*Buckingham Palace, February 6, 1866.*

**T**HIS day Her Majesty proceeded in state from Buckingham Palace to the House of Peers, where she arrived soon after two o'clock; and was received, on alighting from Her state carriage, by the Lord Chancellor, the Lord President, the Lord Privy Seal, Lord Colville of Culross, officiating for the Lord Great Chamberlain (the Lord Willoughby de Eresby), the Deputy Earl Marshal, Garter King of Arms, and Black Rod, and proceeded into the House in the usual order;—the crown was borne by the Marquis of Lansdowne, the sword of state by the Lord President, and the cap of maintenance by the Marquis of Winchester.

Her Majesty being seated on the Throne, and the Great Officers of State and others standing in their respective places on the right and left, Black Rod was sent with a message from Her Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their immediate attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, Her Majesty was pleased to deliver to the Lord Chancellor the following most gracious Speech to both Houses of Parliament, which Her Majesty commanded his Lordship to read, and which he accordingly did:

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

IT is with great satisfaction that I have recourse to your assistance and advice.

I have recently declared my consent to a marriage between my daughter Princess Helena and Prince Christian of Schleswig-Holstein Sonderbourg-Augustenburg. I trust this union may be prosperous and happy.

The death of my beloved uncle the King of the Belgians has affected me with profound grief. I feel great confidence, however, that the wisdom which he evinced during his reign will animate his successor, and preserve for Belgium her independence and prosperity.

My relations with Foreign Powers are friendly and satisfactory, and I see no cause to fear any disturbance of the general Peace.

The meeting of the fleets of France and England in the ports of the respective countries has tended to cement the amity of the two nations, and to prove to the World their friendly concert in the promotion of Peace.

I have observed with satisfaction that the United States, after terminating successfully the severe

struggle in which they were so long engaged, are wisely repairing the ravages of civil war. The Abolition of Slavery is an event calling forth the cordial sympathies and congratulations of this country, which has always been foremost in showing its abhorrence of an institution repugnant to every feeling of justice and humanity.

I have at the same time the satisfaction to inform you that the exertions and perseverance of my Naval Squadron have reduced the Slave Trade on the West Coast of Africa within very narrow limits.

A correspondence has taken place between my Government and that of the United States with respect to injuries inflicted on American commerce by cruisers under the Confederate flag. Copies of this correspondence will be laid before you.

The renewal of diplomatic relations with Brazil has given me much satisfaction; and I acknowledge with pleasure that the good offices of my Ally the King of Portugal have contributed essentially to this happy result.

I have to regret the interruption of peace between Spain and Chili. The good offices of my Government, in conjunction with those of the Government of the Emperor of the French, have been accepted by Spain, and it is my earnest hope that the causes of disagreement may be removed in a manner honourable and satisfactory to both countries.

The negotiations which have been long pending in Japan, and which have been conducted with great ability by my minister in that country, in conjunction with the representatives of my allies in Japan, have been brought to a conclusion which merits my entire approbation. The existing Treaties have been ratified by the Mikado; it has been stipulated that the tariff shall be revised in a manner favourable to commerce, and that the indemnity due under the terms of the Convention of October, 1864, shall be punctually discharged.

I have concluded a Treaty of commerce with the Emperor of Austria, which I trust will open to that empire the blessings of extended commerce, and be productive of important benefits to both countries.

The deplorable events which have occurred in the Island of Jamaica have induced me to provide at once for an impartial inquiry, and for the due maintenance of authority during that inquiry, by appointing a distinguished military officer as Governor and Commander of the Forces. I have given him the assistance of two able and learned Commissioners, who will aid him in examining

into the origin, nature, and circumstances of the recent outbreak, and the measures adopted in the course of its suppression. The Legislature of Jamaica has proposed that the present political constitution of the island should be replaced by a new form of Government. A Bill upon this subject will be submitted for your consideration.

Papers on these occurrences will be laid before you.

Papers on the present state of New Zealand will be laid before you.

I have given directions for the return to this country of the greater portion of my Regular Forces employed in that Colony.

I watch with interest the proceedings which are still in progress in British North America with a view to a closer union among the provinces, and I continue to attach great importance to that object.

I have observed with great concern the extensive prevalence, during the last few months, of a virulent distemper among cattle in Great Britain, and it is with deep regret, and with sincere sympathy for the sufferers, that I have learnt the severe losses which it has caused in many counties and districts. It is satisfactory to know that Ireland and a considerable part of Scotland are as yet free from this calamity, and I trust that by the precautions suggested by experience, and by the Divine blessing on the means which are now being employed, its further extension may be arrested.

The Orders which have been made by the Lords of my Privy Council, by virtue of the powers vested in them by law, with a view to prevent the spreading of this disease, will be laid before you; and your attention will be called to the expediency of an amendment of the law relating to a subject so deeply affecting the interests of my people.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

I have directed that the Estimates for the ensuing year shall be laid before you. They have been prepared with a due regard to economy, and are at the same time consistent with the maintenance of efficiency in the Public Service.

The condition of Trade is satisfactory.

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

A Conspiracy, adverse alike to authority, property, and religion, and disapproved and condemned alike by all who are interested in their maintenance, without distinction of creed or class, has unhappily appeared in Ireland. The constitutional power of the ordinary tribunals has been exerted for its repression, and the authority of the law has been firmly and impartially vindicated.

A Bill will be submitted to you, founded on the Report of the Royal Commission, on the subject of Capital Punishment, which I have directed to be laid before you.

Bills will be laid before you for amending and consolidating the Laws relating to Bankruptcy, and for other Improvements in the Law.

Measures will also be submitted to you for extending the System of Public Audit to branches of receipt and expenditure which it has not hitherto reached, and for amending the provisions of the Law with respect to certain classes of legal pensions.

Your attention will be called to the subject of the Oaths taken by Members of Parliament, with a view to avoid unnecessary declarations, and to remove invidious distinctions between members of different religious communities in matters of Legislation.

I have directed that information should be procured in reference to the Rights of Voting in the election of Members to serve in Parliament for counties, cities, and boroughs.

When that information is complete, the attention of Parliament will be called to the result thus obtained, with a view to such improvements in the laws which regulate the rights of voting in the election of Members of the House of Commons as may tend to strengthen our free institutions, and conduce to the public welfare.

In these and in all other deliberations I fervently pray that the blessing of Almighty God may guide your counsels to the promotion of the happiness of my people.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then next session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders amongst sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has since been from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal, to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection; and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act; and that all persons offending against the same shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, or such smaller sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty's Privy Council may in any case by such Order direct:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder now prevails among cattle within that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, which dis-

order is generally designated as the "cattle plague:"

And whereas, with a view to check the spreading of the said disorder, an Order dated the twenty-third day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, has been made, under the authority of the said Acts, by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, consolidating and amending certain Orders previously made for that purpose; and the same has since been altered and amended by subsequent Orders, bearing date the sixteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and the twentieth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six:

And whereas it is expedient to alter and amend the said Orders, in so far as they relate to the Metropolis: Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, in exercise of the powers given by the said Act so continued as aforesaid, order as follows:—

1. The word "Metropolis," for the purposes of this Order, shall mean any parish or place within the jurisdiction of the Metropolitan Board of Works, exclusive of the City of London and the liberties thereof, and also exclusive of that part of the county of Kent which is included in such jurisdiction, and which is situated to the north of the Thames.

2. So much of the said Orders of the twenty-third day of November and the sixteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, as empowers the Clerk of Her Majesty's Privy Council to appoint Inspectors within the limits of the Metropolitan Police District, is hereby revoked.

3. So much of the said Orders of the twenty-third day of November and the sixteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and of the Order of the twentieth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, as gives to any Local Authority any jurisdiction or power whatsoever within the Metropolis is hereby revoked; and all Orders made or notices published by any such Local Authority shall absolutely cease and determine so far as respects the Metropolis from the date of this Order coming into force, but without prejudice to their validity as respects any place beyond the Metropolis.

4. The Clerk of Her Majesty's Privy Council may appoint Inspectors for the Metropolis, and the Notice required by Section 8 of the Order of the 23rd of November, 1865, to be given to the said Clerk of the Council by persons in certain cases within the Metropolitan Police district, shall after the date of this Order be required to be given only by persons within the Metropolis.

5. No person having in his possession, or under his charge, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf within the Metropolis, whether such animal has been in the Metropolitan Cattle Market or not, shall convey or remove, cause to be conveyed or removed, or attempt to convey or remove, any such animal out of the Metropolis, except into the City of London, or the liberties thereof: Provided that where any person occupies a farm or other contiguous premises situated partly within and partly without the Metropolis, he may, with a license from the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis, which such Commissioner is hereby empowered from time to time to grant, and, if he think fit, to revoke, and for a time not exceeding seven days from the date of such license, move from one part of such premises to another any animal not affected by the cattle plague which

has been in his own possession for fourteen days previous to the date of such license, and has been marked in such manner as the said Commissioner of Police may direct.

