THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council, relating to the "cattle plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of the 18th section of their Lordships' Order of the 23rd November, 1865 :—

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Suffolk to Wit.*

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, holden by adjournment at Bury St. Edmunds, in and for the Western Division of the said county of Suffolk, on Friday, the 26th day of January, in the year of our Lord 1866, before Thomas Anderson, Clerk, Chairman, John Henry Heigham, Esquire, Peter Huddleston, Esquire, Benjamin Brydges Hunter Rodwell, Esquire, and others their companions, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the peace within the said county; and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdeeds, in the said county done and committed.

At this Court, held by adjournment for the purpose of considering the Order of the Privy Council, dated 20th day of January instant :—it was resolved and ordered,

That the Order made for the Western Division of the said county on Tuesday, the 9th day of January instant, be confirmed, except as regards Rules two and three of such Order, which will stand as under :

Rule 2. That no cattle be moved from one parish to another, except on adjoining lands, or from the occupation of one person to that of another, except they be in the same parish, without the order of two Justices in Petty Sessions.

Rule 3. That while the cattle plague exists in any parish, and for a period of one calendar month after it has been certified to the Justices at Petty Sessions in which such parish is situate

by the inspector of the district, that the parish is free from cattle plague, no live animal shall be moved into, through, or out of such parish. And during such periods, no person shall remove any manure, fodder, hides, skins, or offal out of the said parish, provided always, that the Justices in Petty Sessions may grant orders for the removal of sheep and swine.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Sussex.*

At the General Quarter Session of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden at Lewes, in and for the county of Sussex, on Monday, the 1st day of January, in the 29th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord 1866, and from thence continued by divers adjournments to and holden at Lewes, in and for the said county, on Tuesday, the 23rd day of the same month of January, before the Right Honorable Henry Thomas, Earl of Chichester, Francis Vernon Harcourt, Esquire, and others their Fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace in the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other ill deeds done and committed in the county aforesaid.

It is ordered by this Court, holden by adjournment as aforesaid, on the said 23rd day of January, that all Orders made at the General Quarter Session of the Peace, holden at Lewes, in and for the said county, on the said 1st day of January, 1866, or at any adjournment thereof, by virtue of an Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 16th day of December, 1865, and of an Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, be absolutely revoked. And this Court doth further order, by virtue of the said Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council, as follows :—

I. That all Orders, made in and for the Eastern Division of the county of Sussex, or so much of the said division as is within the jurisdiction of the Justices of the Peace of the said county in Quarter Sessions assembled, by any previous local authority constituted by and under the powers given by the said Order of Her Majesty's Privy

Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, or by any other Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council therein mentioned, and thereby consolidated, be revoked, and the same are hereby revoked from and after the 30th day of January, 1866, with the exception of any Order, or part of any Order, made by any such previous local authority as aforesaid, whereby any inspector or inspectors may have been appointed for the purpose of carrying into effect the rules and regulations made by the said Orders of Council, or any of them, all which appointments of inspectors, so far as they are now in force, are hereby confirmed.

II. It is hereby declared that it is expedient, and this Court doth order, that from and after the 30th day of January instant, until the 1st day of March, 1866, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be brought from any part of Great Britain without the jurisdiction of the Justices of the said county of Sussex, in Quarter Sessions assembled, into any place within the Eastern Division of the said county, or so much of such division as is within such jurisdiction, provided that in case any farm shall be partly without the jurisdiction of the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled, and partly within the Eastern Division of the said county, or so much of such division as is within such jurisdiction, any such animal as aforesaid may be brought from the part of such farm without such jurisdiction, into the part of the same farm within the said Eastern Division, or so much of such division as is within such jurisdiction, on condition that at the time such animal is brought in as aforesaid, it has been in the possession of the occupier of the said farm one month at least, and is in a healthy condition, but lands in the occupation of the same person entirely separated from one another shall for this purpose be deemed separate farms, although such lands may be held as the same occupation and at one rent. Provided that nothing contained in this clause or order shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animals by railway through such jurisdiction.

III. That the Inspectors for the several Petty Sessional Divisions within the Eastern Division of the said county, appointed under the Orders in Council relating to the cattle plague, or some or one of such orders, be, and such Inspectors are, hereby re-appointed until the 1st day of March next.

IV. That the authorities of corporate towns and boroughs within the county be invited to co-operate with the Justices of the county.

V. That this Order be published in the Sussex Express and Sussex Advertiser, and in papers circulating in Hampshire, Kent, and Surrey.

