THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Lords Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council, relating to the "cattle plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of the 18th section of their Lordships' Order of the 23rd November, 1865 :—

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

*The Petty Sessional Division of Barton-on-Humber, in the parts of Lindsey.*

NOTICE is hereby given, that in pursuance and in exercise of the power given to us, the undersigned Justices of the Peace, acting in and for the Petty Sessional Division of Barton-on-Humber, in the said parts and county, and in pursuance of the several Acts of Parliament passed for the prevention of the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals, and particularly by a certain Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November last, with a view to prevent the spreading of the contagious or infectious disorder which now prevails among the cattle of Great Britain, and which is generally designated the "cattle plague." We do hereby declare, that it is expedient that no pigs shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said Petty Sessional Division of Barton-on-Humber, comprising the several parishes following, that is to say, Barton-on-Humber Saint Peter, Barton-on-Humber Saint Mary, Barrow-on-Humber, Bonby, Elsham, Goxhill, Horkstow, Saxby, South Ferriby, Thornton, otherwise Thornton Curtis, Ulceby, Wootton, and Worlaby, between this day and Thursday, the 1st day of March, 1866.

Any person offending against the said Order in Council, after the due publication of this notice, will be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, a moiety of which will be payable to any informer on conviction and recovery thereof, under the said Acts or Order.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

I, JOHN BLACKIE, Jun., Lord Provost of the city of Glasgow, in virtue of the powers vested in me as local authority, under the Orders issued by Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, do hereby give notice that from and after the date hereof, and up to the 1st of March next, it is expedient that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine shall be permitted to enter the city of Glasgow from any other part of Great Britain, except for the purpose of being sent to the Glasgow Cattle Market.

Further, I, as local authority foresaid, do hereby give notice, that from and after the date hereof, and up to the 1st of March next, it is expedient that no such animal shall be allowed to enter the Glasgow Cattle Market, except for the purpose of slaughter, and subject to the following conditions, viz. :—

First. That every animal on entering the market shall be marked in such way as the officers of the market may from time to time direct.

Second. No animal shall leave the market unless to go or be taken to one or other of the slaughter-houses, provided by the Market Commissioners, to be there forthwith slaughtered.

Third. Every cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be inspected by the Inspectors appointed for the purpose, after being slaughtered, and shall not be allowed to pass out of the slaughter-houses for consumption until such examination has taken place.

Arrangements have been made with the Market Commissioners for affording every possible facility for the slaughtering and inspection of animals.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Suffolk to wit.*

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, begun and held at Ipswich, in and for the Eastern Division of the said county of Suffolk, on Thursday, the 4th day of January, in the year of our Lord 1866, before Chas. Austin, Esquire, Chairman, John Kerrich, Esquire, Peter Robert Burrell, Esquire, and others their companions, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace within the said county; and also to hear and determine di-

vers felonies, trespasses, and other misdeeds, in the said county done and committed.

At this Court Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Suffolk, assembled at the above-named Sessions, in exercise of the power given to them by an Order of the Lords of the Privy Council, dated the 16th day of December, 1865, do by this notice, intended to be published as by the said Order required, declare that the following Order be made, videlicet:—

*Cattle Plague Resolutions for the Eastern Division of the county of Suffolk.*

1st. That, subject to the provisions of the Order in Council, no stock be permitted to enter the Eastern Division of the county, without the order of two Magistrates at Petty Sessions within the union to which they are imported.

2nd. That in any union in which the Justices acting in any Petty Sessions therein shall certify that no Cattle Plague has appeared for one calendar month then last past, and which union shall, by notice published in one or more of the county papers be declared free from Cattle Plague, cattle shall be allowed to circulate, but that no stock be brought into or sent out of such union without the Order of two such Justices as aforesaid.

3rd. That in any union which has not been certified as free from Cattle Plague as aforesaid, no stock be permitted to be removed upon a public road from any occupation without the Order of two Justices at Petty Sessions.

