WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prevent until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has since been from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly, by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of Her present Majesty, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, and to make other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations, and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act; and that all persons offending against the same should for each and every offence, forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, or such smaller sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty's Privy Council may in any case by such Order direct:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder prevails among Cattle within those parts of the United Kingdom called England and Scotland, which disorder is generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," or "Rinderpest," and may be recognised by the following symptoms:—"Great depression of the vital powers, frequent shivering, staggering gait, cold extremities, quick and short breathing, drooping head, reddened eyes, with a discharge from them, and also from the nostrils of a mucous nature, raw looking places on the inner side of the lips and roof of the mouth, diarrhoea or dysenteric purging."

And whereas it is possible that the said disorder may extend to that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland; and it is expedient to make provisions with a view to check the spreading of the said disorder, in case it should so extend:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, by virtue of, and in exercise of, the powers given by the said Act so continued as aforesaid, order as follows:—

1. This Order shall extend to all parts of that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland.
2. In this Order the word "animal" shall mean any cow, heifer, bull; bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and any horse kept in the same field, house, stable or building with any cattle.
3. In all provisions of this Order to be enforced within the Police District of Dublin Metropolis, the words "County Inspector of Constabulary," shall signify one of the Commissioners of the Dublin Metropolitan Police; and "Constable" shall signify a Superintendent or Inspector, or Acting Inspector of the Dublin Metropolitan Police; and the words "Petty Sessions Court" shall signify any of the offices of the Divisional Justices of the said district.
4. Every person having in his possession or under his custody any animal labouring under or having symptoms of the said disorder, shall forthwith give notice thereof to the nearest constabulary station of the district within which such animal is, or if within the Dublin Metropolitan Police District, to one of the Superintendents of the Metropolitan Police.
5. Every constable shall have power within his district to enter upon and inspect any premises or place in which he has reason to believe that any animal is labouring under the said disorder, and to

examine and inspect, whenever and wherever he may deem it necessary, any animal within such district which he has reason to suspect to be labouring under the disorder; and such constable shall report the fact of every such visit, with its results, to the Petty Sessions Court of the district in which such visit has been made at the next sitting of such Court.

6. Whenever any Constable shall receive or obtain information that any animal is labouring under the said disorder, he shall, by the next post, or if possible by telegram communicate such information to the Chief Secretary or Under Secretary to the Lord Lieutenant, who shall immediately order a competent person as inspector to proceed without delay to the place where the animal alleged to be so labouring is, and to inspect the same; and such inspector shall on the same day forward to the said Chief Secretary or Under Secretary, a report stating whether in his opinion the animal is or is not affected with the disorder.

7. Such Constable shall communicate also to the nearest Magistrate the report which he has transmitted to the Chief Secretary or Under Secretary; and if such Magistrate shall satisfy himself that there are reasons for grave suspicion that the animal mentioned in the Constable's report is labouring under the said disorder, he shall have power to issue an Order (to be in operation for three days, or until such time as the Inspector shall finally report that such animal is free from the said disorder, and subject to such conditions as he may think proper), prohibiting the removal of such animal from the land or premises where the said animal shall be, and requiring all other animals to be kept separate and apart from it.

8. On receipt of information to the effect that an animal is labouring under the said disorder, not being within a district already marked out as an infected district as hereinafter provided, the Lord Lieutenant shall send without delay to the place where such animal is, two or more competent persons, who shall mark out a certain line around such place, and lay down the same upon the Ordnance Map. The limit of the district enclosed shall be shown by well-defined boundaries, and all the district within such boundaries shall be called "An Infected District," and such competent persons shall forthwith forward to the County Inspector of Constabulary a description of such district, and marked as aforesaid on the Ordnance Map.

9. On receipt of such information the County Inspector of Constabulary, shall, without delay, cause to be posted in all public places within ten miles of the infected district, a notice describing the boundaries of the same; and, from the date of the posting of the first of such notices, it shall not be lawful for any person to hold any fair within such "infected district," or to move out of such "infected district" any animal whatsoever; but any animal, if certified by an Inspector to be free from disease, may be slaughtered, and the carcase of such animal may be sent out of such infected district, provided that its skin and offal shall be left within the district; and no skin of any animal slaughtered or dying within such district shall be removed without being disinfected, and without the permission of the Inspector, provided that this prohibition shall not extend to the carrying any animal through any such district by a railway train.