VI. That this Order be sent to the Clerk of Her Majesty's Privy Council, to be published by him in the London Gazette.

VII. And notice is hereby given, that every person offending against this Order is liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding £20.

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Wilts to wit.*

BE it remembered, that at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen,

holden at Trowbridge, in and for the said county of Wilts, on Monday, the 22nd day of January, in the 29th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, by adjournments from time to time, made from Tuesday, the 2nd day of the same month at Devises aforesaid, before Sir John Wither Awdry, Knight, Chairman, Henry Alworth Merewether, Esq., the Most Honourable the Marquis of Ailesbury, the Most Honourable the Marquis of Bath, the Most Honourable the Marquis of Lansdowne; the Right Honourable the Earl of Suffolk; the Honourable Jacob Viscount Folkestone, and others, their Fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace of the said Queen in the county aforesaid; and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanors, done and committed in the said county. It is ordered and declared as follows, that is to say:—

Whereas, by virtue of two several Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November and the 16th day of December, 1865, made under the authority of the several Acts of Parliament in the said Order recited, with a view to check the spreading of a contagious or infectious disorder now prevailing among cattle, within that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, which disorder is generally designated as the "Cattle Plague." The said Justices of the Peace for the said county assembled at a General Quarter Sessions of the Peace holden at Chippenham, in and for the said county, on the 8th day of this present month of January, by adjournment from the said 2nd day of the same month, did order and declare it to be expedient

That the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, from any parish or place in the said county of Wilts, to any other parish or place in the said county; and the introduction of any such animal into any parish or place within the said county; and the moving of any such animal upon or along any highway in the said county, for a distance greater than one hundred yards, should be prohibited for one month, from the 4th day of the said month of January, and that then, if required, the prohibition should be extended to the 1st day of March next.

That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, should be removed, brought or sent to any market or fair within the said county for the purpose of exhibition or sale, for one month from the said 4th day of January.

That in case of the appearance of the Cattle Plague, in or upon any farm, in the said county (so long as the preceding Orders of the said Justices should continue in force) no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, should be removed from such farm, until it should be pronounced by the Inspector that it would be safe that such animal should be so removed.

And whereas the said Justices have resolved to alter or vary the said recited Orders and declarations, and to make such further Orders, declarations, and appointments in the premises as are hereinafter expressed and contained.

Now, therefore, by virtue and in pursuance of the said Orders in Council, the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled as first aforesaid do hereby order:

1. That all appointments made, notices given, and other acts done by any local authority within the jurisdiction of this Court, under and by virtue of the said Order of the 23rd of November, 1865, or the Orders thereby revoked be and the same are hereby revoked.

2. That the Chief Constable of the county be, and he is hereby appointed Chief Inspector, for the purpose of carrying into effect, within the jurisdiction of this Court, the rules and regulations made by the said Orders in Council, of the 23rd of November, and the 16th December last; and the notices, orders, and declarations given and made, and hereafter to be given and made by this Court, under and by virtue of such Orders in Council.

3. That the following persons be, and they are hereby appointed Inspectors for the county, to act in the several districts therein, as hereunder scheduled, for the purpose of carrying out the said rules, regulations, notices, and declarations.

And that they be authorized to act in the absence or occupation of an adjacent Inspector, on the recommendation of the Chief Inspector or his deputy. And that it shall be the duty of such Inspectors to make such reports and returns to the said Chief Inspector as he may from time to time require, and generally to conform to any instructions which they may receive from him.

And the said Justices assembled as aforesaid, do by this notice, further order and declare (anything in the hereinbefore recited order and declaration of the said Justices of the 8th day of January instant, contained to the contrary notwithstanding:)

4. That it shall be lawful, until the 4th day of February next, for any person having any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (bonâ fide his or her property), placed out to straw or grass previously to the said 8th day of January, within the jurisdiction of this Court, at a distance from the farm to which it belongs, to remove such animal back to such farm between the hours of seven in the forenoon and five in the afternoon: Provided that an authority in writing for such removal be first obtained from two Justices of the Peace acting in and for the Petty Sessional Division wherein such farm is situate; and that no such authority be given without the production of a certificate from the Inspector of the district wherein the parish or place from whence it is proposed to remove such animal is situate, stating that the Cattle Plague does not exist, nor for the space of six months previously has existed, in the Petty Sessional Division wherein such parish or place is situate.