4th. That all fairs, markets, and repository sales for the sale of stock be prohibited.

5th. That stock be permitted under the Order of two Justices at Petty Sessions, to be taken to any place for immediate slaughter (that is to say, not exceeding three days), but that no stock be allowed to return alive from such place. And further, that no restriction in this rule shall be held to apply to any union which shall have been certified under the second rule.

6th. That no stock be permitted to enter any union from any other union within the county, without the Order of two Justices at Petty Sessions, acting in the union from which such stock is sent.

7th. That no offal or hides be removed in any infected union without the Order of two Justices at Petty Sessions.

8th. That no cattle shall, under any circumstances, be driven upon any highway or public road between the hours of six o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the morning.

9th. That every person driving any cattle along any highway or public road shall, if required to do so, show his license to any Justice of the Peace or police officer in uniform.

10th. That for the purposes of breeding, cows and swine may be sent off the premises of the owner to a bull or boar, provided that before so sending, the owner of the animals so sent shall procure from the guardian of his parish a certificate stating that the animals on the sender's premises are free from disease, and before bringing them home again a similar certificate from the guardian of the parish into which they have been sent, certifying that the cattle among which they have been are also free from disease.

11th. That the word stock include all cattle sheep, swine, and goats.

12th. That these resolutions be in force until the 1st day of March.

13th. That the Mayors of boroughs be invited to co-operate and maintain uniformity of action throughout the county.

And it is further ordered—

That the licence for removal of any cattle and stock within the said Eastern Division of the said county shall specify the description and number of cattle to which such licence refers, the term for which it is valid, from where, and to where cattle are to be removed, the name of the sender, and to whom consigned, and shall after every such removal be delivered to the guardian of the parish into which such cattle are sent if it is a rural parish, to a police officer, or clerk of the market if it be a town.

And the said Justices, so assembled as aforesaid, do hereby revoke all notices at any time heretofore published by any previous local authority within the said Eastern Division of the said county, except as to any liabilities which may have been incurred, or any legal proceedings which may have been taken under any of the said notices.

Every person offending against this notice or the said Order in Council, is liable to a penalty of £20, to be recovered summarily before the Justices acting for the Petty Sessional Division within which the offence is committed.

**CATTLE PLAGUE.**

*Borough of Louth.*

By virtue of the power vested in me by an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, made in pursuance of several Acts of Parliament in such Order mentioned, I, Samuel Trought, Mayor of the borough of Louth, in the county of Lincoln, with a view to prevent the spreading of the "cattle plague," do hereby declare and give notice that it is expedient, and I do order and direct, that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or pig, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into the said borough from the 13th day of January instant until the 1st day of March next, both inclusive, unless the party desiring to effect such removal shall previously obtain for that purpose the written license of the inspector for the time being of the district from which such animal is to be removed, countersigned by a Justice of the Peace for the said borough of Louth: Provided that such licence shall only remain in force during the day on which it is dated: Provided also that nothing herein contained will make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animals by railway through the said borough.

And I do hereby give notice, that any person offending against the said Order in Council will be liable to a penalty of not exceeding £20.

**CATTLE PLAGUE.**

*County of Carnarvon.*

By virtue and in pursuance of an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 16th day of December, 1865, made in pursuance of the several Acts of Parliament therein mentioned, we, Her Majesty's

Justices of the Peace for the county of Carnarvon, assembled at the Hilary Quarter Sessions held at Carnarvon, in and for the said county, on Thursday, the 4th day of January, 1866, do now by this notice order and declare, that it is expedient that until the 1st day of March next no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, or swine, or any hides, skins, horns, or hoofs of any such animals shall be removed or taken from any part or parts of the county of Carnarvon lying to the east of the River Conway into any other part or parts of the same county for any purpose, or under any conditions whatever. And further, that until such 1st day of March next no such animal or article as before defined shall be removed or taken to any market or fair within any part of the said county for the purpose of exhibition or sale, and that no such animals or articles as before defined shall be brought into the said county, or any part thereof, from any place or places whatsoever (except that cattle, sheep, and pigs, for immediate slaughter may be brought into the said county from any part of the county of Anglesey), except the parish of Holyhead.