6. No person shall bring or send, or cause to be brought or sent, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf to any market or fair, or to any place, whatever in the Metropolis, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, excepting to the Metropolitan Cattle Market; and no person shall bring or send, or cause to be brought or sent, any such animal to the said Metropolitan Cattle Market, except for the purpose of being there exhibited and sold for immediate slaughtering; and no such animal so brought or sent shall be allowed to leave the said market, unless sold, and marked in the manner in which cattle are ordinarily marked for slaughter in the said market, *videlicet*, by clipping the hair off the end of the tail. And the officers of the said market shall cause such mark to be duly made. And no person shall buy or sell, or cause to be bought or sold, any such animal in the said market, except for immediate slaughtering; and every person buying any such animal in the said market shall slaughter the same, or cause the same to be slaughtered, within seven days of such purchase: Provided that nothing contained in this clause of this Order shall be held to prohibit any person from exhibiting or selling on his own land or premises any animal belonging to him which has been on such land or premises for not less than fourteen days previous to such exhibition or sale, and is not affected by the cattle plague.

7. No person shall remove, or cause to be removed, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, along any highway, thoroughfare, or public place, within the Metropolis, except for a distance not exceeding 500 yards from part to part of the same farm, or to water, without a license from the said Commissioner of Police; and every such license shall state the number and description of animals licensed to be removed, and the place of their destination, and shall be valid only for twenty-four hours from the date thereof: Provided that this clause of this Order shall not apply to any animals intended for immediate slaughtering, which are sent to or from the said Metropolitan Cattle Market.

8. This Order shall come into operation on the fourteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

9. Every person offending against this Order shall, in pursuance of the said Act, for every such offence forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.

THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council, relating to the "cattle plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of the 18th section of their Lordships' Order of the 23rd November, 1865:—

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*City of Coventry.*

PURSUANT to an Order by the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, made

on the 23rd day of November last, I, James Marriott, Esquire, Mayor of the city of Coventry, do, by this notice, declare that it is expedient that every cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, and calf (save and except such fat animals of the above description as may be intended to be, and shall actually be, slaughtered within the said city within the next forty-eight hours after arrival), shall be excluded. And I do hereby give notice, that such animals, except as aforesaid, will be excluded from all markets and fairs to be held within the said city, and from the city generally, until the 1st day of March next ensuing.

And I do hereby further give notice, that no fat cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf will be admitted into the city at all, whether arriving by railway or otherwise, unless the hair of the tail shall have been previously cut off immediately below the dock, and every such animal shall be intended to be, and shall actually be, slaughtered within the city within forty-eight hours after its arrival.

Any person offending against this notice will, for every offence, incur a penalty not exceeding £20.

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.

Notice.

*County of Dumfries.*

By virtue of the powers conferred by an Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 20th day of January, 1866, notice is hereby given, that Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Dumfries, in adjourned Quarter Sessions assembled at Dumfries, on the 31st day of January *curt.*, declare that it is expedient, from the 7th day of February next, until the 1st day of March next, with a view to prevent the spreading of the Cattle Plague, that all raw or untanned hides and skins, and all horns or hoofs of animals, *viz.*, cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and offal of such animals, and also all dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection, shall not be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the jurisdiction of the said Justices; and it shall not be lawful for any person, in contravention of this notice, to bring or send any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection, or other article aforesaid, from any place in Great Britain beyond the jurisdiction of the said Justices into any place within such jurisdiction, but always with and under the exceptions mentioned in said Order of Council. Further, said Justices declare that it is expedient for the foresaid period, with a view to prevent the spreading of the Cattle Plague, that no sheep or swine, from an infected farm, or from any place within one mile from the nearest point of infection, shall be removed from any particular part of the jurisdiction of the Justices to any other part of their jurisdiction, or from place to place generally within their jurisdiction: Further, that for foresaid period all raw or untanned hides, and all horns or hoofs of any animals, *viz.*, cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and offal of any such animal, and also all dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to promote infection, shall not be removed, within the jurisdiction of the said Justices, from an infected farm, or from any place within one mile from the nearest point of infection; and

it shall not be lawful for any person to remove any sheep or swine, or any hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, or other article as aforesaid, within the jurisdiction of the said Justices, in contravention of this notice, excepting under the conditions mentioned in the foresaid Order of Council.

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Buckinghamshire.*

*Adjourned Quarter Sessions.—1st February, 1866.*

*Bucks to wit:*

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, holden at Aylesbury in and for the county of Buckingham, on Monday, in the first week next after the 28th day of December (to wit) the 1st day of January, and thence continued and afterwards holden by adjournment on the 4th day of January, and thence continued by further adjournment, and afterwards holden on the 1st day of February, in the 29th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord, 1866, before the Most Noble Richard Plantagenet Campbell, Duke of Buckingham and Chandos, John Hale, Esquire, the Reverend James Booth, Doctor of Laws, and others, their fellows, Keepers of the Peace and Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to preserve the Peace in the county aforesaid; and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses and other misdemeanors done and committed in the said county, and so forth.

Whereas the Justices of the Peace for the said county of Buckingham, in Quarter Sessions assembled, and sitting in open Court on the said 4th day of January as aforesaid, in pursuance of the powers in them vested as the "local authority" by virtue of two several Orders made by the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date respectively the 23rd day of November, 1865, and the 16th day of December, 1865, resolved and determined to declare, and did declare by notice, published on the 6th day of January, 1866, in newspapers circulating within the counties bordering upon the said county of Buckingham, as well as in newspapers circulating within the jurisdiction of the same Justices, that it was expedient from and after the 6th day of January, 1866, until the 1st day of March, 1866, absolutely to prevent the removal of any one of the animals as in the said Order of the 23rd day of November, 1865, defined, namely, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within their said jurisdiction (to wit), the area of the said county of Buckingham (except the municipal boroughs of Buckingham and Chepping Wycombe) for the purpose of exhibition or sale; and also that it was farther expedient from and after the said 6th day of January until the said 1st day of March, 1866, that animals as lastly hereinbefore defined should not be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within our said jurisdiction: and also that it was further expedient from and after the 10th day of January, 1866, until the said 1st day of March, 1866, that no

cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, should be removed from any one farm or place within their said jurisdiction to any other farm or place therein: and whereas, by another Order made at the Council Chamber, Whitehall, on the 20th day of January, 1866, by eight Lords and others of the said Council, reciting that it was expedient to alter and amend the said Orders of the 23rd day of November and the 16th day of December respectively, the said lastly-mentioned Order did order as in the said Order now in recital is set forth; and the same came into operation on the 25th day of January instant, and is to be in force until the 1st day of March next: and whereas the said lastly recited Order was duly, within fourteen days after the issuing thereof, published in the London Gazette, and also, within fourteen days as aforesaid twice published in a newspaper circulating in the said county of Buckingham: and whereas the said Justices (being such local authority as aforesaid are satisfied of the existence of the disorder, in the said Orders in Council designated the "Cattle Plague," in the district over which their jurisdiction extends, such district being the area of the county of Buckingham aforesaid (excepting as aforesaid): now, therefore, the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled, and sitting in open Court on the said 1st day of February as aforesaid, have resolved and determined to declare, and do hereby declare by this notice, to be published on the third day of February, 1866, in newspapers circulating as well within the jurisdiction of the same Justices as also within the counties bordering upon the said county of Buckingham, that it is expedient on and after the 4th day of February, 1866, until the 1st day of March, 1866, that no animals as in the said Order of the 23rd day of November, 1865, defined, namely, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, shall be removed from any one farm or place in the said county of Buckingham (defined as aforesaid) to any other farm or place therein, except upon the conditions hereinafter specified, namely:—

1. That two Justices sitting in Petty Sessions for the Division, in which the parish may be situate into which it may be proposed to remove or bring any of the animals in this condition specified, may (if they think fit) grant a licence to the owner of any sheep, lambs, goats, or swine, to remove them from premises in his own occupation to other premises also in his own occupation.
2. Provided that such licence shall not be granted in any case if the said disorder called the "Cattle Plague" shall at any time since the 26th day of August, 1865, have appeared or existed either in the parish or place from which it may be proposed to remove any of such animals as last aforesaid, or in any parish or place adjoining thereto, or in any parish or place through which it may be proposed to move such animals, or in the parish or place into which it may be proposed to bring any of such animals,

And further, that it is expedient for and during the said lastly-mentioned period that no raw or untanned hides or skins, nor any horns or hoofs of any animals as defined as aforesaid (except such hides, skins, horns or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), nor any offal of any such animals, as defined as aforesaid, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the county of Buckingham, and that no such hides, skins,

horns, hoofs, or offal shall be removed from any parish, place, or premises within the county of Buckingham (as defined as aforesaid) except upon the condition following, namely:—

That two Justices sitting in Petty Sessions for the Division in which the parish, place, or premises may be situate, from which it may be proposed to move such raw or untanned hides or skins, horns, hoofs, or offal as aforesaid, may (if they think fit) upon the certificate of an Inspector for that Division as to the propriety thereof, grant a licence, for a time to be specified therein, for the removal of such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal as aforesaid from such parish, place, or premises.

