HER Majesty in Council was this day pleased to appoint the Right Honourable George Joachim Göschen to be President of the Committee of Council appointed for the consideration of all matters relating to Trade and Foreign Plantations, in the absence of the President of the said Committee for the time being.

The **QUEEN's** Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four; of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-four; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme,

bearing date the ninth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-four; of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-four; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for permanently annexing a canonry residentiary in the Cathedral Church of Winchester to the archdeaconry of Surrey, in the diocese of Winchester, and for transferring to us certain lands, tithes, and other hereditaments now forming the endowment or part of the endowment of such archdeaconry, and for appropriating the said lands, tithes, and other hereditaments, or certain portions thereof towards making better provision for the cure of souls within the parish of St. Andrew, Farnham, in the county of Surrey, and in the said diocese of Winchester, and likewise within the new parish of Saint John, Hale (sometime part of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham), and within the particular district of Saint Peter, Wrecclesham (sometime part of the same parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham), and likewise within the parish of Elstead, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and within the parish of Seale, in the same county and diocese, and likewise within the parish of Frensham, in the same county and diocese, and likewise within the particular district of Saint Stephen, Shutter Mill (some time part of the said parish of Frensham), and likewise within the parish of Bentley, in the county of Southampton and in the said diocese of Winchester, and also for transferring to the Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester for the time being, the patronage of certain benefices and cures now in the gift of the archdeacon for the time being of the said archdeaconry of Surrey, and in the gift of the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, and also for transferring to the present archdeacon of the said archdeaconry of Surrey, the patronage of the said particular district of

Saint Peter, Wrecclesham, and also for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, and also for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the said parish of Frensham, and out of the particular district of Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill, aforesaid.

"Whereas the Venerable John Sutton Utterton is the present archdeacon of the said archdeaconry of Surrey, and is also the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, and now holds a canonry residentiary in the said cathedral church of Winchester.

"And whereas the patronage of all the canonries residentiary in such cathedral church belongs to the Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester for the time being.

"And whereas it has been proposed to us by the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, with the concurrence of the said John Sutton Utterton, and it appears to us to be expedient, that the arrangements hereinafter set forth should be carried into effect.

"And whereas the present endowments of the said archdeaconry of Surrey comprise, *inter alia*, the rectory house and certain glebe lands situate within the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham; and also certain tithes or commutation tithe rentcharges arising within the same parish, and also certain tithes or commutation tithe rentcharges arising within the said parishes of Elstead, Frensham, and Seale, and within the said parish of Bentley, portions of which are now in possession, and other portions are subject to outstanding leases or grants for lives.

"And whereas the said John Sutton Utterton is, in right of his said archdeaconry, the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, and of the perpetual curacies of the said parishes of Seale and Bentley, and of the particular district of Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill, aforesaid.

"And whereas the said John Sutton Utterton is also in right of his said archdeaconry the patron in reversion (expectant upon the determination of certain outstanding leases or grants for lives of the before mentioned tithes or commutation tithe rentcharges of the said parishes of Elstead and Frensham) of the perpetual curacies of the parishes of Elstead and Frensham.

"And whereas the said John Sutton Utterton as the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, is the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Saint John, Hale.

"And whereas the bishop of the said diocese of Winchester for the time being is, in right of his see, the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of Saint Peter, Wrecclesham.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the churches of the said vicarage of Saint Andrew, Farnham, and of the perpetual curacies of Saint John, Hale, and of Saint Peter, Wrecclesham, and of the perpetual curacies of Elstead, Seale, Frensham, Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill, and Bentley aforesaid, are at present ill-endowed, and that it is desirable that some additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the said several parishes or districts respectively.

"And whereas with a view to such additional provision being made it has been agreed that the patronage of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, and also of the said perpetual curacy of Saint John, Hale, shall be transferred from the said John Sutton Utterton

(to whom such patronage now belongs in right of his archdeaconry as aforesaid) and be vested in the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and his successors, bishops of the same diocese for ever, as hereinafter recommended and proposed, and that the patronage of the said cure of Saint Peter, Wrecclesham, shall be transferred from the said Bishop of the diocese of Winchester (to whom in right of his see such patronage now belongs as aforesaid) to the said John Sutton Utterton, in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present contained within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purpose of Divine worship), should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth, by the name of 'The District of Tilford.'