Provided that it shall not be unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animals by railway without stoppage through our said county.

Every person offending against the above Order is liable to a penalty of not exceeding £20.

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Cambridgeshire to wit.*

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace holden at the County Courts in and for the county of Cambridge, on Thursday, the 4th day of January, in the year of our Lord 1866, before Thomas St. Quintin, Esquire, Chairman, and the Right Honourable Charles Philip, Earl of Hardwicke, William Parker Hamond, and Edward Hicks, Esquires, and others their companions, Justices of our Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace within the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdeeds in the said county done and committed.

By virtue of the powers given to Courts of Quarter Sessions by the Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 16th day of December last, this Court doth hereby declare that, with the view of preventing the spread of the Cattle Plague, it is expedient, and doth hereby order that, from and after the 8th day of January, 1866, until the 1st day of March next, no cow, bull, bullock, or calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine shall be brought to any market or fair within this county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, and that no cow, bull, bullock, or calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, shall be allowed to travel along the highways within this county, without a permit in writing, signed by two Justices of the Peace (except in cases of occupiers removing their cattle from one part of their farm to another, within a distance of two miles, and in cases of cows going to the bull or sows to the boar), such permit to be produced for inspection on demand; and no such removal shall take place between the hours of sun-set and sun-rise, nor unless such stock shall have been on the premises from which they are removed for a period of twenty-eight days previously.

And this Court doth hereby give notice that all persons offending against the provisions of the

above Order, shall, for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding £20.

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Breconshire Epiphany Quarter Sessions, 1866.*

In pursuance of the Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, and the 16th day of December, 1865, with reference to the contagious and infectious disorder now prevailing among cattle, it is deemed expedient by the magistrates assembled at the Epiphany General Quarter Sessions of the county of Brecon, in 1866, to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, to any market or fair or to any place whatever within the county of Brecon, for the purpose of exhibition or sale until the 1st day of March next.

And it is further ordered by the court that it shall not be lawful for any person from the date of this Notice, until the said 1st day of March next, to bring or send any such animal as aforesaid, from any other place in Great Britain, into any place within the county of Brecon.

Every person offending herein will for every such offence, forfeit a sum not exceeding £20.

Provided always that nothing contained in these Orders shall be held to prohibit any person from bringing or sending to any butcher within this jurisdiction, any fat stock, bona fide purchased within the county of Brecon by such butcher, provided such fat stock shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours of such bringing or sending.

At the General Quarter Session of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden at Petworth, in and for the county of Sussex, on Thursday, the 4th day of January, in the 29th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord 1866, before John Morgan Cobbett, Esquire, the Honorable John Jervis Carnegie, and other their fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace in the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other ill deeds done and committed in the county aforesaid.

This Court doth declare, in pursuance of the Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council of the 16th day of December, 1865, that it is expedient that henceforth until the 1st day of March now next coming, no person shall drive or conduct any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf to or from the parish of Slindon, in the county of Sussex, or drive or conduct any such animal through or by way of such parish, unless the person so removing, driving, or conducting such animal shall have first obtained a certificate, in writing, signed by two or more Justices of the said county, that such removal, driving, or conducting may take place without danger of spreading the cattle disease.

That this Order be published in the West Sussex Gazette, Sussex Advertiser, and Sussex

Express newspapers, and that a copy be sent to the Clerk of Her Majesty's Privy Council, to be published by him in the London Gazette.

And notice is hereby given, that every person offending against this Order is liable to a penalty for every such offence not exceeding £20.

