

the local authority under the Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, bearing date the 23rd day of November last, do hereby give notice, that from and after the 1st day of February next to the 1st day of March next (both days inclusive), no person shall bring or send, or cause to be brought or sent, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox or calf, into the cattle market, or into any other place within the said city and borough, except for the purpose of immediate slaughtering; but no such animals shall be permitted to be brought for slaughter into the said city and borough from beyond the parish of Saint Cuthbert, Wells, without a license in writing, signed by two Justices of the Peace acting for the Petty Sessional Division of Wells.

Provided, that it shall be lawful for any person occupying land immediately adjoining the boundary of the said city and borough, to remove such animals as aforesaid, from such land to land in his own occupation within the said city and borough.

Provided also, that occupiers of land in the parish of St. Cuthbert, Wells, desiring to remove any such animals as aforesaid, from land in their own occupation to other land in a different part of the said parish also in their own occupation, by which it may be necessary that such animals should pass through the said city and borough, it shall be lawful for such removal to take place, on obtaining a certificate in writing, under the hand of the local authority for the time being.

Provided also, that nothing contained in this notice or order shall make it unlawful for any person to send any such animals as aforesaid, through the said city and borough, by railway.

And I hereby also give notice that any person offending against the above Order, will be liable to a penalty of £20, for each animal so brought or sent.

THE Justices of the Peace for the county of Perth, in Sessions assembled on the 29th December last, and 5th January current, by virtue of the Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council, of date 16th December last, declared, and do hereby declare, it expedient, that from and after the 10th day of January current, until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be removed from place to place generally, within the said county of Perth, nor from the city of Perth (being a separate jurisdiction), excepting always sound fat cattle being brought or sent for immediate slaughter, or being taken or sent to the nearest railway station, to be carried by railway out of the said county; and those only under authority of a license by one or more Justices, and after a declaration made before the Justice to whom he applies, by the person wishing the license, as to the destination of the cattle, and their freedom from disease; and also, excepting sound cattle when necessary to pass on a public road, from one part of the same farm to another part thereof; and if required under special circumstances to be moved beyond the farm, then only under authority of a license, to be granted by three Justices after an application made to the General Sessions.

Notice is hereby given, of the said declaration and resolution, and that every person offending

against the same, shall for every offence be liable in a penalty of £20.

Town and Port of Seaford, in the county of Sussex.

At the General Quarter Session of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden at Seaford, in and for the town and port of Seaford, in the county of Sussex, on Saturday, the 13th day of January, in the 29th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord, 1866, and from thence continued by divers adjournments to and holden at Seaford, in and for the said town and port, on Wednesday, the 24th day of the same month of January, before James Singer Turner, Esquire, Bailiff, and James Chambers, Esq., Jurat, and as such Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace in the said town and port, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other ill deeds done and committed in the town and port aforesaid.

By virtue of Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated respectively the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 23rd day of November, 1865, this Court doth declare and order:—

1. That it is expedient that from henceforth until the 1st day of March, 1866, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall, except in accordance with the provision contained in the 18th section of the said Order of Council of the 23rd day of November, 1865, be brought from any part of Great Britain without the jurisdiction of the Justices of the said town and port in Quarter Sessions assembled into any place within the said town and port, unless the person or persons who shall bring, or cause to be brought, any such animal into such last mentioned jurisdiction shall have first obtained for that purpose a license, in writing, from one of the Justices of the Peace acting in and for the said town and port.

2. That this Order be published in the Sussex Express and Sussex Advertiser, and in papers circulating in Hampshire, Kent, and Surrey.

3. That this Order be sent to the Clerk of Her Majesty's Privy Council, to be published by him in the London Gazette.

4. And notice is hereby given, that every person offending against this Order is liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding £20.