10. From the date of the posting of such notice, the County Inspector of Constabulary shall station at all necessary places Constables and Sub-Con-

stables, who shall prevent the egress of all animals from the "infected district," and shall prohibit the transit or passage of all animals by or through any part of the said district, except in railway trains, and shall as far as possible prevent any animal from approaching the boundaries of such district, and shall prevent the carrying out of any forage, litter, or manure therefrom.

11. The constables or sub-constables shall cause all faecal matter discharged by any animal labouring under the said disorder to be collected, so far as it can be done, and all litter and other refuse, in any house or place in which any such animal may have been located, and all fodder placed before or brought into contact with such animal, to be collected and buried at least four feet under the surface, or to be destroyed by fire, and the ashes thereof buried.

12. From the date of the posting of the first of such notices, all dogs within the infected district at that date shall be kept shut up or chained, or by other sufficient means shall be prevented from passing out of such district.

13. Such "infected district" shall remain and be considered as an infected district, and subject to the regulations herein applicable to an infected district so long as any case of disorder exists within it, and for a period of twenty-one days after the last case of death, or recovery, to be certified by the Inspector, and until such Inspector shall have certified that all proper precautions have been taken for the purposes of disinfection.

14. Every inspector shall have power to require and cause any animal declared and certified by him in writing to be labouring under the said disorder, to be slaughtered without delay and buried six feet deep in the ground and covered with lime, in such a spot as he may select, and in the case of burial being necessary at a distance from the place of death, he shall cause all practicable means to be taken for preventing the carcase from becoming the vehicle of infection before the removal thereof. The carcasses of all diseased animals shall be buried unskinned, and the skins thereof shall be scored so as to prevent their being used.

15. No person who may be brought into contact with any deceased animal, shall take with him out of such "infected district" any clothes or garment which such person may have worn while in contact with any such animal, either by wearing the same or otherwise, without taking all such precautions against propagating infection by means thereof, as the Lord Lieutenant by any order may direct.

16. No dog accompanying a drover or of the description ordinarily used by drovers or persons in charge of cattle, sheep, or swine, shall be brought into any part of Ireland by any person, if the last place on land from whence such dog shall have been brought shall be any part of Great Britain.

17. This Order shall come into operation on the 25th day of January, 1866, and shall continue in force thenceforth until the same shall be revoked by any future Order.

18. Every person offending against this Order shall, in pursuance of the said Act, for every such offence, forfeit any sum not exceeding £20, which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has since been from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places, as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection; and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained, shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act; and that all persons offending against the same shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, or such smaller sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty's Privy Council may in any case by such Order direct:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder now prevails among cattle within that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, which disorder is generally designated as the "cattle plague:"

And whereas with a view to check the spreading of the said disorder, an Order, dated the twenty-third of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, has been made, under the authority of the said Acts, by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, consolidating and amending certain Orders previously made for that purpose; and the same has since been altered and amended by a subsequent Order, bearing date the sixteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.

And whereas it is expedient to alter and amend the said Orders of the twenty-third day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and the sixteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, respectively: Now,

herefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, in exercise of the powers given by the said Act so continued as aforesaid order as follows:—

