation of such works or dramatic pieces, and the representation therein of any translation of such dramatic pieces not so re-

spectively authorised by them:

And it is further ordered that the time within which any such authorized translation as afore-said, must be registered and deposited in the United Kingdom pursuant to the last-mentioned Act, shall be three months from the publication thereof, either in the United Kingdom or the Kingdom of Italy, or if such translation be published in parts within three months of the publication of the last part thereof; and Her Majesty by and with the advice aforesaid, and by virtue of the authority of the said secondly hereinbefore recited Act, doth further order that an Order in Council of the fourth February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, to give effect to a Convention between Her Majesty and the King of Sardinia, on the subject of copyright shall be, and the said Order is hereby from henceforth, revoked, save so far as relates to any rights heretofore acquired by or vested in any persons or person under and by virtue thereof, and as to all which rights the same Order is to remain in full force and effect:

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the thirteenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth

seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Luke, situate at Shireoaks, in the parish of Worksop, in the county of Nottingham, and in the diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Worksop, and of the parish of Anston, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Worksop, and of the said parish of Anston, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Luke,

situate at Shireoaks aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln, as such Bishop, with the consent of the Right Honorable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York, as the patron, in right of his see, of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Anston, and with the consent of the Most Noble Henry Pelham Alexander, Duke of Newcastle, as the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Worksop (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Worksop and of the said parish of Anston, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Luke, situate at Shireoaks aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Luke, Shirecaks,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the said Henry Pelham Alexander, Duke of Newcastle, his heirs and assigns, as lords of the manor of Shireoaks.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem mect.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Luke, Shireoaks, being:

"All that portion of the parish of Worksop, in the county of Nottingham, and in the diocese of Lincoln, containing by admeasurement one thousand one hundred and seventy-six acres or thereabouts, which is comprised within and is co-extensive with the land and lands called respectively 'The Church Land' and 'The Endowment Lands' in the Act of Parliament known as the 'Shireoaks District Church Act, All which land and lands are more particularly described and enumerated in the first and second schedules annexed to the said Act. And also all that portion of the parish of Anston, in and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter the county of York, and in the diocese of York,

containing by admeasurement four hundred acres or thereabouts, which comprises the houses and lands called Brancliffe Grange, Fan Field Farm, and Turner Wood, all which said portion of such parish is situate generally to the south of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides such parish from the parish of Worksop aforesaid; that is to say, upon the boundary dividing the said county of Nottingham from the county of York as aforesaid, at the point where the stream, known as the County Dike or Old River, strikes such boundary; and extending thence first northward then westward and again northward along the middle of the said river to the point near Wood Mill, where such river is joined by the stream flowing from Peck Mill; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-described stream as far as the boundary which divides the said parish of Anston from the parish of Thorpe Salvin, in the county of York, and diocese of York aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the said diocese of York.

FOR HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirteenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

- "We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making certain apportionments of income between the vicarage of Sawley and the perpetual curacy of Wilne, both in the county of Derby and diocese of Lichfield, and between the vicarage of Farndon and the vicarage of Balderton, both in the county of Nottingham and diocese of Lincoln.
- "Whereas the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lichfield, is in right of his see the patron of the said vicarage of Sawley and of the said perpetual curacy of Wilne.
- "And whereas the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lincoln, is in right of his see the patron of the said vicarage of Farndon and of the said vicarage of Balderton.

- "And whereas by an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the tenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, a yearly sum or stipend of six pounds was made payable by us to the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the said vicarage of Sawley.
- "And whereas by another Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, a yearly sum or stipend of two hundred and seventeen pounds was made payable by us to the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of Wilne.
- "And whereas such augmentations were so made upon the assumption that the incomes of the said vicarage and of the said perpetual curacy would by such annual payments be raised to the clear annual value of three hundred pounds, or thereabouts, respectively.
- "And whereas it has been represented to us that a portion (amounting to a yearly sum of sixty pounds) of the income from other sources heretofore accruing or held to be accruing to the vicar of the said vicarage of Sawley, did not actually and rightfully belong to such vicarage, but to the said perpetual curacy of Wilne.
- "And whereas by reason of the before-mentioned annual sum or stipend of six pounds being so made payable by us as aforesaid, the income of the said vicarage of Sawley has been raised to a yearly sum of two hundred and forty pounds only, instead of to a yearly sum of three hundred pounds.
- "And whereas by reason of the before-mentioned annual sum or stipend of two hundred and seventeen pounds being so made payable by us as aforesaid, the income of the said perpetual curacy of Wilne has been raised to a yearly sum of three hundred and sixty pounds, instead of to a yearly sum of three hundred pounds.
- "And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that arrangements should be made for apportioning the incomes of the said vicarage of Sawley and of the said perpetual curacy of Wilne, in the manner hereinafter mentioned.
- "And whereas under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, an annual sum or stipend of twenty pounds was made payable by us to the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the then united benefices of Farndon and Balderton, subject to the employment of a duly licensed curate in one of the said parishes of Farndon and Balderton.
- "And whereas by another Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixtytwo, the said annual sum or stipend of twenty pounds was made payable by us to the vicar or incumbent of the said vicarages of Farndon and Balderton, irrespectively of such condition.
- "And whereas by another Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the sixteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, a further annual sum or stipend of seven pounds was made payable by us to the vicar or incumbent of the said united vicarages of Farndon and Balderton.
- "And whereas by another Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, the said united vicarages of Farndon