And also, that it is expedient, during the period aforesaid, that no dung, hay, straw, fodder or litter, likely to propagate infection shall be brought from any place in Great Britain beyond the county of Buckingham, into any place within the said county (as defined as aforesaid): and also, that it is expedient that no dung, hay, straw, fodder or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be removed from any farm, place, or premises in the same county, to any other farm, place, or premises therein: and, lastly, the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled as aforesaid (being such "local authority") do hereby revoke all the notices given by any "local authority" under or by virtue of the said Order of the 23rd day of November, 1865, other than the notices given by the "local authority" constituted by the said Order of the 16th day of December, 1865, but nothing hereinbefore contained shall vary or revoke any appointment of Inspector heretofore made by any "local authority."

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

### NOTICE No. 2.

*County of Westmorland.*

*Westmorland to wit.*

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden in and for the county of Westmorland, at the Shire Hall for the said county, on Friday the 5th day of January, in the 29th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and from thence continued by several adjournments to and holden at the said Shire Hall, on Saturday, the 3rd day of February, in the said 29th year of the reign of our said Lady the Queen:

Whereas, under or by virtue of Orders by the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 23rd day of November, 1865, the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866, or by some or one of such Orders, the Justices of the Peace in General or Quarter Sessions assembled, are, as the "local authority," empowered, by notice published in any newspaper circulating within their jurisdiction, to declare, that it is expedient that, among other things, animals and articles, or things of the description hereinafter specified, shall not be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within their jurisdiction, with such exceptions as are in the said Order of the 20th of January, and hereinafter mentioned; and it is by

the same Order declared, that it shall not be lawful for any person, in contravention of any such notice, to bring or send any such animals or articles from any place beyond to any place within such jurisdiction:

Now, therefore, this Court doth declare that it is expedient, that any animal or article of the description hereinafter mentioned, shall not be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the jurisdiction aforesaid, with such exceptions as are hereinafter mentioned. And this Court doth order and direct as follows:

1. That all orders made by this Court under the two Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, 1865, and the 16th day of December, 1865, be, and are hereby revoked.

2. That it shall not be lawful for any person to bring any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, goat, or swine, or any raw or untanned hides or skins, or the horns or hoofs, or the offal or dung of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to produce infection, from any place in Great Britain, beyond the aforesaid jurisdiction, that is to say, the county of Westmorland, into any place within such jurisdiction, with such exceptions as are in the said Order or hereinafter mentioned.

3. That it shall not be lawful for any person to remove from one Petty Sessional Division to another within the said jurisdiction, any animal mentioned in this Order, except under a licence or certificate, signed by two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, either acting in and for the division into which, or in and for the division out of which such animal shall be removed, nor unless such animal has been in possession of the owner thereof for at least 21 days, and has not during that time been in contact with diseased cattle.

4. That it shall not be lawful to hold any cattle fairs within the said jurisdiction, nor to remove any animal, mentioned in the said Order, from one place to another for exhibition or sale.

5. That the following persons shall be, and are hereby appointed Inspectors:

William Eastcott, Kendal, Kendal and Lonsdale Wards.

Joseph Pears, Penrith, West Ward.

William Rawes, Keld, Shap, West Ward.

John Harrison, Warcop, East Ward.

John Herd, Appleby, East Ward.

6. That this Order shall come into operation on the 6th day of February instant, and shall be in force until the 1st day of March next.

And notice is hereby given, that any person offending against this Order shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding £20, which the Justices, before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence, may think fit to impose.

Provided always, that it shall be lawful for any person occupying land on the border of the county, with the licence of two Justices, to be in force for such time as in such licence shall be specified, or until such licence shall be withdrawn, to bring his or her cattle into such jurisdiction for the purpose of only watering them, but such person shall not drive his or her cattle along the highway a greater distance than a quarter of a mile for the purpose aforesaid.

And this Court doth declare, in pursuance of the said Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council, that it is expedient that henceforth, until the 1st day of March now next coming, no person shall drive or conduct any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, to or from the parish of Slindon, in the county of Sussex, or drive or conduct any such animal through or by way of such parish, unless the person so removing, driving, or conducting such animal shall have first obtained a certificate in writing, signed by two or more Justices of the said county, that such removal, driving, or conducting may take place without danger of spreading the cattle disease.

That this order be published in the West Sussex Gazette, Sussex Advertiser, and Sussex Express newspapers, and that a copy be sent to the Clerk of Her Majesty's Privy Council, to be published by him in the London Gazette.

That from and after the 6th day of February instant, until the 1st day of March next, if there shall be, or shall have been at any time for a month past, any cattle plague in any place or parish, within the jurisdiction of the Local Authority of the county of Warwick, it shall not be lawful to move any sheep, or any offal of any animal, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, from or out of any such place or parish, into any other place or parish, or along any public road, within the said jurisdiction.

3. Any act wilfully done, in contravention of the said orders, shall subject the offender to the penalty under the statute not exceeding £20.

4. Ordered that these Sessions be further adjourned to Saturday the 17th day of February instant, at two o'clock in the afternoon.

That with the further view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, it is expedient that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said borough from the day of the date of the publication of this notice in the required newspapers until the said 1st day of March next, except as follows and under the following conditions:—

1st. That fat cows, heifers, bullocks, oxen, calves, sheep, lambs, and swine, purchased for slaughter, may be brought into the said borough, provided the same shall be slaughtered within three days.

2nd. That fat cattle, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, may be conveyed through the same borough under a certificate of two Justices of the Peace for the county of Gloucester authorizing their removal from one place to another within the said

county, upon a certificate of a Justice of the Peace for the said borough authorizing the conveyance of the same through the said borough for the purpose of such removal.

And I give notice, that every person offending herein will, for every offence, forfeit a sum not exceeding £20.

1. That every such animal sent or removed from any part of Great Britain to the borough of Warrington shall have been certified by a duly appointed Inspector, under and for the purposes of the said Orders in Council, to be free from the said disorder, and (except as to any such animal brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain to the docks at Liverpool, Fleetwood, or Holyhead, and sent or removed direct by railway from such docks, or from the cattle markets in Liverpool, Stanley, near Liverpool, and Salford,) to have been on premises free from all suspicion of the said disorder for a period of fourteen days previous to such removal, and provided that such animal shall, at the time of arrival, be free from such disorder; and every such certificate shall state the description of the animal, and the time when such animal was inspected, and the place from which it was brought, sent, or removed, and shall accompany such animal, and no such certificate shall be in force for a longer period than four days from the date of such inspection, and a duplicate of such certificate shall forthwith, after the signing thereof, be delivered or sent by post, addressed to "The Chief Constable of the Borough, Warrington."

2. That before being removed from any place within the said borough to any other place within the same borough, every such animal shall be inspected by an Inspector, duly appointed under and for the purposes of the said Orders in Council, for the said borough, and be certified by him to be free from such disorder.

And I give notice that every person offending against any of the conditions, provisions, and stipulations herein contained, will be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20.

At an adjourned Court of Quarter Sessions, held at Beaumaris, on Saturday, the 27th day of January, 1866, the Court made the following Order:—

By virtue and in pursuance of an Order of the Lords of the Privy Council, dated the 23rd of January, 1866, made in pursuance of the Acts of Parliament therein mentioned, the Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled (not revoking any Order heretofore made by any Justices acting in Petty Sessions in the said county), declare that it is expedient and they do hereby order that until the 1st day of March next, it shall not be lawful for any person to bring any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, nor any raw or untanned hides or skins, nor any horns or hoofs of any animals as defined as aforesaid (except as in the said Order in Council is excepted), nor any offal of any such animals as aforesaid, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, whether adhering to any carriage or otherwise, and likely to propagate infection, from any place in the county of Carnarvon, or from any other place in Great Britain beyond the jurisdiction of this Court in that behalf (except only from the borough of Beaumaris), into any place whatever within the jurisdiction of the same, nor to convey or send by railway from any place within their said jurisdiction to any other place within the same, any offal of any animals as above mentioned, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, whether adhering to any carriage or otherwise, and likely to propagate infection.

And they further order, that it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send into, or expose for sale, at any of the markets or fairs, or any other place within their said jurisdiction, except upon his own premises, any animal of the description above mentioned.

And they further order, that, subject to the approval of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, David White Griffith, Esq., the Chief Constable of the said county, be appointed Inspector for matters relating to the cattle plague within their said jurisdiction.

And they further order, that in consideration of the increased duties to be performed by the County Constabulary in carrying out all orders to prevent the spread of infection, the Police Force be increased by three persons, and application made to the Secretary of State for his sanction thereto.

