IT is hereby notified that the Earl of Clarendon, K.G., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Santiago a Despatch, which encloses a Letter from the Commander-in-Chief of the Spanish Naval Forces in the Pacific to the Consular Body at Valparaiso, announcing "that the Blockade maintained by the forces under his command is for the present limited to the ports of Valparaiso and Caldera."

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Swithin, situate in the township of Kennington, in the county of Berks, and in the diocese of Oxford.

"Whereas the said township of Kennington comprises certain portions of the parish of Sunningwell, and of the parish of Radley, both in the county and diocese aforesaid, which said portions lie contiguous one to another, and contain a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Sunningwell and of the said parish of Radley, comprised within the township of Kennington, as aforesaid, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Swithin, situate in such township as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, and of Sir George Bowyer, of Radley Park, in the said county of Berks, Baronet, the patron both of the rectory of the said parish of Sunningwell and of the cure of the said parish of Radley (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Sunningwell, and of the said parish of Radley, which are comprised within the township of Kennington as aforesaid, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Swithin, situate in the same township as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Swithin, Kennington,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, and by his successors, bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Swithin, Kennington, being:—

"All those portions of the two parishes of Sunningwell and Radley, both in the county of Berks, and in the diocese of Oxford, which are comprised within and are co-extensive with the limits of the township of Kennington."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Oxford.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Bute.

THE Justices of the Peace of the county of Bute, by virtue of the power conferred on them by the Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated 20th January, 1866, do hereby declare, in addition to their declaration of date the 27th November last, that it is expedient for the period from the date of this notice to the 1st day of March, 1866, that no raw or untanned hides, or skins, and no horns, or hoofs, of any animals, as defined by the Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council of 23rd November, 1865 (viz., any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine), except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America, and no offal of any such animals as aforesaid, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the county of Bute.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Carnarvon.

By virtue and in pursuance of certain Orders by the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866, made in pursuance of the several Acts of Parliament therein mentioned, we, Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Carnarvon, assembled in Quarter

Sessions, held at Carnarvon, in and for the said county, on Saturday, the 10th day of February, 1866, do now by this notice order and declare, that until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, goat, or swine, or any raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs of any such animals, or the offal of any such animals, or any dung, lay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be removed or taken from any part or parts of the county of Carnarvon, lying to the east of the River Conway, into any other part or parts of the same county, for any purpose or under any conditions whatever, except as hereinafter provided.

And further, that until such 1st day of March next, no such animals as aforesaid, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid shall be removed or taken to any market or fair, within any part of the said county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

And that no such animals, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, shall be brought into the said county, or any part thereof, from any place or places whatsoever (except that cattle, sheep, and pigs for immediate slaughter, or hay, straw, and fodder may be brought by road only into the said county from any part of the county of Anglesey, except the parish of Holyhead).

Provided always that it shall not be unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animals, or any hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, by railway through the said county.

Provided also that it shall not be unlawful for any person to remove or take hay, straw, and fodder, by road only, and for the purpose of feeding cattle only, but not for sale, from any part or parts of the county of Carnarvon, lying to the east of the river Conway, into any other part or parts of the same county, with a license signed by two Justices of the same county, during a time to be specified in such license.

Provided also that it shall not be unlawful for any person to bring or send (with a license signed by two Justices of the same county), any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, from any land or premises in his own occupation, beyond the jurisdiction of the said county, which shall be free from the cattle disease, to any other land or premises in his own occupation within the jurisdiction of the said county, during a time to be specified in such license.

Every person offending against the above Order is liable to a penalty of not exceeding £20.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Great Torrington.

By virtue of the Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, the 16th day of December, and the 20th day of January last, I hereby order and declare as follows:—

That it is expedient to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or goat to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the borough of Great Torrington, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, until the 1st day of March next.

That it is expedient that, until the said 1st day of March, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or goat be brought from any other

part of Great Britain into this borough, or be removed from any place within this borough to any other place therein, unless the owner shall have previously applied to the borough police and obtained a Justices' license for such removal.

Provided that it shall be lawful for any person, without such license, to remove his own cattle from land or premises in his own occupation, either within or beyond the said borough, to any other such land or premises within the said borough, unless such cattle shall in the course of removal be driven or carried over more than two miles of any turnpike-road, highway, public road, or sides thereof, or any unenclosed land.

