WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prevent until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then next session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has since been from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals; and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act; and that all persons offending against the same shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, or such smaller sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty's Privy Council may in any case by such Order direct:

And whereas an Order, dated the 29th day of September, 1865, has been made under the authority of the said Acts by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, with a view to prevent the spreading to the Island and Barony of Lewis, in the county of Ross, of a contagious or infectious disorder generally designated the "cattle plague," now prevailing in many other parts of Great Britain:

And whereas it is expedient to revoke the said Order, and to take measures for preventing the spreading of the said "cattle plague" to certain parts of Scotland:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, by virtue and in exercise of the powers given by the said recited Act, and by the several Acts continuing the same as aforesaid, order as follows:—

1. The said Order, dated the 29th day of September, 1865, is revoked, provided that such revocation shall not affect any act done or penalty recoverable under the said Order.

2. In this Order the word "cattle" shall be interpreted to mean any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, or lamb, and the expression "North Western District of Scotland" shall be interpreted to mean and embrace the whole of the county of Argyll, in Scotland, and the whole of Scotland lying to the north and west of the Caledonian Canal.

3. It shall not be lawful for any person to remove any cattle to any port or place within the "North Western District of Scotland," as defined and described in this Order, from any other port or place in Great Britain.

4. Nothing in this Order shall be construed to prohibit the removal of any cattle from any port or place within the said North-Western District of Scotland to any port or place within the same, or within any other part of Great Britain.

5. Every person offending against this Order shall for every such offence forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.

United General Gas Light Company.

(Repeal of Charter and Acts; Reconstruction and division of Company; Apportionment and Regulation of Capital; Powers to light Dublin, Kingstown, Bray, and adjacent districts; Sale or Transfer to Alliance Gas Company.)

A PPLICATION is intended to be made to Parliament, in the next session thereof, for an Act for the following, or some of the following among other, purposes, that is to say:

The district over which the powers of the intended Company are, by the Bill intended to extend, consists of the metropolitan police district of Dublin, together with the parishes of Kill, Killiney, Kilmacud, Old Connaught, and Rathmichael, in the barony of Rathdown, all which places are in the county of Dublin and Bray, in the barony of Rathdown, in the county of Wicklow.

5. To manufacture, purchase, or hire, gas meters, and gas apparatus, and to sell or let the same, and levy rates, rents, and charges for the sale and supply of gas, and of gas meters and fittings.

6. To regulate the capital, shares, or stock of the United General Gas Light Company, and to apportion a part thereof to the Company, to be constituted by the said Bill, and to make all necessary arrangements and provisions for the severance of the undertakings, and works, estate, rights, and credits, debts, and liabilities of the United General Gas Light Company, between the Company so to be constituted as aforesaid, and any other Company to be constituted in the next or any future session of Parliament, for the lighting of the city of Limerick with gas.

7.