Every person offending against the above-named Order, is liable to a penalty of not exceeding twenty pounds.

*Bedfordshire, to wit.*

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, holden at Bedford, in and for the county of Bedford, on the 2nd day of January, and thence continued by several adjournments to and on the 3rd day of February, in the year of our Lord 1866.

In pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eleventh and twelfth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, "to prevent, until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then next session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has since been from time to time continued by subsequent Acts, and lastly by the "Expiring Laws Continuance Act, 1865," and in pursuance of Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, 1865, and the 16th day of December, 1865: The said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled as aforesaid, and sitting in open Court, on the said 3rd day of February, have resolved and determined to declare, and do hereby declare—

That it is expedient that until the 1st day of March next ensuing no raw or untanned hide, skin, horn, hoof, or offal of any animal as defined by the Order of the Privy Council of the 23rd of November last, shall be brought from any place in Great Britain into the county of Bedford, and that no such hide, skin, horn, hoof, or offal shall be removed from place to place within the said county, except under such conditions as are imposed by the order of the Court of the 13th of January last, with respect to the removal of cattle from place to place within the said county, so far as such conditions are applicable hereto.

That it is expedient that until the 1st day of March next ensuing no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be removed from any place in the said county where the cattle plague exists at the time of such intended removal, or has existed within a period of 42 days next previously thereto, to any other place within the said county.

That it is expedient that until the 1st day of March next ensuing no sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, shall be removed from any part of the county of Bedford where the cattle plague exists at the time of such intended removal, or has existed within a period of 42 days next previously thereto, to any other place within the said county.

Resolved, that so much of the order of the Court of Quarter Sessions made on the 13th day of January last as provides as follows—"but that in the case of breeding cattle, the certificate of the Veterinary Inspector shall be dispensed with, and that any owner or occupier in any parish in the county be allowed to remove any such cattle to a distance not exceeding three miles from the farm homestead where such cattle shall be for breeding purposes without license of Justices, provided that at the time of such intended removal the cattle plague does not exist and has not existed during the space of six weeks within the parish or place from or to which it shall be proposed to remove such cattle"—be revoked, but that nothing contained in the said order shall make it unlawful to send any cow or heifer to a bull to a distance not exceeding three miles from the place from which such cow or heifer shall be so sent, if the cattle plague does not then exist, and has not for the space of 42 days previously thereto existed, within the parish or place from or to which such cow or heifer shall be so sent.

Every person offending against this order will be liable for every such offence to forfeit twenty pounds.

By virtue of an Act passed in the 11th and 12th years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter 107 (which Act has since been from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by the "Expiring Laws' Continuance Act, 1865"), and of certain Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, 1865, the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866,—The Justices of the Peace for this County now assembled do, as the Local Authority constituted by the said Order in Council of the 16th day of December, 1865, by this Notice, to be forthwith published in a newspaper circulating within this county, and also in newspapers circulating in the several counties of Devon, Dorset, Wilts, Gloucester, Monmouth, and Glamorgan, as the counties bordering on this county of Somerset, declare, that it is expedient to make the several Orders hereinafter contained, and do order accordingly:—

1. That on and after the 8th day of February instant, all former notices given by this Court under the Order in Council of the 16th day of December, 1865, be, and the same are hereby revoked, except so far as relates to the appointment of inspectors, which is hereby confirmed; and that all notices given by the former local authorities, under the Order in Council of the 23rd day of November, 1865, or any Order previous thereto, be, and the same are hereby revoked, except so far as relates to the various appointments of inspectors, which appointments are hereby confirmed. Such revocations not to affect any penalties recoverable under any of the notices hereby revoked. And that this Court doth hereby appoint the Chief Constable of this county inspector for the purpose of carrying into effect the rules and regulations made by the said Orders in Council, and the notices and orders of this Court, within the jurisdiction of this county, as the district for which he is appointed, and the several members of the force under his command, inspectors for the respective divisions to which they are respectively attached.

2. That the following Orders take effect on the 8th day of February instant, and continue in force until the 1st day of March next.

3. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and no raw or un-

tanned hide or skin, and no horn or hoof of any such animal as aforesaid (except as in the said Order in Council of the 20th day of January last, is excepted), and no offal of any such animal, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any place in Great Britain beyond the jurisdiction of this county, into any place within such jurisdiction.

Provided that it shall not be unlawful for any person to bring any such animal or article as aforesaid, from any land in his own occupation beyond such jurisdiction, to any land in his own occupation within such jurisdiction, with the licence, in writing, of two Justices acting in and for the jurisdiction into which such animal or article is required to be brought; such licence to be in duplicate, and to specify the number and kinds of animals or articles, and the places from and to which they are to be brought and to be delivered to the person in charge, as an authority for any such removal; and such animals and articles shall be so removed within two days after such licence shall have been signed by such Justices.

4. That no such animal or article as aforesaid, shall be removed from any place within the jurisdiction of this county, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the same jurisdiction, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

5. That no sheep, lamb, goat, or swine be removed from any Petty Sessional Division within the jurisdiction of this county, into any other Petty Sessional Division within the same jurisdiction.

Provided that it shall be lawful for any person to remove such animal as aforesaid, from land in his own occupation, in any Petty Sessional Division within this jurisdiction, to land in his own occupation in any other Petty Sessional Division in the same jurisdiction, where such land shall be situated in parishes adjoining each other; and where such land shall be situated in parishes not adjoining each other, then, with such licence, in writing, as hereinbefore specified, of two Justices acting in and for the Petty Sessional Division into which such animals are required to be removed.

6. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, and no raw or untanned hide or skin, and no horn or hoof of any such animal, or of any sheep, lamb, goat, or swine (except as in the said Order in Council of the 20th day of January last is excepted), and no offal of any such animal as aforesaid, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be removed from any parish within the jurisdiction of this county, to any parish within the same jurisdiction.

Provided that it shall be lawful for any person to remove any such animal or article as aforesaid, from land in his own occupation, situate in any part of a parish within the jurisdiction of this county, to land in his own occupation, situate in any detached or outlying part of the same parish, or in any parish adjoining thereto within the same jurisdiction; and if such person desire to remove any such animal or article to land in his own occupation in a more distant parish, such removal shall only take place with such licence, in writing, as hereinbefore specified, of two Justices acting in and for the Petty Sessional Division into which the said animals or articles are required to be removed.

Provided also, nevertheless, that it shall be lawful for any person to remove any cow, heifer, or bull from land in his own occupation in any parish within the jurisdiction of this county, to land in any adjoining parish within the same jurisdiction and back again to such land in the first-mentioned parish as aforesaid, so that such removal be strictly and solely for breeding purposes.

7. That, if and when the Cattle Plague shall be certified by a duly appointed inspector to exist, or to have existed within 21 days then last past, in any parish within the jurisdiction of this county, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and no raw or untanned hide or skin, and no horn or hoof of any such animal (except as in the said Order in Council of the 20th day of January last is excepted) and no offal of any such animal, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection, shall be removed from place to place within such parish until 21 days after the Cattle Plague shall have ceased to exist in such parish.

Provided that it shall be lawful for any person in the occupation of any land within such parish, during the existence of the Cattle Plague therein, certified as aforesaid, and for the space of 21 days after the Cattle Plague shall have ceased to exist in such Parish, to remove any such animal or article as aforesaid from place to place within the same occupation, where such removal can be made without crossing or passing along any public road, highway, or occupation road, or any land not in the same occupation.

8. That no removals in any of the foregoing clauses of this notice mentioned of any animal or article as aforesaid, whether with or without licence, shall take place upon any public road, highway, or occupation road, between the hours of six o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the morning.

Provided always that nothing hereinbefore contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal or article as aforesaid by railway through the jurisdiction of this county, or to send or carry any such animal or article, if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction, to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of carrying it through or out of such jurisdiction.

And notice is hereby given, that persons offending against the provisions of the said Act of 11th and 12th Vic., cap. 107, and the notices and orders made in pursuance thereof, will be liable for every such offence to a penalty of twenty pounds; and that one-half of all penalties and forfeitures recovered under the Act will be paid to the person who shall sue or proceed for the same.

And farther, that no hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal of the animals as before described, and no dung, hay, or straw, shall be removed from place to place generally, within the said county of Perth, nor from the city of Perth (being a separate jurisdiction), excepting always:—

1. Hides, skins, horns, or hoofs directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America.

2. Such of the foresaid articles as are being taken or sent by railway through the said county.

3. Hay and straw, but these last-named articles only under authority of a license by one or more Justices, and after a declaration made before the Justice to whom he applies, by the person wishing the license as to the destination of the said hay or straw, and that there has been no animal labouring under the cattle disease on the premises from which the said articles are to be removed, and that to places within the county the same shall be removed otherwise than by railway.

