mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place :

And whereas the Justices of the Peace for the county of Warwick, in General Quarter Sessions assembled, on the seventeenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places at present existing in the southern division of the said county is insufficient, and praying that Leamington Priors, situate within the said division, may be a polling place for the southern division of the said county :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having taken the said petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that Leamington Priors shall be a polling place for the said southern division of the said county, and that the Justices of the Peace for the said county, in Quarter Sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act, passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such southern division of the said county into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that the said village of Ystradgunlais shall be an additional polling place for the said county, and that the Justices of the Peace for the said county, in Quarter Sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such county into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

WHEREAS by the West Indian Encumbered Estates Act, 1854, provision was made to facilitate the sale and transfer of encumbered estates in the several West Indian Colonies named in a schedule to the said Act (among which is the colony of Montserrat), and it was enacted that Her Majesty might, from time to time, by Order in Council, direct the said Act to come into operation in any of the said colonies, but that no such Order in Council should be made in respect of any colony until the legislature thereof should have presented an address to Her Majesty, praying Her Majesty to issue such Order, and should also have made provision to the satisfaction of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies for the payment of the salaries of the Local Commissioners in the said Act mentioned, and of all such assistant secretaries, clerks, messengers, and officers, as might be appointed under the said Act in such colony, and of such other expenses of carrying the said Act into execution as were therein directed to be provided for by the said legislature :

And whereas other Acts have passed, intituled, respectively, "The West Indian Incumbered Estates Act, 1858," "The West Indian Incumbered Estates Act, 1862," and "The West Indian Incumbered Estates Act, 1864:" and whereas by the said several Acts, respectively, it is provided that when Her Majesty shall by Order in Council direct that the said first-mentioned Act shall come into operation in any of the colonies mentioned therein, such Order shall be construed to apply as well to the said several Acts as to the said first-mentioned Act :

And whereas the Legislature of Montserrat, by an address dated the twenty-sixth of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, has prayed Her Majesty to issue such Order aforesaid ; and by an Act passed on the nineteenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, intituled "An Act for carrying into execution in Montserrat the West Indian Incumbered Estate Acts, 1854, 1858, 1862," has made provision for the payment of such salaries and other expences as aforesaid to the satisfaction of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies :

It is, therefore, hereby ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the said "West Indian Encumbered Estates Act, 1854," shall, from the date of this Order in Council, come into operation in the colony of Montserrat :

And the Right Honorable Edward Cardwell, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions accordingly.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy ; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five ; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the sixth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words following ; that is to say :

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy ; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five ; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church situate at Holland Fen, in the parish of Fosdyke, within the limits of the united benefice of Alгарkirk-cum-Fosdyke, in the county of Lincoln, and in the diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Fosdyke, and of the parish of Alгарkirk, together constituting the united benefice of Alгарkirk-cum-Fosdyke aforesaid, of the parish of Sutterton, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and of the parish of Kirton, in the same county and diocese, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is

situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

“And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Fosdyke, and of the said parish of Algarkirk, together constituting the united benefice of Algarkirk-cum-Fosdyke as aforesaid, of the said parish of Sutterton, and of the said parish of Kirton, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church situate at Holland Fen aforesaid.

“Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln, as such Bishop, of the Reverend Basil Beridge, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Fosdyke and of the rectory of the said parish of Algarkirk, together constituting the said united benefice of Algarkirk-cum-Fosdyke, and of the Right Honourable Henry John, Viscount Palmerston, the First Lord of your Majesty's Treasury, acting on behalf of your Majesty, as the patron, in right of the Crown, of the vicarage of the said parish of Sutterton (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), and with the consent of the Worshipful Company of the Mystery of the Mercers, in the city of London, the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Kirton (in testimony whereof they have hereunto affixed their corporate seal), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Fosdyke and of the said parish of Algarkirk, together constituting the united benefice of Algarkirk-cum-Fosdyke as aforesaid, of the said parish of Sutterton, and of the said parish of Kirton, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church situate at Holland Fen aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The Consolidated Chapelry of Holland Fen;’ and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the rector or incumbent for the time being of the said united benefice of Algarkirk-cum-Fosdyke.

“We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“The Consolidated Chapelry of Holland Fen, being:—

“All those contiguous portions of the parish of Algarkirk and of the parish of Fosdyke, together constituting the united benefice of Algarkirk-cum-Fosdyke, in the county of Lincoln, and in the diocese of Lincoln, of the parish of Sutterton, in the same county and diocese, and of the parish of Kirton, in the same county and diocese, which are situate to the north of an imaginary line extending along the southern bank of the South Forty Feet Drain.