That it is expedient that, from and after the 16th day of January instant, until the 1st day of March now next coming, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall, except in accordance with the proviso contained in the 18th section of the said Order of Council of the 23rd day of November, 1865, be brought from any part of Great Britain without the Western Division of the county of Sussex into any place within the Western Division of the said county, or so much of such division as is within the jurisdiction of the Justices of the said county in Quarter Sessions.

2. That this Order be published in the West Sussex Gazette, Sussex Advertiser, and Sussex Express newspapers, and that a copy be sent to the Clerk of Her Majesty's Privy Council, to be published by him in the London Gazette.

3. And notice is hereby given, that every person offending against this Order is liable to a penalty, for every such offence, not exceeding twenty pounds.

In pursuance of the powers vested in the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled, by two

Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, and the 16th of December, 1865, this Court doth hereby order and declare,

1. That all Orders made and notices given by any local authority in the said county, under the said Orders previous to the 2nd of January instant, be revoked.

2. That in case of farm sales, or change of tenants, a certificate of two Justices acting on the Cattle Plague Committee shall be sufficient authority for the removal of any cattle so sold or moved, and shall exempt the parties moving such cattle from any penalty under the Orders of Council.

3. That no animals, as described in the said Orders, be removed from one parish to another between the hours of 6 p.m. and 6 a.m., until the 1st of March next.

### THE CATTLE PLAGUE.

*County of Flint.*

NOTICE is hereby given, that Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace acting in and for the county of Flint, assembled in General Quarter Sessions at the County-hall, in Mold, in the said county, on Wednesday, the 3rd day of January, 1866, did order, declare, and direct as follows:—

1. That all notices given by any local authority in the said county, under and by virtue of an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, or the Orders thereby revoked, shall be revoked from and after the 6th day of January instant, but that all appointments of Inspectors made by such local authority shall remain valid and effectual.

2. That with a view to prevent the spreading of the contagious or infectious disorder designated the "Cattle Plague," it is expedient from the 6th day of January instant, until the 1st day of March next, to prevent the removal of sheep, lambs, goats, or swine, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except under the conditions following; that is to say:—the owner of such animals shall, previous to removal, make a solemn declaration before a Justice of the Peace, that the said animals have been in his or her possession for at least twenty-one days next preceding the day upon which such declaration is made, and that no animals of any description

whatever have at any time been suffering from the cattle plague on lands or premises in his or her occupation; and that, thereupon, the said owner shall receive from such Justice a license in writing to remove the said first-mentioned animals to some place to be named in such license, which license shall remain in force for a period of three days, inclusive of the day on which it is issued.

3. That with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, it is expedient that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, or, or calf, shall, from the 6th day of January instant, until the 1st day of March next, be removed by driving from place to place along any turnpike-road, highway; or any other road or way not being a private road or way, within the said county of Flint, but subject nevertheless to the provisions of the existing Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council relating to the cattle plague, dated respectively, the 23rd day of November, 1865, and the 16th day of December, 1865.

4. That this notice shall not affect the borough of Flint.

any Justice of the Peace acting in and for the division from whence the animals are intended to be removed.

aforesaid, until the 1st day of March next, no sheep, lamb, or swine, shall be removed to any market or fair, or to any place whatever, within the county of Denbigh, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except the owner thereof shall, previous to removal, obtain a license of removal from a Justice upon proving, by a declaration, that the animal has been in his or her possession for at least twenty-one days previous to his or her application, and that no animals have been suffering from the cattle plague on land in his or her occupation at any time; such license to have effect for a period of three days, inclusive of the day on which it is issued.

riding in General or Quarter Sessions assembled, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except under the conditions hereinafter imposed. And the said Justices of the Peace of the said riding so assembled as aforesaid, do by this notice declare that (with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder) it is expedient that between the 8th day of January, 1866, and the 1st day of March, 1866, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat or swine, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place in the said West Riding, within the jurisdiction of the Justices of the Peace for the said riding in General or Quarter Sessions assembled. And the said Justices do accordingly declare and give notice, that it shall not, between the dates aforesaid, be lawful for any person to bring any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat or swine from any other part of Great Britain, into any place in the said West Riding within the jurisdiction of the Justices of the Peace for the said riding in General or Quarter Sessions assembled as aforesaid.