I. The power given by the said Orders to any local authority, as defined by the said Order of the sixteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, to declare by notice published in any newspaper circulating within its jurisdiction, and also by notice published in some newspaper or newspapers circulating within the county or counties bordering upon the county within which the jurisdiction of such local authority is situate, that it is expedient, for a time to be specified in such notice, that animals, as defined by the said Order of the twenty-third day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, or some specified description thereof, shall not, either absolutely, or except under such conditions as such local authority shall think fit to impose with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within his or their jurisdiction, shall extend, from and after the day on which this present Order comes into operation, to all raw or untanned hides and skins, and all horns or hoofs of any animals as defined as aforesaid or of any description thereof to be specified in any such notice, except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America, and to the offal of any such animals as aforesaid, and also to all dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection; and it shall not be lawful for any person, in contravention of any such notice, to bring or send any hide, skin, horn, hoof, offal, or other article as aforesaid, except in accordance with such conditions as aforesaid, from any place in Great Britain beyond such jurisdiction into any place within such jurisdiction; and the copy of any such notice shall be sent forthwith by the local authority by which it is made, to the Clerk of Her Majesty's Privy Council, and shall be published by him in the London Gazette: Provided always that nothing contained in this clause of this Order shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, by railway, through such jurisdiction; and provided also, that nothing contained in this clause of this Order shall make it unlawful for any person to bring or send, with the licence of any two Justices acting in and for the jurisdiction to which such notice applies, any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, from any land and premises in his own occupation, and beyond such jurisdiction, to any other land or premises in his own occupation within such jurisdiction, during a time to be specified in such licence.

II. The power given by the said Order of the sixteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, to any local authority as thereby defined, to declare, by notice published in any newspaper circulating within its jurisdiction, that it is expedient, for a time to be specified in such notice, that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall, except under such conditions as such local authority shall think fit to impose with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, be removed from any particular part of the jurisdiction of such local authority to any other part of such jurisdiction; or from any place or places within such jurisdiction, to be specified in such notice, to any other such place or places, also to be so specified; or from place to place generally

within such jurisdiction, or within any specified part thereof; shall extend, from and after the day on which this present Order comes into operation, to all animals, as defined by the said Order of the twenty-third day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, or any specified description thereof; and also to all raw or untanned hides and skins, and all horns and hoofs of any animals as defined as aforesaid or of any description thereof to be specified in any such notice, except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America, and to the offal of any such animals as aforesaid, and also to all dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection; and it shall not be lawful for any person to remove any animal, or any hide, skin, horn, hoof, offal, or other article as aforesaid, in contravention of any such notice: Provided always, that nothing contained in this clause of this Order shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animals, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, by railway, through such jurisdiction, or to send or carry any such animals, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction, to the nearest convenient railway station for the purpose of carrying them through or out of such jurisdiction.

III. The aforesaid Order, bearing date the sixteenth day of December, is hereby amended by omitting the words "or out of" from the proviso at the end of the fourth clause of the said Order; and the said proviso is to be read as follows, "provided always that nothing contained in this clause of this Order shall make it unlawful to send or carry any such animal by railway through such jurisdiction, or to send or carry any such animal, if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction, to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of carrying it through or out of such jurisdiction."

IV. Any notice given by virtue of this present Order may be renewed, revoked, altered, or varied, from time to time, in the manner provided by the said recited Orders, with respect to notices given under and by virtue thereof.

V. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-fifth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and shall be in force thenceforth until the first day of March next, and no longer, unless continued by some further Order.

VI. Every person offending against this Order shall, in pursuance of the said Act, for every such offence forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.

THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council, relating to the "cattle plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of the 18th section of their Lordships' Order of the 23rd November, 1865:—

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Salford.

I, THE undersigned, as the local authority within the borough of Salford, under and for the purposes

of the Orders of the Privy Council, with respect to a certain disorder called the "Cattle Plague," do hereby, in pursuance of the power vested in me, declare that it is expedient, with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, that from and after the 24th day of January instant, and until the 1st day of March next, no animal, to wit, cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall (except as provided by the said Orders in Council, and except as hereinafter provided) be brought, sent, or removed from any other part of Great Britain, into any place within the borough of Salford, or from any place within such borough to any other place within the same borough, save the cattle market, situated in Cross-lane, within such borough, for the purpose of being there sold for immediate slaughtering, and into such cattle market only on a Tuesday, after eight o'clock in the morning, and under and subject to the following conditions, namely:—