That it is expedient that, until the said 1st day of March, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or goat be removed over or along any turnpike-road, highway, public road, or sides thereof, or any unenclosed land, within the said borough, between the hours of six in the evening and six in the morning.

And I hereby give notice, that all persons offending against this order will be liable to a penalty of £20 for every such offence.

Shropshire Sessions, 10th February, 1866.

ORDER AS TO HIDES, &c.

In pursuance of the Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated 20th January, 1866, the Justices of the Peace assembled at this Court of Quarter Sessions with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder designated as the Cattle Plague, do, in addition to their order of the 6th of January last, prohibiting the removal of cattle in the said county, except to lands adjoining, and in the same occupation, by this notice declare, that it is expedient, that upon and after this 10th day of February instant, and until the 1st day of March next, no raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), or the offal of any such animals; and also that no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain, into any place within the said county of Salop, or removed from any place whatever within the said county of Salop, to any other place within such jurisdiction, provided always that nothing contained in this Order shall make it unlawful for any person to bring or send with the licence of any two Justices acting for the said county, any such hides, skins, horns, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, from any lands and premises in his own occupation, and beyond the jurisdiction aforesaid, to any other lands or premises in his own occupation, within the said jurisdiction, during the term hereinbefore mentioned.

CATTLE PLAGUE NOTICE.

Cumberland, to wit.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, holden by adjournment at Carlisle, in and for the county of Cumberland, on Saturday, the 10th day of February, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria, and in the year of our Lord 1866, before certain Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lady the Queen, in the same county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanors, in the same county committed.

In pursuance of the powers vested in the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled, by three Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November and the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866,

This Court doth order and declare—

As to Swine.

1. That under the certificate of two Justices acting in Petty Sessions, in their usual place of transacting business, swine may be carted to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of being removed out of the county by railway.

As to Fat Cattle.

2. That the distance from the cattle plague within which fat cattle may be driven to a railway be reduced from two miles to one mile.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Derbyshire, to wit.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the county of Derby, holden at Derby, on Tuesday, the 2nd day of January, 1866, and thence continued by several adjournments to Wednesday, the 7th day of February, before Thomas William Evans, Esq., M.P., Chairman, Robert William Mills Nesfield, Esq., Deputy Chairman, and others, Justices, &c., appointed to preserve the Peace in the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies and trespasses in the said county committed.

Pursuant to, and by virtue of an Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, of the 20th day of January, 1866, and of the Statutes and Orders therein mentioned or referred to, the said Justices (being the local authority in and for the said county of Derby) have, at the said Adjourned Sessions held on the said 7th day of February instant, resolved to declare, and do hereby declare and give notice, that within the jurisdiction of the Justices of the said county, in Quarter Sessions assembled; that is to say, the whole of the said county, except the borough of Derby:

1. That it is expedient that, from the 10th day of February instant until the 1st day of March next, no raw or untanned hides or skins, or any horns or hoofs of any animals, as defined by an Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council of the 23rd day of November, 1865 (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America); that is to say, of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine, or the offal of any such animals as aforesaid, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder; or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought

from any place in Great Britain beyond such jurisdiction into any place within such jurisdiction: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, by railway through such jurisdiction, or to bring or send, with the license of any two Justices of the said county, any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, from any land and premises in his own occupation, and beyond such jurisdiction, to any other land or premises in his own occupation, within such jurisdiction, during a time to be specified in such license.

2. That from the 10th day of February instant until the 1st day of March next, the clause No. 5 of the Order made at an adjourned General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the county of Derby, on the 24th day of January last, shall extend to all animals as defined by the said Order of the 23rd day of November, 1865, and hereinbefore specified; and also to all raw or untanned hides and skins, and all horns and hoofs of any such animals (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), and to the offal of any such animals as aforesaid; and also to all dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection: Provided always, that nothing contained in this clause of this Order shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animals, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction, to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of carrying them through or out of such jurisdiction.