“All which said portions of the above-named parishes being fen allotments form part of the territory called Holland Fen, and are respectively known as Algarkirk Fen, Fosdyke Fen, Sutterton Fen, and part of Kirton Fen.”

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lincoln.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the third day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of the rectory of Trotterscliffe or Trosley, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Canterbury, for the patronage of the rectory of Churchlench, in the county of Worcester, and in the diocese of Worcester.

“Whereas the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of Worcester, as the bishop of the diocese, is seized in fee, in right of his see, of the patronage of or perpetual right of nomination to the said rectory of Trotterscliffe or Trosley.

“And whereas Charles William Shepherd, of Trotterscliffe aforesaid, Esquire, is seized in fee of the patronage of or perpetual right of nomination to the said rectory of Churchlench.

“And whereas the said Henry, Bishop of Worcester, and the said Charles William Shepherd, have signified to us their desire that the patronage of, or right of nomination to, the said benefices may be exchanged as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

“And whereas we have made due enquiry and calculation as to the circumstances of the proposed exchange, and the relative values of the said benefices and patronage, and we do hereby certify to your Majesty that, after making all proper deductions and allowances, the values of the said benefices respectively are as set forth in the schedule hereto annexed.

“Now, therefore, with the consents of the said Henry, Bishop of Worcester, and of the said Charles William Shepherd (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the patron-

age of or perpetual right of nomination to the said rectory of Trotterscliffe or Trosley shall be assigned and transferred from the said Henry, Bishop of Worcester, and his successors; Bishops of Worcester, and shall become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Charles William Shepherd, his heirs and assigns for ever, and that in exchange for the same, the patronage of or perpetual right of nomination to the said rectory of Churchlench shall, upon and from the said last-mentioned day, be assigned and transferred from

the said Charles William Shepherd and his heirs and assigns, and shall in like manner become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by, the said Henry, Bishop of Worcester, and his successors, Bishops of Worcester, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Canterbury, and by the Registrar of the diocese of Worcester.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas an Order in Council has been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyard hereinafter mentioned, from the time specified in such Order; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discon-

tinuing burials in the said churchyard be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyard be postponed as follows; viz.:

In the churchyard of *SUTTON FOREST*, York, to the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the under-mentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that interments in the same should be discontinued, with the following modifications: viz.:

FORDINGTON, DORSETSHIRE.—After the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by stone or brickwork properly cemented.

LEIGHTON BUZZARD.—Forthwith in the burial-ground of Lake-street Chapel, except upon the following conditions: that no coffin be exposed or remains disturbed, and that every coffin buried in it be enclosed by brickwork or masonry properly cemented, or by concrete not less than six inches thick.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the eighteenth day of December next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representations, one month before the said eighteenth day of December.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then next session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders amongst sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has since been from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal, to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection; and also for the purpose of purifying any yard, stable, outhouse, or other place, or any waggons, carts, carriages, or other vehicles; and also for the purpose of directing how any animals dying in a diseased state, or any animals, parts of animals, or other things seized under the provisions of the said Act, are to be disposed of; and also for the purpose of causing notices to be given of the appearance of any disorder among sheep, cattle, or other animals, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of

the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act; and that all persons offending against the same shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, or such smaller sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty's Privy Council may in any case by such Order direct:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder now prevails among the cattle of Great Britain, which is generally designated the "cattle plague," and may be recognized by the following symptoms:—

"Great depression of the vital powers, frequent shivering, staggering gait, cold extremities, quick and short breathing, drooping head, reddened eyes, with a discharge from them, and also from the nostrils, of a mucous nature, raw looking places on the inner side of the lips and roof of the mouth, diarrhoea or dysenteric purging:"

And whereas several Orders, dated respectively the 24th of July, the 11th, 18th, and 26th of August, and 22nd of September, 1865, have been made under the authority of the said Acts by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, with a view to check the spreading of the said disorder.

And whereas it was ordered by the Lords of the Council on the 22nd of September, 1865, as follows:—

(Clause 19)

"Whenever any Local Authority, as hereinbefore defined, declares, by Notice published in any newspaper circulating within his or their jurisdiction, that it is expedient that animals, as hereinbefore defined, or some specified description thereof, shall be excluded from any specified Market or Fair within that jurisdiction, for a time to be specified in such Notice, it is hereby ordered, that after the publication of such Notice it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send such animals or description thereof into such Market or Fair: Provided always, that this clause of this Order shall not, unless renewed by a further Order, be in force after the expiration of three calendar months from the date of this Order."