5. That it shall also be lawful for any person, being the occupier of a farm situate partly in one parish or place, within the jurisdiction of this Court, and partly in one or more other such parish or place, or parishes or places, to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (bonâ fide his or her property), from any part of such farm to any other part thereof, between the hours of seven in the forenoon and five in the afternoon; provided that no such animal shall, during such removal, traverse any highway, or the sides thereof, for a greater distance than four hundred and forty yards.

6. That it shall also be lawful for any person to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, (bonâ fide his or her property), from any land or premises in his or her own occupation, to any other land or premises in the same parish or place, also in his or her own occupation, along any highway within such parish or place. Provided that an authority in writing for such removal be first obtained from two Justices of the Peace acting in and for the Petty Sessional Division wherein such parish or place is situate. And that every such authority shall state the period (not exceeding twenty-one days), for which it is granted, and shall only be so granted on production of a certificate from the Inspector of the district wherein such parish or place is situate, stating that the Cattle Plague does not exist, nor for the space of six months previously has existed in such parish or place.

7. That every local authority, other than this Court, now having jurisdiction within the limits of this county, be invited to co-operate with this Court in carrying into effect the rules and regulations made by or under the Orders in Council hereinbefore recited.

8. That this Court urges upon all Inspectors of districts within the county, the immediate procurement of vaccine lymph, and earnestly recommends all owners of cattle to have the same vaccinated as speedily as possible.

9. That all existing Orders of the Privy Council and all orders of this Court in relation to the Cattle Plague be printed, and a copy sent to each Magistrate in the county.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Borough of Eye.*

I, SAMUEL PECK, Esquire, Mayor of the borough of Eye, pursuant to the authority given to me by the several Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November last and the 16th day of December last, or one of them, hereby revoke the notices published by me, dated respectively the 6th and 18th days of December last.

And I, the said Samuel Peck, Mayor of the said borough, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," hereby give notice and declare, pursuant to the authority given to me by the said Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November last and the 16th day of December last, or either of them, that it is expedient from the date hereof until the 1st day of March, 1866, to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or goat, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said borough, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

And I hereby further give notice and declare, that it is expedient from the date hereof until the said 1st day of March next, that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or goat, be brought from any other part of Great Britain into this borough, except that any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, or lamb, that is fit to be slaughtered, may be brought from any other part of Great Britain into this borough for the purpose of being immediately slaughtered, provided the owner thereof first obtain a license in writing under my hand, authorizing the animals mentioned in such license to be so brought for that purpose.

And any person offending herein will be liable to a penalty of £20.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Borough of Margate, in the County of Kent.*

## Notice.

WHEREAS it appears to me expedient that, with a view to prevent the spreading of the cattle plague, the following orders should be made, and notice given for the said borough of Margate.

Now, therefore, I, the undersigned, George Yeates Hunter, Esq., Mayor of the said borough of Margate, do hereby, by authority of the Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November last and the 16th day of December last (made in pursuance of the several Acts of Parliament therein mentioned), and in the exercise of the powers conferred on me thereby, order, give notice, and declare, that on and from the 29th day of January instant to the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bullock, ox, or calf, sheep, goat, or swine, shall be removed to any market or fair within the said borough for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

And that on and from the said 29th day of January instant to the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be brought or removed from any place without the said borough to any place within the said borough; nor be on, nor pass over, along, or across any street, highway, or public road within the said borough; except as follows: namely, that this order shall not extend to prohibit the removal of

any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, between the hours of eleven o'clock at night and six o'clock in the morning, from the Margate railway stations to such place only within the said borough where such animal shall be removed or taken to be slaughtered, provided that such animal shall have been first examined by the Inspector appointed or to be appointed for the said borough of Margate, under the authority of the Orders of the said Lords of the Privy Council, at the said railway stations, before its removal, and the sanction of such Inspector for such removal shall have been given, and that such animal shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours from the time of such removal.

Provided always, that nothing in this order contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal by railway through or out of the said borough, or to send or carry any such animal, if brought by sea, from any place out of Great Britain into the said borough, to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of carrying it through or out of the said borough.

That Henry Saunders, the Superintendent of Police of this borough, be appointed Chief Inspector, for the purpose of carrying into effect the rules and regulations made by the Orders of the Lords of the Privy Council, of the 23rd November and 16th December last, for the said borough of Margate.

And I also hereby further order, that notice of the aforesaid Orders be published within the jurisdiction of this borough, and in the Thanet Advertiser of Saturday next.