4. And dung removed from one part of a farm to another part thereof by the usual roads or ways to the fields.

Notice is hereby given, of the said declaration and resolution, and that every person offending against the same shall, for every offence, be liable in a penalty of £20.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, holden by adjournment, at Carlisle, in and for the county of Cumberland, on Saturday, the 3rd day of February, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria, and in the year of our Lord, 1866, before certain Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lady the Queen, in the same county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanors in the same county committed:

In pursuance of the powers vested in the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled, by three Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November and the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866,

This Court doth order and declare—

## AS TO SHEEP.

1. That under the certificate of two Justices acting in petty sessions, in their usual place of transacting business, sheep may be driven to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of being removed out of the county by railway.

## AS TO SKINS.

2. That under the like certificate, skins of slaughtered sheep may be removed from off the premises where slaughtered, to the nearest convenient railway station or to a tanyard.

## AS TO FAT CATTLE.

3. That under the like certificate, fat cattle may be driven to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of being removed out of the county by railway, subject nevertheless to the same regulations as are now in force for the removal of cattle at farm sales and on change of tenants.

## AS TO PETITION TO PARLIAMENT.

4. And this Court doth further order, that a Petition to Parliament be prepared by the Clerk of the Peace, and signed by the Chairman on behalf of the Court, and forwarded by him for presentation, setting forth the danger arising from the importation of cattle and uncured hides into Great Britain, and from their transmission by railway through the country; and also setting forth the difficulty felt by the Court in dealing with the whole matter, and carrying out such measures as they may deem expedient for endeavouring to arrest the spread of the cattle plague, in consequence of their inability to levy a rate to meet the expenses necessarily incurred, and calling upon Parliament to pass such an Act as in their wisdom they may deem expedient.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Borough of Berwick-upon-Tweed.*

I, JOSEPH WILLIS RUDDOCK, Esquire, Mayor of the county of the borough and town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, being the local authority, as defined in the Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, in this behalf, do hereby, by virtue and in pursuance of the said Orders in Council, declare and give notice, that it is expedient from the day of the date hereof until the

1st day of March next, that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (except for transmission by rail or for slaughter), nor any raw or untanned hide or skin, nor any horns or hoofs of any such animals, or of any sheep, lamb, or goat, such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, not being directly imported from India, Australia, South Africa, or America, shall be brought from any part of Great Britain into any place within my jurisdiction, except under and subject to the following conditions, viz.:—

1st. That all cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, or calves brought into my jurisdiction shall be certified as free from the disorder generally designated as the "Cattle Plague" or "Rinderpest," or any suspicion thereof, by a duly appointed Inspector of the district from which such animals are brought, or a duly appointed Inspector for my jurisdiction; and that such certificate shall be signed by such Inspector; and shall be granted not more than four days prior to the bringing in of such animals, and that the same shall be, on demand, delivered to any police constable for my jurisdiction.

2nd. That a certificate from a Magistrate of the county or borough where such cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, or calves have been kept, certifying that such animals have been kept during fourteen days at least before the date of such certificate, in the same place from whence it is desired to remove the same, and that the said disorder has not been within the parish or within two miles of such place, shall be delivered to the Inspector for my jurisdiction, or to any police constable thereof requiring the same.

3rd. That every such animal as aforesaid sent into my jurisdiction for transmission by rail, shall be trucked and forwarded on the same day on which it is so sent.

4th. That every such animal as aforesaid, sent into my jurisdiction for slaughter, shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours after its arrival, and shall be driven direct to the slaughterhouse, and there kept till killed.

5th. That every raw or untanned hide, skin, horn, or hoof, brought into my jurisdiction, except as aforesaid, shall be certified by a duly appointed Inspector of the district from whence the same has been brought, as having undergone some sufficient process of disinfection, such certificate to be delivered to the Inspector for my jurisdiction, or to any police constable thereof as aforesaid.

Every person offending against the above order shall, for every such offence, forfeit a sum not exceeding £20.

Provided always, that nothing in this order contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animals, or any such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as aforesaid, by railway, through or out of my jurisdiction.

(ORDERS IN COUNCIL.)—11 and 12 Victoria, cap. 107.

*Durham to wit.*

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden at Durham, in and for the county of Durham, by adjournment, on Saturday, the 3rd day of February, in the

29th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord 1866, before Rowland Burdon, Chairman, John Fawcett, William Scurfield Grey, Esquires, and others their Fellows Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lady the Queen, in the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanours done and committed in the said county.

1. Pursuant to, and in exercise of, the powers and authorities in this behalf vested in and conferred upon them by, and in certain Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, having reference to a certain disorder generally designated the "Cattle Plague," and dated respectively the 23rd day of November, 1865, the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866; or by and in one of the same Orders, and in exercise of any other powers enabling them in this behalf, the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled, do hereby revoke and rescind so much and such part and parts only of the order made by this Court on the 17th day of January last past, with reference to the said cattle plague, as is or may be inconsistent with the Orders hereinafter mentioned.

2. It is resolved and ordered that with a view to prevent the spread of the cattle plague, all notices heretofore published, declarations made, acts done, and proceedings taken by local authorities in the several Petty Sessional Divisions of the county of Durham, under or by virtue of the Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, respecting the cattle plague, be, and the same are hereby revoked.

3. That henceforth until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep or lamb, be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any part of the county of Durham, over which this Court has jurisdiction, except that it shall not be unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal by railway through or out of such jurisdiction, or to send or carry any such animal, if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction, to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of carrying and conveying the same through or out of such jurisdiction.

4. That until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep or lamb, be removed from any place within the jurisdiction aforesaid to any other place within the same jurisdiction.

5. That it shall not be deemed a contravention of this order for any person to remove any such animals as aforesaid from one part of a farm to another adjoining part of the same farm, within the jurisdiction aforesaid, although in order to effect such removal it may be necessary to drive or convey such animals over a public highway, or for any person to remove any such animals as aforesaid from one farm to another farm *bond fide* in his or her own occupation, however distant from each other such farms may be respectively, (the term "occupation" being considered as including the entage of turnips on a detached farm), or to drive or take a cow to or from a bull on another farm within such jurisdiction, provided that in all such several cases the person intending so to remove or take such animals, shall previous to such removal, obtain the written consent of two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, such

consent to be granted only on proof to the satisfaction of such Justices that cattle plague does not exist at or in the neighbourhood of the place from whence such removal is proposed to be made, or along the route on which it is proposed to drive, take, remove, or convey the said animals.

6. That it shall not be deemed a contravention of this order for any person to bring a bull from without the jurisdiction aforesaid into the same jurisdiction, or from one part of such jurisdiction into another part of the same jurisdiction, provided a certificate be previously obtained of the perfect health of such bull from two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and an Inspector acting for the place or district from which such bull shall be brought, and with the consent of two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and an Inspector acting within the jurisdiction into which such bull is to be brought.

7. That where a farm is situate partly in the county of Durham and partly in another adjoining county, animals may be removed from such part of the farm as is without the county of Durham to the adjoining part of the farm within the said county.

8. That it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send from any place in Great Britain, beyond the jurisdiction aforesaid, into the same jurisdiction, or from any place or places within such jurisdiction to any other place or places within such jurisdiction, or from place to place generally within such jurisdiction, any raw or untanned hides or skins, or any horns or hoofs of any animals of any description (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa or America), or the offal of any animals, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection; provided always, that nothing contained in this clause of this order shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal or other articles as aforesaid, by railway, through such jurisdiction, or to send or carry any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of carrying them through or out of such jurisdiction, and provided also, that nothing contained in this clause of this order, shall make it unlawful for any person to bring or send with the licence of any two Justices acting in and for the said county, any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, from any land and premises in his own occupation, and beyond such jurisdiction to any other land or premises in his own occupation within the said jurisdiction, during a time to be specified in such licence, or to bring or send the contents of ash pits or privies, or pure horse manure, after the same shall have been disinfected by the use of McDougal's disinfecting powder or chloride of lime, and the certificate of the Inspector of the district into which the same is proposed to be sent or carried shall have been obtained, that the same has been so disinfected and may properly be removed accompanied by the written consent of one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace acting within the district aforesaid.

9. That the person in charge of animals, or other substances, matters or things, permitted to be removed as aforesaid shall carry with and when thereunto required produce to all Inspectors, Policemen, Constables, Overseers, and other pub-

lic officers, requiring the same, the certificates, order, or consent for such removal.

10. That the following Veterinary Surgeons, or duly qualified persons, be appointed Inspectors, for the purpose of carrying into effect the rules and regulations of the said Orders in Council, and of this order, within the several divisions or sub-divisions of this county, that is to say:—

Cattle Plague, unanimously resolved as follows, viz. :—

First. That it be declared, by notice published in terms of the Privy Council Order, of date 20th January, 1866, that it is expedient that, subject to the exceptions and provisions of the said Order, from the date of such publication until the 1st day of March next, no raw or untanned hide or skin, and no horn, hoof, or offal, of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, shall be brought into the county of Inverness, from any other part of Great Britain, both to the south of the Moray Firth, and to the east of the River Spey, or to the south, west, or east, of the county march between the county of Inverness and the counties of Argyle, Banff, Aberdeen, and Perth, and those parts of the county of Moray lying on the south or east side of the Spey.