And whereas Notices published under the said clause of the said Order have been evaded by sales being held in the neighbourhood of Markets or Fairs from which animals have been excluded by such Notices, and it is expedient to prevent such evasion:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, by virtue of, and in exercise of the powers given by, the said Act, so continued as aforesaid, order as follows:—

1. Where any Notice has been or may hereafter be published by any Local Authority, as defined in the said Order of the 22nd day of September, 1865, excluding animals, as defined in the said Order, or some specified description thereof from Markets or Fairs within the jurisdiction of such Local Authority; It shall not be lawful, from and after the date of this Order and while such Notice shall be in force, for any person to bring or send any such animals or such description thereof to any place within such jurisdiction for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell any such animals so brought or sent: Provided that nothing contained in this Clause of this Order shall be held to prohibit any person from exhibiting or selling on his own land or premises any such animal belonging to him which has been on

such land or premises for not less than fourteen days previous to such sale.

2. Every person offending against this Order shall, in pursuance of the said Act, for every such offence forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.

And whereas an Order, dated the 29th day of September, 1865, has been made under the authority of the said Acts by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, with a view to prevent the spreading to the Island and Barony of Lewis, in the county of Ross, of a contagious or infectious disorder generally designated the "cattle plague," now prevailing in many other parts of Great Britain:

And whereas it is expedient to revoke the said Order, and to take measures for preventing the spreading of the said "cattle plague" to certain parts of Scotland:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, by virtue and in exercise of the powers given by the said recited Act, and by the several Acts continuing the same as aforesaid, order as follows:—

1. The said Order, dated the 29th day of September, 1865, is revoked, provided that such

revocation shall not affect any act done or penalty recoverable under the said Order.

2. In this Order the word "cattle" shall be interpreted to mean any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, or lamb, and the expression "North Western District of Scotland" shall be interpreted to mean and embrace the whole of the county of Argyll, in Scotland, and the whole of Scotland lying to the north and west of the Caledonian Canal.

3. It shall not be lawful for any person to remove any cattle to any port or place within the "North Western District of Scotland," as defined and described in this Order, from any other port or place in Great Britain.

4. Nothing in this Order shall be construed to prohibit the removal of any cattle from any port or place within the said North-Western District of Scotland to any port or place within the same, or within any other part of Great Britain.

5. Every person offending against this Order shall for every such offence forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.

Revolving Light on Cape Katakolo.

THE Greek Government has given notice, that on and after the 17th day of September, 1865, a light would be exhibited from the lighthouse recently erected at Cape Katakolo, the south point of the peninsula forming Katakolo Bay, on the west coast of the Morea.

The light is a *revolving white* light, which attains its greatest brilliancy once *every two minutes*. A faint light will be seen for $1^m 30^s$; followed by a total eclipse for $10\frac{1}{2}^s$; a bright flash for 9^s ; and then a total eclipse for $10\frac{1}{2}^s$. The light is elevated 149 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather at 17 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the 4th order.

The tower stands at 779 yards within the south point of the peninsula, and its position is given at lat. $37^{\circ} 38' N.$, long. $21^{\circ} 18' 50''$ East of Greenwich.

PROHIBITION OF THE IMPORTATION OF CATTLE AND SHEEP INTO THE ISLE OF MAN.

WHEREAS by an Act passed by the Legislature of the Isle of Man, entitled "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1865," the Lieutenant-Governor is authorized by and with

the advice and consent of any two Members of the Council to make from time to time, such Orders and regulations as may appear to be necessary to prevent the introduction of the cattle disease, commonly known as the "cattle plague," into the said Isle.

The Lieutenant-Governor therefore by virtue and in exercise of the powers given by the said Act, hath ordered as follows:—

1. That from this date no animal, or the skins, hides, horns, or hoofs of any animal shall be imported into this Isle, or into any particular port or ports thereof, provided that this Order shall not extend to skins and hides brought into Great Britain, from India, South America, or Australia.

2. That from this date no animal, or the skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or parts of any animal, shall be exported from this Isle, to that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland.

3. That in this Order the word "animal" shall be interpreted to mean any bull, cow, ox, heifer, steer, calf, tup, sheep, wether, or lamb.

Bodmin Turnpike Roads.

(Grant of new term in and powers to alter and improve existing and make and maintain new portions of roads and to abandon existing roads; Repeal and Amendment of Act; Alteration and reduction or increase of Tolls; New provisions for application of Revenue and for reduction and discharge of Debt; Maintenance of roads; and other purposes).