3. That it is expedient that after the word "home-land" in the Clause 5, No. 8, of the said Order of Sessions of the 24th of January last, shall be added the words "or to or from the nearest public watering place;" so that after the said 10th day of February instant, the said Clause 5, No. 8, shall be read and construed as if the words "or to or from the nearest public watering place" had been originally inserted therein.

4. That the certificate required by Clause 5 of the said Order shall (except in case of fat animals purchased by a butcher for immediate slaughter, and removed direct to some slaughter-house) state (in addition to the matters required by the said Order) that the animal proposed to be removed has not been exposed at any sale by auction within seven days of the date of such certificate.

And it is hereby ordered that these Sessions be adjourned to Wednesday, the 21st day of February instant, to be then held at the County Hall, in Derby, at twelve o'clock,

PENALTY £20.

Every person offending against this Order will, for every such offence, forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted may think fit to impose.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Lincolnshire, Holland.

At a General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, held (by adjournment) at Boston, in and for the Parts of Holland, in the county of Lincoln, on Wednesday, the 7th day of February, 1866, before the Rev. John Wilson (chairman), the Rev. Basil

Beridge, the Rev. John Tunnard, Major Moore, Major Hopkins, Joseph C. Barker, Esq., the Rev. Edw. Moore, the Rev. C. F. Newmarch, Thomas Garfit, Esq., the Rev. H. T. Fletcher, Adderley Howard, Esq., the Rev. C. A. Moore, Robt. Everard, Esq., Justices acting in and for the Parts aforesaid, the Court having under its consideration the several Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council concerning the prevailing disorder known as to the "Cattle Plague," and being desirous to give full effect to the said Orders, with the view to check the further spreading of the said disorder, do order and declare—

Firstly. That the disease known as "the Cattle Plague" is in existence in the division of Holland, and that from and after the 9th day of February instant all Orders previously given by this Court under any of the various Orders in Council shall be and they are hereby revoked, except as to any penalties incurred, or the appointment of any Inspector or Inspectors made, under any of the said Orders.

And it is further ordered and declared,

Secondly. That it is expedient, from henceforth until the 1st day of March next, to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, swine, or sheep (excepting as hereafter provided), whether fat or store, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the Parts of Holland aforesaid, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

Provided that nothing contained in this Order shall be held to prohibit any person from exhibiting or selling on his own laud or premises any animal belonging to him which has been on such lands or premises for not less than thirty days previous to such sale, nor to prohibit the buyer thereof from removing the same within the period of twenty-four hours from the day of sale under a certificate and license according to the Forms marked B and C, provided no case of cattle plague has occurred on the premises, or within half a mile thereof, within the aforesaid period of thirty days.

And it is further ordered and declared,

Thirdly. That it is expedient, from henceforth until the 1st day of March next, that no such animal as before enumerated (except sheep as hereafter provided for), nor any raw or untanned hides or skins, nor any horns or hoofs, of any animal as aforesaid, not previously disinfected, nor any offal of such animals, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, or from any infected locality, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place whatever within the Parts of Holland aforesaid.

Provided that nothing contained in this Order shall make it unlawful for any person to bring or send with the license of any two Justices acting in and for the said Parts of Holland, any such animals, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or dung, or litter, or other articles as aforesaid from any land or premises in his own occupation, and beyond the Parts of Holland, to any other lands or premises in his own occupation within the said Parts.

Provided also that nothing in this Order shall render it unlawful for any person to bring or send, with a certificate (in the form A) hereto annexed, any sheep (whether fat or store) from or to any market, fair, or other place beyond or within the Parts of Holland, to or from any land in his own occupation within the said Parts.

And it is further ordered and declared,

Fourthly. That it is expedient, from henceforth until the 1st day of March next, that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine, nor any

raw or untanned hides or skins, nor horns or hoofs of any animals as aforesaid, or the offal of any such animals, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, which has not been properly disinfected, or from any infected locality, shall be removed from any lands in the said Parts of Holland, in the occupation of any person or persons, to any other lands in the same Parts, in the occupation of the same person or persons, or from place to place generally within the said Parts of Holland.