## NOTICE.

*Dorsetshire.*

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, held by adjournment at the County Hall, in Dorchester, in and for the county of Dorset, on Tuesday the 23rd day of January, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, and in the year of our Lord 1866, before the Right Honourable Edward Berkeley, Lord Portman, Chairman, John Floyer, Esq., M.P., and others, Justices of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lady the Queen in and for the county aforesaid; and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanours done or perpetrated in the same county.

By virtue of certain Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, 1865, and the 16th day of December, 1865, made and issued in pursuance and under the authority of the Act 11th and 12th Victoria, cap. 107, intituled "An Act to prevent until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then Session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has been continued by subsequent Acts, and lastly by the "Expiring Laws Continuance Act, 1865."

The Justices of the Peace for this county now assembled, have, in pursuance of the said Order

in Council of the 16th day of December, 1865, as the local authority hereby constituted, and of all powers vested in them by the said Orders in Council, or either of them, resolved, ordered, and declared, and do hereby resolve, order, and declare, by this their notice, to be published on the 25th day of January instant in the two county newspapers, called the Dorset County Chronicle and Somersetshire Gazette, and the Sherborne, Dorchester, and Taunton Journal; and also by the same notice to be published in the Western Times, the Western Flying Post, and the Salisbury and Winchester Journal, being newspapers circulating within the counties of Devon, Somerset, Wilts, and Hants, as the counties bordering upon this, the said county of Dorset, as follows, that is to say:—

1. That all appointments made, notices given and other acts done by the local authorities in the several Petty Sessional Divisions of this county, under or by virtue of the said Order in Council of the 23rd day of November, 1865, shall be, and the same are hereby, revoked as and from the 1st day of February next.

2. That this Court, as the local authority of this county, have appointed, and do hereby appoint, the Chief Constable of this county Chief Inspector, for the purpose of carrying into effect the rules and regulations made by the said Orders in Council, and the orders and notices of this Court, as such local authority; that the Superintendents and Sergeants under his command be appointed Inspectors for the respective Divisions to which they are respectively attached; that the following persons be appointed Inspectors for the purposes aforesaid, for the respective Divisions of this county, namely:—

And that the several inspectors do make such reports and returns to the Chief Inspector as he may from time to time require. That the police be required to perform the duties hereby imposed upon them in accordance with the provisions of

the 19th and 20th Vict., cap. 69. And that the Chief Inspector be empowered to engage the services of a veterinary surgeon when, in his opinion, the same shall be rendered necessary.

3. That with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder it is expedient that from and after the said 1st day of February until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine shall be brought or sent from any part of Great Britain beyond the jurisdiction of the local authority of this county into any place within such jurisdiction.

Provided that it shall not be unlawful for any person to remove any such animals as aforesaid, the property this day of an owner residing within this jurisdiction, from a place without to a place within this jurisdiction, the owner of such animals obtaining a certificate signed by the owner of the lands on which they have been kept, to the effect that the aforesaid animals are not infected with disease, and have been under his care for twenty-eight days, and that there has been no Cattle disease in the same parish during that period, and such certificate shall also be signed by the Inspector of the District from which it is proposed to remove such animals, and by two Justices of the Peace of this county, on their being satisfied of the reason for such removal.

4. That from and after the said 1st day of February until the said 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, shall be removed from any parish or place within the jurisdiction of the local authority of this county to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within such jurisdiction for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

Provided that no person shall be prohibited from exhibiting or selling on his own land or premises any animal belonging to him which has been on such land or premises for not less than fourteen days previous to such sale.

5. That from and after the said 1st day of February next, until the said 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be removed from any parish or place within the jurisdiction of the local authority of this county to any other parish or place, along any public road or highway.

Provided that it shall be lawful for any person to remove any such animals as aforesaid from any one part to any other part of a farm or lands in the same occupation. Provided also, that it shall be lawful for any person to remove, between one hour before sunrise and one hour after sunset, any such animals as aforesaid as shall have been in the possession for four weeks previously of the owner thereof, or of the person, being a resident within this jurisdiction, from whom they shall have been purchased, and the person in charge of such animals shall produce a certificate thereof, dated and signed by the owner or vendor, as the case may be, to any Inspector, Police Constable, or person authorized to require the same; and such certificate shall be countersigned by such stockowner in the parish as may consent to act as an Overseer of Cattle, to the effect that there is no Cattle Disease in the parish, and by a Justice of the Peace in the Division, to the effect that the removal is made for reasons satisfactory to him; and such certificate shall remain in force for three days, and shall specify the number and kind of animals to which the same shall apply.