"And whereas it has also been made to appear to us that it would likewise promote the interests of religion that the particular portion of the said parish of Frensham and also the particular portion of the particular district of Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill, hereinafter mentioned and described (such portions not at present containing within their limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship) should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth, by the name of 'The District of Saint John, Churt.'

"And whereas it has been proposed to us by the said John Sutton Utterton, and it appears to us to be expedient, that, in consideration of the endowment for the said district of Tilford proposed to be formed out of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, being immediately provided out of the lands, tithes, and hereditaments to be transferred by him to us as hereinafter mentioned, the whole right of patronage of such district, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, should be assigned as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas it has been further proposed to us by the said John Sutton Utterton, and it appears to us to be expedient, that in consideration of the endowment for the said district of Saint John, Churt, proposed to be formed out of the said parish of Frensham and out of the particular district of Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill, being eventually provided out of the lands, tithes, and hereditaments to be transferred by him to us as hereinafter mentioned, the whole right of patronage of such district, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, should be assigned as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas a new church has been erected at Tongham, in the said parish of Seale, and the same is about to be consecrated, and a consolidated chapelry or other ecclesiastical district, is intended to be assigned to such church under the provisions of the Church Building Acts, or some of them, and it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that an endowment should be provided for such church in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and of the said John Sutton Utterton, as such Archdeacon of Surrey, and also as vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, as aforesaid (testified by their having respectively signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that immediately upon and from the day

upon which any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, the canonry residentiary in the said cathedral church of Winchester, which is now held by the said John Sutton Utterton, shall become and be permanently annexed and united to the said archdeaconry of Surrey, and be held by the archdeacon for the time being of the said archdeaconry; and that every future archdeacon of the archdeaconry of Surrey shall, as such archdeacon, be entitled to installation to the canonry so proposed to be annexed to his archdeaconry, and shall be invested with, and so long as he shall remain archdeacon of such archdeaconry, and no longer, shall hold and enjoy all the rights, privileges, and emoluments of a canon of the same church, and that upon and from the said last-mentioned day all the lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments whatsoever (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage) now forming the endowment of the said archdeaconry of Surrey shall be disannexed therefrom, and become and be absolutely transferred to and be vested in us (subject to any existing lease or leases, grant, or grants thereof,) for the purposes of the said Acts.

And with the like consents of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and of the said John Sutton Utterton (testified as aforesaid), we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said vicarage of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, and of the said perpetual curacy of Saint John, Hale, and of the nomination of the respective incumbents thereto, and to the respective churches thereof, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be, subject to the proviso hereinafter contained, transferred from the said John Sutton Utterton as archdeacon of the said archdeaconry of Surrey, and as vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, respectively; and from his successors in the same archdeaconry and vicarage, and be assigned to and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from to time be exercised by, the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and his successors, bishops of the same diocese, for ever; provided always, that so long as the said John Sutton Utterton shall continue to be vicar of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, he shall be entitled to nominate and appoint a minister or incumbent to serve the church of the said perpetual curacy of the new parish of Saint John, Hale.

And with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Charles Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consents of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and of the said John Sutton Utterton, testified as aforesaid, we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of Saint Peter, Wrecclesham, and of the nomination of an incumbent thereto and to the church thereof, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be transferred from the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese

of Winchester, to the said John Sutton Utterton, in manner following (that is to say): so that the same right of patronage and nomination shall belong to and be held, used, and from time to time exercised by the said John Sutton Utterton, so long as and no longer than he shall continue to be archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Surrey, and so that upon and from the day upon which he shall cease to be such archdeacon the said right of patronage and nomination shall, *ipso facto*, revert to and be and remain in the then Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and his successors, bishops of the same diocese, as fully and absolutely as if the transfer thereof, which is hereby recommended and proposed, had not been made.