1. That every such animal, before being sent or removed from any part of Great Britain to the said market, or from any place within the said borough to the same market, shall have been certified by a duly appointed Inspector, under and for the purposes of the said Orders in Council, to be free from the said disorder, and (except as to any such animal brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain to the docks at Liverpool, Fleetwood, and Holyhead respectively, and sent or removed direct by railway from such docks respectively) to have been on premises free from all suspicion of the said disorder for a period of fourteen days previous to such removal, and shall, at the time of being driven or taken into such market, be free from such disorder; but the certificate as to any animal sent or removed from any place within the said borough to such market shall be given by a duly appointed Inspector, under and for the purposes of the said Orders in Council for the said borough. Every certificate shall state the description of the animal, and the precise time when such animal was inspected, and the place from which it was brought, sent, or removed, and shall accompany such animal, and no such certificate shall be in force for a longer period than four days from the date of such inspection; and a duplicate of such certificate shall, forthwith after the signing thereof, be delivered or sent by post, addressed to "The Market Inspector, Town Hall, Salford."
2. That every such animal shall be inspected by a duly appointed Inspector, under and for the purposes of the said Orders in Council for the borough of Salford, at the entrance gates of the aforesaid market, and be declared by him to be free from such disorder.

Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall prohibit the removal, under and subject to the aforesaid Condition No. 1, on a Monday, between the hours of twelve at noon and five in the afternoon, of any such animal arriving by railway from any railway station within the borough to lairs on land belonging to the Corporation of Salford adjoining the said cattle market, for the purpose of being on the following morning removed into such market.

Nor shall any such animal be removed from such market to any place, except direct to a railway station or to a slaughter-house, for the purpose of being there slaughtered, within the space of forty-eight hours after such removal, and except the same be certified by an Inspector for

the said borough to be free from the said disorder, and be marked by clipping the hair off the end of the tail.

Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall prohibit the removal of any such animal from one part of any farm to another part of the same farm, or the taking of any cow or heifer to the bull, or the removal, under the personal superintendence of such Inspector as last aforesaid, of any animal labouring under the said disorder, to a suitable place, for the purpose of being buried.

And I give notice, that every person offending against any of the conditions, provisions, and stipulations herein contained, will be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20.

Now the Justices of the said county, assembled in Quarter Sessions, held on the 3rd day of January, 1866, and, by adjournment, on the 19th day of January instant, do, under and by virtue of, and in exercise of, the powers given to them by the last recited Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, renew the said notices published by the Justices of the said Divisions of Northampton and Towcester, and the notice published by the Justices of the said Division of Wellingborough, with such alteration as is aforementioned, so that the same respectively shall continue in force until the 1st day of March now next ensuing.

I, THOMAS KIER, Provost of the burgh of Falkirk, by virtue of the power and authority conferred on me by the Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, of date the 23rd day of November, 1865, hereby declare, in terms of the 16th section of the said Order, that, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder generally designated the "Cattle Plague," it is expedient, from this date to the 1st day of March next, to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, to any place whatever within the burgh of Falkirk, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except

under the condition that they shall be, immediately after such exhibition or sale, slaughtered within my jurisdiction; and in terms of the 18th section of the said Order, I hereby declare that it is expedient, with the view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, that, from this date to the 1st day of March next, no animal, of the descriptions above specified, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the burgh of Falkirk, except under the condition that they be forthwith exhibited and sold, and immediately thereafter slaughtered within my jurisdiction.

And I hereby revoke the notice given by me of date the 22nd December, 1865.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Stamford.

WHEREAS by authority of several Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd November and 16th December, 1865, and the Orders therein respectively mentioned, I, Octavius Nowlan Simpson, Esquire, Mayor of the borough of Stamford, do give notice and declare that it is expedient that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine, be brought into any fair or market within this borough, or at any other time from the date hereof until the 1st day of March next ensuing; and that no animal of the aforesaid description be brought from any place in Great Britain beyond my jurisdiction into any part of this borough, except fat stock for the purpose of being slaughtered, and that such fat stock must be slaughtered within forty-eight hours after it shall have been brought within the said borough. Provided, that any person may exhibit or sell, on his own land or premises, or land or premises in his occupation, any such animal belonging to him which has been on such land or premises for not less than twenty-eight days previous to such sale. Provided also, that persons having such animals on lands or premises in his own occupation and beyond the borough, may, but only with the license of two Justices acting in and for the said borough, bring or send such animals to any other land or premises in his own occupation within my jurisdiction.