6. That in the event of any case of Cattle Plague occurring within this jurisdiction, the Chief Inspector do send immediate notice thereof to the Clerk of the Peace, who, on receipt of such

notice, shall cause an advertisement to be inserted in the County Papers, to the effect that from the date thereof it shall not be lawful for any person to remove any animal hereinbefore specified from the farm or parish in which such case of Cattle Plague has occurred, or from any conterminous parish (specifying all such parishes by name) to any other place within this jurisdiction.

7. That from and after the said 1st day of February next to the said 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, shall be removed by railway from any parish or place within this jurisdiction to any other parish or place within the same jurisdiction.

8. And notice is hereby given, that every person offending against the provisions of the said Orders in Council, and of this Order and notice, will be liable to forfeit for every such offence any sum not exceeding £20, and that in compliance with the provisions contained in the said Act, 11 and 12 Vict., cap. 107, one-half of all penalties and forfeitures recovered under the Act will be payable to the person who shall sue or proceed for the same.

And I do, by this notice, intended to be published as aforesaid, and also in some newspaper or newspapers circulating within the counties of Lincoln, Cambridge, and Suffolk, declare, that it is expedient that, from and after the publication of this notice until the first day of March next, animals as hereinbefore defined, except as hereinafter mentioned, and also all raw and untanned hides and skins, and all horns or hoofs of any such animals aforesaid, except as hereinafter mentioned, and the offal of any such animals aforesaid, and also all dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall not be brought or sent from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said borough, or be removed from place to place within the said

borough; and that from and after the publication of this notice as aforesaid, until the said first day of March next, it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send any such animal, except as hereinafter mentioned, nor to bring or send any raw or untanned hide, skin, horn, or hoof, of any such animals aforesaid, except as hereinafter mentioned, or the offal of any such animals aforesaid, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, from any place in Great Britain beyond the limits of the said borough, into any place within the said borough, or to remove any such animal, hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or other articles as aforesaid, except as hereinafter mentioned, during the period aforesaid, from place to place within the said borough, save that this notice shall not apply:—

Firstly. To any such animal, hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or other articles as aforesaid sent or carried by railway through the said borough, or brought from beyond the sea, as specified in the said Orders in Council, into the said borough, and sent or carried through the said borough to the nearest convenient railway station.

2ndly. To any person bringing or sending any such animal, hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, with the licence of any two Justices acting in and for the said borough, from any land or premises in his own occupation and beyond the said borough, to any other land or premises in his own occupation within the said borough.

3rdly. To any person removing any such animal, hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or other articles as aforesaid, from place to place within the said borough, so that the same are not taken over or along any public road or highway a greater distance than 100 yards, or exceeding that distance, with the licence of any two Justices acting in and for the said borough.

4thly. To any fat animal for immediate slaughtering, and which shall be slaughtered within the said borough within five days after being brought therein.

And I hereby revoke the notice issued by me on the 12th day of December, 1865.

And I further give notice, that every person offending herein will be liable to a penalty of £20 for every offence.

any place whatever within my jurisdiction as Mayor of the city of Worcester, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

2nd. That until the said 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, shall be brought into any place within my jurisdiction as aforesaid, except for the purpose of being slaughtered; and that every animal brought in under the foregoing exception shall be slaughtered within the limits of the said city, within the space of three days after it shall have been brought within the limits of the said city, inclusive of the day of bringing in, and shall not be taken out of the said city alive.

Any person in anywise offending in the premises will, for every such offence, forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.

Provided always, that any animal free from the said disorder, may pass through the said city while in course of removal from one part of the county of Worcester to any other part thereof by virtue of a licence granted by some Justice of the Peace for the said county, in pursuance of the order of the last Epiphany Quarter Sessions of the said county.

Now, therefore, the said Justices assembled at the said General Quarter Sessions of the Peace holden by adjournment at the County Courts aforesaid, on this 26th day of January, 1866, do hereby declare, that the said Order of this Court made on the 4th day of January instant, shall, from and after the publication of this Order, be revoked.

And the said Justices (by virtue of the powers given to them by the aforesaid Orders in Council, and by another Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 20th day of January instant) do hereby further declare and order that, from and after the publication hereof, and until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and no raw or untanned hides and skins, nor any horns or hoofs, or the offal of any such animals, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought, sent or removed into this county from any other part of Great Britain.