And we further recommend and propose that the messuage or rectorial house of residence and lands, situate in the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, heretofore belonging to the said Archdeaconry of Surrey, and so to be vested in us as aforesaid, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham.

And we further recommend and propose, that the whole of the tithes or commutation tithe rentcharges issuing, arising, and payable out of lands, tenements, and hereditaments situate within the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, and heretofore belonging to the said archdeaconry of Surrey, so to be vested in us as aforesaid, and all our estate and interest therein, shall without any conveyance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be transferred to and become and be absolutely vested in the said John Sutton Utterton, the now vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, and in his successors vicars or incumbents of the same vicarage for ever, subject nevertheless to the further provisions affecting such vicarage which are hereinafter contained.

And we further recommend and propose that he the said John Sutton Utterton, or other the vicar incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, shall upon the first day of January in each and every year following such transfer, pay over to the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Saint John, Hale, one fifth part, and to the incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of Saint Peter, Wrecclesham, one other fifth part of the net amount received by him the said vicar or incumbent, during the twelve calendar months ended the first day of October then last past, in respect of the same tithes or commutation tithe rentcharges, after deducting all such outgoings in respect of rates, taxes, repair of chancels, costs of collection and management, and other (if any) outgoings as shall be allowed by the bishop of the diocese for the time being, upon the submission to him the said bishop, on or before the thirty-first day of December in each year, of an account which the said incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, shall be bound so to submit, showing the receipts and disbursements in respect of the said tithes, and commutation

time rent-charges, for the twelve months ended the first day of October then last preceding, which account, after being allowed and approved by the said bishop, shall be deposited in the Registry of the Commissary Court for the parts of Surrey, in the diocese of Winchester; and that a proportionate part of the first of such yearly payments to the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Saint John Hale, and to the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of Saint Peter, Wrecclesham, respectively, calculated from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette, of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, shall be due to and receivable by each such incumbent upon the first day of January next following such publication as aforesaid.

And we further recommend and propose, that the incumbents of the said new parish of Saint John Hale, and of the said particular district of Saint Peter, Wrecclesham, and each of them, and each of his assigns, shall as against the vicar for the time being of the said vicarage of the parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, and his assigns, and the estates and revenues of the same vicarage (but so far only as such estates or revenues shall consist of the tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges hereinbefore recommended and proposed to be vested in such vicar and his successors) have and be entitled to exercise all such and the like powers of entry, distress, and other remedies for compelling payment of the proportionate annual sums hereinbefore proposed to be secured to the incumbents of the said new parish of Saint John Hale, and of the said particular district of Saint Peter, Wrecclesham, respectively, as landlords are by law entitled to have and exercise in respect of rent reserved upon a lease and in arrear, provided always, and with the consents of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and the said John Sutton Utterton, (testified as aforesaid), we further recommend and propose that the vicar for the time being of the said vicarage of the parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, shall not under the provisions of this scheme be accountable in any one year to the incumbent of the said new parish of Saint John Hale, for a greater amount than one equal fifth part, nor to the incumbent of the said particular district of Saint Peter, Wrecclesham, for a greater amount than one equal fifth part of the net annual amount of the rectorial tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges, which shall have been actually received by him during the twelve months, in respect of which such payment is to be made, so that any such deficiency of receipts be a *bond fide* deficiency, and be duly accounted for to the satisfaction of the Bishop of Winchester for the time being, upon such rendering of account as is hereinbefore mentioned and provided for, but so nevertheless that if, any of the rectorial tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges so recommended and proposed to be vested in the vicar of the parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, as aforesaid, shall not be recovered or received by him in any one year in which they may be due and payable but shall be recovered or received by him in any subsequent year, one equal fifth part of the net amount of the same when so recovered or received as last aforesaid, shall thereupon be paid over to each of the incumbents of the said new parish of Saint John Hale, and of the said particular district of Saint Peter, Wrecclesham, respectively.