And the said Justices do by this notice further declare that (with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder) it is expedient that between the 8th day of January, 1866, and the 1st day of March, 1866, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall, except under the conditions hereinafter imposed, be removed from place to place in the said riding within the jurisdiction aforesaid. And the said Justices do accordingly declare and hereby give notice, that it shall not be lawful between the dates aforesaid, for any person to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, from place to place in the said riding, within the jurisdiction aforesaid, except for the purpose of slaughter, and with the license of a Justice of the Peace as hereinafter mentioned, and every such animal shall be immediately marked by the hair being clipped off the end of the tail by the vendor, and shall on no account be allowed to leave the premises of the purchaser alive. Such lean and store animals are also excepted as a Justice of the Peace acting in and



for the said riding shall permit to be removed by a license in writing, under his hand, dated at the time of issue, specifying the number and description of animals to be removed, and the place from which and to which the same are to be removed, and the time during which such license shall remain in force, and such license shall be lodged by the person using the same with some West Riding Police Constable, or at the West Riding Police Station nearest the place to which such animals shall be removed, within twelve hours after the expiration of the time for which the license was granted; but no such license shall be issued unless the animals to be removed shall have been at least twenty-one days in the possession of the applicant. Such last-named lean and store animals are not hereby required to be slaughtered. Nothing in this clause shall authorise the removal of any animal between an hour after sunset and an hour before sunrise. No hoofs or hides shall be removed from the place where any animal is slaughtered without first being disinfected.

Any person may, notwithstanding the foregoing regulations, send or carry any of the above-named animals by railway through or out of the said riding within the jurisdiction aforesaid.

And the said Justices do by this notice further declare that (with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder) it is expedient that between the 8th day of January, 1866, and the 1st day of March, 1866, it shall not be lawful for any person to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat or swine alive from any premises upon which the said disorder exists, or has existed within a period of twenty-eight days, upon any ground or pretext whatever, until a certificate has been granted by the inspector acting for the division or township in which such premises are situate that the said disorder no longer exists upon the said premises, and that no case has occurred there within twenty-eight days next preceding the date of such certificate.

I, CHARLES FREDERICK LOGGIN, Esquire, Mayor of the borough of Stratford-upon-Avon, in the county of Warwick, hereby declare:—

1. That from the date hereof until the 1st day of March next it shall not be lawful to send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (hereafter in these Orders called "animal") to any market or fair, exhibition, auction, or sale within my jurisdiction.

2. That until the said 1st day of March next the introduction of any such animal as aforesaid into any place within my jurisdiction from parts beyond the same be strictly prohibited, except under the provisoes in the 18th clause of the Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council of 23rd November, 1865.

3. That (except for the purpose of immediate slaughter) no such animal shall be brought into any place or moved along any turnpike road, street, or highway within my jurisdiction without a licence to be granted by me to the owner thereof, permitting the bringing or moving in the day-time only within one month from the date thereof any animal being his own property from any land to other land both in his own occupation; which said licence will be granted only on the certificate of an Inspector of Cattle appointed by the local authority, within whose jurisdiction the said animal shall have been for one month at least before the signing thereof, to the effect that such animal and the land and other premises whereon or wherein the same has been kept during such period of one month, has been and is free from the disease called the "cattle plague;" a full description of the said animal and of the road or roads, street or streets, highway or highways within my jurisdiction along which it is intended to move or bring such animal, shall be inserted in the said licence. Provided always that should the cattle plague be proved before me to have appeared among the stock of such owner or within one mile of his land or premises, then the said licence shall cease and determine, notice in that behalf being given to such owner and to the police.