Provided that it shall be lawful for any owner or owners to remove any such animals as last aforesaid, being in a healthy state, or any hides or skins, or horns or hoofs of any animals previously disinfected, or the offal thereof, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, not likely to propagate infection, from lands or premises in the same or adjoining parishes in his or their own occupation, within the Parts of Holland aforesaid, to other lands or premises also in his or their own occupation, the distance to be travelled not to exceed ten miles.

Provided also, that it shall be lawful for any owner or owners to move any such animals or things as last aforesaid with a certificate in the form marked E, to the nearest convenient railway station within the Parts of Holland, for the purpose of carrying such animals or things out of the jurisdiction.

Provided also, that it shall be lawful for any person or persons to remove any such animals or things as last aforesaid from parishes or places within the Parts of Holland aforesaid to other parishes or places within the said Parts, on condition that, prior to the removal, a certificate in the form B hereto annexed shall be obtained, signed by a Magistrate, Churchwarden, or Guardian, or Overseer of the Poor residing near the place from which it is desired to effect the removal, and that a license of removal consequent on the aforesaid certificate, in the form C hereto annexed, be obtained, signed by a Magistrate residing near the place to which it is desired to cause the removal, such certificate and license to be available only under the restrictions therewith specified; and both of them to be obtained and signed before the removal be commenced.

Provided also, that persons having cattle agisted out shall be considered as occupying the land on which such cattle are agisted, and shall be permitted to move such cattle so agisted upon obtaining the certificate B and license C as aforesaid.

Provided also, that with respect to any animal purchased by butchers for immediate slaughter on their own premises, the butcher purchasing such animal shall obtain a certificate from the vendor that the animal so sold is in a healthy state, and that he has not had any case of cattle plague upon his premises within twenty-eight days; and the said butcher shall also give a certificate engaging to slaughter the said animal within twenty-four hours of its arrival on his premises (the same not exceeding a distance of fifteen miles from the vendor's premises), such certificates to be in the form D hereto annexed, and to be delivered by the butcher forthwith to the nearest resident policeman. A duplicate copy of the certificates to be handed to the driver of the cattle, and to be produced by him to the police when demanded.

Provided also, that nothing contained in the foregoing orders, or any or either of them, shall render it unlawful to take any cow or sow in a healthy state to or from any bull or boar within a distance of five miles; but the owner of the cow or sow shall be bound to produce within forty-eight hours, if demanded by the police, a

certificate signed by the owner of the bull or boar that the cow or sow was so bonâ fide taken; and that his permission to bring the cow or sow to the bull or boar had been previously obtained.

Provided also, that nothing contained in the foregoing Orders, or any or either of them, shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animals or things, as aforesaid, by railway through the Parts of Holland, as authorised by the Orders of the Privy Council.

And it is further ordered,

Provided always, that nothing contained in this order shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animals, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles aforesaid by railway through such jurisdiction, or to send or carry away any such animals, or any such hides, skins, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain, into the borough of Folkestone, to the nearest railway station for the purpose of carrying them through or out of the said borough, or prohibit the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf between the hours of eleven o'clock at night and six o'clock in the morning from either of the railway stations at Folkestone, to such place only within the said borough where such animal shall be removed or taken to be slaughtered, if such animal shall have been first examined by the Inspector appointed, or to be appointed, for the said borough of Folkestone at such station before its removal, and the sanction of such Inspector for such removal shall have been given in writing, and that such animal shall be slaughtered within 24 hours from the time of such removal, or prohibit the removal of any hide, skin, horn, hoof, or offal of such animals so slaughtered as aforesaid; also, within 24 hours from the time of such removal.

And provided further, that nothing contained in this order shall make it unlawful for any person to remove any such animals for breeding purposes within the said borough, if such animals shall have been first examined by the Inspector, and such sanction in writing, as in the previous

That a certificate from a magistrate of the county or borough where such cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, or calves have been kept, certifying that such animals have been kept, during fourteen days at least before the date of such certificate, in the same place from whence it is desired to remove the same, and that the said disorder has not been within the parish, or within two miles of such place, shall be delivered to the Inspector for my jurisdiction, or to any police constable thereof requiring the same.

3rd. That every such animal as aforesaid sent into my jurisdiction, for transmission by rail, shall be trucked and forwarded on the same day on which it is so sent.