Any person committing an offence against this Order will be liable to a penalty of twenty pounds.

CATTLE PLAGUE NOTICE.

Cumberland to wit.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, holden by adjournment at Carlisle, in and for the county of Cumberland, on Saturday, the 20th day of Janu-

ary, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria, and in the year of our Lord 1866, before certain Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lady the Queen, in the same county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanours in the same county committed :

Ordered, that the appointment of Messrs. Carlisle and Bell, as Cattle Inspectors for Longtown Division, be revoked, and Mr. Coates, of Brampton, be appointed Cattle Inspector for such division,

Ordered, that Mr. Jacob Howe, of Sebergham, be appointed an additional Cattle Inspector for Allerdale-below-Derwent.

Ordered, that the Order made at the adjourned Quarter Sessions, held on the 13th instant, authorising the removal of cattle out at grass, be revoked, from and after six o'clock on the evening of Wednesday the 24th instant.

Ordered, that it be a recommendation of the magistrates acting in the matter of the Cattle Plague, that they do not sign any certificate or licence for the removal of cattle, except on evidence upon oath, and when they are sitting in Petty Sessions in their usual place of transacting business, and that the fees for such certificate do not exceed 4s. in each case.

Ordered, that so much of the Order of this Sessions as prohibits the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf from any adjoining county, or from any other part of Great Britain, into any parish or township within this county, be extended to "sheep, lambs, goats, and swine," and that none of the last-named animals shall from and after six o'clock on the evening of Wednesday next, be brought into any part of this county from any other part of Great Britain until the 1st day of March next.

Ordered, that no cattle be permitted to be moved from any farm or other place in any township or place in which, or within a radius of two miles of which, the Cattle Plague exists, to any other farm or place whatsoever.

Ordered, that the word "township," whenever it occurs in the Orders of this Court, be construed and taken to mean every place maintaining its own highways, or for which a surveyor of highways is appointed.

Resolved, that the Surveyor of Taxes be requested to furnish the Chief Constable with a list of persons throughout the county who are assessed to the Dog Tax.

Resolved, that it be a recommendation to the Master of the Cumberland Fox Hounds, and to the Masters of the other packs of fox hounds, harriers, and beagles in this county, that all hunting should cease for this season.

Ordered, that the Clerk of the Peace do write to the Home Secretary informing him that the Magistrates in Quarter Sessions have deemed it necessary temporarily to increase the police force in the present emergency, and asking him to sanction the employment of the additional men and horses during the existence of the Cattle Plague in this county.

Any person offending against any of the Orders made by this Court, under the provisions of the Orders in Council, shall for every such offence, forfeit any sum, not exceeding £20, which the Justices, before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence, may think fit to impose.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace held by adjournment (from the 1st) at the Shire Hall, in and for the county of Hereford, on Thursday, the 4th day of January, 1866,—It having been considered expedient that greater uniformity of action for the prevention of the Cattle Plague, should exist throughout this county, and the Order in Council dated the 16th day of December, 1865, constituting the Justices the local authority for that purpose, having been laid before the Court, and the committee of Justices appointed at the Quarter Sessions held on the 1st instant, having agreed on the following orders, and recommended them to be adopted.

It is unanimously resolved,

1st. That all notices heretofore issued by the Justices of the several Petty Sessional Divisions, be hereby revoked, except such parts thereof, if any, as relate to the appointment of Inspectors.

2nd. That from the date hereof until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, or calf, sheep, or swine, shall be removed to any market or fair, or to any place whatsoever within the jurisdiction of this Court, for the purpose of sale or of being otherwise disposed of, save as hereinafter provided.

3rd. That it shall not be lawful during the time above specified, to remove any such animal across the boundary line of any parish within the said jurisdiction, save that the occupier of any farm, which is situate in two or more adjoining parishes, shall be at liberty to remove any such animal bona fide belonging to him, from any one part of his said farm, to any other part thereof, but not beyond the limits thereof, except to any place within the parish in which his farmhouse is situated.

