PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the third day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew, situate in the parish of Hillingdon, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Hillingdon and of the parish of Cowley, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population, which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Hillingdon, and of the said parish of Cowley, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the church of Saint Andrew aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Honorable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London, as such bishop, and also as the patron in right of his see of the vicarage of the said parish of Hillingdon, and of William Edward Hilliard, of Cowleyhouse, in the said county of Middlesex, Esquire, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Cowley (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion,

be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Hillingdon, and of the said parish of Cowley, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Andrew, situate in the parish of Hillingdon as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Hillingdon;' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the bishop for the time being of the said diocese of London.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing  
Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Hillingdon, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Hillingdon, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, and also all those several detached portions of the parish of Cowley, in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within an imaginary line, commencing at a point in the centre of Stafford-bridge, which carries the turnpike-road from Hillingdon to Uxbridge over the Ickenham-brook; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said brook for a distance of two hundred and twenty-three yards, or thereabouts, as far as a point on the boundary dividing the said parish of Hillingdon from a certain detached portion of the parish of Cowley aforesaid; and extending thence first north-westward then westward, and finally southward along the said boundary to a boundary stone inscribed 'H. St. A. C. C., 1865,' and placed on the western side of the road leading from Greenway to Cowley Church, at a point in the middle of the eastern end of the fence dividing the close numbered 1294 upon the map of the inclosure award of the said parish of Hillingdon, and upon the map hereunto annexed, from the close numbered 1292 upon the same maps; and extending thence westward along the middle of the said fence to the boundary at the western extremity of such fence, which divides

the said parish of Hillingdon from another detached portion of the parish of Cowley aforesaid; and extending thence first northward and then westward, along the last-described boundary (crossing the Cowley-road), as far as a point in the middle of Fray's River; and extending thence in a direction mainly northward along the middle of the said river as far as a point near Rab's Mill, on the boundary dividing the said parish of Hillingdon from the new parish of Saint John, Uxbridge Moor, in the county and diocese aforesaid; and extending thence north-westward along the last described boundary (following thereby the course of the said Fray's River) to the junction of such boundary with the boundary dividing the said parish of Hillingdon from the new parish of Saint Margaret, Uxbridge, in the county and diocese aforesaid; and extending thence first north-eastward and then north-westward along the last described boundary to its junction at the place called 'The Pool' with the boundary dividing the said parish of Hillingdon from the parish of Denham, in the county of Buckingham, and in the diocese of Oxford; and extending thence first north-eastward and then north-westward along the said boundary (which is also the boundary dividing the said county of Middlesex from the said county of Buckingham) to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Hillingdon from the parish of Harefield, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London aforesaid; and extending thence in a direction mainly south-eastward along the last described parish boundary to its junction at the bridge over the Ickenham-brook aforesaid, called Ickenham-bridge, with the boundary dividing the said parish of Hillingdon from the parish of Ickenham in the last named county and diocese; and extending thence in a direction mainly southward along the middle of the said brook as far as the centre of Stafford-bridge, where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, sections three, four, and seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the third day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-

five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, sections three, four, and seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for assigning certain lands and hereditaments as the permanent endowment of the see of Carlisle.

"Whereas the Honorable and Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of Carlisle, succeeded to the said see on an avoidance which happened before the passing of the hereinbefore-mentioned Act; and has now as such bishop an income of four thousand and five hundred pounds per annum, being the amount contemplated by Parliament, and named for the bishops of the see of Carlisle in the Order of your Majesty in Council of the twentieth-fifth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one.

"And whereas the said Samuel, Bishop of Carlisle, has signified to us his willingness to accept as the endowment for his see, the lands, tenements, and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule hereto annexed, which are now vested in us in fee simple in possession, the same being in the judgment of our Estates Committee convenient to be held as the endowment of the said see, and calculated to secure to the holder thereof as nearly as may be (after deducting costs of management) a net annual income of four thousand and five hundred pounds, and no more.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Samuel, Lord Bishop of Carlisle, testified by his having signed this scheme, and sealed the same with his episcopal seal, we humbly recommend and propose, that upon the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published Order, the lands, tenements, and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule hereto annexed, with their appurtenances, and all our right, title, and interest therein, and all our right, title, and interest in any tithes, or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, arising out of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments, or charged thereupon, and in the benefit of the perpetual land-tax, if any, charged upon the same premises, which has been redeemed, shall be assigned as the endowment of the bishoprick of Carlisle, and shall become and be absolutely vested in the said bishop, in as full and ample a manner as if the same had formed part of the ancient possessions of the said see, and that the said bishop shall become entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds of such lands, tenements, and hereditaments, as from the second day of August now last past.