Second. That it be declared, by notice published in terms of the Privy Council Order, of date 23rd November, 1865, that, without prejudice to the notice by the Justices of the Peace of this county, in Sessions assembled on the 4th December, 1865, it is expedient that for the period from the date of such publication, until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, shall be brought into the county of Inverness from any other part of Great Britain, both to the south of the Moray Firth and to the east of the River Spey, or to the south, west, or east, of the county march between the county of Inverness and the counties of Argyle, Banff, Aberdeen, and Perth, and those parts of the county of Moray lying on the south or east side of the Spey.

Third. That it be declared, by notice published in terms of the said Privy Council Order, that it is expedient, for the period from the date of such publication until the 1st day of March next, that no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter be admitted into this county from any of the northern counties, except under a certificate from a Justice of the Peace that these are the produce of farms in these counties.

Fourth. That intimation be at the same time made, that in terms of the 1st section of the said first-mentioned, and of the 18th section of the said last-mentioned Privy Council Orders respectively, it shall not be lawful for any person, in contravention of such notices, to bring or send any hide, skin, horn, hoof, offal, or other article as aforesaid, or any such animal as aforesaid, into the county of Inverness; and that by the 6th and 22nd sections of the said orders respectively it is declared that any person offending against said orders respectively, shall for every such offence forfeit any sum not exceeding £20 which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence shall think fit to impose.

Provided that no animal as aforesaid shall be removed out of the said parishes of Chaddesley Corbett and Severn Stoke, or from one place to another within the said parishes, except with and subject to a licence of a Justice of the Peace, to be granted in accordance with the declaration of this Court, dated the 3rd day of January last.

3. That it is also expedient, from the 6th day of February instant until the 1st day of March next, that no raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs of any such animals as aforesaid (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa or America), shall be removed out of the parishes, places, hamlets, or chapelries of Knighton-on-Teme, Newnham, Rochford, and Brockamin, or either of them, into any parish or place adjoining the said parishes, places, hamlets, or chapelries, or from one farm to another within the said parishes, places, hamlets, or chapelries.

4. The declarations of this Court in respect of such disease designated as the "Cattle Plague," made on the 3rd, 23rd, and 30th days of January last, are to the foregoing extent only hereby altered, varied, and revoked.

Every person offending against the tenor hereof will for every offence forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted may think fit to impose.

1. That it is expedient that from the 7th day of February instant (the date of the publication hereof), until the 1st day of March next, no raw or untanned hides and skins, nor any horns or hoofs of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine (except such hides, skins, horns or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa or America), nor any offal of any such animals as aforesaid, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder or litter likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within such part of the said county over which, by virtue of the said Orders in Council, some or one of them, this Court, as the "Local Authority" in the said county, has jurisdiction.

2. That it is also expedient that from and after the 7th day of February instant, until the 1st day of March next, the order or declaration of the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled, on the 4th day of January last, restricting the removal of cattle from one place to another along the public highways of the said county (except under certain conditions), be extended in like manner to sheep, lambs, goats and swine; and also to all raw and untanned hides and skins, horns or hoofs of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine (except as aforesaid), which shall only be removed from place to place in the said county, and within the jurisdiction of the Local Authority of the same county, except under the following conditions:— That such hides, skins, horns, and hoofs of horned cattle, may be removed from the premises of the slaughterer to a tan-yard within 48 hours of the time of slaughter, and be there immediately disinfected in the lime pits; and that the skins of sheep, lambs, and goats may be removed in like manner, and within the same period, to a fell-monger's yard, and be there immediately and effectually disinfected.

3. That it is also expedient between the dates aforesaid, between the hours of sunrise and sunset, to permit any cow, heifer or sow, requiring to go to the bull or hog, to pass along any highway within the said county, either with or without a companion for such purpose only, with the license in writing of one Justice of the Peace, to be in force for seven days.

4. That it is also expedient that the certificate for the removal of store cattle required by the said Order or Declaration of the 4th day of January last to be signed by two Justices at Petty Sessions, may be executed by any two Justices of such Petty Sessional Division acting in the presence of each other at any time.

5. And that it is expedient that fat animals be permitted to be removed from the parish of Twynning in this county, through the borough of Tewkesbury and into this county again, under a proper certificate in accordance with the said Order or Declaration of the 4th day of January

last, and with the license of the Mayor of the said borough.

The declarations of the Justices of the Peace of the said county, in Quarter Sessions assembled, being the Local Authority in and for the said county, in respect of such disease designated as "The Cattle Plague," made on the 4th day of January last, are, to the foregoing extent only, hereby altered and varied.

1st. That it is expedient that, for the period from the publication of this notice, until the 1st day of March next, no raw or untanned hide or skin, and no horns or hoofs of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or goat (except such hides, skins, horns or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), and no offal of such animals as aforesaid, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the jurisdiction of the Justices, as the local authority for the county of Stirling, all in terms and within the meaning of the first section of the said Order in Council, dated 20th January, 1866, and subject to the provisions therein contained.

2nd. That it is expedient that, for the foresaid period, no sheep, lamb, or goat, and no raw or untanned hide or skin, and no horns or hoofs, of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or goat (excepting such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom as aforesaid), and no offal of such animals as aforesaid, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, be removed from place to place within the said jurisdiction, in terms and within the meaning of the fourth clause of the Order in Council, dated the 16th day of December last (as amended by the third clause of the Order in Council, dated 20th January last), and of the second clause of the Order in Council, dated the said 20th January last, under the provisions contained in these clauses, and under the farther provision, that, notwithstanding this declaration, it shall be lawful for any person to remove such sheep, lambs, or goats, or any of them, and the offal, and the raw or untanned hide and skin, and horns and

hoofs, of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or goat, and any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, from place to place on the same farm, and across or along any public road, so far as intersecting such farm, provided that no animals on such farm, or in any premises connected therewith, are, or have been, affected by said disorder, and that no stock formerly on such farm has been so affected while thereon; or to remove such sheep, lambs, and goats, or any of them, from the farm or premises where they have been for twenty-one days at least prior to such removal, for the exclusive purpose of being slaughtered, and that within forty-eight hours thereafter, or for the purpose of being conveyed forthwith by railway out of the jurisdiction, or to remove such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, from place to place within the said jurisdiction, provided that a licence for such removal shall have been obtained within twenty-four hours previous thereto, from a Justice of the Peace for the county, upon a declaration emitted in his presence by the owner of such animals, hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, offal, dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, that such animals are not, and have not been, affected by said disorder, and that no animals on his farm, or in his premises, are, or have been, so affected, and that no stock formerly on said farm has been so affected while thereon, and that such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, and offal, are not the hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal of animals which have been affected by said disorder, and have not been in premises in which there has been the said disorder, and that the said dung, hay, straw, fodder or litter has not been on any farm, or in any premises where there has been the said disorder.

And notice is hereby further given, that every person offending against the said Orders, and the foregoing resolution and notice, shall, for every such offence, forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

Now, therefore, I, the undersigned, George Yeates Hunter, Esq., Mayor of the said borough of Margate, do hereby, by authority of the Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November last, and the 16th day of December last (made in pursuance of the several Acts of Parliament therein mentioned), and in the exercise of the powers conferred on me thereby, on and after the 9th day of February instant, revoke the said orders made by me and notice given for the said borough on the 24th day of January last, and in lieu thereof, order, give notice, and declare, that on and from the said 9th day of February instant to the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bullock, ox, or calf, sheep, goat, or swine, shall be removed to any market or fair

within the said borough for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

And, that on and from the said 9th day of February instant to the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be brought or removed from any place without the said borough to any place within the said borough; nor be on, nor pass over, along, or across any street, highway, or public road within the said borough.

Provided always, that nothing in this order contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal by railway through or out of the said borough; or to send or carry any such animal, if brought by sea, from any place out of Great Britain into the said borough to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of carrying it through or out of the said borough.

That Henry Saunders, the Superintendent of Police of this borough, be appointed Chief Inspector, for the purpose of carrying into effect the rules and regulations made by the Orders of the Lords of the Privy Council of the 23rd November and 16th December last, for the said borough of Margate.

And I also hereby further order, that notice of the aforesaid Orders be published within the jurisdiction of this borough, and in the *Kentish Observer* of Thursday next.

And under the hereinbefore-mentioned Order, and a certain other Order made by the said Privy Council on the 20th day of January, 1866, I further order and declare, that no raw or untanned hides or skins, nor any horns or hoofs of any animal, as defined in the said last-mentioned Order, except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America, shall after the due publication of this notice, be brought by railway or water carriage, into the jurisdiction of the same borough, until the 1st day of March next.