4th. That every such animal as aforesaid, sent into my jurisdiction for slaughter, shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours after its arrival, and shall be driven direct to the slaughter-house, and there kept till killed.

5th. That every raw or untanned hide, skin, horn, or hoof, brought into my jurisdiction, except as aforesaid, shall be certified by a duly appointed Inspector of the district from whence the same has been brought, as having been brought from a district where no cattle plague has been known for fourteen days previous to such animals being killed, or within two miles of the place from whence it comes; such certificate to be delivered to the Inspector for my jurisdiction, or to any police constable thereof as aforesaid.

3rd. That every such animal as aforesaid sent into my jurisdiction for transmission by rail, shall be trucked and forwarded on the same day on which it is so sent.

4th. That every such animal as aforesaid sent into my jurisdiction for slaughter, shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours after its arrival, and shall be driven direct to the slaughter-house, and there kept till killed.

The Right Honourable Sir William Erle, Knt., Lord Chief Justice of Her Majesty's Court of Common Pleas, at Westminster, has appointed William Cozens, of the town of Haverfordwest, Gentleman, to be one of the Perpetual Commissioners for taking the acknowledgments of deeds to be executed by married women, under the Act passed for the abolition of fines and recoveries, and for the substitution of more simple modes of assurance, in and for the town and county of the town of Haverfordwest, also in and for the county of Pembroke.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the twenty-eighth year of the reign of Her Majesty, cap. 45, entitled "An Act to provide for the Collection by means of Stamps of Fees payable in the Superior Courts of Law at Westminster, and in the Offices belonging thereto," it is provided by the third section thereof, that the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, with the concurrence of the Lord Chief Justices and of the Lord Chief Baron, may from time to time make such rules as seem fit for regulating the use of the stamps under this Act, and particularly for prescribing the application thereof to documents from time to time in use or required to be used for the purposes of such stamps, and for insuring the proper cancellation of adhesive stamps and keeping account of such stamps. Now we, being two of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, with the concurrence of the Lord Chief Justices and of the Lord Chief Baron, do hereby order and direct that the following rules be observed in respect to stamps used and taken in reference to proceedings at Nisi Prius on the Circuits by the Clerk of Assize acting as Associate, his officers and clerks.

1. The stamps to be used for collecting the fees payable to the Clerks of Assize as Associates on Circuit, shall be procured and paid for by the parties liable to pay such fees.

2. A book or books shall be kept by the Clerks of Assize acting as Associates on Circuit, in which

book or books shall be entered the names of the several causes, against which shall be placed adhesive stamps of the value required during the different stages of a cause, and it shall be the duty of the Clerk of Assize acting as Associate, or of his officer or clerk, to cancel such stamps immediately after they are placed in such books, either by obliterating the same by means of a hand stamp and printing ink, or by writing his initials and the date of cancellation thereon.

3. The fees payable to the Clerks of Assize acting as Associates on Circuits on receiving writs of subpoena, and for attendance on such writs, shall be taken in stamps, which shall be affixed to such writ, and be cancelled by the Clerk of Assize or his officer, in the manner hereinbefore provided.

4. That when any stamp has been cancelled without having been legitimately used, the Clerk of Assize or his Deputy shall certify that such stamp is a fit subject for allowance, and it shall be competent to the Board of Inland Revenue, upon the presentation of such certificate, to allow the amount thereof.

5. That distributors of stamps, and all persons licensed to sell stamps in England and Wales, shall be permitted to sell the stamps above referred to.

6. The several Clerks of Assize shall on or before the 31st day of December in each year, make out an account of all stamps cancelled in their respective offices, specifying the number of each denomination, and the circuits on which such stamps were respectively received, and shall render such account to the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury.

And whereas the harbours so specified comprised part of Dover Bay, namely; as much thereof as is comprised within the following limits (that is to say):—from Arch Cliff Fort, on the west, to Guildford Battery, on the east, including the Inner Tidal Harbour, the Admiralty Pier and all approaches thereto, and seaward for a distance of one mile from the shore.

And whereas it appears to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty that the interests of Her Majesty's Naval Service no longer require that the said part of Dover Bay should be excepted out of the operation of Section eight of the said Act.