4th. That whenever the Cattle Plague shall have broken out in any parish within the said jurisdiction, it shall not be lawful to remove any such animal from any farm within the said parish, or from the lands of any occupier lying within two miles of an infected farm, though beyond the limits of the said parish.

5th. That it shall not be lawful for any person or persons to slaughter any such animal for food,

except within the limits of the parish in which the same has been fed or kept.

§ 6th. That it shall not be lawful to remove from any farm or lands whereon the Cattle Plague exists to any other place whatsoever, any skins, hoofs, hides, or horns.

And notice is hereby given, that any person offending against any or either of the said Orders of the Court of Quarter Sessions will be liable to a penalty for each offence of £20.

And it is further ordered, that the Clerk of the Peace do cause the said Resolutions to be inserted in all the newspapers published and circulated within the jurisdiction, and in one of the newspapers published and circulated within the county of Worcester, the Midland Counties Herald, and in the London Times.

And the said Justices further hereby declare, in terms of the said Orders, that with a view to prevent the spreading of the Cattle Plague, it is expedient, from this date till the 1st day of March next, to prevent, and they therefore do hereby prohibit, from this date to the 1st day of March next, the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, from place to place within the jurisdiction of the said Justices, along any public road, highway, or public way, whether for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or for any other purpose whatever, except under the following conditions, viz. :—

Notwithstanding this notice, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, may be removed from any place within the said jurisdiction, to the market of Edinburgh, or to any local butcher direct, to be slaughtered within forty-eight hours after reaching his custody, or to the nearest railway station (with reference to its destination) to be forwarded to any market to be sold for slaughter, but without the power of being brought back alive, provided always, that the owner or person having the charge of such cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall procure, not more than three days previous to removal, a certificate by an Inspector, that the said cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, is in a sound state of health, and that no animal on the same farm or premises is, or so far as known to said Inspector, has been affected with Cattle Plague, and also a licence by two Justices of the Peace for the county of Edinburgh.

And the said Justices do hereby further declare that it is expedient, from this date to the 1st day of March next, to prevent, and they do therefore hereby prohibit, from this date to 1st day of March next, the removal of any sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, from any place whatever within their jurisdiction, to any market or any place whatever within their jurisdiction, for the pur-

pose of exhibition or sale, except under the following conditions, viz. :—

Notwithstanding this notice, any sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, may be removed from any place within the said jurisdiction to the Market of Edinburgh, or to any local butcher direct, to be slaughtered within forty-eight hours of its reaching his custody, or to the nearest railway station (with reference to its destination) to be forwarded to any market to be sold for slaughter, but without the power of being brought back alive.

And the said Justices do further hereby declare that it is expedient, with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, that from this date to the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, shall be brought into any place within the jurisdiction of the said Justices, viz., the county of Edinburgh, from any place in Great Britain beyond their jurisdiction. And it is hereby declared that the bringing or sending of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, from any place in Great Britain beyond the jurisdiction of the said Justices into any place within their jurisdiction is prohibited from this date to the 1st day of March next.

Every person offending against the above notice is liable to be prosecuted for a penalty not exceeding £20 for each offence.

The forms to be used by Inspectors and Justices will be found in the hands of the various Inspectors for the county, or supplied at the office of the Clerk of the Peace, or of the Chief Constable, County Rooms, Edinburgh.

NOTE.—Nothing contained in the above notice makes it unlawful for any person to send or carry any animals by railway through the jurisdiction of the Justices for the county of Edinburgh, nor to bring or send with the licence of any two Justices acting in and for said jurisdiction, any animals from any land or premises in his own occupation, and beyond such jurisdiction to any other land or premises in his own occupation within such jurisdiction.

3rd. That from the said 24th day of January instant to the said first day of March next, no carcase or hide, or part of the carcase or hide of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be brought into the said city and borough, or any part thereof, or be removed from any place within the said city and borough to any other place within the said city and borough between the hours of six o'clock p.m. and six o'clock a.m.

4th. Provided that nothing in this Order shall make it unlawful for any person having first obtained the written licence of the chief constable or surveyor of the said city and borough to remove, between the hours aforesaid, any such animal as aforesaid which has died or been slaughtered in any place within the said city and borough to any other place to be specified in such licence within the said

city and borough for the purpose of being buried; and provided such animal be thereupon instantly buried.