and Balderton were separated and disunited, and became separate and distinct benefices to all intents and purposes whatsoever, but no apportionment was, by such last-mentioned Order of your Majesty in Council, made between such benefices of the annual sums or stipends, amounting to twenty-seven pounds, payable by us as aforesaid to the vicar or incumbent of the theretofore united benefices of Farndon and Balderton.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Most Reverend Charles Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, and also with the consent of the said John, Bishop of Lichfield, and also with the consent of the said John, Bishop of Lincoln, and also with the consent of the Reverend William Lloyd, Clerk, the perpetual curate or incumbent of the said perpetual curacy of Wilne, in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose, that upon and from the day of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such Order, the yearly sum or stipend of two hundred and seventeen pounds, which, under the hereinbefore secondly-recited Order of your Majesty in Council, was made payable by us to the incumbent for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of Wilne, shall be reduced to a yearly sum or stipend of one hundred and fifty-seven pounds; and the yearly sum or stipend of six pounds, which, under the hereinbefore firstly-recited Order of your Majesty in Council, was made payable by us to the vicar for the time being of the said vicarage of Sawley, shall be increased to a yearly sum or stipend of sixty-six pounds.

"And we further recommend and propose, that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, the annual sums or stipends, together amounting to twenty-seven pounds, which, as aforesaid, were formerly payable by us to the united vicarage of Farndon with Balderton, shall be divided and apportioned in equal moieties between the said vicarage of Farndon and the said vicarage of Balderton, and that such apportionment and division shall commence and take effect as from the said twenty-sixth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the dioceses of Lichfield and Lincoln.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls within the parish of Garthbeibio, in the county of Montgomery, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph.

"Whereas the Bishop of Saint Asaph for the time being is, in right of his see, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Garthbeibio, and also of the rectory of the parish of Llangadvan, in the same county and diocese.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the church of the said parish of Garthbeibio is at present ill-endowed, and that it is desirable that some additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the said parish.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Thomas Vowler, Bishop of Saint Asaph, the bishop of the diocese and the patron in right of his see, of the rectory of the parish of Llangadvan as aforesaid, has proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the income of the said rectory of such lastly-mentioned parish should be apportioned between the rector or incumbent thereof and the rector or incumbent of the said rectory of the parish of Garthbeibio, in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Honorable and Most Reverend Charles Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, of the said Thomas Vowler, Bishop of Saint Asaph, and of the Reverend Griffith Edwards, Clerk, the present rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Llangadvan (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that the tithes, or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, issuing, arising, and payable out of or in respect of certain lands, tenements, and hereditaments, situate either wholly or in part within the township of Voel, in the said county of Montgomery, and now forming part of the endowments of the said rectory of the said parish of Llangadvan, which are set forth and described in the schedule hereunto annexed, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette, be disannexed and transferred from the rectory of the said parish of Llangadvan, and from the rector or incumbent thereof and his successors, and shall become and be absolutely vested in the Reverend William Evan Jones, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing a transfer of the patronage of, or right of presentation to, the vicarage and parish church of Saint Edward, Leek, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese

"Whereas the patronage of, or right of presentation to, the vicarage and parish church of Saint Edward, Leek, is vested in the Right Honourable Thomas Augustus Wolstenholme, Earl of Macclesfield.

"And whereas the said Thomas Augustus Wolstenholme, Earl of Macclesfield, is desirous that the said patronage or right of presentation should be transferred to, and become vested in, the bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield for the time being, so as to render the said church and vicarage more eligible than it would otherwise be according to the rule and practice heretofore adopted by us to receive an unconditional grant in augmentation of the income thereof out of the common fund under our control which is referred to in the hereinbefore mentioned Act.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, and of the said Thomas Augustus Wolstenholme, Earl of Macclesfield (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole right of patronage of, and right of presentation to, the said vicarage and parish church of Saint Edward, Leek, and of the nomination of the vicar or incumbent thereto, shall be transferred to and become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, and by his successors, Bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme, for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts.