Now, therefore, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty do, by this writing, in pursuance of the said Act, and by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the said Act or otherwise in them vested, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, give the Lords of the said Committee notice, that the said notice of the 28th day of April, 1863, as far as the same relates to part of Dover Bay, shall be and the same is hereby revoked.

MEDITERRANEAN.—WEST COAST OF ITALY.

THE Minister of Commerce and Public Works at Rome has given notice, that on the 1st day of January, 1866, the following lights would be established on the coast of the Roman States:—

FIUMARA-GRANDE.

Fixed Light on San Michele Tower.

A *fixed* white light on San Michele tower, on the left bank of the Fiumara-Grande branch of the Tiber, at an elevation of 88 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 15 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the third order.

The tower is small, octagonal, and stands on the north part of the large tower of San Michele, at nearly a mile from the south point of entrance to the river, and rather more than 4 cables from the beach south of it. It is elevated 77 feet above the ground, and is in lat. 41° 44' 33" N., long. 12° 15' 11" East of Greenwich, or about 2 miles east of that of the Admiralty charts.

Lights at Fiumicino.

Two lights at the mouth of the Fiumicino branch of the Tiber:—one a *fixed* white light at about 50 yards from the extremity of the north mole, 20 feet above the sea, and visible at a

distance of 4 miles. The other at 28 yards from the extremity of the south jetty, also a *fixed* white light, 20 feet above the sea, and visible 4 miles.

Lights at Port Badino.

Two *fixed* white lights at Port Badino:—one placed at about 45 yards from the extremity of the dike west of Portatore canal, 15 feet above the sea, and visible 4 miles. Its position is given in lat. $41^{\circ} 17' N.$, long. $13^{\circ} 9' 9''$ East of Greenwich, or about $2\frac{3}{4}'$ west of that of the Admiralty charts. The other light is about 30 yards from the extremity of the dike east of the canal.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the fourth order.

Fixed Light on Mount Circeo or Circello.

A *fixed* white light on Mount Circeo or Circello, at an elevation of 124 feet above the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 17 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the third order.

The tower is round, 71 feet high, adjoining a house in Cervia battery, and stands in lat $41^{\circ} 13' 21'' N.$, long. $13^{\circ} 4' 9''$ East of Greenwich.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 6.)—ATLANTIC OCEAN.

Currents near the Equator.

Doubts having recently arisen as to the correctness of published statements relative to the currents that prevail in the immediate neighbourhood of the Roccas, a dangerous shoal in lat. $3^{\circ} 51' 30'' S.$, long. $33^{\circ} 47' W.$, 130 miles to the N.E. of Cape St. Roque (and which lies in the track of vessels taking an extreme westwardly route in passing from the North to the South Atlantic Oceans), it is deemed desirable to publish for the information of mariners the following facts bearing on this question, lest the authority on which the well grounded statements hitherto received by seamen may be unjustly weakened.

The latest Admiralty hydrographic work embracing the Roccas was published in 1864, under the title of *The South American Pilot*, Part I. In it, in addition to the position and nature of these rocks, the following statement is given: "The current in the vicinity of Fernando Noronha and the Roccas sets strong to the westward; at 2 miles westward of the latter it has been found to run $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles an hour. The many wrecks that have taken place on the Roccas is sufficient to prove to the mariner the necessity of caution when in the vicinity of this dangerous reef;" and "when in the vicinity of St. Paul's rocks, chronological observations should be frequently taken, allowance made for the current, and a good look out kept. In proceeding to the southward, if to the westward of Fernando Noronha, the same precautions are necessary to avoid that dangerous reef the Roccas."

The stream which sets to the westward past this reef, as just described, is well known to seamen as the equatorial current. This great current is thus broadly described by the late

Major Rennel, whose well known investigations of the currents of the Atlantic Ocean—as derived from the logs of all the ships of war and Indiamen which had traversed those seas for 30 or 40 years previously to his death in 1830—form the basis of the several works on this branch of hydrography which have been published for the use of navigators:—"This stream continues its course along both sides of the equator (from the western coast of South Africa). It receives constant supplies from the drift current of the South Atlantic, so that by the time it has reached the middle point between the two continents, it has acquired during the season of the northern summer a vast breadth, and in some places a rate of three miles per hour. At the middle point between the two continents, and precisely at the equator, the stream (now considerably widened) sends off a very large branch to the N.W., whilst the main stream turns to the W.S.W., pointing to the promontory of Cape St. Roque, and when it approaches that cape it subdivides, the largest part passing by the north of the cape towards the West Indies, the other southward along the eastern coast of Brazil."