5th. Provided further that nothing in this Order shall make it unlawful to remove between the hours aforesaid any meat, free from disease, which has been bought or sold by retail for consumption in the open market, or at any of the butchers' shops, stalls, or standings in the said city and Borough.

6th. Lastly, this Order is to be read and construed as supplementary to the orders published by me, dated respectively the 22nd day of December, 1865, and the 1st day of January, 1866, and the said last-mentioned orders are hereby so far altered as that they shall not nor shall either of them justify the doing of any act or thing hereby prohibited, but in all other respects the same orders remain in full force and are hereby confirmed.

And I hereby give further notice that every person offending against this notice and order will, for every such offence, forfeit any sum not exceeding £20, which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted may think fit to impose.

At the General Quarter Session of the Peace, held by adjournment at Lancaster, in and for the

Whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," now prevails within the hundred of Lonsdale, in the said county:—

1. Now, therefore, the Justices of the Peace of the county of Lancaster, in Quarter Sessions assembled, being the local authority under an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 16th day of December, 1865, do hereby (by virtue of the said Order of the 16th day of December, 1865, and of a previous Order in Council of the 23rd day of November, 1865, and of all other powers and authorities enabling them in this behalf) declare that it is expedient, with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, that on and after Thursday, the 25th day of January instant; and until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine shall be brought or sent from any part of Great Britain into any place within the jurisdiction of the said Justices for this purpose in the hundred of Lonsdale, in the said county, except as provided by the said Orders in Council; and that it is expedient to prevent the removal of any such animal to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said jurisdiction in the said hundred, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, and from place to place therein, except as provided by the said Orders in Council, and under certain conditions.

2. And the said Justices further declare and order as follows:—That all Notices now in force in and for any Petty Sessional Division within the said jurisdiction in the said hundred, under the powers given by any Order in Council, be and the same are hereby revoked, such revocation to take effect on and after the 25th day of January instant, save and except so far as relates to the appointment of any inspector or inspectors made under any former Order or Orders.

3. And the said Justices do hereby further declare that it shall not be lawful, after the 25th day of January instant, and until the 1st day of March next, for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine from any part of Great Britain, beyond the said jurisdiction, into any place within the said jurisdiction, except only as provided by the said Orders in Council.

4. Nor shall it be lawful for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said jurisdiction, in the said hundred of Lonsdale, in the said county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except under the conditions hereinafter specified.

5. Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove or cause to be removed any skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or offal to or from any place within the said jurisdiction, except the skins and hides of healthy and unsuspected animals sent direct to a tanner's; such skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or offal to be certified to be from healthy animals by some competent person duly appointed to certify cattle for removal (as hereinafter provided) for the district from which such removal shall take place; notice in writing of such removal to be given forthwith, by post or otherwise, by the person seeking to remove such skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or offal to the constable in charge at the nearest police station.

6. Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove or cause to be removed any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf from any Petty Sessional

Division to any other Petty Sessional Division within the said jurisdiction in the said Hundred, except as hereinafter provided.

7. Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove or cause to be removed any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf along any turnpike road or other highway for general traffic, without the certificate of some competent person (to be appointed as hereinafter provided), countersigned by a Justice of the Peace of the county of Lancaster, except from one part of any farm to another part of the same farm, or except in the case of any cow taken to the bull within a distance of two miles; nor between the hours of six o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the following morning.

8. And it is hereby declared that the conditions on which any such animal may be removed to or from any place within the said Hundred, shall be as follows, viz.:—

1. Any person may sell on his own land or premises any animal belonging to him which shall have been on such land or premises for not less than fourteen days previous to such sale, and any animal so sold may be removed from such land or premises provided it be certified by some veterinary surgeon, or by some other competent person or persons (to be appointed for that purpose within each parish or township by the Justices in Petty Session assembled), to be free from the said disorder called the Cattle Plague, and to be on premises free from all suspicion of the said disorder.