And with the consent of the Reverend George Edmund Fox, the incumbent of the said new parish of Saint John Hale, tes-

tified by his having signed and sealed this scheme), we further recommend and propose, that the annual sum to be so paid to him and his successors by the vicar for the time being of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, as aforesaid, shall be in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum of fifty pounds now payable by us to the incumbent of the said new parish of Saint John Hale, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, and also in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum of fifty-five pounds now likewise payable by us to such last-mentioned incumbent under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-third day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

And with the consent of the Reverend Henry Richard Julius, the incumbent of the said particular district of Saint Peter, Wrecclesham, (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme), we further recommend and propose, that the annual sum to be so paid to him and his successors by the vicar for the time being of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, as aforesaid, shall be held to be in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum of ninety-two pounds now payable by us to the incumbent of the said particular district of Saint Peter, Wrecclesham, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the seventeenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four.

And with the like consent of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme), we further recommend and propose, that all that part of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, which is described in the first Schedule hereunto annexed (all which part, together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map of plan hereunto also annexed and numbered, 1) shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, be constituted and become and be a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Tilford.'

And with the consents of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and of the said John Sutton Utterton (testified as aforesaid), we further recommend and propose, that the minister of the said district of Tilford so recommended to be constituted shall be permanently endowed in manner following; that is to say, that so soon as a minister shall be appointed and duly licensed to such district, there shall be paid to him and his successors the annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds (clear of all deductions except income or property tax, if any), on the first day of December in each and every year, and that such annual sum shall be due from and paid by the vicar for the time being of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, and shall be charged upon and issuing out of the residue of the tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges arising within the said parish of Farnham and hereinbefore recommended and proposed to be vested in the said vicar and his successors, which shall remain to the said vicar after payment as aforesaid of the two several fifth parts of the net amount of the same tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges which are hereinbefore made payable by the said vicar to the incumbents of the perpetual curacy

of the said new parish of Saint John, Hale, and of the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of Saint Peter, in Ecclesham, respectively set out and defined in the said Act.

And with the like consent of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and of the said John Sutton, Utterton (testified as aforesaid), we further recommend and propose that so soon as the said district of Tilford, so recommended to be constituted as aforesaid, shall have become, according to the provisions of the herein thirdly named Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, the perpetual curate thereof shall be further permanently endowed with an annual sum of one hundred pounds clear of all deductions (except income or property tax, if any) and that such last-mentioned annual sum shall (like the said annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds) be due from and paid by the vicar for the time being of the said parish of St. Andrew, Farnham, on the first day of December in each and every year, and shall be further charged upon and issuing, as aforesaid, out of the residue of the tithes or commutation tithes rent-charges arising within the said parish of Farnham, and hereinbefore recommended and proposed to be vested in the said vicar and his successors, which shall remain as aforesaid.

And we further recommend and propose that in case of vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish, shall happen on any other day than the first day of December, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister of the perpetual curate making the vacancy or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish.

And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district of Tilford, so recommended to be constituted as aforesaid, and so soon as the same shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, then of such new parish, and of the nomination or appointment of the minister or perpetual curate thereof, shall, without any assuance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said John Sutton, Utterton, so long as he shall be and continue archdeacon of the said archdeaconry of Surrey, and that upon his avoidance of such archdeaconry, the whole right of patronage as aforesaid shall be transferred to and become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and his successors, bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

And we further recommend and propose that the whole of the tithes or commutation tithes rent-charges issuing, arising and payable out of lands and hereditaments situate within the said parish of Frensham, and heretofore belonging to the said archdeaconry of Surrey, so to be vested in us as aforesaid, and all our estate and interest therein, shall upon and from the expiration or other determination of the outstanding lease or grant of such tithes or commutation tithes rent-charges, and also without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, become and be transferred to and absolutely vested in the