4. That the removal of fat stock within my jurisdiction be permitted during the day-time only on the application of the buyer thereof for a licence to remove any animal into my said jurisdiction; which licence shall specify a mark to be made on the animal before it shall be removed for the purpose named in the said licence; and which application shall be accompanied by a declaration signed by such buyer in my presence that the said animal shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours of the time specified for the removal thereof into my said jurisdiction, and a declaration to be signed in my presence by the seller of such animal to the effect that there has been no cattle plague on his land or any of his premises whereon or wherein such said animal has been kept for one month past. The person in whose possession any such animal is found subsequent to the forty-eight hours specified in the buyer's declaration shall be held to be the owner thereof.

5. Nothing herein contained shall interfere with the power of the Inspector appointed for the said borough to forbid the removal of any animal.

6. The police officers within the said borough are required to keep a strict look-out upon all turnpike roads, streets, and highways therein, and whenever they shall discover any animal being upon, or being driven along any road, street, or highway without any such licence as aforesaid, they are to give immediate information to the

Magistrates' Clerk of such said borough at his office.

7. Any person offending against these Orders will be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds; one-half whereof will be paid to the informer, pursuant to Statute 11 and 12 Vict., cap. 107, sec. 13.

And the said Justices further declare and order as follows:—That all notices now in force in and for any Petty Sessional Division within the said jurisdiction in the said hundreds, under the powers given by any Order in Council, be and the same are hereby revoked.

¶ And the said Justices do hereby further declare that it shall not be lawful, after the due publication of this notice, and until the 1st day of March next, for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, from any part of Great Britain, beyond the said jurisdiction, into any place within the said jurisdiction, except only as provided by the said Orders in Council.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said jurisdiction, in the said hundreds of Amounderness, Blackburn, or Leyland, in the said county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except under the conditions hereinafter specified.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove any skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or offal to or from any place within the said jurisdiction, except the skins and hides of healthy and unsuspected animals sent direct to a tanner's. Notice to be given, by post or otherwise, twenty-four hours at least before any such removal, to the Superintendent of the Police District in which the said premises shall be situate.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove any such animal or animals from any Petty Ses-

sional Division to any other Petty Sessional Division within the said jurisdiction, in the said hundreds, except as hereinafter provided.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove any of the said animals along any turnpike road or other highway, without the license in writing of two Justices, except from one part of any farm to another part of the same farm, or except in the case of any cow taken to the bull, nor between the hours of six o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the following morning.

And it is hereby declared, that the conditions on which any such animal may be removed to or from any place within the said hundreds, shall be as follows, viz. :

1. Any animal may be sold by the owner thereof that shall have been on his land or premises not less than fourteen days previous to the sale thereof, and that shall be certified by some Veterinary-Surgeon, or other competent person or persons, appointed for that purpose by the Justices in Petty Sessions assembled, to be free from the said disorder, and to be on premises free from all suspicion of the said disorder, except by license of a duly appointed Inspector.
2. Any fat cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf may be removed within the limits of each Petty Sessional Division, provided it be certified as aforesaid, and be taken direct to some place within the said Petty Sessional Division and sold for immediate slaughter, or be forthwith forwarded direct to some accustomed market or fair for the sale of fat cattle, or to some slaughter house beyond the jurisdiction of the said Justices, but subject to such regulations as may be in force with reference thereto.

Provided that every such certificate shall be granted not more than four days before the removal of such animal, and shall (together with the licence of the said Justices, whenever required) accompany the animal or animals so removed, and a duplicate thereof shall be delivered to the Superintendent or Superintendents of Police, or one of them, for the district in which the land or premises are situate, two days at least before the animal to which it relates shall be removed from the owner's premises.