As many recent navigators have in practice adopted a more westwardly route for crossing the equator than prevailed in former years, it appears desirable that the facts accumulated as to the general correctness of the foregoing description, and especially as to the direction and strength of the currents in the vicinity of the Roccas and Cape St. Roque, should be brought to the notice of seamen briefly and clearly.

In the immediate neighbourhood of the Roccas there is the following testimony to the generally strong westerly current:—

"The East India ship *Britannia* and King George transport were wrecked on the Roccas at 4 a.m., November 2nd, 1805, when the current set at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ knots to the westward."—Brazil Pilot, 1818, p. 31.

Lieut.-Commander Lee, in the U.S. brig *Dolphin*, was employed 14 days in March, 1851, sounding near and surveying the Roccas and their vicinity. He states, "the current in the vicinity of this reef sets *from* between S.E. by E. and E. by N. at the rate of from $\frac{3}{10}$ to $1\frac{1}{2}$ knots per hour. The surface current found by trials on four different days sets *from* between S.E. and E. by N. from $\frac{3}{10}$ to $1\frac{4}{10}$ knots per hour. At our anchorage under the lee of Sand Island the tide ran from $\frac{3}{10}$ to $\frac{5}{10}$ knots per hour, setting *from* between S.S.E. and E. by N. towards the northward and westward;" also, "the current between the Roccas and the Main sets generally *from* the southward and eastward from 1 to $1\frac{1}{2}$ knots."

In March, 1856, H.M.S. *Sharpshooter*, Lieut.-Commander Parish, anchored near the Roccas, and at the suggestion of the British Consul at Pernambuco, planted several cocoa-nut trees. In this officer's remarks he states, "We found the current to set W.N.W. *true* between 1 and 2 miles per hour."

On 12th November, 1856, in the afternoon, the ship *True Briton*, in passing the Roccas and observing signals of distress on the shore, endeavoured to communicate and render assistance by boat, but from the strength of the current was unable to do so from the ship being swept to leeward so fast. On the 13th November, it is stated, "found that the ship during the last 24 hours had been set to the westward 60 miles. On the 14th November, find that the ship has been set to the westward 36 miles during the last 24 hours."

In 1858, Commander J. H. Selwyn, in H.M.S. *Siren*, visited the Roccas and erected a temporary beacon. He states that the "anchorage is fair

and protected from the prevalent swell from N.E. to S.E.," and "from its situation in the heart of a westerly current, which varies in force from 1 to 2 miles, and its comparative vicinity to the mainland, a lighthouse would be most valuable to the mariner, as a means of ascertaining his position with certainty."

Numerous other isolated examples of the westerly current prevailing near this reef will be found in published works; but the following analysis of the registers of 930 ships, which have been deposited with the Meteorological Department of the Board of Trade between 1856 and 1865, will, doubtless, be deemed sufficient.

Of these 930 ships passing from the North to the South Atlantic Ocean, 42 passed within a distance of 30 to 40 miles east or west of the Rocas at various seasons of the year. Of these 42, 14 do not record whether they have experienced any current or not. One experiences "a strong westerly current," and was "driven back." The remaining 27 found currents of the following direction and rate:—

- 11 vessels were set West;—4 of these from 48 to 24 miles, and the remaining 7, from 20 to 10 miles a day.
- 8 vessels were set W.N.W.;—4 of these from 51 to 30 miles, and 4 from 29 to 21 miles a day.
- 5 vessels were set W.S.W.;—3 of these from 48 to 30 miles, and 2 from 20 to 10 miles a day.
- 1 vessel was set S.W.;—40 miles a day.
- 2 vessels were set North;—12 to 8 miles a day.

The strongest of these 27 recorded currents were found in June, July, August, and November.