incumbent for the time being of the said parish of Frensham, subject nevertheless to the provisions and conditions hereinafter contained; that is to say, provided always, and the said last-mentioned transfer is hereby recommended and proposed to be made upon the condition and understanding that when and so soon as the incumbent of the said perpetual curacy of the parish of Frensham shall come into the receipt or possession of the tithes or commutation tithes rent-charges so to be vested in him as aforesaid, he shall yearly and every year pay to the incumbent for the time being of the said particular district of Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill, aforesaid, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, clear of all deductions (except income or property tax, if any) and that such sum shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of April and the first day of October in each and every year, and that the first of such half-yearly payments or a proportionate part thereof, shall be due on the first day of April or the first day of October as the case may be, next following the expiration or other determination of the said lease or grant of the tithes or commutation tithes rent-charges lastly hereinbefore mentioned.

And we further recommend and propose that such annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, and each and every instalment thereof, shall be and be deemed to be charged upon all the tithes or commutation tithes rent-charges, so hereby recommended to be vested in the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Frensham, and that the incumbent for the time being of the said particular district of Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill, aforesaid, shall have all legal remedies for recovering and enforcing payment of the said annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds or of any part thereof that may be due and unpaid.

And we further recommend and propose that if a vacancy in the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of St. Stephen, Shotter Mill, shall happen on any other day than one of such half-yearly days of payment as last aforesaid, the annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds hereinbefore recommended to be made payable shall be duly apportioned between the incumbent making the vacancy or his representative or representatives, and the incumbent succeeding to the said particular district.

And with the consent of the Reverend Charles Candy, the present incumbent of the said particular district of Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we further recommend and propose that the said annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds to be so paid to him and his successors as aforesaid by the incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Frensham, when and so soon as the same shall become payable, shall be held to be in lieu of, and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum of twenty-six pounds now payable by us to the incumbent of the said particular district of St. Stephen, Shotter Mill, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, and also in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum of twenty pounds now likewise payable by us to the same incumbent under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-third day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

And with the like consent of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified as aforesaid), we further recommend and propose that all that portion of the said

parish of Frensham, and also all that portion of the particular district of Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill, which are described in the Second Schedule hereunto annexed (all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are respectively delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed and numbered 2), shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, be constituted and become and be a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint John, Churt.'

"And we further recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us in each and every year to the minister for the time being of the said district of Saint John, Churt, so recommended to be constituted as aforesaid, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the herein thirdly-mentioned Act, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, and that the said sum of one hundred and fifty pounds shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year, and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the licence of such minister as aforesaid, and that in case a vacancy in the ministry of such district shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount then next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister succeeding to such district; provided always, that such payment shall cease to be made by us upon and from the expiration or other determination of the outstanding lease or grant of the tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges arising within the said parish of Frensham, and recommended to be vested in the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the same parish as hereinbefore mentioned.

"And we further recommend and propose, that when and so soon as the incumbent of the said parish of Frensham shall come into the possession of the tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges so to be vested in him as aforesaid, the same shall thenceforth and for ever be charged and chargeable with and liable to the payment of a yearly sum of one hundred and fifty pounds to the minister for the time being of the said district of Saint John, Churt, so recommended to be constituted, and that such last-mentioned sum shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of April and the first day of October in each and every year, and that the first of such half-yearly payments, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be due upon the first day of April or the first day of October, as the case may be, next following the expiration or other determination of the said lease or grant of the tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges herein lastly mentioned, and that the minister of the said district of Saint John, Churt, and his successors, shall have all legal remedies for enforcing payment of the said annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, or any part thereof, that may be due and unpaid.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district of Saint John, Churt, so recommended to be constituted, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London

Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and become absolutely vested in and shall and may, from time to time, be exercised by the said John Sutton Utterton, Archdeacon of Surrey, and by his successors, Archdeacons of Surrey, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges issuing, arising, and payable out of lands, tenements, and hereditaments situate within the said parish of Seale, and heretofore belonging to the said archdeaconry of Surrey, so to be vested in us as aforesaid, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, upon and from the expiration or other determination of the outstanding lease or grant of such tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be transferred to and become and be absolutely vested in the incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Seale, subject to the provisos and conditions hereinafter mentioned.