And the said Justices do further order, that during the period aforesaid, no such animal shall be brought, sent, or removed to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within this county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

And the said Justices do further order, that during the period aforesaid, no such animal shall be allowed to travel along the highways within this county for any distance exceeding 200 yards, without a permit in writing, signed by a Justice of the Peace for this county (except in cases of occupiers removing their cattle from any land in their own occupation, to any other land in their own occupation within this county, for a distance not exceeding one mile), such permit to be produced for inspection on demand; and no such removal shall take place between the hours of sun-set and sun-rise; nor unless such animals shall have been on the premises from which they are removed, for a period of twenty-eight days previously.

And the said Justices do further order that, during the period aforesaid, no raw or untanned hides and skins, horns, or hoofs, or the offal of any such animals, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection shall be removed from any place within this county to any other place within this county, without a permit in writing signed by a Justice of the Peace for this county, such permit to be produced for inspection on demand; and no such removal shall take place between the hours of sun-set and sun-rise.

And the said Justices do further order, that all permits granted by any Justice under the foregoing Order, be immediately returned by post at the termination of the permit to the Justice who shall have granted the same.

And the said Justices to further order, that the Chief Constable of this county be appointed Chief Supervisor, for the purpose of carrying into effect the Rules and Regulations made by the abovementioned or any future Orders of the Lords of the Privy Council, relative to the Cattle Plague, and the notices and orders given by this Court within their jurisdiction, and that the superintendents, inspectors, and serjeants under the command of the said Chief Constable, be appointed supervisors for the respective Divisions to which they are for the time being attached.

And this Court doth hereby give notice, that all persons offending against the provisions of the above Order, will be liable for each and every offence to forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding £20.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

### Amended Orders.

#### County of Warwick.

1. THE Justices assembled at the Quarter Sessions held at Warwick, by adjournment, on the 20th day of January, 1866, hereby declare, that from and after the date hereof, until the 1st day of March next, it shall not be lawful to send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (hereinafter in these Orders called "animal," to any market or fair, exhibition, auction, or sale, in any place within the jurisdiction of the local authority of the county of Warwick.

2. That until the 1st day of March next, the introduction of any such animal as aforesaid into any places and parishes within the said jurisdiction, from parts beyond that jurisdiction, be strictly prohibited.

3. That from the date of these Orders until the 1st day of March next, no such animal shall be permitted to go upon or be driven along any highway or turnpike road within the jurisdiction of the said local authority.

### Exceptions and Limitations of this Rule.

1stly. Fat cattle for slaughter under Rule 4.

2ndly. Two Justices of the division may, at their discretion, grant a license under their hands to any occupier to make use of any public road which passes through the land in his occupation, so far as may be necessary for his cattle to pass, in the day-time only, from one part of his land to another, or to his cow-house or homestall; provided that such license shall not be granted for a longer period than for one month at any one time, and shall be liable to be revoked by the said Justices, or either of them, or by any other Justice of the same division, upon the requisition of the Cattle Plague Inspector for the district, or upon such other information given to the said Justices or Justice, as shall in their or his opinion render it expedient that the said license shall be revoked, in the whole or in part; of which revocation the said Justices or Justice shall cause immediate notice to be given to the holder thereof, and also to the police constables of the district.

3rdly. One Justice of the division may, at his discretion, grant a license to any person who shall be the tenant and occupier of two separate farms, both being in the county of Warwick, and not more than five miles apart, to remove his cattle from one farm to the other; the license to specify the number and quality of the animals, and the day on which they are to be removed, and the public road by which they are to travel; the person in charge of the animals to carry the license with him, and the license to be valid only for the day named in it; provided that if the said two farms are situate in different divisions, the above license shall be obtained from a Justice of the division out of which the cattle are to be removed, but it shall not be valid unless it be countersigned by some Justice of the division into which the cattle are intended to be brought.

4thly. One Justice of a division may, for breeding purposes, grant a license, at his discretion, to move any cow or cows, heifer or heifers, along any public road for a limited distance, not to exceed two miles, or thereabout, to any place where a bull is usually kept; the license to specify the number of cows or heifers, the time for which it is granted, the public road to be travelled over, and that the cow or cows, heifer or heifers, is or are the property of the person applying for the license, and have been in his possession for at least one month last past; the person going with the animals to carry the license with him.

5thly. Any Justice of the division in which any sale of live stock takes place, such as has been authorised by the Orders in Council, may, grant a license, at his discretion, to any purchaser of cattle thereat, to remove the said cattle from the place of sale to such place as

the purchaser desires, being within the limits of the jurisdiction of the local authority; the license to state the number and quality of the animals, and the time for which it is granted, and the public roads by which they are to travel; the license to be carried by the person who has the charge of the animals.