"Whereas there are not at present within the several parishes and districts specified in the schedule hereunto annexed houses of residence belonging to the respective benefices and suitable for occupation by the incumbents thereof.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that arrangements should be made for providing such a house of residence for each of such benefices, and that for that purpose certain sums of money should be borrowed upon mortgage of the same benefices respectively, in order that such sums of money may be applied towards defraying the costs of such houses of residence respectively.

"Whereas under the provisions of the abovementioned Acts, and of an Act of the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty, chapter twenty-six, and by virtue of an Order of your Majesty in Council, made under the authority of such provisions, bearing date the tenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and duly published in the London Gazette on the sixteenth day of the same month, in consideration of annual money payments of four thousand and five hundred pounds, and two hundred pounds, to the said Dean and Chapter (such last-mentioned sum to be by them appropriated and paid to the Chapter Clerk for the time being in respect of the profits which would have accrued to him on account of the management of the estates thereby proposed to be transferred to us), all the manors, lands, titles, tenements and hereditaments theretofore belonging, either in possession or reversion, to the said Dean and Chapter (except certain portions thereof in the above-mentioned Order particularly excepted), and all the estate and interest therein of the said Dean and Chapter became vested in us.

"And whereas it was by the above-mentioned Order of your Majesty in Council provided that none of the monies or estates received or acquired under the provisions thereof should be applicable to the purposes of our common fund, except only so far as it might be necessary to reimburse such fund any advances made thereout under the provisions of such Order, until or unless, by and under the like authority, the said Dean and Chapter should have been put into possession, in fer-simple, of real estate sufficient to secure to them an annual income therefrom (after deducting rates, taxes, and other outgoings, including cost of management), of four thousand and five hundred pounds; subject, however, as well to the charges and outgoings particularly described in the schedule marked B, annexed to such Order, as to all other capitular liabilities, except the thereinbefore-mentioned payment of two hundred pounds per annum to the Chapter Clerk.

"And whereas by an Order of your Majesty in Council, made under the authority of the above-inentioned Acts, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and duly published in the London Gazette on the thirty-first day of the same month, it was provided that there should be paid by us to

the Dean of the said cathedral church, and to his t successors, Deans of the same church, such a sum as should together with the monies which upon inquiry and calculation should appear to have become due in each year to the Denn of the said church, out of the corporate revenues thereof, be sufficient to make up the income of the Dean for each such year to the sum of one thousand pounds.

"And whereas by the second of the above-mentioned Acts it is enacted that it shall be lawful by the authority in such Act referred to, that is by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying a scheme prepared by us, to carry into effect certain purposes referred to in the same Act. one of such purposes being that of giving to the Dean of every cathedral and collegiate church in England an average annual income of one thousand pounds, by any mode of payment, contribution, augmentation, or endowment, which may be deemed fit, as well as by the modes in the first of the above-mentioned Acts specified.

"And whereas under the statutes and usuages of the said cathedral church the surplus of the revenues thereof, after providing for the charges and capitular liabilities to which such revenues are subject, is divisible into five equal parts or shares, of which the said Dean is entitled to one part or share, the remaining four parts or shares being severally receivable by the four canons of the same cathedral church respectively.

"And whereas the Dean of the said cathedral church is at present in the receipt of the annual sum of five hundred pounds as his said one-fifth part or share of the divisible surplus arising from the above-mentioned gross annual payment of four thousand and five hundred pounds, four ninth parts of the same gross annual payment being appropriated towards providing for the expenses of the services of the said cathedral church, and the other purposes particularly enumerated and set forth in the schedule marked B annexed to the hereinbefore recited Order of your Majesty in Council of the tenth of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty; and to providing for all other capitular liabilities, and the said Dean is also in receipt of an annual sum of five hundred pounds, payable to him from time to time by us under the authority of the hereinbefore recited Order of your Majesty in Council of the twenty-sixth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

annual income of five thousand pounds, four tenth parts of the rents, profits, and proceeds of such estates should be appropriated to providing for the discharg of the expenses of the services of the said cathedral church and the other purposes particularly enumerated and set forth in the said schedule marked B annexe I to the Order of your Majesty in Council hereinbefore first recited, and to providing for all other capitular liabilities; and that the remaining six tenth parts should be appropriated as follows, that is to say, -- that such six tenth parts should be divided into six equal parts or shares, and that two of such parts or shares should constitute the income of the Dean, and the remaining four parts or shares should be severally appropriated to and receivable by the four canons of the said cathedral church respectively.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Dean and Chapter of the said cathedral church at Chichester, testified by their having affixed their corporate seal to this scheme, and also with the consent of the Very Reverend Walter Farquhar Hook, Doctor in Divinity, the Dean of the same cathedral church, testified by his having duly signed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that upon the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published Order, the lands, tenements, and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, with their appurtenances, and all our right, title, estate, and interest therein, and in the benefit of the perpetual land tax, if any, charged upon the same premises which has been redeemed, shall be assigned as the endowment of the Dean and Chapter of Chichester, and shall become and be absolutely vested in the said Dean and Chapter, in as full and ample a manner as if the same had formed part of the ancient possessions of the said Dean and Chapter, and that the said Dean and Chapter shall become and be absolutely entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments aforesaid, as from the twenty-fifth day of March last past, in lieu of, and substitution for, the annual sums payable by us to the said Dean and Chapter, and to the said Dean respectively, under the provisions of the two several Orders of your Majesty in Council, hereinbefore recited, which said payments shall, as from the same twenty-fifth day of March last, cease and determine.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Kirkthwaite, being:-