"And we further recommend and propose, that so soon as the new church situate at Tongham, within the parish of Seale, and hereinbefore referred to, shall have been consecrated, and a consolidated chapelry or other ecclesiastical district shall have been assigned to such church under the provisions of the Church Building Acts, or some of them, there shall be paid by us out of our Common Fund, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of the said church, when duly licensed, the sum of one hundred pounds by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; provided always, that such payment shall cease to be made by us upon and from the expiration or other determination of the outstanding lease or grant of the tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges arising within the said parish of Seale, and so to be vested in the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the same parish as hereinbefore mentioned.

"And we further recommend and propose that when and so soon as the incumbent of the said parish of Seale shall come into possession of the tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges lastly hereinbefore referred to, he shall, yearly and every year, pay to the incumbent for the time being of the said church at Tongham (if the said church shall have been duly consecrated, and a consolidated chapelry or other ecclesiastical district shall have been legally assigned to it as hereinbefore mentioned), the sum of one hundred pounds clear of all deductions (except property or income tax, if any) and that such sum shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of April and the first day of October in each and every year, and that the first of such half-yearly payments, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be due on the first day of April or the first day of October, as the case may be, next following the expiration or other determination of the said lease or grant of the tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges, lastly hereinbefore mentioned.

"And we further recommend and propose, that such annual sum of one hundred pounds, and each and every instalment thereof, shall be, and be deemed to be charged upon all the tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges so to be vested in the incumbent of the said parish of Seale as aforesaid, and that the incumbent for the time being of the said church at Tongham, shall have all legal remedies for enforcing payment of the said annual sum of one hundred pounds, or any part thereof, that may be due and unpaid.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the tithes, or commutation tithe rent-charges

issuing, arising, and payable out of lands, tenements, and hereditaments situate within the said parish of Elstead, and heretofore belonging to the said Archdeaconry of Surrey, so to be vested in us as aforesaid, and all our estate and interest therein, shall upon and from the expiration of or other determination of the outstanding lease or grant of such tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Elstead.

"And we further recommend and propose that the tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges issuing, arising, and payable out of lands, tenements, and hereditaments situate within the said parish of Bentley, and heretofore belonging to the said Archdeaconry of Surrey, so to be vested in us as aforesaid, and all our estate and interest therein, shall upon and from the expiration or other determination of the outstanding lease or grant of such tithes or commutation tithe rent-charges, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, become and be transferred to and absolutely vested in the incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Bentley.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The First Schedule to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Tilford, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester, which is situate generally to the south of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish from the parish of Seal, in the same county and diocese, at a point near Crooksbury Hill, in the middle of the road leading from Runfold to Waverley Mill; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the same road, to its junction near Waverley Mill with the road leading past Waverley House to Farnham; and extending thence north-westward, along the middle of the last described road, to its junction near Waverley North Lodge with Sandy Lane; and extending thence south-westward, along the middle of the last-named lane, to its junction with the road leading from Farnham to Tilford; and continuing thence still south-westward, across the last-described road, to a point in the middle of the north-eastern end of the New Road leading over Lodge Hill to Short Heath and Wrecclesham; and continuing thence still south-westward, along the middle of the last described road, to its junction at Fox Hill with the road leading from Farnham to Frensham; and extending thence southward, for a distance of one hundred and twenty-five yards or thereabouts, along the middle of the last described road, to the boundary which divides the said parish of Farnham from the parish of Frensham, in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"All those several portions of the parish of Frensham, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester, and of the particular district of Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill, sometime part of the said parish, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Frensham from the parish of Headley, in the county of Southampton, and in the said diocese of Winchester, at a point on the southern margin of Frensham Great Pond; and extending thence in a direction mainly southward along the said parish boundary, which is also the county boundary, to its junction with the boundary dividing the said particular district of Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill, from the parish of Headley aforesaid; and continuing thence, first generally southward and then south-eastward, along the last described boundary, continuing thereby to follow the said county boundary, and passing Whitmoor Farm as far as a point in the middle of the cross road leading from Headley to the London and Portsmouth turnpike road; and extending thence eastward, along the middle of such cross road, to its junction with the said turnpike road; and extending thence first north-eastward and then eastward, along the middle of the same turnpike road as far as its intersection by the boundary dividing the said particular district of Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill, from the parish of Thursley, in the county of Surrey and diocese of Winchester aforesaid; and extending thence northward, along the last described boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said particular district of Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill, from the parish of Elstead, in the last-named county and diocese; and continuing thence still northward, along the last described boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Frensham from the parish of Elstead aforesaid; and extending thence in a direction generally northward, along the last described boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Frensham from the parish of Farnham, in the same county and diocese; and extending thence north-westward, along the last described boundary, to the point where it is met by the northern boundary of the tithing of Churt, in the said parish of Frensham; and extending thence first south-westward and then north-westward, along the said tithing boundary to its junction with the boundary which divides the said parish of Frensham from the parish of Headley aforesaid, at the first described point on the southern margin of Frensham Great Pond, where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has been, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore, thirdly mentioned Act, transmitted to the patron, and to the vicar of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Andrew, Farnham (out of which it is proposed that "The District of Tilford," recommended in the said scheme to be constituted shall be taken) and the said patron and vicar (being one and the same person) has signified his assent to the said scheme.