2. Any fat cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf may be removed within the limits of each Petty Sessional Division, provided it be certified as aforesaid, and be taken direct to some place within the said Petty Sessional Division and sold for immediate slaughter or forthwith forwarded direct to some accustomed market or fair for the sale of fat cattle, or to some slaughter-house beyond the jurisdiction of the said Justices, but subject to such regulations as may be in force with reference thereto. Provided that every certificate shall state the place to which such animal is to be removed, and shall accompany the animal or animals so removed, and provided that such animal continues free from disease up to the time of removal. A duplicate of such certificate shall in every case be delivered or sent by post forthwith to the Superintendent of Police for the Division in which the land or premises are situate; and no certificate shall be in force for any longer period than four days from the date thereof.

9. Provided, lastly, that nothing in this Order or notice contained shall extend or be construed to extend to authorise or permit the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf from any part of the Hundred of Lonsdale South of the Sands into any part of the Hundred of Lonsdale North of the Sands, or from any part of the Hundred of Lonsdale North of the Sands into any part of the Hundred of Lonsdale South of the Sands, except as provided by the said Orders in Council.

Every person offending against these Orders and notices, or in whose possession or custody any animal shall be found in contravention thereof, will be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

I, THE undersigned, by virtue of the powers vested in me as the local authority within the said borough, under the Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, do, in pursuance of the said Order in Council, declare that, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder called the Cattle Plague, it is expedient that no animal, that is to say, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, nor the skins, hides, horns, or hoofs, of any such cattle, sheep, or swine, shall be brought or sent to any market or fair within the said borough, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, until after the 1st day of March next; and further it is expedient that any such animal, skins, hides, horns, or hoofs, shall not be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the borough aforesaid, without the licence first being obtained of two of the Justices of the Peace for the said borough of Monmouth, until after the 1st day of March next.

And I hereby give you notice, that from and after this publication within this borough, every person who shall bring or send any such animal, skins, hides, horns, or hoofs, into any market, fair, or place, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or who shall receive, exhibit, buy, or sell any such animal, skins, hides, horns, or hoofs so bought or sent, or who shall bring or send any such animal, skins, hides, horns, or hoofs from any other place in Great Britain to any place within the borough aforesaid, without having first obtained a licence from two of the Justices for the said borough, will offend against the provisions of the said Order of Council, and be liable to a penalty of twenty pounds for every such offence.

And all turnpike gate-keepers and toll collectors within the said borough, are hereby requested not to permit any cattle, sheep, or swine, skins, hides, horns, or hoofs, to pass through their gates without the production of such licence as is above mentioned.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS an Act of Parliament was passed in the 4th year of the reign of Her present

Majesty intituled "An Act for the regulation of duties of Postage."

And whereas another Act of Parliament was passed in the 11th year of the reign of Her present Majesty intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office."

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in them in and by the said recited Acts and each of them, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, did, by a certain Warrant under the hands of two of the said Commissioners, bearing date the 1st day of June, 1865 (amongst other things), fix certain packet rates of postage on letters transmitted by the post direct by British packet boat, or partly by British packet boat and partly by French packet boat, between any port in Australia and (amongst other places) any port in the East Indies not passing through the United Kingdom.

And whereas it is expedient that so much of the said Warrant as relates to or affects letters transmitted by the post direct by British packet boat between Australia and Ceylon should be repealed.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said recited Acts, and each of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided), order and direct as follows:—

1. That so much of the said recited Warrant of the 1st day of June, 1865, as relates to or affects letters transmitted by the post direct by British packet boat between any port in Australia and Ceylon, not passing through the United Kingdom, shall be, and the same is hereby repealed, revoked, and annulled, and that the several rates of postage therein mentioned and set forth, applicable to such letters, shall wholly cease and determine.

2. That all letters transmitted by the post direct by British packet boat between any port in Australia and Ceylon, not passing through the United Kingdom, shall, in lieu of any rates of postage now payable by law on such letters, be charged and chargeable with the same single and progressive rates of postage, and be under and subject to the same orders, directions, and regulations as such respective letters were liable and subject to under or by virtue of a certain Warrant under the hands of two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 19th day of September, 1855.

3. That this Warrant shall come into operation on the day of the date hereof.

4. That the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.
