

subject to such regulations as may be in force with reference thereto. Provided that every certificate shall state the place to which such animal is to be removed, and shall (together with the licence of the said Justice, whenever required) accompany the animal or animals so removed, and provided that such animal continues free from disease up to the time of removal.

A duplicate of such certificate shall in every case be delivered, or sent by post forthwith, to the Superintendent of Police for the Division in which the land or premises are situate; and no certificate shall be in force for any longer period than four days from the date thereof.

Every person offending against these Orders and notices, or in whose possession or custody any animal shall be found in contravention thereof, will be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding £20.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Clitheroe, in the county of Lancaster.

I, ROBERT DEWHURST, Esquire, Mayor of the said borough, by the authority of certain Orders made by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, and the 16th day of December, 1865, and of all other powers and authorities enabling me in this behalf, do hereby revoke all notices now in force in and for the said borough, made under the powers given by any Order in Council respecting the disorder called the Cattle Plague, and I do hereby declare that it is expedient with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder called the Cattle Plague, that from and after the publication of this notice, and until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine shall be brought or sent from any part of Great Britain into any place within the said borough (except as provided by the said Orders in Council), and to prevent the removal of any such animal to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said borough for the purpose of exhibition or sale, and from place to place therein, except as provided by the said Orders in Council, and under certain conditions.

And I do hereby further declare that it shall not be lawful after the publication of this notice and until the 1st day of March next, for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine from any part of Great Britain beyond the said borough, into any place within the said borough, except only as provided by the said Orders in Council.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said borough for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except under the conditions hereinafter specified.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove any skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or offal, to or from any place within the said borough, except the skins and hides of healthy and unsuspected animals sent direct to a tanner. Notice to be given by post or otherwise twenty-four hours at least before any such removal to the Superintendent of Police stationed in the said borough.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove any of the said animals along any turnpike road, or other highway within the said borough without

my licence in writing, except from one part of any farm to another part of the same farm, or except in the case of any cow taken to the bull, nor between the hours of six o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the following morning.

And I do hereby declare that the conditions on which any such animal may be removed to or from any place within the said borough shall be as follows, namely—

1. Any animal may be sold by the owner thereof that shall have been on his land or premises not less than fourteen days previous to the sale thereof, and that shall be certified by the inspector of the said borough or other competent person or persons appointed by me for that purpose, to be free from the said disorder, and to be on premises free from all suspicion of the said disorder, except by licence of a duly appointed inspector.
2. Any fat cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine may be removed within the limits of the said borough provided it be certified as aforesaid, and be taken direct to some place within the said borough, and sold for immediate slaughter, or be forthwith forwarded direct to some slaughter-house beyond the said borough, but subject to such regulations as may be in force with reference thereto.

Provided that every such certificate shall be granted not more than four days before the removal of such animal, and shall (together with my licence whenever required) accompany the animal or animals so removed, and a duplicate thereof shall be delivered to the Superintendent of Police stationed in the said borough, two days at least before the animal to which it relates shall be removed from the owner's premises.

Every person offending against this Order, or in whose possession or custody any such animal shall be found, by means of which this notice shall be contravened, will be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding £20.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Swansea.

I, THE Undersigned, George Burden Strick, Esquire, Mayor of the said borough, by virtue of the powers vested in me, as the local authority therein, do hereby and in pursuance of the several Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November and the 16th day of December, both now last past, revoke the notice given by me, dated the 22nd day of December last: Provided, nevertheless, that nothing in this notice contained shall affect any breaches of the said notice of the 22nd day of December last, or any proceedings in respect of such breaches; and in lieu of such revoked notice, I do hereby, in further pursuance of the said Orders, and subject to the exceptions and conditions therein contained, declare that, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder generally designated the "Cattle Plague," it is expedient, from and after this date, to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said borough, except under the conditions hereinafter mentioned; and also to prevent the removal of any such animal from any place in Great Britain into place within