Misconception has also arisen relative to the *easterly current* which has occasionally been found in the parallels of 9° to 2° N, a special and striking example of which is given in the South American Pilot, as having been experienced by the brigantine Monte Christo in her voyage from Cayenne to Parahiba, in July and August, 1862.

This *counter current* has been traced to extend, at certain months of the year, from the meridian

of 53° or 50° W. to that of about 25° W., and thus joining or forming a part of the well-known Guinea current. It is seldom experienced to the southward of 2° N., and there are very few records of its being found on or to the southward of the equator; it must not, therefore, be confounded with the equatorial current, as before described, for in the meridian of the Rocas its southern edge may generally be expected to be found about 350 miles to the northward. The western limits of this occasional *easterly current* have been ascertained from numerous observations of French ships of war visiting Cayenne and the neighbouring ports, and discussed by the able French seamen Lartigue and Montravel (1827 and 1851), and may be generally stated as existing between the meridians of 53° and 40° W. and the parallels of 9° and 5° N., where it has been found running at the rate of 60 miles a day in July, August, and September. Within these limits this counter current does not appear to be constant or certain in direction, a westerly current more generally prevailing.

To the eastward of 40° W. part of this easterly current approaches nearer the equator, or to about 2° N., and decreases considerably in strength, until joining the Guinea current, where it increases again in velocity as it nears the African shores. Within these eastern limits it appears to run the strongest in the summer and autumn months; and East of 30° W. to be generally constant during the year. Between the meridians of 30° and 20° west, and the parallels of 8° and 4° N. it has been found to run from 30 to 15 miles a day.

As the best meridian for crossing the equator by outward bound ships, still appears to be an unsettled question among navigators, and as it is connected with the subject of the equatorial currents referred to above, it may be of interest to seamen to append the following tabular statement, showing where each of the 930 ships already alluded to made their crossings; it being observed that all these ships were bound from British ports either to or round the Cape of Good Hope, round Cape Horn, or to some port of South America, southward of Bahia, between 1855 and 1865;—

It is impossible, without a more rigid analysis than has yet been bestowed on this question of crossing the equator, to determine with precision the best meridian. It is certain that it must vary according to the seasons, and perhaps the months; and as will be seen by a few examples appended, the evidences of the advantages of the more easterly route contrast favourably with the extreme westerly route.

Until, however, the various conditions attending the size, class, and speed of the ships, the favouring circumstances or otherwise of veins of wind, or calms, and other local conditions are duly allowed for and include a large number of ships extending over several years, it appears reasonable to assign weight to the practical results afforded in the above tabular statement.

One fact is observable in compiling this state-

ment, viz., that of the 930 ships, 808 passed 100 miles or more to the eastward of the Roccas, and thus to the eastward of Fernando Noronha.

Examples of the number of days occupied by *Sailing* ships in reaching the equator in different meridians and at different months of the year from among the 930 ships quoted:—

In January and February 3 ships of 609, 614, and 1,126 tons respectively, cross the equator in 21° , $24\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$, and $32\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W., and are respectively 21 days from Greenock, 22 days from the Start, and 23 days from Liverpool.

In March, April, and June, 4 ships of 964, 898, 1,041 (deeply laden), and 477 tons respectively, cross the equator in $21\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$, $23\frac{3}{4}^{\circ}$, $24\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$, and 28° , and are respectively 21 $\frac{1}{2}$, 26, 31, and 34 days from Deal, Plymouth, Gravesend, and Liverpool.

In July and September, 3 ships of 1,160, 1,202 and 765 tons respectively, cross the equator in $30\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$, $32\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$, and $32\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W., and are 20 $\frac{1}{2}$, 38, and 42 days respectively from Scilly, the Downs, and Liverpool.

In November, 1855 and 1856, 2 ships of 1,050 and 300 tons respectively cross the equator in $31\frac{1}{4}^{\circ}$ and 31° W., and are 45 and 21 $\frac{1}{2}$ days in crossing the equator from Liverpool; the ship making the longest passage leaves Liverpool with a "fair but light wind," which lasted with slight intermission to the N.E. Trades, which were also light. Ship was 14 days from 6° N. to the equator."