Every person offending against this Order, or in whose possession or custody any such animal shall be found, by means of which this notice shall be contravened, will be liable, for each offence, to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

And the said Justices further declare and order as follows:—That all notices now in force in and for any Petty Sessional Division within the said jurisdiction in the said hundred, under the powers given by any Order in Council, be and the same are hereby revoked, such revocation to take effect on and after the 13th day of January instant: save and except so far as relates to the appointment of any Inspector or Inspectors made under any former Order or Orders.

And the said Justices do hereby further declare that it shall not be lawful, after Saturday, the 13th day of January instant, and until the 1st day of March next, for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf from any part of Great Britain, beyond the said jurisdiction, into any place within the said jurisdiction, except only as provided by the said Orders in Council.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said jurisdiction, in the said hundred of Salford, in the said county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except under the conditions hereinafter specified.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove, or cause to be removed, any skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or offal to or from any place within the said jurisdiction, except the skins and hides of healthy and unsuspected animals sent direct to a tanner's; notice to be given, by post or otherwise, twenty-four hours at least before any such removal, to the Superintendent of the Police District in which the said premises shall be situate.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove or cause to be removed, any such animal or animals from any Petty Sessional Division to any other Petty Sessional Division within the said jurisdiction in the said hundred, except as hereinafter provided.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove, or cause to be removed, any of the said animals along any turnpike road or other highway for general traffic, without the license in writing of a Justice of the Peace for the county of Lancaster, except from one part of any farm to another part of the same farm, or except in the case of any cow taken to the bull, nor between the hours of six o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the following morning.

And it is hereby declared, that the conditions on which any such animal may be removed to or

from any place within the said hundred, shall be as follows, viz. :—

1. Any person may sell on his own land or premises any animal belonging to him, which has been on such land or premises for not less than fourteen days previous to such sale, and which shall be certified by some Veterinary Surgeon, or other competent person appointed for that purpose by the Justices in Petty Sessions assembled, to be free from the disorder called the cattle plague, and to be on premises free from all suspicion of the said disorder. The license of a duly appointed Cattle Plague Inspector will also authorise such sale.
  2. Any fat cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf may be removed within the limits of each Petty Sessional Division, provided it be certified as aforesaid, and be taken direct to some place within the said Petty Sessional Division and sold for immediate slaughter, or be forthwith forwarded direct to some accustomed market or fair for the sale of fat cattle, or to some slaughter-house beyond the jurisdiction of the said Justices, but subject to such regulations as may be in force with reference thereto. Provided that every certificate shall state the place to which such animal is to be removed, and shall (together with the license of the said Justices, whenever required) accompany the animal or animals so removed; and provided that such animal continue free from disease up to the time of removal.
- A duplicate of such certificate shall in every case be delivered or sent by post forthwith to the Superintendent of Police for the division in which the land or premises are situate, and no certificate shall be in force for any longer period than four days from the date thereof.

Every person offending against these orders and notices, or in whose possession or custody any animal shall be found in contravention thereof, will be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding £20.

ORDERS made at the Adjourned General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, holden at Northallerton, in and for the said Riding, on Thursday, the 4th day of January, in the 29th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, before the Right Honourable Alan Earl Cathcart, Chairman; the Right Honourable William Henry Lord Bolton; the Right Honourable Charles John Lord Teignmouth; the Honourable Charles John Shore; the Honourable William Ernest Duncombe, M.P.; Sir George Orby Wombwell, Baronet; Mark Milbank, Joshua Samuel Crompton, William Rutson, and James Pulleine, Esqs.; Edward Cust, Clerk; Richard Machell Jaques, John Bartholomew Rudd, and Roper Stote Donnison Rowe Roper, Esqs., James Hill, William Fitzwilliam Wharton, and Thomas Warren Mercer, Clerks; Charles Christopher Oxley, John Richard Westgarth Hildyard, James

Stovin Pennyman, John Wind Coates, Henry Rutson, Henry Hood, John Hodgson, Robert Akenhead, and Isaac Hartas, Esqs., Justices of the Peace for the said Riding then and there assembled.