C., 1865, No. 1,' and placed on the western side of such road near to the south-eastern corner of Peggles Wright Plantation aforesaid; and extending thence, in a direct line, northward, for the distance of rather more than a mile to a boundary stone inscribed, 'K. D. C. 1865, No. 2.,' and placed on the mound called Fanny-hill, upon the boundary on the summit of Rise-hill which divides the said chapelry of Dent from the parochial chapelry of Garsdale, in the parish of Sedbergh aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

And whereas the mayor, aldermen, and burgesses of the borough of Wrexham, in the county of Denbigh, in Council assembled, have presented a petition to Her Majesty in Council, stating that the parish of Wrexham comprises an area of 14,292 statute acres, and includes 15 townships separately maintaining their own poor, the total population being, at the Census of 1861, 19,775, That five of these townships, and portions of three others of them, covering an area of 6,350 statute acres, and containing a population of 6,560, have been formed into three separate ecclesiastical districts, and have burial-ground attached to them at present sufficient for the requirements for the purposes of sepulture of such districts, And further stating that the portion of the parish of Wrexham forming the ecclesiastical parish under the spiritual control of the vicar contains 7,942 statute acres, having a population of 13,215, And further stating that in the year 1857, the parliamentary borough of Wrexham, comprising the townships of Wrexham Regis and Wrexham Abbot, and part of the township of Esclusham Below, and including therein the town of Wrexham, was constituted by Royal charter a municipal borough, under the provisions of the Municipal Corporation Acts, And further stating that the borough of Wrexham thus constituted, having an area of 1,087 acres, possessed, at the Census of 1861, a population of 7,588, and forms part of the above-mentioned ecclesiastical parish of Wrexham, and further stating that the church of Saint Giles, being the parish church, the chapel of ease or quasi-district church of Saint Mark's, a Roman Catholic church, and 12 places of worship belonging to different Dissenting denominations.

some of them of considerable size, are situated within the borough of Wrexham, And further stating that, with the exception of a small graveyard attached to a Dissenting chapel three miles from Wrexham, the burial-grounds for the inhabitants of the ecclesiastical parish of Wrexham are three only in number; that is to say, the churchyard of the parish church of Saint Giles, a cemetery in or near to a place called Penybryn, in the said borough of Wrexham, belonging to the Established Church, and a burial-ground called Rhosddu Burial-ground, also within the said borough, belonging to several congregations of Protestant Dissenters, And further stating that the churchyard of Saint Giles is a very ancient place of sepulture, having been so used for several centuries, That in consequence of its position in the centre of a dense population and its overcrowded state, an Order in Council was made in the year 1856 for its close (with the exception of interments in vaults and brick graves), And further stating, that the cemetery in Penybryn had been used as a burial-ground for upwards of 60 years, That its admeasurement is 2A. WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session VV of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to " prevent until the 1st day of September, 1850, " and to the end of the then next session of Par-"liament, the spreading of contagious or infec-"tious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other "animals," and which has since been from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals; or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals; and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act; and that all persons offending against the said Act shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, or such smaller sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty's Privy Council may in any case by such Order direct:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder has lately appeared, and now prevails among cattle within that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, which is generally designated as the "cattle plague:"

And whereas it was expedient to take measures for preventing such disorder from extending to that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland; and whereas, for such purpose, an Order was duly made in pursuance of the authority of the said Acts, by the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 25th August, 1865; and whereas, by such Order, the removal to any port or place, in that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland, from any port or place in that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf was prohibited:

And whereas it is apprehended that the said disease, termed "cattle plague," may be communicated otherwise than by the removal of the above-named animals:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, in exercise of the powers given by the said recited Act, and by the several Acts continuing the same as aforesaid, order as follows:—

That, after the date of the publication of this Order in the London Gazette, it shall not be lawful for any person to remove any skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any of the above-named animals, from any port or place within that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, to any port or place within that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland.

And the Lords of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give such directions herein as may be necessary to insure due obedience to this Order.