After the publication of this notice, any person offending against the above Order, will for every offence forfeit a sum not exceeding £20.

*Huntingdonshire, Epiphany Sessions, 1866.*

At the General Quarter Session of the Peace, holden at Huntingdon in and for the county of Huntingdon, on Monday, the 1st January, continued by adjournments until the 7th day of February, in the year of our Lord 1866, before George Rust, Philip Tillard, Denis Herbert, Esqs., Rev. Plummer Pott Rooper, Rev. Arthur Fanshaw Stopford, and others their fellows Justices.

In pursuance of an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 16th day of December, 1865, transferring all the powers contained in the Order of the said Privy Council of the 23rd day of November last, from the Justices acting in and for the several petty sessional divisions of the said county to the Justices of the Peace for the said county in Quarter Sessions assembled as the local authority for the purpose of carrying into effect the said Orders in Council, and in pursuance of the further Order of the said Privy Council, dated the 20th day of January, 1866, the said Justices at these Quarter Sessions, as the said local authority in the said county of Huntingdon (excepting only the municipal boroughs of Huntingdon and Godmanchester), having weighed and well considered the several matters referred to them, do make and pass the several resolutions and orders next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

1st. It is resolved and ordered that all notices and orders heretofore issued by the Justices of the Peace in and for the said county, in Quarter Sessions assembled, as the local authority thereof, and now in force for the said county, be revoked on and from the 10th day of February instant, except as to any liability which may have been incurred, or any legal proceedings which may have been taken under any or either of the said previous orders or notices.

2nd. It is further resolved and ordered that the Chief Constable of this county be appointed Chief Supervisor, for the purpose of carrying into effect the rules and regulations made by the Orders of the Lords of the Privy Council, of the 23rd day of November, the 16th day of December, and the 20th day of January last respectively, and the notices and orders given by the Court within their jurisdiction; that the Superintendents, acting Superintendents, and Sergeants under the command of the said Chief Constable, be appointed Supervisor for the respective divisions to which for the time being they may be attached, and that all Inspectors of Cattle already appointed by any person or persons acting as such local authority as last aforesaid, be and are hereby re-appointed Inspectors of Cattle for the respective divisions in which they were Inspectors of Cattle immediately before the said 20th day of January last.

3rd. And it is further ordered that from and after the publication of this notice, until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, shall be brought, sent or removed to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said county for the purpose of exhibition or sale, and that it will be unlawful to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell any such animal so brought or sent.

4th. And it is further ordered that from and after the publication of this notice until the 1st day of March next, no such animal, or the offal, horns, or hoofs of any such animal, and no raw or untanned hides and skins, except sheep skins, and except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, be brought into any place

within the said county from any other part of Great Britain, except as hereinafter provided.

5th. And it is further ordered that from and after the publication of this notice, until the 1st day of March next, no such animal or article as aforesaid, with the aforesaid exception, and except sheep, hay, and straw, shall be removed from place to place within the said county of Huntingdon, except under such license as hereinafter provided.

6th. And it is further ordered that all licences granted by any Justice as hereinafter provided shall be immediately returned by post, at the termination of the license, to the Justice who shall have granted the same.

7th. And it is further ordered that no animal or article as aforesaid shall be removed under any such license, except between the hours of seven o'clock in the morning and six o'clock in the evening.

Provided always, that

1. As to clause 4.—1. Any person may send or carry any such animal or article as aforesaid by railway through the said county; 2. By license first obtained from any two Justices acting in and for the said county, any person may, during a time to be named in such license, bring or send any sheep which have been his own property for at least two months previously, or hay or straw from any land or premises in his own occupation, or which he may have temporarily hired for the purpose of agistment beyond the limits of the said county, to any other land or premises in his own occupation within the said county. Provided that on making application for such license he produce to such Justices a certificate from the Cattle Plague Inspector of the district in which such sheep, hay, or straw respectively have been kept, that for twenty-one days previous no case of cattle plague has existed on the premises or occupation from which such removal is desired, and that the sheep have been kept on land at a distance of half a mile at least from any land or premises in or upon which any cattle disease may have existed within a period of twenty-one days.
2. By license of a Justice of the said county first obtained, any person may move, during a time to be named in such license, not exceeding seven days, sheep and manure, being his own property, for a mile; any other such animal or article as aforesaid, being his own property, for any distance not exceeding two hundred yards, along any highway or public road, for the purpose of removing the same from one part to another part of his occupation, where such parts respectively adjoin the said highway or public road, upon proof to the satisfaction of such Justice that such removal is to be solely from lands to lands in the same occupation, and that for twenty-eight days previous to such removal no case of cattle plague had existed on the land or premises from or to which such removal is desired. By such license as aforesaid, hay or straw may be moved for any distance along such highway or public road.
3. By license first obtained from a Justice of the Petty Sessional Division within which a cow, heifer, or sow may be kept, any owner of such cow, heifer, or sow may send the same to a bull or boar respectively within a distance of five miles from or to any place within the said county, upon proof to the satisfaction of such Justice that for two months previous to the application for such

license no case of cattle plague had existed on the respective farms on which such animals as named in this proviso had been kept, and upon production of a written consent from the owner of such bull or boar.

4. By license first obtained from a Justice qualified as last aforesaid, any fat animals as aforesaid may be removed from place to place within the said county upon proof to the satisfaction of such Justice that for twenty-eight days previous to such removal no case of cattle plague had existed on the farm or premises from which such removal was desired; such license shall state the places from and to which such removal is desired, the route to be taken, and the time, not exceeding two days, during which such license shall be valid; and every such fat animal, if of the cattle tribe, shall, before its removal, be conspicuously marked, videlicet, by clipping off all the hair at the end of the tail, and with the letter X on the near hip; and every such fat animal for which such license is obtained shall be slaughtered within four days after such removal.
5. Every such license as aforesaid shall, during the removal of such animal or article as aforesaid respectively, be carried by the person in charge of the animal or article removed, and such person shall be bound to produce such license on demand made by any Inspector of Cattle, Police Supervisor, Parish Constable, or other person, and the owner of such animal or article shall be responsible for the fulfilment of this condition.

And notice is hereby given, that every person offending against the terms of these orders is liable to a penalty of £20 for every such animal or article so unlawfully dealt with; and in compliance with the provision contained in the Act 11 & 12 Vict. c. 107, one half of all penalties and forfeitures recovered under the Act will be paid to the person who shall sue or proceed for the same.

#### ORDER.

At the General Quarter Session of the Peace and Gaol Delivery of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, holden at Hertford, in and for the county of Hertford, on Monday, the 1st day of January, in the 29th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord, 1866, and continued thence by several adjournments to, and holden at, the same place on Saturday, the 3rd day of February, in the year aforesaid, before the Most Honourable James Brownlow, William Gascoyne, Marquess of Salisbury, K.G., William Parker, Esq., Baron Dimsdale, and others, their fellows Justices of our said Lady the Queen, appointed to conserve the Peace within the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and misdemeanors committed within the same.

Whereas under or by virtue of Orders by the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 23rd day of November, 1865, the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866, or by some or one of

such Orders, the Justices of the Peace for the said county in General or Quarter Session assembled, are, as the "Local Authority" empowered by notice published in any newspaper circulating within their jurisdiction, to declare that it is expedient that (amongst other things) the articles or things hereinafter specified, shall not be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within their jurisdiction, with such exceptions as in the said Order of the 20th January, and hereinafter mentioned, and it is by the same Order declared that it shall not be lawful for any person in contravention of any such notice to bring or send any such articles from any place beyond to any place within such jurisdiction.

Now, therefore, this Court doth declare that it is expedient that the articles hereinafter mentioned shall not be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the jurisdiction aforesaid, with such exceptions as hereinafter mentioned.

And further, this Court doth order and direct as follows:—

1. It shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send any raw or untanned hides or skins, or the horns or hoofs, or the offal, of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or goat, or the hides or skins of any swine, or any dung, or any litter likely to propagate infection, from any place in Great Britain beyond the aforesaid jurisdiction, into any place within such jurisdiction.

2. The following articles are excepted out of this order:—

- A. Articles of the description aforesaid sent or carried by railway through the jurisdiction aforesaid.

- B. Articles of the description aforesaid, brought or sent with the license of any two Justices acting in and for the aforesaid jurisdiction, by any person from any land and premises in his own occupation and beyond such jurisdiction, to any other land or premises in his own occupation within such jurisdiction, during a time to be specified in such license.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the 10th day of February inst., and shall be in force until the 1st day of March next.

Notice is hereby given, that any person offending against this Order will for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding £20, which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.

or skins, horns or hoofs, of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), or the offal of any such animals, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said borough (except such enumerated articles be brought from any other part of the county).