4. One Justice, within the division in which he resides, may, at his discretion, grant a license to move, on a day to be named therein, in the day-time only, any fat beast to a place to be specified, for slaughter, or to a railway station, upon a declaration (to be retained by the Justice) being made before him by the owner, or by some person authorised by the owner, that the said animal has been in his possession for at least one month last past, is healthy and free from Cattle Plague, and is intended to be slaughtered at the place named, within 48 hours from the day of removal, or is intended to be sent by railway out of the jurisdiction of the local authority (as the case may be); and the condition of the license shall be, that if the said animal be not slaughtered within the time specified, or be afterwards found alive in any place within the limits of the jurisdiction of the local authority, the person in whose possession it shall be so found shall be liable to the penalty under the Statute not exceeding £20.

5. That the police constables of the county be instructed to keep a strict look out upon all turnpike roads and highways within the jurisdiction of the local authority of the county of Warwick, and whenever they discover any such animal being upon or being driven along any public road, without any of the aforesaid licenses, to give information to some one of the Justices of the division, or their clerk. Every such license to be produced, on demand, to any police constable, or to any owner or occupier of land adjoining, on either side of the public road on which such cattle shall be found.

6. Any wilful infraction of these orders, or any false declaration or misrepresentation made for the purpose of obtaining any of the foregoing licenses, or refusal to produce them when lawfully demanded, shall subject the offender to the penalty under the statute not exceeding £20, in addition to any other proceedings to which he may be legally liable.

7. It is recommended by the Court that no fee be demanded or taken upon any declaration or license under these Orders.

8. Ordered, that these sessions be further adjourned to Saturday, the 3rd day of February, 1866, at two o'clock in the afternoon.

tained, I do hereby, in further pursuance of the said Orders, declare that, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder generally designated the "Cattle Plague," it is expedient from and after this date to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or any other horned animal, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said borough, except under the conditions hereinafter mentioned; and also to prevent the removal of any such animal from any place in Great Britain into any place within the said borough, except under the conditions hereinafter mentioned.

The conditions hereinbefore referred to are:—

I.—That, subject as aforesaid, no such animal brought by water, railway, or otherwise, shall be landed within, or be allowed to enter the said borough, except for the purpose of being slaughtered, and not even then until after the Inspector of the district shall, in each case, have certified that the same is free from disease.

II.—That every such animal shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours from the time when such Inspector shall have given his said certificate.

III.—That upon the receipt of such certificate, all such animals shall, on and after Wednesday next, be immediately taken to the public slaughter house within the said borough, prior and in order to their being so slaughtered as aforesaid, whither they shall continue to be taken until the said Inspector, by my authority, shall appoint any other place fit for their reception.

And I do hereby order that the said conditions shall be strictly observed accordingly.

### *Penalty.*

Any person after this date offending against the said Orders, or against the above notice, declaration, conditions, and order, will, for every such offence, be liable to forfeit the sum of £20.

brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the city of Edinburgh, except under the condition that they be forthwith exhibited and sold, and immediately thereafter slaughtered within my jurisdiction.

And I hereby revoke the notice given by me of date the 26th December, 1865.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

#### *Borough of Wolverhampton.*

I, JOSEPH CROWTHER SMITH, Esquire, Mayor of the said borough, do, by this notice, and by virtue of the several Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, enabling me in this behalf, declare that it is expedient for the time hereinafter specified, to prevent the removal of animals as hereinafter defined, except under the conditions hereinafter specified (with a view to prevent the spreading of the Cattle Plague), to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said borough, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

I declare and order that on and after Thursday, the 1st day of February next, and until Thursday, the 1st day of March next, no person shall bring or send, receive, exhibit, buy, or sell, or cause to be brought or sent, received, exhibited, bought, or sold, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf to or in any market, fair, or place within the said borough, except for the purpose of being slaughtered.

Every such animal so brought or sent, received, exhibited, bought, or sold, shall, before being allowed to leave the said market, fair, or borough, be marked or branded with a distinctive mark or brand, by proper officers appointed for that purpose; and such mark or brand shall state the date when such animal was marked or branded.

Every person bringing any such animal into any market, fair, or place within the said borough, or having in his possession in the said borough any such animal branded or marked as aforesaid, shall slaughter, or cause the same to be slaughtered, in all cases, on or before the fifth day after the day of the date of such mark or brand.