This Court having considered the resolutions of the Court held on the 2nd instant, and the several Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November last and the 16th day of December last, and also the recommendations now made by the Police Committee, with the view to prevent the spreading of the Cattle Plague.

It was declared and resolved, that all notices given and other acts done by the Justices acting in and for any Petty Sessional Division within the said Riding, under and by virtue of the said Order of the 23rd day of November last, or any of the Orders thereby revoked, be, and the same are hereby revoked and rescinded, except so far as the appointment of any inspector or inspectors under any of the said Orders; and also, except so far as may affect any proceedings already commenced, or to be hereafter commenced, for or by reason of any offence against the said Orders, committed previous to this day.

And it was also declared and resolved, that it would be expedient, until the 1st day of March next, absolutely to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the North Riding, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

And it was further declared and resolved, that it would be expedient, until the 1st day of March next, to prohibit any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine from being brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the North Riding, subject nevertheless to the proviso contained in the 18th clause of the Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council of the 23rd day of November last.

And it was further declared and resolved, That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be removed from any part of the said Riding to any other part of the said Riding, or from any place or places within the said Riding to any other place or places within the said Riding, or from place to place generally within the said Riding, subject nevertheless to the proviso contained in the 4th clause of the Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council of the 16th day of December last, and also subject to the following proviso, that is to say, provided always that two Justices, in Petty Sessions assembled, may grant (subject to being revoked at any time at the pleasure of any two Justices) a licence in writing to any person occupying lands in one part of the said Riding, to remove any such animal as aforesaid, between sunrise and sunset, from such lands to any other lands in his own occupation within one mile, for such purposes as shall be proved to their satisfaction to be absolutely necessary, or to convey any cow or heifer to a bull within that distance; but such licence shall specify the number and description of animals to be removed, and the places from which and to which the same shall be removed, and the time during which such licence shall remain in force; but no such licence shall be issued unless the animal to be moved shall have been at least forty days in the possession of the applicant, nor shall any such animal be removed from any premises where the said disorder exists, or has existed within the period of forty days, upon any ground or pretext whatever.

Ordered, That the Clerk of the Peace be instructed to give the utmost publicity throughout

the Riding to the beforegoing resolutions: and also to publish the requisite notices under the Orders in Council, warning all persons of the penalties which will be incurred for any offence against the said Orders and these resolutions.

Ordered, That the Clerk of the Peace do forthwith forward copies of these resolutions to the Lord Mayor of York, and to the mayors of the other boroughs in the Riding, with the view of promoting uniformity of action within those boroughs.

Ordered, That the Clerk of the Peace do apply to the Home Secretary, requesting to be informed out of what funds the necessary expenses of carrying out these resolutions are to be paid.

Ordered, That all future reports of each inspector in the riding be made weekly to the clerk of the petty sessional division, and that copies thereof be made by the latter and be forwarded without delay to the Clerk of the Peace.

Ordered, That the Chief Constable be instructed to look to the due execution of these Orders and resolutions, and give the utmost effect thereto.

Ordered, That the Clerk of the Peace, together with the Chief Constable, do arrange all statistics of the disease forwarded to them, and prepare weekly returns for the information of the court, and of the police committee.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Court be given to the police committee for the trouble which they have taken in this matter.

Resolved, That in the opinion of this Court it is desirable that the provisions of the Order in Council of the 16th of December last, should be extended to goats, sheep, and swine, and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded by the Chairman to the Home Secretary.

Resolved, That this Court be now adjourned to Wednesday, the 24th day of January instant, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon.

#### INCOME TAX.

ing, according to the regulations of the said Act of the 5th and 6th years of Her Majesty, such number of fit and proper persons to be Commissioners for general purposes for the said district of Castle Ward, and of persons to supply vacancies amongst such Commissioners, as may be sufficient to increase the number of such Commissioners to any number not exceeding fourteen, and of persons to supply vacancies amongst such Commissioners to any number not exceeding fourteen.