"And we further recommend and propose that the money payment payable by us under the provisions of the Order of your Majesty in Council of the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall, as from the said second day of August now last past, cease and determine.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said hereinbefore-mentioned Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in the new parish of Saint James, Hill Top, West Bromwich, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas the church of the said new parish of Saint James, Hill Top, West Bromwich, is in the patronage of the Right Honorable William Walter, Earl of Dartmouth.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the church of the said new parish is ill-endowed, and that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the said new parish.

"And whereas in consideration of our undertaking to recommend and propose to your Majesty in Council the augmentation of the present endowment of the church of the said new parish of Saint James, Hill Top, West Bromwich, hereinafter mentioned, the said William Walter, Earl of Dartmouth, is willing that the right of patronage of the said new parish should be transferred to and become vested in the bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield for the time being.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, and of the said William Walter, Earl of Dartmouth, in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose, that upon and from the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole right of patronage of the said new parish of Saint James, Hill Top, West Bromwich, and of the nomination of the incumbent thereto and to the church thereof, shall be transferred to and become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, and by his successors, bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the twenty-seventh and twenty-eighth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the twenty-

seventh and twenty-eighth years of your Majesty, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting the transfer to us and our successors of the lands and hereditaments now forming the endowment of the sub-chanter and vicars-choral of the cathedral church of York, and for substituting in lieu thereof an annual money payment.

"Whereas it is by the same Act enacted that it shall be lawful under the authority of a scheme prepared by us, and of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, with the consent in writing under the common or corporate seal of any vicars-choral priest, vicars, senior vicars, custos, and vicars-warden, and vicars or minor canons who may constitute a corporation aggregate in any cathedral church in England, and of their visitor for the said vicars-choral priest, vicars, senior vicars, custos, and vicars-warden, and vicars or minor canons, to transfer to and vest in us for the purposes of the Acts relating to us and subject to the provisions thereof and to the conditions which may be specified in any such scheme and Order, all the lands and hereditaments belonging to such corporation for and in consideration of any annual or other money payment to be made by us to such corporation.

"And whereas the sub-chanter and vicars-choral of York Cathedral constitute a corporation aggregate within the meaning of the said herein-before recited Act, and have agreed with us, that with the view of effecting such a transfer of their estates and hereditaments as is contemplated in the said Act the following arrangement shall be recommended by us to your Majesty in Council.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said sub-chanter and vicars-choral of York Cathedral, and of the Right Honorable and Most Reverend William, Lord Archbishop of York, as Visitor of the said corporation, testified by their having hereunto affixed their respective corporate seals, we humbly recommend and propose that, immediately upon the gazetting of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, all lands, tithes, and hereditaments whatsoever (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage) now belonging to the said sub-chanter and vicars-choral, or to or in which they have or ought to have any estate, right, title, or interest, shall, together with all such estate, right, title, and interest therein (except as aforesaid), be and be held to be, for the consideration hereinafter mentioned, transferred by and from the said sub-chanter and vicars-choral to us, and shall then and thereupon become and be absolutely vested in us and our successors, for the purposes of the Acts relating to us, subject, nevertheless, to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof, or of any part or parts thereof, and subject also to any charges or liabilities which specifically attach to the ownership of the said lands, tithes, and hereditaments, but free and discharged from the payment of tenths and synodals, and from all annual or other payments hitherto customarily made by the said sub-chanter and vicars-choral to the Songmen or the Bedern-porter in the said cathedral; and that we shall, upon such gazetting as aforesaid, be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds of the said lands, tithes, and hereditaments, as from the twenty-fifth day of December now last past; and that, in consideration of and for such transfer, there shall be paid by us to the said sub-chanter and vicars-choral, and their successors, the sum of one thousand and four hundred pounds per annum, by equal half-yearly payments on the twenty-fourth

day of June and the twenty-fifth day of December in every year; and that, immediately upon such gazetting as aforesaid, payment shall be made by us to the said sub-chanter and vicars-choral of the amount which, by virtue of the provisions hereinbefore contained, will then be due in respect of the period which elapsed between the said twenty-fifth day of December last and the twenty-fourth day of June now last past; provided always, that no renewal of any lease, nor any new lease of the said lands, tithes, and hereditaments, or of any part thereof, was or shall, since the said twenty-fifth day of December last, have been or shall be granted or made by the said sub-chanter and vicars-choral.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."