And I do hereby further order and declare that it is expedient, from and after the said 2nd day of February, 1866, that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be removed by railway from any point within the said county of Montgomery into the said borough; and that it shall not be lawful for any Railway Company, or for any agents or servants of such Company, or any other person whomsoever, to remove or convey any such animals, or the skins or hides before enumerated, from any station of or point on any railway into the said borough.

Every person offending herein, will, for every offence, forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden at Stafford, in and for the said county of Stafford, upon Monday, the 1st day of January, in the year of our Lord 1866, and from thence adjourned day by day until Wednesday, the 3rd day of the said month of January, and from thence adjourned until Monday, the 5th day of February, 1866, before the Right Honourable Thomas George, Earl of Lichfield, Chairman, Thomas Fletcher Twemlow, Esq., and others their fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace in the county aforesaid; and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanors, committed in the same county.

1. It is ordered and declared, by this notice, given in pursuance and by virtue of three Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, and the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866, that it is expedient with a view to prevent the spreading of the contagious and infectious disease, generally designated the "Cattle Plague," to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, to any market or fair within the said county of Stafford (except the market held at Stoke-upon-Trent) for the purpose of exhibition or sale, from the 8th day of February, 1866, to the 1st day of March, 1866.

2. And it is further ordered and declared by this notice that from and after the publication of this notice, and for and during the said period from the said 8th day of February to the 1st day of March 1866, it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, into any market or fair within the said county of Stafford (except as aforesaid) for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell,

any such animal so brought or sent. Provided that nothing in this notice contained, shall be held to prohibit any person from exhibiting or selling on his own land or premises any animal belonging to him, which has been on such land or premises for not less than fourteen days previous to such sale. And provided also, that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, shall be removed from any part of the said county of Stafford to the Stoke-upon-Trent market, except under the conditions by this notice hereinafter imposed and declared, with respect to the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, from place to place within the said county of Stafford.

3. And it is further ordered and declared, that it is expedient with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disease called the "Cattle Plague," that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine, shall be removed from place to place within the said county of Stafford, from the 8th day of February to the 1st day of March, 1866, except under such conditions as are hereinafter imposed, and which conditions are hereby declared to be as follows:

#### *Exceptions.*

4. The owner of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine, who shall wish to remove any such animal from place to place within the said county of Stafford, shall fill up and sign a separate certificate for each such animal he shall desire to remove, with the following particulars:—

The name of the parish or place from which each such animal is intended to be removed, the name of the owner of each such animal, and a description of each such animal, the place to which it is intended to remove each such animal, the route each such animal is to travel, and the name of the person to whom each such animal is to be delivered; and it shall also be certified therein that the parish or place from which each such animal is to be removed is then free from the cattle disease, and that each such animal is also free from disease, and has not been exposed in any public market or place within the space of forty days from the date of such certificate; and the said certificate when so filled up and signed by the said owner, shall also be signed by two members of a district committee of the County of Stafford Cattle Insurance Company, or by a duly appointed Inspector of the North Staffordshire Cattle Insurance Company, or by two members of the Board of Guardians of the Union from which it is proposed to remove each such animal (each such guardian being an owner of not less than three head of horned cattle in the said union) who shall have personally seen each such animal within twenty-four hours prior to their or his signing the said certificate. And one of such persons not being the owner, shall sign the said certificate in the presence of a Justice of the Peace acting in and for the Petty Sessional Division of the said county of Stafford, in which the place from which it is intended to remove each such animal is situated, who being satisfied of the truth of such certificate, shall countersign the same, and indorse thereon a license to remove each such animal to the place and by the route named in such certificate on a day to be named in such license, between the hours of 6 a.m., and 6 p.m. And such certificate, with the license indorsed thereon as aforesaid, shall be delivered by the owner of each such animal to the drover of each such animal, and shall be produced by him on demand to any person requiring to inspect the same. And such certificate shall be valid

and available only for the day for which it is granted, and for the removal of the animal described therein, to the place described therein, and for no other purpose whatsoever.

5. With the consent of the said Justices any number of sheep, lambs, or swine may be included in one certificate and license.

6. When any such animal having been removed under the conditions and with such license as aforesaid, shall be sold by public auction for immediate slaughter, each such animal shall be slaughtered, at the place of sale.

7. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the owner of any cow usually kept at night within any building in any town or place, from driving such cow, so long as the said cow shall continue free from disease, to and from her pasture daily, for the purpose of milking and housing such cow, upon such owner obtaining a license from two Justices of the Peace acting in and for the Petty Sessional Division of the county of Stafford, in which the place where the cow is kept is situated, that such cow is free from disease.

8. Nothing herein contained shall prevent any person from driving any such cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine, from any part of a farm in his own occupation to any other part of the same farm, so long as the animals on his farm or land are free from disease, and so long as there is no cattle plague in the neighbourhood of such farm or land, upon his obtaining the license of any two Justices acting in and for the said county.

9. Any Justice of the Peace for the county of Stafford may grant a license to move any cow or heifer, which has been in the possession of the owner for one month at least prior to the date of such license, to the bull, such license to specify the name of the owner of the cow, or heifer, the place from which the cow or heifer is removed, and the place to which the cow or heifer is to go; and also to state that the Justice of the Peace granting the license is satisfied that no cattle plague exists either at the place where the cow or heifer is to be removed from, or where the cow or heifer is to be removed to, the bull, such license to be in force for seven days.

10. Any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine, bought in the Wolverhampton market, or in the Stoke-upon-Trent or Hanley markets, in the county of Stafford, and coming into the jurisdiction of the county of Stafford, from the Wolverhampton or Hanley markets, or coming from the Stoke-upon-Trent market, with a separate certificate for each such animal, signed by the Inspector of the market from which each such animal shall come, that each such animal is free from disease, and is bought for immediate slaughter, each such animal being also branded with the date of the day of sale, shall be allowed to proceed within the jurisdiction of the county of Stafford, from the said Wolverhampton market, to any place within the limits of the parliamentary borough of Wolverhampton, and to either of the following places, Wednesbury, Darlaston, Tipton, and Westbromwich, and from the said Stoke-upon-Trent and Hanley markets to any place within the limits of the parliamentary borough of Stoke-upon-Trent, in each and every case with the license of two Justices of the Peace acting in and for the Petty Sessional Divisions of Wolverhampton and Bilston, or Stoke-upon-Trent respectively, such license specifying the place at which each such animal is to be delivered for slaughter, the date of the purchase, and the name of the party to whom each such animal is consigned for slaughter. Provided each such animal

be slaughtered within five clear days from such day of sale.

11. Each such animal shall proceed to its destination by the nearest direct road; and on arriving at its destination shall be kept in some building or shed, and shall not at any time on such journey or afterwards be turned out or exposed in any land or open place.

*Removal from another county or jurisdiction into the county of Stafford.*

12. And it is further ordered and declared by this notice, that it is expedient that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain (except the boroughs of Wolverhampton and Hanley, under the conditions hereinbefore provided) into any place within the said county of Stafford (except by railway into the town of Stoke-upon-Trent) from the 8th day of February to the 1st day of March, 1866, and that from and after the publication of this notice, and from the said 8th day of February to the said 1st day of March, 1866, it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send any such animal from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said county of Stafford, except as aforesaid.

13. Nothing in the orders and notices of Quarter Sessions of the 3rd day of January, 1866, or in these present orders or notices contained, shall make it unlawful for the London and North Western Railway Company to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, to and from their cattle station at Wednesfield Heath, to and from the borough of Wolverhampton.

14. Nothing contained in this notice shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such last named animals by railway, through the jurisdiction of the county of Stafford.

15. No animal whatever shall be removed from place to place within the said county of Stafford between the hours of six o'clock, p.m., and six o'clock, a.m.

*Hides, Skins, Manure, Hay, Straw, &c.*

16. And it is further ordered that no raw or untanned hides, nor any skins, hoofs, horns, or offal, of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine—and also that no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the county of Stafford.

17. And it is further ordered that no raw or untanned hides, nor any skins, hoofs, horns, or offal, of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine—and also that no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be removed from place to place within the said county of Stafford, without the license of two Justices of the Peace of the said county.

18. It shall be lawful for any Justice or Justices of the Peace for the said county of Stafford from time to time to withdraw any license granted by him or them under the powers in this notice contained.

19. The word owner, in this notice contained, shall include any bailiff in the actual management of and residing upon any farm in the county of Stafford.

20. It is ordered, that the several orders relative to the disease called the "Cattle Plague," made at the Court of Quarter Sessions, held in

and for the said county by adjournment, on Wednesday, the 3rd day of January, 1866, are to the extent and in the manner hereinbefore contained, varied and amended.

#### PROHIBITION OF THE IMPORTATION OF THE CARCASSES OF CATTLE AND SHEEP INTO THE ISLE OF MAN.

2. That from the date of this Order, no offal, dung, or fodder shall be imported into this Isle, or into any of the ports thereof.