No such mark or brand so placed as aforesaid, shall be defaced or obliterated; and if from any cause the same shall be defaced or obliterated, then and in such case such animal shall be slaughtered or cause to be slaughtered by the owner thereof, or the person in whose custody or possession such animal may be found, forthwith after such owner or person shall be aware that such brand or mark has been so defaced or obliterated, or within twelve hours after notice shall have been given to such owner or person by the Market Inspector, or either of the Cattle Inspectors appointed for the said borough.

No such animals as aforesaid which shall be removed to any such market, fair, or place within the said borough, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, shall be depastured or turned out on land in the said borough, but all such animals shall be kept in lairs, sheds, or cow-houses.

Provided always, that this notice shall not extend to any cow purchased by any person *bona fide* carrying on the business of a cowkeeper and dealer in milk within the limits of the borough, for the purpose of such business, in case notice be forthwith given to the Cattle Inspector, or one of them, by such cowkeeper and dealer in milk, of

every such cow being so purchased, and a certificate be produced to them or him from the Veterinary Inspector of the district from which every such cow is brought, dated not more than two clear days before the bringing or sending of such cow into the said borough, that the farm or place from which every such cow is brought is free from the Cattle Plague, and that such animal has not formed part of nor been in contact with any diseased herd.

Provided also, that nothing contained in this notice shall be held to prohibit any person from exhibiting or selling on his own land or premises within the said borough, any animal belonging to him which has been on such land or premises for not less than fourteen days previous to such sale; nor to make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal by railway through the said borough, nor for any person to bring or send with the license of any two Justices acting in and for the said borough, any such animal from any land or premises in his own occupation, and beyond the said borough, to any other land or premises in his own occupation within the said borough.

Every person offending against this notice, is liable to forfeit, for every such offence, a sum not exceeding £20.

## TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, cap. 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage, certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, or in respect of letters, newspapers, parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post, and by the same Act powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of postage therein mentioned.

And whereas further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office.

And whereas it is expedient to authorise the transmission by the post between the United Kingdom and the United States of Columbia, of certain packets, and for that purpose to make certain regulations in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us, in and by the said hereinbefore-recited Acts of Parliament, and each of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows; that is to say:—

1. All packets consisting of printed papers (other than British newspapers), or consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize of no intrinsic value, posted in any part of the United Kingdom, addressed to the United States of Columbia, or posted in the United States of Columbia, addressed to any part of the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and the United States of Columbia by British packet boat, subject to the several rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, an uniform single rate of postage of three pence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:—

On every such packet, if exceeding four ounces and not exceeding one half of a pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two rates of postage;



And on every such packet, if exceeding one half of a pound and not exceeding one pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, four rates of postage;

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of one pound, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

2. Every packet consisting of printed papers (other than British newspapers) which shall be transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant, shall be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends or sides, and it may contain any number of separate books, or other publications, prints, or maps, and any quantity of paper, parchment, or vellum, and the books or other publications, prints, or maps, may be either printed, written, or plain, or any mixture of the three, and all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of a book, publication, print, or map, or of a portion thereof, shall be allowed to pass by the post, whether such binding, mounting, or covering be loose or attached, as also rollers in the case of prints or maps, markers (whether of paper or otherwise) in the case of books, and whatsoever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto; but no packet shall contain any written letter, nor any communication in the nature of a letter closed or open, nor any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any communication of the nature of a letter written in or upon any such packet or cover thereof, nor shall any packet consist of, or contain any photographs, drawings, prints, or other contents, which may be obviously of an obscene character.

3. Every packet consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize which shall be transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant, shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to the several orders, directions, regulations, and conditions hereinafter contained, that is to say:—

No pattern or sample being of any intrinsic value, or being an article or thing of a saleable nature, or having a value of its own apart from its mere use as a pattern or sample, shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant.

There shall be no enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other enclosure not authorised by this Warrant sent in or with any such packet.

There shall be no writing in or upon any such packet, or on the cover thereof, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender thereof, a trade mark, and numbers and prices.

All such packets shall be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination; nevertheless, samples of seeds, drugs, and such other articles and things as cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen, paper, or other material, tied at the neck, but bags so closed that they cannot be readily opened, even although they be transparent, shall not be used for that purpose.

4. No packet which shall exceed two feet (British) in length, or one foot (British) in breadth or depth, shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant.

The term "weight" used in this Warrant shall mean British weight, and the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning, in all respects, as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, cap. 96.

11. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, revoke, or modify any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time may appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

12. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.