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has been, in accordance with the provisions of the said lastly-mentioned Act, also transmitted to the patrons of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Frensham, and to the patron and incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said par-

ticular district of Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill (out of which said parish and particular district, it is proposed that "The District of Saint John, Churt," recommended in the said scheme to be constituted shall be taken).

And whereas one calendar month has elapsed since such draft was so transmitted to the said patrons of the parish of Frensham, and no objections have been made by any of them to the said scheme.

And whereas the patron and also the incumbent of the said particular district of Saint Stephen, Shotter Mill, have signified their assent to the said scheme.

And whereas a writ of sequestration has been issued, whereby the temporalities of the said perpetual curacy of the parish of Frensham aforesaid have been sequestered into the hand of John Burder, No. 27, Parliament-street, in the City of Westminster, Esquire, the sequestrator in the same writ named and appointed.

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has been in accordance with the provisions of the said lastly mentioned Act, and of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four, transmitted to the said John Burder, as such sequestrator as aforesaid, and he, as such sequestrator, has signified his assent to the same scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

"All that portion of the new parish of Saint Matthias, Bethnal Green, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, which is situate to the north of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides such new parish from the new parish of Saint Philip, Bethnal Green, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of Church-street, opposite to the middle of the southern end of Tyssen-street; and extending thence north-eastward, along the middle of Church-street aforesaid, as far as a point on the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Matthias, Bethnal Green, from the parish of Saint Matthew, Bethnal Green, in the county and diocese aforesaid, opposite to the middle of the southern end of the street or lane called Gate-wells, Hents.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled “An Act to prevent until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then next session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infec-

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"tious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has since been from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act; and that all persons offending against the same shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, or such smaller sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty's Privy Council may in any case by such Order direct:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder has lately appeared, and now prevails among cattle within that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, which is generally designated as the "cattle plague:"

And whereas it was expedient to take measures for preventing such disorder from extending to that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland; and whereas for such purpose, Orders were duly made in pursuance of the authority of the said Acts, by the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 25th of August, 1865, and the 7th and 29th of September, 1865:

And whereas by the Order, dated the 7th day of September, 1865, the removal to any port or place in that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland, from any port or place in that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, of any skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, was prohibited:

And whereas by an Order dated the 13th day of September, 1865, all hides and skins brought into Great Britain, from India, South America, and Australia, and afterwards removed from Great Britain to Ireland, were excepted from the operation of the said Order of the 7th day of September, 1865:

And whereas it has been represented to the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, that horns are imported into Ireland from India, South America, and Australia, which countries are at present free from the disease designated as the "cattle plague:"
